This season Sycamore fans will have the opportunity to see an All-American candidate on the field virtually every snap. When ISU possesses the ball, watch for senior tailback **Jake Shields** to take control of the game as he looks to become the first Sycamore running back to record a 1,000-yard rushing season since 1993. On defense, **Kyle Mitchell** needs just six sacks to attain the Sycamores' all-time career record in less than three seasons. Excitement is building as Shields and Mitchell build All-American seasons ahead of a talented group of veterans and transfers that should round out a squad that is ready to compete for the Gateway Football Conference Championship in 2004.

MEDIA INFORMATION

TO THE MEDIA:

It is our goal that you find this publication useful while covering Indiana State University's 2004 football team. Every effort has been made to include timely and pertinent information.

Additional requests by accredited media representatives for items such as color photography, video tape, feature material, etc. should be directed to our office. It is our purpose to serve you.

CREDENTIALS:

Requests for working press, radio, television and photographer passes should be made as early as possible to:

Credentials may be picked up in the Media Relations office prior to the first game, thereafter they will be left at Memorial Stadium Media Will Call. Credentials must be made visible at all times for proper identification by Indiana State security personnel. Weekly print media and non-reporting radio-TV representatives have least priority to media reservations. Likewise, we are unable to accommodate children, spouses or other nonworkers.

PHOTO / SIDELINE CREDENTIALS:

Follow the same procedure as used in requesting press box credentials. A credential must be designated photo for access to field level.

MEDIA WILL CALL:

The Memorial Stadium Media Will Call is located at the southwest gate area of the stadium. Credentials may be picked up 90 minutes prior to game time.

PRESS BOX:

Entrance: The entrance to the Memorial Stadium press box is via the elevator located on the west side of the stadium, directly across from main gate.

Layout: The Memorial Stadium press box is a single-level facility. The main area is reserved for print media personnel. There are separate booths for radio and television networks, coaches and the official stat crew. Film crews are asked to use the photo deck atop the press box.

Radio Networks: The originating station for each team's radio network is provided a booth from which to broadcast. Phone lines are provided in the visitor's radio booth on a reciprocal basis.

Television: Should a station wish to originate live coverage of a game, a broadcast booth will be provided to the originating network. **All telecasts must have the approval of the Indiana State University Athletics Director.**

Coaches Booth: Home and visiting coaching staffs are provided a booth, seating four persons, from which to work.

Photo Deck: An open air photo deck is located on the pressbox roof. Secondary radio broadcasts may also be placed on the roof due to space limitations.

Sideline: Indiana State follows NCAA regulations

regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines and must display their credential armbands at all times. Media may not work inside the team areas at any time. Representatives from the Indiana State Athletics Department will be responsible for sideline control.

MEDIA PARKING:

There is no designated media parking area at Memorial Stadium. However, there is ample parking available near the press box entrance.

PRESS BOX SERVICES:

Statistical and informational materials including pre-game notes, flip cards and gameday programs will be distributed in the press box prior to game time. Two telephone lines are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Play-by-play, complete quarter, halftime and final game statistics and drive charts will be available shortly after the game. A light meal and beverages will be available to accredited media one hour prior to game time. Beverages will be available throughout the game. In-game live statistics will be provided to live electronic broadcast outlets.

POST-GAME PROCEDURE:

Prior to the end of the contest, Assistant SID Ace Hunt will collect media requests. Media will be escorted to field level with five (5) minutes remaining on the fourth quarter clock. Player interviews will be conducted following a 10-minute cooling off period just outside of the fieldhouse on the north side. Coach McGuire will then be available in the coaches' meeting/film room following player interviews. The visiting locker room will be open at the discretion of the visiting SID.

RADIO INFORMATION:

Radio contract requests and information should be directed to the Indiana State Athletics Media Relations Office. Stations designated as "official" by visiting opponents will be provided a courtesy telephone line on press row. All other stations requesting broadcast space must pay a fee of \$50 to Indiana State University and will be accommodated on the press box roof.

PLAYER INTERVIEW POLICY:

All requests for player interviews must be made through the Media Relations office. Players have been instructed to conduct no interviews unless they have been set up in this manner. The interviews generally will be conducted before or after practice at Memorial Stadium. Players generally are available throughout the week with the exception of game days. Requests for telephone interviews will be handled by players returning phone calls to the media. **No home telephone numbers will be given out.**

INTERVIEWS WITH COACH TIM MCGUIRE:

Interviews with Coach Tim McGuire may be arranged through the Athletics Media Relations Office by calling (812) 237-4159. It is best to arrange phone interviews during the

morning. If you are unable to speak with Coach McGuire during the mornings, he is available to talk to the media prior to or directly after the conclusion of practice at Memorial Stadium.

DIRECTIONS TO MEMORIAL STADIUM:

Memorial Stadium is located on the northeast corner of Wabash and Brown Avenue.

From the east (Indianapolis): Take Interstate 70 west to the first Terre Haute exit (Hwy 46). Turn right onto Highway 46 North and travel approximately two miles to Wabash Avenue. Turn left onto Wabash Avenue and travel approximately one mile to Brown Avenue (second stoplight).

From the west (St. Louis): Take Interstate 70 east to the third Terre Haute exit (Highway 46). Turn right onto Highway 46 North and travel approximately two miles to Wabash Avenue. Turn left onto Wabash Avenue and travel approximately one mile to Brown Avenue (second stoplight).

SEASON OUTLOOK

EXPERIENCE & DEPTH HOLD KEY TO 2004

For the Indiana State Sycamores, 2003 was a year of growing and learning as over 40 underclassmen stepped onto the field, most for the first time. While injuries took their toll on the limited ISU depth during the course of the season, numerous young players received the chance to play early in their careers. Many of those younger players will be thrust into expanded roles with experience behind them, while an influx of transfers will look to mesh with the talent base in place in what promises to be an exciting 2004 campaign.

The addition of depth and experience at what was thin positions in 2003 became a focal point for the ISU coaching staff in recruiting. Tim McGuire and his staff went out and found top quality junior college and Division 1-A transfers to round out the squad for the fall.

QUARTERBACK

After starting the first nine games last year, Jake Schiff's season ended prematurely due to injury. Phillip Johnson stepped in to provide leadership during the season's last three games. Both players had solid years, and will once again stage a battle for the starting job during fall drills.

Schiff returns from a Gateway Football Conference All-Newcomer Team season in which he completed 55 percent of his passes for a team-leading 1,290 yards and five touchdowns. Johnson showed what he could do in the home finale against Western Illinois, throwing for 180 yards and three touchdowns while rushing for another. Also returning this fall will be Ben Schmidt who is coming off a solid redshirt season.

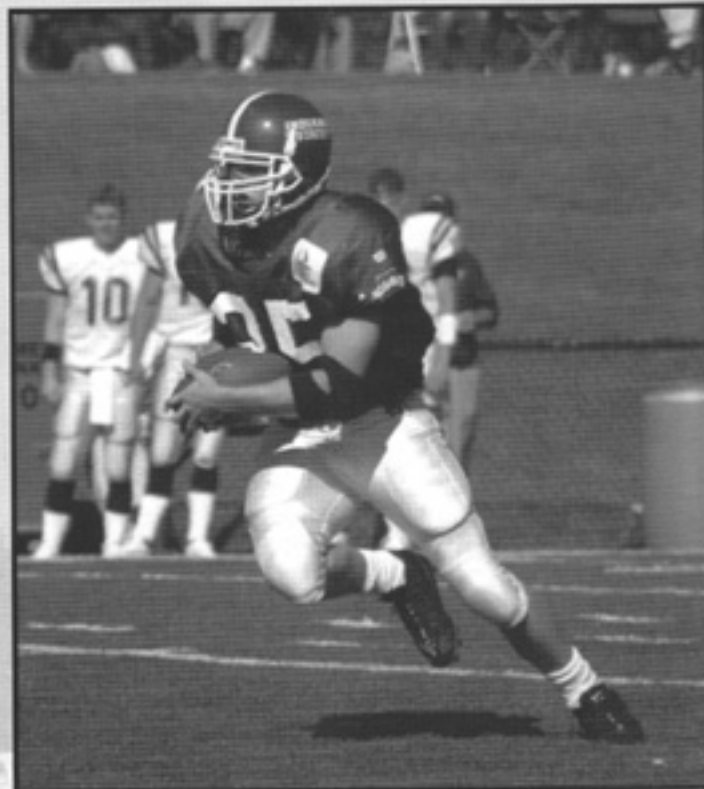
Joining the fray this season will be Michigan State transfer Griff Howard, who had a record-setting career at Florida's Port Charlotte High School. After redshirting last season with the Spartans as a defensive back, Howard returns to the position that led him to all-state honors and recording-breaking seasons in high school.

This preseason, just like last year, the quarterback position will feature a four-way battle for the team's starting job. Although Schiff won the job last season, the race will be tight once again as he continues to recover from a broken collarbone suffered against Western Kentucky.

OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

Jake Shields and Sidney Montfort return for their senior campaigns as the Sycamores' top two tailbacks. Shields looked to be on track for a 1,000-yard rushing season until ankle injuries ended his season after seven games. A healthy Shields will be a key component to any ISU success in 2004 as his hard-nosed running ability will be needed in new offensive coordinator Steve Brickey's balanced attack.

Montfort answered the call during the remaining contests after the injury to Shields. He finished the season with 301 yards on the ground, the second best mark on the team. Kris

Karagory will be returning on the heels of his best game as a Sycamore, eclipsing the 100-yard mark in the season finale at Illinois State. Karagory saw 48 rushes on the season for 241 yards and one touchdown. Also back this season is Andre Forte. Although he has battled injury throughout most of his career, he did run for a combined 100 yards in two games last season.

Adding depth this season will be junior college transfer Martuan Sample and Therral Hatfield, a sophomore transfer from Louisiana-Lafayette. At the fullback position, redshirt Brian Lewis gets his chance to enter the rotation as will Brian McCulley and Skip Clemens, who moved over from the offensive line.

RECEIVERS

ISU lost its top receiver from 2003 in Ryan King to graduation and will rely on Sam Logan, James Braden and Carl Berman who return to the squad after promising seasons.

Logan burst onto the scene with a 100-yard receiving day against Eastern Illinois and held steady throughout the season. Sycamore quarterbacks also will be looking for the sure hands of James Braden, who will look to get back to the form he enjoyed as a freshman. Berman saw a majority of his playing time last season as the team's leading punt returner,

but showed big-play capability with a 49-yard catch against Eastern Illinois.

Adding to the mix this year will be Markus Naves, a transfer from Central Michigan and Ben Steckler, a transfer from Michigan State. Both had standout high school careers, and will look to make their mark in the collegiate game beginning this season.

OFFENSIVE LINE

On the line, ISU returns a solid corps of starters in Fred Freitag, Jon Ferber and Stuart Williams. Expected to help fill in the gaps left by the graduation of Matt Griebel and Marc Phillips will be Zach Odle and Kevin Wildman, who are slated to become starters in 2004.

For the first time in recent history, the Sycamores have three returning starters on the line, and can go three-deep at each position. Sophomore Brandon Hooks enjoyed a successful year as the deep snapper in 2003, and this fall will continue to contribute to the team in that capacity.

DEFENSIVE LINE

Over on defense, Tom Brillhart and Bruce Blue will make their marks at the defensive tackle positions while Adam Vogel and the Sycamore's lost-yardage leader Kyle Mitchell return as ends.

Brillhart returns for his senior season off a year in which he finished seventh on the squad in tackles despite missing two contests due to injury. Blue will look to continue his strong play from last season in which he recorded 19 tackles and one sack.

ISU's lone All-American from 2003 returns as junior Kyle Mitchell looks to continue his standout career. He needs just five sacks to tie Shannon Jackson for the Indiana State career mark in just three seasons. Mitchell tied for the team lead in tackles for loss last year with 12. Joining Mitchell on the other end of the line will be Adam Vogel, who recorded 24 tackles last season along with two fumbles forced and recovered.

Adding depth along the line this season will be Shawn Stackhouse and Herbie Blain at the tackles and Russell Coleman and Jarret Harris at the ends.

LINEBACKERS

Linebacker Darryl Morton had a breakout year in 2003, pacing ISU with 101 total tackles. Morton returns this season as the strong-side linebacker and will be backed up by Fred Quarles, who saw significant playing time last year due to other injuries.

Establishing himself last season as a talented backer was Andy Jones, who began the year as a reserve, but burst into a starting role by midyear. Jones recorded 77 tackles as a freshman, including five for losses. Jones will have William McDonald, a junior college transfer, backing him up heading into the fall.

Redshirt freshman Brandon Logan will join the Sycamore linebacking corps after a redshirt season. Logan gained valuable experience as a redshirt and will be looked upon as a leader at the weak-side linebacker. Jared Rosenow, a fellow redshirt, and Scott Cassell, a true freshman, will serve as backups to Logan. Also in the mix this season will be junior college transfer LaDrelle Bryant, who originally signed to play at Purdue, but went on to start at Garden City C.C. for the past two seasons. Also transferring in will be Matt Muxlow, who turned in a stellar career at Bakersfield C.C.

DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD

Quincy Wallace and Kyle James return after anchoring the cornerback positions last season. Wallace recorded 32 tackles a season ago in 11 starts. James proved to be a star in the making as he is the team's leading returner for interceptions with two a season ago — including one in his first collegiate game at Ball State.

Redshirt Courtney Reese along with transfer John Jordan will provide depth at the cornerback positions in 2004.

The Sycamores lost both starting safeties from a season ago in Terrance Miles and Larry Thompson. Redshirt Derrick Williams at strong safety while Ryan Mosley is eligible and will be looked at the fill in at free safety. Sophomore John Jackson will be the first backup for Mosley while Rocky Alo will contend for playing time at the strong safety position.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Sophomore Kyle Hooper returns after a standout freshman season in which he was a perfect 19-19 on PAT's and was an impressive 9-14 on field goals. Phillip Johnson will look to replace the departed Pat Jordan at punter, although preseason drills will leave the punting position wide open. In the mix for the placekicking or punting duties will be freshman Brandon Anwieler who hails from Brownsburg, Ind. Nick Urankar is back for his sophomore season as the kickoff specialist. Courtney Reese will also see extensive action as a return specialist.

THE SCHEDULE

ISU opens the 2004 season with a date against the 2003 GMAC Bowl champion Miami (Ohio) Redhawks. Beginning at 6:00 p.m. (CST) on August 28th, the game will serve as the national college football kickoff.

ISU begins 1-AA play at Eastern Illinois, and then continues its tour of the Ohio Valley Conference with home contests against Murray State and Tennessee-Martin.

The Gateway schedule begins on October 2nd with a home contest against Illinois State, before the Sycamores take to the road against Western Illinois. Following a home game against SMS, ISU is the homecoming opponent at Western Kentucky before travelling to Youngstown State.

The Sycamores host their own homecoming game in early November against defending conference co-champion UNI. ISU concludes the season at the other co-champion, Southern Illinois, in a late-season night contest in Carbondale, Ill.

MEMORIAL STADIUM

Home for the Sycamores over the past 37 years is venerable Memorial Stadium. The 12,764-seat structure has stood at the corner of Wabash and Brown Avenues in Terre Haute, Ind., since its original construction in 1924. The facility was acquired by Indiana State University in 1967.

The stadium, through constant upkeep, is in excellent condition through the years. Its latest additions are a \$600,000 AstroPlay artificial surface, installed prior to the 2001 season, as well as a refurbished pressbox.

Memorial Stadium is not new to synthetic surfaces, as the stadium and Indiana State University claim distinction as the world's first university to make outdoor application of AstroTurf. Following the University's acquisition of the stadium, Indiana State opened the 1967 season with a 41-6 win over Eastern Illinois in the first game played

on the new surface.

Memorial Stadium was dedicated to the public for the first time on May 5, 1925, as the local minor league baseball team, the Terre Haute Tots, played the Peoria Tractors before an estimated crowd of 9,000. Among the honored guests were Major League Baseball Commissioner Judge Kennesaw Mountain Landis and Charles Barnard of the Cleveland Indians.

The first use of the playing field was in the fall of 1924, when Wiley and Garfield High Schools played their traditional Thanksgiving Day game.

Original construction of Memorial Stadium was begun in 1922, at a cost of \$450,000. Upon the University gaining control in 1967, a three-part renovation project was started which included: the reorientation of the playing field from a north-south direction to

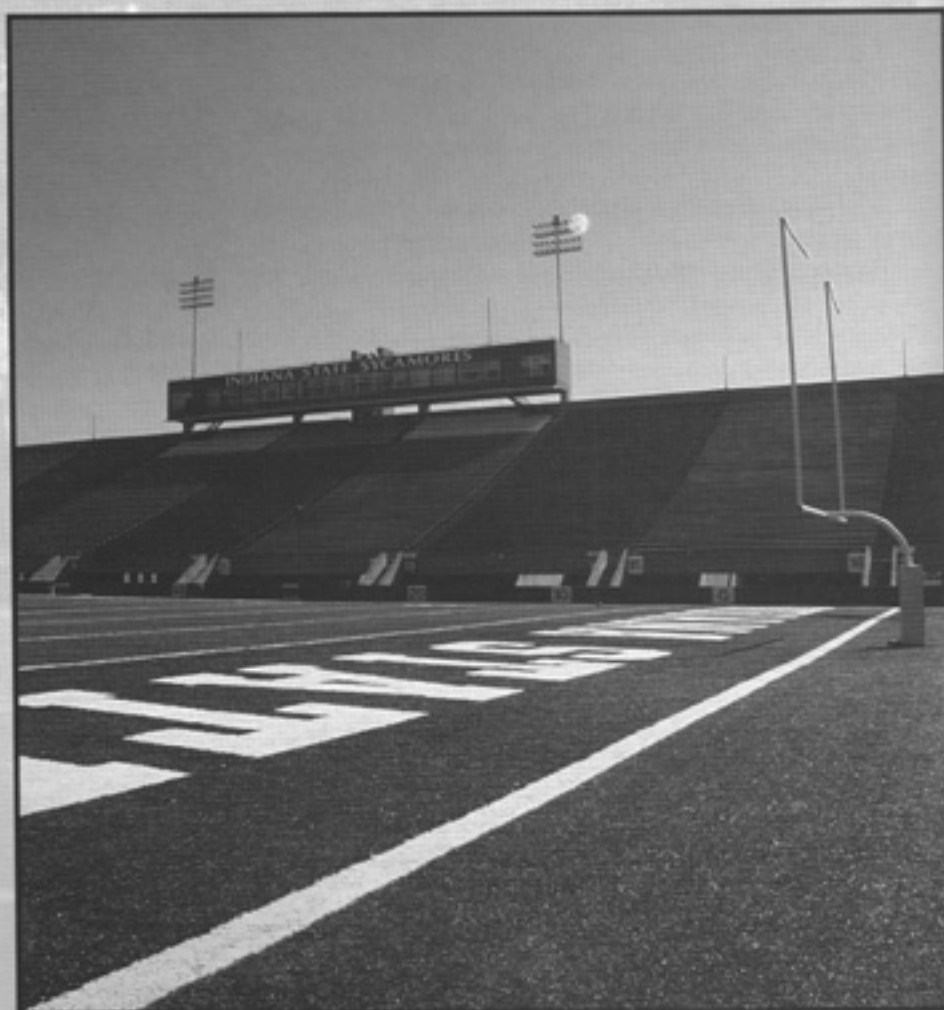
its present east-west configuration; the installation of AstroTurf; and the construction of some 4,500 bleacher seats on the north side of the field as well as the rebuilding of seats on the south side. The original arch still remains from the original structure. However, the bleacher seats, installed in 1967, were removed in the summer of 1996 and replaced by a landscaped hill which serves as a general admission section and a site for pregame tailgating for Sycamore fans.

Former Indiana State head coach Dennis Raetz utilized Memorial Stadium well. His Sycamore teams posted a 67-30-1 mark for a .689 winning percentage in 18 seasons at Memorial Stadium. Under the lights, Raetz's teams compiled a 34-4-1 mark for an .885 winning percentage.

TIM MCGUIRE NEBRASKA ('75)

20-48 AT INDIANA STATE (SEVENTH SEASON)

The highly personable Tim McGuire is entering his seventh season as the head coach of the Indiana State football program. McGuire has been a vital part of Indiana State football program for the past 11 seasons, having guided the Indiana State defense as the program's defensive coordinator before becoming head coach prior to the 1998 campaign. He has also served previously as the assistant head coach, as well as instructing the ISU defensive backs.

During his six seasons as the Sycamores' head coach, McGuire has developed seven all-Americans – defensive back/return specialist DeJuan Alfonzo and defensive ends Shannon Jackson and Troy Lefevra. In 2002, Soso Dede, Deitrich Lapsley and Richard Harris joined that select group by garnering several postseason All-America honors as well. Last season defensive end Kyle Mitchell earned mention on the *Don Hansen Football Gazette All-America* squad.

Last season, Coach McGuire led his troops into battle at Ball State to open the season in the first-ever night game held at the Cardinal's Ball State Stadium.

In 2002, the Sycamores had one of their best seasons in recent history, winning four of its five home contests, including wins over NCAA Tournament participant Murray State and perennial Gateway Football Conference powerhouse Northern Iowa.

McGuire's teams also came within an eye lash of downing Division I-A Ball State on their home field, and narrowly dropped a tough decision to

Eastern Illinois.

As a defensive coordinator McGuire's Sycamore defensive units ranked among the top four Gateway Football Conference leaders in five of seven years. His 1994 squad was first among the Gateway in total defense and 17th in the nation, while the 1995 team finished second in league play and 20th nationally.

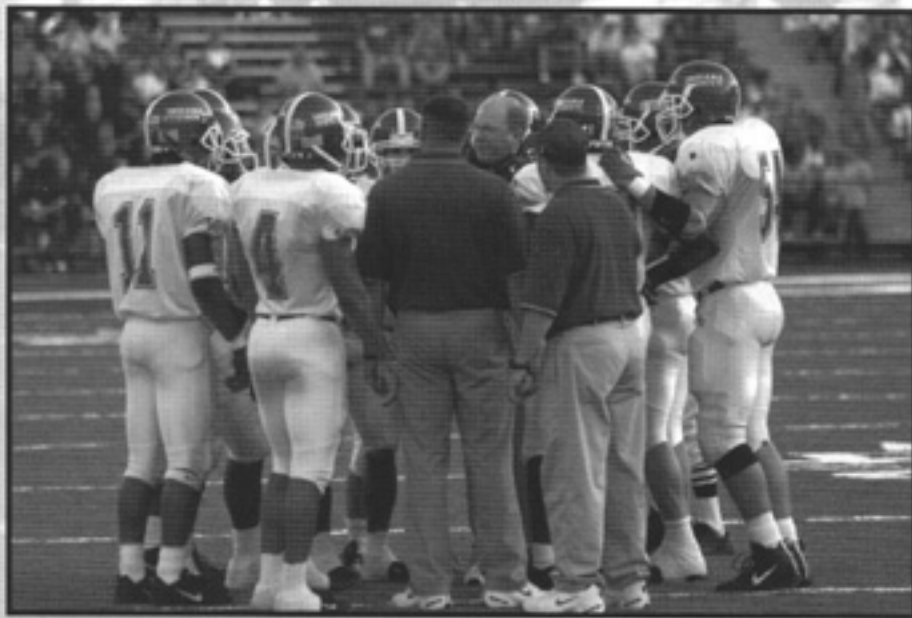
In his five years as defensive coordinator, McGuire's units recorded three shutouts and 10 games in which the opposition were held to fewer than 10 points. He also coached three all-Americans, including current Philadelphia Eagle standout Dan Brandenburg, Chris Libaire and Richard Moss.

The Omaha, NE, native has also tutored 13 student-athletes who have garnered first-team, all-conference honors, while seven have earned second-team. McGuire also has tutored 14 academic all-Conference honor-

ees.

Prior to his arrival at Indiana State, McGuire spent two seasons at the United States Naval Academy. In 1991 he coached the linebackers for the varsity squad, and the following year (1992) he was the defensive coordinator for the academy's lightweight football team. The '92 team finished with a 7-0 record enroute to the East Lightweight Football Championship.

The 2003 campaign represents McGuire's eighth season as a head coach, as he served two seasons (1981-82) as head coach of Morningside College, a Division II school in Sioux City, Iowa. McGuire compiled a 7-15 mark in his two-year head coaching debut at Morningside, but that record is somewhat deceiving. His 1981 team went 5-6, recording the most wins for the school in 10 years, and despite falling to 2-9 the

following year, his two recruiting classes eventually posted winning seasons of 6-5 in 1984 and 7-3-1 in 1985.

McGuire honed his skills as a defensive intellect with stints at Northern Illinois University as well as at Kansas State University.

At Northern Illinois, McGuire spent four seasons (1986-1990) as the Huskies' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach. While at the Dekalb, Ill., institution, he coached five players who signed contracts with the NFL, as well as All-Americans Doug Bartlett, Cary Caliendo and Ron Delisi. His 1987 squad ranked third nationally in interceptions, 34th in total defense and 42nd in passing defense, while his 1988 defensive unit held the opposition to an average of 10 points or less per game enroute to ranking 23rd nationally in scoring defense. The 1989 Huskies finished fourth in turnover margin and 29th in rushing defense, allowing just six opponents to eclipse 100 yards in team rushing.

His stint at Kansas State lasted two years from 1984-85. Serving as the Wildcats' defensive coordinator and linebackers coach, McGuire instructed Barton Hundley—a Chicago Bears draft selection and a first-team, all-Big Eight pick.

McGuire acquired his love for Indiana State in a one-year assignment as defensive coordinator with the Sycamores during their Division I-AA playoff run in 1983. Not only was his defensive unit ranked first in the Missouri Valley Conference in turnover margin and second in both total defense and scoring defense, but it was at this time that McGuire began his streak of producing All-Americans and NFL draft picks.

Former Sycamore standouts Vencie Glenn, Ed Martin, Kevin Ramsey, Walter Seaphus and Sam Suggs all played under McGuire and later signed contracts in the NFL. As for all-American standouts, DeJuan Alfonzo, Glenn, Martin and Wayne Davis all grabbed such honors.

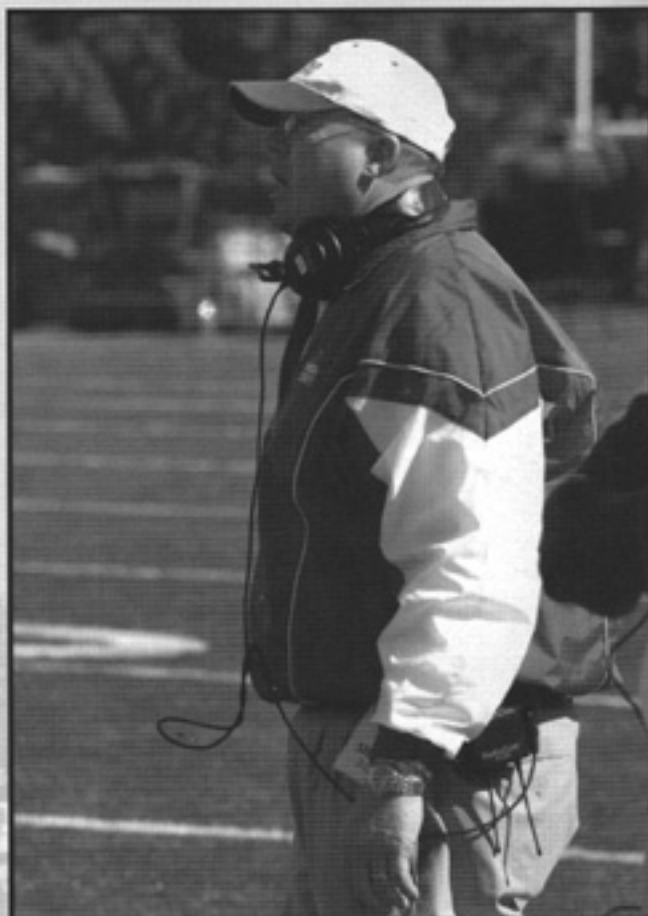
McGuire spent three seasons (1978-80) as an assistant coach instructing the defensive line at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. Prior to UNO, McGuire spent the 1977 season as an assistant football coach and mathematics teacher at Millard High School in Omaha, NE. He began his professional career in 1975 as head football coach and mathematics teacher at Archbishop Ryan in Omaha.

McGuire played offensive guard at the University of Nebraska for four seasons (1971-74), receiving his bachelor's degree in mathematics. He later attained a master's degree from the University of Nebraska-Omaha in physical education.

McGuire is a member of several organizations, including American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), American Red Cross and American As-

sociation for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

McGuire and his wife, Judy, are the parents of four children: Lisa, Tim, Jr., Molly and Paul.

STEVE BRICKEY
OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR
QUARTERBACKS
(MISSOURI '82)

In his first season as the Sycamores' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach is Steve Brickey. This marks his third stint with Indiana State and his 10th season overall with the Sycamore football program.

Brickey comes to ISU from Iowa State where in just four seasons, Brickey coached two different quarterbacks to three of the finest seasons ever enjoyed by any Cyclone signal caller.

In his first season at Iowa State, Brickey, a 26-year college coaching veteran, tutored ISU quarterback Sage Rosenfels to the second most productive season by a quarterback in school history.

A new success story was crafted by a different quarterback under Brickey's guidance in 2001. Junior college transfer Seneca Wallace compiled 2,519 yards of total offense, en route to Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year honors.

In 2002, Wallace threw for 3,245 yards and 15 touchdowns while rushing for 437 more and scoring eight times on the ground. In just two seasons, Wallace became Iowa State's all-time career total yardage leader.

Brickey's success is to be expected. He was offensive coordinator at North Texas in 1998 and 1999. Prior to that, Brickey tutored four of the all-time career offensive leaders in Southwest Conference history during his 13-year tenure as a coach in the Lone Star state.

As an assistant coach at Texas from 1987-91, Brickey tutored quarterbacks Peter Gardere and Bret Stafford. Gardere and Stafford rank third and fifth all-time, respectively, in Longhorn history in total offense.

At TCU, Brickey recruited tailback and current San Diego Charger LaDainian Tomlinson, the nation's leading rusher in 1999 and 2000. Brickey coached Max Knake at TCU, who in 1994 was the SWC co-Offensive Player of the Year and set single season records for passing yards and touchdowns thrown.

While at Indiana State from 1978-85, Brickey worked with quarterbacks Jeff Miller (7,519 yards) and Reggie Allen (6,102 yards), who finished first and fourth, respectively, in career total offense in the Missouri Valley Conference. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Missouri (1976-77).

He has been to seven bowl games and two NCAA I-AA Playoffs including: 1986 Independence Bowl (Texas Tech), the 1987 Bluebonnet Bowl (Texas), the 1991 Cotton Bowl (Texas), the 1994 Independence Bowl (TCU), the 2000 Insight.com Bowl (Iowa State), the 2001 Independence Bowl

(Iowa State) and the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl (Iowa State). While an assistant at Indiana State, he helped the Sycamores to their only NCAA I-AA playoff berths (1983, 1984).

Brickey was an all-metro quarterback at Affton High School in suburban St. Louis, graduating in 1972. He played both quarterback and defensive back at Missouri and received his degree in 1976. He and his wife, Patti, have three sons: Chris, John and Mike.

David Hutchison begins his third season on the Sycamore coaching staff, and his second working with the ISU offensive line.

Last season he tutored all-conference honoree Stuart Williams along a Sycamore offensive front which blocked for Jake Shields during the school's fourth-best ever rushing effort against Florida International. During the most recent off-season offensive lineman Matt Griebel signed a free agent contract with the Indianapolis Colts.

Working with the ISU runningbacks in 2002, Hutchison guided Shields to a season in which he gained 5.4 yards per carry, scoring seven touchdowns for the Sycamores. "Hutch" also was instrumental in the development of Soso Dede and Sydney Montfort, who also combined for seven rushing touchdowns on the season.

He came to the Sycamores' football program after spending one year as a graduate assistant with the offensive unit at Missouri.

Prior to joining the Mizzou staff, Hutchison spent two years as a graduate assistant at Toledo (1999-2000), where he also worked with the offensive unit, tutoring tight ends and wide receivers. In 1998, he served as a student assistant coach at Adrian College (Mich.), coaching wide receivers.

A 1999 graduate of Adrian College with a bachelor's degree in Physical Education/Elementary Education, Hutchison was a three-year starter and a two-time all-conference selection at wide receiver. A team captain his senior season, he earned both team and offensive unit most valuable player honors.

A native of Onsted, Mich., Hutchison was born January 10, 1976.

Beginning his second season at ISU as the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach is Tim Burke. Last season his defensive unit was paced by Kyle Mitchell -- an all-Gateway Conference honoree -- and third team All-America selection.

Mitchell continued his stellar ISU career by recording 70 total tackles, including 12 for a loss of minus of 61 yards to tie for the team lead. He paced the squad with eight sacks for minus 49 yards.

Burke, who comes to ISU from the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga brings a wealth of experience to the table for a Sycamore defense that made great strides last season.

Prior to working at Chattanooga, Burke worked for two seasons at Kansas where he worked with the Jayhawk defensive backs in 2000, before working with the defensive line in 2001.

Burke also was the defensive backs coach at Purdue, where he worked for four seasons at the West Lafayette, Ind., school.

While with the Bollermakers, the secondary turned into a significant weapon, allowing just 193.7 yards per game in 1998 and intercepted 23 passes in 1997 (the second-most in Purdue school history).

Previously, Burke spent two years at Wyoming, where he also coached the secondary. His 1995 unit led the WAC and ranked 32nd in the country in pass defense. In 1996, he coached strong safety Brian Lee, who set a school record and ranked second nationally with eight interceptions, including three in one game.

Burke was also secondary coach from 1989-94 and defensive coordinator from 1992-94 for the Ball State Cardinals. While at BSU, he helped the Cards win MAC Championships in 1989 and 1993 with berths in the California Raisin and Las Vegas Bowls, respectively. BSU was the MAC's winningest team during the six years that Burke was at the Muncie school.

Burke also was the defensive coordinator/secondary coach at North Dakota from 1986-88 and held a similar post at South Dakota from 1982-85.

A 1977 graduate of Luther College, he also has been an assistant coach at Appalachian State (1981), Gardner-Webb (1980) and Minnesota (1977-79).

A native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, he has two sons, Kelly and Evan.



SHANNON JACKSON
DEFENSIVE LINE
(INDIANA STATE '00)

Now in his fourth season as a member of the Indiana State football staff is Shannon Jackson, one of the great defensive players to have worn the Sycamore blue.

As a coach, Jackson tutors ISU's stalwart on the defensive line, Kyle Mitchell, who garnered all-Gateway conference honors in 2003 with a team-leading eight sacks.

During the 2001 campaign, Jackson's first as the defensive line coach, he oversaw the development of all-America candidate Richard Harris, who ranked among national tackle-for-loss leaders.

Jackson initially joined the Indiana State staff prior to the 2000 season, serving in the role of graduate assistant/tight ends coach.

A preseason first-team all-America selection as a senior defensive lineman in 1999, Jackson was selected to two all-America postseason squads following that campaign.

Jackson registered a career-high 89 tackles as a sophomore in 1997, including 48 solo take downs. A two-time all-Gateway Football Conference performer at defensive end, he stamped his name in the Indiana State record book with his 24 career quarterback sacks spanning his four-year career (1996-99).

A native of Fort Wayne, Ind., Jackson was born September 18, 1976. An Indiana State University Dean's List member, he received his bachelor's degree in Criminology in the Spring of 2000.



PAUL MACKLIN
RUNNING BACKS
(VIRGINIA UNION '96)

Beginning his second season as a member of the ISU coaching staff is Paul Macklin. He coaches the Sycamores stable of talented running backs.

Macklin had three runners average 3.5 yards per carry during the 2003 season with Jake Shields leading the way with an average of 5.3 yards per carry and 825 yards gained.

Macklin is a 1996 graduate of Virginia Union University in Richmond, Va., where he was a wide receiver. A four-year starter, Macklin was a member of the CIAA All-Academic

team as a freshman.

While at Virginia Union, Macklin was tutored by former Philadelphia Eagle great Harold Jackson, and worked at football camps at Penn State with Kenny Jackson.

Working under second-year defensive coordinator Tim Burke is linebackers coach Matt Egloff. Egloff is in the second year of his second stint with the Sycamore program after previously serving under Dennis Raetz from 1996-98.

Egloff, the team's leading tackler in 1992, returns to the Sycamores after a four-year stint as an assistant football coach at Rose Hulman.

While at RHIT, Egloff spent three seasons as the team's defensive coordinator while also serving as the school's head wrestling and women's golf coach.

Prior to working at RHIT, Egloff served from 1996-98 as an assistant football coach with the Sycamores. In 1996, he was an assistant football coach, strength and conditioning coach and intramural sports coordinator at Butler County Community College.

On the gridiron for the Sycamores, Egloff earned all-Gateway Conference honors in 1994. Egloff also qualified for the ISU Dean's List during his enrollment.

Joining the Indiana State coaching staff and working with the Sycamore tight ends and full backs under offensive coordinator Steve Brickey is veteran coach Bret Ingalls.

Ingalls brings a wealth of experience to ISU as he comes from his alma mater, the University of Idaho. In what was his second stop with the Vandals, Ingalls served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach during the 2000 and 2001 seasons. For the past two seasons, Ingalls worked as the running backs coach at UI.

Prior Gateway Football Conference experience is on his resume as Ingalls spent the 1997-99 seasons at UNI where he was the offensive line coach and offensive coordinator for the Panthers. At UNI, he coached four all-conference players, including Honorable Mention All-American Andy Pattee.

Ingalls spent two years as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at Louisville. He joined the Cardinals staff after spending the 1994 season as offensive line coach at Eastern Michigan, and was promoted to offensive coordinator following the team's seventh game of the year. The Eagles averaged 36.6 points and went 4-0 after Ingalls took over the reigns midyear.

Prior to his stint at EMU, he was running backs coach in 1989 and 1993, offensive line coach from 1990-92 and offensive coordinator from 1992-93 at San Diego State. All-American Marshall Faulk, the nation's leading rusher in 1991 and '92, was tutored by Ingalls. Ingalls is a native of San Diego, Calif., but moved on to Snohomish (Wash.) High School where he earned All-America honors. A multi-sport athlete, he also lettered in basketball and baseball.

ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES

Indiana State University student-athletes have access to one of the finest athletic training programs in the country. Under the guidance of Chairperson Dr. Mitch Cordova, the Athletic Training Department at Indiana State University is currently one of only a handful of institutions nationwide that offers an accredited entry-level athletic training education program, an accredited Master's advanced athletic training program, and Ph.D specialization in sports medicine.

Indiana State University's Baccalaureate and Master's degree programs were the first to be accredited by the National Athletic Trainers' Association (NATA), and have been continuously accredited for over 30 years. Consequently, ISU offers an extremely progressive, contemporary, and high quality health care network to over 375 student-athletes. Athletic Training Services continually seeks to provide all Sycamore student-athletes the best available care in sports medicine. Sport-specific programs are carefully designed and implemented in an effort to prevent, manage, and treat a spectrum of athletic injuries.

Additionally, the staff athletic trainers direct rehabilitation programs that are focused on returning the student-athlete to his/her pre-injury activity level in an efficient and safe manner.

Athletic Training Services is directed by Paul Plummer, LAT, ATC. Mr. Plummer supervises four full-time staff athletic trainers: Lori Vancza, LAT, ATC, Anthony Pass, LAT, ATC, CSCS, Tony Carlton, LAT, ATC, and Amy Reinhart, LAT, ATC, an intern and seven additional graduate assistants. All of the full-time staff, intern and graduate assistants are certified by the NATA – Board of Certification, and Licensed in the State of Indiana to practice athletic training. Together they serve to provide health care services for all ISU student-athletes, as well as serving as clinical instructors for students in the entry-level athletic training education program.

The Athletic Training Department is fortunate to have four physicians assist in

delivering health care to the students-athletes at Indiana State, while also playing a key role in educating athletic training students within the Department. Dr. Tom Klootwyk serves as the Team Orthopedic Surgeon for ISU, and Team Physician for the Indianapolis Colts. His private practice resides at Methodist Sports Medicine Center in Indianapolis. Dr. Pat Kersey and Dr. Jon Stockrahm serve as Team Physicians in Athletic Training Services. Both are trained as Primary Care Physicians with an additional certification in Sports Medicine.

Dr. Kersey practices medicine at Methodist Sports Medicine Center in Indianapolis and Dr. Stockrahm is in private practice in Terre Haute. Additionally, Dr. Dorene Hojnicky plays a vital role in providing care to student-athletes as Medical Director of the Student Health Center at ISU. Furthermore, she serves as the Medical Director for all of the athletic training education programs on campus. Dr. Hojnicky's area of expertise is in emergency medicine. In addition to their clinical affiliation with Indiana State University, Dr. Klootwyk holds the rank of Adjunct Professor, while Dr. Hojnicky holds the rank of Adjunct Associate Professor, and Dr. Kersey and Dr. Stockrahm hold the rank of Adjunct Assistant Professor within the Athletic Training Department.

Together, the staff athletic trainers, physicians and faculty in the Athletic Training Department comprise a comprehensive network of sports medicine professionals that utilizes cutting-edge methods and technology in caring for student-athletes at ISU.



ANTHONY PASS ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER SECOND SEASON

Entering his second year on the Indiana State University Athletic Training Service's staff is Anthony Pass. Pass directs the athletic training services for the Sycamore football program. The Broomfield, Colo., native is an Indiana licensed athletic trainer, nationally certified athletic trainer as well as a certified strength and condition specialist. Pass came to Indiana State University after spending two years in the National Football League.

Pass spent a year as an assistant athletic trainer and strength & conditioning assistant with the Houston Texans. While with the Texans, Pass was a sideline specialist for the Gatorade Sports Science Institute implementing hydration protocols and

monitoring dehydration of players. During the 2001 season, he worked with the Buffalo Bills as a season-long athletic training intern. Prior to that Pass worked at the University of Houston for three years as a graduate assistant athletic trainer under Mike O'Shea, LAT, ATC.

Indiana State's strength and conditioning program is conducted in a state-of-the-art 10,000-square foot facility which is located in University Hall.

The facility, funded by private donations, is divided into three main areas which include free weights and weight machines, movement drills and plyometric training.

Indiana State's strength and conditioning program is an integral part of each player's development. All weight training is coordinated with on-field activities. The program, which includes a speed and movement program, is designed to improve each individual player's speed and overall athletic ability. Injury prevention also plays an important role in the overall program.

Programming for freshmen student-athletes is centered on value clarification, the development of time management skills, sports nutrition for healthy living and top performance, study skills, stress management, and drug and alcohol education.

"Smart Sex: Sexual Responsibility & Student-Athletes" is a workshop offered to sophomore student-athletes to address issues concerning sexual responsibility and safe dating. Campus facilitators are on hand to educate students on the facts concerning sexual assault and assist in the development of healthy dating lifestyles.

The Athletics Media Relations Department conducts a program on "Dealing with the Media" to help student-athletes develop strong media relations skills. Local media personnel come together to allow student-athletes the opportunity to ask questions and learn through mock interviews.

The Senior "Life After Sports" Seminar assists student-athletes to prepare for what lies on the other side; to help them to bridge the gap from college to professional life in the work world. Guest speakers, former Indiana State Student-Athletes who have made successful transitions, return to give student-athletes advice on how to cope with "Life after sports."

SAFE "Sycamore Athletes for Education" is a volunteer community service program in which student-athletes have the opportunity to make a meaningful contribution to the Terre Haute community. Student-Athletes share their time with elementary school children once a week to stress the importance of education through reading.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

UNIVERSITY 101

The Academic Support Program for Athletics has adopted a proactive approach to academics in order to prepare the student-athlete for the many challenges associated with balancing both academics and athletics. Beginning with the Athletic Department Orientation and Study Skills Class (**University 101**), student-athletes are provided with a wealth of information and strategies for success during their first term at Indiana State. The class, teamed with study halls, tutoring, small study groups, and periodic progress monitoring, helps to ensure that each and every student-athlete at Indiana State has the best possible opportunity for both personal and academic success.

University 101 is a course to help students make a successful transition into the University by introducing the concepts and values of a University education, of liberal studies, and of the preparation in the disciplines; by fostering a sense of ideas and people; by developing critical thinking skills as well as academic and personal skills necessary for success; and by providing an introduction to the resources and services of the University.

The Academic Support Program has been able to make continuous gains in the level of academic achievement in the percentage of scholar athletes compiling a 3.0 grade point average or better. This past year at least 60 percent of our student-athletes achieved a 3.0 GPA, earning a spot on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. Coaching staffs, administration, faculty, and the university community have all been very supportive of our efforts as we assist student-athletes working toward that ever important goal of gaining a college degree. Lessons learned through the academic advisement program have proved extremely valuable to several members of the Indiana State football program.

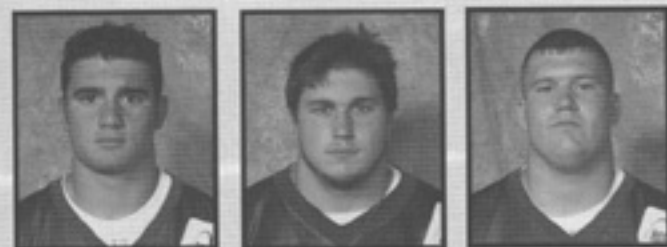

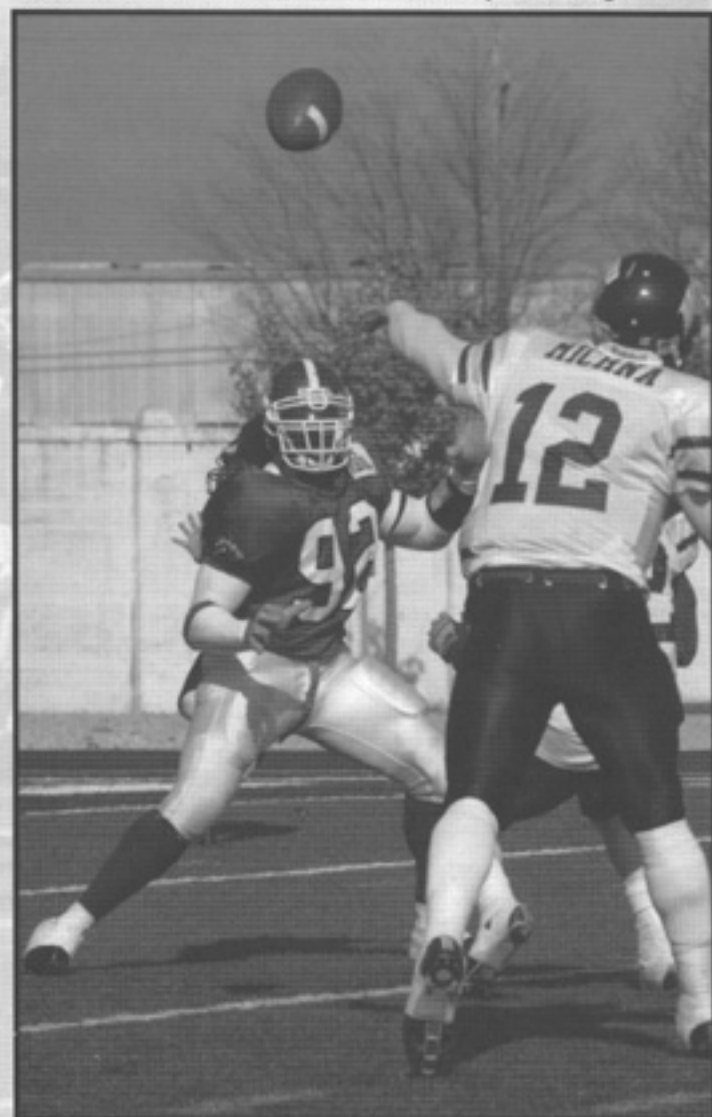

Lloyd W. Benjamin III became the tenth president of Indiana State University on July 1, 2000.

Prior to coming to ISU, President Benjamin served as vice president for academic affairs at Valdosta State University in Valdosta, Georgia, from 1995 to 2000. He was dean of the College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Studies at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock from 1988 to 1995 and dean of the College of Fine Arts, UALR from 1984-1988. He also served as acting dean of the College of Fine Arts and chair of the department of art, UALR, from 1983-1984.

Benjamin graduated from Emory University in 1966 with a bachelor of arts degree in the history of art. In 1973, he earned his Ph.D. in art history from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. His dissertation focused on "The Empathetic Relation of Observer to Image in 15th Century Flemish Painting."

In addition to his duties as university president, Benjamin also serves as president of the ISU Foundation, and serves on the boards of Union Hospital, the Swope Art Museum, the Alliance for Growth and Progress and United Way of the Wabash Valley, as well as for the Indiana Economic Development Council, and the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System.

Dr. Benjamin is married to Wieke van der Weijden, who earned a Ph.D. in biochemistry from Leiden University, The Netherlands. The Benjamins have two grown children: a daughter, Saskia Jansje, and son, Lloyd William.

DIRECTOR OF
ATHLETICS

Certainly no stranger to Indiana State University and Sycamore athletics, Andrea Myers is now in her sixth year as the Director of Athletics, having spent the last 13 years as a vital part of the Indiana State athletics administration. She served as Interim Athletics Director during the 1994-95 academic year as well as from November, 1997 until her current appointment in February, 1999.

Before ascending into the director's role, Myers was the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director. And, as she is known at the University, served as the University's NCAA Compliance Officer, while also overseeing budgetary matters and many of the day-to-day operations of the 15 intercollegiate sports at Indiana State.

She serves on the Missouri Valley Conference Academic/Eligibility and Compliance Committee as well as the Legislative Review Committee. Myers has served as a member of the NCAA's Committee on Committees for Women's Athletics, the NCAA Management Council and currently serves on the NCAA Infractions Committee.

Myers moved into her administrative capacity in April, 1989, after a successful seven-year tenure as Indiana State's women's basketball coach. An Indiana State graduate, Myers led the Sycamores to 40 wins in her final two seasons, including a school-best 22-6 mark in 1988. In that same year, Myers was named Gateway Conference Coach of the Year after ISU posted a 14-4 league mark, also a school-best.

Prior to accepting the head coaching post at ISU, Myers guided the Vincennes University Lady Trailblazers to an impressive 15-year record of 209-95 and several appearances in the NJCAA postseason tournament. She was twice selected the NJCAA Region 12 Coach of the Year and led VU to two national third-place finishes. While at Vincennes, Myers also served as chairperson of HPER.

A native of Dana, Ind., and a graduate of South Vermillion High School, Myers earned both her bachelor's and master's in physical education from ISU. She participated in women's basketball and field hockey and received the Hillman Award as a senior.



DENNIS RAETZ

Dennis Raetz is in his seventh year as Associate Athletics Director. Raetz assumed his current duties in December of 1997, after serving as the Sycamores' head football coach for the previous 18 years.

Raetz handles the athletics department's compliance department, making sure Indiana State is adhering to NCAA, Missouri Valley and Gateway Football Conferences rules and regulations. He also serves as the department's academic liaison, financial aid officer and oversees several sports.

Raetz is the most prolific football coach in Indiana State University history. In 1991, Raetz became the all-time winningest coach in Sycamore history, surpassing the legendary Wally Marks. He finished his 18-year career with 94 victories.

The former "Dean of the Gateway Conference" guided the ISU program to its greatest heights including a No. 1 national ranking during most of the 1984 season and two trips to the NCAA I-AA playoffs. Raetz was named the Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1984 while also garnering Kodak I-AA District Coach of the Year honors.

Raetz has been a fixture at ISU since 1978 when he came to Terre Haute to serve on Dick Jamieson's staff as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. He remained in that position for two seasons before taking over the top job on February 25, 1980.

A native of North Platte, Neb., Raetz attended the University of Nebraska on a football scholarship, but his playing career was cut short by a severe knee injury. Following his college graduation in 1968, he was an assistant coach at North Kansas City High School in Missouri for five seasons before accepting head-coaching responsibilities at J.C. Harmon High School in Kansas City, KS.

In 1977, Raetz joined the University of Missouri coaching staff where he coached the defensive ends in addition to his duties as the junior varsity head coach.

Raetz and his wife Betty reside in nearby Riley, Ind. Their daughter Jaime graduated from the University of Nebraska and is a school teacher in Omaha, Neb. Their son Mark is a 2001 graduate of the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo.

In addition, the University maintains family housing units on a 15-acre site one mile south of the main campus and a 12,764-seat football and athletic facility two miles to the east. The 35-acre river campus located along the Wabash is the site of the University's outstanding baseball program.

The campus is continually changing, with two facilities — the Music Rehearsal Hall and the Technology Center — completed within the last year. The music building features a rotunda lobby with a 175-seat recital hall, rehearsal rooms, teaching studios and an art gallery. The technology structure, with 35 state-of-the-art laboratories and a 100-seat multimedia room, has a sky lit, three-story atrium as its major design feature.

Cunningham Memorial Library houses more than 2 million books, pe-



riodicals, documents and audiovisual and microfilm items; it also is a government depository containing more than 100,000 government documents. The Rare Books and Special Collections section houses the Eugene V. Debs pa-

pers, early Indiana textbooks and one of the largest early dictionary collections in the world. An interlibrary loan service and database searching units also are available.

Hulman Center, completed in 1973, probably is best known as the arena in which basketball star Larry Bird played in during his college career. Its versatility also provides an ideal location for conferences, conventions, concerts, banquets, stage shows and other services.

Hulman Memorial Student Union became the hub of campus upon its completion in 1991. Students gather by the attractive outdoor plaza and its circular fountain. The soothing sounds of cascading water set the tone for the activity that takes place in the renovated nine-story building.

Within its walls, the Dede Activity Center provides meeting space as well as recreational and fitness opportunities, while a variety of retail services and food is available in The Commons, from favorite fast-food franchises and sit-down restaurant to a bookstore, bank and convenience store.

Tilson Auditorium, located in Tiley Hall, houses the Terre Haute Symphony Orchestra and the University's Convocation Series, which brings touring Broadway productions and other entertainment to campus. The former union building also has a recital hall which features weekly concerts by University faculty and students.

The New Theater offers a modern "in-the-round" setting for year-round dramatic presentations. ISU's successful SummerStage program has provided excellent entertainment for more than 30 years. The Dreiser Theater, located in Dreiser Hall, provides a proscenium stage for more tra-

ditional performances.

For more than a century and a quarter, Indiana State has played an important role in Indiana's public service. Today,

ISU makes a number of contributions to economic development locally, regionally and nationally.

The Technology Services Center in the School of Technology contracts with small and medium-sized manufacturing companies to facilitate technology transfer to increase productivity and improve competitiveness. The Center for Research and Management Services in the School of Business contracts with businesses throughout Indiana to pro-

vide targeted industry studies, applied research, consultation and training. A Small Business Development Center is part of the larger center.

The Interdisciplinary Center for Cell Products and Technology focuses on areas concerned directly with biotechnology, its commercialization and its social and ethical implications.

Also on campus is the Indiana Institute on Recycling, the country's first state-created institute charged with developing effective voluntary recycling programs.

ATHLETICS HISTORY & TRADITION

The ISU Athletic Tradition is rich and full of spectacular moments from John Wooden's great basketball teams of the late 1940s to Bruce Baumgartner's Olympic wrestling heroics of the 1980s. And don't forget Larry Bird! These three names along with hundreds of others have helped form the memorable tradition of Sycamore Athletics.

Most recently, the men's basketball team has captured consecutive Missouri Valley Conference championships and made back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances, the men's tennis team has won three straight MVC Championships while both the men's and women's track and field programs can also claim Valley Championships.

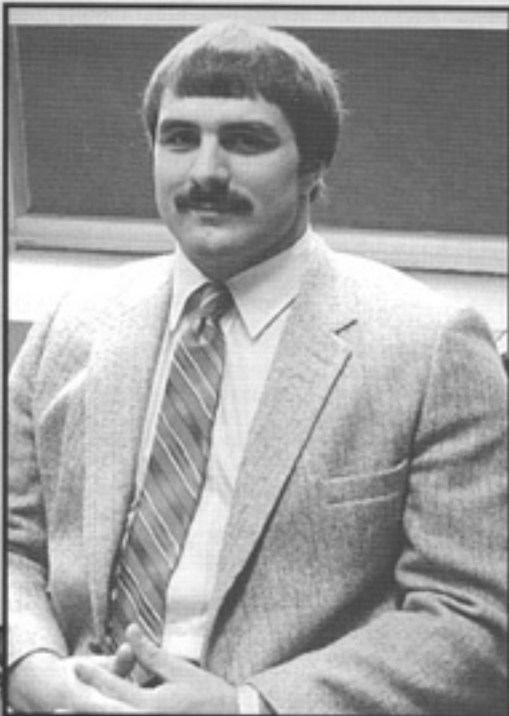
This Sycamores' winning tradition is most evident as they march into the 21st century. But it's also a deep-rooted heritage.

The origins of the athletic department at ISU can be traced back to the turn of the century when the school was called Indiana State Normal School. Arthur Westphal (1912-17) and Birch E. Bayh (1917-23) have been given the majority of credit for establishing the administrative framework for athletic programs at ISU to emerge competitively on the in-

tercollegiate level. Arthur Strum was appointed head of the Men's Physical Training Department as well as "Coach" and Director of Athletics in 1923. His charge was to establish intercollegiate teams in football, basketball, baseball and track. Men's tennis, golf and a women's varsity basketball program were introduced at this time as well.

From these modest beginnings, the athletic program has grown to what we know it as today—an NCAA Division I program offering programs in men's and women's basketball, football, baseball, softball, volleyball, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's cross country, and men's and women's indoor/outdoor track and field.

about in Sycamore athletic lore. But that year offered more than Larry Bird's march to the Final Four and eventual runner-up finish in the NCAA basketball tournament. The Sycamores also boasted the leading hitter in Division I baseball in Wally Johnson. The Sycamore football team posted an 8-3 record, and Kurt Thomas was ranked Number 1 in the world among male gymnasts.

The early 1980s brought about heavyweight Bruce Baumgartner's reign as the number-one heavyweight wrestler in the country. The Sycamore baseball program was churning out pro prospects such as pitcher Zane Smith. The football program recorded consecutive trips to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs and a number-one regular season ranking in 1984.

The Sycamores have won one team championship and 20 individual titles. The breakdown on the individual titles shows 14 championships for the men and six titles won by the women.

SEASON IN REVIEW

The 2003 season promised to be one of excitement from the youthfulness of the team to the demanding schedule that featured a season opening contest at Ball State and a historic battle with Indiana at Bloomington's Memorial Stadium. Last year's edition of the Sycamores did not disappoint despite a 3-9 record and 0-7 mark in the Gateway Conference.

After falling 31-7 in the first-ever night contest at Ball State Stadium before a record crowd of more than 23,000, ISU opened the home season with a thrilling 13-10 win over Florida International. Two key defensive stops in the fourth quarter held onto a lead provided by the 213 rushing yards accumulated by Jake Shields — the fourth-most prolific rushing day ever by a Sycamore.

Indiana State played on a Big 10 Field for the first time in several seasons as they contested the Indiana Hoosiers in the first game between the two schools since 1925. While the Hoosiers took the contest 33-3, ISU gained valuable experience and exposure throughout game week and gameday before over 30,000 fans at Memorial Stadium.

The road show continued the next week as Shields led a march down the field on the Sycamores' first drive of the game against Murray State en route to a 17-10 win over the Racers. The Sycamore defense once again stood tall in the fourth quarter with a dramatic fumble recovery allowing ISU to run out the clock to preserve the win.

The Sycamores would move past .500 for the first time since the 1998 season with a 23-7 home win over Eastern Illinois. ISU used a potent passing attack and three interceptions on defense to take their first win over the Panthers since the 1993 season to move to 3-2 on the year.

Unfortunately as the injuries and level of competition began to rise, the Sycamores would not

win again during the season. At UNI, a 72-yard interception return for a touchdown by Kyle Mitchell ignited a furious comeback for the Sycamores as they possessed the ball first-and-goal at the Panther two-yard line following a defensive pass interference infraction. On the next play, the ball was intercepted to end the threat and give the Panthers a tight 22-14 victory.

Indiana State also took Youngstown State down the wire at home falling in overtime, 30-24. With ISU ahead 24-21 with just over two minutes remaining, the Penguins were able to connect on a lengthy field goal to tie the contest. After Jake Schiff fumbled at the three-yard line on the first play of overtime, it took just two plays for the visitors to find the endzone and the win.

After a homecoming loss to Western Kentucky which saw the loss of starting quarterback Jake Schiff for the remainder of the season to a broken collarbone, and a defeat at the hands of SMS on the road, ISU played its best game of the year against visiting Western Illinois in a game televised by Fox Sports Net.

With Phillip Johnson entrenched as the starting quarterback, ISU jumped out to a quick 21-0 lead over the Leathernecks in the game's opening quarter. Johnson would account for three touchdowns on the day, including two by rushes, but a Lee Russell fumble recovery and return for a touchdown put WIU up 34-28 to stay late in the game to cap a dramatic comeback. With over half of the opening day lineup on the injured list heading into the finale at Illinois State, ISU fell 38-3 to the Redbirds to close the season.

Ryan King and Kyle Mitchell were named to the All-Gateway Football Conference First Team upon the conclusion of the season. Matt Beste, Pat Jordan and Stuart Williams capped strong campaigns by being named to the GFC's Honorable Mention list.

In the off-season for the second straight year, the Sycamores had one athlete sign a professional contract. Offensive lineman Matt Griebel inked a free agent deal with the NFL's Indianapolis Colts and participated in the team's mini-camp held earlier this spring. Griebel joins Richard Harris — who signed with the Tennessee Titans in 2003.

GAME ONE: BALL STATE 31 INDIANA STATE 7 August 28, 2003 Ball State Stadium

The Indiana State Sycamores (0-1) dropped a tough 31-7 decision to the homestanding Ball State Cardinals (1-0) in front of the largest crowd to ever witness a game at Ball State Stadium of 23,549 on Thursday night. The contest was the first ever night game in the 36-year history of the stadium.

The two teams went toe-to-toe in a defensive struggle early on until the Sycamores gave the Cardinals a golden opportunity on a high snap of

a punt attempt as the first quarter was winding down. A snap over Pat Jordan's head gave BSU possession at the ISU 33 where it took three plays to punch the ball into the end zone on a one-yard run by Scott Blair with twenty seconds showing on the clock. The extra point failed giving Ball State the early 6-0 lead.

Indiana State would not go quietly as they took the ball at their own 38 with 1:32 showing on the clock and moved to within field goal range with five seconds left. Freshman Kyle Hooper missed wide right as time expired to send the Sycamores into the lockerroom down 15-0.

ISU came out with a new head of steam in the third quarter, starting a drive on their own 20. Led by the strong rushing of Jake Shields, ISU was able to move the ball the entire 80 yards in 17 plays that took over nine minutes off the clock. Shields did the honors from three yards out, to cut the Ball State lead to 15-7.

In his first ever collegiate contest, Schiff was 14 of 25 passing for 70 yards with two interceptions. Shields led the Sycamores in rushing with 127 yards on 33 carries, including a long of 26 yards and the lone touchdown of the evening. Schiff also showed some ability to run with 10 attempts that netted 14 yards, including a long of 16 yards.

Through the air, the Sycamores big target was senior Ryan King who brought down four balls for 14 yards. Jordan averaged 39.2 yards per punt on the evening, including a long of 44 and four of his five kicks were downed inside the Ball State 20-yard line.

GAME TWO: INDIANA STATE 13 FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL 10 September 6, 2003 Memorial Stadium

The Indiana State Sycamore football team (1-1), led by the rushing of junior Jake Shields and his 213 yards — the fourth-best single game rushing mark in school history — amassed 366 yards of total offense against the Florida International Panthers en route to a 13-10 win at Memorial Stadium.

Shields got off to a slow start gaining just eight yards on seven rushes at the end of the first quarter, but a 51-yard rush that set up a Kyle Hooper 25-yard field goal, and a 63-yard scamper that helped pin FIU deep in their own territory with time winding down put an exclamation point on Shields record breaking day. Shields' 213 yards are the first 200-yard rushing day by a Sycamore since Julian Reese's 207-yard day against Southern Illinois in 2001.

The Sycamores began their first scoring drive of the day with seven straight running plays to either Kris Karagory or Shields. Then it was time for freshman Jake Schiff to take over as he completed three straight passes, the third of which was his first collegiate touchdown — a 24-yard pass to the right corner of the end zone to Matt Beste — boosting ISU to a quick 7-0 lead.

ISU then came back with the score tied 7-7 on the ensuing possession to put together a 10-play, 56-yard drive which took up 5:13 and was capped by a 32-yard field goal by Hooper with 37 seconds showing on the clock, sending the two teams into the lockerroom with ISU up 10-7.

The Sycamores tacked on their final three points with 4:21 remaining in the third quarter on a Hooper 25-yard field goal that was spurred by Shields' 51-yard rush. After Hooper's make, ISU stood tall with a 13-7 lead.

After turning the ball over on downs on their last possession of the game, the ISU defense had no problem holding FIU for the final 1:02 of the game to seal the 13-10 victory.

GAME THREE: INDIANA 33 INDIANA STATE 3 September 13, 2003 Memorial Stadium

It was the first time since 1925 that both Indiana and Indiana State put their teams on the same gridiron and while ISU was able to hold their own against their in-state and BIG 10 Conference foe for some of the game, the Indiana offense and special teams proved too mighty for the visiting Sycamores. ISU (1-2) attempted to hold Indiana (1-2) down, but crucial errors continued to haunt ISU as they took a 33-3 loss to the Hoosiers in the first night game at Memorial Stadium in almost four seasons.

ISU's lone score of the evening came on a 36-yard field goal late in the first quarter that edged the Sycamores back to within six points at 9-3.

After falling behind 23-3 heading into the half, the Sycamores came out and started to move the ball down the field as Thomas Plummer received his first game action as a Sycamore and promptly helped move the ball down to the Hoosier one-yard line. On the final play of the drive, Plummer fumbled while trying to reach for the endzone and the Hoosiers were able to recover to stop the scoring threat.

ISU held until the Hoosiers' Bryan Roberston connected on a 21-yard field goal with 2:26 left in the third quarter to push the lead to 26-3. The final score of the game came on a Green-Ellis 11-yard rush that capped an eight-play, 58-yard drive with 3:52 left to put the score out of reach at 33-3.

The Sycamores were led by Jake Shields, who carried 15 times for 58 yards, and Jake Schiff, who completed 16 of 22 passes for 179 yards.

GAME FOUR: INDIANA STATE 17 MURRAY STATE 10 September 20, 2003 Roy Stewart Stadium

Jake Shields rushed for 196 yards on 24 carries and scored one touchdown as Indiana State rallied with 10 points in the fourth quarter to beat Murray State 17-10.

Ron Lane carried the ball 11 times for 72 yards for Murray State (1-3). He also had two kick returns for 37 yards.

Indiana State (2-2) went ahead of the Racers 14-10 when Kris Karagory scored on a 6-yard touchdown run early in the final quarter.

With nine minutes to go, Kyle Hooper's field goal put ISU ahead 17-10.

The Sycamores secured the win when they recovered a Murray State fumble with 2:16 remaining in the game.

Indiana State had 341 yards of total offense with 221 yards on the ground. Quarterback Jake Schiff completed 11-of-15 passes for 120 yards.

"Our team came together tonight in a tough

environment and pulled out a win against a team that has a lot of tradition in a stadium that has a lot of tradition," head coach Tim McGuire said. "Both teams really fought hard tonight and we made some big plays down the stretch that helped us win."

Murray State's Stewart Childress was 9-of-17 for 74 passing yards.

Greg Blake recovered an Indiana State fumble about 15 seconds into the second quarter to set up an offensive drive for the Racers. Oscar Walker scored on a 2-yard run two minutes later and Jesse Ohliger's kick tied the game at 7-7. Murray State led 10-7 at halftime after Ohliger kicked a 23-yard field goal with 46 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

In the first quarter, the Sycamores scored on their opening drive. Shields scored on a 15-yard touchdown run about two and one-half minutes into the game. With Hooper's extra point, Indiana State led 7-0.

GAME FIVE: INDIANA STATE 23 EASTERN ILLINOIS 7 September 27, 2003 Memorial Stadium

The Eastern Illinois Panthers (1-3) keyed on the NCAA's leading rusher Jake Shields, but he still managed to gain 77 yards on the ground with a touchdown as Indiana State defeated the Panthers for the first time since 1993 with a 23-7 victory at Memorial Stadium. With the win, ISU moves to 3-2 on the season, their first winning record since they were 4-3 after defeating Southern Illinois in 1998.

ISU's first score of the game came by virtue of a muffed punt snap by Eastern Illinois six minutes into the contest. ISU was able to only move the ball seven yards over five plays but a 31 yard field goal by Kyle Hooper gave the Sycamores a 3-0 lead with 8:32 left in the first period.

ISU's next score was set up by a Jamal Brown interception of a Vincent pass early in the second quarter in which Brown returned the ball down to the Eastern 15-yard line. Shields dashed through the Panther defense on four straight plays, with the final one, a three-yard scamper over the left side to give the Sycamores a 10-0 lead with 11:40 remaining before the half.

The Sycamores would not go quietly as freshman Kyle James picked off a Harris pass — James' second interception of the season. The Sycamores' hit their longest touchdown pass of the year, a 34-yarder from Jake Schiff to Sam Logan, to put ISU up 17-0 with 8:48 left.

Shields led ISU in rushing with 77 yards and a touchdown while Schiff was 15 of 26 with one interception and a touchdown pass. Logan caught a career-high five balls for 104 yards and a touch-

down while Hooper was a perfect three of three on field goal attempts.

GAME SIX: SOUTHERN ILLINOIS 37 INDIANA STATE 14 October 4, 2003 Memorial Stadium

The Indiana State Sycamores (3-3, 0-1 Gateway) fell behind Southern Illinois (5-0, 1-0 Gateway) by a score of 20-0 after some early miscues, and the Salukis were able to squash a Sycamore comeback attempt in the second half as they took a 37-14 win over Indiana State in the Gateway opener for both schools.

SIU broke though first when Chris Kupec caught a seven-yard pass from Joel Sambursky with 12:39 left in the first quarter on a drive that was set up by a Jake Shields fumble on the first play from scrimmage. A Jake Schiff interception on ISU's next possession, gave the Salukis the ball at their own 49 and it took them six plays to move the ball 51 yards as they scored on a 41-yard pass from Sambursky to Brent Little to push the advantage to 14-0.

The Salukis next possession was a marthon drive that went 13 plays for 69 yards and ended with a Sambursky one-yard run on a bootleg play. The drive was delayed for over 20 minutes as umpire Richard Zerr was knocked out on the field and had to be taken off the field via a stretcher. After the drive was over, SIU took a 20-0 lead. The Salukis tacked on three more points on a 32-yard Craig Coffin field goal before the Sycamores took the ball for the final possession of the half.

ISU was aided in that drive by a defensive pass interference penalty and a personal foul by the Salukis that set up a Schiff to Ryan King 29-yard pass to inch ISU back into the game at 23-7 heading into the half.

Indiana State would not go away as they took

the ball down the field on seven plays for 80 yards with Jake Shields churning out the yards and scoring on a 17 yard play with 4:12 left in the third quarter.

GAME SEVEN:
UNI 22
INDIANA STATE 14
October 11, 2003
UNI Dome

For the first two and a half quarters of Indiana State's dual with Northern Iowa the Sycamores could not get anything going against the homestanding Panthers until sophomore defensive end Kyle Mitchell returned an intercepted pass 72-yards for a touchdown. Indiana State fell to 3-4 (0-2 Gateway) on the season with the 22-14 loss to UNI before 14,018 fans at the UNI Dome.

UNI out-rushed ISU 166-48 as well as dominating the passing game by completing 13 passes for 156 yards compared to ISU's seven completed passes for 94 yards. The defense was critical in the game for the Panthers - only allowing the Sycamores one third-down conversion out of 11 tries.

Midway through the fourth quarter, the Sycamores defense was trying to stall another UNI drive when Mitchell again came up with a big turnover. Following a Petrie fumble, Mitchell recovered at the UNI 41, giving the Sycamores a chance to stage a comeback.

It took just three plays for Sidney Montfort to scamper in from eight yards out, moving ISU closer with a 22-14 score.

It took two series of downs for ISU to stop UNI, but they got the ball back at their own 15-yard line with 2:46 remaining in the game. Schiff completed a pass for 12 yards to Carl Berman then completed a nine-yard pass to Sam Logan to move the ball to the ISU 40 yard line. Facing a fourth and one situation, Montfort got just enough to keep the drive alive. Following an

incomplete pass, Schiff hit Scott Penick in stride as he raced down to the Northern Iowa 25-yard line, setting up a chance to tie the contest.

Schiff then threw to Chris Lewis for a nine-yard gain before heaving a ball into the endzone intended for Ryan King. The ball was incomplete but the Panthers were flagged for pass interference, giving the Sycamores a first and goal at the UNI two-yard line. On the next play, Schiff's pass into the right corner of the endzone was intercepted by Dokes with 51 seconds left in the game.

GAME EIGHT:
YOUNGSTOWN STATE 30
INDIANA STATE 24 (OVERTIME)
October 18, 2003
Memorial Stadium

Having never beaten Youngstown State at Memorial Stadium, the Sycamores had the Penguins on the rope, up 24-14 in the fourth quarter, but a 10-point rally forced overtime and Youngstown State needed two Josh Cayson runs to stun the homestanding Sycamores 30-24 in overtime. The loss dropped ISU to 3-5 (0-3 Gateway) while Youngstown State moved to 5-3 (2-1 Gateway). The ISU defense came out strong and forced the Penguins to punt, but Carl Berman fumbled the return when Youngstown State recovered the ball at the ISU 27. From there, it took just five plays and 1:53 for Matt Rycraft to punch in the ball from six-yards out with 10:57 left in the first quarter, giving YSU a 7-0 lead.

Following a Sycamore defensive stop midway through the second quarter, a Joe Bishop punt was blocked by Terrence Miles and the ball bounded through the endzone for a safety, making the score 7-2 in favor of YSU. After the ensuing free kick, the Sycamores put together their most complete drive of the day, starting from their own 21-yard line. With Sidney Montfort carrying the weight of the offense on his shoulders, he led the seven-play, 79-yard drive that took up 4:19 to move ISU ahead 8-7. A pass from Jake Schiff to Sam Logan was good for the two-point conversion, giving them a 10-7 lead. Youngstown State came out roaring to open the second half and intercepted a Schiff pass deep in ISU territory, giving them the ball at the Sycamore 14-yard line. After an offside penalty, Cayson scored from nine-yard line to move YSU up 14-10 with 14:05 left in the third. ISU answered back with an 11-play, 83-yard drive that took up 5:17 of the clock, culminating with a one-yard run by Montfort on third and goal, to move ISU back ahead 17-14. ISU then took the ball in the fourth quarter and scored on a pass from Schiff to Steve Daniel with 7:31 left in the game, moving ISU up 24-14. After a kickoff, the Penguins took the ball at their own 46 and marched 54 yards to the endzone, culminating with a Phillip Lamon 30-yard touchdown pass with 5:39 left in the game. Then Nick Terrancina nailed a 42-yarder to tie the game at 24.

The Sycamores made the most of the game's remaining time, moving the ball down to the YSU 25-yard line where Kyle Hooper missed a 42-yarder wide right as time expired.

ISU took the ball first in the overtime and Schiff scrambled to the YSU three yard line where he fumbled and the Penguins recovered to end the Sycamores' offensive series. From there Cayson made a 10-yard run, then the game-winning 15-yard rush to give YSU a 30-24 victory. Schiff completed 18 of 27 passes for 216

yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. Montfort was a workhorse for ISU as he gained a game-high 129 yards with a touchdown while Schiff gained 93 yards himself on the ground. Carl Berman was the Sycamores leading receiver with four catches for 38 yards, while Ryan King continued his strong season with three catches for 60 yards and a touchdown.

GAME NINE:
WESTERN KENTUCKY 59
INDIANA STATE 14
October 25, 2003
Memorial Stadium

The Indiana State Sycamores (3-6, 0-4 Gateway) punted on their first two possessions of the game, while Western Kentucky scored touchdowns on their first six drives as they raced out to a 42-0 halftime lead leaving a Homecoming crowd of 3,708 fans stunned en route to a 59-14 Hilltopper victory, the worst Sycamore home loss in school history.

ISU was able to scratch back into the contest early in the third quarter as Phillip Johnson - taking over for injured Jake Schiff - directed a four-play, six-yard drive that ended with Johnson going over the top of the pile for a one-yard touchdown run and to move within 42-7 with 10:03 left in the quarter. The ISU scoring drive was set up by the second of two Western Kentucky fumbles to open the second half.

After the Hilltoppers responded with 17 points of their own, Johnson found paydirt again as he scampered 20 yards to end a four-play, 56-yard drive to give the final margin, a 59-14 loss to WKU.

ISU was paced by Sidney Montfort, who gained 63 yards on 15 carries. Sophomore Andre Forte saw his first collegiate action as he gained 49 yards on eight carries.

Receiving, Ryan King caught three passes for a team-high 44 yards while Sam Logan also caught three to gain 24 yards.

The Sycamores gave up two one hundred yard rushers for the first time since the 2001 season, as WKU's Tony West gained 149 yards and Lerron Moore gained 148 en route to a total of 443 yards on the ground, and 561 yards of total offense.

The loss was costly for the Sycamores, as Schiff left the game in the third quarter with a shoulder injury as did Kris Karagory. Defensive tackle Tom Brillhart was also injured as a twisted ankle forced him to leave the game in the second period.

GAME TEN:
SMS 45
INDIANA STATE 10
November 1, 2003
Plaster Field

With turnovers and mistakes in the kicking game costing the Sycamores during its four-game losing streak, it seemed that it was going to be a different day as they took advantage of three Southwest Missouri St. turnovers and a muffed punt early to race out to a 10-0 lead. The tide turned in the second quarter when ISU began to give up big plays to the SMS defense and special teams units as the Bears claimed a 45-10 win over the Sycamores on an overcast afternoon at Plaster Field. With the loss, ISU dropped to 3-7 overall and 0-5 in the Gateway while SMS moved to 4-5 overall and 1-4 in conference play.

SEASON IN REVIEW

The Sycamores were able to open the scoring on a career-best 39-yard field goal by freshman Kyle Hooper with 5:28 left in the first quarter as ISU took a 3-0 lead. The short 23-yard drive was set up by a Cody Pratt fumble that was recovered by Larry Thompson at the SMS 45-yard line.

With time winding down in the first quarter the Sycamore defense struck again as Pratt fumbled for a second time, this one at the 50-yard line, setting up the Sycamores with a short field. On fourth and short at the SMS 42-yard line quarterback Phillip Johnson was stopped short of the first down giving the ball back to the Bears. It would not hurt as the Sycamore defense came right back to stop the SMS offense and force a punt.

With the ball on their own 41-yard line, following a punt and an SMS personal foul, the ISU offense was stopped, but a 41-yard Pat Jordan punt was muffed on the return and the ball shot into the endzone where senior Ben Thompkins fell onto the ball for his first career touchdown and a 10-0 lead after the Hooper extra point with 11:19 left in the first half.

GAME ELEVEN: WESTERN ILLINOIS 34 INDIANA STATE 28 November 8, 2003 Memorial Stadium

It was a tale of two halves for the Sycamores (3-8, 0-6 Gateway) as they took a 28-17 lead into the halftime locker room before giving up 17 unanswered points to Western Illinois (7-3, 4-2 Gateway) en route to a 34-28 Leatherneck victory on senior day at Memorial Stadium in front of 2,001 fans.

The first score was set up on a bit of trickery for the Sycamores as Chris Lewis hit Carl Berman on a reverse pass on the first play from scrimmage to put the ball down into Western Illinois territory. Quarterback Phillip Johnson hit Ryan King for a big gainer on second down to move the ball within the Leatherneck 10-yard line where Johnson's one-yard scamper gave ISU the early 7-0 lead with 12:28 to go in the first quarter. The run netted Johnson his third rushing score of the season.

The highly active first quarter continued on as ISU's Johnson connected with Scott Penick for a 75-yard touchdown strike – the longest play from scrimmage of the season – to tie the game up at 14 as the first quarter expired.

The Sycamores took the ball in later portions of the second quarter and put together a five-play, 52-yard drive that ended with Johnson connecting to Sam Logan for his second touchdown pass of the day to move ISU up 21-17. The drive was extended when Pat Jordan was roughed on a punt attempt to give the Sycamores a first and ten.

ISU's defense forced a Leatherneck punt and the Sycamore rush blocked the punt attempt, giving the Sycamores the ball at the WIU 30-yard line. It took just four plays for Johnson to find Ryan King on an eight-yard touchdown pass – his third of the day – to move ISU out to a 28-17 lead heading into halftime.

The final score was forced by the Western Illinois defense when Lee Russell forced a Kris Karagory fumble and Wyatt Green took the fumble back 22 yards for a touchdown to move WIU up 34-28 at the end of the third quarter.

ISU received a golden opportunity when WIU

fumbled a punt return and King pounced on the ball at the Leatherneck 22 yard line, giving the Sycamores a short field down only six points. ISU's Kyle Hooper was unable to connect on a 36 yard field goal attempt as it sailed wide right to end the ISU threat.

GAME TWELVE: ILLINOIS STATE 38 INDIANA STATE 3 November 15, 2003 Hancock Stadium

The Indiana State Sycamores (3-9, 0-7 Gateway) ended their 2003 season with a disappointing 38-3 loss to conference rival Illinois State (6-6, 3-4 Gateway) on a rainy Saturday afternoon in front of 5,491 fans at Hancock Field. Indiana State's Kris Karagory took advantage of a starting opportunity to record his first 100-yard rushing game of the season, finishing with 132 on the ground.

After going three and out on their first offensive series, the Sycamores allowed the Redbirds to drive down to the ISU four yard line, where redshirt freshman Rashawn Champion recorded his second interception of the season and was ruled down in the endzone for a touchback.

On the ensuing play from scrimmage, Sycamore quarterback Phillip Johnson threw an interception of his own as Redbird senior Cercne Colvin made a pick to give Illinois State the ball in Sycamore territory. The Indiana State defense stood tall once again allowing the Redbirds to drive to the five-yard line where Stephen Carroll drilled a 22-yard field goal to cap an eight-play, 28-yard drive that covered 3:07 to give the Redbirds a 3-0 lead with 7:00 left in the first quarter.

It appeared that the Sycamores would fall further down to the Redbirds but Russell Coleman forced a Mike Souza fumble and recovered it himself with the final minute of the first quarter to give ISU possession at its own 21-yard line.

After a punt gave Illinois State possession near midfield, the Redbirds were able to find the endzone for the first time of the game when Souza found Dwayne Smith for a seven-yard touchdown, his sixth of the season. The play capped a five-play, 52-yard drive that took up 1:05 of the clock and made the score 10-0 Illinois State with 8:42 left in the first half.

Indiana State's second field goal attempt of the game was good as freshman Kyle Hooper connected on a 34-yard field goal with 2:50 left before the break to move ISU closer to the Redbirds at 10-3. The scoring drive covered 64 yards in eight plays and took up 3 minutes of the clock.

The Redbirds looked poised to move the ball down the field as time wound down in the first half. Their efforts were helped by two Indiana State facemask penalties that moved the ball down the field. But a Kyle Mitchell sack, his eighth of the season, and an open field tackle by Kevin McDavid on third and four as Illinois State inched inside Sycamore territory forced the Redbird punt were the Sycamores ran out the first half clock. Illinois State went into the locker room with a 10-3 lead over the Sycamores.

Illinois State came out of the gate strong in the second half as Sha-Ron Edwards punched the ball in from two yards out to cap a nine-play, 73-yard drive that took up 3:22 of the clock. With the score, Illinois State upped its lead to 17-3 with 11:32 left in the third quarter.

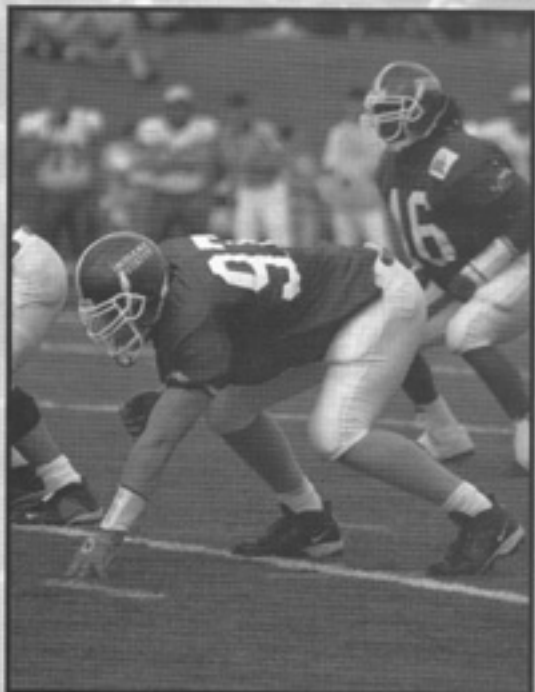
Indiana State came right back with a drive of their own including a 26-yard scamper by Karagory in which he eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark for the first time. The drive ended at the Illinois State 33-yard line where Kyle Hooper came in and attempted a 49-yard field goal which was short.

The missed field goal gave the Redbirds good field position and a long pass from Souza to Smith helped move the ball down the field where Edwards scored his second touchdown of the day – a 22-yard run – to give Illinois State a 24-3 lead with 7:52 left in the third quarter. The Redbird scoring drive was a quick three-play, 67-yard drive that took up one minute and five seconds.

The Redbirds tacked on another seven points when Josh Chrestman sacked Johnson and forced a fumble where Andrew Papocchia scooped up the ball and ran it back 18 yards for a touchdown to give Illinois State a 31-3 lead with 25 seconds left in the third stanza. It was the second week in a row that a Sycamore fumble was picked up and returned for a touchdown.

Souza went on to complete a 29-yard touchdown pass to tight end Mike Larson with 11:32 left in the game to stretch the Redbird advantage to 38-3.

Indiana State's Champion came down with his second interception of the game, his third of the season with 6:48 left in the game to give the Sycamores another possession.



Tom Brillhart had four sacks and started 11 games in 2003.

2004 SEASON OPPONENTS IN BOLD

THIS IS THE GATEWAY CONFERENCE ...

The Gateway Football Conference enters its 20th season in 2004, and the league will be hard-pressed to duplicate the success of 2003. Four teams represented the league in the 16-team NCAA I-AA playoffs, marking the first time any league has sent that many to the playoffs in the same year in the 26-year history of I-AA postseason.

All signs, however, point to continued national prominence for a league entering its 20th anniversary season.

The Gateway Conference has two recent national championships (Western Kentucky - 2002; Youngstown State - 1997), and Gateway members YSU (3) and Southern Illinois (1) own additional titles prior to Gateway membership, meaning six I-AA championship trophies are housed on Gateway campuses, in addition to two (both by Youngstown State) second-place awards. Only four I-AA leagues possess more than a single I-AA championship trophy, and the Gateway Conference is among that elite.

In recent years, the Gateway has established itself as a leader among Division I-AA conferences. During the past seven years, the league has two national championships, and four other semifinal trips. The Gateway's 22-14 playoff mark and 22 playoff wins in that span is second only to the Southern Conference (25-14), and the Gateway has had three teams reach the title game, topped only by the Southern Conference's four championship game appearances since 1997.

Additionally, the Gateway's 16 playoff berths in the past seven years matches the Atlantic-10 and Southern Conference for I-AA supremacy, and the Gateway has had two representatives each of the past nine seasons. In addition, the Gateway is the only I-AA conference to have each of its members make the playoffs.

The Gateway's success is not limited to the immediate past. During the decade of the 1990s, current members of the Gateway compiled a 34-19 mark in the I-AA playoffs, bettered only by the Southern Conference, whose members were 37-19 in that decade.

Last year, the league was an impressive 28-14 against non-conference teams, which included a 16-6 record against I-AA teams. All six of those losses came against teams that advanced to the I-AA quarterfinals, and four of the six I-AA losses came during the playoffs. The GFC went 7-1 against the Top 25 last year. In addition, Western Illinois claimed the league's 24th win vs. a I-A program as WIU beat Eastern Michigan. Of the league's 14 non-league losses in 2003, eight were to I-A teams.

Team accomplishments have helped solidify the Gateway as a I-AA elite, but individuals at the league's member institutions are the real source of pride within the conference. Last year, five Gateway student-athletes were finalists for the I-AA's top awards, while more than a dozen Gateway players earned All-America honors.

In addition, SIU's Jerry Kill and UNI's Mark Farley were finalists for the Eddie Robinson Award, given to the nation's top I-AA football mentor. Thanks to strong coaching, the Gateway has reached and will maintain its place among the I-AA best.

During the past eight seasons, the Gateway has compiled a 193-121 record in non-conference games. Of the 121 losses, 96 came against ranked I-AA or I-A opponents. Said another way: Only 25 times in those 314 games did a Gateway Conference team lose to a non-ranked I-AA team or to a non-I-A team. Notably, the Gateway Conference has posted 48 wins against top-25 I-AA teams in the past eight years alone.

Last year, despite tough scheduling, four teams in the Gateway Conference had winning records, matching an all-time high. The Gateway has had four teams with better than .500 records in the same season 10 times now, including the past six seasons. In fact, the 2003 season marked the first time that four Gateway teams had won eight games during the same season (each of those four won nine games last year).

In 1997, Youngstown State grabbed the crowned jewel for the Gateway, as the league had one of its most successful seasons. In addition to claiming the league's first national title, Youngstown State finished the year ranked No. 1, marking the first time a league member has held that spot in a season-ending poll. Western Illinois ended the season at No. 6, marking the first time the Gateway ended the year with two teams ranked among the top six.

In 1999, the Gateway trumped that, as YSU finished the year No. 2, and Illinois State was No. 3. UNI, too, finished in the top 20 in both the Teamlink.com (17) and Sports Network (15) final polls.

In 2002, Western Kentucky added to the league's national championship trophy case with a 2002 I-AA crown, while both WKU (No. 1) and WIU (No. 5) finished among the nation's top five in the season-ending polls.

THIS IS THE GATEWAY CONFERENCE ...

On the subject of national polls, the Gateway has had two teams ranked among the Top 10 in the same poll 77 times (including 14 times last year) with 76 of the 77 coming post-1996. In 1999, five Gateway teams (Illinois State, UNI, Southern Illinois, Western Illinois, and Youngstown State) were ranked in the same poll for the first time in league history. Prior to the Sept. 20, 1999, poll, the Gateway had never had five teams ranked in the Top 25 during the same week.

In all, five Gateway teams have been ranked among the national Top 25 during the same week three times in league history, including Oct. 14, 2002; Sept. 3, 2001; and Sept. 20, 1999.

In the Sept. 22, 2003, and Sept. 29, 2003, top-25 polls, four Gateway teams were ranked, and four more Gateway teams were receiving votes — meaning all eight teams in the league were receiving votes or were ranked. The last time that happened was Sept. 6, 1999, but no I-AA league (including the Gateway) has had that happen that late in a season (Sept. 29).

Four Gateway teams were in the Top 15 of the ESPN/USA Today Coaches top-25 rankings of Oct. 1, 2001 (Youngstown State-5; Western Kentucky-11; Western Illinois-14; and UNI-15). That marked the first time in league history that four league teams were in the Top 15 the same week. Those four schools were each ranked in the Top 15 in the Sports Network and/or ESPN coaches polls of Oct. 1, Oct. 8, and Oct. 15, giving the league four top-15 teams for three-straight weeks.

A minimum of four Gateway teams have been ranked in the same top-25 poll 39 times in league history, including a league-record 11 times in 2003.

And last year, all four playoff teams (UNI, SIU, WIU, and WKU) represented the Gateway Conference in the Top 10 in the final national rankings — marking the first time that's ever happened in the league's 19-year history. Including the season-ending poll, those four teams represented the Gateway in same-week top-10 polls a total of five times.

Certainly, the Gateway will be hard-pressed to continue its non-conference success, particularly because the league schedules tough opponents year after year.

Tough scheduling is not an aberration for the Gateway. Last year, five schools had five or more games against top-25 I-AA foes, and all eight league schools played at least four ranked teams; while seven played at least one I-A opponent. Western Illinois' 34-12 win at Eastern Michigan was the league's 24th win against a I-A program.

The original Gateway Conference was founded as a women's athletic organization in August, 1982, following the dissolution of the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women. In September of that year, Patty Viverito was named the first commissioner of the newly founded conference, a position she maintains today. Before moving to its permanent headquarters in St. Louis, the Gateway spent three organizational months on the campus of Eastern Illinois University.

In July of 1992, the 10-team conference disbanded as its women's programs realigned with their men's teams in their respective conferences. The league assumed its new name on July 1, 1992, becoming the Gateway Football Conference, a NCAA I-AA football league comprised of seven Midwest institutions.

The Gateway Conference football division was born on August 21, 1985, when the Gateway Conference President's Council voted to add a I-AA football division for six of its members to the previously all-women's athletics organization. Founding members of the football division were Eastern Illinois, Illinois State, UNI, Southern Illinois, SMS, and Western Illinois. The creation of the Gateway football division marked the first time in college annals that football was added to a women's conference. In June of 1986, Indiana State became the

seventh member of the Gateway Conference.

In the 19 years of the football division, league membership has been stable — with only three fluctuations since 1986. Eastern Illinois left the Gateway to join the Ohio Valley Conference in 1996, while Youngstown State joined the Gateway for 1997 to return league membership to its original seven-member status. League membership reached an all-time high of eight members for the start of the 2001 season with the addition of Western Kentucky.

The Gateway is among eight I-AA conferences that receive automatic bids to the NCAA I-AA Championship. Those other leagues include the Atlantic-10 Conference (formerly the Yankee), the Big Sky Conference, the Midwestern Athletic Conference, the Ohio Valley Conference, the Patriot League, the Southern Conference, and the Southland Football League. The Gateway has had an automatic bid since 1986, as the I-AA Football Committee waived the league's two-year waiting period and granted the league an automatic bid after just one year.

The Gateway Conference is the only automatic I-AA qualifying conference that sponsors football as its only sport, as the league completed its service to women's athletics following the 1991-92 season. Although the league no longer sponsors women's sports, the Gateway has a historical place in the development of intercollegiate women's athletics.

The 10 founders of the original Gateway Collegiate Athletic Conference currently belong to three conferences. Eight members joined their men's programs in the Missouri Valley: Bradley, Drake, Illinois State, Indiana State, UNI, Southern Illinois, SMS, and Wichita State. Eastern Illinois is in the Ohio Valley Conference, while Western Illinois competes in the Mid-Continent; Youngstown State's sports, other than football, are in the Horizon League, while Western Kentucky's home for non-football sports is in the Sun Belt.

In its decade of operation, the Gateway sponsored championships in ten women's sports and football. The women's sports were basketball, cross country, golf, indoor and outdoor track & field, swimming and diving, tennis, softball, volleyball and, early on, field hockey.
