2023 IDAHO STATE FOOTBALL - WEEK 2

The Bengals are back home for the first time in 2023.

Idaho State welcomes the University of Northern Iowa to Holt Arena for the 2023 season opener. This will be the first matchup with the panthers since 2019 and the fourth all-time meeting.

Kickoff is set for 4:00 PM

The game will be broadcast on ESPN+ and on KISU 91.1 FM

NEW YEAR, NEW STAFF

The Bengals open the 2023 season with a revamped staff led by first-time head coach Cody Hawkins. Hawkins comes to the staff from UC Davis where he previously worked as the offensive coordinator. Leading the defense is Josh Runda, previously at Iowa State. Mark Weber comes back to Idaho State to lead the offensive linemen. Weber was a graduate assistant coach on the Bengal's 1981 National Championship team and has had a storied career at multiple schools. After stints with the XFL and UC Davis, Jesse Thompson joins the Bengals to lead the special teams. Jacob Thomas joins the Bengals to coach the running backs after stints with Azusa Pacific and UC Davis. Also coming to the Bengals from UC Davis is the offensive flex coach, Joshua Mondt, primarily working with the quarterbacks. Nick Alaimalo stayed with ISU and switched roles to coach the inside receivers. Scott Thiessen comes to the Bengals from Lamar University to coach the safeties. After assisting at Virginia Tech, Korey Rush comes to the Bengals to coach the Defensive Line. Devin Holiday returns for another year coaching the corners and finally coming from Boise State, Keith Price coaches the outside receivers.

VETERAN LEADERSHIP - FRESH FACES

After finishing a challenging 2022 season, the Bengals were left with only 40 returning players on the roster. Included in this number are a core group of returners including but not limited to; quarterback Hunter Hays, Running Back Raiden Hunter, Receivers Christian Fredericksen and Chedon James, Mike Davis who is making the switch from Tight End to Offensive Line.

On the defensive side of the ball, Josh Alford returns at corner along with Tylor Bohanon and Jihad Brown in the defensive back group. Cortland Horton returns on the defensive line

Newcomers to watch out for on the offensive side of the ball Include but are not limited to #9 Alfred Jordan Jr. and #4 Aaron Blancas. The Bengals also added #14 Michael Shulikov, an Idaho State track and field Big Sky Champion high jumper who is throwing his hat in the football ring.

On the defensive side of the ball, new faces to watch include #9 Herman Smith, a transfer from Jackson State and New Mexico State transfer Adrian Rodriguez who both add depth to the linebackers and corners.

Attacked the Aztecs

After a 38-7 loss to the SDSU Aztecs in 2022, The Idaho State Bengals went into Snapdragon Stadium with a new mentality and instead of rolling over to their FBS foe, the Bengals took it to the Aztecs.

Behind quarterback play from Hunter Hays and Jordan Cooke, The Bengals fought for four complete quarters, falling just short with a 36-28 loss. While it was a loss, this Idaho State team showed they want to move on from the past in Pocatello. The Bengals didn't relent the fight and kept battling. The Bengal defense, under new DC Josh Runda, kept the Aztecs on their toes forcing multiple fumbles and stepping up on third down in multiple situations where it mattered.

Head Coach Cody Hawkins remarked postgame, "There are totally moral victories; at the end of the day you want to win every game but I mean, this is a perennial Mountain West champion-type program. I respect the heck out of the program. Brady Hoke has been coaching in Michigan, and it's my first game ever as a head coach. I'm super proud of these guys. They did an awesome job. I told him that at the end of the game, if they can continue to approach every game like that, I won't guarantee them success but I can guarantee them fulfillment. That's what we're all searching for in life and in sports. I want to win

every game. But as we build this thing, I want guys to feel special for being Bengals and tonight they feel that in a locker room."

Fell to the Aggies

The Idaho State Bengals fell to the Utah State Aggies 78-28 Saturday evening in Logan Utah.

The game started off with a competitive first 15 minutes. After giving up the opening touchdown to Utah State, the Bengals responded with a seven-play 75-yard drive by quarterback Jordan Cooke capped with a nine-yard pass to Christian Fredericksen to even the score at 7-7 headed to the 2nd quarter.

The 2nd quarter was all Aggies, as the Utah State football team took advantage of a strong running game and costly Bengal turnovers to quickly run up the score.

With under a minute to play in the half, Hunter Hays put together a 10-play 75-yard drive with Christian Fredericksen once again hauling in the touchdown catch, the seventh of his career.

After an offense explosion by the Aggies in the first half, the two teams continued to battle coming out of the locker room.

With seconds left on the clock in the third, Hays floated a pass to the back of the endzone where a familiar face to the Idaho State faithful was waiting.

In the back of the endzone waited Idaho State wide receiver Michael Shulikov, the current Idaho State track and field indoor high jump record holder. Shulikov put his field skills to use and leaped over the Utah State defender to haul in the pass in the back of the endzone. In the fourth, the Bengals never stopped fighting, driving the field in 11 plays and punching in a one-yard touchdown with a direct-snap run by Raiden Hunter.

INTRODUCING HEAD COACH CODY HAWKINS

After a national search, Idaho State University Director of Athletics Pauline Thiros has announced that Cody Hawkins has been named head coach of the Idaho State Football Program.

“Coach Hawkins exhibited in every way that he is the right person to lead Idaho State Football into the future. He is Idaho-grown, well-connected across our recruiting footprint, is the architect of a prolific scoring offense, and has the right values at the right time. I know Coach will offer our student-athletes what they need most to perform at their best. He is innovative and a culture builder. I am pleased to welcome Cody, his wife, Tianna, and their children Finley and Bowen to Pocatello and Idaho State University,” said Thiros.

Hawkins, an Idaho native, brings a wealth of experience to the position after spending the last six seasons at UC Davis in multiple roles. The previous three seasons as offensive coordinator, two as the wide receivers coach and one season as quality control. During his time with the Aggies, Hawkins helped lead the team to multiple FCS playoff appearances and a Big Sky Conference Championship in 2018. Hawkins had proven success while at UC Davis. Coordinating their offense, the Aggies averaged 35.91 points per game, 3rd in BSC in Total Offense. In 2022, Hawkins engineered an offense that produced the Big Sky’s leading rusher, passer, and 39.6 points scored average in Big Sky Conference play.

Hawkins has strong ties to the Gem State and made a name for himself while playing quarterback for Bishop Kelly High School in Boise in the mid-2000’s for the legendary Tim Brennan. During his high school career, Hawkins compiled a 40-0 record and won a state championship inside Holt Arena. He was named the Idaho Statesman State Player of the Year twice and in 2005, was named the Idaho Gatorade Player of the Year.

“I could not be more excited to help Pauline and President Satterlee create an amazing student-athlete experience here at Idaho State. Growing up in this great state, I have watched the Bengals for as long as I can remember. I have been in Holt Arena when it was rocking, and I look forward to building a program the Idaho State community, alumni, and fans are proud of. Tianna and I want to sincerely express how much it means to us to be moving home and have the opportunity to help this program honor its history and heritage by creating great memories and results, on and off the field,” said Hawkins.

Hawkins then moved on to the FBS level continuing his playing career with the Colorado Buffaloes. With the Buffs, Hawkins set school records for passing yards and passing touchdowns. He also earned multiple awards including the Kordell Stewart Career Achievement Award, the Eddie Crowder Award for outstanding leadership, and the Derek Singleton Award (leadership, enthusiasm, and dedication) on three separate occasions.

Hawkins continued to grow his coaching prowess as a graduate assistant coach at Ohio State University. In Columbus, he helped coach the wide receivers group and gained valuable offensive knowledge managing the Buckeye’s playbook, before heading to Los Angeles Valley College where he went 11-0 and won a state championship, and then UC Davis. In 2015 Hawkins was the Quarterback Coach and play caller for the United States Men’s National Team, helping them claim the title of 2015 IFAF World Champion.

“Coach Hawkins will lead our program with integrity, skill, and genuine enthusiasm. His vision to build our football program through a championship culture will inspire our team. Cody will be a great partner, leader and member of our Bengal community,” said Idaho State President Kevin Satterlee.

BENGAL BITES

- The Bengals only return 40 players on the roster from the 2022 season. Despite the low numbers, Coach Hawkins and his staff recruited a full 110 man roster for the 2023 season.
- The Bengals' 28 points scored against SDSU is the 2nd most scored against an FBS opponent in the modern era. The record is 30 against Nevada in the Bengals' 2017 30-28 win over the wolfpack. Third place is in the year 2000 against the Utah State Aggies in a 27-24 win.
- The Bengals threw 63 pass attempts against the Aztecs, leading the nation in total attempts. While more yardage is to be desired still, the number marks a change in the offense style that hasn't been seen in Pocatello for some time.
- 28 points scored against San Diego State equaled the season high from 2022.
- The Bengals matched the 28 points scored this past week against the Aggies.
- After two games, the Bengals rank 3rd in the FCS in fewest penalties and penalty yards.
- The Bengal passing offense is ranked 5th in the FCS with an average 9.92 yards per completion rate.
- Jihad Brown and Mason Young are tied for 4th in the FCS with two forced fumbles apiece
- Christian Fredericksen is tied for 1st in the nation in touchdown receptions (3 TDs)
- Chedon James is 4th in the nation in receptions per game with 8.

Thomas Kopcho joined the Bengals from Missouri Western. The Bengal kicker comes from a United States Air Force family and along with his three sisters moved around the country and the world growing up.

Born in Colorado Springs, Kopcho spent some of his early childhood in Klein Texas before heading overseas to Germany and then Korea with his father's military career.

What got you into the sport of football - I always went to the schools on base and so just like normal American schools we would play football at recess. In sixth or seventh grade I found out I could kick and eighth grade was when I moved back to the states and played tackle football. At that point kicker was my main position



What is a favorite memory that sticks out – In 2021 I was at Missouri Western and we were playing Northeastern state in our homecoming game. In that game, I was five for five FGS and six for six PATs. I broke the school and conference record held by Greg Zuerlein. It also tied the D2 record. I scored like 21 points in that game.

Who has been a mentor in your career – The first is my dad, He has always been there, drove me around the country to camps and colleges my senior year.

I have a coach that has helped me for years and helped me to develop the skills I needed to get into college, Sandro DeAngelis, he played for Nebraska and in the CFL.

Most recently, Matt Thompson out of Denver has worked with me through a company called one on one kicking. I still go to him for training and He is someone I can talk to no matter what is going on.

Kopcho has entered a Master's of Computer Science program at Idaho State and has also started an internship working with the Idaho National Laboratory.

What brought you into Computer Science – I like Comp sci because I like solving problems. It's never the same thing. My Dad was into computers and I learned from him. I also play a lot of computer games and naturally that led to my study of computer science. It also led to me interning at the Idaho National Laboratory

What do you do in your freetime – Depends on my mood but usually I'm playing computer games or spending time with my two dogs.

What is the one meal you could always eat– There is this Korean soup called Seolleongtang (Ox Bone Soup) it's a rich bone broth. My mom makes this milky broth with a bunch of sides, I can't get enough of it



What's the advice you are passing on to the next generation – You have to just stay cool when you're on the field, Once you start getting in your own head that's when things go wrong. Let your muscle memory take over. Have fun with it, don't take it too seriously in the end if your aren't having fun, whats the point.

One of my mentors has a formula he always tells me. Have fun first, then concentrate on the sweet spot of the ball and swing easy. It applies to all aspects of football.



HOLT ARENA RENNOVATION

In 1970 Idaho State University opened its doors to the first indoor collegiate football field in the country. Then named the ASISU Minidome, the name was later changed to Holt Arena to honor legendary coach, athletic director and now Big Sky Hall of Fame member Milton “Dubby” Holt.



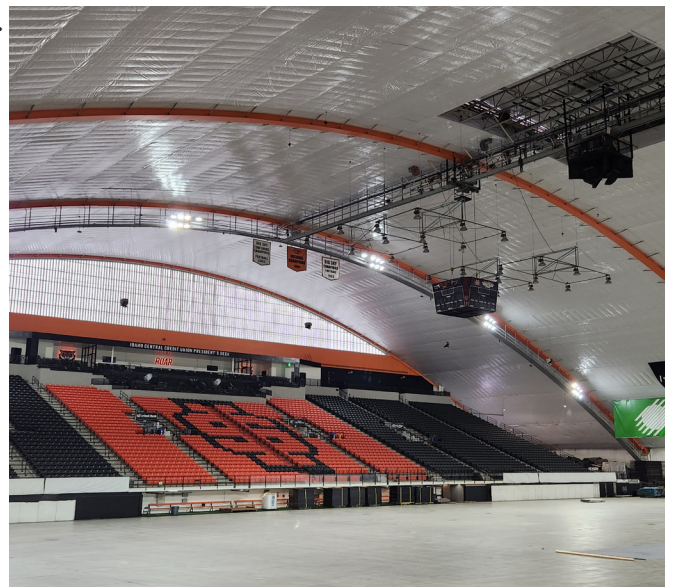
In 2021, the University announced a multi-million-dollar renovation project to upgrade the facility and improve the fan experience.

The construction crews worked round the clock and the renovation is set to be completed by the first home game in 2023 against the University of Northern Iowa.

The project has not only included new seats, but upgrades to the roof structure, improved seismic protection, Modernized technology in the building, a new presidents deck and increased availability of handicap and wheelchair access.

In 2023 The Bengals started construction on the southwest corner of the arena to add a new athletics film and study room that can also be used to host events inside of the arena.

Idaho Central Credit Union announced in 2023 a donation that will allow a new video board to be built on the west end of the arena for the 2024 season



CACCIA FIELD

On Saturday afternoon, October 6, 2007 on Homecoming against Northern Colorado, Idaho State University dedicated the Holt Arena playing surface to ISU's all-time winningest coach, Italo J. "Babe" Caccia. The field is now known as Caccia Field.

The ceremony took place on the field prior to the nationally televised game with the Bears, a long standing former Rocky Mountain Conference rival that Caccia's squads went 9-1 against over his coaching tenure. Flanked by his wife and family, Caccia, who celebrated his 90th birthday during the week of the festivities, was called by then ISU President Dr. Arthur C. Vailas "an institution, and a true Bengal".

Caccia, who was the Athletic Director for ISU's 1981 National Championship season and worked hand in hand with his best friend and Dome namesake Milton "Dubby" Holt, had the Holt Arena crowd in stitches at the ceremony, commenting that, "had I known all this would have happened, I'd be happy to turn 90 again next year!"

Babe coached the Bengals from 1952 through the 1965 season, compiling an alltime mark of 79-38-2. Babe's teams won Rocky Mountain Conference championships in 1952, 1953, 1955, 1957, and 1959, and he also won the first ever Big Sky Conference title in 1963. Caccia's legendary teams include a pair of undefeated squads in 1952 (8-0, 5-0 RMC) and in 1957 (9-0, 6-0 RMC). The 1957 team outscored their opponents 280-85, with only one game decided by 13 points or less.

Caccia's teams also went 11-3 on Homecoming, and fittingly, Idaho State scored a decisive 26-14 victory to commemorate the occasion and the christening of Caccia Field.

KEVIN SATTERLEE - IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

Kevin D. Satterlee became Idaho State University's 13th president in June 2018. Kevin is a native Idahoan from Priest River, Idaho. He has served Idaho's higher education system for over 20 years. Kevin has a passion for watching students transform their lives through their educational experiences. His favorite day of work for the last 20 years has always been the first day of school. Watching students begin a new year, with fresh hopes and the excitement for new opportunities, has never ceased to move and motivate Kevin.

Upon assuming the presidency, Kevin committed to faculty, staff, students, alumni and friends of the University to always listen, be transparent and lead inclusively. As a natural problem-solver, the challenges facing Idaho State University, and higher education in general, do not phase Kevin. Rather, these challenges give Kevin the motivation and determination he needs to face them head-on.

Idaho State University's strengths are evident. As Idaho's leader in health science education, a strong partner of Idaho's National Laboratory, and a university where faculty and staff always put students first, there is an amazing story to tell. Kevin has been privileged to help share these stories with state leadership, community members and future students. One of his top priorities as president is to continue to build on and celebrate ISU's strengths, traditions and community culture.

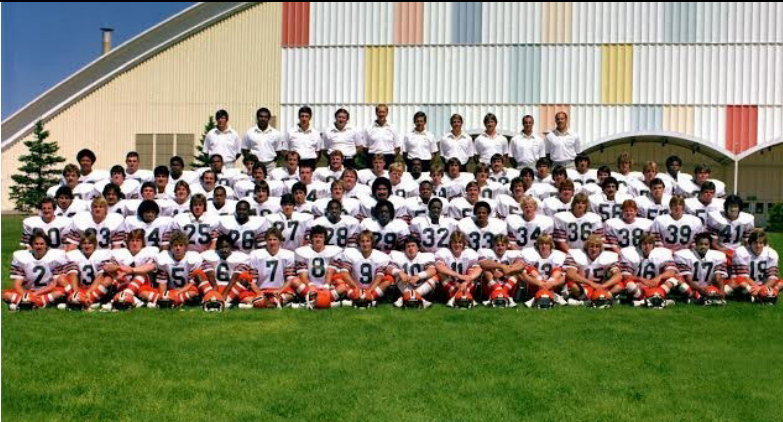
In 2023, Satterlee announced he would retire at the end of the calendar year and a national search is currently underway.

**PAULINE THIROS - ISU DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**

Pauline Semons Thiros is the Director of Athletics at Idaho State University and has enjoyed a successful 26-year-career as a coach, development professional and Director of Athletics. She started at Idaho State University as Assistant Volleyball Coach and Recruiting Coordinator in 1995, following a standout playing career which earned her All Big Sky Conference Honors. She received her Bachelor of Science in Health Care Administration from ISU in 1995, and her Master of Education in Athletic Administration in 1999. Her efforts on the court earned her an induction to the ISU Sports Hall of Fame in 2006.

In August of 2018 Pauline was named Interim Director of Athletics at Idaho State University, and achieved extraordinary results in that role. She advanced the Davis Field renovation project, successfully proposed a student fee increase to support athletic department initiatives, and built corporate partnerships to expand facilities, staffing and services for student athletes. Following a rigorous four-month national search which began in December of 2018, Thiros was named Director of Athletics at Idaho State University in March 2019. She is the first female Director of Athletics to be named at a Division I University in Idaho. She is currently the Chair of the Big Sky Conference Joint Athletics Committee, former Chair of the Big Sky Conference Olympic Sports Committee, and serves on the Big Sky Conference Eligibility Committee, Legislative Review Committee, Mental Health and Wellness Committee. She is the Big Sky Conference Administrator for NCAA Volleyball. In August of 2019 she was appointed to the prestigious NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Committee. Thiros serves on the Board of Directors for Hoop Camp, a unified sports camp program offering participation opportunities for people of all ages with special needs.

1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS



The 1981 Bengal squad went 12-1 on the way to the NCAA I-AA National Championship

In the fall of 1981, the Idaho State University football team shocked the nation, as the Bengals capped an improbable season with a I-AA national championship. The season was all the more remarkable because in 1979 the Bengals went 0-11, and the championship came just 14 months after ending the longest losing streak in I-AA history at 19 games. After an opening win over Eastern Washington, the Bengals took out defending

national champion Boise State in Boise 21-10. They followed that with home wins over a strong Nevada team and Northern Arizona, and a road win at Portland State.

ISU lost at Montana 24-21, but they would not falter again. They knocked off Idaho on the road 24-14, and then scored impressive home wins over Montana State 21-3, and Utah State, 50-24, setting up a winner-take-all showdown with Weber State for the Big Sky title and a berth in the NCAA playoffs. The game went to three overtimes, with ISU surviving a missed 32-yard field goal in the second overtime by WSU's Roger Ruzek that would have won the game. In the third overtime, Case deBruijn nailed a 33-yard field goal for a 33-30 win. Idaho State then waltzed to the championship game after home wins against Rhode Island 51-0, and South Carolina State 41-12. In the Pioneer Bowl, as the I-AA game was called, ISU went up against perennial power Eastern Kentucky, but the Bengals would not be denied, winning the title with a 34-23 victory

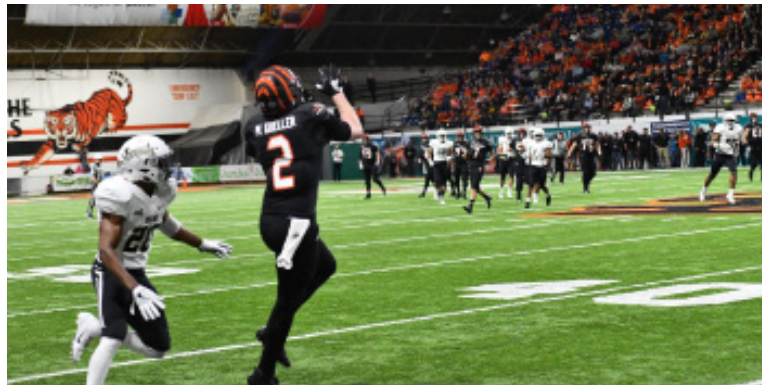

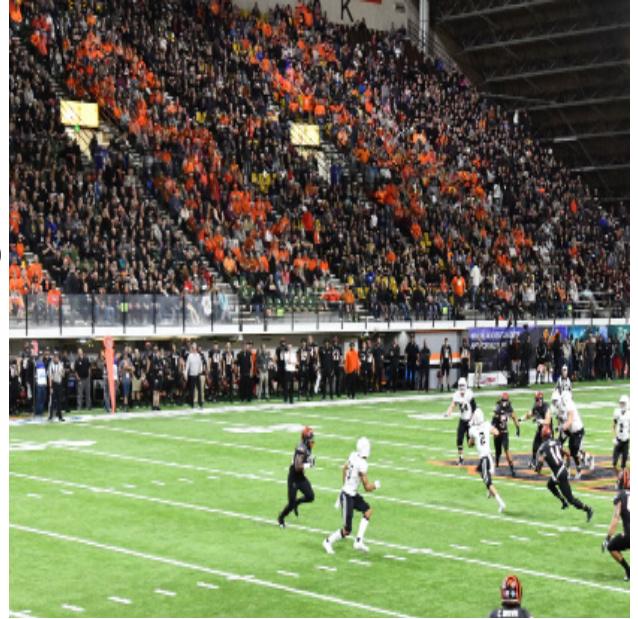

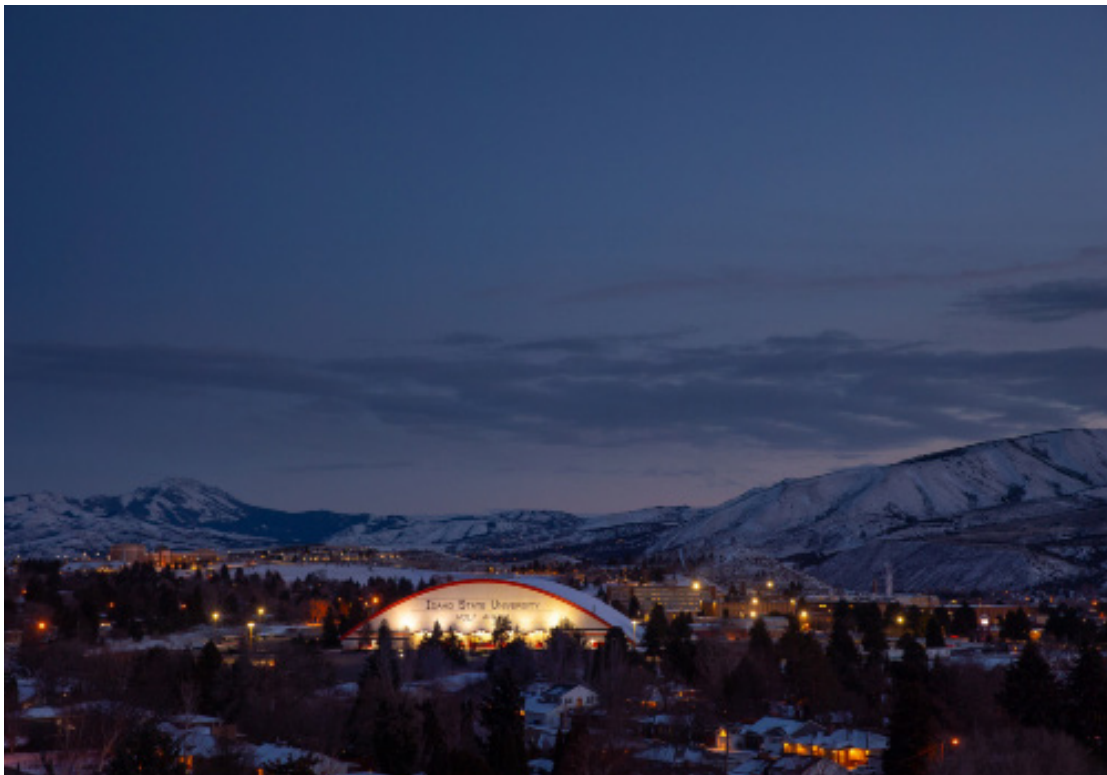
