CYCLONE HEADLINES

- Iowa State opens the season with a pair of Big 12 duals to start the season. The Cyclones will take on South Dakota State on Friday evening at 7 p.m. and will close out the weekend with a matchup against the Bison of North Dakota State on Sunday at 2 p.m.
- In 2015-16, ISU posted a 10-6 dual mark. The double-digit wins marked the second-consecutive season that a Kevin Jackson-led squad won 10 or more duals in a season.
- Five Cyclones begin the year ranked in the national polls. Earl Hall (5, 5, 4), Gabe Moreno (17, 16, 14), Lelund Weatherspoon (7, 6, 7), Patrick Downey (7, 9, 6) and Marcus Harrington (17, 19, 19) all begin the year slotted in the top-20 in FloWrestling, TheOpenMat and InterMat rankings.
- Hall (7), Weatherspoon (6) and Downey (5) are all coming off of All-America finishes in 2015-16. The Cyclones are one of just eight squads in the country to return three or more 2016 All-Americans.
- The Cyclones also return two other 2016 NCAA-Qualifiers in Kyle Larson and Dante Pestano.
- ISU finished third at the newly-expanded Big 12 Conference Championship. Weatherspoon won his second-career conference title, making him the 56th wrestler in program history to win multiple conference championships.
- Iowa State's lineup returns many familiar faces. In total, 15 members of this year's team saw action as a starter in dual competition in 2015-16. Those 15 wrestlers accounted for 85 percent of Iowa State's total dual wins last season.
- Hall and Weatherspoon are both knocking on the door of 100 career wins. Hall has tallied 81 career wins, and Weatherspoon has compiled 70 career victories. In 2015-16, Hall compiled 33 total wins, while Weatherspoon racked up 27.
- After shuffling around his lineup quite often last season, Coach Jackson's lineup features several weight changes. Moreno will be bumping down to 141 pounds, Dane Pestano will be cutting down to 165 pounds and Downey is set to wrestle at 184 pounds.
- Iowa State's dual season is jam-packed with Big 12 matchups. The Cardinal and Gold are slated to face seven out of the nine other Big 12 and Big 12 affiliate squads.
- In 2017, the Big 12 Championship makes its debut at the BOK Center in Tulsa, Okla. The conference championship will be hosted at the BOK Center in 2017 and 2018.
- The 2017 NCAA Championship is returning to the Scottrade Center in St. Louis, Mo. Last year, the Cyclones finished 12th (35 points) at the national finals, which were held at Madison Square Garden in New York City.
- In the offseason, Iowa State named Dana Vote the new Iowa State Wrestling Director of Operations.
- Iowa State head coach Kevin Jackson is in his eighth year leading the Cyclones.

Former Olympic gold medalist and two-time World Champion, Kevin Jackson is in his eighth season as Iowa State's head wrestling coach. In his initial year at the helm, Jackson coached two NCAA individual champions en route to a third-place finish at the 2010 NCAA Championships.

Jackson's efforts with the Cyclone squad in his inaugural campaign didn't go unnoticed, as he was honored as Amateur Wrestling News magazine's 2010 Rookie Coach of the Year. Jackson coached the ISU grapplers to a 13-2 overall dual record, with a perfect 4-0 mark in Big 12 action.

In 2010-11, Jackson's squad finished the year with a 9-10 mark in dual competition. The year was highlighted by senior Jon Reader, who went 39-0 en route to an individual NCAA title at 174 pounds.

After a down year in 2011-12, Jackson was able to rally his troops and bounce back strongly in 2012-13. After a 1-3 start, Jackson's Cyclones won 10 of their last 12 duals, finishing second at the 2013 Big 12 Championships and 11th at the NCAA Championships.

A 12th-place team finish at the NCAA Championships kept the Cyclones in the nation's top-15 in 2014, as Kyven Gadson (4th - 197), Michael Moreno (5th - 165) and Earl Hall, Jr. (8th - 125) each worked their way onto the NCAA podium. Two wrestlers crowned Big 12 Champions (Gadson and Lelund Weatherspoon), as Jackson coached Weatherspoon to becoming the Cyclones' first freshman Big 12 champion since David Zabriske in 2007.

Jackson coached the 2014-15 Iowa State wrestling squad to its best regular season performance since 2010. The Cyclones finished with an 11-2 dual record (.846) and finished the season ranked No. 8 in the coaches' poll. ISU finished runner-up champions to Oklahoma State at the 2015 Big 12 Championships, and qualified seven grapplers for the NCAA Championships.

At the 2015 NCAA Championships, Jackson coached Kyven Gadson to a perfect 5-0 record, including a fall in the 197-pound finals. Gadson credited Jackson for showing him the move that he used, "The Gadson", to pin Kyle Snyder in the Championship bout.

The Cyclones sent six wrestlers to the 2016 NCAA Championship in New York City. Jackson's squad put three wrestlers on the podium, with Earl Hall (7th - 133), Lelund Weatherspoon (6th - 174) and Patrick Downey (5th - 197) all earned All-America honors. Weatherspoon was the only unseeded wrestler to reach the semifinals at any weight.

Jackson was named the 2016 Cadet World Team head coach, where he led a group of the Nation's best to a runner-up finish at the 2016 Cadet World Championships. The second-place finish is tied for the best in USA Cadet World team history. Jackson steered the team to three individual gold medals, two silver and three bronze.

Under Jackson's tutelage at Iowa State, ISU has placed at least one wrestler at the top of the podium every year at the conference tournament. In seven seasons, the Lansing, Mich. native, has coached four NCAA champions, 11 All-Americans and seven Big 12 champions.

Prior to being hired at Iowa State, Jackson served eight years (2001-08) as the National Freestyle Coach for USA Wrestling. He was the first full-time freestyle wrestling coach for the organization and took two United States' teams to the Olympics. Two of his athletes – Cael Sanderson (2004) and Henry Cejudo (2008) – won gold medals. His 2001 freestyle team won the World Cup, the 2003 team placed second and the 2006 squad finished third at that meet.

Before becoming the nation's head freestyle coach, Jackson was a freestyle resident coach at the Olympic Training Center, head coach for the U.S. Army team at Fort Carson (1998-2001) and head coach of the Sunkest youth development program. During that tenure, he personally trained 2000 Olympic champion Brandon Slay.

As a competitive wrestler, Jackson established himself as one of the world's best in the 1990s, capturing gold medals at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona, Spain and at the World Championships in both 1991 (Varna, Bulgaria) and 1995 (Atlanta). He is one of just five wrestlers in U.S. history with three career world-level titles.

Adding to an already impressive list of accomplishments competing at the international level, Jackson also won two Pan American Games titles as a U.S. World Team member in 1993 and 1995. He won three U.S. Open titles, placing second five times. In 1998, Jackson became the first American to win the prestigious Takhti Cup in Tehran, Iran.

Jackson's success earned him a number of major awards, including the 1995 John Smith Award as National Freestyle Wrestler of the Year, 1992 Amateur Wrestling News Man of the Year and 1991 USA Wrestling and USOC Wrestler of the Year.

As a college wrestler, he attended Louisiana State and earned All-America honors three times before the school dropped the sport. He transferred to Iowa State for his senior year and captained the Cyclones' last NCAA championship team (1987), earning another All-America honor with a NCAA runner-up finish after registering a 30-3-1 record on the year.

Jackson's endless list of wrestling accolades has earned him recognition by several hall of fames. He is a member of the FILA International Wrestling Hall of Fame, the United States National Wrestling Hall of Fame (as a distinguished member), Greater Lansing Area Sports Hall of Fame (1993 inductee) and the Iowa State University Athletics Hall of Fame (2007 inductee).

He earned a bachelor of sports science degree from the U.S. Sports Academy / University of Americas in 2005.

Jackson and his wife, Robin (a native of Emmetsburg, Iowa), have five children: Cole, Bailee, Trinity, Brynn and Kira.

IOWA STATE RETURNS THREE ALL-AMERICANS

At the 2016 NCAA Championship, three Iowa State wrestlers earned All-America honors. Earl Hall (7th), Lelund Weatherspoon (6th), and Patrick Downey (5th) all finished on the podium at their respective weights.

The Cyclones are one of eight programs to return three or more 2016 All-Americans this season.

This was the second time that Hall had finished in the top-8 at the national finals. In 2014, Hall scrapped his way to an All-American finish as an unseeded wrestler at 125-pounds.

Weatherspoon was the only unseeded wrestler in New York City to reach the semifinals. The Jackson, Mich. native, knocked off No. 2 Brian Realbuto of Cornell in the first round to launch his run to the podium.

After joining the team late in the year, Patrick Downey qualified for the NCAA Championship at 197-pounds by finishing third at the Big 12 Championship. Downey was electric in Madison Square Garden, knocking off four opponents that were seeded, including a pair of falls over Virginia Tech's No. 5 Jared Haught.

FAMILIAR FACES RETURNING TO THE MAT

- The Cyclones return a plethora of big time contributors from the 2015-16 squad. Tanner Weatherman was the lone Iowa State starter to graduate last season.
- In total, 15 members of the 2016-17 Iowa State wrestling team competed in at least one dual last year. Those fifteen wrestlers accounted for 85 percent of the total dual wins tallied by ISU last season.

SHUFFLING UP THE LINE-UP

- Although there are many familiar faces returning in 2016-17, many of them will be at different weights.
- After suffering a season-ending shoulder injury, Gabe Moreno is back in an Iowa State singlet. He'll wrestle down a weight at 141-pounds. Moreno competed at this weight during the 2013-14 season.
- Possibly the biggest shift in the line-up will be Dane Pestano bumping down to 165 pounds. Last year, Pestano qualified for the NCAA Championship at 184 pounds. He'll look to fill the hole left by the departure of Tanner Weatherman
- Patrick Downey is bumping down to what most people are calling the toughest weight in college wrestling this year, 184 pounds. Downey floated between the 184 pounds and 197 pounds last year, as Marcus Harrington was shifted to heavyweight following an injury to Quean Smith late in the year.

NEW KIDS IN TOWN

- Iowa State boasts one of the top freshman classes in the nation. Flowrestling pegged the Iowa State youngsters as the No. 3 overall class in the country.
- In total, the group of incoming Cyclones posted seven All-America finishes and four national championships at the 2016 Fargo Junior National Championships.
- Four of the newcomers were ranked in top-100 in class of 2016. Ian Parker was No. 88, Kanen Storr No. 37, Samuel Colbray No. 10 (No. 1 at 195-pounds) and Gannon Gremmel was No. 60 coming out of high school.
- Head Coach Kevin Jackson says he plans on redshirting all of the newcomers, but has them prepared to be the next man in if needed.

EARL HALL LOOKS TO MAKE ONE FINAL STATEMENT (AGAIN!)

- The Homestead, Fla. native, was granted one more year of eligibility by the NCAA this May.
- After wrestling to a 33-9 record in 2015-16, Hall earned the No. 7 seed at the 2016 NCAA Championship. He wrestled to his seed, placing seventh in New York City. This was the second time that Hall has earned All-America honors. He finished eighth at the 2014 NCAA Championship at 125-pounds.
- Currently, Hall has 80 career victories. Hall will be in search of becoming the 37th wrestler in school history to notch 100 or more career wins. The last Cyclone to eclipse the century mark was Jon Reader in 2011. Reader tallied 124 career victories, which ranks tied for eighth all-time among Cardinal and Gold grapplers.
