Indiana State Hosts Western Illinois As **Sycamores Return To Memorial Stadium**

SETTING THE STAGE

Year one of the Mike Sanford era at Indiana State continues Saturday, November 16, as the Sycamores return home to face off against Western Illinois. Saturday's game is set for a 2:00 p.m. (ET) kickoff at Memorial Stadium (12,764). The game will be broadcast live worldwide on a pay-per-view basis on Sycamore Vision with Brian Fritz (pbp) and Tom James (color) on the call. The game will also air live on WIBQ (98.5 FM), with Brian Fritz and Tom James calling the action for the Nelligan Sports Marketing Radio Network. QUICK HITS

— Indiana State's Donovan Layne had a 20-yard interception return for a touchdown against Missouri State on November 2. It was the second "pick-6" of the season for the Sycamores with the other being a 31-yard interception return for a touchdown by Connor Underwood in the season opener at Indiana.

— Senior tailback Shakir Bell has seen his season and career end due to injuries with 4,214 rushing yards which is second on the Sycamore all-time list. He finishes his ISU career just 123 yards short of becoming Indiana State's all-time leading rusher behind only the 4,335 yards of Vincent Allen from 1973-77. His 4,214 career rushing yards ranks sixth all-time in the history of the Missouri Valley Football Conference. Additionally, Bell is just the third Sycamore and 10th player ever in the history of the Missouri Valley Football Conference to eclipse the 4,000 career rushing yard mark.

MVFC Teleconference

All nine league head coaches are available on the league's weekly coaches' teleconference on Tuesday's during the regular season. The call begins at 11:00 a.m. and coach Sanford will make his weekly appearance beginning at 11:42 a.m. Media members may call 877-393-4731 to join the teleconference.

Postgame Policies

Ace Hunt will coordinate all postgame interviews for the Sycamores, as the locker room is closed to media. On the road, Coach Sanford and selected players will be made available after a brief cooling off period in an area outside the locker room or a space designated by the host school. At home, both team's head coaches as well as selected players will be made available in the interview area located inside the Memorial Stadium Fieldhouse.

The Indiana State Head Coach

Indiana State head coach Mike Sanford (Southern California, 1978) is 17-52 (.246) overall in his sixth season as a head coach, and is 1-9 (.100) in his first season with Indiana State. He is 0-6 all-time in MVFC games, including an 0-2 mark at home and an 0-4 mark on the road. During his career, he is 14-20 in all home games, 3-32 on the road and 5-7 in games decided by three points or less. Sanford is 0-0 all-time against Western Illinois, and is 0-0 against the Leathernecks at home. With the Trees, Sanford is 0-0 in overtime games, and 0-1 in shutouts. Saturday's game is Mike Sanford's 11th as Indiana State head coach and his 70th as a collegiate head coach.

The Western Illinois Head Coach

Bob Nielson is in his first year as the head coach of the Western Illinois football program where he carries a 3-7 record into Saturday's game. Overall, Nielson is 173-65-1 in 21 seasons as a collegiate football head coach. He has never faced Indiana State and is 1-5 against the Missouri Valley Football Conference in his inaugural campaign.

Scouting The Leathernecks

Western Illinois is 3-7 on the season, including a mark of 1-5 in MVFC play as the Leathernecks began the campaign with home field victories over Hampton and Quincy. WIU dropped a pair of road games against FBS opponents Minnesota and UNLV before winning their league opener on Sept. 28 against South Dakota. Western Illinois enters Saturday's game with a five-game losing streak and had a bye week last Saturday while ISU played at South Dakota State.

A Little History

This marks the 109th season of football at Indiana State, dating back to 1896. The University did not field teams from 1899 to 1900, 1908 or from 1910 to 1919. ISU owns an all-time record of 359-487-22 and is competing for the 28th consecutive season as a member of the MVFC.

Jameer Thurman Ranks As Top Freshman Defender In MVFC

Indiana State freshman linebacker Jameer Thurman leads the Sycamore defense in 2013 with 80 total tackles, including 43 solo stops and has played in started in all 10 games so far this season. Thurman owns nine tackles for a loss of 35 yards and boasts four quarterback sacks for a loss of 23 yards. Thurman tallied a season-best 17 total tackles (including nine solos) at South Dakota State and has recorded at least four tackles in every game this season. He also had 15 tackles at South Dakota. Against South Dakota, he posted a season-best three tackles for a loss of 11 yards, including a pair of quarterback sacks. Thurman burst onto the scene with seven tackles each at FBS opponents Indiana and Purdue to begin the season. Thurman currently ranks fifth-best in the MVFC with a 8.0 tackles per game average, which is the highest of any freshman in the league. In league games only, Thurman is averaging 8.8 tackles per game which is tied for third-best in the MVFC and the best of any freshman. Thurman's 3.0 quarterback sacks in league games ranks tied for ninth-best and is also the best mark of any freshman defender in the conference. Additionally, Thurman's 6.0 tackles for loss in league games only, ranks tied for eighth-best in the MVFC and is also the best for a freshman in Valley Football in 2013.

Donovan Layne Earns Indiana State's Second "Pick-6" Of The Season

Indiana State defensive back Donovan Layne reached the end zone for the Sycamores with a 20-yard interception return for a touchdown in the second quarter at Missouri State on November 2. It marked the second interception return for a touchdown by a Sycamore this season as Connor Underwood tallied one for 31 yards in the season opener at Indiana. Layne's interception return for a touchdown was the first of his career and marked his first interception in 2013.

• Give Indiana State its first MVFC victory of the season and break a seven-game skid, with five of those seven games

LeMonte Booker Owns 97-Yard Kickoff Return For A TD Versus NDSU

Indiana State freshman LeMonte Booker returned a kickoff 97 yards for a touchdown against No. 1 North Dakota State on October 26. It was the first for the Sycamores since Tanner Riley returned a kickoff for a touchdown against Missouri State in 2012. Booker's return was also the longest for the Sycamores since Cornell Johnson had a 97-yard kickoff return against Western Illinois in 2005.

Sycamores Against The Nation's Best

Indiana State downed No. 1 North Dakota State last season on October 13 on the road to mark the last time the Sycamores have won against a nationally-ranked team. The Sycamores are 11-77 all-time against FCS nationally-ranked opponents, including a mark of 8-58 against league members that are nationally ranked. The Sycamores have dropped each of their last four meetings against nationally-ranked teams (Illinois State last season, Youngstown State, North Dakota State and South Dakota State this season).

Mike Perish Close To Topping School Passing Record Yet Again

Mike Perish's performance against league-leading and nationally ranked Youngstown State was once again near the top of the Sycamore football record book. Perish was 30-of-56 passing for 392 yards and three touchdowns against the Penguins. Perish was just four passing yards away from the single-game school record in each category. He found nine different receivers on the day and all nine had multiple receptions.

Sampson I Am

Indiana State freshman Sampson Levingston had one of the more interesting statistical lines in the history of Indiana State football with only two pass receptions but three receiving touchdowns against nationally-ranked Youngstown State. Levingston had two receptions for 56 yards, including a long of 27. He had a 27-yard TD reception, in the second quarter and also had a 21-yard TD reception late in the game. The other eight yards on his receiving total came in the fourth quarter after Kyani Harris had a 68-yard pass reception and lateraled the ball to Chris O'Leary who then pitched the ball to Levingston who went the final eight yards for his third touchdown reception of the game. Levingston is the first Sycamore to record three pass receptions for a touchdown since James Braden did it in 2001 at Missouri State (Braden also scored touchdowns on all of his pass receptions in that game). Additionally, Levingston's touchdown on the double lateral was featured on ESPN SportsCenter's Top 10 Plays. Levingston has six touchdown receptions on the season, which is just two shy of the school record of eight held by Steve Schmid in 1986.

Mike Perish Named MVFC Offensive Player Of The Week Following Quincy Contest

Mike Perish took home his first Missouri Valley Football Conference Offensive Player Of The Week honor following his performance against Quincy on September 14. Perish was 23-of-26 passing for 379 yards with four passing touchdowns and one on the ground as the Sycamores went over 70 points for the first time since 1925 in their 70-7 victory over Quincy. Perish had 379 passing yards which are the fourth-most in a single-game in school history and was part of a school record 433 passing yards, topping a 2006 effort against Missouri State. Perish's completion percentage of 88.4 percent (23-of-26) is likewise a new school record. Perish added a one-yard touchdown run.

Sycamore Offense Hits 70 Point Mark For First Time Since 1925

Indiana State defeated Quincy by the score of 70-7 in the home opener. It marked the

first time that ISU has scored at least 70 points in a game since a 72-0 victory over Vincennes in 1925. It was the first time the Sycamores have scored at least 70 points in a game played in Terre Haute since a 79-0 victory over Vincennes in 1924. The 10 touchdowns scored by the Sycamores are a school record, topping the previous best of nine. The Sycamores have scored 119 points in three games this season, averaging 39.7 points per game, which currently ranks third-best in the MVFC.

Indiana Sets New Passing Record Against Quincy

The Sycamore offense set several records in the 70-7 victory over Quincy. Indiana State's 433 passing yards is a school record for a single-game, topping a 396-yard effort through the air in 2006 at Missouri State. The Sycamores amassed 671 yards of total offense versus Quincy, which was just four yards short of the school record of 675 yards against Dayton set in 1975. For the season, Indiana State's offense is averaging 424 yards per game which is fourth-best in the MVFC and they are one of six different MVFC schools to average more than 400 yards of total offense per game.

Sycamore Trio Earns Preseason All-MVFC Plaudits

A trio of Indiana State seniors Shakir Bell, Calvin Burnett and FN Lutz have been named to the 2013 Preseason All-Missouri Valley Football Conference Team as announced by the league office. Additionally, the Sycamores were picked to finish sixth in this season's 10team MVFC race. The Preseason All-MVFC Teams as well as the predicted order of finish were determined by a vote of the league head coaches, media and sports information directors. Bell, a member of the Preseason All-MVFC First Team, is a two-time All-MVFC selection and has already been named to numerous Preseason All-American Teams as well this summer. He was the MVFC Offensive Player of the Year in 2011 as well as a finalist for that season's Walter Payton Award. Burnett, a senior defensive back, is also a member of the Preseason All-MVFC First Team. He was a Second Team All-MVFC selection in 2012 and was an honorable mention pick as a freshman in 2010 when he also was named to the league's all-newcomer team. Lutz, a senior offensive lineman, is a member of the Preseason All-MVFC Honorable Mention Team. He sat out the 2012 campaign after a knee injury in the spring game forced him to miss the entire season. Despite his injury and based on the hope that he might be ready to play last year, he was named to the Preseason All-MVFC First Team and was a candidate for the Lowe's Senior Class Award.

Indiana State Football With Third Consecutive Winning Season

The Indiana State Sycamores were 7-4 overall and 5-3 in Missouri Valley Football Conference play last season. The Sycamores secured their third consecutive winning campaign which is the first time ISU has enjoyed that many winning seasons in a row since the 1967-69 years under Jerry Huntsman when ISU posted six consecutive winning seasons.

Sycamores Against The Missouri Valley Football Conference

Indiana State is in its 28th season as a member of the MVFC. ISU's first season as a league member came in 1986 when it went 1-5 through a six-game league schedule. The Sycamores are 51-121 in MVFC contests all-time.

In Overtime

The Sycamores have played in 12 overtime contests since the rule was established for regular season games in the NCAA FCS Subdivision in 1996. The Sycamores are 7-5 in games that have used an extra period. ISU's last overtime contest came in the form of a 38-35 victory against Missouri State in the sixth game of the 2010 season.

Up Next

The regular season will conclude on Saturday, November 23 when the Sycamores host Southern Illinois in the final MVFC contest for both teams. Kick-off is set for 2:00 p.m. (ET).

Mike Sanford

Indiana State Head Football Coach First Season

Mike Sanford was named the Indiana State head football coach on December 14, 2012 and will begin his first season at the helm of the program in 2013.

"It is with great anticipation that I welcome our new head football coach, Mr. Mike Sanford to the Sycamore Athletics Family," Prettyman said. "He is a tremendous football coach and an even better person to lead our young men in our football program. His experience, his work ethic, his commitment to education, family and faith are all qualities that will help to shape the future of our program for years to come. Please join me in welcoming Coach Sanford to Indiana State University and Terre Haute."

Sanford is considered one of the nation's top offensive minds and comes to Indiana State from Utah State, where he spent the 2012 season as the assistant head coach, running backs and tight ends coach on Gary Andersen's staff.

"I am extremely excited and passionate about becoming the new head coach of the Sycamore football program," Sanford said. "I look forward to continuing and building upon what this team accomplished over the past three seasons. I especially want to thank Indiana State University President Dan Bradley and Director of Athletics Ron Prettyman for this opportunity."

The Aggies are ranked No. 18 in the Associated Press Poll, No. 20 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll and finished No. 22 in the Bowl Championship Series standings. The Aggies defeated Toledo is the Famous Idaho Potato Bowl played at Boise, Idaho on Saturday, December 15 by the score of 45-13.

Utah State has had one of its best overall seasons in school history in 2012 as with an 11-2 record, set the single-season school record for victories, including a school record six at home. USU also also won six league games for just the second time in the history of the program and posted the school's first-ever perfect 6-0 conference record en route to the Western Athletic Conference Championship. The Aggies captured their first-ever road victory over a nationally-ranked team when they downed No. 19 Louisiana Tech by the score of 48-41 in overtime. Utah State appeared in the Associated Press Poll for three consecutive weeks for the first time in school history as well as the ESPN/USA Coaches Poll' and BCS standings for the first time ever.

Under Sanford's tutelage, Utah State senior running back Kerwynn Williams led the team with 1,277 rushing yards on 200 carries (106.4 ypg) with 12 touchdowns and also led the team with 43 catches for 663 yards and five TDs. Williams led the team with 24 big plays of over 20 yards (17-rushing and 7 receiving) and each had receptions of 74, 76, and 86 yards. The Aggie offense averaged 44.8 points and 502 yards of total offense per game over the final six contests of the year, including senior tight end Kellen Bartlett, who had 18 receptions for 111 yards and four touchdowns.

Williams was one of 17 Utah State players to take home All-Western Athletic Conference honors as he was named to the first team. Bartlett took home Honorable Mention All-WAC plaudits. Of Williams' seven career 100-yard rushing performances, six came in 2012 under Sanford's tutelage. The Aggies were second in the WAC and 26th nationally in total offense (460.5 ypg) as well as second in the WAC and 37th nationally in rushing offense, totaling 192.5 ypg in 2012.

"I'm really happy for Mike. He wants to be a head football coach again and it's hard to get those

jobs," said fourth-year USU head coach Gary Andersen. "I know it's hard for him to leave Utah State University, but he feels like this is a great opportunity and he has made a decision that he thinks betters himself and his family. I'm very supportive of it and I wish him and his family all the best."

Sanford spent the 2003 and 2004 seasons at Utah as offensive coordinator under head coach Urban Meyer and was part of the Utes' 21-2 overall and 13-1 Mountain West two-year stretch, including a 12-0 overall and 7-0 league mark and victory in the 2004 Tostitos Fiesta Rowl

After the Utes finished last in the Mountain West in scoring offense the season before his arrival, Sanford led Utah to the No. 3 ranking in the nation at 43.3 points per game, third in total offense (499.8 ypg), third in passing efficiency (173.41) and boasted Heisman Trophy finalist Alex Smith, who went on to become the top pick in the 2005 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Smith was second in the NCAA in passing efficiency (176.52) and fifth in total offense (298.6 ypg).

During that same season, Utah boasted one of the nation's most balanced offensive attacks, averaging 236.06 yards per game on the ground and 263.67 yards through the air.

"Mike is a fine football coach who I got to know well while we coached together at Utah," Ohio State head coach Urban Meyer said. "I wish him all the best as he takes over the Indiana State program."

Sanford came to Utah State after two seasons at Louisville, where, as offensive coordinator and tight ends coach, he helped improve the Cardinals' offensive passing, from nine touchdown passes in 2009 to 20 in 2010. Louisville scored 23 or more points in nine games, including 56 in a win against Memphis. Sanford also mentored Louisville tight end Cameron Graham who earned first-team all-Big East Conference accolades after catching 40 passes for 470 yards and five touchdowns.

Prior to Louisville, Sanford was head coach at UNLV from 2005-09, where he took over a program that was coming off four consecutive losing seasons. His five seasons at UNLV tied for the third-longest coaching stint in Rebel football history. The Sanford-led Rebels made national headlines in 2008 with an upset win at No. 13 Arizona State. Under Sanford, UNLV's offense set several school records in 2008, highlighted by tying for the top red zone scoring offense percentage (.950) in the nation, matching Ohio State. UNLV's offense was also

15th in the nation in sacks allowed (1.2 pg).

During his time at UNLV, Sanford coached 29 All-Mountain West Conference honorees, including 2007 MWC Defensive Player of the Year Beau Bell, and 2006 MWC Freshman of the Year Ryan Wolfe, who went on to earn three first-team selections. In Sanford's offense, Casey Flair set a school record and tied a MWC record with 47 consecutive games with a reception.

At UNLV, Sanford replaced his college head coach, John Robinson, who retired after a legendary career that included six seasons with the Rebels.

"Mike Sanford is an outstanding football coach," Mike Hamrick, the Director of Athletics at Marshall (and Athletic Director at UNLV at the time of his hiring in Las Vegas) said. "He is a man of integrity and will run a football program that the entire Indiana State University family will be proud of. His teams at UNLV were very competitive and had many big wins over teams such as Utah, Arizona State, lowa State, Air Force and many others. His reputation as having a brilliant offensive mind is well documented. He will give everything he has to continue the success of Indiana State football."

Sanford was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Stanford in 2002, returning to the college ranks after three seasons in the NFL as wide receivers coach with the San Diego Chargers from 1999-2001.

"Mike Sanford is a tremendous football coach, but just as important he is great with young people," Mike Riley, head coach of Oregon State said. "He will be a great leader of the program and an excellent teacher for the young men of the Indiana State team. This is a terrific hire for the University."

Sanford's NCAA Division I coaching experience includes stints at Notre Dame, USC, Purdue, Long Beach State, Virginia Military Institute and Army.

As an assistant coach, Sanford has participated in 12 bowl games with five different programs. As the wide receivers coach at USC from 1989-96, Sanford assisted in two Pac-10 championships and two Rose Bowl victories (vs. Michigan in 1990 and Northwestern in 1996). Three of his Trojan receivers were selected in the first round of the NFL Draft: Curtis Conway in 1992, Johnnie Morton in 1993 and Keyshawn Johnson, the No. 1 overall pick in the 1996 draft and a consensus All-American in 1995.

Sanford began his coaching career in 1977 as a graduate assistant at Southern California before earning his bachelor's degree from USC in 1978. Later that year, Sanford started his first full-time coaching position as the defensive coordinator at San Diego City College.

As a player, Sanford was a reserve quarterback for USC's 1973 and 1974 Rose Bowl teams (the 1974 team beat Ohio State for the national championship). He played free safety in 1976 when USC beat Michigan in the Rose Bowl and finished second in the nation.

Sanford, born April 20, 1955, and his wife Melinda have two grown children, a daughter, Lindsay, and a son, Mike, Jr., who is currently the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at Stanford and was the quarterback at Boise State from 2001-04.



- Indiana State scored 21 unanswered points in just over one minute of game time around the halftime break and scored the most points by an Indiana State team in five all-time games versus the Hoosiers, but Indiana turned the Sycamores back with a 73-35 victory on a hot and humid night in front of 40,278 fans at Memorial Stadium.

Shakir Bell went over 100 yards rushing for the 20th time in his career and the 17th time in the 109 year history of the program during a season opening contest as he amassed 113 yards on the ground on 18 carries.

Freshman Sampson Levingston and junior transfer Kyani Harris each hauled in touchdown passes



for the Sycamores while Calvin Burnett returned a fumble for a touchdown and Connor Underwood had his first interception return for a touchdown as the Sycamores reached the end zone five times and scored a record 35 points in five all-time meetings wiht Indiana.

Jamar Brown was the Sycamores' leading receiver with four catches for 50 yards, including a long of 21 yards which helped set up Indiana State's first touchdown of the contest.

Indiana State trailed 45-7 late in the second quarter but were sparked just before the half. The Sycamores went 78 yards on seven plays and Perish found Kyani Harris for a 17-yard touchdown reception with 19 seconds on the clock to cut the IU advantage down to 45-14. George Cheeseborough forced a Hoosier fumble on the ensuing kick-off and Calvin Burnett pounced on the ball in the end zone with 10 seconds on the clock to send both teams into the half with the Sycamores trailing 45-21.

Indiana State continued a scoring run by netting its third consecutive touchdown of the game in the first minute of the second half. With 14:17 left in the third guarter, Connor Underwood returned an interception 31 yards for a touchdown to cut the Indiana lead down to 45-28.

Robert Tonyan, Jr., found Demory Lawshe for a 57-yard touchdown pass with 8:36 remaining to close out the scoring for both teams.

The Sycamores took to the field first in the game with junior guarterback Mike Perish leading the offense, but Indiana State was forced to punt. The Sycamores' Jordon Stangler had his knee on the ground as he attempted to field the snap, which set up the Hoosiers with an 18-yard field. It took them just three plays, including a 12-yard touchdown pass from Tre Roberson to Ted Bolser with 12:32 left in the first quarter to stake IU to a quick 7-0 lead.

Indiana State responded with a 10-play, 75-yard scoring drive to even the score at 7 with 8:27 on the clock in the first quarter. Sampson Levingston, making his Sycamore debut, hauled in an 11-yard touchdown pass from Perish after Shakir Bell had 27 rushing yards on the drive.

Indiana State's defense stopped the Hoosiers on fourth-and-one inside Sycamore territory after the touchdown, but were not able to move the ball and Indiana was able to counter with a 43-yard touchdown pass to Shane Wynn off the arm of Roberson with 3:44 remaining in the first quarter to give Indiana a 14-7 advantage. Following a Bell fumble, Indiana went 41 yards on four plays to take a 21-7 lead at the 2:46 mark of the first quarter on a 34-yard touchdown run by Tevin Coleman.

The Hoosiers scored twice in the first two minutes of the second quarter as Bolser reached the end zone for the second time in the game, a 9-yd reception from Nate Sudfeld with 14:47 on the clock. Shane Wynn followed with a 58-yard punt return for a touchdown with 13:15 left before the half for the 35-7 Hoosier lead.

After Indiana State scored 21 unanswered points in less than a minute of game time around halftime, the Sycamores surrendered a pair of third quarter touchdowns as the Hoosiers reclaimed a 59-28 lead.




TERRE HAUTE, Ind. -- Indiana State staged an impressive second half comeback but time proved to be too short late in the fourth quarter as Purdue escaped with a 20-14 victory over the Sycamores in front of 50,165 fans inside Rose-Ade Stadium.

Indiana State fell to 0-2 on the season, dropping a pair of contests against members of the Big Ten Conference while Purdue improved to 1-1.

The Sycamores outgained the Boilermakers 295-284 in total yardage, including a 256-150 advantage through the air.

Mike Perish was 29-of-45 passing for 256 yards and two touchdowns with just one interception to lead the Sycamore offense against the Boilermakers. Demory Lawshe proved to the Sycamores' leading receiver as he hauled in seven receptions for 62 yards and one touchdown while Kyani Harris had five receptions for 32 yards. Tanner Riley added four



receptions for 63 yards while George Cheeseborough had four receptions for 43 yards.

All told, the Sycamores had 11 different players catch a pass in the game.

Shakir Bell, was not able to play with an injured shoulder, but Cheeseborough stepped in with 11 rushes for 43 wards

Mark Sewall led the Sycamores with eight tackles and one pass brake up. Jameer Thurman and Calvin Burnett each had seven tackles with Thurman adding one tackle for loss.

Purdue owned a 17-0 lead until the Sycamores were able to move the ball 79 yards on eight plays including a 36-yard touchdown pass from Mike Perish to George Cheeseborough with 2:44 remaining in the third quarter to cut the Boilermaker advantage down to 17-7. The touchdown pass from Perish to Cheeseborough came on a 4th-and-9 play as Perish hit Cheeseborough in stride at the five-yard line and he walked into the end zone for the score.

Once again the Sycamore defense was able to keep the Boilermakers out of the end zone after the Indiana State offensive score even though Purdue had a 12-play drive which took nearly seven minutes off the clock. Purdue did advance to near the red zone, but the Boilers were forced into a 37-yard field goal by Paul Griggs with 10:57 to go in the contest to stretch their lead out to 20-7.

Indiana State responded to the Boilermaker field goal with a six-play. 61-yard drive that took just 1:35 off the clock and ended with Perish's second touchdown pass of the day. This time Perish found Demory Lawshe for a 17-yard scoring strike with 9:22 on the clock to cut the Purdue lead down to just 20-14.

The Sycamore defense made one final stand that resulted in a three-and-out for Purdue that gave Indiana State the ball with 46 seconds on the clock. After a five-yard completion from Perish to Cheeseborough, the Boilers sealed the victory with an interception of Perish's final pass attempt of the game.

With a knee taken at the 19 second mark, Purdue was able to narrowly escape their home opener with a 20-14 victory over Indiana State.

Purdue opened the game with a 99-yard kick-off return for a touchdown by Akeem Hunt which staked the Boilermakers to a fast 7-0 advantage just 14 seconds in.

The only other scoring in the first half came on a Paul Griggs 18-yard field goal with 9:03 remaining in the second quarter for a 10-0 Purdue lead. That drive featured one of two goal line stands by the Sycamore defense in the first half. The first came after the Boilers moved the ball inside the ISU 5-yard line and made three consecutive goal line stops to force the Griggs field goal.

The second big defensive stop came as the first half was winding down and the Boilers moved all the way down to the ISU one-yard line as the clock ticked down under one minute remaining in the second quarter. Connor Underwood led the Sycamore defensive charge by making a pair of tackles at the goal line on Hunt rushes, the final coming with 12 seconds remaining. The first half clock expired as Purdue attempted to bring their field goal unit on to send Indiana State into the locker room down to the Boilermakers 10-0.

The first drive of the third quarter looked promising as the Sycamores moved the ball into Purdue territory. ISU faced a fourth and short but the Purdue defense made the stop to end the Sycamore threat. Purdue then took the ball 60 yards on eight plays over the next 4:43 to reach the end zone on a 16-yard run by B.J. Knauf with 5:08 left in the third quarter for the 17-0 advantage.



TERRE HAUTE, Ind. - Indiana State scored a Memorial Stadium record 70 points as they opened their home season with a 70-7 victory over the Quincy Hawks in front of 7,002 fans. The Sycamores also set a single game record for passing yards and quarterback Mike Perish accumulated the fourth most single game passing yards in school history. The Sycamores also came close to establishing the school record for total yards in a game.

Perish was 23 of 26 in passing for 379 yards which ranks behind Blayne Baggett who threw for 396 yards against Missouri State in 2005, Jeff Miller who threw of 391 yards against Ball State in 1985, and Kyle Frondorf who went for 383 yards against Eastern Illinois in 1986.



Perish and Robert Tonyan were a combined 27 of 34 in the game for 433 yards and five touchdowns. The 433 yards is a new school single game record. Indiana State also had 671 yards of total offense which was just shy of the 675 accumulated by the 1975 team against Dayton.

Demory Lawshe had three catches for 115 yards and a touchdown while Tanner Riley caught six passes for 62. Buck Logan led the Sycamore rushing attack with 85 yards in 10 carries with George Cheeseborough going for 77 yards on 10 carries.

The Sycamores scored 42 points in the first half but it wasn't until midway through the opening quarter that Indiana State struck pay dirt and it came on a 78 yard pass play from Mike Perish to Demory Lawshe with 7:18 left in the opening quarter. Indiana State also scored on their next possession as the Sycamores capped a nine-play, 88-yard drive with a two-yard pass from Perish to Sam Levingston with three minutes remaining in the period.

Indiana State found the end zone four times in the second quarter including the first play of the second period when Perish busted through the middle from a yard out to complete a seven-play, 65-yard drive. Perish also connected with Buck Logan on a 24 yard scoring strike with 6:29 left in the half to cap a 61-yard drive (nine plays) and a five yard touchdown pass to Taje High with just seven seconds left to cap a 73 yard drive (five plays).

In between was a 36 yard scoring run by George Cheeseborough with 3:36 left in the second that came on just the second play of the Sycamore possession. Perrish connected with Logan on a 21 yard gain on the first play.

Indiana State scored four more touchdowns in the second half with one coming from the defense. Cheeseborough scored his second touchdown of the game with 12:45 left in the third guarter to cap a 56-yard, six-play drive. Tonyan connected with Justice Berry on a 12 yard scoring strike with 9:33 left at the end of a 72 yard, sevenplay drive with Tonyan also scoring Indiana State's final touchdown with 9:01 left on a five yard run to cap a 51-yard, eight-play drive.

Jess Harris also scored for Indiana State as the linebacker returned an interception 51 yards for the score with 13:04 left in the game.

COOKEVILLE, Tenn. -- Indiana State senior tailback Shakir Bell returned to the Sycamore lineup and rushed for over 200 yards for the sixth time in his career but it was not enough as the Sycamores fell 38-37 on the road to Tennessee Tech

Shakir Bell, who saw his first action since injuring his shoulder in the season opener at Indiana, rushed for 201 yards and one touchdown to go over the 4,000 career rushing yard mark. He is the third Sycamore in the history of the program and ninth in the history of the Missouri Valley Conference to achieve that milestone. Bell now has 4,108 rushing vards in his career. He added six receptions for 68 yards, including one touchdown through the air. Bell is now just three



touchdowns away from tying the ISU all-time career touchdowns scored record.

Mike Perish was 25-of-43 passing for 288 yards and two touchdowns. Bell was Perish's top target while Sampson Levingston added six receptions of his own for 55 yards and a touchdown.

Making her collegiate debut, Eric Heidorn connected on three field goals -- the most by a Sycamore since the 2012 campaign.

Trailing 24-12 at the half, the Sycamores came right out of the break with a strong offensive charge which ended with 13:13 remaining in the third quarter on a one-yard touchdown run by Mike Perish was was set up by a strong run near the goal line by Shakir Bell. The Perish rushing touchdown cut the Tennessee Tech lead down to 24-19.

Tennessee Tech answered with a five-yard touchdown run by Jared Davis at the 8:01 mark of the third quarter to restore the 12-point advantage at 31-19.

That is when Shakir Bell took over the contest for the Sycamores in the second half. Bell scored on a six-yard touchdown run with 5:16 left in the third quarter to get ISU within 31-26. Mike Perish then found Sampson Levingston for a 12-yard touchdown reception with 1:12 left in the third period and added a two-point conversion from Perish to A.J. Johnson to give the Sycamores a 34-31 lead -- its first since the first quarter.

After another defensive stop, freshman Eric Heidorn connected on his third field goal of the contest with just under 13 minutes remaining to stretch the lead out to 37-31.

Zach Ziegler regained the lead for Tennessee Tech on a two-yard pass from Jared Davis with 1:11 on the clock to put the Golden Eagles up 38-37. The Sycamores got into Tennessee Tech territory on their final drive, but a tipped pass was intercepted with less than 20 seconds remaining to seal the game for TTU.

Indiana State scored first in the game on a 31-yard touchdown reception by Shakir Bell off the arm of Mike Perish. Bell returned to action from a shoulder injury which has sidelined him since the season opener at Indiana. The touchdown drive was set up by an interception from Phil Wilson on Tennessee Tech's opening drive. Bell caught a screen pass and raced down the sideline for the quick 6-0 lead at the 11:33 mark of the first quarter.

Tennessee Tech answered the Sycamores' opening score with 17 unanswered points to take a 17-6 advantage at the 13:14 mark of the second quarter.

The Sycamores moved the ball deep into Tennessee Tech territory twice in the second quarter, first with a nine-play, 59-yard drive which ended with Eric Heidorn's first career field goal — a 31-yarder — at the 10:13 mark to cut the deficit down to 17-9. Heidorn came back on the Sycamores' next drive to connect on a 42-yard field goal at the 4:56 mark to further cut into the Golden Eagle lead at 17-12.

Through a pair of weather delays and a steady rainfall over the course of most of the contest, Youngstown State earned a 35-24 victory over Indiana State in front of 8,000 fans on Homecoming inside Memorial Stadium.

The game was delayed for 10 minutes after halftime as a severe thunderstorm rolled through Vigo County during the break and then was delayed again for nearly an hour and a half with 3:02 left in the third guarter due to lighting around the stadium.

Through it all, junior Calvin Burnett quarterback Mike Perish went 30-of-56 passing for 392 yards two pass attempts and four passing yards shy of all three single-game school records. Sampson Levingston caught two passes for 56 yards in the game but still

became the first Sycamore to record three pass reception touchdowns since James Braden did it in 2001 against Missouri State. Levingston had a 27-yard reception in the second quarter, a 21-yard reception late in the fourth quarter and an 8-yard reception earlier in the final stanza came after a pair of laterals from Kyani Harris and Chris O'Leary.

Buck Logan led the Sycamore ground game with 64 yards on the ground while Harris had five pass receptions for 101 yards. Mark Sewall led the Sycamore defense with eight tackles, including two for losses and Connor Underwood added a quarterback sack.

The Sycamores opened the scoring on their first possession of the game with Tanner Fritschle booting a 23-yard field goal with 9:35 left in the first quarter. It didn't take the Penguins long to respond as Andre Stubbs took the ensuing kickoff 52 yards to the Sycamore 44 and Martin Ruiz broke free on the first play from scrimmage and ran in for a Youngstown State score with 9:16 left in the first.

Indiana State was able to move on the Penguins on their next possession as the Sycamores advanced to the Youngstown nine yard line. A personal foul against Indiana State moved the ball back to the Penguins 24 and a Mike Perish pass was picked off by the Penguins Jameel Smith and returned 95 yards for a Youngstown State touchdown. The point after was good as the Sycamores fell behind 14-3 with 1:08 left in the first.

The teams traded punts early in the second quarter before the Penguins were able to strike pay dirt again, this time on a 13 yard run by Ruiz with 7:12 left in the half for a 21-3 Penguin lead. The Sycamores finally scored a touchdown with 3:31 left in the half as Perish connected with Sam Levingston on a 27-yard touchdown strike to make it 21-10 going into the halftime break.

The rains came down for the rest of the opening half as neither team could advance the ball. However, after a 35 minute halftime, the Penguins opened the third quarter with an 80-yard drive that ended with Ruiz scoring his third touchdown of the game, this one from six yards out with 9:37 remaining to stretch the advantage out to 28-10.

The game was suspended with 3:02 remaining in the third quarter by lightning. Both teams returned to the field after a one and a half hour delay to resume the game.

Christian Bryan caught a two-yard pass from Kurt Hess with 8:51 remaining in the game to make it 35-10 in favor of the Penguins. Indiana State responded with a 68-yard pass to Kyani Harris, who lateralled at the 10-yard line to Chris O'Leary who then pitched the ball to Levingston for what officially went down as a 78-yard play but an eight-yard touchdown reception for Levingston from Perish with 7:48 remaining to inch ISU within 35-16.

Perish and Levingston hooked up on a 21-yard scoring strike with 1:57 remaining to cut the lead down to 35-24, but the Penguins were able to run out the clock by keeping the ball on the ground.

Shakir Bell moved into second place on the ISU all-time rushing list with his 80-yard effort against the Coyotes. Bell now has 4,205 rushing yards for his career to move ahead of David Wright for second and needs 131 to take over the career rushing record for Vincent Allen.

Mike Perish started the game at quarterback and went 5-of-8 passing for 48 yards while Robert Tonyan, Jr., was 8-of-17 for 34 yards. Both Perish and Tonyan had touchdown throws.

Tsali Lough and Mark Sewall each had pass interceptions.

South Dakota scored first in the contest on a three-yard run by Trevor Bouma for the quick 7-0 lead with 8:54 left in the first quarter. The Bouman scoring rush capped a seven-play, 70-yard drive.

The Sycamores answered right back with a nine-play, 80-yard drive which was aided by a pair of 15-yard Coyote penalties and capped with a 22-yard touchdown pass from Mike Perish to A.J. Johnson at the 5:39 mark of the second half to level the score at 7-7.

The Coyotes would drive deep into Sycamore territory twice in the second quarter but each time were stopped by interceptions. The first came via Mark Sewall after a tip at the goal line by Connor Underwood and the second came from Tsali Lough in the end zone as well.

Lough's interception set up a Sycamore drive which ended in a punt with three minutes remaining before halftime. Jordon Stangler's punt was deep and muffed by South Dakota where Lough fell on the football at the Coyote 22-yard line. ISU needed just four plays after the turnover to take a 14-7 lead with 1:06 remaining in the second quarter on a 3-yd touchdown pass from Robert Tonyan, Jr., to Logan Buske.

After the half, South Dakota fumbled away the ball and Conrrad Nicholls came up with the recovery but the Sycamores could not take advantage and were forced to punt. USD came back with an eight-play, 38-yard drive which ended with a 43-yard field goal by Miles Bergner to inch the Coyotes within 14-10 with 6:52 remaining in the third quarter.

South Dakota would take a 17-14 lead with 11:06 remaining in the contest on Bouma's second rushing touchdown of the game. Bouma capped a 10-play, 36-yard drive with the rushing touchdown.

Trailing 17-14 and with the clock ticking towards eight minutes remaining, Donovan Layne blocked a field goal attempt to give the Sycamores the ball at their own 20-yard line. The drive was kept alive on 4th-and-6 with a pass from Tonyan to A.J. Johnson which got the ball to the 50-yard line.

The drive would stall at the USD 34-yard line when Robert Tonyan, Jr.'s scramble was short of the line to gain with 3:39 remaining in the contest.





TERRE HAUTE, Ind.. -- Indiana State fell to the top-ranked North Dakota State Bison by the score of 56-10 in front of 5,009 fans inside Memorial Stadium today (Oct. 26).

The Sycamores dropped to 1-7, 0-4 MVFC while North Dakota State improved to 8-0, 5-0 MVFC.

Indiana State fell behind 21-0 as NDSU's Brock Jensen connected with Zach Vraa on an 11-yard TD pass on their first drive and then found Vraa again late in the first quarter for a 29-yard score while Colten Heagle had a 35-yard interception return for a touchdown.



Eric Heidorn booted a 40-yard field goal with 14:12 remaining in the second quarter to inch ISU within 21-3. Heidorn's field goal capped a six-play, 48-yard drive which was set up by a Jensen fumble on an attempted backwards pass which was recovered by Mark Sewall as well as a 37-yard rush by Buck Logan.

After Jensen found Ryan Smith on a 20-yard touchdown pass with 11:30 on the clock for a 28-3 Bison advantage, LeMonte Booker found pay dirt on the ensuing kickoff with a 97-yard touchdown return just 14 seconds later to get ISU within 28-10. Booker's 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown was the first for the Sycamores since Tanner Riley had one last season against Missouri State and the longest since a similar return by Cornell Johnson against Western Illinois in 2005.

The Bison answered with a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by Ryan Smith 13 seconds later to stretch the lead out to 35-10 and Jensen recorded his fourth passing touchdown of the day with a three-yard strike to Trevor Gebhart at the 2:21 mark of the second quarter for a 42-10 advantage.

With 1:18 left in the first half, Christian Dudzik had a 43-yard punt return for a touchdown for a 49-10 North Dakota State lead and he added a 68-yard punt return for a score with 9:09 remaining in the third quarter for the 56-10 advantage.

Buck Logan led all rushers with 76 yards on the ground on 15 attempts, averaging 5.1 yards per carry. Tanner Riley had a pair of pass receptions for 20 yards on the day.

Russell Jones led the Sycamore defense with nine tackles, including one for a loss and two forced fumbles. Mark Sewall and George Stone each had fumble recoveries for the Sycamore defense. Connor Underwood, Tyshon Waller and Carlos Aviles each had one tackle for loss in the contest.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. -- Indiana State saw its three-game winning streak against MVFC foe Missouri State come to an end as the Bears earned a 49-7 decision over the Sycamores in front of 6,648 fans on a sunny but windy afternoon at Plaster Field.

Mike Perish return to the Sycamore lineup after missing the last two contests with a knee injury and went 14-of-34 passing for 95 yards. Buck Logan led the way on the ground for Indiana State with 14 rushes for 69 yards. Tanner Riley caught a team-best six passes for 42 yards.

Defensively, Garrick Ratliff led the way with 12 total tackles, including six solo stops. Russell Jones and Connor Underwood each had 1.5 tackles for a loss in the contest. Mark Sewall stopped the first Missouri State drive of the contest with his second interception of the season while Donovan Layne converted his first interception of the season into a

a 3-yd touchdown run by Mikael Cooper-Falls to stake the Bears to a 7-0 lead.

touchdown with a successful 20-yard return in the second quarter. Neither team was able to reach the end zone in a first quarter which took just 19 minutes of real to complete. Missouri State chewed up over six minutes of the clock and scored on the first play of the second period with

Indiana State responded with a defensive score as Donovan Layne picked off an Ashton Glaser pass and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown to level the score at 7-7. It marked the second "pick-6" of the season as Connor Underwood had one for 31 yards in the opener at Indiana.

The Bears scored on a 28-yard pass from Keirra Harris to Eric Christophel with 2:02 left in the second quarter to regain the advantage at 14-7. That scoring drive capped a four-play, 51-yard drive that took just under two minutes to complete.

The Sycamores moved all the way down to the Missouri State 44-yard line on their final drive of the first half but were stopped and punted the ball to the Bears, who were able to run out the clock and send the teams into the locker room with MSU holding a 14-7 lead.

The Bears came out of the gate strong to open the third quarter as they took the kickoff and scored with 10:36 on the clock on a 3-yd touchdown rush by Kierra Harris. The scoring drive took nine plays and 73 yards as the Bears extended their lead to two scores. Missouri State's lead grew to 28-7 with 7:18 remaining in the third quarter a 53-yd interception return for a touchdown by Rique Bentley.

The Bears picked up a second interception return for a touchdown with 5:54 remaining in the third quarter when Jeremy Springer took one back 51 yards as Missouri State's lead grew to 35-7. Missouri State returned their third interception for a touchdown with three seconds remaining in the third stanza when Sybhrian Berry scored on a 73-yd return for the 42-7 lead.

Missouri State capped the scoring in the contest with a Cedric Miller eight yard touchdown run with 59 seconds remaining in the contest for the 49-7 Bear victory.



BROOKINGS, S.D. -- The Indiana State football team (1-9, 0-6 MVFC) fell 29-0 on the road Saturday, to the Jackrabbits of South Dakota State (6-4, 3-3 MVFC) on a cold and windy afternoon in Brookings, S.D. in front of 5,317 fans at Coughlin-Alumni Stadium.

The Sycamores found themselves behind early as South Dakota State got on the scoreboard first with a 32 yard field goal to take a 3-0 lead with just over eight minutes remaining in the first quarter.

On the ensuing Indiana State series, their first of the game, quarterback Mike Perish was hit on a rush attempt and was injured on the play. Robert Tonyan Jr. then assumed the quarterback responsibilities for the remainder of the game.



South Dakota State then extended their lead to 9-0 after a 22 yard touchdown run. The Jackrabbits missed the PAT, kicking into a swirling wind.

At the start of the second quarter, the Sycamore offense began to gain some momentum as they put together a 13 play, 43 yard drive to the SDSU seven yard line. Eric Heidorn's 24 yard field goal attempt was blocked, however, keeping the SDSU lead at 9-0.

The Jackrabbits tacked on 27 and 35 yard field goals to take a 15-0 lead over the Sycamores into the locker room.

In the third quarter, the Sycamore defense forced the first turnover of the game, by either team, when Travis Starks forced a fumble and Joshua Appel recovered for Indiana State.

The Sycamores couldn't captialize, however, and on the next South Dakota State possession, the Jackrabbits went 57 yards for a touchdown to take a 22-0 lead over Indiana State with 6:44 to go in the third guarter.

South Dakota State extended their lead even further in the fourth quarter with a one yard touchdown run to make it a 29-0 game.

The remainder of the game, the Sycamores could not keep a drive going and eventually fell to the Jackrabbits by a final core of 20.0

Junior tailback Buck Logan led the Sycamores with 20 rushes for 68 yards. Senior Tanner Riley led the ISU receiving core with three receptions for 24 yards.
