Running Back Eric Robinson

MEMORIAL STADIUM



Indiana State plays their home football games at Memorial Stadium, which is located on the corners of Wabash and Brown Avenues in Terre Haute.

The stadium was acquired by the University in 1967 and, prior to that time, was used for both football and baseball. Since the installation of the synthetic playing surface, however, the field has been used for football and field hockey.

The first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of Astroturf was Indiana State and the Sycamores put the new field to good use in September of 1967 as ISU hosted Eastern Illinois.

The Astroturf in use at Indiana State is similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome. Plus factors in the use of the synthetic surface include durability (some 15 college and high school football games are played on the field each year; and in addition the ISU

football team conducts all practices on the field) and a constant surface which will provide sure footing regardless of weather.

Each blade of grass is $\frac{3}{8}$ inches long and is attached to a sponge-rubber pad $\frac{1}{4}$ inches thick. This sponge pad is then set upon a fiber pad $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick. Both the sponge pad and the fiber pad are set on a two-inch layer of asphalt.

Memorial Stadium was open to the public for the first time May 5, 1925 as the local minor league baseball team, the Terre Haute Tots, played the Peoria (Ill.) Tractors with an estimated crowd of 9,000 on hand for the event.

Among the honored guests at the game were major league baseball commissioner Judge Kennesaw Landis and Charles Barnard, a representative of the Cleveland Indians.

The first use of the playing field was in the fall of 1924 as local high schools, Wiley and Garfield, played their traditional Thanksgiving Day game.

Work on Memorial Stadium was begun in 1922 at a cost of \$450,000.

After the University gained control of the stadium in 1967, a three-part renovation project was started which included the reorientation of the playing field from a north-south direction to an east-west line; installation of Astroturf; and a building of some 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field as well as rebuilding of seats on the south side of the field.

Capacity of Memorial Stadium is now 20,500.

SYCAMORE PREVIEW

Despite the loss of such players as Reggie Allen, Craig Shaffer, Eddie Ruffin, Kirk Wilson and Hubert Moore, the future appears bright for the Indiana State football program in 1982.

Of course, the task will not be an easy one.

Missing from the Sycamore lineup this fall will be several familiar faces, including 11 offensive and defensive starters. The most noticeable vacancies will be at quarterback, linebacker, split end, flanker and tight end.

Among those players who must be replaced are Allen, who set several passing records while at Indiana State and is among the top passers in the Missouri Valley Conference annals; Shaffer, a sixth-round draft choice of the National Football League's St. Louis Cardinals and the MVC's 'Defensive Player of the Year' in 1981; Ruffin, the most prolific pass receiver in Indiana State history; and Wilson, ISU's home-run threat for the past four seasons and a late spring free agent signee with the NFL's Washington Redskins.

Third-year head coach Dennis Raetz, however, expects that the Sycamores will be a much improved team this time around. How so, Coach?

"Sure, we've lost some high visibility people. It's going to be tough to replace players the caliber of Reggie and Craig," Raetz offered. "But we have a strong nucleus of quality people returning that I feel pretty good about.

"We're not going to be as bad off as some people might think."

Giving the Sycamores a stiff test right out of the chute will be an imposing slate of games—perhaps the most ambitious 11-game schedule that an Indiana State football team has ever encountered.

Road games with Mid-American Conference foes Central Michigan (Sept. 4) and Ball State (Sept. 25), Missouri Valley Conference rivals Drake (Oct. 2), Southern Illinois (Oct. 23), and Tulsa (Nov. 13), Atlantic Coast Conference member Maryland (Oct. 9) and independent Louisville (Nov. 8) offers a strong challenge to the Indiana State players and coaching staff alike.

A position-by-position look at the '82 Sycamores follows below:

OFFENSE

Quarterback: Fifth-year senior Scott Bartel appears to have a lock on the vacant signal calling position. After playing a reserve role to Allen for the past couple of seasons, Bartel will get his chance at directing the Sycamore offense this fall.

But close behind in the battle for quarterback looms sophomore Jeff Miller. Both Bartel and Miller played well during the spring workouts. Also in the hunt is junior Keith Bonney, a junior college transfer from Cowley County (Ks.) Community College who redshirted last fall.

Running Backs: An Indiana State strong point in 1982. With

the return of starters Eric Robinson at tailback and James Banks at fullback, ISU's running game should be in fine form this season.

Robinson had a banner season last fall as he led the Sycamores in rushing (867-yards) while also scoring 10 touchdowns. The 5-8, 190-pound Silver Springs, Md., native ranked among the nation's best in all-purpose running until a knee injury forced Robinson to the sidelines.

Banks, meanwhile, played well and was the third ranking rusher on the Sycamores in 1981 with 265-yards.

Sophomore Darrold Clardy should provide strong relief for Robinson at a tailback spot and senior Ed Foggs is a quality reserve at fullback.

Receivers: An area decimated by graduation, finding replacements for Ruffin and Wilson are vital. Sophomore Terry Bell played well during the spring and should start at the split end position. Senior John Spradley, who was a reserve behind Wilson last year, will get the first opportunity at flanker in '82. Also watch for Anthony Kimball, a sophomore, to see playing time as well.

The recruitment of several freshmen could also have an impact at this position as well.

Offensive Line: Perhaps the most experienced position on the Indiana State team in 1982. The Sycamores return three

starters from last fall: center Sean Whiten, guard Rich Dawson and tackle Bob Koehne. Junior Chris Delaplaine will take over at a guard spot for the graduated John Wozniak and should add some size (6-6, 283) to the ISU front wall.

Sophomore Steve Buxton moves into a starting tackle position. Depth should come from Bob Hopkins, Scott Piercy and Manual Studway. All three have extensive game experience.

Tight End: Sophomore Herbert Dawson is the new Indiana State tight end after playing a reserve role to Hubert Moore for the past two seasons. A good blocker and pass receiver, Dawson should team well with junior Max Dillon to give the Sycamores a strong one-two combination.

Dillon missed all of last season with a leg injury but has healed sufficiently to give Indiana State its best tandem at tight end in a long while.

DEFENSE

Defensive Line: Veteran noseguard Walter Seaphus returns for his fourth campaign to lead the Indiana State line contingent. Seaphus, a senior from Chicago, has been one of the top defensive linemen in the Missouri Valley Conference for the past two years and should be a candidate for post-season honors in 1982 as well.

Junior Perry Willett, sophomore Brad Verdun and sophomore Allen Hartwig will contend for a starting berth at defensive tackle. Junior Dean Reader and sophomore Doug Arnold are also strong choices to see increased playing time this fall.

Senior Ed Campbell has proven to be a valuable reserve for the Sycamores at noseguard and led the Indiana State defensive linemen in interceptions with one.

Defensive Ends: The big question at defensive end is whether Kevin Lynch has had a successful rehabilitation from a mid-season knee injury. Lynch, a senior, was hurt in the Indiana State-West Texas State game last fall and missed the remainder of the season.

If Lynch can return to the Sycamore fold healthy, Indiana State could have the best set of defensive ends in the conference as junior Ed Martin takes over for the graduated Dwight Tripp.

Martin came on strong in the latter half of the 1981 season and played well against Eastern Illinois and Marshall.

Key reserves at end include junior Gregg Kimbrough and sophomores Kurt Bell and Bobby Boyce.

Linebackers: Senior Dan Maher returns for his third season as a starter. Junior Quintin Mikell, the MVP of the Sycamore special teams last fall, will take over at the other inside linebacking position.

Sophomores Jeff Campbell and Mike Osborne are expected to provide depth.

Defensive Backs: Cornerback Kevin Ramsey and safety Bob Tyree are the two returning starters for the Sycamores in 1982.

But the interesting sidelight is how well former running

back Wayne Davis does at cornerback. Davis, a sophomore, started one game for the Sycamores at running back last fall and responded with a 100-yard effort against Illinois State.

Regis Mason will replace Alvin Reynolds at a strong safety spot. Also watch for Keith Ward, Sam Suggs and Larry Swart to see plenty of playing time.

KICKING GAME

Punter: Senior Mike Johannes set an ISU single-season record for punting average last fall (40.5) and figures to improve even more in 1982. The left-footed kicker had two punts over 60 yards in 1981 and averaged 45.0 yards per kick in a key conference game against Tulsa.

Placekickers: A three-way battle has developed for the Indiana State placekicker's position. Junior Tom Chapman appears to be in the driver's seat at the moment but senior Dennis Teegarden, who took over for Chapman last fall, and junior Eric Zoph are waiting in the wings.

Teegarden was the second leading scorer for the Sycamores last fall with 39 points. Zoph is a junior college transfer.

DENNIS RAETZ

Head Football Coach

A proven winner at both the high school and collegiate levels, Indiana State head football coach Dennis Raetz (pronounced RATES) is beginning his third season at the helm of the Sycamore grid program.

The former prep mentor at J. C. Harmon High School in Kansas City (KS) has brought the ISU program in the right direction after taking the coaching reins from former ISU coach Dick Jamieson in 1980.

Where Jamieson built the foundation of a solid collegiate football program at Indiana State during his brief two-year stint as the Sycamore head coach, Raetz has continued in a winning tradition and has guided ISU to an 11-10-1 mark since taking the head coaching position.

One of the most respected head coaches in the Missouri Valley Conference, Raetz has been known primarily for his strong defensive ballclubs (the 1981 edition of the Sycamores led the conference in total defense and scoring defense).

And, under the watchful eye of Raetz, Indiana State has produced the MVC "Defensive Player of the Year" for two of the past three seasons—defensive end Gerry Gluscic, 1979 (ISU's only Division I All-American) and linebacker Craig Shaffer, 1981) a sixth-round draft choice of the National Football League's St. Louis Cardinals).

A 1968 graduate of the University of Nebraska, Raetz had served two seasons as the Sycamores' defensive coordinator (1978-79) before being elevated to the head coaching position. During his two-year stint as an ISU assistant, Raetz worked with the defensive ends and linebackers.

When Raetz was given a new three-year contract by Indiana State athletic director Beanie Cooper during the winter of 1981, it served notice that Indiana State was dedicated to winning football.

"Coach Raetz has had success at every level of coaching and I am certain that he will continue to do an outstanding job. Dennis and his staff are recruiting good student-athletes



to our campus. And they will continue to build a solid football program at Indiana State," remarked Cooper upon making the announcement.

A native of North Platte, Nebraska, Raetz attended the University of Nebraska and played on the Cornhusker football team before a leg injury forced him to the sidelines.

After obtaining a bachelor's degree in math and physical education, Raetz served as an assistant football coach and teacher at North Kansas City (Missouri) High School until 1973 when he took over as the head coach at J. C. Harmon.

Raetz took the position at Harmon at the age of 26 and promptly guided his teams to 24 victories over a three-year span and two league championships.

In 1977, former University of Missouri head coach Al Onofrio offered Raetz an opportunity to coach at the Big Eight school. The offer was quickly accepted and Raetz worked as the head junior varsity coach as well as the defensive end coach.

Raetz earned his master's degree from Central Missouri State in 1971 in Physical Education.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

COACH, PLEASE TELL US A LITTLE OF YOUR COACHING PHILOSOPHY: "At Indiana State we have attempted to bring stability to the program and continue to recruit good student-athletes. The elements of academics and athletics fit together well at our school and this is an area we stress.

In terms of football, we want good people who will dedicate themselves to becoming better players through the years, always improving. We have established a system and expect everyone to strive to be a working part of that system."

WHAT CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT THIS YEAR'S TEAM?: "Although we lost a number of visible people, we think we have a chance to be a little bit better football team than some people are giving us credit for being. Our biggest job is to fill the hole left by the graduation of Craig Shaffer, the league's Most Valuable Player on defense. He is someone you cannot just replace; you have to find ways to alter here and there to get an overall good unit and we do have two kids, Dan Maher and Quinton Mikell, who have played quite a bit at linebacker.

Offensively, we lost a lot, but we feel that we can fill the holes of those who have left, starting with Scott Bartel at quarterback, who replaces Reggie Allen. Allen holds virtually all of our passing records so this is also a big responsibility.

We do feel that overall we can find replacement. As everybody says at this time of year, if we can avoid costly injuries, since we don't have much depth, we can be a good football team."

LET'S TURN OUR ATTENTION TO THE MISSOURI VALLEY CON-

ERENCE RACE: "Over the last few years, I believe the Missouri Valley, as a whole, has become much more competitive in football. This can be attributed to stability of the head coaches, in terms of years and programs, at a number of schools. There is more balance and they are all good teams.

However, as has been the case over the past few years, Tulsa and Drake appear to be the teams capable of winning the league championship. Wichita State, with a number of people returning, should be a factor. Any number of schools could contend for the title, and I think we fit in this category."

WHICH NEWCOMERS MIGHT PLAY IMMEDIATELY FOR THE SYCAMORES?: "The biggest areas that freshmen might make an impact are at wide receiver and tailback.

The first area, receiver, is obvious since we graduated two players, Kirk Wilson and Eddie Ruffin, who were all-Missouri Valley Conference selections. Two newcomers in particular, Tracey Stewart of Terre Haute and Joe Downing of Lafayette, could make an impact at that position.

At tailback, we return Eric Robinson and Darrold Clardy but need a third running back at that position because we seem to go through numerous players at that position. We moved Wayne Davis, a freshman tailback a year ago who started one game, to defensive back where he will be a starter, so we need more depth."

WHAT DO YOU FEEL ARE THE STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES OF THIS TEAM?: "We think our biggest strength might be our offensive line and running game. Our

line will be the biggest we have ever had at Indiana State. Now it remains to be seen whether they will mesh together to become a good unit.

...Robinson is one of the premier running backs...

At running back we return Eric Robinson, James Banks, Eddie Foggs, Rick Rick Dwenger and Darrold Clardy, all who have had extensive game experience. Robinson is one of the premier backs in the league.

Other positives include noseguard Walter Seaphus and punter Mike Johannes, both of whom are outstanding at their respective positions.

On the negative side our chief concern is lack of depth at linebacker and defensive end. We are fine one-deep, but after that we have a lot of unproven people. Injuries on defense could be a real problem but we hope to have a defensive unit similar to last season, when we led the league in scoring defense, total defense and rushing defense. We are solid in the first unit, but others must prove themselves."

PLEASE TALK ABOUT THE SCHEDULE: "There is no doubt this is the most difficult schedule Indiana State has every played. Besides playing the Missouri Valley co-champions Tulsa and Drake on the road, we also play the most prestigious team ever, in terms of football, when we take on Maryland. Overall, it will be very challenging."

WHAT DO YOU DO FOR RELAXATION WHEN YOU ARE AWAY FROM FOOTBALL?: "I enjoy playing golf as a way to get away from the football world. The job demands are great and time consuming, so the golf course gives me an opportunity to just enjoy myself."



MAX PAYNE,
Academic Advisor and
Offensive Backs

After a successful career in the high school ranks, 41-year-old Max Payne is now beginning his third year with the Sycamore football program. Payne will coach the offensive backs this year after coaching respon-

sibilities with the defensive line in the past. He also coordinates all academic areas.

Payne was most recently head coach at Kansas City Wyandotte High School and won three league championships. Other coaching stops included head coach at Bethel (Missouri) High School (1962-67) and assistant at North Kansas City (Missouri) High School (1968-74).

He is a 1962 graduate of William Jewell College, where he played running back, and earned his master's degree from Central Missouri State in 1974.

Payne and his wife Carolyn have two children; Doug 19 and Andrea 16.



BOB TURNER,
Special Team Coordinator
and Defensive Backs

In terms of years at ISU, Bobby Turner is the senior member of the Sycamore football coaching staff. The former Indiana State standout intercepted 16 passes as a three-year starter at defensive back during a span

from 1969 to 1972.

Coach Turner has been on the ISU staff since 1976 after a stint as assistant football and basketball coach at Kokomo Haworth High School. He is special team coordinator and also coaches the defensive backs.

At one time, Turner held the school record for interceptions in a season with nine and also returned punts for 250 yards and a touchdown.

An East Chicago native who attended Washington High School, Turner resides in Terre Haute.



PAT HENDERSON,
Defensive Coordinator
and Defensive Ends,
Linebackers

Pat Henderson, who is beginning his third year with the Sycamore football staff, is undertaking additional responsibilities as the defensive coordinator. He will also continue as coach of the defensive

ends and linebackers.

A 1975 graduate of the University of Kansas, Henderson was the defensive secondary coach at the University of Nebraska-Omaha before coming to Indiana State. Previously he had coached at Coffeyville (Kansas) Junior College where the 1975 team won the National JUCO Championship.

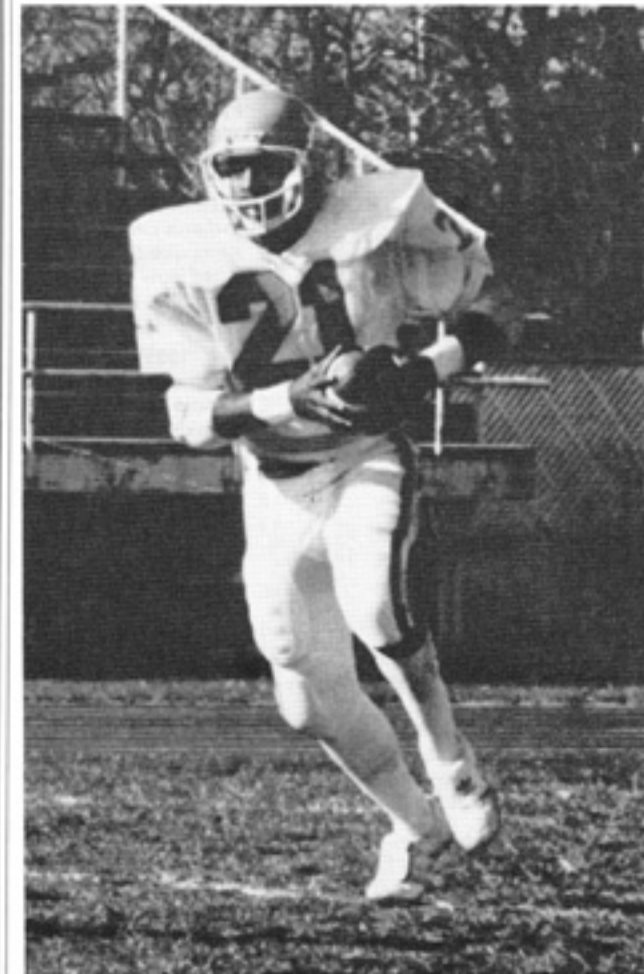

Midwestern athletic history was made at the Midland Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri on January 12, 1907, when eight faculty members representing five universities gathered to form the Missouri Valley Conference, the first intercollegiate athletic organization west of the Mississippi River.

Attending the first organizational meeting of the Missouri Valley Conference were: Prof. Clark W. Hetherington and Dr. M. J. Monilaw, University of Missouri; Mark Catlin, University of Iowa; Captain John G. Workizer,

Five schools formally organized the conference at a second meeting at the Coates House in Kansas City on February 16, 1907. They were Washington University of St. Louis and the state universities of Iowa, Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska.

On March 15, 1908, Drake University and Iowa State College (now Iowa State University) were voted membership and admitted on April 1, at which time the conference's official name was adopted, the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

The MVC charter members are the University of Iowa, the University of Kansas, the University of Missouri, and Washington University of St. Louis. Added by election were the University of Nebraska, Iowa State College and Drake University.

Today the Missouri Valley Conference has ten members. They are Bradley University, Creighton University, Drake University, Illinois State University, Indiana State University, New Mexico State University, Southern Illinois University, The University of Tulsa, West Texas State University and Wichita State University.

MVC BRIEFS

Bradley -- Located in Peoria, Illinois, Bradley is a school of about 5,000 students, and it participates in eight intercollegiate sports ... Bradley joined the MVC in 1948 and has been a member for 31 years ... it withdrew in 1952 but was readmitted in 1955 ... The Braves play their home basketball games in Robertson Fieldhouse, capacity 7,300 ... Bradley does not compete in football.

Creighton -- Located in Omaha, Nebraska, Creighton has an enrollment of approximately 4,700 students ... Creighton was a member of the MVC from 1928-48 before withdrawing, and was readmitted in March, 1976, for a total tenure of 25 years ... The Bluejays compete in four intercollegiate sports and play their home basketball games in the 10,000 seat Civic Auditorium ... Creighton also does not compete in football.

Drake -- Drake, the school with the longest membership in the MVC of 74 years, is located in Des Moines, Iowa ... The Bulldogs joined the conference in 1908 ... They compete in seven sports and have an enrollment of about 4,800 ... Drake Stadium, home of the prestigious Drake Relays, seats 18,000 for football, while Veterans Memorial Auditorium seats 12,000 for basketball.

Illinois State -- Illinois State is the newest member of the MVC, formally accepting invitation to the conference on June 19, 1980 ... located in Normal, Ill., ISU has an enrollment of almost 8,000 students, and the Redbirds compete in 12 intercollegiate sports ... Hancock Stadium seats 15,000 for football, while Horton Fieldhouse seats 8,000 for basketball.

Indiana State -- Indiana State was admitted to the MVC in 1976 along with Creighton ... It is located in Terre Haute, Indiana, and the Sycamores compete in 12 sports ... Enrollment is about 11,500 ... Hulman Center seats 10,220 for basketball, while Memorial Stadium seats 20,500 for football.

New Mexico State -- New Mexico State joined the MVC in 1970 and has been a member since ... The Aggies compete in eight intercollegiate sports, and the school has an enrollment of about 12,500 ... New Aggie Memorial Stadium seats 30,000 for football, while the Pan American Center

seats 13,222 for basketball.

Southern Illinois -- A relatively new member, SIU joined the MVC in 1974 ... It is the largest school in the conference with an enrollment of 22,635 and competes in 12 sports ... McAndrew Stadium seats 20,000 for football, and SIU Arena seats 10,000 for basketball.

Tulsa -- The school with the second longest membership in the MVC of 48 years, is located in Tulsa, Oklahoma ... A school of about 6,000 students, Tulsa joined the MVC in 1934, and competes in eight sports ... Skelly Stadium, the largest in the conference, seats 40,235 for football, while the Tulsa Assembly Center seats 8,200 for basketball.

West Texas State -- Located just outside Amarillo, Texas in Canyon, West Texas State University joined the MVC in 1970 and has been a member since ... The Buffs compete in six sports ... Enrollment is approximately 6,500 ... Kimbrough Memorial Stadium seats 20,000 for football, while the Amarillo Civic Center seats 5,000 for basketball.

Wichita State -- Wichita State has been a MVC member for 37 years having joined in 1945 ... Enrollment is about 14,500 and the Shockers compete in eight intercollegiate sports ... Cessna Stadium, the MVC's second largest, seats 31,500 football, while Henry Levitt Arena seats 10,235 for basketball.

MEMO TO THE MEDIA

The 1982 Indiana State Football Press Guide has been prepared to assist the media in covering Indiana State University football this fall. Contents of the guide and changes in personnel and plans will be updated before and during the season by the Indiana State sports information office.

PRESS BOX

The Memorial Stadium press box is located on the south side of the Stadium complex and is serviced by an elevator from ground level to the press box proper. Booths for visiting coaches and radio stations are provided. A large outside booth is also available for visiting camera personnel.

CREDENTIALS

Space limitations in the Memorial Stadium press box make it mandatory that only WORKING members of the media will be granted credentials. Credential policy is as follows: a) local newspapers, wire services, national publications, newspapers from an opponent's area, and student newspapers from Indiana State and opponent's school; b) other daily newspapers with preference to those which regularly cover Indiana State; c) radio and television personnel not actually broadcasting but considered reporting; d) scouts.

Credentials will not be mailed. Please pick up all press passes at the Memorial Stadium will-call ticket window. All photographers must have a press pass while on the sidelines.

Please do not request credentials for non-working members of the media.

RADIO-TV

The press box has been designated for use by radio and television broadcasting crews, both home and opponent. Each booth is enclosed and sound-proof.

SERVICES

Play-by-play, halftime and final game statistics will be provided. When possible, post-game comments from each head coach will be made available. Refreshments will be available on the press deck.

TELECOPIER

Four telephones and one telecopier are available for media use on a first-come, first-serve basis. If you plan to use your own phone and telecopier, please contact the ISU sports information office in advance.

TELEPHONE

Telephone and radio service should be secured directly through the General Telephone Company of Indiana in Terre Haute (812-238-5444). They will contact the sports information office for location. If the visiting radio station has been designated as the OFFICIAL station for the opposing school, a courtesy telephone line is available. Other stations will have to pay a right's fee of \$50 to Indiana State.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Programs, lineups, and game background information will be available to the media prior to each game. For player interviews, photographs or video tape highlights, contact the

sports information office.

Interviews with Coach Raetz should be conducted between 1 p.m.-2 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Coach Raetz will be at Memorial Stadium during that time and can be contacted at 812-232-6311, Ext. 2544.
