- Parking --** Plenty, although there is no media parking area, as such. All parking around the stadium is free.

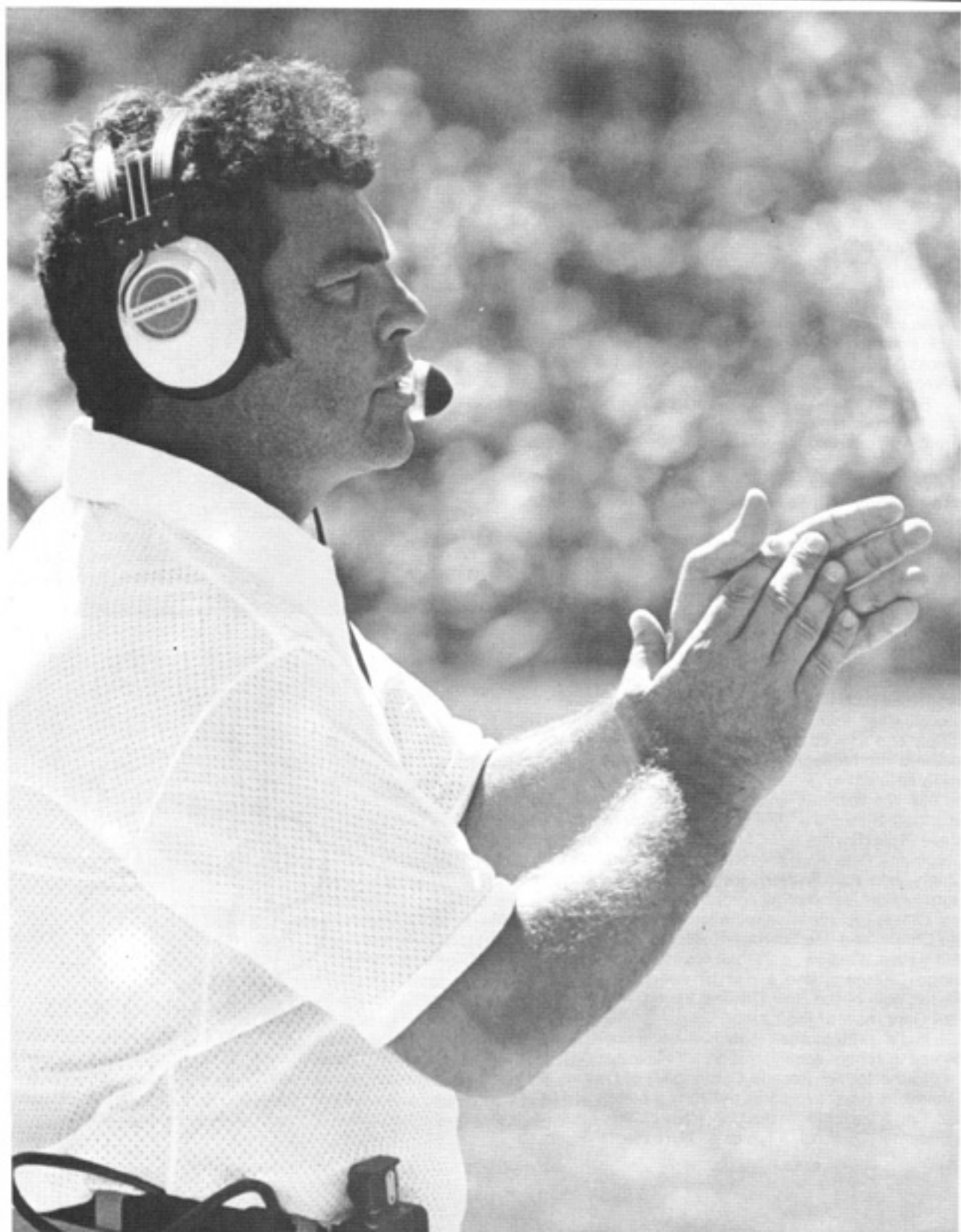

# DICK JAMIESON

## HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Dick Jamieson, a former star quarterback at Bradley University and for six years ('72-'77) the offensive coordinator at the University of Missouri, is in his second season as head football coach at Indiana State.

As a 19-year-old sophomore at his hometown university (in Peoria, Ill.) Jamieson led the nation's small colleges in total offense and directed Bradley to a 7-2-1 record in 1956. Although he left BU to sign a pro baseball contract (as a catcher) the following spring and didn't gain his bachelor's degree until 1961, the strong-armed signal caller's grid playing career wasn't at an end.

After two seasons behind the plate in the Pittsburgh Pirate organization, Jamieson traded his "tools of ignorance" for a spot on the Baltimore Colt roster and sideline. There, in 1959, he studiously served as backup quarterback to NFL Hall of Famer Johnny Unitas. ("It was easy playing behind him. Johnny was playing so well, I had very little to do," Jamieson recalls.)

Not being one to sit back and watch, Jamieson left the security of the Colts to join the New York Titans of the fledgling American Football League. There, in 1960 and '61, he piloted the Titan offense until suffering a serious back injury. ("We used to run to the bank to cash our checks," says a smiling Jamieson about the now super-solvent Jets.)

So, Jamieson -- articulate enough to hold down the job of sports director at Peoria TV station WMBD in 1961 -- turned to coaching, becoming backfield tutor at Bradley from 1962-64. The lure of playing brought him back to the AFL in 1965 where he served as a player-coach with the Houston Oilers. Again a backup signal caller -- this time to ever-youthful (or ever-aged) George Blanda -- his coaching responsibility was as receiver mentor.

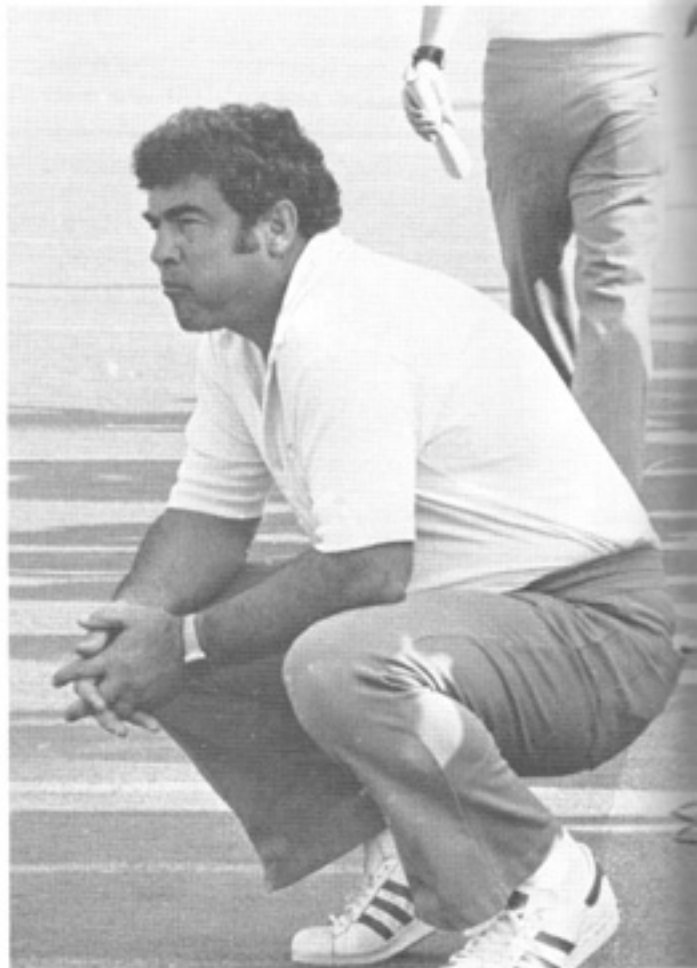
Jamieson returned to coaching for good the following year when he moved back to Peoria as head coach at his prep alma mater, Central High. In six seasons there his club posted an impressive 40-19-1 mark, including a conference title and "Coach of the Year" honors in 1970.

A success at the prep level, Jamieson joined the Missouri staff in 1972. There, under Al Onofrio, he was in charge of both quarterbacks and receivers -- as well as coordinating the Tiger offense. To Mizzou he brought variety and a touch of innovation to an attack which once featured the fullback up the middle on third down and a (railroad) yard to go.

An ace recruiter and an outstanding coach of offensive football, some of Jamieson's prize players at MU were Steve Pisarkiewicz, a '77 first round pick of the St. Louis Cardinals, Pete Woods, fourth pick of the Kansas City Chiefs, and Phil Bradley, the Big Eight's all-conference signal caller last year as a sophomore.

Others include wide receivers Henry Marshall, now of the Chiefs, and Joe Stewart of the Oakland Raiders, tight end Kellen Winslow, a '79 first round selection of the San Diego Chargers, and a pair of Peorians, tackle James Taylor, now of the New Orleans Saints, and runningback Earl Gant, now of the Chiefs.

ISU's 14th football coach, who gained a master's degree in school administration at Bradley in 1966, is married to the former Rosalie Cottingham of Ottawa, Ill. The Jamiesons have two sons, Jeff, 21, a senior at Missouri, and Tim, 20, a junior at the University of New Orleans, and a daughter, Judi, 15, a junior at Terre Haute South.



## INDIANA STATE ASSISTANT COACHES



**STEVE BRICKEY**  
QB-RECEIVER COACH

Youngest member of the Indiana State football coaching staff is 25-year-old Steve Brickey.

Brickey, a '77 graduate of Missouri, came to ISU after serving as a graduate assistant coach at Mizzou two years ago. Under Coach Dick Jamieson here his responsibility is working with receivers and quarterbacks.

As an Afton High senior in 1971, Brickey was a first-team All-Metro selection at quarterback by the St. Louis POST-DISPATCH. Unfortunately, a pair of knee injuries ended his playing career at MU.

Active in sports of all sorts, Brickey is the lone bachelor on the staff.



**DICK COMAR**  
DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

Dick Comar, who joined Dick Jamieson's grid staff in mid-summer, is in his first campaign as the

Sycamore defensive line coach. For the past two years he was a member of the Wayne State staff in Detroit, first as offensive line coach and last year as defensive coordinator.

Before his stint at Wayne State, Comar was voted the 1976 Detroit Catholic League "Coach of the Year" while at Southgate Aquinas High School. A graduate of Adrian (Mich.) Catholic Central where he lettered 14 times in four sports, he was football coach (and athletic director) at Aquinas from '69 through '76, compiling a 47-16-3 record.

The 40-year-old Comar is a 1963 graduate of the University of Detroit, where he majored in biology and starred in fencing for four years. He also earned a master of science degree in biology from St. Mary's College in Winona, Minn., after doing graduate work at Purdue, Wayne State and Eastern Michigan.

Comar and his wife, Carol, have four children: Cathy, 14, John, 13, Jenny, 9, and Joe, 3.



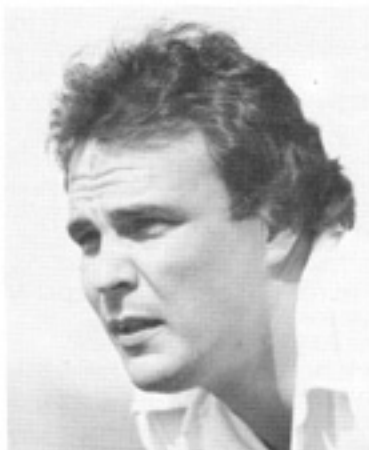
**JIM DONAHUE**  
DEFENSIVE BACK COACH

Jim Donahue, like his boss Dick Jamieson and fellow-aide Pete Hoener--a graduate of Bradley University ('73), is Indiana State's new defensive backfield coach.

Donahue, who joined Jamieson's staff last March, came to ISU from Winnebago High School in Rockford, Ill., where he had been head football coach for the past two seasons. Previous to his duties in Rockford he was an assistant grid coach at East Peoria High for two years ('75-'76) and assistant football coach and head baseball

coach at his prep alma mater, Peoria Spalding, for three years ('72-'74).

The 30-year-old Donahue and his wife, Mary, have three children: Amy, 8, Mark, 4, and Guy, 1.



**PETE HOENER**  
OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

Pete Hoener, like two others, is in his second year as an assistant football coach at Indiana State.

Hoener (pronounced HAY-nur), who coaches the Sycamore offensive linemen, joined the ISU staff after spending 1977 at another ISU, Illinois State. Before that he was a graduate assistant for two years ('75 and '76) at Missouri.

A native of Peoria, Ill., Hoener was a three-year starter at tight end for Bradley University. A '73 Brave grad, his first two years of coaching were at Peoria Spalding and Belvidere, respectively.

Also a five-year veteran of semi-pro hockey, the 27-year-old Hoener and his wife, Marianne, have an infant daughter, Jennifer.

## INDIANA STATE ASSISTANT COACHES

### DENNIS RAETZ

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Coordinating Indiana State's defensive efforts this season is second-year Sycamore aide Dennis Raetz.

Raetz (pronounced RATES), who also is in charge of linebackers and defensive ends, was graduated from Nebraska in 1968 and three years later gained a master's degree from Central Missouri State.

He joined Coach Jamieson's staff after spending a season at Missouri (1977) where he served as MU's junior varsity grid coach. Previous to that he was head football coach for four years ('73-76) at Harmon High School in Kansas City, Kansas.

The 33-year-old North Platte, Neb., native is married. He and his wife, Betty, have one daughter, Jaime (4-1/2), and a son, Mark (1).

### BOB TURNER

OFFENSIVE BACK COACH

Bob Turner, who starred in Indiana State's defensive secondary for three seasons, is in his fifth year as a Sycamore coach--and third working with the offensive backfield.

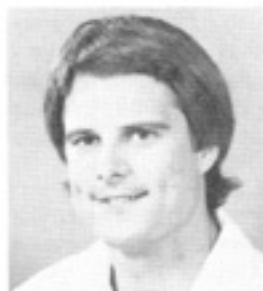
Turner, a '72 grad, tied a former ISU record by intercepting nine passes during his sophomore year, and picked off a total of 16 aerials for 219 yards in three campaigns ('69-71). He also returned 22 punts for 250 yards and a TD during his career.

Before joining the Sycamore staff at his alma mater, Turner was assistant football and basketball coach at Kokomo Haworth for three years ('73-75).

The 30-year-old East Chicago Washington product is married to the former Sheryl Oliver.



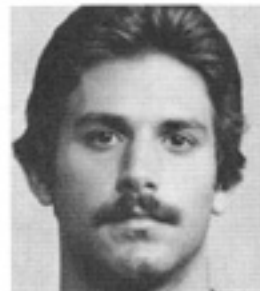

# INDIANA STATE FOOTBALL '79 OUTLOOK

Last season, his first in the Missouri Valley Conference, Indiana State football coach Dick Jamieson didn't exactly know what to expect. This year it's different.

"This (the MVC) is a good football league--better than most people give it credit for," said Jamieson, as he, his staff and team prepare for a well-balanced loop race in 1979.

The Sycamores, fifth in the Valley (2-3) and 3-8 overall last season, again are young in '79--extremely young. In fact, of the 37 returning lettermen less than a dozen are seniors. Add a handful of junior college transfers and 27 incoming freshmen, and it's apparent that Jamieson and assistants have plenty of work to do on collegiate fundamentals.

But--indeed--there is a good bit of talent with which to work. Heading that list are six all-Missouri Valley selections from last year, four on defense. Tops is junior weak safety John Allman, who received all-America special mention from THE SPORTING NEWS and a first team all-MVC selection by both the Associated Press and United Press International voters. Allman, at 6-1, 188 pounds, led ISU in tackles as a sophomore with 117, including 68 primaries. He also broke up 10 passes and intercepted one.

While Allman is the hub of secondary, another key defender is soph linebacker Craig Shaffer, who ranked second on the squad in tackles with 109--as well as breaking up seven passes, recovering three fumbles and returning a blocked punt for a 49-yard touchdown. Shaffer was an all-MVC second team choice by AP. Another second teamer is senior defensive end Gerry Gluscic, who was involved in 68 tackles, including 17 for a loss of 80 yards.

Offensively, Jamieson is confident about his receivers and running backs.

"In physical ability, I feel we have a trio of sophomore receivers that have the tools and ability to play anywhere in the country," boasts the former Baltimore Colt backup signal caller. The three Jamieson is referring to are wide

receivers Eddie Ruffin and Kirk Wilson and tight end Hubert Moore, who accounted for 760 yards in 42 catches among them.

ISU also has depth at running back, where junior Zack Washington earned honorable mention all-MVC from AP's sportswriters. Besides Washington five other lettering backs return, all of whom are sophomores or juniors.

And the all-important quarterback spot is every bit as young with sophs Reggie Allen and Scott Bartel as top candidates. Another contender--if he recovers from winter knee surgery--is "redshirted" Mike Shannon, again listed as a freshman. (While Allen completed only 35 passes last year, he connected on four TD aeriels in the '78 finale against Wichita State, a school record.)

The Sycamores' kicking game--dependent the last four years on four-year stalwarts David Vandercook and Bill Edwards--is an area that must be filled and as such enters the '79 campaign as a major question mark.

Jamieson, who insists that depth is a problem at 90 per cent of colleges across the nation, admits it concerns him--especially in the offensive and defensive lines. Keys in the trenches include senior center Tunch Ilkin and junior guard Mark Gradkowski, a former defensive starter.

"We'll be counting on freshmen as backups particularly in the defensive line and at linebackers. Still, we were very pleased in this year's recruiting class," he said. Ace Sycamores landed figure to be two-time Illinois all-state linebacker Richard Anderson of Peoria, and running backs James Banks of Cincinnati and Eddie Foley of St. Louis--a pair of all-state prepsters.

All in all, Indiana State certainly won't be favored to win the Missouri Valley, but opponents--including Mid-American champ Ball State and major independent Louisville and defending MVC titlist New Mexico State--are going to have to battle tooth and nail to avoid being dealt defeat by the Sycamores.

## PROBABLE CANDIDATES FOR POST-SEASON HONORS



**JOHN ALLMAN (46) Defensive Back, 6-1, 188, Jr., St. Louis, Mo.**

Something of a question mark at the beginning of last season, he turned himself into an exclamation point with a brilliant season at free safety . . . was an offensive back as a freshman, but in his first season on defense he became an all-conference performer and earned mention on The Sporting News All-America team, only the second Sycamore to be so honored (all-time leading rusher Vincent Allen was the first) . . . was the leading tackler from the first game to the last, contributing 117 stops, breaking up 10 passes and intercepting another . . . it isn't usually a good thing for a team to be led in tackles by a safety, but it's hard to keep this one away from the action--he even had eight stops behind the line of scrimmage . . . as a freshman he had three carries for eight yards, caught two passes for 19 yards, returned two kickoffs for 17 yards and scored a two-point conversion . . . also has the vital but unsung responsibility of being the holder for Sycamore kickers . . . played for Coach Tom Moran at Cleveland High School . . . majoring in health at ISU . . . born 5-7-59.



**CRAIG SHAFFER (55) Linebacker, 6-1, 208, So., Terre Haute**

A former halfback who last season was a revelation after switching to the linebacker position and who seems to get better and better with every game and even every practice . . . 2nd team MVC selection (AP) last season . . . has everything you'd want in a linebacker -- quickness, speed, a love of contact, a nose for the football and a lot of aggression . . . was a little small for the position at the beginning of last season (about 195 pounds) but has worked with weights constantly since then and has gained about 20 more pounds (he hopes to get to about 220) without losing any of his speed . . . even scored a touchdown at Illinois State when he blocked a punt and took it 49 yards (which actually made him the team's leading punt returner too) . . . finished the year with 109 tackles (including a team-leading total of 20 behind the line of scrimmage) while breaking up seven passes and recovering three fumbles . . . an all-state halfback at the former Schulte High School for Coach Jay Barrett, playing in the North-South All-Star game and winning the McMillan Award as the outstanding high school athlete in Vigo County (he also played basketball and baseball and threw the discus) . . . no major yet . . . born 3-31-59.



**ZACK WASHINGTON (21) Running Back, 5-10, 194, Jr., Jeannette, Pa.**

Perhaps the biggest and most pleasant surprise of the 1978 season, he came from third string to lead the team in rushing and scoring, earning all-conference mention in the process . . . came off the bench to score Indiana State's only touchdown in last season's opener with New Mexico State, added two more scores in the next game with Western Illinois, and rapidly worked his way to the top of the Sycamore list of running backs . . . finished the season with 524 yards in 115 carries and five touchdowns . . . his 4.6-yard average per carry is remarkable, considering his size and the fact that most of his plays were designed to go inside . . . continued his fine work in the spring game, leading the losing Blue team with 71 yards in 18 carries and scoring both his team's touchdowns . . . carried the ball 16 times for 61 yards and caught one pass as a freshman, when most of his work came as a kick returner . . . maybe the smallest Valley fullback but certainly one of the most effective, particularly in short-yardage situations and near the goal line . . . played for Coach Joe Mucci at Jeannette High . . . majoring in environmental safety at ISU . . . born 1-31-59.

One of the inspirational leaders of the Indiana State football team, this two-year regular could probably play almost any position on the field--and if he had to choose, he'd probably pick something besides offensive guard . . . will play where he's needed and play hard, however, and could be an all-conference possibility . . . probably the brightest spot of the offensive line last year, his first season at the position . . . great quickness for pulling assignments and great dedication to the team and to the game . . . was a standout during his freshman season as a 200-pound defensive tackle, making 81 tackles . . . tight end and linebacker at Keystone Oaks High for Coach John Durham . . . major is environmental safety . . . born 4-2-59.



**WAYNE HAMILTON (43) Defensive Back, 6-1, 196, So., Indianapolis**

Rangy defensive back who was a pleasant surprise last season and who may be just coming into his own as a strong safety . . . had 63 tackles last fall to rank fifth on the team, broke up five passes and recovered a fumble . . . followed that up with an outstanding performance in the spring Blue-White game, earning an award as best defensive back in that contest . . . his combination of size and speed has the pro scouts looking already . . . another walk-on, although like French he has earned his aid by now . . . played at Shortridge High under former ISU Academic All-America running back Gary Brown . . . major is mechanical technology . . . born 1-4-58.

Hard to believe to look at this player, particularly when he's out of uniform, but he's a defensive lineman--and a good one at that . . . was actually a 240-pounder when recruited, but lost his baby fat in the summer before coming to school and now occasionally plays under 200 pounds . . . one of his best games last year was across from Drake's 275-pound pro draftee Jack Matia, so lack of size hasn't handicapped him much . . . noseguard as a freshman, then moved to tackle last year, now is likely to move back to noseguard . . . had 49 stops last year, and his quickness made him a pest in opponents' backfields (seven sacks for 42 yards in losses, four deflected passes) . . . played for Coach Robert Jones at Kettering High . . . majoring in business administration . . . born 5-15-59.



**TUNCH ILKIN (58) Center, 6-3-1/2, 243, Sr., Highland Park, Ill.**

Injury cut short the season of this outstanding offensive lineman last year, but he was awarded another season of eligibility by the NCAA and now could be the premier center in the MVC in 1979 . . . moved to tackle to shore up a weakness there a year ago, but has been moved back to his original position--where he was a pre-season all-conference selection last fall . . . named the team's best blocker during the 1977 season, and Coach Jamieson says he's better than most of the centers he saw in the Big Eight while coaching at Missouri . . . showed he had fully recovered from last season's injury with an excellent spring, capped by the award as best offensive lineman in Blue-White game . . . born in Turkey . . . played for Coach John Scornavacco at Highland Park High . . . broadcasting major . . . born 9-23-57.



**LEROY IRVIN (79) Offensive Tackle, 6-3, 224, So., Lockport, Ill.**

Big, strong offensive line prospect who is working hard to win a spot in the Indiana State lineup . . . saw very limited action as a freshman, but showed his dedication to improve by losing about 30 pounds (he's still not exactly small at his current weight) . . . still has a way to go before being considered a regular, but he's looked to for valuable strength and depth at the tackle position this year . . . outstanding physical potential, particularly since he's much quicker--and just as strong--at his present weight . . . two-year letterman at Lockport Central High, where he played for Coach Bill Zimmer--but in the winter participated in wrestling (three seasons) rather than with the Porters' top-ranked basketball squads . . . also an honor student there and is a pre-dentistry major at Indiana State . . . born 11-20-60.



**DON JACKSON (20) Defensive Back, 6-1, 174, Sr., Chicago, Ill.**

His junior season was less spectacular than his sophomore year, when he was all-Valley and Indiana State's award-winner as best defensive back, but this two-year starter still ranks as one of the best pass defenders in the MVC . . . has intercepted four passes in each of the last two years, leading ISU in that category both seasons, and last year had 65 tackles and broke up eight passes . . . had a fine spring game with three deflections and an interception . . . pros are interested, for he's a punishing hitter who can play both safety spots in addition to corner . . . originally enrolled at Alabama A & M, transferring after his freshman year . . . played for Coach Homer Turner at South Shore High . . . a criminology major at Indiana State . . . born 1-29-57.



**KEN KLEIN (89) Tight End, 6-2, 195, Jr., St. Louis, Mo.**

Injury problems have already plagued this excellent sophomore prospect, but if he's healthy, he'll be an outstanding addition to the defensive line this season . . . made one tackle in limited action as a freshman -- and significantly it was at the line of scrimmage . . . had four stops while playing part-time during the Blue-White game in the spring . . . excellent quickness for an interior lineman, and he has the potential to add weight as he gets older and stronger . . . also the only player on the team who is also a certified barber . . . all-city player for Coach Willie Martin at Indianapolis Tech, where he was named honorary captain and his team's best defensive lineman . . . no major yet at ISU . . . born 12-29-59.



**JAMES MASSEY (52) Linebacker, 5-11, 200, Jr., Detroit, Mich.**

Returning squadman who will add depth to the Indiana State defensive unit this fall . . . able to play both linebacker and defensive end, although most of his work this season is expected to be at the former position . . . also ticketed for a lot of special teams play, since he is quick and aggressive and enjoys hitting people . . . made a good impression during spring practice and had a key fumble recovery in the Blue-White game . . . has several highly regarded people ahead of him on the pre-season depth charts, but he's a willing worker and promises to be ready when the call comes . . . named Most Valuable Defensive Player and won the Outstanding Leadership award at Kettering High School, where he played for Coach Robert Jones . . . hasn't declared a major yet . . . born 4-17-59.

Four starters return to the Indiana State secondary, so there aren't any spots open -- yet don't count this outstanding young prospect out of winning a regular job . . . saw very little playing time as a freshman, yet made 37 tackles, broke up two passes and blocked a kick . . . four of his tackles came behind the line of scrimmage for a total of 23 yards in losses . . . strong and rangy with great speed, he seems capable of covering an entire field by himself . . . also a standout in special teams action last fall . . . all-district, all-New Orleans and All-America as a senior at West Jefferson High for Coach Henry Crosby . . . management major at Indiana State . . . born 6-24-59.



**ERIC ROBINSON (40) Running Back, 5-8, 175, Fr., Silver Spring, Md.**

Probably the smallest of Indiana State's running backs and may also be the quickest . . . injured all last season, he was granted a second freshman season by the NCAA and may rank as one of the "secret weapons" of this season's Sycamore team . . . made his presence felt during spring practice, working his way up to a starting job for the Blue-White game and winning honors as best offensive back that day with a sparkling 10-carry, 100-yard performance . . . in some ways similar to ISU's all-time best, Vincent Allen -- not tall, but very strong in the upper body and apparently able to take the punishment a running back has to take . . . high school All-America at John F. Kennedy High for Coach Wes Abrams . . . has yet to select a major . . . born 12-12-60.



**EDDIE RUFFIN (6) Wide Receiver, 5-7, 160, So., Peoria, Ill.**

Tough little guy who proved he was big enough for major college football last season by leading Indiana State in receiving as a freshman . . . caught 19 passes for 290 yards and two scores, including a 62-yard bomb at Louisville . . . size not a handicap as long as the QBs can see him when he goes downfield, for he has demonstrated many times an ability to go up in traffic and make the tough catch . . . great leaping ability . . . perhaps surprisingly, he's also an outstanding blocker, maybe the best among Sycamore wide receivers . . . from a Missouri Valley Conference family, as his older brother, Dan (who's not any bigger) has been a valuable reserve guard with the Bradley basketball team . . . Eddie played basketball and ran track as well as football at Peoria Central High, where his football coach was Larry Lavery . . . no major yet at ISU . . . born 8-26-60.

Steady, hard-working lineman who figures to be in the starting lineup for the third consecutive season this fall . . . won a regular tackle job as a sophomore, switched to guard last season, and now is slated to return to his original position . . . not big as tackles go, but is a consistent player who gets the most out of his ability every time he takes the field . . . coaches hope he's saved his best season for his senior year, because a good year from ISU's offensive tackles would be a key factor in the improvement of the young offensive unit . . . one of the "quiet men" of the team, also one of its most reliable performers . . . three-sport athlete (also wrestling and track) at LaSalle High School in Cincinnati, where he played for Coach Steve Rasso . . . finance major at ISU . . . born 2-17-58.



**MIKE SHANNON (15) Quarterback, 6-3, 201, Fr., St. Louis, Mo.**

A question mark entering fall drills after losing last season and all of spring practice with a knee injury -- but he could quickly turn that question mark into an exclamation point if he's fully recovered . . . before the injury in pre-season drills last fall, he was ranked ahead of both Allen and Bartel, so he could be in the thick of the ISU quarterback battle before long . . . considered the best pure passer on the squad, although not the running threat the other two are . . . yes, he's the son of former St. Louis Cardinal Mike Shannon, currently the Redbirds' broadcaster, but he's not a "Junior" -- his given name is Thomas Michael Joseph Shannon . . . played for Coach Bryan Hagerty at Christian Brothers (CBC), where he also competed in basketball and baseball . . . no major yet . . . born 11-27-59.



**MARVIN SMITH (73) Defensive Lineman, 6-2, 224, So., Indianapolis**

Young defensive lineman who is trying to work his way into the lineup at either defensive tackle or noseguard . . . made impressive progress during spring practice and figures to be a valuable reserve at the positions if he doesn't win a starting job somewhere . . . came to Indiana State as a defensive end and might even see some action there -- in fact, he's willing to play just about any position on the defensive unit . . . worked hard during the off-season, particularly on his quickness and his initial charge out of his stance . . . may just now be reaching his potential and is expected to be a very useful player for the next three campaigns . . . a two-year letterman at Indianapolis Tech for Coach Willie Martin . . . an automotive technology major at ISU . . . born 12-7-58.

Wealth of running backs on the roster has enabled this speedy sophomore to switch to wide receiver, and if spring practice is any indication the move may have been an inspired one . . . caught two passes for 69 yards, including a tumbling grab of a 49-yard scoring strike from Bartel, to lead all Blue-White receivers and also gained six yards on an end-around . . . had 25 carries for 82 yards as a freshman, also caught seven passes in limited playing time . . . missed some games midway through the year with an injury, but is at full strength again . . . full name is John Spradley III . . . played for Coach Robert Lyle at Plaquemine Senior High near New Orleans . . . no major yet . . . born 12-16-60.

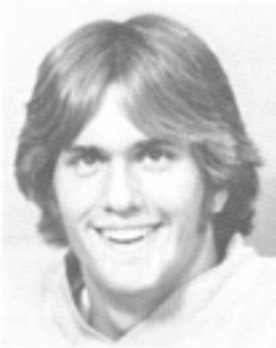
**CARL SPRUILL (53) Center, 6-5, 216, Sr., Norfolk, Va.**

Appears to have the big foot necessary to fill some of the biggest shoes on the Indiana State team -- those worn by four-year kicker David Vandercook . . . came to ISU from Rock Valley Junior College in Rockford, Ill., where he was a second-team all-stater and sixth in the nation in kick scoring last fall . . . soccer-style booter with a strong leg, needs to work only on his consistency . . . came to Indiana State for second semester last year and participated in spring football, but never got to attempt a placement in Blue-White game (after his team fell so far behind it attempted only two-point conversions) . . . three-sport man (also basketball and baseball) at Boylan Central Catholic High in Rockford, where his football coach was Ben Murray . . . marketing major . . . born 3-23-58.



**MARTY STRUTZ (57) Defensive End, 6-1, 200, So., Midlothian, Ill.**

One of the most versatile athletes on the squad, this sophomore has already worked a number of different positions in just one full season and one spring campaign . . . listed as a reserve defensive end this season, and saw most of his action last year at linebacker . . . that's not so unusual -- except that he came to Indiana State as a quarterback . . . has also worked on placekicking, but Sycamore coaches have no plans for him in that area unless an emergency develops . . . willing to make sacrifices to earn a spot in the lineup, an attitude the coaches can appreciate . . . also played baseball and was an honor student at Bremen High School, where his football coach was Ed Novak . . . math major hoping to become an architect . . . born 8-2-60.



**RUDY SUZICH (93) Defensive Tackle, 6-3, 204, Jr., Charleroi, Pa.**

Another of the truly unsung players on the Indiana State football team, he'll again be battling for a limited amount of playing time as a reserve quarterback . . . played only enough last season to log four carries and no pass attempts, but earned a letter doing something few quarterbacks would attempt -- special teams work covering punts and kickoffs . . . toughness has never been his problem, and he's probably taken more licks in practice than any varsity quarterback would get in several seasons of game action . . . had his best day as a Sycamore in the spring Blue-White game, scoring a pair of touchdowns on a one-yard sneak and a 20-yard run . . . played for Coach Bill Kriger at Montour High . . . a speech communication major at Indiana State . . . born 1-8-59.



**DWIGHT TRIPP (86) Defensive End, 6-2, 194, Jr., Detroit, Mich.**

A junior who has made great strides during his two years at Indiana State, he'll get a chance to hold down one of the regular defensive end positions this season . . . lettered as a reserve at that position last fall, and in brief playing time showed potential of being a big-play athlete . . . was in on 20 tackles and ranked third on the team with two fumble recoveries . . . has great reactions and quickness, and when he's in the game he seems to be spending as much time in the opponents' backfield as do their backs . . . has logged more than his share of hours in the weight room and is a much stronger player than his size would indicate . . . teammate of Dale Harvel and James Massey at Kettering High playing for Coach Robert Jones . . . an environmental safety major . . . born 6-5-58.

Linebacker **RICHARD ANDERSON**, 6-2, 225, was a unanimous choice to the All-Big State Ten all-star team last season, as well as being named to the Illinois all-state squad for the past two years while playing at Peoria (Ill.) Manual High . . . **JAMES BANKS**, a 6-2, 190-pound running back, hails from Cincinnati and played for Coach Pat O'Brien at Western Hills High. Banks was a highly-recruited athlete for baseball as well as for football at Western Hills, which includes among its graduates such outstanding athletes as Pete Rose (Philadelphia Phillies), Jack Reynolds (L.A. Rams) and Don Zimmer (Boston Red Sox manager) . . . Ft. Wayne Concordia sends 5-7 speedster **RON BEASLEY** to Indiana State after being a standout athlete for Coach Jack Massucci. Beasley, a 160-pound wide receiver, was a three-year starter in basketball and was named all-Summit Athletic Conference two years in a row for his grid prowess. Beasley, a UPI all-state selection, played in the Indiana North-South all-star game.

**MARK BRYSON**, 6-1, 185, is a defensive back out of Elkhart (Ind.) Memorial, where he played for Coach Dale Rems. Bryson was picked to the AP all-state team . . . wide receiver **DARRYL CHRISTIAN**, 5-10, 165, hails from Evansville where he attended Bosse High and earned all-state, all-conference and all-city honors. Christian was a starting receiver for the South in the Indiana North-South all-star game . . . **ERROL COBBINS**, 6-0, 200, comes to Terre Haute from Kansas City (Ks.) Wyandotte where he was a three-sport star and was named to the Kansas City Star's all-metro honorable mention team as a senior . . . linebacker **DENORVELL COLLIER** earned all-state mention while playing at M.L. King High in Chicago. The 6-4, 200-pound grinder answers to the nickname of "Big D".

**CHRIS DELAPLAINE**, the largest incoming freshman (at 6-5, 245), is an offensive tackle from Bedford (Ind.) North Lawrence, also the prep alma mater of ISU basketballer Scott Turner . . . **DAN DICKEY**, a 6-3, 220-pound offensive guard from St. Louis, was named all-district as a senior and earned All-Suburban South mention as a junior at Oakville High . . . **MAX DILLON**, 6-3, 205, tight end, won all-conference, all-district and honorable mention all-metro credit while at Lafayette High School in suburban St. Louis (Baldwin), Mo. . . . Another highly sought after running back coming to ISU also is a St. Louisan. He's 5-10, 156-pound **EDDIE FOLEY** who hails from Soldan High. There he was named all-Public League, honorable mention all-America and all-metro while playing under Coach Ron Villars. Former Sycamore quarterback Calvin "Pete" McCoy was a prep star at Soldan . . . a late-summer signee is 6-foot, 165-pound punter **GREG GUICHET** (pronounced GEE-shay), an all-district selection at Redemptorist High in Baton Rouge, La.

**DAVID HENRY**, 5-11, 205, is a running back from Jacksonville, Fla., where he attended Andrew Jackson High and earned the Best Overall Athlete award as a senior . . . from Tampa, Fla., comes quarterback **CHRIS JONES**, 6-4, 193, where he was a four-sport star at Jefferson High, prep alma mater of ISU basketball "supersub" Leroy Staley. His football coach at Jeff was Clarence White . . . another recruit from Cincinnati is 6-5, 220-pound tackle **ROBERT KOEHNE** (pronounced CONE-EE), where he attended LaSalle High and played under coach Ray Heidron.

MAYOR), 6-4, 205-pound linebacker from Princeville, Ill., graduated from Wyoming High and was an all-Blackhawk Conference football and basketball player, as well as the holder of the school record in the shot put . . . **QUINTIN MIKELL** (pronounced MICHAEL), 6-2, 197-pound linebacker from New Orleans (La.) Nicholls, was an all-District 9-AAAA first team pick as well as anchoring his school's 440- and 880-yard relay teams.

**RAY NUGENT** was an all-conference pick while at Argo High in Bridgeview, Ill. The 6-3, 195-pound linebacker comes from a family of 10 and played his high school ball for coach John Rutkowski, who also coached Gary Gamen, ISU's all-MVC defensive tackle last year . . . an all-state defensive back from East St. Louis (Ill.) Senior High is 6-0, 180-pound **KEVIN RAMSEY**. Ramsey was an all-metro, all-state and all-Southwestern Conference pick . . . Chicago's Harper High sends 6-2, 223-pound lineman **WALTER SEAPHUS**. An all-city as well as an honorable mention All-America pick, Seaphus will be joined here by another Harper product, 6-2, 218-pound linebacker **MANUAL STUDWAY** who was a two-sport standout. Both Studway and Seaphus were coached by Terry Lewis at Harper . . . **LEDELL SHELTON** is the third '79 Sycamore recruit from Louisiana. The 6-1, 185-pound defensive back from Avondale (La.) Ehret earned outstanding defensive back honors in his junior year.

One of the bigger recruits signed by the Indiana State staff is 6-3, 235-pound tackle **SCOTT TERRELL** from Canon-McMillan High in Canonsburg, Pa., where he played for Coach Tom Olszewski . . . past half-decade. And football, Jamieson believes, is at the brink of turning the corner toward gridiron excellence in the Missouri Valley Conference.

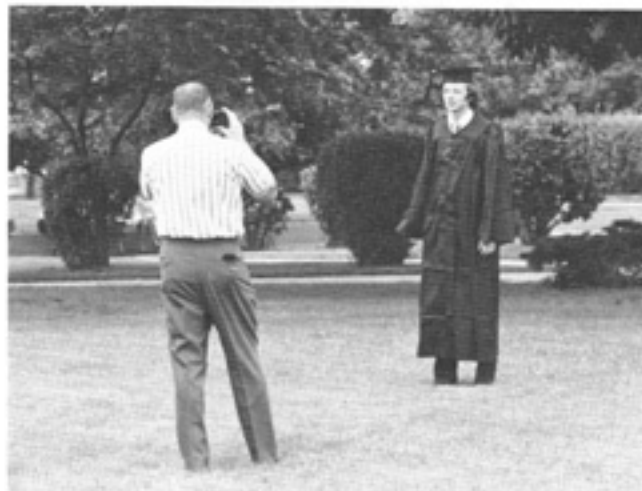

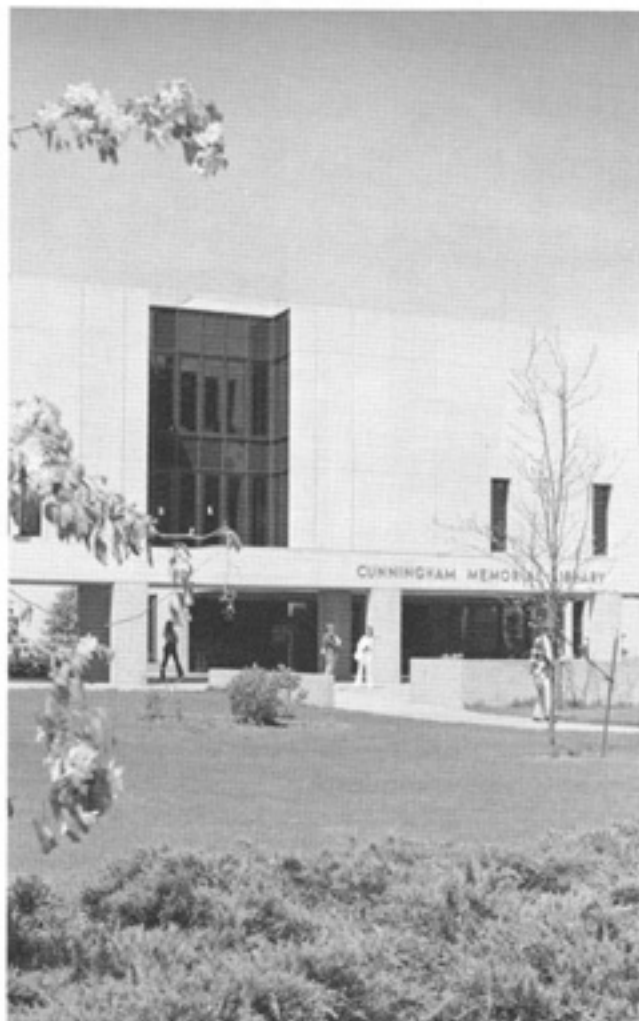
Thanks to athletics . . . gymnastics, basketball, baseball, football and the rest . . . word on ISU is spreading throughout the state, region and, indeed, the nation!

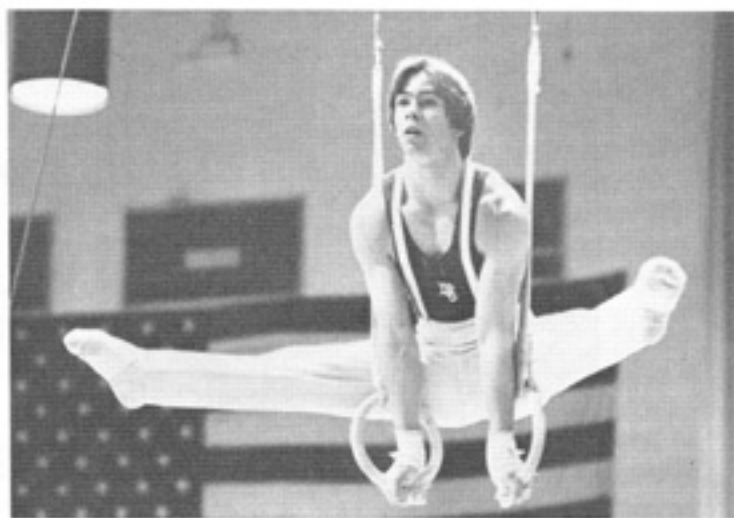

# UNIVERSITY STAFF



**DR. RICHARD G. LANDINI** President, Indiana State University

Dr. Richard G. Landini, now in his fifth year as President of Indiana State University, was a most important factor in the Sycamores' admission into the Missouri Valley Conference on March 9, 1976. But that figures, since he's a doer -- not a passive spectator.

The 50-year-old Landini earned his bachelor of arts (1954) and a master of arts (1956) degrees as an English major at the University of Miami in Florida. In 1959 he gained a doctor of philosophy from the University of Florida.

Following those three years at Florida, Landini served on the Arizona State University staff for 11 years ('59-70) -- the last two years as assistant to the president of ASU. He then moved to the University of Montana in 1970 as academic vice-president and professor of English. After five years there he succeeded Dr. Alan C. Rankin here and became ISU's eighth president.

Landini, who resides on the ISU campus with his wife, Phyllis, is the proud father of four sons and one daughter: Richard, 24, Gregory, 23, Matthew, 21, Cynthia, 19, and Vincent, 14.



**DR. JACK JESSELL** NCAA Faculty Athletic Representative

Dr. John C. Jessell is in his seventh year as ISU's faculty athletic representative to the NCAA. A professor of education and director of the division of guidance and counseling in the graduate education department, Dr. Jessell joined ISU's staff in 1964.

A former college baseball player at New Haven (Conn.) State (now Southern Connecticut), he gained a master's in education at Ohio U., and a doctoral degree at Wisconsin.



**BOB KING** Director of Athletics

While forced to drop his coaching duties due to illness last season (Oct. 11, 1978), Bob King is in his sixth year as Director of Athletics at Indiana State University.

Appointed as Sycamore AD April 1, 1974, King was charged with three key assignments: elevate Indiana State football program to Division I status, gain admittance to a prestigious major college conference and improve interest in and attendance at I-State's basketball games.

Less than a decade later, Indiana State has a football team classified as Division I-A, is a member of the Missouri Valley Conference and has a basketball team that has made three straight post-season tournament appearances, including being a finalist in the '79 NCAA championships at Salt Lake City. (Missions accomplished, indeed!)

In three seasons as head cage coach at ISU, King compiled a 61-24 record to add to his winning career mark of 236-113 (.676). Then on July 26, 1978, he suffered a heart attack and later encountered further medical problems which necessitated his discontinuing his coaching career.

King came to ISU after serving 12 years at the University of New Mexico, the last two as associate athletic director. But his primary notoriety came as Lobo basketball coach between '62 and '72 when his clubs were 175-89. Four of his teams went on to post-season play -- three NITs and one NCAA.

The 56-year-old Gravity, Iowa native (Aug. 24, 1923) -- who never had a losing season in 27 years of coaching -- was graduated from Iowa in 1947 and earned a master's degree in psychology from Drake in 1957.

An Air Force officer from 1943-46, King was a prep coach for 14 years at Britt and Algona, Iowa, and Rockford, Ill. He also was an assistant basketball coach at Iowa ('59-62) before moving to New Mexico.

King and his wife, Sharel, have six children: Chris, Gary and Larry, no longer living at home, and Dianne, 9, Brad, 7, and Randy, 5.



### **JERRY HUNTSMAN** Assistant Athletic Director

Jerry Huntsman, who left the football coaching profession a winner (7-3) in 1972, is assistant athletic director, and served as acting director of athletics prior to the arrival of Bob King.

Huntsman, whose seven-year record here was 43-24-1 (.639), is in his seventh campaign as an athletic administrator. Prior to coming to ISU as backfield coach in 1965, Jerry guided Earlham College to 29 victories in 32 games through four seasons. (His 1962 club was undefeated.) His prep coaching experience was gained at Waveland, Covington, Crawfordsville and Huntington and his final coaching mark was 105-39-4 (.723).

A native of Richmond, Ind., and a 1952 graduate of Wabash College, Huntsman earned a master's degree from Purdue in 1958. As a quarterback at Wabash he was named an all-state small college gridder in 1951.

Jerry and his wife, Coralee, have three sons -- Brent, 22, Jerry, 20, and Scott, 17.



### **ED MCKEE** Sports Information Director

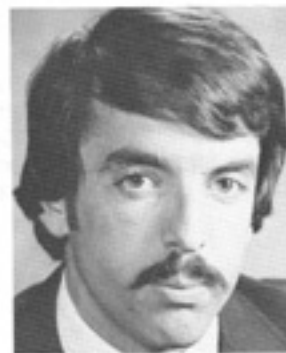
Ed McKee, in his ninth year as SID at Indiana State, came to ISU in June, 1971, after working in Goodyear's public relations department in Akron, Ohio, for three years. He also was a part-time sportswriter for the Akron Beacon Journal in 1970-71.

A St. Louis native and graduate of Rockhurst College in Kansas City, Mo., he played two seasons of AAU basketball with the Akron Goodyears before settling down to his full-time PR post there.

The SID post at Terre Haute has been a homecoming of sorts for the 6-8 former center, who was selected by the Indiana Pacers in the ABA's first draft in 1967.

The 34-year-old SID, a member of CoSida, USBWA and FWAA, has received awards for his '75-76 basketball press guide and '73 and '75 football guides from the College Sports Information Directors of America.

### **JOE MACISAAC** Athletic Ticket Manager

MacIsaac came to Indiana State from Ohio University, where he earned a master's degree in Sports Administration in 1974.

A former resident of Colorado, he attended Colorado Mountain College and earned a bachelor's degree from Colorado State University in 1972.

### **RAY BAGGETT** Athletic Trainer

Ray Baggett is in his 13th year as a trainer at Indiana State and has more than 21 years of athletic training experience behind him.

He came to ISU in 1967 after serving as trainer at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., for three years. Before that, he was a trainer at Indiana University for seven years.

Baggett -- who took sabbatical leave last year to do further post-graduate work at the University of Alabama -- gained a bachelor of science degree from Troy (Ala.) State in 1957, and a master's degree from Indiana the following year. He also earned a Director of Health degree with specialization in health education from IU in '66.



### **HAROLD GARVIN** Equipment Manager

Indiana State's football equipment staff is headed by seventh-year athletic department veteran Harold Garvin. 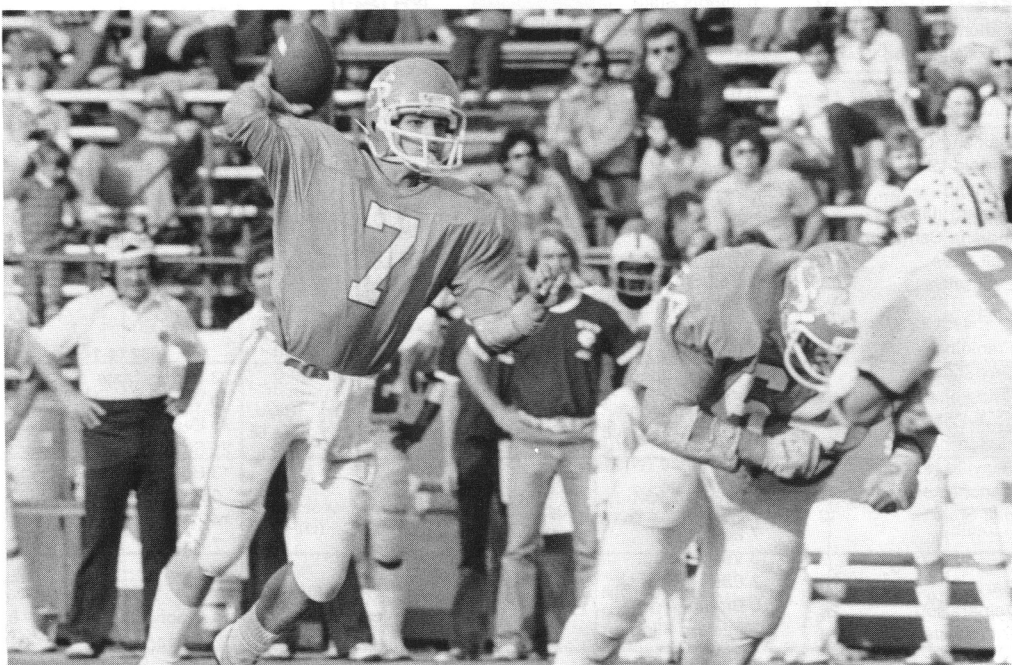

Founded in 1907, the MVC was the first intercollegiate athletic organization west of the Mississippi River. The objectives of the nine-member conference are to provide intercollegiate athletics a proper role in education; establish friendly relationships and high standards of competitive performance; and establish an organization to manage and control intercollegiate athletics within the conference.

Newest member of the Missouri Valley staff is its commissioner, David Price, who succeeded Mickey Holmes July 1, 1979. He is only the sixth commissioner in the 72-year history of the MVC. Price, 36, was assistant executive director of the Pacific-10 Conference before joining the Tulsa-based loop. Ironically, he is a native of Ponca City, Okla., and a 1966 graduate of Oklahoma's school of journalism.

Assisting Price are a pair of second-year league staff members: Jeff Hurd, director of public relations, and Johnny Overby, supervisor of officials.
