Indiana State University, with its world-known Schools of Education, Business, and Technology, is located in Terre Haute, Indiana (population 60,000) in the heart of mid-America.

Founded in 1865, ISU today offers its 11,200 students over 170 programs through the College of Arts and Sciences and the Schools of Business; Education; Graduate Studies; Nursing; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; and Technology. ISU degrees are awarded at associate, baccalaureate, master's and doctoral levels.

Indiana State University anticipates the 21st century with a bold Master Plan designed to enhance the usefulness of existing buildings and replace those no longer cost-efficient. Also planned are attractive pedestrian malls linking the areas where major campus functions take place.

Heralding this exciting era is an \$11.4 million addition to the University Arena, completed last January. In July, ground was broken for an \$8.8 million classroom and office building for several departments of the College of Arts and Sciences. Work begins this fall on the \$8.6 million Hulman Memorial Student Union.

The addition to the University Arena is a 121,000 square-foot structure housing state-of-the-art health, physical education and recreation facilities. There are laboratories in motor learning, biomechanics, exercise physiology and health and safety as well as office and laboratory space for academic functions.

Other features are an indoor jogging track, tennis courts, basketball courts, and handball and racquetball courts. Many of the new areas replace those lost in 1984 when a fire destroyed the Women's Physical Education Building.

Memorial Stadium, home of the Sycamore football team, boasts the world's first university-owned and -operated Astroturf playing surface, installed in 1967.

The 1988 Sycamore track team won the Missouri Valley Conference championship and also the state championship against competitors from Purdue, Notre Dame and Indiana University.

PRESIDENT Dr. Richard Landini

Presently in his 13th year as President of Indiana State University, Dr. Richard Landini has been a strong supporter of all of the University's athletic programs.

Working with representatives of the Athletic Department, he was advocate of ISU's membership in the Missouri Valley and Gateway Collegiate Athletic Conferences. His concern for the academics of athletes has been evidenced by his active involvement in policy making by the National Collegiate Athletic Association. In 1983 he helped draft the NCAA rule which states that a student athlete must make satisfactory progress toward specific degree requirements.

Landini earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in literature from the University of Miami in 1954 and 1955. After earning his Doctor of Philosophy degree (1959) at the University of Florida, he served on the faculty and administrative staff of Arizona State University for 11 years (1959-70). In 1970, he was appointed academic vice-president and professor of English at the University of Mon-

tana. He is ISU's eighth president, succeeding Dr. Alan C. Rankin in 1975.

Dr. Landini and his family reside in historic Condit House on the University campus.

In 1988, the Lady Sycamores basketball team won more games than any previous ISU women's basketball team and advanced to post-season play in the Gateway Conference tournament.

The ISU baseball team has achieved a string of successes in recent years, including playing in the 1986 College World Series. In 1987's major league baseball draft, the eight Sycamores chosen represented the second largest number of players ever taken from one institution.

A number of former ISU athletes have distinguished themselves in professional sports. They include basketball superstar Larry Bird of the Boston Celtics and football's Wayne Davis of the Buffalo Bills, Tunch Ilkin of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Craig Schaffer of Ottawa in the CFL, and the San Diego Chargers' Vencie Glenn. Baseball players include Wallace Johnson of the Montreal Expos, and the Atlanta Braves' Zane Smith. Many more former ISU diamondmen are in the minor leagues.

The Indiana State University athletic program will take a new direction with the naming of Brian Faison as Director of Athletics.

Faison, 38, comes to Indiana State from the University of Louisville where he was Assistant Director for Development and Executive Director of the Cardinal Athletic Fund (1984-88). He directed the development and implementation of all athletic fund raising, special events and marketing programs while coordinating activities for all support groups.

During his four years at Louisville, annual giving increased from \$560,000 to over \$2.9 million, thirty-four endowed scholarships were established, and special designated giving programs were developed for the non-revenue sports. Among his other duties, he served as tournament director for the 1986 and 1987 Metro Conference Basketball Tournaments and the 1987 NCAA Southeast Regional Basketball Tournament.

"It is a real honor and a great opportunity for myself and my family to be named Director of Athletics at Indiana State University," Faison said. "Our goals are to put the student-athletes in a position to succeed in the classroom as well as on the playing field and to give our coaches the tools to be competitive on a conference and national level. We want to provide an atmosphere in the community of Terre Haute where businesses and individuals can contribute and be a part of our athletic family."

Faison is very familiar with the Missouri Valley Conference serving five years at MVC member Illinois State University as Assistant Athletic Director and Executive Director of the Redbird Club (1979-84).

A native Dubuque, Iowa, Faison has also served as Assistant Director of Alumni Activities at the University of Missouri-Columbia. He earned his undergraduate degree in political science at Missouri in 1972 and is completing his Master's Degree program in journalism at Mizzou.

Brian and his wife Donna have three children: Jonathan (8), Matthew (5) and Bradley (2).

Dr. Cathy Baker takes the Athletic Study Center into its third year of operation this fall where she and her staff will supervise the academic progress of some 400 Indiana State University student-athletes over the course of the school year. Baker's background includes a BA in English, an MA in English, a PhD in Secondary Education and eight years as a Reading Specialist with the ISU Study Skills Center.

"We've always had great support from the athletic and coaching staffs and we now have support from faculty and administration. This is a young program but down the road I hope we will be able to expand the services we offer, expand our hours of operation, and expand the physical space we have to work with," said Baker. "I'd also like to computerize our record keeping and tutoring services."

Some of the services the Athletic Study Center provides include a required study skills course, tutoring, proofreading services and a reader service for LD Students, counseling, and proctored or oral exams for LD Students. In addition to these services, Baker and her staff provide fundamental instruction in areas such as basic study skills, time management, drug education and testing, and media relations. The Athletic Study Center provides supervised study hall sessions, academic support for student-athletes who are learning disabled, and individual tutoring for those students who need in-depth help with a particular subject. Careful academic records are maintained for each student-athlete.

"I think one measure of our success in the past two years has been that a high percentage of our Proposition 48 students are doing very well. Of all our student athletes, 90% are in good academic standing with the university and 25% maintain over a B average," Baker noted.

Dr. Baker's philosophy is simply this: "I like to say that 'my team' wins when these guys graduate. But actually, there's a lot more I want for these students. I want them to learn something while they're here; I want them to be personally and professionally successful."

The student-athletes at Indiana State University are in good hands.

The Gateway Collegiate Athletic Conference enters its seventh year of existence and fourth season of operating a seven-school NCAA I-AA football division.

The Gateway Conference was founded, as a women's athletic organization, by ten midwestern universities with similar academic and athletic interests in 1982.

The conference is comprised of schools which are members of two different conferences for other men's sports and is spread out over five states. Six Gateway members belong to the Missouri Valley Conference: Bradley University, Drake University, Illinois State University, Indiana State University, Southern Illinois University and Wichita State University. Four others belong to the Association of Mid-Continent Universities (AMCU): Eastern Illinois University, University of Northern Iowa, Southwest Missouri State University and Western Illinois University.

The Gateway sponsors championships in nine women's sports and one men's sport, football. The women's sports include cross-country, volleyball, basketball, indoor track and field, swimming and diving, golf, tennis, softball and outdoor track and field.

On August 21, 1985, the Gateway Conference Presidents' Council voted to add a I-AA football division, for six of its members, to their previously all-women's athletics organization. Forming the football division were Eastern Illinois, Illinois State, Northern Iowa, Southern Illinois, Southwest Missouri and Western Illinois. This move marked the first time in college annals that men's football was added to a women's conference. In June 1986, Indiana State University enrolled as the seventh member of the Gateway Conference football division.

Patty Viverito has governed the Gateway Conference since its birth. In fact, Mrs. Viverito became the first woman commissioner to govern a conference associated with men's athletics.

The football division of the Gateway, a conglomeration of former Missouri Valley Conference and Mid-Continent Conference football playing institutions, has quickly become a national power. The strength of the fledgling Gateway was confirmed in July of 1986 when the NCAA I-AA Football Committee voted to waive the league's two-year waiting period and grant the Gateway an automatic bid to the national championships after just one season of play.

The Gateway's first three football seasons have been marked by continual successes. Northern Iowa has advanced to the NCAA I-AA Playoff semifinals twice in three years, only to drop decisions to the eventual national champions while Eastern Illinois was a playoff quarterfinalist in 1986. Gateway members will be looking to top all of that in 1988.

Head Coach Dennis Raetz



When Indiana State University's football team takes the field each game, it's often difficult to tell the head coach, Dennis Raetz (pronounced RATES), from his six assistant coaches; they are all dressed alike.

"I don't wear something different because sometimes I don't want anyone to know I am the head coach—especially if they are throwing things," Raetz explains with a joking grin.

"They say that anyone in coaching has a larger than normal ego," he points out. "But in this job it is tough to take yourself too seriously. There are a lot of people who are every bit as qualified, if not more, than me to be a head coach. I just happened to be in the right place at the right time..."

The truth is that Raetz, 42, tends to downplay his ability and accomplishments. He would, for example, never boast about 1980, his first year as head coach at ISU, when he led the Sycamores to six wins and five losses, giving him the best first-year record in school history.

Nor would he brag about being the all-time second-winningest football coach at Indiana State, a feat he accomplished just last season. Or the fact that he has directed ISU to two appearances in the NCAA I-AA post-season playoffs and to consecutive nine-win seasons (1983, 1984); was the 1984 Missouri Valley Conference "Coach of the Year" for leading ISU to a second-place finish in the league; and had the Sycamores ranked No. 1 nationally in I-AA for most of the 1984 season.

If Raetz is reluctant to talk about his many achievements at ISU, he is more vocal about the sport to which he has directed his personal life.

"It's the best," he says. "It (football) appeals to all types of people. You don't necessarily have to be 6-foot-8 to play—there's a place for everybody."

Raetz' affection for the pigskin is somewhat predictable. He grew up in Nebraska (in a town, North Platte, that is not unlike Terre Haute), where football fosters the same kind of hysteria that high school basketball does in Indiana.

The oldest of four children, Raetz was a standout quarterback in high school and was a pitcher, shortstop, and third baseman on an American Legion baseball team. He also earned varsity letters in basketball, track and golf.

Raetz entered the University of Nebraska on a football scholarship, but a severe knee injury brought a quick, disappointing end to his college career. Still, playing the game was not where he had pegged his future. He wanted to coach, wanted it for the satisfaction he felt in working with kids, wanted it because in being a coach he might never have to grow up himself.

"There's a certain amount of risk in coaching," he muses. "But if you risk nothing, you gain nothing. You go into this kind of profession with your eyes wide open."

After college, Raetz became an assistant coach at North Kansas City (Mo.) High School for three years. From 1973 to 1976 he was the head football coach at J.C. Harmon High School in Kansas City (Ks.), where his teams compiled a 24-13 won-loss record and won two league championships. It was at Harmon where Raetz first met and later coached a young man to which he has grown very close, defensive back Mark Haynes (New York Giants, Denver Broncos).





In 1977, Raetz joined the coaching staff at the University of Missouri, where he was the junior varsity head coach and worked with the varsity defensive ends under former Tiger coach Al Onofrio.

It was at Missouri that Raetz struck up a working friendship with Dick Jamieson, who was the Tigers' offensive coordinator. When Jamieson was offered the head coaching job at Indiana State in 1978, Raetz was one of the first people he hired for his new staff.

"Dick asked me if I wanted to be defensive coordinator," Raetz remembers. "That was unbelievable...me, a defensive coordinator at a major school after just one year of college coaching."

Raetz was named as the Sycamores' 15th head football coach on February 25, 1980 when Jamieson resigned in order to take an assistant coaching position with the National Football League's St. Louis Cardinals.

Since taking over the reins of the ISU football program, Raetz has been instrumental in the development of such standouts as linebacker Craig Shaffer (Missouri Valley Conference "Offensive Player of the Year," 1984), cornerback Wayne Davis (Missouri Valley Conference "Defensive Player of the Year," 1984) and safety Vencie Glenn (Missouri Valley Conference "Defensive Player of the Year," 1985).

Also, during Raetz' tenure as head coach, the Sycamores have had four Division I-AA first-team All-Americans: linebacker Ed Martin (1983), cornerback Wayne Davis (1984), safety Vencie Glenn (1985), and offensive lineman Mike Simmonds (1986); one third-team I-AA All-American, safety Steve McKeel (1987); and five NFL draftees: linebacker Ed Martin (1984, Dallas), cornerback Wayne Davis (1985, San Diego), offensive lineman Steve Buxton (1985, Chicago), safety Vencie Glenn (1986, New England), and offensive lineman Mike Simmonds (1987, Tampa Bay).

In addition to athletic ability, Indiana State football players have also fared well in the classroom under Raetz, himself a former high school mathematics instructor. Quarterback Jeff Miller and linebacker Kurt Bell were Rhodes Scholarship candidates in 1984 and Miller was a second-team academic All-American in 1984. All four of ISU's varsity quarterbacks last season had a 3.5 grade-point-average (on a 4.0 scale). 57.5 percent of the players who have attended ISU since 1980 have earned degrees. That compares with 45 percent of all non-athletes who have been at Indiana State during the same time period.

The Indiana State University football program has made great strides under Raetz' strong and determined leadership during the 1980's. That upward movement is expected to continue for many years to come.

ON COACHING: "I have coached for several years and there are always kids who stick out in your mind, those who remain friends even after they're grown and have families of their own. I named my son Mark after one player I have known since he was in the ninth grade (Denver Broncos cornerback Mark Haynes)."

COACHING STYLE: "There are various ways to get to kids. I'm not one to grab or scream. But I don't think anyone has ever accused me of not letting them (the players) know how I feel. Mistakes are going to be made. And coaching is teaching, so if a kid keeps making the same error over and over, you have to feel that you might be teaching him wrong."

Max Payne is in his eighth season as a member of the Indiana State University football coaching staff as the Sycamores' assistant head coach and running backs coach. Payne, 48, came to ISU in the spring of 1980 after serving as the head football coach at Wyandotte High School in Kansas City, Kansas for five seasons (1975-80).



While at Wyandotte, Payne led the school to three Kansas City League titles. The native of Arkansas City, Kansas, is a 1958 graduate of Jasper, Missouri, High School and earned his bachelor's degree from William Jewell College in 1962.

Payne, in addition to his work at Wyandotte High School, also served as the head coach at South Harrison High School in Bethany, Mo., and as an assistant coach at North Kansas City High

Jerry Boyce is in his fourth season as a member of the Indiana State University football coaching staff as the Sycamores' offensive coordinator and quarterback-receiver coach. Boyce, 49, came to Indiana State in March, 1985 after serving four seasons as the offensive coordinator at Kansas State University.



A veteran recruiter and college coach, Boyce has also served as the head coach and athletic director at Butler County Community College in El Dorado, Kansas and at Cowley County Community College in Arkansas City, Kansas in addition to stints as an assistant coach at Wichita State University and Central Missouri State University.

The Kansas City, Mo., native served for five seasons as the head football coach at North Kansas City High School in Kansas City, Mo.

A college division All-American running back at Central Missouri State, Boyce is married, Marilyn, and has two children, Tommy (26) and Bobby (25). Bobby is a former outside linebacker at Indiana State and is a member of the ISU coaching staff this fall.

While at University High, Ritter completely turned around the fortunes of the football program, taking a team that was 1-7-1 the year prior to his arrival and making it a winner with a 6-4 record in his final season as coach.

As the head coach at Miami High School in Miami, Arizona, Ritter led the school to consecutive trips to the state playoffs.

ALVIN REYNOLDS Defensive Backs Computer Analysis

Alvin Reynolds is in his sixth season as a member of the Indiana State University football coaching staff as the Sycamores' defensive backfield coach, and is in his 10th year as a member of the ISU football family.

A former defensive back for the Sycamores, Reynolds has coached two of the top players in ISU history—cornerback Wayne Davis (Buffalo Bills) and safety Vencie Glenn (San Diego Chargers), both former Missouri Valley Conference "Defensive Player of the Year" honorees and I-AA first-team All-Americans.

While a player at ISU, Reynolds had the distinction of being the only Sycamore gridder to receive votes for the coveted Heisman Trophy after being made the main figure in the "Our Pal Al" promotion as a senior. The promotion was done in conjunction with a business class at Indiana State and proved very successful

1988 SYCAMORE FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Sycamores look to build on hot second half finish of last season

Indiana State's 1988 football team veterans remember the second half finish of last season, winning four straight games to end the year in impressive fashion. Included in the four wins were two Gateway Conference triumphs and two victories over 1-A opponents Cincinnati and Ball State at the Hoosier Dome.

Building on that success is the tone of the Sycamore football camp in 1988 as fourteen starters return this season. "Based on experience only and the numbers returning, we will be an improved football team this season," said ninth-year Head Football Coach Dennis Raetz. "The final four games of 1987 were played with intensity and were efficient offensively to be successful. We want to carry that over into this season, but it will take the added effort and work."

Offensive firepower returns with quarterbacks John Sahm and Kyle Frondorf throwing to returning starters Rodney Porter at tight end and wide receiver Chris Jonson. Gone are receiver and kick return specialist Gary Cannon and top rusher Charles Walls along with five outstanding offensive linemen (Pete Endre, Mike Miller, Mark Blakey, Stu Sevald and Mike Edwards). Running backs Tori Vactor, Ray Wallace and Kevin Jackson with fullbacks Mark Sike and Brent Fleming will handle the rushing duties in 1988.

Defensively the Sycamore outlook is a good one with nine returning starters who have all played extensively in their college careers. Indiana State lost two-time All-Gateway SS Steve McKeel to graduation, but the remaining secondary is intact and their improvement was vital in the strong finish last season. "We played with more confidence defensively to end last season and everyone got the playing time and experience needed to improve. We have to continue to play with intensity and improve on the defensive side of the ball," Raetz said.

Here is a Position-by-Position look at the 1988 Sycamores:

QUARTERBACK—John Sahm (6-2, 200, Jr) returns as the ISU starter with 1986 starter and outstanding backup Kyle Frondorf (6-2, 205, Sr) in relief. Sahm missed most of spring football with a knee injury but will be at full strength for August drills. He started eight games in 1987 leading ISU in passing yardage with 1296 yards and 11 TDs. "John Sahm is very important to our football team and when healthy, he adds a dimension to our offensive unit that picks up the whole team." Coach Raetz says about his junior signal caller.

Frondorf and Todd Jochem (6-2, 191, JR) played in thirteen games between them last season—Jochem started three at QB. Red-shirt freshman Marvin Bullock (5-11, 170) had a good spring practice and will be available for duty in 1988 also. The four QB's in camp give the Sycamores excellent depth and a healthy John Sahm throughout 1988 could lead to a big season offensively.

RUNNING BACK/FULLBACK Last season's top ground gainer Charles Walls graduated, but all six of ISU's next runners return led by Tori Vactor (5-11, 200, Sr) and Ray Wallace (5-11, 190, Jr). Vactor rushed for 493 yards (4.7 avg and 3 TDs) last season and Wallace totaled 385 yards (4.2 avg.) in 1987 in ISU's rotating backfield. "Playing on turf most of the season leads to injury problems and we use a lot of backs in our offense," said Coach Raetz. "We will use a number of backs to keep them fresh and that will pay dividends as the season progresses." Expected to contribute in the backfield are red-shirt freshman Kevin "Action" Jackson (5-9, 170) and Willie Wilson (5-6, 170, Jr). Starting fullbacks Mark Sike (6-3, 222, Sr) and Brent Fleming (5-10, 215, Sr) combined for over 250 yards rushing and 30 pass receptions for over 200 yards last season. Those two seniors return to bolster the Sycamore offense.

OFFENSIVE LINE The area most hit by graduation is the Sycamore offensive front. Part-time starters Mark Marshall (C, 6-3, 265, Sr) and Jim Coveliers (OG, 6-3, 240, Sr) are the top returnees up front as ISU lost five veterans to graduation. "We improved ourselves on the offensive line in spring drills but were hurt because of

injuries to some key people who need the work and will help us this fall. It is an area of concern but we have the people who can fill the holes and with added preparation and work, we'll be ready," Raetz said about his inexperienced offensive line.

Red-shirt Freshman Dan Quick (6-4, 245) had a good spring and hopes to fill one of the tackle spots. Transfer Steve Engel (6-3, 275, Jr) missed most of spring practice and is expected to fill an opening up front. Pat Christie (6-0, 260, Jr), Jeff Purkey (6-3, 265, Jr), Ed Allison (6-3, 255, So), and newcomer Henry Villegas (6-5, 265, Jr) are expected to battle for starting roles along with a host of red-shirt freshmen/squad men who have improved in the offensive line.

RECEIVERS/TIGHT END Record-setting tight end Rodney Porter (6-2, 210, Jr) and senior flanker Chris Johnson (5-11, 175, Sr) lead the Sycamore receiving corps. Porter set new Indiana State school records with his 49 receptions for 738 yards last season. He led the Gateway Conference in receiving for eight weeks before finishing second by one catch to UNI's Carl Boyd. Johnson, the school record holder with his 253 yards receiving in 1986 vs. Illinois State, has over 40 career catches and over 20 yards per catch at ISU. Junior Steve Elmlinger (6-0, 185) caught 11 passes for 196 yards and three TDs last season and was a clutch receiver for Indiana State in 1987. Elmlinger had a great spring season and will be one of the top receivers in the Gateway his final two years. Quality depth is provided by a host of receivers who could contribute in 1988.

PLACE KICKER/PUNTER Sophomore Rob Hufty (6-0, 182) and Tom Moore (5-11, 178, Jr) are competing for the Sycamore place kicking duties. Last year's kicker Corey Potter hit 8 of 11 FGs and 19 of 21 EXP's and is lost to graduation. Hufty hit 2 EXP's last year and missed on his two FG attempts as a freshman. He has the strong leg to be an asset to the ISU offense and time will tell how good the highly-touted Indiana all-stater will become.

Hufty, John Stites (6-2, 175, So) and John Barrett (OLB, 6-2, 225, So) competed for the punting duties last spring with Hufty having the edge in drills.

LINEBACKERS All-American candidate Antoine Liddell (6-3, 230, Sr) leads the list of as many as 10 veteran linebackers who will contribute to the Sycamore defense in 1988. Liddell is into his third year of starting duty at ISU and he teams with veteran starters Ken Hopp (ILB, 6-2, 220, Sr), Matt Campbell (ILB, 6-1, 218, Sr) and sophomores Steve Hein (ILB, 6-2, 225) and Jeff Propst (6-1, 220, ILB) to form the Sycamore linebacking crew. Add quality players Darnell White (6-3, 235, OLB, Jr), Anthony Booker (OLB, 6-4, 225, RS Fr) and Scott Foster (ILB, 6-3, 205, RS Fr), the growing list of linebackers is impressive.

Hopp led the team last year with 112 tackles and the linebackers combined for over 300 tackles and four QB sacks in 1987. "We have the needed depth and experience at linebacker," said Coach Raetz. "We have to get the consistent performance from them, game-in-game-out, for us to be successful as a defensive unit this season."

DEFENSIVE SECONDARY This hard-working unit could be the key to the 1988 Indiana State defense if they continue to show improvement and perform similar to the final four games of the 1987 season. Losing two-time All-Gateway performer Steve McKeel hurts, but the secondary return veterans at all other spots and quality newcomers with outstanding athletic ability and talents to fill openings. Returning starters Walter Crutchfield (6-0, 200, Jr), Lavent Blaylock (5-9, 180, Jr), Troy Mickens (5-9, 170, So) and Curtis Daley (5-11, 205, Sr) combined for close to 200 tackles in 1987 and combined with McKeel for six of ISU's 11 interceptions. Red-shirt freshman Don Cox (5-10, 170) had a impressive spring and will fight for a starting DB spot along with Tom Werner (6-2, 170, Sr), Bernard Shackleford (5-11, 190, Jr), John Story (6-2, 175, So), and Marcus Wilson (5-9, 195, So). "We'll be improved in the secondary and the added experience and playing time from last season will help them. We have to get the intensity and improved play from day one of drills in August to the end of the season," Raetz said.

DEFENSIVE LINE Defensive Coordinator/Defensive line coach Dan Ritter has five quality players returning on the defensive front line. Heading the veterans are four seniors and a junior: Rhett Schmidt (DT, 6-3, 245), Mark Bertram (DT, Jr, 6-4, 240), Brad Whitaker (Sr, DT, 6-2, 245), Paul Wafzig (NG, Sr, 6-3, 250) and Tony Lowe (Sr, NG, 6-3, 285). The five combined for over 200 tackles and nine QB sacks last season. Added emphasis on the pass rush and play of the line in controlling the "trenches" was instrumental last season in the final four victories. Glenn Skreppen (6-4, 265, So), Robert Patton (6-5, 220, RS Fr), Pete Georges (6-1, 240, So) and Doug Dutton (6-6, 245, RS Fr.) will all be battling for playing time.

SCHEDULE

The 1988 schedule is a good one, opening at home with Salem College September 10 at Memorial Stadium. Then the Sycamores get a return visit to Gainesville, Florida and a battle with the Florida Gators September 17. ISU fans will remember the last trip there in 1983 and this year the Sycamores will have to contend with Heisman Candidate RB Emmitt Smith of the Gators.

Indiana State plays five games at Memorial Stadium with Illinois State slated as the homecoming opponent on October 22. The Gateway Conference opener is at home September 24 vs. Western Illinois. The annual Victory Bell Classic game with Ball State at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis will be played Thursday, November 17, 7:00 p.m. kickoff.

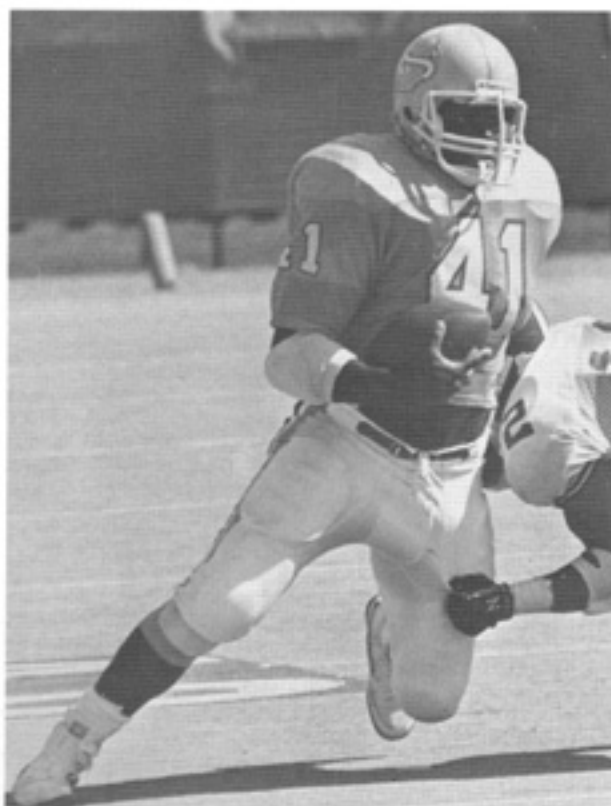

Memorial Stadium



Indiana State plays their home football games at Memorial Stadium, which is located on the corners of Wabash and Brown Avenues in Terre Haute.

The stadium was acquired by the University in 1967 and, prior to that time, was used for both football and baseball. Since the installation of the synthetic playing surface, however, the field has been used for football and field hockey.

The first university in the world to own and make outdoor application of Astroturf was Indiana State and the Sycamores put the new field to good use in September of 1967 as ISU hosted Eastern Illinois.

The Astroturf in use at Indiana State is similar to that used in Houston's famed Astrodome. Plus factors in the use of the synthetic surface include durability (some 15 college and high school football games are played on the field each year; and in addition the ISU football team conducts all practices on the field) and a constant surface which will provide sure footing regardless of weather.

Each blade of grass is 3/8 inches 64 long and is attached to a sponge-

rubber pad 1/4 inches thick. This sponge pad is then set upon a fiber pad 1/2 inch thick. Both the sponge pad and the fiber pad are set on a two-inch layer of asphalt. Memorial Stadium was open to the public for the first time May 5, 1925 as the local minor league baseball team, the Terre Haute Tots, played the Peoria (IL) Tractors with an estimated crowd of 9,000 on hand for the event.

Among the honored guests at the game were major league baseball commissioner Judge Kennesaw Landis and Charles Barnard, a representative of the Cleveland Indians.

The first use of the playing field was

in the fall of 1924 as local high schools, Wiley and Garfield, played their traditional Thanksgiving Day game.

Work on Memorial Stadium was begun in 1922 at a cost of \$450,000.

After the University gained control of the stadium in 1967, a three-part renovation project was started which included the reorientation of the playing field from a north-south direction to an east-west line; installation of Astroturf; and a building of some 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field as well as rebuilding of seats on the south side of the field.

Capacity of Memorial Stadium is now 20,500.
