### SETTING THE SCENE

- Indiana (6-6, 2-6 B1G East) faces Duke (7-5, 4-4 ACC Coastal) in the 2015 New Era Pinstripe Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 26. Kickoff is set for 3:30 p.m. EST at Yankee Stadium (49,542; Natural Grass) on ABC.
- The Hoosiers are appearing in their 10th bowl game and their first since the 2007 Insight Bowl.
- This is the first time IU has faced an ACC opponent (at the time of the game) in a bowl.
- The two teams are meeting for the fourth time and the first time since 1984.
- Indiana leads the series 2-1 with 31-21 (Oct. 4, 1980) and 15-10 (Sept. 10, 1983) victories in Bloomington and a 31-24 defeat (Sept. 8, 1984) at Duke.
- The Hoosiers went 1-0 against the ACC this year with a 31-24 win at Wake Forest on Sept. 26.
- This is IU's fourth game in the state of New York. Indiana faced Fordham at the Polo Grounds on Nov. 11, 1939 (L, 13-0), and split a pair of games at Syracuse on Oct. 7, 1972 (W, 10-2) and Sept. 26, 1981 (L, 21-7).

### THE COACHES

- Kevin Wilson** is in his fifth season as Indiana head coach. During his tenure, the offense has set 47 school records, including points, total yardage, passing yardage and rushing yardage in a single season. Sixteen IU standouts have either moved on to the NFL or received camp invites, highlighted by wide receiver Cody Latimer, the 56th pick by Denver (2014), and running back Tevin Coleman, the 73rd selection by Atlanta (2015).
- David Cutcliffe is 47-53 (.470) in his eighth season as Duke head coach. Cutcliffe holds a 91-82 (.526) overall mark with a previous stint at Ole Miss (1999-2004). The 2013 National Coach of the Year has led the Blue Devils to four straight bowl appearances and three consecutive winning seasons.

### QUICK HITS

- Indiana's six wins are the most for the program since the 2007 Insight Bowl team went 7-6.
- IU is riding a six-game non-conference winning streak, the program's longest since 1985-86 (6).
- With their victory in the season finale over Purdue, the Hoosiers have won three consecutive Old Oaken Bucket games for the first time since a four-game winning streak from 1944-47.
- Indiana won its final two games for the first time since 2001, its final two road games for the first time since 1982 and its final two games with both being on the road for the first time since 1946.
- IU had not won back-to-back Big Ten games since 2012, two Big Ten road games in the same year since 2001, back-to-back Big Ten road games since 1993 and three road games in a single season since 1994.
- The Hoosiers recorded 300 yards through the air (350) and on the ground (309) in the same game for the second time in school history (vs. Indiana State on Aug. 29, 2013), both under head coach **Kevin Wilson**.
- Indiana's 659 total yards are the second-most in program history behind the 692 they racked up in its 56-36 win over Purdue on Nov. 30, 2013.



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- IU has scored 40-plus points in three straight games for the second time in school history (1917) and the first time ever against three Big Ten opponents.
- This season marks the third time in program history the Hoosiers have scored 40-plus points five times (1988 and 2013) and the second time under **Kevin Wilson**.
- Senior left tackle **Jason Spriggs** earned first team All-America honors from the *Football Writers Association of America* after he was named one of six semifinalists for the 2015 Outland Trophy.
- Redshirt junior right guard **Dan Feeney** received first team All-America accolades from *ESPN.com*.
- They are the first IU o-lineman to collect first team honors since Gary Cassells in 1967.
- The duo is the first offensive line tandem to secure first team in honors in the same season in program history and just the sixth pair of teammates to accomplish the feat.
- Feeney has allowed just one sack in 36 career starts (2,703 snaps).
- Spriggs (2) and Feeney have allowed two sacks in 431 called pass attempts in 2015. Feeney owns a team-best 91 knockdowns in 967 snaps and Spriggs has 72 in 972.
- A school record 12 Hoosiers received postseason recognition from the Big Ten.
- Redshirt sophomore **Griffin Oakes** is the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year and first team All-Big Ten.
- Feeney and junior running back **Jordan Howard** collected first team All-Big Ten. Spriggs was a second team selection and senior quarterback **Nate Sudfeld** was a third team honoree.
- Safety **Jonathan Crawford** and offensive guard **Wes Martin** earned a spot on the *BTN.com* All-Big Ten Freshman team, while tight end **Brandon Knight** collected honorable mention honors.
- Crawford and Knight secured honorable mention Freshman All-American accolades from *Campus Insiders*.
- Eighteen Hoosiers garnered Academic All-B1G, as the program set a record with 111 awarded under Wilson.
- IU ranks 1st in the Big Ten in total offense (490.8; 16th nationally), passing offense (285.9; 24th) and scoring offense (36.2; T-22nd), and 2nd in rushing offense (204.8; T-30th).
- The Hoosiers have not led the conference in scoring offense since the league began using the entire season as the statistical champion in 1985.
- Indiana has not led the league in total offense since 1988.
- IU would be the first B1G team since Ohio State in 1995 to lead in total, passing and scoring offense.
- The Hoosiers have led the conference in passing offense three times in the past four seasons.
- Looking back to the start of the 2012 campaign, Indiana ranks 1st in the Big Ten in passing yardage per game, 2nd in total yardage per game and 4th in rushing yardage per game.
- IU is the only conference team to rank in the top four in passing and rushing.
- The Hoosiers have met three top 10 opponents for the 9th time in program history and the 1st since 1991.
- Indiana faced four opponents ranked inside the top 15 for the 1st time since 1979 and the 6th time ever (1950, 1951, 1953, 1960).
- When IU met Ohio State (No. 1), Michigan State (No. 7) and Iowa (No. 10), each team was undefeated, and No. 15 Michigan was 7-2. The four teams are a combined 44-6 (.880).
- The Hoosiers have set program records with 304 first downs and 954 total plays.
- Indiana is threatening all-time records in total points (2015: 434; 2013: 461), total yardage (2015: 5,889; 2013: 6,102), passing yardage (2015: 3,431; 2012: 3,734) and passing first downs (2015: 152; 2010: 167).
- IU tops the B1G in 20+ yard plays (74; T-17th nationally) and shares 1st in 20+ yard pass plays (54; T-20th).
- Sudfeld is the program's all-time leader with 58 passing touchdowns and 7,490 passing yards.
- He leads the Big Ten in passing yards per game (289.5; 17th nationally), passing yards (3,184; 23rd), total offense per game (293.2; 20th), total offense (3,225; 20th), passing efficiency (153.9; 17th), yards per completion (14.5; 4th) and yards per attempt (8.8; T-11th), shares 1st in touchdowns (24; T-23rd) and TD-INT ratio, shares 2nd in fewest interceptions (5) and is 4th in completion percentage (60.7).
- The Modesto, Calif., native is 1st in passing touchdowns (58), passing yardage (7,490), 350-yard games (5), 300-yard games (10), 200-yard games (18) and four-touchdown games (5), T-1st in 400-yard games (1), 250-yard games (12) and three-touchdown games (9), 2nd in completion percentage (60.6), T-2nd in completions (565), 3rd in total offense (7,602) and 5th in attempts (932) on IU's career lists in 36 games (25 starts).
- He was one of three finalists for the Wuerffel Trophy and one of 10 finalists for the Senior CLASS Award.

- In his last two outings, Sudfeld earned B1G Offensive Player of the Week honors, the first two of his career.
- Over those two games, he collected eight passing TDs and 10 total scores. He went 41-of-64 (64.1 percent) for 735 yards, good for a 201.8 passer rating.
- **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, is 3rd in the league in yards per catch (16.9), 4th in yards (914) and yards per game (76.2), and 10th in receptions (54) and receptions per game (4.5).
- In Big Ten games only, Cobbs was 1st in the league in yards per catch (18.1), 2nd in yards (670) and yards per game (83.8), and T-9th in receptions (37) and receptions per game (4.6).
- The Oak Park, Ill., native led the Hoosiers with career-highs in catches (9) and yards (192) at Maryland. The 192 yards rank 8th in school history and marked his third career 100-yard game, all this season.
- Earlier in the year, the sophomore became the first IU wide receiver with consecutive 100-yarders since current Denver Broncos wideout Cody Latimer tallied three straight in 2013 (Sept. 14, Sept. 21, Oct. 5).
- Redshirt junior **Ricky Jones** is 5th in the Big Ten with 16.3 yards per catch, 7th with 817 yards and 68.1 yards per game, T-9th with five scores, and 12th with 50 receptions and 4.2 catches per game.
- **Mitchell Paige** owns 46 catches (16th in B1G) for 589 yards (17th) and five TDs (T-9th).
- Indiana is one of only two teams in the B1G with three wideouts in the top 17 in receptions and yardage.
- Paige returned his second punt for a touchdown this year with a 51-yarder against Michigan. He is the first Hoosier with two punt return TDs in a season since 1990 (Rob Turner).
- The redshirt junior also returned a 91-yarder against Western Kentucky in game three and is T-2nd nationally with his two scores. Paige owns 199 yards (23rd nationally) on 17 returns, an 11.7 average (T-21st).
- Junior **Jordan Howard** is 2nd in the Big Ten with 134.8 rushing yards per game (9th nationally) and with 146.6 all-purpose yards per game (15th). He owns 1,213 rushing yards (3rd in Big Ten; 30th nationally) on 196 carries (3rd), good for a 6.2 average (3rd; 26th), with nine rushing touchdowns (7th) and 10 total TDs (T-7th).
- A candidate for the Doak Walker and Maxwell Awards, he became the 11th Hoosier (16th time) to reach 1,000 yards and is 12th on the program's all-time single-season list. He rushed for 1,587 yards at UAB in 2014.
- Coupled with Tevin Coleman's 2,036-yard season in 2014, IU has back-to-back 1,000-yard rushers for the first time since 2000 (Antwaan Randle El – 1,270) and 2001 (Levron Williams – 1,401). It is the first time running backs have reached consecutive 1,000-yard years since Vaughn Dunbar in 1990 (1,224) and 1991 (1,805).
- **Devine Redding** has provided a quality complement to Howard. The sophomore owns 785 yards (8th in B1G) on 191 carries (4th), a 4.1 average, with eight rushing touchdowns (T-8th).
- In the final two games, Redding carded his first two 100-yard games with 144 yards on 22 attempts (6.5 average) and a TD at Purdue and 130 yards on 24 carries (5.4) at Maryland.
- Indiana is the only team in the conference with two rushers in the top 10.
- IU has had a 100-yard rusher 19 times since the start of the 2014 season.
- During that span, the Hoosiers have rushed for 200-plus yards 17 times - T-7th nationally.
- Indiana shares 1st in the Big Ten and T-9th nationally with 13 sacks allowed.
- The Hoosiers have outscored their opponents 133-48 in the third quarter and have blanked seven teams.
- IU is 4th in the league (T-21st nationally) in the red zone, scoring 50 times (33 TDs) in 56 trips (89.3 percent).
- **Griffin Oakes** is 1st in the Big Ten in field goal percentage (88.0, T-7th nationally), 1st in field goals (22, T-6th), and 1st among B1G kickers (T-6th) and T-1st among all players (T-14th) with 9.5 points per game.
- He has 51 touchbacks on 83 kickoffs. The Greenwood, Ind., native leads the B1G (T-6th) with 51 touchbacks (83 kickoffs) and in touchback percentage (61.5, 16th), and is 2nd in kickoff average (63.5, 16th).
- Oakes is 22-of-25 (88.0) on field goals and 48-of-52 (92.3) on extra points in 2015. The redshirt sophomore is 1st in field goals, T-2nd in PATs and T-3rd in points (114) on IU's single season lists.
- In his career, Oakes is 7th on the program's career field goals chart, hitting 35-of-43 (81.4), and 7th on the extra points ledger, connecting on 71-of-75 (94.7).
- The Hoosiers are 3rd in the Big Ten and T-18th nationally at plus-8 in turnover margin. They are 3rd with 10 fumble recoveries (T-29th) to go along with nine interceptions.
- Indiana has scored 68 points off of the 19 takeaways, including two INT touchdown returns.
- IU saw its streak of 14 consecutive games with a takeaway snapped against Iowa in week nine. The Hoosiers have forced a turnover in 16-of-18 games and at least two in seven of its last 15.
- Indiana has turned it over 11 times (5 fumbles and 6 interceptions) - 1st in the B1G and T-5th nationally.
- IU is T-1st in the league (T-11th nationally) in fewest fumbles and T-3rd (T-11th) in fewest INTs.
- The Hoosiers are T-6th in the Big Ten in sacks (29; T-36th nationally) and T-7th in tackles for loss (79).
- Indiana's 29 sacks are the program's most since 2008 (31), 79 tackles for loss are the most since 2012 (86), and 19 takeaways are the most since 2009 (29).
- IU finished with 13 TFLs, including four sacks, at Michigan State, tied for the second-highest total in program history and the most since the school record 16 against Minnesota on Nov. 14, 1998.
- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** became the first Hoosier with 100 tackles since Matt Mayberry (108) in 2009. Oliver, who has 102 in 2015, is 10th in the Big Ten with 8.5 tackles per game.
- A six-time IU defensive player of the week, including four straight, Oliver has reached double-digit tackles in four of the last seven games and has paced the team in stops seven times.
- Oliver has had a hand in seven turnovers – four forced fumbles, T-7th nationally, two INTs and one recovery. In 26 career games, he has assisted on 10 takeaways - seven forced fumbles, two interceptions and one recovery.
- **Nick Mangieri** collected two sacks each against No. 1 Ohio State, at Penn State and at Purdue to increase his team-leading total to nine, which shares 5th in the Big Ten and 19th nationally.
- The senior defensive end has the most sacks for a Hoosier since Jammie Kirlew's 10.5 in 2008.
- True freshman safety **Jonathan Crawford** picked off his third pass vs. Michigan. He is T-8th in the Big Ten with the three INTs and is 3rd on the Hoosiers and 2nd among league freshmen with 67 tackles, 44 solos (1st).
- The Largo, Fla., native also has one sack, one forced fumble and one blocked kick.
- Redshirt sophomore cornerback **Rashard Fant** shares the national lead with 21 pass breakups. Fant is 6th on the Hoosiers with 50 tackles, 46 solo (2nd), with 1.5 tackles for loss and one fumble recovery.

**ALL-AMERICA HOOSIERS**

For the first time ever, a pair of Indiana offensive lineman earned first team All-America status in the same season. Senior left tackle **Jason Spriggs** collected recognition from the *Football Writers Association* and junior right guard **Dan Feeney** received accolades from *ESPN.com*.

They are the first IU o-lineman to garner first team honors since Gary Cassells in 1967.

Spriggs has also been honored by the *Walter Camp Football Foundation*, *Sporting News*, *Associated Press* and *SI.com*, while Feeney has secured additional honors from *CBS Sports*, *Associated Press* and *SI.com*.

The duo gives the Hoosiers three All-Americans over the past two seasons, joining 2014 unanimous and consensus selection and current Atlanta Falcons running back Tevin Coleman.

**ALL-B1G HOOSIERS**

A school record 12 Indiana football standouts were recognized by the Big Ten. Redshirt sophomore kicker **Griffin Oakes** was named the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year and first team All-Big Ten.

Redshirt junior right guard **Dan Feeney** and junior running back **Jordan Howard** collected first team All-Big Ten honors. Senior left tackle **Jason Spriggs** was a second team selection and senior quarterback **Nate Sudfeld** was a third team honoree.

Seven additional Hoosiers received honorable mention recognition: sophomore wide receiver **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, fifth-year senior tight end **Michael Cooper**, junior defensive tackle **Darius Latham**, senior defensive end **Nick Mangieri**, redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver**, redshirt junior return specialist **Mitchell Paige** and fifth-year senior bandit **Zack Shaw**.

Fifth-year senior center **Jake Reed** was named Indiana's Big Ten Sportsmanship Award winner.

**ALL-B1G HIGHLIGHTS**

- IU's 12 honorees are a school record.
- Coupled with Tevin Coleman (2014), this is the third time in school history two different IU running backs have earned first team honors in back-to-back years: Marv Woodson (1962) and Tom Nowatzke (1963-64); Vern Huffman (1936) and Corby Davis (1937).
- IU is the first Big Ten team with different running backs earning first team honors in back-to-back years since Ohio State in 2006 and 2007 (Antonio Pittman and Chris Wells).
- **Dan Feeney** is the first IU first team offensive lineman since 1989 (Ian Beckles and Ron Vargo).
- This is the first time two IU offensive linemen have made one of the teams since 1989.
- This is the first time IU has had four offensive players make one of the teams since 1989 (Beckles, Todd Oberdorf, Anthony Thompson and Vargo).
- This is the first time IU has had two offensive players on the first team since 2001 (Antwaan Randle El and Levron Williams).
- This is the first time IU has had three first team players since 2007 (James Hardy, Greg Middleton, Tracy Porter and Austin Starr).
- **Griffin Oakes** is the first IU first team kicker since 2007 (Starr).
- Oakes is the first IU kicker to ever win the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year.
- **Nate Sudfeld** is the first quarterback to make one of the teams since 2007 (Kellen Lewis, second team).

**ALL-B1G FROSH**

Three Indiana freshmen were recognized on the *BTN.com* All-Big Ten Freshman team. Safety **Jonathan Crawford** and offensive guard **Wes Martin** earned a spot on the team, while tight end **Brandon Knight** collected honorable mention honors. Twenty-four freshmen have been recognized under **Kevin Wilson**.

Crawford and Martin received honorable mention All-America honors from *Campus Insiders*, giving Wilson nine Freshman All-Americans since 2011.

**ACADEMIC ALL-B1G**

Eighteen Indiana football student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors. IU has set a program mark with 111 award winners in head coach **Kevin Wilson's** five seasons.

Twenty-four Hoosiers collected recognition in 2011, 22 in 2012, a school-record 26 in 2013 and 21 in 2014.

Additionally, Wilson has mentored two of the Indiana's nine Academic All-Americans - Adam Replogle (2012) and Mark Murphy (2013, 2014).

Student-athletes must be in at least their second academic year and carry a GPA of 3.0 or better.

#### UNDER KEVIN WILSON INDIANA HAS...

In head coach **Kevin Wilson's** five years, the Hoosiers offense has set 47 school records, including points, total yardage, passing yardage and rushing yardage in a single season.

During Wilson's tenure (2011-present), the Indiana offense has:

- Scored 35+ points 23 times
- Scored 40+ points 15 times
- Scored 45+ points 11 times
- Scored 50+ points 5 times
- Reached 500+ total yards 18 times
- Reached 550+ total yards 16 times
- Reached 600+ total yards 8 times
- Reached 650+ total yards 3 times
- Thrown for 300+ yards 21 times
- Thrown for 350+ yards 12 times
- Thrown for 400+ yards 5 times
- Posted 200+ rushing yards 28 times
- Posted 250+ rushing yards 15 times

#### BALANCED ATTACK

A misconception about the Indiana offense is that it is only a passing attack. Since **Kevin Wilson** arrived in Bloomington in 2011, Indiana has rushed for 200 yards 28 times and passed for 300 yards 21 times.

- Looking back to the start of the 2012 campaign, the Hoosiers rank first in the Big Ten in passing yardage per game, second in total yardage per game and fourth in rushing yardage per game.
- IU is the only conference team to rank in the top four in passing and rushing.
- Indiana ranks first in the Big Ten in total offense (490.8; 16th nationally), passing offense (285.9; 24th) and scoring offense (36.2; T-22nd), and second in rushing offense (204.8; T-30th).
- The Hoosiers have not led the conference in scoring offense since the league began using the entire season as the statistical champion in 1985.
- IU has not led the league in total offense since 1988.
- Indiana would be the first B1G team since Ohio State in 1995 to lead in total, passing and scoring offense.
- The Hoosiers have led the conference in passing offense three times in the past four seasons.
- In its wins over Southern Illinois, Western Kentucky and Purdue this year, IU reached both 300 passing and 200 rushing yards for the fifth, sixth and seventh times in the same game under Wilson.
- Against Purdue, Indiana went over 300 yards through the air and on the ground for the second time in school history (vs. Indiana State - Aug. 29, 2013).
- Since the start of the 2014 campaign, the Hoosiers have rushed for 200-plus yards 17 times, which shares seventh nationally. They have had at least one 100-yard rusher 19 times over that span.
- In 2014, Indiana sat ninth nationally (3rd in the Big Ten) with 263.6 rushing yards per game and fifth in the league with 405.0 total yards per game.
- IU gained 200 rushing yards in 10 of 12 games, averaged 5.9 yards per carry (8th nationally, 2nd in the Big Ten) and scored 29 times on the ground.
- The team's seven straight 200-yard games to open 2014 were a school single-season record.

• Dating back to the 2013 finale, the Hoosiers rushed for 200 yards in eight straight games, which tied a program record (1989-90).

• In 2013, Indiana set single-season program records with 6,102 total yards, 508.5 total yards per game, 461 points, 38.4 points per game, 36 passing touchdowns and 62 total touchdowns.

• It marked the first time in school history IU averaged over 300 passing yards and 200 rushing yards.

• The Hoosiers were one of only three teams nationally to average 300 passing yards and 200 rushing yards.

• Indiana led the Big Ten in passing, finished second in scoring and total offense, and fourth in rushing.

• IU tied for ninth nationally in total offense, 17th in passing, 16th in scoring and 30th in rushing.

• The Hoosiers were just one of six teams in the nation to rank in the top 30 in total, passing, scoring and rushing offense.

#### SUDFELD CLOSING CAREER IN STYLE

**Nate Sudfeld**, Indiana's 2015 most valuable player, is the program's all-time leader with 58 passing touchdowns and 7,490 passing yards.

• Sudfeld leads the Big Ten in passing yards per game (289.5; 17th nationally), passing yards (3,184; 23rd), total offense per game (293.2; 20th), total offense (3,225; 20th), passing efficiency (153.9; 17th), yards per completion (14.5; 4th) and yards per attempt (8.8; T-11th), shares first in touchdowns (24; T-23rd) and TD-INT ratio, shares second in fewest interceptions (5) and is fourth in completion percentage (60.7).

• The senior has racked up these numbers despite missing six quarters of action due to injury.

• Over the final two weeks of the season, Sudfeld earned Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week honors, the first two of his career.

• In those two games, he collected eight passing TDs and 10 total scores. He went 41-of-64 (64.1 percent) for 735 yards, good for a 201.8 passer rating.

• En route to the Hoosiers third consecutive Old Oaken Bucket victory over Purdue, Sudfeld finished with 350 yards, the fifth-highest total of his career, on 18-of-29 passing with a career-high-tying four touchdowns and one rushing TD. He also matched a career-high with five total scores (3rd time in his career) and posted a career-best 209.0 passing efficiency mark.

• The previous week at Maryland, Sudfeld matched the four passing touchdowns and five total TDs. He went 23-of-35 (65.7) for 385 yards, the second-highest total of his career, and carded a 195.8 passer rating.

• His six 300-yard games (T-15th nationally) and four 350-yard games (T-9th) lead the conference.

• Sudfeld now has one 400-yard game, five 350-yard games and 10 300-yard games, five four passing touchdown games and nine three passing TD games, and 12 40-plus yard scores and seven 50-yarders, including three 70-yarders (70, 72, 76), in his career.

• Against Rutgers in week seven, Sudfeld set career-highs in completions (32), passing yardage (464), total yardage (456) and touchdowns accounted for (5), and he tied his career-highs in attempts (42) and passing scores (4) en route to a 190.9 passing efficiency mark.

• His 464 yards are the 20th-most in the FBS and a Big Ten best in 2015, and rank second to Ben Chappell (480) on the Indiana single-game list. His 32 completions share second, his 456 total yards are fifth and his four TDs share sixth.

• Overall in 2015, Sudfeld is 219-of-361 (60.7 percent) for 3,184 yards with 24 passing scores, five interceptions

and a 153.9 passing efficiency mark. He also has a career-high five rushing touchdowns.

- In the 48-point outburst against Southern Illinois, Sudfeld threw for 349 yards, the sixth-highest total of his career, on 19-of-32, with a 57-yard TD.

- He added a career-high 46 rushing yards, including a career-long 21-yarder, for 395 total yards, the third-highest total of his career.

- Sudfeld carded the fourth-highest passing total of his career with 355 yards on 20-of-27 and three touchdowns in the Western Kentucky win.

- At No. 7 Michigan State, he tossed for 308 yards on 23-of-37 (62.2) in addition to three scores.

- Sudfeld, who was on the watch list for the Maxwell Award and one of 15 candidates for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, suffered a season-ending shoulder injury at Iowa in week six last year.

- Before his injury, Sudfeld went 101-of-167 (60.5) for 1,151 yards with five scores and three interceptions.

### CLIMBING THE CHARTS

One of the most decorated quarterbacks in Indiana history, **Nate Sudfeld** is first in passing touchdowns (58), passing yardage (7,490), 350-yard games (5), 300-yard games (10), 200-yard games (18) and four-touchdown games (5), tied for first in 400-yard games (1), 250-yard games (12) and three-touchdown games (9), second in completion percentage (60.6), tied for second in completions (565), third in total offense (7,602) and fifth in attempts (932) on IU's career lists in 36 games (25 starts).

- In his career, Sudfeld is 565-of-932 (60.6) with 7,490 yards, 58 passing TDs, 18 INTs, eight rushing scores and a 144.8 passing efficiency mark.

- Sudfeld's four 350-yard games are first, six 300-yard games share first, 3,184 yards are second, 24 touchdowns share second, 3,225 total yards are third, 219 completions are fifth and his 361 attempts are eighth on the program's single-season list.

### SUMMER OF SUDFELD

**Nate Sudfeld** enjoyed a rewarding summer. The senior quarterback received an invitation to serve as a counselor at the prestigious Manning Academy in July.

- He finished second among the college quarterbacks in the Papa John's Quarterback Challenge, a skills competition, and got the opportunity to talk some Xs & Os with Peyton and Eli Manning.

- Later in the month, Sudfeld received the opportunity to pick the brain of another all-pro, Andrew Luck.

- Luck hosted his annual Change The Play initiative in Bloomington, and Sudfeld worked the camp for the second straight year.

- He wrapped up his summer as one of the co-speakers at the Big Ten Kickoff Luncheon.

- Sudfeld talked about the service trip he took to Uganda over 2015 spring break, his second trip to the African country. He also traveled there at the age of 14.

- A three-time Academic All-Big Ten member, Sudfeld was one of three finalists for the Wuerffel Trophy and one of 10 finalists for the Senior CLASS Award®. He was a semifinalist for the National Football Foundation's National Scholar-Athlete Award and a nominee for the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team®.

### EARLY SUCCESS

In 2013, **Nate Sudfeld** completed 194-of-322 (60.2) for 2,523 yards with 21 touchdowns, nine interceptions and a 142.0 pass efficiency rating.

- He finished fourth in scores and completion percentage, seventh in yardage and ninth in completions on Indiana's single-season charts.

- A native of Modesto, Calif., Sudfeld set season-highs with 31 completions, 42 attempts, 363 passing yards, 398 total yards and four TDs (tied) against Navy.

- He earned his first career start against Bowling Green and finished with 335 yards on 17-of-26 passing with two passing strikes and one rushing score.

- Sudfeld became the third true freshman quarterback to play at IU in 2012. He threw for 632 yards, completed 51-of-82 (62.2) with seven touchdowns and one interception in seven games.

- The 14th-rated quarterback nationally by *ESPN.com* set school single-season records in passing yards (2,332), passing scores (29) and passing yards per game (233.2) at Modesto Christian High School.

- Sudfeld's brothers, Zach and Matthew, are twins and no strangers to football. Zach is a tight end for the New York Jets and starred at Nevada (2007-12). Matthew was a wide receiver at Brown (2007-11).

### SPRIGGS & FEENEY PACK A 1-2 PUNCH

Senior left tackle **Jason Spriggs**, a first team All-American and one of six 2015 Outland Trophy semifinalists, and redshirt junior right guard **Dan Feeney**, a second team All-American and a first team All-Big Ten selection, anchor one of the nation's top offensive lines.

- In 2015, the duo has allowed two sacks (Spriggs) in 431 called pass attempts.

- Feeney, an Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award Watch Lister, owns a team-best 91 knockdowns in 967 snaps and Spriggs has 72 in 972.

- During the Hoosiers spring testing, Spriggs ran a 4.82 40-yard dash (would have been 1st among 2015 NFL Combine participants), posted a 37.5 vertical leap (1st), benched 455 pounds and 33 reps on the 225-pound bench (4th), and clean lifted 365 pounds.

- He started 30 consecutive games to begin his career and has made 46 starts in 47 games at left tackle.

- The Concord, Ind., native allowed just two sacks in 689 snaps and recorded 45 knockdowns in 2014.

- Feeney has allowed just one sack in 36 career starts at right guard (2,703 snaps).

- The Orland Park, Ill., product started all 12 games in 2014 and led the offensive line with 80 knockdowns en route to honorable mention All-Big Ten accolades.

- Spriggs and Feeney collected freshman All-America honors after starting all 12 games in 2012, an Indiana true freshman record for an offensive lineman.

### IT STARTS UP FRONT

**Greg Frey**, a nominee for the 2015 Broyles Award, is in his fifth season as Indiana's offensive line coach. During his tenure, he has mentored some of the top lines in the country, and this year is no different.

- The unit owns 141 career starts and 221 games played among 10 players, led by left tackle **Jason Spriggs** (46 starts) and right guard **Dan Feeney** (36).

- Center **Jake Reed** (21) and right tackle **Dimitric Camiel** (17) round out the returning starters. Redshirt freshman **Wes Martin** started the first six games and redshirt junior **Jacob Bailey** (11) has started the last six at left guard this season.

- That group shares the Big Ten lead and ninth nationally allowing just 13 sacks this year.

- Seven of the linemen currently bench over 400 pounds and Martin paces the group with a 500 bench.

• Frey has coached 19 all-conference honorees in his career. Spriggs (2012-15), Feeney (2012, 2014-15), center Will Matte (2012) and center Collin Rahrigh (2013-14) have earned All-Big Ten recognition.

• Martin received freshman All-Big Ten accolades in 2015, joining Bailey (2013), Feeney (2012), Rogers (2013), Spriggs (2012) and Bernard Taylor (2011).

• Since the start of 2012, the Hoosiers rank first in the Big Ten in passing yardage, second in total yardage and fourth in rushing yardage per game.

• Indiana is the only conference team to rank in the top four in passing and rushing.

## JORDAN RULES

Looking to continue the record-setting ground dominance displayed in 2014, Indiana has done just that in 2015, led by junior **Jordan Howard**, a transfer from UAB. Howard joined the Hoosiers in the spring.

• Despite missing 18 quarters this season due to injury, Howard is second in the Big Ten with 134.8 rushing yards per game (9th nationally) and with 146.6 all-purpose yards per game (15th).

• He owns 1,213 rushing yards (3rd in B1G; 30th nationally) on 196 carries (3rd), a 6.2 average (3rd; 26th), with nine rushing touchdowns (7th), 10 total TDs (T-7th) and 11 receptions for 106 yards with one score.

• A candidate for the Doak Walker and Maxwell Awards, Howard became the 11th Hoosier (16th time) to reach 1,000 yards in a single year and is 12th on the program's all-time single-season list. He rushed for 1,587 yards at UAB in 2014.

• Back to full strength after suffering an ankle injury in week five against No. 1 Ohio State, Howard collected 174 yards rushing on 22 carries (7.9 average) to go along with two touchdowns, from 37 and 29 yards, against No. 10 Iowa.

• The Hawkeyes entered the game allowing one rushing score and 85.8 yards per game. Maryland quarterback Perry Hills was the only player to rush for over 100 yards (104 on Oct. 31).

• Howard followed that effort up with 238 yards, the second-most ever by a Michigan opponent, on 35 carries (6.8) with three TDs, two rushing, against the No. 15 Wolverines.

• His 238 yards are his most this season, the second-most in his career and rank 10th on the all-time IU list, and his 35 carries are his most this year and tied for the second-most in his career.

• U-M had not allowed a 100-yard rusher since the final game of 2014 and entered the game allowing 80.6 yards per game and 2.6 yards per carry.

• Howard owns 17 career 100-yard games, including in 10 of his last 13, and 12 150-yarders. He has six 100-yarders, five 150-yarders (T-4th nationally) and two 200-yarders (T-6th) this year, is fifth on the school's single-season list in 100-yard games and shares fourth in 150-yard and 200-yard games.

• Of his 196 carries, 67 (34.2 percent) have resulted in either a first down or a score and 176 (89.8) have gone for positive yardage.

• Since the start of 2013, Howard is first nationally among active running backs with 12 150-yard games, third with 647 attempts, fourth with 3,681 rushing yards, fifth with 17 100-yard games, sixth with 115.0 rushing yards per game seventh with 3,942 yards from scrimmage, tied for seventh with three 200-yard games, ninth with 123.2 yards from scrimmage per game, 10th with 3,942 all-purpose yards and 11th with 123.2 all-purpose yards per game.

• He has averaged 5.7 yards per rush and scored 27 total TDs (24 rushing and 3 receiving).

## QUICK STUDY

• **Jordan Howard** became the only FBS player in the last 20 seasons with 140-plus rushing yards in each of his first four games with a program.

• In his IU debut, Howard rushed for 145 yards on 20 carries (7.2 average) with a career-high three scores, including the game-winner with :58 remaining.

• His 145 yards are the most for a Hoosier in his debut since Alex Smith's 152 vs. Cincinnati on Sept. 3, 1994.

• He followed that up with 159 yards on 27 attempts (5.9) in the Florida International victory and the second 200-yard game of his career with 203 yards on 31 carries (6.5) in the Western Kentucky win.

• Howard carried the ball 33 times for 168 yards (5.1) and a touchdown in the victory at Wake Forest en route to Big Ten co-Offensive Player of the Week honors.

## HOWARD HEADS NORTH FROM UAB

• In 2014, **Jordan Howard** earned first team All-Conference USA recognition, posting 1,587 yards on 306 carries (5.2 average) with 13 touchdowns.

• Eighty-seven of his 306 attempts (28.4 percent) resulted in first downs.

• The Gardendale, Ala., native ranked seventh nationally with 132.3 rushing yards per game, 14th in rushing yards, 16th with 138.3 yards from scrimmage per game, 24th with 138.3 all-purpose yards per game, 25th with 1,659 yards from scrimmage, tied for 26th in rushing TDs and tied for 30th with 14 total scores.

• Howard tallied eight 100-yard games, including four straight to end the year, and five 150-yarders, with a career-high 262 yards in the win at Southern Miss.

• He also recorded five games with 30-plus attempts, including a career-high 39 vs. Marshall.

• En route to Conference USA All-Freshman team accolades in 2013, Howard collected 881 yards on 145 rushes (6.1) with two touchdowns.

## GRANDPA JONES KNOWS BEST

**Ricky Jones** came to Bloomington in 2012 with high expectations and the hopes of having a breakout campaign as a true freshman. However, the redshirt junior wideout suffered a broken ankle, which sidelined him for the season, in his very first game.

• The injury limited Jones the following season and he struggled to regain 100 percent health in 2014.

• Jones, his teammates and the coaching staff insisted he was back and better than ever during preseason camp, and he has proved them correct.

• A Biletnikoff Watch List member, Jones is fifth in the Big Ten with 16.3 yards per catch, seventh with 817 yards and 68.1 yards per game, tied for ninth with five scores, and 12th with 50 receptions and 4.2 catches per game.

• He has three 100-yard games, five 50-yard games, and he has reached five catches six times. Jones has paced the team in receptions on six occasions and in yardage three times.

• The Sarasota, Fla., native led all power five conference receivers with 186 yards on six receptions, with his first score from 57 yards out, in the Southern Illinois win.

• Jones added a 71-yarder that set up Indiana's game-winning score with :58 remaining.

• His 186 yards rank 10th on IU's single-game list and were the most for a Hoosier since Cody Latimer had 189 vs. Illinois on Nov. 9, 2013.

- Jones, the eldest statesman in the receivers room who is affectionately called "grandpa" by his teammates, entered the contest with 60 yards, four catches and zero TDs in his entire career.
- In the win vs. WKU, he pulled in five balls for 126 yards, including a 69-yarder, with an 18-yard touchdown.
- Jones collected his third 100-yard game with six receptions for 119 yards and a 38-yard score vs. Rutgers.

### OAKES NAMED BIG KICKER OF THE YEAR

**Griffin Oakes** became the first Indiana kicker to collect the Big Ten's Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year award and the first kicker since Austin Starr in 2007 to earn first team All-Big Ten honors.

- Oakes is first in the Big Ten in field goal percentage (88.0, T-7th nationally), first in field goals (22, T-6th), and first among B1G kickers (T-6th) and tied for first among all players (T-14th) with 9.5 points per game.
- He leads the B1G (T-6th) with 51 touchbacks (83 kickoffs) and in touchback percentage (61.5, 16th), and is second in kickoff average (63.5, 16th).
- After making a pair of field goals in the Old Oaken Bucket victory at Purdue, Oakes set the school's single-season mark with his 22nd three-pointer and is 22-of-25 (88.0) overall and 48-of-52 (92.3) on extra points.
- He is also tied for second in PATs and tied for third in points (114) on the Hoosiers single-season lists.
- The Greenwood, Ind., native earned back-to-back B1G Special Teams Player of the Week honors following the Michigan and Maryland games, pushing his career total to three.
- Against both teams, Oakes matched a program single-game record with four field goals (8th time ever) in four tries.
- IU recovered an onside kick against the Terrapins to make Oakes 2-of-2 in 2015 and 5-of-6 overall.
- He converted 11 straight field goals before a miss at Purdue, the second-longest streak in program history.
- In his career, Oakes is seventh on the school's career field goals chart, hitting 35-of-43 (81.4), and seventh on the extra points ledger, connecting on 71-of-75 (94.7).
- Oakes set a program record with a 58-yarder against Maryland last year, one of his 13 field goals, which shares 10th on Indiana's all-time list.
- He arrived in Bloomington as a walk-on in 2013, redshirted that season, took over duties in week three in 2014, and earned a scholarship prior to 2015.

### INSIDE THE DEFENSE

Indiana returned five starters, 21 letterwinners and 98 career starts on defense. Game 13's depth chart features three seniors (2 fifth-year), six juniors, 11 sophomores and eight freshmen (5 true).

### OPPORTUNISTIC OLIVER

After sustaining a season-ending ACL injury in week three last season, redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** has returned better than ever in 2015.

- A six-time IU defensive player of the week, including four straight, Oliver has reached double-digit tackles in four of the last seven weeks, and five times overall and in his career.
- Oliver shared game-high honors for the third time and paced the Hoosiers for the seventh time this year with 11 stops in the team's victory at Purdue.
- He made eight solo tackles and added one stop for loss and his second interception of 2015 and his career.
- Oliver owns the team lead with 102 tackles (9th in the Big Ten) and 61 solos (5th), and he has had a hand in

seven turnovers — four forced fumbles, tied for seventh nationally, two INTs and one recovery.

- The Hamilton, Ohio, native also has one sack, 6.5 tackles for loss (4th on the team) and one pass breakup.
- Oliver became the first Hoosier since Matt Mayberry (108) in 2009 to reach the century mark in tackles.
- A week after he matched a career-high with two stops for loss and collected seven tackles and one forced fumble at No. 7 Michigan State, he posted a team-high 11 stops against No. 10 Iowa.
- Oliver made 13 tackles, with a half-tackle for loss and one pass breakup at Penn State, and bested those numbers with a career-high 14 stops and 12 solos, one for loss, and the first interception of his career against Rutgers in week seven.
- He forced a fumble vs. No. 1 Ohio State and finished with six tackles.
- In 26 career games, Oliver has assisted on 10 takeaways with a team-best seven forced fumbles to go along with two picks and one recovery.
- Oliver displayed a knack for finding the ball before his arrival in Bloomington. At Hamilton High School, the two-time first team all-conference selection forced seven fumbles, recovered five and picked off a pass for 13 takeaways.
- In his first start this season on the weak-side against Southern Illinois, Oliver delivered 10 stops and a career-best two forced fumbles.
- He led the Hoosiers with seven tackles and one fumble recovery in the week two win over Florida International.
- Three of his takeaways have resulted in touchdowns, including the game-winner against FIU.
- Before his injury last season, Oliver was a *BTN.com* honorable mention All-Big Ten Freshman team member back in 2013.

### YOU ARE THE MAN...GIERI

A 2015 honorable mention All-Big Ten selection and a member of the Ted Hendricks Award Watch List, **Nick Mangieri** started 10 times and played in 22 games at defensive end in his first two seasons.

- He has returned to the line in a big way in 2015 after playing the bandit position last year.
- After posting three, two-sack games (career-high) vs. No. 1 Ohio State, at Penn State and at Purdue, Mangieri finished the regular season with nine, which leads the Hoosiers, is tied for fifth in the Big Ten and 19th nationally, and is sixth on IU's single-season list.
- Mangieri, who has at least one sack in six games this year, has the most sacks for a Hoosier in a single campaign since Jammie Kirlew's 10.5 in 2008.
- The senior also contributed a career-high three tackles for loss and six tackles in the Purdue win.
- Mangieri added one forced fumble against the Buckeyes, giving him two in 2015 and putting him in a tie for 10th in the conference.
- He has 48 tackles, 31 solo, both highs among Indiana defensive linemen, to go along with his nine sacks, 11 tackles for loss (1st on the Hoosiers), two forced fumbles (2nd), one fumble recovery (T-1st), five pass breakups (T-2nd), four quarterback hurries (1st) and one blocked kick (T-2nd).
- A three-time IU defensive player of the week in 2015, Mangieri is Indiana's active career sacks leader with 14 and is second with 20 tackles for loss.
- In the season opener vs. Southern Illinois, he made a career-high and tied for game-high honors with 11 stops, including a career-best nine solos, and one sack.

• Week two saw more Mangieri domination, as he set up a pair of touchdowns, including the game-winner in the fourth quarter, against Florida International.

• The Peoria, Ill., native forced a fumble after recording a sack with 10:09 remaining. In the third, he recovered the first fumble of his career.

• Mangieri remained on a roll with a fourth quarter blocked field goal, the first of his career, in the team's three-point win over Western Kentucky.

• He netted one sack, broke up a career-high-tying two passes, added five tackles and tallied one quarterback hurry in the victory at Wake Forest.

• Last season, Mangieri started all 12 games and recorded 37 tackles, 19 solo, two sacks, two tackles for loss, one INT, three QBHs and two PBUs.

• Mangieri made 10 starts in 2013 and collected 26 stops, 15 solo, three sacks, six TFLs, one pick, one forced fumble and five pass breakups.

• As a true freshman in 2012, Mangieri played in 10 games and finished with 12 tackles, one for loss.

• Mangieri's brother, P.J., was a long snapper at Nebraska (2009-12). His uncles, Ed and Dan Sutter, both played linebacker at Northwestern. Ed played five seasons in the NFL (Cleveland, Baltimore and Atlanta).

### SHAW THAT STIRS THE DRINK

**Zack Shaw**, a 2015 All-Big Ten honorable mention selection, has appeared in all 48 games in his career following a redshirt year in 2011.

• He moved from linebacker to defensive end during 2012 spring practice before finding a home at the bandit position last season.

• Shaw recorded his first career two-sack game and set a career-high with three tackles for loss to go along with six stops at Penn State in week six this year.

• He is second on the team with 10.5 TFLs, shares second with four sacks and has 46 tackles.

• Shaw has at least one stop for loss in eight of his last nine games, including a pair at No. 7 Michigan State in week eight.

• He leads the club with 24.5 career tackles for loss and is second with nine sacks. Shaw also owns 123 tackles, 79 solo, with a pair of fumble recoveries.

• In conference games only, Shaw paced the Hoosiers and shared 10th in the league with 9.5 TFLs and tied for second with three sacks.

• Shaw has recorded at least 4.5 tackles for loss in each of his four campaigns.

• As a freshman, the Coshocton, Ohio, native earned a spot on the *BTN.com* All-Big Ten Freshman team.

• Shaw starred at Coshocton High School, where he finished as the school's all-time leader with 450 overall tackles from 2008-10.

• As a senior, he collected first team All-Ohio Division IV, East District Player of the Year, first team East District linebacker and league player of the year.

### STOUT UP FRONT

The Hoosiers defensive line has recorded 16 of Indiana's 29 sacks (55.2 percent) and 34 of its 79 tackles for loss (43.0) this season.

• In 2014, it accounted for 12.5 of IU's 23 sacks (54.3) and 32 of the team's 77 TFLs (41.6).

• Junior defensive tackle **Darius Latham** has started 19 games and appeared in 34 in his career.

• A 2015 honorable mention All-Big Ten selection, Latham is third on the team with 10 tackles for loss despite missing two games. He leads the interior linemen with 28 tackles to go along with four sacks.

• The Indianapolis native, who also starred on the hardwood at North Central High School, matched a career-high with six stops at No. 7 Michigan State.

• Latham collected five tackles, 2.5 for loss, and blocked a pair of extra points the previous weekend against Rutgers.

• He posted a career-best three TFLs and one sack in the win at Wake Forest.

• In his 10 appearances, he recorded at least one sack in four games and one tackle for loss in seven.

• He is third among active Hoosiers with 7.5 sacks and 18.5 tackles for loss in his career.

• Fifth-year senior nose tackle **Adarius Rayner** leads the group having played in 42 games with 19 starts.

• The Largo, Fla., native has 11 stops for loss and four sacks in his career.

• A honorable mention freshman All-American in 2013, redshirt junior defensive tackle **Ralph Green III** has collected 60 tackles, three sacks and 12.5 TFLs in 34 games (12 starts).

### SIMMONS SETTLED IN

**T.J. Simmons** is Indiana's leader with 209 tackles and 122 solo stops in his career.

• The junior, who has started 34 of the 36 games in which he has appeared, also owns six sacks (4th on team), 16 tackles for loss (4th), two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

• At No. 7 Michigan State, Simmons recorded a game- and career-high 15 stops, his third career double-digit game, and added career-bests with 2.5 sacks (18 yards) and four TFLs (21 yards).

• His four tackles for loss share fifth on IU's single-game list and are the most for a Hoosier since Adam Replogle had four at Penn State on Nov. 17, 2012.

• Simmons opened 2015 with a game-high-tying 11 stops, seven solos, in the SIU win and in week five, he made seven tackles, all solos, vs. No. 1 Ohio State.

• The Lakeland, Fla., native is second on the team with 69 stops to go along with 34 solos, three sacks (T-4th on the team) and six TFLs (5th) in 2015.

• He started 11 games in the middle last year and paced the team in tackles six times, including twice with game-high honors. He finished second on the club with 72 stops and 46 solos.

• A four-time IU defensive player of the week, he added two sacks, 6.5 for loss, and his fumble recovery. Simmons topped Indiana and tied for eighth in the Big Ten with a pair of forced fumbles.

• Simmons became the first IU true freshman to start at middle linebacker since John Kerr (2002). He started all 12 games, which tied a Hoosiers freshman record.

• In 2013, he was the Big Ten's leading freshman tackler with 5.7 per game and made 68 stops overall, 42 solo, with one sack and 3.5 TFLs.

• *CollegeFootballNews.com* named Simmons an honorable mention freshman All-American and *ESPN.com* selected him freshman All-Big Ten.

• Simmons enrolled in the spring semester out of Lakeland High School, where he finished with 325 tackles and was a first team all-state selection.

• The 6-0, 240-pounder has recorded at least seven tackles 14 times in his career.

### TIPPING THE SCALES

After missing the first two games of 2015, sophomore linebacker **Tegray Scales** returned to action in week three against Western Kentucky and has paid big dividends ever since.

- Scales finished the regular season reaching seven tackles in four of the team's final five games, including a nine-tackle, one-interception effort at Purdue.
- The pick was the fifth of his career, which leads all Hoosiers, and his second of the campaign, which shares second on the team.
- In 10 games, he has 56 stops (5th on the team), 35 solo (5th), three sacks (T-4th), 5.5 tackles for loss (6th) and four pass breakups (T-4th).
- Scales led the team with eight tackles, including a career-high seven solos, with one stop for loss against No. 15 Michigan and followed that up with a team-high-sharing seven tackles, a half-TFL and one pass breakup in the win at Maryland.
- The sophomore recorded nine stops and his first two-sack game in the win at Wake Forest.
- He collected an interception the next week vs. No. 1 Ohio State and added seven tackles, one sack and two TFLs at No. 7 Michigan State.
- Scales shared the top spot (T-9th overall) among Big Ten freshmen and tied for the team lead with three picks en route to freshman All-America honors in 2014.
- He posted 46 stops, including a career-high 11 at Bowling Green, 29 solo, with two sacks, 4.5 tackles for loss, two quarterback hurries and one PBU.
- The Cincinnati native earned Big Ten co-Freshman of the Week honors after he recorded five tackles, one sack and one QBH in the win at No. 18 Missouri.

#### OPENING ACT

In 2015, 12 true freshmen have played: CB **Andre Brown, Jr.**, S **Jameel Cook, Jr.**, S **Jonathan Crawford**, LS **Dan Godsil**, CB **Tyler Green**, WR **Donavan Hale**, OL/TE **Brandon Knight**, RB **Mike Majette**, DE **Jacob Robinson**, WR/CB **Leon Thornton III**, WR **Nick Westbrook** and CB **Devonte Williams**.

- Indiana has fielded 60 true freshmen in head coach **Kevin Wilson's** tenure.
- Thirteen true freshmen played in 2014, eight in 2013, 11 in 2012 and 16 in 2011.

#### EIGHT WALK-ONS AWARDED SCHOLARSHIPS

Fifth-year senior tight end **Michael Cooper**, redshirt sophomore cornerback **Ben Bach**, redshirt sophomore kicker **Griffin Oakes** and redshirt freshman running back **Ricky Brookins** were awarded scholarships as the Hoosiers broke preseason camp.

- Fifth-year senior punter **Erich Toth**, senior tight end **Anthony Corsaro**, senior wide receiver **Damon Graham** and redshirt junior wide receiver **Mitchell Paige** previously earned scholarships and have done so once again for the 2015 season.
- A former walk-on himself at North Carolina, head coach **Kevin Wilson** awards scholarships on a yearly basis. Now in his fifth season, 40 players have been rewarded since his arrival in Bloomington.

#### NFL BOUND

In head coach **Kevin Wilson's** tenure, 16 Hoosiers have either moved on to the NFL or received camp invites, including four in 2015.

- Running back **Tevin Coleman** was selected 73rd overall by the Atlanta Falcons in the 2015 NFL Draft after the Denver Broncos picked wide receiver **Cody Latimer** 56th the previous year.
- Latimer became the first Hoosier taken in the second round since St. Louis Rams offensive lineman **Rodger Saffold** in 2010 (33rd pick).

- Tight end **Ted Bolser**, joined Latimer, as he went to the Washington Redskins with the second pick of the seventh round.

- Wide receiver **Kofi Hughes** (Bears, Texans, Redskins), running back **Stephen Houston** (Steelers, Patriots) and kicker **Mitch Ewald** (Broncos) signed free agent deals in 2014, while center **Collin Rahrig** (Steelers), defensive tackle **Bobby Richardson** (Saints) and wide receiver **Shane Wynn** (Browns, Jets, Chargers) inked free agent deals this year.

- Currently, eight former Hoosiers appear on NFL rosters. Offensive lineman **Andrew McDonald** (Chargers), cornerback **Tracy Porter** (Bears), Saffold (Rams) and return specialist **Marcus Thigpen** (Bills) join Coleman, Latimer, Richardson and Wynn.

#### COLEMAN REACHES 2,000

Tevin Coleman became the 18th player in FBS history to rush for 2,000 yards (2,036) last season. The total set a school record, is 15th on the FBS all-time list and sixth in Big Ten history.

- Coleman was Indiana's third unanimous and consensus All-American in 2014, finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting, was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award, earned an invitation to the 2015 NFL Combine and was drafted in the third round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons.

- The Tinley Park, Ill., native finished second nationally in rushing yards (2,036), rushing yards per game (169.7), all-purpose yards per game (181.4) and yards from scrimmage per game (181.4), third in yards from scrimmage (2,177), fifth in all-purpose yards (2,177) and rushing yards per carry (7.54), tied for 19th in rushing touchdowns (15) and tied for 25th in total touchdowns (15).

- On the Hoosiers career lists, Coleman is first with 7.1 yards per attempt, fourth with 28 rushing TDs, fifth with 3,219 rushing yards and 4,292 all-purpose yards, and tied for sixth with 29 total scores.

- Coleman had 15 career 100-yard games, which is fifth in the Indiana record book, eight 150-yard games (third), five 200-yard games (first), one 250-yard game (tied for second) and one 300-yard game (tied for first).

#### THE MISSOURI WIN

D'Angelo Roberts scored from three yards out with 22 seconds left to lift Indiana to a 31-27 victory over No. 18 Missouri on Sept. 20, 2014.

- The Hoosiers became the first Big Ten team to ever defeat a ranked SEC team on the road.
- IU claimed its first win over a top 20 team since 2006 (No. 15 Iowa, 31-28, Oct. 14) and its first on the road since 1987 (No. 9 Ohio State, 31-10, on Oct. 10).
- Indiana did not turn the ball over, snapping the Tigers streak of 47 consecutive games with a takeaway.

#### TOP RECRUITING CLASSES

**Kevin Wilson** and his staff have assembled the highest-rated recruiting classes in school history over the past three seasons.

- The 2013 and 2014 classes were ranked in the top 40 nationally, which is also a program first.
- The hard work on the recruiting trail has paid off, as eight Hoosiers earned All-Big Ten freshman recognition in 2013, five in 2014 and three more this year.
- Wilson has coached nine freshman All-Americans and 24 freshman All-Big Ten honorees during his tenure in Bloomington.

- One of the most innovative and prolific offensive minds in the country, Kevin Wilson was named Indiana University's 28th head football coach on Dec. 7, 2010.
- Guided the Hoosiers to their 10th bowl appearance in program history and their first since 2007.
- Mentored three first team All-Americans, offensive linemen Dan Feeney and Jason Spriggs in 2015, and Tevin Coleman in 2014.
- Spriggs and Feeney became the first offensive line tandem to secure first team honors in the same season in program history and just the sixth pair of teammates to ever accomplish the feat.
- Sixteen IU standouts have either moved on to the NFL or received camp invites, including four in 2015.
- Wide receiver Cody Latimer was selected 56th overall by the Denver Broncos in 2014 and running back Tevin Coleman was selected 73rd overall by the Atlanta Falcons in 2015.
- Thirty-eight Hoosiers have earned All-Big Ten honors under Wilson, highlighted by a school record 12 this year.
- Griffin Oakes was named the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year and first team All-Big Ten.
- Feeney and running back Jordan Howard collected first team All-Big Ten honors. Spriggs was a second team selection and senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld was a third team honoree.
- In Wilson's tenure, the offense has set 47 school records, including points, total yardage, passing yardage and rushing yardage in a single season.
- The Hoosiers won the Old Oaken Bucket for the third straight year for the first time since 1944-47.
- Indiana won its final two games for the first time since 2001, its final two road games for the first time since 1982 and its final two games with both being on the road for the first time since 1946.
- IU had not won back-to-back Big Ten games since 2012, two Big Ten road games in the same year since 2001, back-to-back Big Ten road games since 1993 and three road games in a single season since 1994.
- Coleman became the 18th player in FBS history to rush for 2,000 yards (2,036), which set a school record, is 15th on the FBS all-time list and sixth in Big Ten history. He was IU's third unanimous and consensus All-American, finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award.
- Assembled the highest-rated recruiting classes in school history over the past three seasons. The hard work on the recruiting trail has paid off, as eight Indiana freshmen earned All-Big Ten freshman recognition in 2013, five in 2014 and three in 2015.
- Coached nine freshman All-Americans and 24 freshman All-Big Ten honorees overall in his five seasons.
- Adam Replogle (2012) and safety Mark Murphy (2013, 2014) became the eighth and ninth IU players to collect Academic All-America honors. Murphy is just the third Hoosier to earn the honor twice.
- Murphy was one of 17 National Football Foundation National Scholar-Athletes and the runner-up for the 2014 William V. Campbell Trophy, awarded to the top scholar-athlete in college football.
- Overseen 111 Academic All-Big Ten award winners, a five-year program record.
- With its 31-27 win at No. 18 Missouri last season, the Hoosiers earned their first win over a top 20 team since 2006 and their first on the road since 1987. It marked the first time a Big Ten team defeated a ranked SEC team on the road.
- Spent the 2002-10 seasons at the University of Oklahoma. He served as co-offensive coordinator and offensive line coach (2002-05) and offensive coordinator and tight ends and fullbacks coach (2006-10).

- Led some of the most productive offenses in the history of college football, coached in 10 consecutive bowl games and made seven BCS bowl appearances, including three national championship games (2003, '04, '08).
- OU played in seven Big 12 Title games in Wilson's nine years, going 6-1 in those appearances. His offenses were vital to accumulating an overall record of 99-24 (.805) during his time in Norman, including seven 10-win seasons.
- Over Wilson's time at Oklahoma, 26 offensive players were drafted in to the NFL, including seven first-rounders, with three going among the first 10 picks and two in the top five.
- Served as position coach for three All-Americans, an Outland Trophy winner (Jammal Brown), a Mackey Award finalist (Jermaine Gresham) and a two-time Rimington Trophy finalist (Vince Carter).
- As position coach, Wilson tutored three first-round draft picks (Jermaine Gresham, TE - 2010, Davin Joseph, OL - 2006 and Jammal Brown, OL - 2005), a second-round pick (Chris Chester, OL - 2005), a fifth-round pick (Brody Eldridge, TE - 2010), two sixth-round picks (James Hanna, TE - 2012; Wes Sims, OL - 2004) and six free agents at Oklahoma.
- Twice a finalist for the Frank Broyles Award - awarded to the nation's top assistant coach, Wilson won the award in 2008. His 2008 offense shattered NCAA records by scoring 60-or-more points in five straight games and 716 total points, to average more than 51 points per contest.
- The 2008 team played in the BCS National Championship Game behind Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback Sam Bradford. Bradford passed for 4,720 yards and 50 touchdowns, Chris Brown and DeMarco Murray both rushed for over 1,000 yards, Juahquin Iglesias caught 74 balls for 1,150 yards and Jermaine Gresham added 66 catches for 950 yards.
- Bradford ranked No. 1 nationally in passing efficiency as a freshman in 2007 and again in 2008, as he threw for more TDs (86) in two seasons than anyone in NCAA history.
- In the 2010 NFL Draft, Bradford was selected with the No. 1 overall pick by the St. Louis Rams. He captured the 2010 Associated Press NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honor.
- Wilson was also instrumental in the development of Adrian Peterson. Peterson rushed for 1,925 yards in his freshman campaign (2004), which set an OU single-season record and marked the highest total for a freshman in NCAA history.
- Peterson went on to place second in the Heisman voting, which at the time was the highest finish ever by a freshman. He was drafted by the Minnesota Vikings as the seventh pick in the 2007 NFL Draft, where he was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year. Peterson won the 2012 NFL Most Valuable Player Award after he rushed for 2,097 yards, just nine shy of the NFL's single-season mark.
- Prior to his stint in Norman, Wilson was promoted to assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Northwestern University in 2001 after serving as offensive coordinator in 1999 and 2000. He worked with the quarterbacks during his time in Evanston.
- Followed Randy Walker to Northwestern from Miami University after spending nine years in Oxford, coaching alongside former Indiana head coach Terry Hoepfner.
- Served as offensive line coach for his first two years at Miami and was promoted to offensive coordinator for the next seven, spending 1992-1997 in charge of the offensive line and the 1998 season with the quarterbacks.
- A walk-on offensive lineman at North Carolina, Wilson earned a scholarship while playing in four bowl games. He earned his bachelor's degree in education (1984) and his master's degree in physical education (1987).
- Wilson was a three-sport star at Maiden (N.C.) H.S.
- Kevin and his wife, Angela, have five children, including three daughters, Elaina (19), Makenzie (17) and Marlee (14), and two sons, Trey (15) and Toby (12).

During his 42 years with IU, Fischer has been named Indiana Sportscaster of the Year 28 times by two different organizations. The National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association has awarded him 24 times, including the last five seasons, while the Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association has named him its honoree four times.

In October of 2010, Fischer was one of eight inductees into the Indiana Broadcast Pioneers Richard M. Fairbanks Hall of Fame. The Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association (ISSA) inducted Fischer into the ISSA Hall of Fame in 2004.

He has won several awards for best play-by-play performance, and he has been honored by Indiana University with the J.W. Bill Orwig Medal, that goes to non-alumni for distinguished service to the University.

Fischer also has been named an Honorary "I" Man. In addition, the City of Indianapolis, and the State of Indiana have each honored Fischer with a special "Recognition Day" for his service and abilities as the play-by-play broadcaster for IU.

He has broadcast more than 1,600 Indiana University games - a total that includes seven bowl games, four NCAA basketball championship games and two N.I.T. championship games.

From 1973 through 1987, he worked for ABC Radio, Canada's CBC and several additional major market radio stations, including WIRE in Indianapolis, as their source for reports during the month of May coverage of the Indianapolis 500. During that period, Fischer also served WIRE and Network Indiana, a statewide news network, as their sports director.

A native of Rochelle, Ill., Fischer has been in the radio business for 47 years. His previous broadcast experience includes stops in Butte, Mont.; Ottawa, Ill.; Springfield, Ill.; and Terre Haute, Ind.

Fischer has four sons and 10 grandchildren. Don and his wife, Susy, reside in Greenwood, Ind.



### BUCK SUHR

Buck Suhr rejoined the Indiana University Football Radio Network as color commentator in 2010. Suhr, who served in the same capacity from 1997-2001, reunited with the Voice of the Hoosiers, Don Fischer, and Joe Smith (pre-game, post-game and halftime).

Suhr was a member of the Hoosier football program for 18 years as a running backs coach and administrator. He spent 12 seasons (1984-95) as running backs coach under IU's all-time winningest coach, Bill Mallory. After his stint as a coach, where he tutored All-America selections Anthony Thompson

and Vaughn Dunbar, Suhr was named administrative assistant to the head coach and athletic director from 1996-2001.

As running backs coach, Suhr helped direct one of the nation's most productive rushing attacks. From 1984-95, the Hoosiers had three different 1,000-yard rushers who topped that mark on six separate occasions. In 1988, the IU offense rushed for a then-school record 2,963 yards.

During his tenure, Suhr coached Thompson, the 1989 Heisman Trophy runner-up, along with Dunbar and Alex Smith, the 1994 UPI National Freshman of the Year. Suhr and his wife, Jane, are the parents of one son, Errek, and the deceased Jenny Suhr. Errek played in 74 games and earned four letters as a guard for the IU men's basketball program from 2004-07.

They have three grandchildren, Addy (5), Hayden (3) and Taylor (infant).



### JOE SMITH

Joe Smith is in his 33rd year with the IU Radio Network. He has handled pre-game, halftime, and post-game duties for Indiana football and men's basketball since 1983. Smith, the sports director of WGCL-AM 1370 in Bloomington, is in his

47th year of radio broadcasting in Bloomington. He began his broadcasting career in 1969 at WAIK Radio in Galesburg, Ill. From 1973-89, Joe worked on "RFD-4 Agri-Business Show" on WTTV-4 with the late Bob Cook. In 1998, Smith was named Indiana Sportscaster of the Year and in April 2003, he was inducted into the Indiana Sportswriters/Sportscasters Hall of Fame. Joe handled the IU TV Warmup Shows from 1978-82 and hosted several IU Coaches Shows from 1983-96 and again from 2002-04.

## POST-GAME NOTES

- In his Hoosiers debut, **Jordan Howard** rushed for 145 yards on 20 carries (7.2 average) with three touchdowns (a career-high), including the game-winner with :58 remaining. Howard now owns 12 career 100-yard games and five career multi-TD games. The junior tallied 15 scores in his two seasons at UAB. Howard added two receptions for 25 yards.

- Sophomore **Devine Redding** scored Indiana's first touchdown of the season, a 13-yard rush, at the 9:47 mark in quarter one. Redding added his second from three yards out to put the Hoosiers up with 2:34 remaining in the third.

- Redding finished the game with 57 yards on 16 carries (3.6 average)

- Fifth-year senior **Nate Sudfeld** threw for 349 yards, the second-highest total of his career, on 19-of-32 passing with a 57-yard touchdown. Sudfeld now has five 300-yard games and five career 50-plus yard TD passes. He added a career-high 46 rushing yards, which included a career-long 21-yard rush.

- Sudfeld moved into seventh in completions (365), seventh in passing yards (4,655), eighth in total offense (4,772), a tie for fourth in passing touchdowns (35), second in 300-yards games (5) and sixth in 200-yard games (11) in Indiana history.

- Redshirt junior **Ricky Jones** reached the end zone for the first time in his career, a 57-yard pass from Sudfeld, to open the second half scoring. Jones came into 2015 with 60 career receiving yards and four receptions. Today Jones pulled in six catches for 186 yards (both career-highs).

- Jones final reception of the day was for 71 yards, which set up the game-winning touchdown rush by Howard. His 186 yards rank ninth on IU's single-game list and are the most since Cody Latimer had 189 vs. Illinois on Nov. 9, 2013.

- Redshirt junior **Mitchell Paige** had career-highs in receptions (4) and yards (32).

- True freshman safety **Jonathan Crawford** blocked a 49-yard Southern Illinois field goal attempt in the opening stanza, which led to Indiana's first points. Bobby Richardson was the last Hoosier to block a field goal. Richardson's came against Penn State on Nov. 8, 2014.

- Crawford closed the game with eight tackles to go along with the block.

- Redshirt sophomore **Marcus Oliver** forced a pair of fumbles in the game, giving him five in just 15 career games. The linebacker finished with a career-high 10 tackles on the day.

- Freshman cornerback **Andre Brown, Jr.**, recovered the first fumble and redshirt junior linebacker Dawson Fletcher made his first career fumble recovery.

- Indiana is 39-17 all-time in Memorial Stadium openers. The Hoosiers have victories in 13 of their last 14 and wins in 30 of their last 34 home starters. **Kevin Wilson** owns a 4-1 mark in his five opening weekends.

- Junior linebacker **T.J. Simmons** and senior defensive end **Nick Mangieri** led the team with 11 tackles each. This is a career high for Mangieri, who added one sack as well.

- Griffin Oakes** nailed a 45-yard field in the third quarter and another from 22 yards with 9:08 left in the fourth. The redshirt sophomore also hit all six of his extra points. Oakes is 15-of-20 on field goals in his career, 4-of-5 from 40-49 yards, and 29-of-29 in extra points for his career.

- With 595 yards of total offense, this marks the 12th time in the **Kevin Wilson** era that the Hoosiers have accumulated at least 500 yards.

- Left guard **Wes Martin**, wide receiver **Ricky Jones**, wide receiver **Mitchell Paige**, running back **Jordan Howard**, linebacker **Marcus Oliver**, safety **Kiante Walton**, safety **Jonathan Crawford**, cornerback **Rashard Fant** and cornerback **Andre Brown, Jr.**, made their first career starts for the Hoosiers.

- Right guard **Dan Feeney**, defensive end **Nick Mangieri**, quarterback **Nate Sudfeld** and punter **Erich Toth** served as Indiana's game captains.

- IU won the toss and elected to defer.

- The Hoosiers wore the crimson state flag helmet.

- Senior defensive end **Nick Mangieri** set up a pair of Indiana touchdowns, including the game-winner. Mangieri forced a fumble after recording his second sack of the season and the seventh of his career with 10:09 remaining. In the third quarter, he recovered the first fumble of his career.

- The first turnover set up **Nate Sudfeld**'s second rushing TD and the second Sudfeld's 16-yard scoring strike to **Mitchell Paige**.

- True freshman defensive back **Jameel Cook, Jr.** sealed the Hoosiers victory with a 96-yard interception return with 3:58 remaining in the final stanza. Florida International faced a fourth-and-goal from the 2-yard line in a 29-22 ballgame when Cook delivered his heroics. The return is tied for the fourth-longest in school history.

- Jordan Howard** has now recorded 13 career 100-yard games and his eighth 150-yard game. He has rushed for at least 100 yards in six straight games dating back to last year. The junior finished with 159 yards on 27 carries (5.9 average). He added one reception for five yards.

- Sophomore **Devine Redding** carried the ball 16 times for 53 yards. Together, Howard and Redding have rushed for over 200 yards in back-to-back games.

- The Hoosiers have had a 100-yard rusher in 14 of their last 15 games dating back to last season. Indiana finished with 205 rush yards on 52 carries.

- In its season opener, Florida International limited Central Florida to 46 rushing yards on 30 attempts, a 1.5 average, with zero touchdowns.

- Nate Sudfeld** collected 5- and 1-yard touchdowns, his second-career two-TD rushing game, and finished the evening 19-of-33 for 234 yards with one touchdown through the air. The senior now owns five career rushing scores.

- Sudfeld's touchdown pass moved him into the fourth spot on the all-time Hoosiers list.

- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** recovered Mangieri's forced fumble, the first recovery of his career. Oliver forced a pair of fumbles in the season opener and in 16 career games he has contributed to six takeaways.

- Redshirt sophomore **Rashard Fant** had a game- and career-high four pass breakups. The cornerback also made four solo tackles in the game.

- The Hoosiers forced two fumbles for the second straight week and now have five takeaways in 2015. Indiana converted all three takeaways into touchdowns.

- IU did not allow any points in the third quarter for the second straight game.

- In the red zone, the Hoosiers were a perfect five-of-five. They converted three into touchdowns and two into field goals.

- Paige finished the contest with two catches for 31 yards and the 16-yard TD, the first of his career.

- Fifth-year senior tight end **Michael Cooper** caught three balls for 66 yards, both career-highs.

- Redshirt sophomore **Griffin Oakes** accounted for the Hoosiers first points with 35- and 27-yard field goals in the second quarter. He added a game-tying 40-yarder in the third and finished the ballgame converting three of his four attempts. Oakes is 5-of-6 on the season and 18-of-24 (75.0 percent) in his career. The Greenwood, Ind., native is one field goal away from entering Indiana's career top 10.

- True freshman cornerback **Devonte Williams** made the first start of his career.

- Wide receiver **Ricky Jones**, linebacker **Clyde Newton**, nose tackle **Adarius Rayner** and linebacker **T.J. Simmons** served as Indiana's game captains.

- The Hoosiers wore the two-tone numerical and Block I helmet.

- Indiana is 2-0 for the first time since 2012 and the second time under head coach Kevin Wilson.

- Tonight was the first meeting between the two programs.

## POST-GAME NOTES

- Indiana is 3-0 for the first time since 2010 and the 16th time in school history.
- Overall, the Hoosiers have won four straight games for the first time since 1993.
- Senior quarterback **Nate Sudfeld** recorded the sixth 300-yard game of his career and his second this year. Sudfeld threw for the second-highest mark of his career with 355 pass yards (363 vs. Navy, 9/7/13) on 20-of-27 with three touchdowns to three different receivers. This is his fifth career game with three-or-more passing scores.
- Sudfeld has now thrown 39 career touchdowns (fourth all-time IU list) and 5,244 passing yards (seventh). He is the seventh Hoosier to throw over 5,000 career passing yards.
- Jordan Howard** recorded his 14th career 100-yard game, his eighth 150-yard game and his second career 200-yard game. He has rushed for at least 100 yards in seven straight games dating back to last year. The junior finished with 203 yards on 31 carries (6.5 average). He added three receptions for 38 yards.
- Sophomore **Devine Redding** carried the ball 23 times for 79 yards. Together, Howard and Redding have rushed for over 200 yards in three consecutive games.
- The Hoosiers have had a 100-yard rusher in 15 of their last 16 games and have rushed for over 200 yards in 13 of their last 15 games.
- Redshirt junior **Ricky Jones** collected his second career 100-yard game – both this season – finishing with 126 yards on five receptions. He capped the Hoosiers 99-yard drive in the second quarter with an 18-yard touchdown.
- The 99-yard drive covered 4:53 and took 13 plays, all season-longs. Indiana later added a 97-yard drive, which covered 3:53 in 11 plays.
- Redshirt junior **Mitchell Paige** opened the scoring with a 91-yard punt return, the fifth-longest in school history, with 12:35 remaining in the opening quarter. The score was the first by an IU punt returner since Shane Wynn's 58-yarder against Indiana State on Aug. 29, 2013.
- Paige's return is the longest by a Hoosier since Lance Bennett's 94-yard TD vs. Michigan State on Sept. 25, 2004, and is currently the second-longest in the nation this season.
- Paige was just getting started, as he was the recipient of a 36-yard touchdown pass from Sudfeld in the third quarter. He now has a pair of receiving scores on the season and caught two balls for 41 yards in the contest.
- Sophomore **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.** had his first career touchdown reception with 6:06 remaining in the third quarter. He finished with three receptions and 50 yards.
- Four Indiana tight ends combined for six receptions and 91 yards. Fifth-year senior **Michael Cooper** and redshirt sophomore **Danny Friend** each had two receptions, while senior **Anthony Corsaro** and sophomore **Jordan Fuchs** added one apiece.
- True freshman safety **Jonathan Crawford** delivered the first two interceptions of his career in the third quarter, both of which led to Indiana touchdowns. The interceptions were on two consecutive pass attempts by Western Kentucky.
- Indiana has seven takeaways (three INTs) this year and is plus-5 in turnover margin. The Hoosiers have scored 41 points off of their opponents miscues.
- Fellow true freshman safety **Jameel Cook, Jr.**, has the team's other INT, which he returned 96 yards for a score against Florida International last week. Cook made his first career start.
- IU did not allow any points in the third quarter for the third straight game and has outscored its opponents 44-0.
- Senior defensive end **Nick Mangieri** kept the Hilltoppers off the board in the third with a blocked field, the first of his career and the team's second in 2015.
- Sophomore **Rashard Fant** led the way with a career-high eight tackles (all solo). He added one pass breakup for his fifth of the year.
- Redshirt sophomore **Griffin Oakes** capped off the Hoosiers first half scoring with a 27-yard field, which puts him in a tie for 10th on the program's all-time list with 19 (David Freud, 1976-78). Oakes is 6-of-7 on the season and 19-of-25 (76.0 percent) in his career. The Greenwood, Ind., native added six touchbacks on seven kickoffs and has 18 on 24 kickoffs in 2015.
- Indiana owns a 3-0 advantage in the all-time series against Western Kentucky.
- Linebacker **Marcus Oliver**, center **Jake Reed**, bandit **Zack Shaw** and left tackle **Jason Spriggs** served as Indiana's game captains.
- The Hoosiers wore the script Indiana helmet for the first time ever.

**POST-GAME NOTES**

- Indiana is 4-0 for the first time since 1990 and the sixth time in school history.
- Overall, the Hoosiers have won five straight games for the first time since 1987 (five). The streak is tied for the sixth-longest in program history.
- **Jordan Howard** recorded his 15th career 100-yard game and his ninth 150-yard game. He has rushed for at least 100 yards in eight straight games dating back to last year. The junior finished with 168 yards on 33 carries (5.1 average) and a touchdown.
- Senior **Nate Sudfeld** became the fourth quarterback in school history to reach 40 career touchdown passes. Sudfeld finished 19-of-34 for 205 yards and two touchdowns, giving him 41 for his career, which ranks fourth in school history. The Modesto, Calif., native has 14 career multi-TD games and three this season.
- Sudfeld also moved into sixth place on the IU career passing yards list (5,449), passing Trent Green (1989-92), and fifth in career completions (423). He has 697 career pass attempts, which ranks seventh all-time at IU and his 5,558 yards of total offense ranks seventh.
- Sudfeld's 205 passing yards give him 14 career games of 200-yards or more through the air, tying him with Trent Green for the fourth-most in a career at IU.
- Sophomore **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, turned in his top performance as a Hoosier with a career-high seven receptions for a career-best 75 yards to go along with a 6-yard touchdown, his second in as many weeks.
- **Ricky Jones** capped the Hoosiers' 10-play, 92-yard drive in the second quarter with a 28-yard touchdown grab, his third of the season. The junior finished with two catches for 43 yards.
- Indiana has four TD drives of 90-or-more yards this season.
- Sophomore **Devine Redding** carried the ball 10 times for 48 yards. Together, Howard and Redding have rushed for over 200 yards in three consecutive games.
- The Hoosiers have had a 100-yard rusher in 16 of their last 17 games and have rushed for over 200 yards in 14 of their last 16 games.
- Indiana's defense delivered six sacks, the most for an IU team since seven at Illinois on Oct. 27, 2012, and eight tackles for loss, both season-highs.
- Sophomore safety **Tony Fields** recorded his first career interception and returned it 20 yards for a touchdown. It is the Hoosiers' second INT return of the year - Jameel Cook, Jr., 96-yarder against Florida International.
- Indiana has eight takeaways in 2015 resulting in 48 points. The Hoosiers are plus-6 in turnover margin and own four interceptions and four fumble recoveries.
- Sophomore linebacker **Tegray Scales** carded his first two sacks of the season, a career high, and has four sacks in his career. He led IU with nine tackles. The last time an IU player had two sacks in a game was Bobby Richardson (3.0) against Indiana State to open the 2014 season.
- Senior defensive end **Nick Mangieri** provided a strong effort with five tackles, one sack and a career-high-tying two pass breakups. Mangieri has three sacks in 2015 and eight in his career.
- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** was second on the team with seven tackles in the game, including his first career sack.
- Fifth-year senior bandit **Zack Shaw** collected his first sack of the year and the sixth of his career to go along with four stops.
- **Darius Latham** set a career-high with three tackles for loss with one sack and five stops. The junior defensive tackle also made his first career appearance at fullback, paving the way for Howard's score. Latham has a pair of sacks in 2015 and 5.5 in his career.
- In the first quarter, he Hoosiers forced Wake Forest into three three-and-outs, -2 rushing yards and 47 total yards.
- IU has now outscored its opponents 51-0 in the third quarter in 2015.
- Redshirt sophomore **Griffin Oakes** hit a 30-yard field goal as time expired in the first half to give IU a 17-10 halftime lead. Oakes is 7-of-8 on the season and 20-of-26 (76.0 percent) in his career. His 20 field goals are 10th on the Hoosiers' career list. The Greenwood, Ind., native added four touchbacks on five kickoffs and has 22 on 29 kickoffs in 2015.
- Today marked the first meeting between Indiana and Wake Forest.
- Tight end **Michael Cooper**, wide receiver **Ricky Jones** (second time this season), defensive end **Nick Mangieri** (second) and nose tackle **Adarius Rayner** (second) served as Indiana's game captains.
- The Hoosiers wore the script Indiana two-tone helmet for the first time ever.

- IU has scored 58 points off of its opponents 11 turnovers.

- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** stripped Jalin Marshall at the Indiana 7-yard line in the second quarter, good for his third forced fumble of the year and the sixth of his career. Junior linebacker **Clyde Newton** made his first career recovery.

- Sophomore linebacker **Tegray Scales** intercepted Cardale Jones at the Hoosiers 13-yard line and returned it to their 45-yard line, setting up **Devine Redding's** second rushing touchdown of the afternoon in the third quarter.

- Redshirt freshman linebacker **Zeke Walker** forced his first career fumble and redshirt sophomore cornerback **Rashard Fant** made his second career recovery in the fourth quarter.

- In the first quarter, the Hoosiers outgained Ohio State 114-36 overall, 90-33 through the air and 24-3 on the ground. Indiana recorded one sack, three tackles for loss and one forced fumble in the quarter.

- Sophomore **Devine Redding** gave the Hoosiers a 10-0 advantage with a 1-yard TD in the second quarter, his fourth of the season and the fifth of his career. The running back finished the game with two touchdowns — his second career two-touchdown game. Redding added 45 yards on a career-high 30 carries and two catches for 21 yards.

- Sophomore quarterback **Zander Diamont** saw action late in the game. He led the way for the Hoosiers with 98 yards on the ground. Diamont was 6-of-14 passing for 76 yards.

- Diamont's 79-yard TD is the longest rush by a Hoosier since Tevin Coleman's 90-yarder at Ohio State on Nov. 22, 2014. It is the longest rush by a quarterback in IU history.

- Indiana's second quarter touchdown drive to go ahead 10-0 was the Hoosiers longest in volume of plays (15) and time of possession (4:59) this season and it covered 80 yards. Indiana has 12 double-digit play scoring drives in 2015.

- Senior defensive end **Nick Mangieri** collected a career-high two sacks in the first half, pushing his season total to five and his career total to 10. He stripped Cardale Jones on the first sack for his second forced fumble of the season and the third of his career.

- Redshirt sophomore safety **Chase Dutra** had a career-high 11 tackles (seven solo, four assisted). His previous career-high was six (twice). Dutra also had one tackle for loss.

- Sophomore **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, led the team in receptions and yards with four and 68, respectively.

- Redshirt junior **Mitchell Paige** had one reception for 11 yards. Paige completed his only career pass attempt to Diamont in the fourth quarter on a reverse pass back to the quarterback.

- Redshirt sophomore **Griffin Oakes** added a pair of 34-yarders, one in the first and one in the fourth. Oakes is 9-of-10 on the season and 22-of-28 (78.6 percent) in his career. His 22 field goals are tied for ninth on the Hoosiers career list. The Greenwood, Ind., native added three touchbacks on six kickoffs and has 25 on 35 kickoffs in 2015.

- Right guard **Dan Feeney** (second time this season), linebacker **Marcus Oliver** (second), bandit **Zack Shaw** (second) and quarterback **Nate Sudfeld** (second) served as Indiana's game captains.

- The Hoosiers wore the pink IU helmet for the first time this season.

- Indiana won the coin toss for the second time this season and elected to defer for the second time.

## POST-GAME NOTES

- The 627 total yards for the Hoosiers ranks eighth all-time in school history.
- The 52 points scored by the Hoosiers tied for 18th all-time in program history.
- The 107 combined points scored were the most in a game since Oct. 19, 2013, when Michigan defeated the Hoosiers, 63-47, in Ann Arbor, Mich. The 107 points is the most scored in a game at Memorial Stadium since Aug. 29, 2013, when Indiana defeated Indiana State, 73-35.
- **Nate Sudfeld** set career-highs in completions (32) and passing yards (464). Sudfeld tied his career-highs in attempts (42) and passing touchdowns (4). His 464 yards rank second to Ben Chappell (480) on the Hoosiers single-game list.
- **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, set a career-high with his 107 receiving yards and tied his career-high with seven receptions. The 100-yard receiving game was the first for Cobbs in his career.
- **Mitchell Paige** set career-highs with eight receptions and 126 receiving yards. The 100-yard receiving game was the first for Paige in his career.
- **Ricky Jones** tied his career-high in receptions with six for 119 yards, his third 100-yard game of the season and career.
- **Mike Majette** set career-highs in attempts (11), rushing yards (83), long rush (21), receptions (3), receiving yards (33) and receiving touchdowns (1).
- Majette reached the end zone for the first time in his career with a 17-yard reception to open the second quarter.
- **Devine Redding** set a career-high with 99 rushing yards and tied his career-high with two rushing touchdowns. He carried the ball 15 times, averaging 6.6 yards per rush.
- Cobbs, Paige and Jones are the first trio of receivers to surpass 100 yards receiving in the same game in Indiana football history.
- Sophomore tight end **Jordan Fuchs** caught his second and third career touchdowns and his first and second of this season. Fuchs first score put the Hoosiers in front 24-13 in quarter No. 2. His second score put IU up 45-27 in quarter No. 3.
- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** picked off the first pass of his career in the third quarter. The redshirt sophomore has been involved in five takeaways this season (three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception) and eight in his career (six forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception).
- Oliver set career marks in total tackles (14) and solo tackles (12), while also adding a tackle for loss. The double-digit effort was the third of his career (all this season).
- Redshirt sophomore **Rashard Fant** made eight total tackles (seven solo), with two pass breakups.
- Junior defensive tackle **Darius Latham** blocked two Rutgers extra points, the first two blocks of his career. He finished with 2.5 tackles for loss and five total stops.
- IU has outscored its opponents 86-20 in the third quarter this season.
- Indiana has forced a turnover in 13 consecutive games and now sits plus-7 in turnover margin (13-6).
- The Hoosiers have scored 65 points off of their 13 turnovers.
- True freshman safety **Jonathan Crawford** recorded his first career sack in the opening quarter. He added six tackles (five solo) to go along with his first career forced fumble.
- Redshirt sophomore **Griffin Oakes** opened up the Hoosiers scoring with a 27-yard field goal. Oakes is 10-of-11 (90.9 percent) on the season and 23-of-29 (79.3) in his career. His 23 field goals are ninth on the Hoosiers career list. The Greenwood, Ind., native added seven touchbacks on nine kickoffs and has 32 on 45 kickoffs in 2015.
- Wide receiver **Ricky Jones** (fourth time this season), defensive end **Nick Mangieri** (third), bandit **Zack Shaw** (third) and quarterback **Nate Sudfeld** (third) served as Indiana's game captains.
- 2014 All-American and Atlanta Falcons running back Tevin Coleman served as an honorary game captain.
- The Hoosiers wore the chrome helmet for the first time this season.
- Indiana won the coin toss for the fourth time this season and elected to defer for the fourth time.

## POST-GAME NOTES

- **Nate Sudfeld** tied Indiana's career passing touchdowns record with 48 after his three-TD effort. The senior went 23-for-37 for 308 yards, his fourth 300-yard passing game of the season and the eighth of his career. Sudfeld has seven three-score games in his career and three this year.

- With his three touchdown pass effort, Sudfeld now moves into a tie with Kellen Lewis (2006-08) in school history for most career touchdown passes with 48.

- With his 308 yards through the air, Sudfeld also has recorded 16 career 200-yard passing games (tied for third at IU) and 10 250-yard passing games (third at IU).

- Redshirt junior **Mitchell Paige** led the Hoosiers with a career-high 8 receptions, while logging 99 receiving yards.

- **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, finished with five receptions for a career-high 108 yards and a 37-yard touchdown. The sophomore has two 100-yard games and three scores this year and in his career.

- Cobbs netted his first 100-yard game one week ago against Rutgers. He is the first Hoosiers wide receiver with consecutive 100-yarders since Cody Latimer tallied three straight in 2013 (Sept. 14, Sept. 21, Oct. 5).

- **Ricky Jones** carded his fifth touchdown of the season and his career, from 11 yards out, to tie the game at 14. The redshirt junior caught five balls for 45 yards.

- Senior **Andre Booker** scored his first career touchdown in the third quarter, a 3-yard strike from Sudfeld.

- Indiana's second TD drive covered 94 yards, the Hoosiers fifth 90-plus yard scoring drive of the season.

- Running back **Jordan Howard** returned to action for the first time since the Ohio State game in week five and carried the ball 11 times for 78 yards with a 5-yard touchdown. He now has five touchdowns this season and 20 in his career.

- **Marcus Oliver** forced his fourth fumble of the season and recorded his sixth takeaway (fumble recovery and interception) in the second quarter. The redshirt sophomore linebacker owns nine takeaways (seven forced fumbles) in 22 career games.

- Oliver added seven tackles (five solo), two TFLs and one pass breakup.

- Indiana's defense has collected a takeaway in 14 straight games.

- IU finished with a season-high 13 tackles for loss, its first double-digit game since an 11-TFL performance against Penn State on Nov. 8, 2014.

- The Hoosiers added four sacks – 2.5 by **T.J. Simmons**, one by **Tegray Scales** and a half-sack by **Zack Shaw**.

- Linebacker **T.J. Simmons** picked up a tackle for loss and his first sack of the season on the defense's first two plays. The junior didn't stop there, closing the ballgame with career-highs in tackles (15), sacks (2.5) and TFLs (four). Simmons four stops for loss share fifth on IU's single-game list and are the most for a Hoosier since defensive lineman Adam Replogle had four at Penn State on Nov. 17, 2012.

- Redshirt sophomore safety **Chase Dutra** tallied his second career double-digit tackle game with 13, a career-high. He netted his first in week five against Ohio State with 11.

- Right guard **Dan Feeney** (third time in 2015), defensive end **Nick Mangieri** (fourth), linebacker **Marcus Oliver** (third) and left tackle **Jason Spriggs** (second) served as Indiana's game captains.

- The Hoosiers wore the script Indiana crimson helmet for the first time this season.

- Indiana received the ball first for the third time this season.

- **Jordan Howard** collected 174 yards rushing on 22 carries (7.9) to go along with two touchdowns from 37 and 29 yards. His 37-yard rush was the longest of his Hoosiers career. Howard has seven TDs this season and 22 in his career.

- Howard recorded his sixth career multi-score game and his second this season. The junior now has 16 career 100-yard games, with five of them this season, and 11 career 150-yard games, with four this season.

- He is the second straight Hoosier to surpass 150 yards against Iowa. Tevin Coleman went for 219 in Iowa City on October 11.

- The Hoosiers finished the contest with 227 yards on 39 attempts, a 5.8 average.

- IU has had a 100-yard rusher 16 times since the start of the 2014 and has rushed for 200 yards 15 times in that same span.

- With his 11-yard touchdown to fifth-year senior tight end **Michael Cooper** in the fourth quarter, **Nate Sudfeld** set the program's all-time career mark with his 49th TD.

- Iowa entered today's game allowing one rushing touchdown on the season and 85.8 yards per game. Maryland quarterback Perry Hills was the only player to rush for over 100 yards (104 on Oct. 31).

- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** recorded his fourth double-digit tackle game this season, making a team-high 11 stops. Oliver has recorded double-digit tackles in three out of his last four games.

- Oliver has led the IU defense in tackles on five different occasions this season.

- Safety **Chase Dutra** recorded his second-straight double-digit tackle game with 10 stops. The redshirt sophomore has three double-digit tackle games this season and in his career.

- Sophomore defensive lineman **Robert McCray III** finished with a career-high two tackles for loss.

- IU saw its streak of 14 games with a takeaway snapped.

- **Griffin Oakes** delivered a pair of field goals in as many attempts. The redshirt sophomore moved into sole possession of eighth on the program's career field goals list and is 25-of-32 (78.1) in his career. Oakes has connected on 12-of-14 (85.7) in 2015.

- The teams played to a scoreless third quarter. IU has blanked six teams in the stanza this season and has outscored its opponents 92-27.

- Indiana has scored on its opening drive five times in 2015 (3 touchdowns, 2 field goals).

- Oakes second field goal cut Iowa's lead to 21-20 with 13:22 remaining in the ballgame. The drive was IU's longest scoring drive of the season in term of plays (17) and time of possession (6:07). It also covered 80 yards.

- The Hoosiers have faced three top 10 teams for the ninth time in program history and the first time since 1991.

- Right guard **Dan Feeney** (fourth time in 2015), linebacker **James Halford** (first), linebacker **Marcus Oliver** (fourth) and linebacker **T.J. Simmons** (third) served as Indiana's game captains.

- The Hoosiers wore the script Salute to Service helmet for the first time.

- Indiana won the coin toss and elected to defer for the fifth time this season.

## POST-GAME NOTES

- **Jordan Howard** carded his 17th career 100-yard game and his sixth of the season with 238 yards, the second-most ever by a Michigan opponent, on 35 carries (6.8 yards per carry). His 238 yards are his most this season and rank 10th on the all-time IU list.

- The junior running back became the 11th Hoosier (16th time) to reach 1,000 yards in a single season (1,199). Howard is 12th on the program's all-time single-season list with his 1,199 yards. He recorded his fifth 150-yard game of the season (12th of his career), which is tied for the fourth-most in a season for a Hoosier, and his second 200-yard game (3rd of his career).

- Coupled with Tevin Coleman's 2,036-yard season in 2014, Indiana has back-to-back 1,000-yard rushers for the first time since 2000 (Antwaan Randle El – 1,270) and 2001 (Levron Williams – 1,401). It is the first time running backs have reached consecutive 1,000-yard years since Vaughn Dunbar in 1990 (1,224) and 1991 (1,805).

- Howard's 238 yards are the most yards for a Hoosier against a Michigan team, while the 307 team rushing yards are also a new Indiana high against the Wolverines.

- Michigan had not allowed a 100-yard rusher since the final game of 2014 (Ohio State's Ezekiel Elliott - 121). The Wolverines entered the game allowing 80.6 rushing yards per game and 2.6 yards per carry. As a team, Indiana rushed for 307 yards on 55 carries (5.6 yards per carry).

- Sophomore **Devine Redding** carried the ball 11 times for 48 yards (4.4 yards per carry).

- IU has had a 100-yard rusher 17 times since the start of the 2014 season. During that span, Indiana has rushed for 200-plus yards 16 times.

- Senior **Nate Sudfeld** completed 20-of-34 for 220 yards and one score.

- Sophomore **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, led the Hoosiers with four receptions for 86 yards.

- The Wolverines entered the game allowing 11.9 points, 159.4 passing yards and 240.0 total yards per game. The Hoosiers finished with 41 points, 220 passing yards and 527 total yards – all season-highs against the U-M defense.

- **Griffin Oakes** set a career-high and matched a program single-game record (7th time) with four field goals from 39, 36, 51 and 24 yards. The redshirt sophomore is 16-of-18 on the season (88.9 percent) and 29-of-36 in his career (80.6 percent). Oakes 16 field goals share third on the school's single-season list and the 29 field goals rank eighth. He is now 2-of-4 from 50-plus yards in his career (1st attempt in 2015).

- **Mitchell Paige** returned his second punt for a touchdown this year with a 51-yarder in the third quarter. Paige is the first Hoosier with two punt return TDs in a season since 1990 when Rob Turner had a pair. The redshirt junior also returned a 91-yarder against Western Kentucky in game three.

- True freshman safety **Jonathan Crawford** collected his team-high third interception of the season, stalling a Michigan drive at the Indiana 14-yard line. Crawford added five tackles, which brings his total to 57 in 2015.

- **Darius Latham** recorded one sack and four tackles. The junior defensive lineman now has three sacks this season and 6.5 for his career.

- Sophomore linebacker **Tegray Scales** paced the Hoosiers with eight tackles, seven solo, in addition to one tackle for loss.

- The Hoosiers have recorded a takeaway in 15 of their last 16 games.

- Indiana outscored Michigan, 10-0, in the third quarter. IU has a 102-27 advantage in the quarter and has blanked seven opponents in 2015.

- Senior wide receiver **Andre Booker** tied a career-high with two receptions and set a career-high with 22 yards.

- IU's second scoring drive took 17 plays, matching its longest drive of the season. It also consumed 5:22, the team's second-longest drive.

- Indiana held the ball for 11:49 in the first quarter, which is the longest time of possession in any quarter this season.

- The Hoosiers have faced three top 15 teams for the sixth time in program history and the first time since 1979.

- Defensive end **Nick Mangieri** (fifth time in 2015), nose tackle **Adarius Rayner** (third time), bandit **Zack Shaw** (fourth time), left tackle **Jason Spriggs** (third time) and quarterback **Nate Sudfeld** (fourth time) served as Indiana's game captains.

- The Hoosiers wore the Block I and numerical helmets.

- Indiana received the ball first for the fourth time this season.

## POST-GAME NOTES

- Indiana erased a 21-3 deficit for its fifth victory of the season. It is tied for the third-largest comeback in school history. The Hoosiers came back from 18 points down at Illinois (25-7; Oct. 7, 2006), 21 points vs. Illinois (28-7; Oct. 2, 1999) and 23 points at Iowa (26-3; Sept. 8, 1979).

- Today is the 10th time under Kevin Wilson the Hoosiers have scored 45-plus points, the 15th time of eclipsing 550 total yards and 11th time throwing for 350-plus yards.

- Nate Sudfeld** finished with 385 yards on 23-of-35 passing with a career-high-tying four passing touchdowns, fourth time, and one rushing score. He equaled his career-best with five total TDs.

- The senior matched Ben Chappell (2007-10) with his ninth career 300-yard game, a school record, including five this season, second on IU's single-season list. Sudfeld, Indiana's all-time TDs leader with 54, became the third Hoosier to reach 7,000 passing yards (7,140), sits third all-time in completions (547), fifth in attempts (903) and fourth in total offense (7,239).

- Sudfeld is fifth in passing touchdowns (20), fourth in passing yardage (2,834) and sixth in total offense (2,862) on the program's single-season lists.

- Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, led the Hoosiers with career-highs in receptions (9) and yards (192). The 192 yards for Cobbs rank eighth in school history. It is the sophomore's third career 100-yard game, all in 2015.

- Mitchell Paige** added five catches for 64 yards, including a career-high two touchdowns.

- Sophomore running back **Devine Redding** finished with a career-high 130 yards on 24 carries (5.4 average). The 100-yard game for Redding is the first of his career.

- Senior **Andre Booker** hauled in a career-long 59-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter. He came into the game with 59 yards on the season. He finished with two receptions (matches career-high) for a personal-best 79 yards and his second career TD.

- Redshirt freshman **Luke Timian** recorded his first career reception, a 24-yarder, in the second quarter.

- For the second time in as many weeks, **Griffin Oakes** matched an IU single-game record with four field goals, from 21, 19 and 48 and 36 yards. The redshirt sophomore is 20-of-22 on the season (90.1 percent) and 33-of-40 in his career (82.5 percent). Oakes 20 field goals are second on the school's single-season list and the 33 field goals share seventh.

- The Hoosiers converted an onside kick attempt in the second quarter. Oakes is 2-of-2 this year and 5-of-6 in his career.

- Indiana's defense held Maryland to just seven points over the last 50:32.

- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** and sophomore linebacker **Tegray Scales** each led the team with seven tackles. Scales added a half-TFL.

- Redshirt sophomore cornerback **Rashard Fant** matched a career-high with four pass breakups, third time, and recovered the onside kick.

- Redshirt junior linebacker **Dawson Fletcher** finished with a career-high six tackles.

- Sophomore defensive tackle **Robert McCray III** picked up his first career sack in the third quarter.

- Indiana outscored Maryland, 17-7, in the third quarter and owns a 119-34 edge in the third in 2015.

- Redshirt freshman safety **Will Dawkins** earned his first career start.

- Center **Jake Reed** (second time this season), nose tackle **Adarius Rayner** (fourth time), bandit **Zack Shaw** (fifth time) and left tackle **Jason Spriggs** (fourth time) served as Indiana's game captains.

- The Hoosiers wore the state flag helmets with the IU logo.

- Indiana received the ball first for the fifth time this season.

**POST-GAME NOTES**

- Indiana is bowl eligible for the first time since 2007, when the Hoosiers went to the Insight Bowl and finished 7-6. IU's six wins are the most for the program since that same campaign.
- With the victory, Indiana has won three consecutive Old Oaken Bucket games for the first time since a four-game winning streak from 1944-47.
- The Hoosiers won in West Lafayette for the first time since 2010, improved to 4-2 against Purdue this decade and 3-2 under head coach Kevin Wilson.
- IU won its final two games for the first time since 2001, its final two road games for the first time since 1982 and its final two games with both being on the road for the first time since 1946.
- Indiana had not won back-to-back Big Ten games since 2012, two Big Ten road games in the same year since 2001, back-to-back Big Ten road games since 1993 and three road games in a single season since 1994.
- The Hoosiers 350 passing yards are the most, and their 659 total yards, 309 rushing yards and 54 points are the second-most all-time in the series. The total yards, rushing yards and points are the most ever by an IU team in West Lafayette.
- Indiana recorded 300 yards through the air (350) and on the ground (309) in the same game for the second time in school history (vs. Indiana State on Aug. 29, 2013).
- The Hoosiers 659 total yards are the second-most in program history behind the 692 against Purdue on Nov. 30, 2013.
- IU has scored 40-plus points in the three straight Big Ten games for the first time in school history and in three straight games overall for the second time (1917).
- **Nate Sudfeld** became Indiana's career passing yardage leader after he finished with 350 yards on 18-of-29 passing with a career-high-tying four touchdowns and one rushing score. Sudfeld, who already holds the program's career passing TDs mark (58), moved ahead of Antwaan Randle El (1998-2001) and has 7,490 overall.
- It is Sudfeld's fifth career game with four passing TDs and his third this season. His five total touchdowns matched a career-high (3rd time, all this season).
- The senior passed Ben Chappell (2007-10) with his 10th career 300-yard game, a school record, including six this year, which is second on IU's single-season list. Sudfeld sits tied for second all-time in completions (565), third in total offense (7,602) and fifth in attempts (932).
- Sophomore **Devine Redding** rushed for a career-high 144 yards on 22 carries (6.5 average) with a 6-yard touchdown. Redding recorded the first 100-yard game of his career at Maryland last weekend.
- **Mitchell Paige** opened the scoring with a 23-yard touchdown, his fifth of the 2015 campaign. The redshirt junior ended the contest with five receptions for 92 yards (18.4 average).
- **Simmie Cobbs, Jr.**, capped a 99-yard scoring drive with a 15-yard TD reception, his fourth of the season and his career. The sophomore finished with five receptions for 84 yards (16.8 average).
- The 99-yard drive was the second of the year for the Hoosiers and their sixth of at least 90 yards.
- Redshirt junior **Andrew Wilson** scored his second career touchdown, a 1-yard rush, in the third quarter. Wilson rushed a career-high 15 times for a career-best 52 yards.
- True freshman tight end **Brandon Knight** pulled in his first career TD, from 22 yards, in the fourth quarter.
- Senior **Andre Booker** recorded a career-long 72-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter.
- **Nick Mangieri** recorded his third-multi sack game of the season and his career with two in the first quarter. The senior defensive end owns nine on the season, which ranks sixth on Indiana's single-game list. He added six tackles and a career high three tackles for loss.
- With his 11 tackles, redshirt sophomore linebacker **Marcus Oliver** became the first Hoosier to reach 100 tackles since Matt Mayberry (108) in 2009. Oliver reached double digits for the fifth time this year and in his career. He also recorded his second career interception in the fourth quarter, which he returned 41 yards.
- Sophomore linebacker **Tegray Scales** had nine tackles and picked off his first pass of the season, the fourth of his career.
- Indiana matched a season-high with six sacks and recorded double digits for the second time this year with 10 tackles for loss.
- The Hoosiers forced a season-high four turnovers - two interceptions and two fumble recoveries. IU also collect four takeaways in last season's Old Oaken Bucket game.
- Redshirt freshman linebacker **Dameon Willis, Jr.**, recovered the first fumble of his career at the IU 3-yard line in the opening quarter, and sophomore defensive tackle Robert McCray made his first recovery in the fourth.
- Indiana has 19 takeaways (10 fumbles, 9 interceptions) in 2015. It is the most turnovers forced by the Hoosiers since 29 (16 interceptions, 13 fumbles) in 2009.
- Redshirt junior defensive end **Shawn Heffern** (1), sophomore bandit **Greg Gooch** (1), junior defensive tackle **Darius Latham** (1), fifth-year senior bandit **Zack Shaw** (.5) and junior linebacker **T.J. Simmons** (.5) rounded out six-sack total.
- **Griffin Oakes** hit a 45-yard field goal in the first quarter and a 34-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, to break Austin Starr's (2007) program single-season record, as Oakes now has 22 field goals. Before his miss in the second quarter, Oakes had made 11 straight field goals, the second-longest streak in school history (Starr, 15, 2007).
- The redshirt sophomore is 22-of-25 on the season (88.0 percent) and 35-of-43 in his career (81.0 percent). Oakes 35 career field goals are seventh on the program's all-time list.
- Fifth-year senior **Erich Toth** blasted a 60-yard punt in the first quarter, the third-longest of his career.
- True freshman **Leon Thornton III** made the first start of his career at cornerback.
- Defensive end **Nick Mangieri** (sixth time this season), bandit **Zack Shaw** (sixth time) and left tackle **Jason Spriggs** (fifth time) served as Indiana's game captains.
- The Hoosiers wore the silver script Indiana logo helmets.
- Indiana kicked off first for the seventh time this season.

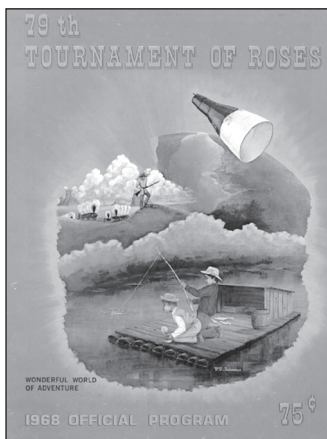
SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA 14, INDIANA 3

On Nov. 25, 1967, Indiana University improved its record to 9-1 with a 19-14 upset win over Purdue in the regular-season finale. The win clinched the Big Ten title and secured the Hoosiers' initial postseason bid - a trip to the Rose Bowl and a tilt against top-ranked and O.J. Simpson-led Southern California. Remarkably, just one season earlier in 1966, Indiana had finished the season with a 1-8-1 record.

IU's only Rose Bowl appearance would not be an easy task for the Hoosiers. However, 102,946 fans watched intently as Indiana would give the Trojans everything they could handle for four quarters.

USC tallied first when All-America running back Simpson (25-128-2TDs rushing) scored on a 2-yard touchdown run in the first quarter to cap an 84-yard scoring drive. Indiana would answer just one quarter later. The Hoosiers had a first-and-goal inside the Southern California 10-yard line but could not score a touchdown. However, Indiana kicker David Kornowa did connect on a 27-yard field goal attempt that pulled the Hoosiers to within 7-3, a lead that USC would take into the locker room at halftime.

In the third quarter, the Trojans put together their final scoring drive of the day. This time it was a 45-yard drive capped by an eight-yard touchdown run by Simpson. The "Cardiac Kids," a nickname that IU had been given because of several exciting comebacks throughout the 1967 campaign, would threaten one more time but could not close the gap. IU moved to the USC 37-yard line midway through the fourth stanza but failed on two chances to gain a first down with just inches to go.

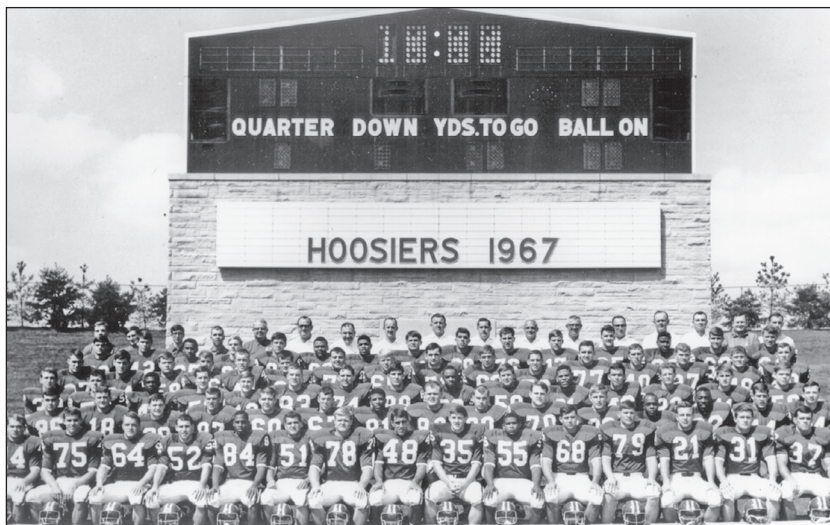

## 1979 HOLIDAY BOWL

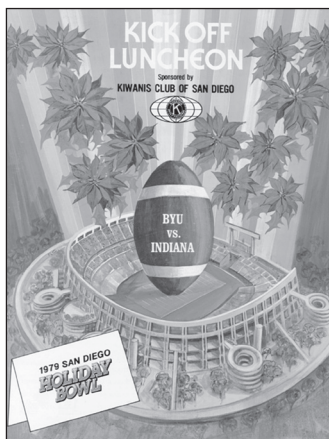

Many people described it as the most exciting game of the 1979 bowl season. The 1979 Holiday Bowl featured Indiana and Brigham Young. The two squads would combine to score 75 total points in addition to tallying 52 first downs and 874 yards of total offense. However, after eight lead changes, Indiana stood victorious, 38-37, over the previously unbeaten Cougars.

Having finished the 1979 regular season with a 7-4 record, Indiana looked to gain its initial bowl victory when it faced off against the Cougars. It was a tight battle throughout as Brigham Young quarterback Marc Wilson completed 28-of-43 passes for 380 yards and 2 TDs. Throughout the game, he showed many reasons why he led the nation in passing and total offense during the regular season. However, IU found a way to answer every BYU score.

The Cougars would take a 24-21 lead early in the third quarter, but IU tallied right back when running back Mike Harkrader (24-71-1TD rushing) scored on a 1-yard touchdown run to give the Hoosiers a 28-24 lead. Indiana kicker Kevin Kellogg would then connect on a 26-yard field goal to increase the IU lead to 31-24. However, a 29-yard field goal by BYU and a 15-yard touchdown strike from Wilson to fullback Eric Lane, put the Cougars in front, 34-31, at the end of three quarters.

The fourth quarter did not lack for theatrics. BYU would score the quarter's first points to increase its lead to 37-31. However, Indiana's Tim Wilbur countered with a 62-yard punt return to tie the game at 37-37. Kellogg would add the extra point to give IU a one-point advantage with 6:53 remaining in the contest. Brigham Young had the opportunity to win the contest on a field goal attempt with just 11 seconds remaining. However, a 27-yard effort by Cougar kicker Brent Johnson failed, and IU held on for the thrilling 38-37 victory.

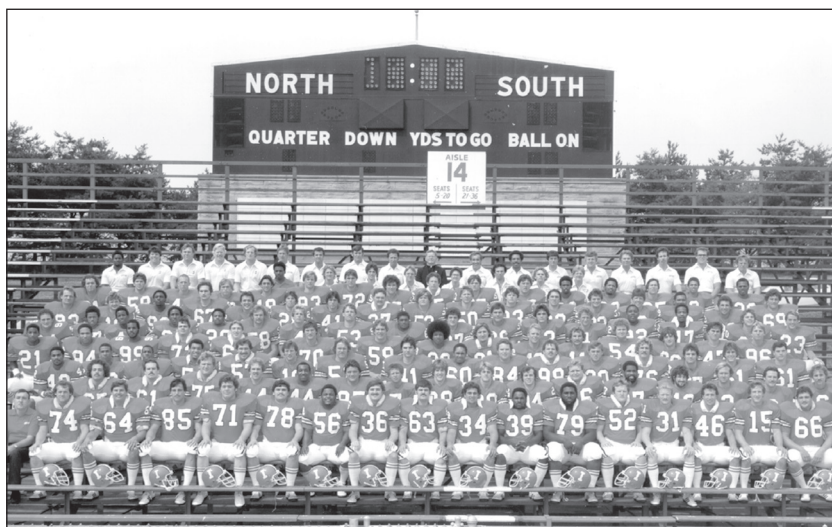

## 1986 ALL-AMERICAN BOWL

DECEMBER 31, 1986

FLORIDA STATE 27, INDIANA 13

Although he finished with an 0-11 record during his first campaign at Indiana in 1984, it would take Bill Mallory just three seasons to lead the Hoosiers to their first bowl appearance under his direction. Indiana finished with a 6-5 regular-season record in 1986 and capped its season by playing a talented Florida State team in the 1986 All-American Bowl on New Year's Eve in Birmingham, Ala.

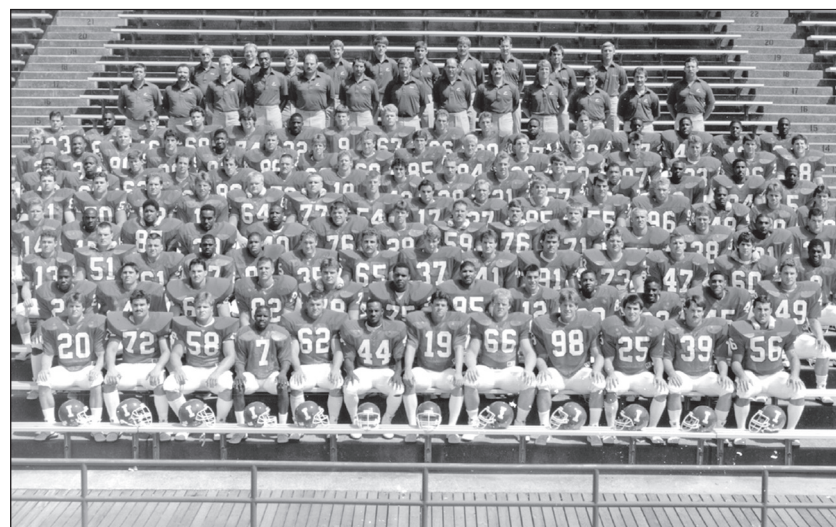
Despite losing 27-13, the Hoosiers would go on to make bowl appearances following four of the next five seasons.

Florida State used four time-consuming scoring drives that averaged 66 yards each to capture the 10th annual All-American Bowl. IU penetrated inside the Seminole 35-yard line four times without a score.

Indiana would tally first as Pete Stoyanovich connected on a 35-yard field goal to give the Hoosiers a 3-0 lead. However, Florida State running back Sammie Smith (25-205-2TDs) scored on runs of four and nine yards in the first and second quarters, respectively, to give the Seminoles a 13-3 halftime lead.

The Seminoles would score another touchdown during the third quarter that would essentially clinch the victory. IU did close the gap to within 20-13 in the fourth quarter, but FSU iced the game with a 68-yard scoring drive.

Indiana running back Anthony Thompson, who was playing in his first bowl game, finished with 127 rushing yards on 28 carries and quarterback Dave Kramme threw for 168 yards. IU dominated the time of possession and totaled more first downs (23-20) and total yards (383-342) than Florida State. However, the Seminoles rushed for 288 yards and were forced into third-down situations on just three occasions during the entire game.

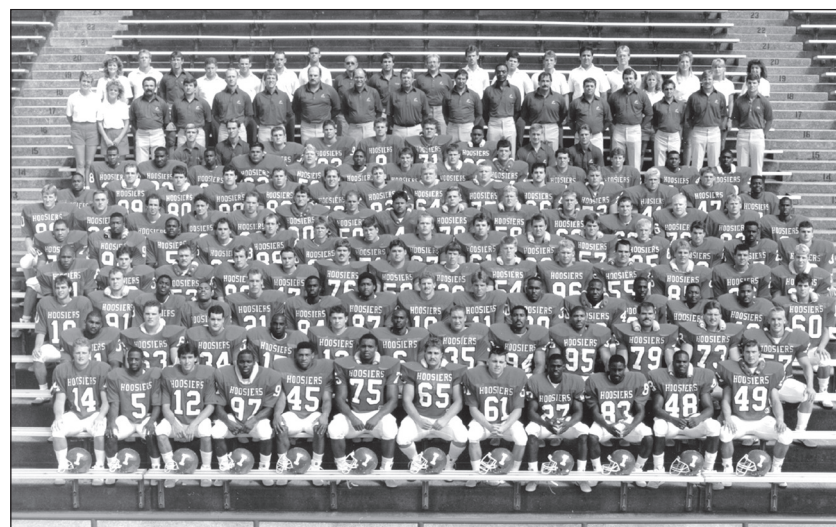
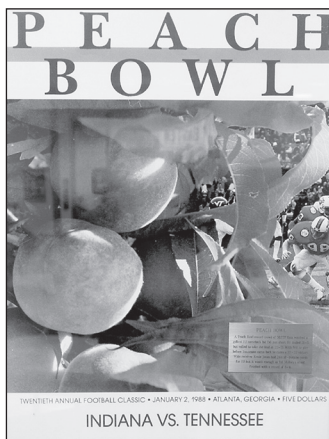
TENNESSEE 27, INDIANA 22

Tennessee drove 40 yards in nine plays and scored on a 9-yard touchdown run by running back Reggie Cobb with just 1:52 remaining in the game to clinch a 27-22 victory over Indiana in the 20th Peach Bowl. The game, which was played on Jan. 2, 1988, at Atlanta's Fulton County Stadium, was witnessed by 58,737 fans. Despite the disappointing loss, IU finished the season with an 8-4 record, which included wins over Michigan and Ohio State.

The Volunteers jumped to a quick 21-3 second-quarter lead. That same stanza, UT blocked an Indiana punt on the IU 9-yard line that gave the Volunteers an opportunity to put the game out of reach. However, IU forced a fumble and drove 91 yards for a touchdown, a 43-yard pass play from quarterback Dave Schnell (33-18-218-1TD-2INTs) to wide receiver Ernie Jones (7-150-1TD). The score narrowed IU's deficit to 21-10 prior to halftime.

The lone score of the third period was a 12-yard run by running back Anthony Thompson (18-67-1TD) that moved Indiana to within 21-16, however, the two-point conversion failed. In the fourth quarter, Indiana scored on a fake field goal attempt when tight end Tim Jorden ran 12 yards for a score that gave IU a one-point lead, 22-21. The two-point conversion attempt was unsuccessful. Tennessee, which had come from behind on four other occasions during the 1987 campaign would turn the trick again as Cobb scored his second touchdown of the game, this one a 9-yard run, to give Tennessee the 27-22 victory.

Tennessee gained 474 yards of total offense, including 146 rushing yards and two touchdowns from Cobb, the game's Most Valuable Offensive Player. However, Jones was just as impressive, as he finished with 246 all-purpose yards (150 receiving, 15 rushing, 81 kickoff returns). Indiana linebacker Van Waiters was recognized as the game's Most Valuable Defensive Player.

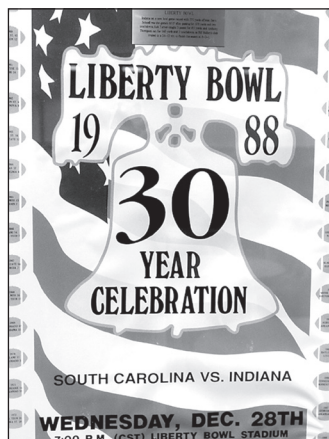
After finishing the regular season with a 7-3-1 record and a 5-3 mark in the Big Ten, Indiana earned a postseason berth for the third consecutive year and played South Carolina in the Liberty Bowl in Memphis, Tenn. The Hoosiers dominated the game and cruised to a 34-10 victory before 39,210 fans.

Indiana running back Anthony Thompson (26-140-2TDs) began the scoring with a 7-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, and the Hoosiers would add 10 more second-quarter points to take a 17-0 halftime lead. The Gamecocks would close the gap to 17-7 in the third quarter when they scored on a 34-yard return of a blocked punt. The two teams would then trade third-quarter field goals and the fourth quarter began with Indiana leading, 20-10.

Although Indiana dominated throughout, the game-breaking play occurred on the first snap of the fourth quarter when Indiana quarterback Dave Schnell (31-16-378-2TDs-1INT) hooked up with wide receiver Rob Turner (5-182-1TD) on an 88-yard touchdown pass that upped IU's lead to 27-10. Thompson would cap the scoring with an 8-yard touchdown run later that quarter that earned him a tie for the Big Ten single-season touchdown record with 26 scores.

Indiana set a Liberty Bowl record with 575 yards of total offense. South Carolina, on the other hand, could muster only 153 total yards, including just 23 yards rushing. The IU defense intercepted three passes and recovered a fumble to go along with six quarterback sacks.

Schnell was the game's Most Valuable Player, and wide receiver Tony Buford caught three passes for 100 yards.

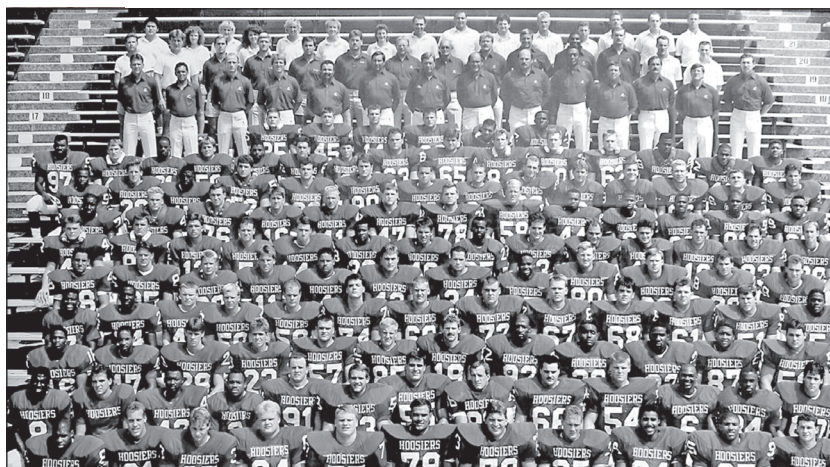

## 1990 PEACH BOWL

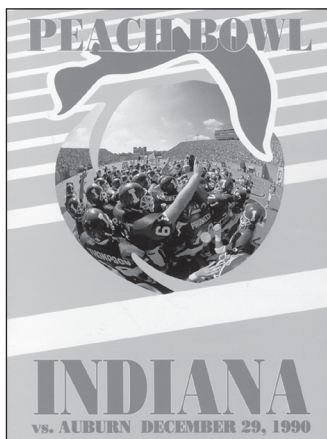

Indiana finished with a 6-4-1 regular-season record in 1990, a mark good enough to earn the Hoosiers a berth in the Peach Bowl for a date with the Auburn Tigers. The game, which was played at Fulton County Stadium in Atlanta on Dec. 30, 1990, was one of the best games played during the 1990 bowl season.

Auburn led Indiana 17-10 at halftime and increased its lead to 20-10 on a 43-yard field goal during the third quarter, but the Hoosiers returned the favor as quarterback Trent Green scored on touchdown runs of two and 11 yards to give IU a 23-20 lead.

However, Auburn quarterback Stan White (48-31-351-1TD passing and 2 TD runs) would direct the Tigers on a 13-play, 72-yard, 1:40-minute, scoring drive. He capped the drive himself when he scored on a 1-yard run with just 39 seconds remaining in the game. The touchdown gave Auburn a 27-23 victory.

Auburn dominated the game statistically, as the Tigers tallied 440 total yards to IU's 220. However, Indiana utilized a solid kicking game to keep the game close. Trent Green tied a Peach Bowl record with his three rushing touchdowns while running back Vaughn Dunbar (21-81) and free safety Mike Dumas (14 tackles, 4 passes broken up) earned offensive and defensive Most Valuable Player honors, respectively.

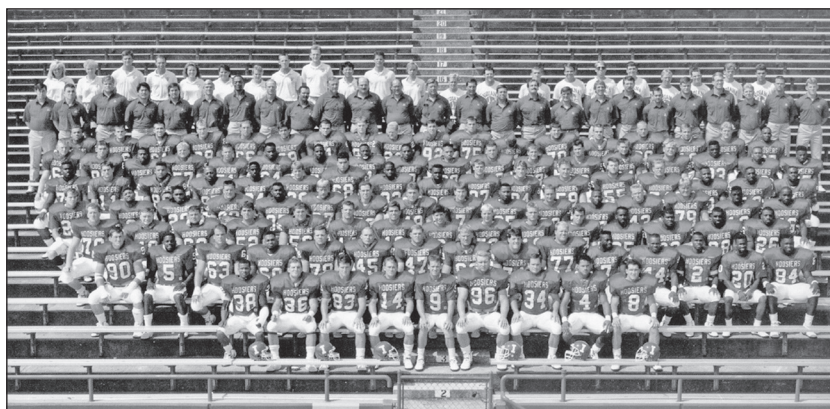

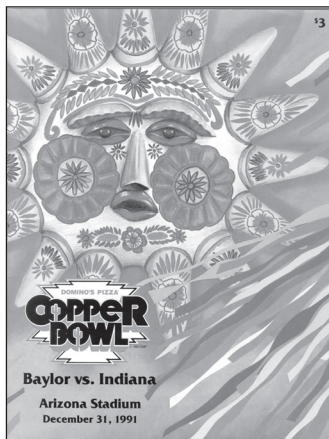
In one of the most impressive performances by any team during the 1991 bowl season, Indiana dominated a highly-regarded Baylor team in the Copper Bowl, 24-0.

Indiana wasted little time getting started as it jumped to a 17-0 halftime lead and was never threatened on its way to winning its second bowl game in four years.

Indiana quarterback Trent Green (21-11-165-0-0 passing, 2 rushing touchdowns) broke the Hoosiers into the scoring column when he tallied a 1-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. IU would increase its lead one quarter later when kicker Scott Bonnell connected on a 27-yard field goal attempt and running back Vaughn Dunbar (28-106-1TD rushing) scored on a 5-yard touchdown run to give the Hoosiers a 17-0 halftime advantage.

IU's only scary moment came in the third quarter when Baylor reached Indiana's 2-yard line. However, a muffed handoff resulted in a fumble that was recovered in the end zone by free safety Damon Watts and the game was, for all intents and purposes, over.

Dunbar won game Most Valuable Player honors on offense and linebacker Mark Hagen (11 tackles, including 2 tackles for loss, and 1 pass broken up) was the game's defensive MVP.

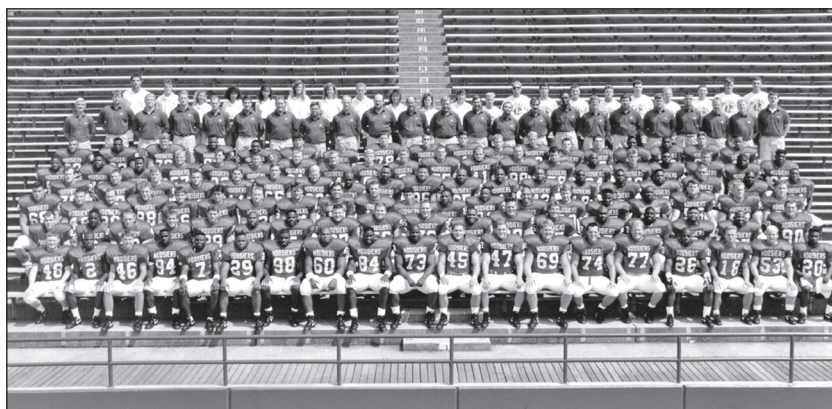

## 1993 INDEPENDENCE BOWL

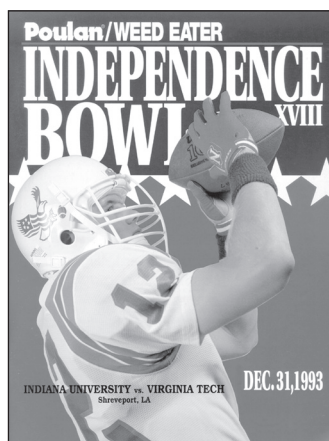

Virginia Tech used two touchdowns in the final 23 seconds of the first half to post a 45-20 victory over Indiana in the 1993 Independence Bowl.

On the positive side of the ledger for IU, wide receiver Thomas Lewis tallied six receptions for 177 yards and two touchdowns. However, Virginia Tech quarterback Maurice DeShazo completed 19-of-33 passes for 193 yards and two touchdowns on his way to earning offensive game MVP honors.

On the other side of the ball, safety Antonio Banks was the game's defensive MVP as he tallied nine tackles, one interception and one pass broken up, in addition to a touchdown on the blocked field goal.

Indiana finished the 1993 season with an 8-4 record. Two of its three regular season losses were by seven points or less.

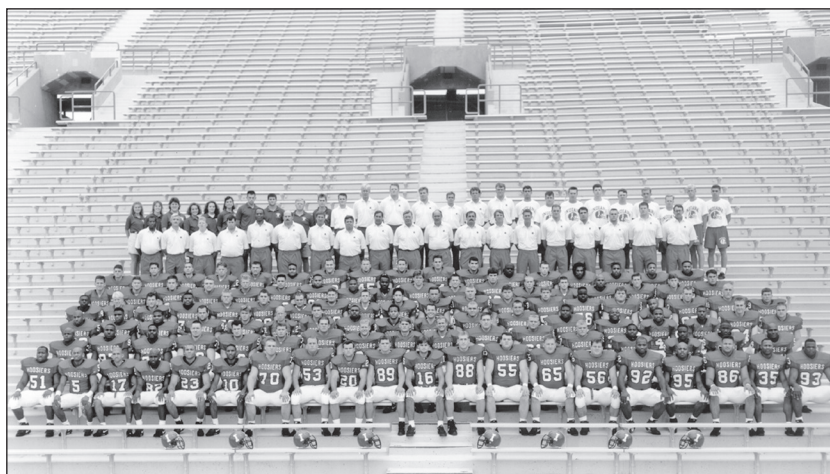

## 2007 INSIGHT BOWL

DECEMBER 31, 2007

TEMPE, ARIZ.

OKLAHOMA STATE 49, INDIANA 33

Indiana capped off an emotional season in achieving late head coach Terry Hoepfner's dream of "Playing 13," as the Hoosiers returned to a postseason bowl for the first time in 14 years at the 2007 Insight Bowl.

Oklahoma State's no-huddle offense took a strong first half lead, and it was too much for a spirited Hoosier squad to overcome in a 49-33 defeat. The Hoosiers rallied from a 35-10 halftime deficit to get within two scores on two separate occasions in the second half.

Kellen Lewis threw for 204 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the loss, tying IU great Antwaan Randle El for first place on the all-time list with 42 TD passes in his career. The sophomore quarterback also ran for 83 yards on 10 carries and scored a touchdown on the ground.

The Hoosiers drove 52 yards on 11 plays on their opening drive, taking a 3-0 lead on Austin Starr's 43-yard field goal at the 10:41 mark of the opening quarter. But OSU scored the next 28 points of the game before the Hoosiers made it 28-10 on a Marcus Thigpen 4-yard TD grab. Cowboy quarterback Zac Robinson tacked on a 1-yard run just before the half to give OSU a 25-point lead at the break.

IU struck with the first points of the second half on a Lewis 1-yard run that followed a 4th-and-8 conversion on a fake field goal pass from Lewis to Starr. The Cowboys rebutted with a TD of their own, and 16 fourth quarter points by the Hoosiers proved to not be enough to overcome the early deficit.

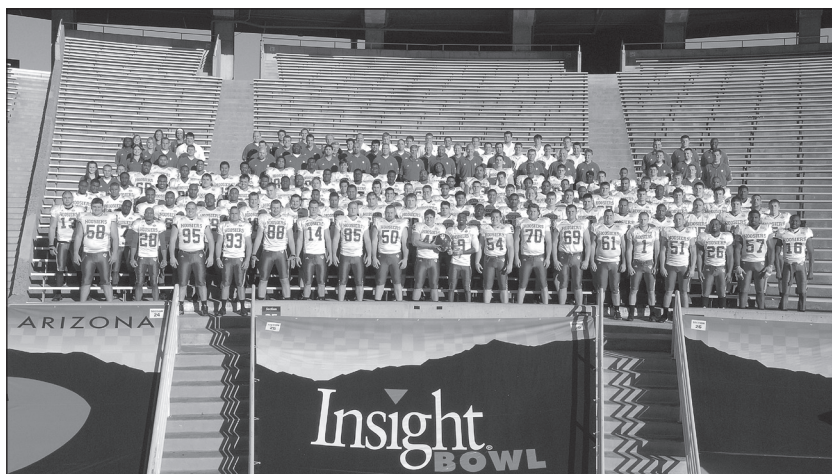

# Spriggs, Feeney Collect First Team All-America Accolades

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Indiana senior left tackle Jason Spriggs and redshirt junior right guard Dan Feeney collected first team All-America laurels on Monday. Spriggs was recognized on the AutoNation FWAA All-America team, while Feeney carded his honor from ESPN.com.

The duo becomes the first offensive line tandem to secure first team honors in the same season in program history and just the sixth pair of teammates to accomplish the feat.

Spriggs and Feeney are the fifth and sixth first team All-America o-linemen in school history, joining Gary Cassells (1967), Tom Schuette (1966), Don Croftcheck (1964) and John Tavener (1944).

The Hoosiers now have three All-Americans over the past two seasons, as current Atlanta Falcons running back Tevin Coleman was a 2014 unanimous and consensus selection.

Spriggs joins Coleman (2014), Antwaan Randle El (2001), Vaughn Dunbar (1991), Anthony Thompson (1988, 1989), Cassells (1967), Bob Ravensberg (1945) and Tavener (1944) as IU's all-time FWAA first-teamers.

One of six semifinalists for the 2015 Outland Trophy, Spriggs has additionally been recognized as an All-American by the Walter Camp Football Foundation, Associated Press and SI.com. He has allowed just two sacks in 431 called pass attempts and has 72 knockdowns in 972 snaps. The Concord, Ind., native started 28 consecutive games to begin his career and has made a team-high 46 starts in 47 games at left tackle.

Feeney, who has previously been honored as an All-American by the Associated Press, CBS Sports and SI.com, has allowed just one sack in 36 career starts at right guard (2,617 snaps). In 2015, he has not allowed a sack in 431 called pass attempts. The Orland Park,

Ill., native owns a team-best 91 knockdowns in 967 snaps. A first team All-Big Ten honoree, Feeney was also an Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award Watch Lister.

Indiana shares first in the Big Ten and ninth nationally with 13 sacks allowed. The Hoosiers rank first in the B1G in total offense (490.8; 16th nationally), passing offense (285.9; 24th) and scoring offense (36.2; T-22nd), and second in rushing offense (204.8; T-30th).

IU has not led the conference in scoring offense since the league began using the entire season's statistics to determine the statistical champion in 1985. Indiana has not led the league in total offense since 1988. The Hoosiers would be the first team since Ohio State in 1995 to pace the Big Ten in total, passing and scoring offense.



## Sudfeld Named MVP at Indiana Football Banquet

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld was named the 2015 Anthony Thompson Most Valuable Player at the Indiana football banquet on Friday evening. Sudfeld, right guard Dan Feeney, defensive end Nick Mangieri, linebacker Marcus Oliver, bandit Zack Shaw and left tackle Jason Spriggs were recognized as the 2015 team captains. Head coach Kevin Wilson honored the team's seniors and handed out several awards inside the Henke Hall of Champions.

One of the most decorated quarterbacks in IU history, Sudfeld is first in passing touchdowns (58), passing yardage (7,490), 350-yard games (5), 300-yard games (10), 200-yard games (18) and four-touchdown games (5), tied for first in 400-yard games (1), 250-yard games (12) and three-touchdown games (9), second in completion percentage (60.6), tied for second in completions (565), third in total offense (7,602) and fifth in attempts (932) on the Hoosiers career lists in 36 games (25 starts).

A Maxwell and Unitas Award Watch Lister, Sudfeld's four 350-yard games are first, six 300-yard games share first, 3,184 yards are second, 24 touchdowns share second, 3,225 total yards are third, 219 completions are fifth and 361 attempts are eighth on the program's single-season list.

The Modesto, Calif., native leads the Big Ten in passing yards per game (289.5; 17th nationally), passing yards (3,184; 23rd), total offense per game (293.2; 20th), total offense (3,225; 26th), passing efficiency (153.9; 17th), yards per completion (14.5; 4th) and yards per attempt (8.8; 12th), shares first in touchdowns (24; T-23rd) and TD-INT ratio, shares second in fewest interceptions (5) and is fourth in completion percentage (60.7).

Over the final two weeks of the season, Sudfeld earned Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week honors, the first

two of his career. In those two games, he collected eight passing TDs and 10 total scores. Sudfeld went 41-of-64 (64.1 percent) for 735 yards, good for a 201.8 passer rating.

A three-time Academic All-Big Ten member, Sudfeld was one of three finalists for the Wuerffel Trophy and one of 10 finalists for the Senior CLASS Award®. He was a semifinalist for the National Football Foundation's National Scholar-Athlete Award and a nominee for the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team®.

## Redding's Patience Rewarded During IU's Bowl Run

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Devine Redding had to be patient. He didn't have much choice.

The sophomore was patient last season while getting sparse carries as the third-string running back behind All-American Tevin Coleman and senior D'Angelo Roberts. He was patient when first team All-Big Ten running back Jordan Howard transferred to Indiana in the offseason and started taking the lion's share of the snaps. All Redding could do was wait his turn and be ready when he was called.

With Howard sidelined by a knee injury, Redding's patience was rewarded the final two weeks of the regular season. He took over as the No. 1 running back in Indiana's wins against Maryland and Purdue, rushing for 274 yards and a touchdown on 46 carries.

"Just got to keep it going with coach's philosophy," Redding said. "Next guy up. Just have a love for the game, love to play."

Redding's patience is being tested in a different way now. He's getting a crash course in waiting for the right moment to burst through running lanes at the line of scrimmage.

Waiting for the hole to open can be difficult for a young running back. Every play is a balance between wanting to impress the coaching staff with a long run and not trying to run through a gap that isn't there.

That's where the patience comes in.

"I was very impatient coming in," Redding said. "I was always just fast to everything. Jordan and Coach (Deland) McCullough helped me out with everything.

Patience is the key, really. Just being patient, letting everything open up."

And once it does open?

"Hit it," Redding said. "Hit it like a shot."

Redding has been the understudy of two of the best rushers in the Big Ten in that regard.

He said Coleman, now an Atlanta Falcon, taught him the value of hitting the running lanes hard without fear. Howard is a more methodical back, teaching

Redding the importance of being patient and waiting for those gaps to open before bursting through.

"I feel like I'm more relaxed back there," Redding said. "I'm not as tense and just excited as I was. I can get back there and comfortably seek out the defense."

Fifth-year senior center Jake Reed admitted he's not quite sure how his running backs do what they do.

He said Redding's eagerness to jump in and replace Howard when he's been limited has been part of what makes Indiana's offense as strong as it is. He went on to add that even Redding has guys like freshman Mike Majette and redshirt junior Andrew Wilson waiting behind him to do the same.

"Devine's a hard worker," Reed said. "There's just a talent being able to see the holes and just kind of knowing when they're going to open up. You'll see these guys where it just looks like a wall of trouble and at the last second, they'll split and they'll find it. It's just impressive to watch."

Redding's back to work getting ready for a Pinstripe Bowl matchup in New York against Duke later this month. With Howard still recovering from his knee injury, it's still not clear to anyone how many snaps he'll wind up taking on gameday.

He's not too concerned, either. He's

used to being patient by now.

"You can't feel pressure because then you're going to think too much and you're probably going to overthink things and not be able to do your job," Redding said. "I kind of just leave that out of the picture and just kind of be a team player and play to the best of my abilities."



# Indiana Excited For Holidays In New York

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Zack Shaw waited five years for the surprise that came at the end of practice Sunday afternoon.

Indiana Director of Athletics Fred Glass showed up to the team's huddle with a message to deliver. Truth be told, the Hoosiers already had a pretty good idea of what he was about to say.

Glass told the team he was proud of what they'd accomplished and that he'd just gotten off the phone with a certain bowl representative. He reached into a bag and pulled out a red Yankees cap and told the team they were heading to New York to play in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl against Duke.

Shaw's Indiana Hoosiers were finally going bowling.

"It's hard to put into words," Shaw said. "You wait so long for something like that to happen. When it did, everyone was just really excited because it's sort of happening. This is what you play for."

Shaw put in his time. The bandit returned for a fifth season knowing a bowl was within reach, but it was never certain until the Hoosiers defeated Purdue in the final week to punch their ticket to the postseason.

His relief was shared among Indiana's senior class that, in its last season, reached the bowl game they strived for when they arrived in Bloomington as freshmen.

"I'm very proud," senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld said. "Ultimately, we wanted to get to the postseason. We were aware that if we didn't take care of business at the end of the season here, and really throughout the season, that we would never have that opportunity (as seniors). Everybody should be able to experience a bowl game."

Indiana head coach Kevin Wilson is admittedly not much of a baseball fan, but he couldn't shrug off the magnitude of playing a game at Yankee Stadium the day after Christmas. The national television exposure during the holiday season in a city like New York should bring Wilson's program additional attention, which could pay dividends down the line with recruiting.

"I wouldn't say I'm the biggest baseball guy ever, but the first time I went to Wrigley Field, I almost started crying," Wilson said. "They've got a new stadium, not the same field. But it's kind of neat to play in one of the great cities. It's going to be kind of neat to play in a great venue."

Redshirt sophomore linebacker Marcus Oliver is simply happy he can stop worrying about where he'll be playing.

Oliver was one of the Hoosiers who spent the week weighing the bowl options trying to figure out which one Indiana would be invited to. It was mostly guesswork that kept he and his teammates busy during a slow week as they counted down the days to selection Sunday.

"It was stressful, but it was also kind of fun," Oliver said. "Just being able to be around these guys, and when we found out seeing how happy everyone was. You understand why this is so important. This is why you play."

Earlier last week, knowing New York was a potential bowl destination, Wilson asked how many of his players had visited New York before. He was curious more than anything else.

"I think about 20 of our kids raised their hands," Wilson said.

That's about to change.

And Indiana wouldn't have it any other way.

"Christmas in New York," Shaw said, "It's going to be fun."





## IU's Commitment To Walk-On Program Pays Off

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Andre Booker, Mitchell Paige and Andrew Wilson are each integral members of Indiana's 2012 walk-on class. They're the recent success stories of a walk-on program head coach Kevin Wilson prioritized when he began coaching in Bloomington in 2011. After all, Coach Wilson was a former walk-on offensive lineman at North Carolina who knows firsthand the value of a walk-on's work.

"That group is important to me and to this program," Wilson said earlier this year. "We're not the team we are without those guys."

The walk-on life can be as unrewarding as it is a grind.

They practice the same as everyone else on the team, but there's never a guarantee of seeing the field. Players can go years, even careers, without ever leaving the bench.

Booker went from playing special teams as a freshman to not even seeing his name on the depth chart as a sophomore. As a junior, he backed up the same special teams group he played on as a freshman.

Had it not been for injuries, he may have never seen the field as a senior.

Wilson had a similar playing pattern, going from scoring a touchdown as a freshman to seeing the field in spurts.

Paige went three years without a catch. Up until this year, he was on the field for four total plays: two against Iowa last year, one against Indiana State as a redshirt freshman and one against Purdue.

He remembers every play. As far as he knew, those four snaps could have been all he ever got.

Scholarship players are naturally going to get the priority. They're the ones receiving a scholarship check every

month to play the game. The walk-ons understand that, Paige said.

For every one chance a walk-on gets, a scholarship player may get 10 chances. Maybe more.

"They're going to get their chances," Paige said. "You have to earn yours."

That opportunity could come at any time. Paige remembers subbing in at practice as a freshman for one of the outside receivers on the third team who was too tired near the end of practice. Paige didn't naturally play on the outside, but it didn't matter.

It was the chance walk-ons wait for.

"To me, that's my World Series. That's my Super Bowl," Paige said.

"That turns into your gameday," Booker chimed in.

"This is one of the best things that ever happened to me," Paige said. "To him, he's taking a break. But this is my chance."

Anyone looking on at practice that day likely wouldn't have thought much of it. The practice play ultimately didn't mean anything to anyone outside of Paige. Maybe nobody would ever notice how he exploded out of his route. How he finished near the ball. How he ran off the field after the play was over.

But maybe they would.

"It takes patience," Booker said. "You've got to have the right mindset. You've got to come in here focused on your goal. For me, my goal was to play. I didn't know when. But I was going to play."

Booker's patience was rewarded in his final season. He's got eight catches for 189 yards and three touchdowns. He's had 173 of those yards and two of those TDs in IU's last three games.

Paige had 46 catches for 589 yards and five touchdowns. He also returned two kicks for scores, earning him All-Big Ten honorable mention as a return specialist.

Wilson, like Booker, has peaked late. He had 15 rushes for 52 yards and a touchdown in IU's win against Purdue that clinched the Hoosiers' first bowl appearance since 2007.

"That makes it worth it," Wilson said. "Looking back at it, I'd way rather be playing Purdue and having all those yards than be on a scholarship and not play at all."

These three aren't alone. There's dozens of non-scholarship players working behind the scenes each day to make a difference. Others are front and center, making plays on gameday each week without a scholarship.

Coach Wilson has made it clear, though. Walk-ons who work hard get rewarded. Now in his fifth season at Indiana, Wilson has awarded 40 walk-on players with scholarships to recognize their work.

Inside the Hoosiers' locker room, there's a wall dedicated to celebrating what Wilson calls "walk-on successes." The wall is covered in a collage of nearly life-size photos of every walk-on who's earned a scholarship during Wilson's tenure. Their names join their pictures on the wall to their left.

"When I saw that wall for the first time, it was pretty tight," Andrew Wilson said.

"To other guys, they might think it's cool, but to us, that's what it is. That's it," Paige added. "Because every day is a grind. You see that wall? Wow. This is possible."

Booker, Paige and Wilson are all on that wall. They've all earned a scholar-

ship at one point or another, but unlike scholarship players, a walk-on scholarship only renews if a player earns it again.

There's a certain sense of uncertainty about it, Paige said. A walk-on can't afford to take plays off. Every year, there's a new group of scholarship players coming in that could replace him.

But it's worth it.

It was worth it when Wilson dove into the end zone against Purdue.

It was worth it when Booker took a bubble screen for a score against Michigan State.

And it was worth it when Paige took a punt return 91 yards for a score against Western Kentucky. When he turned around in the end zone, fellow walk-ons Booker, Luke Timian and Damon Graham were the first ones to greet him.

"It was a walk-on party," Paige said. "How cool is that?"

Those are the moments the work gets rewarded.

Those are the moments that keep walk-ons coming into practice each day without complaints.

Those are the moments that make Indiana's walk-ons keep coming back.

"I think I can speak for all these walk-ons when I say this is the best thing that will probably ever happen to me," Paige said.

"Walking on was the best decision I ever made."



## School Record Twelve Hoosiers Honored by B1G

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - A school record 12 Indiana football standouts were recognized by the Big Ten on Monday and Tuesday evening. Redshirt sophomore kicker Griffin Oakes was named the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year and first team All-Big Ten.

Redshirt junior right guard Dan Feeney and junior running back Jordan Howard collected first team All-Big Ten honors. Senior left tackle Jason Spriggs was a second team selection and senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld was a third team honoree.

Seven additional Hoosiers received honorable mention recognition: sophomore wide receiver Simmie Cobbs, Jr., fifth-year senior tight end Michael Cooper, junior defensive tackle Darius Latham, senior defensive end Nick Mangieri, redshirt sophomore linebacker Marcus Oliver, redshirt junior return specialist Mitchell Paige and fifth-year senior bandit Zack Shaw.

Fifth-year senior center Jake Reed was named Indiana's Big Ten Sportsmanship Award winner.

# Indiana Defeats Purdue, Keeps Old Oaken Bucket

**WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind.** - Kevin Wilson couldn't contain a smile during his postgame press conference. It's hard to blame him.

His Indiana Hoosiers had just defeated Purdue 54-36 to retain the Old Oaken Bucket and secure bowl eligibility for the first time since 2007. But even so, he stuck to his usual script of not showing much emotion minus the wry smile. He was the same Wilson in public as he always is.

But just minutes before, in the Indiana locker room, Wilson broke from his usual persona, according to his players. He joined in on their celebration, dancing to Drake and other hip-hop music that blared through the speakers.

"He's not a good dancer," senior tight end Anthony Corsaro said. "But that's alright. He's my guy."

Wilson had reason to dance. His Hoosiers won their third straight Old Oaken Bucket for the first time since a four-game winning streak from 1944-47 and are heading to a bowl game. Indiana doesn't care which one. They're just excited to be going.

Indiana scored a school-record 54 points in West Lafayette, finished the season winning two consecutive Big Ten road games for the first time since 1993 and headed home to Bloomington knowing they'd completed at least the second-best regular season in 20 years.

"The energy that was in that locker room after the game was something we haven't had since I've been here," fifth-year senior bandit Zack Shaw said. "Guys are getting confidence in themselves, and that was what we needed."

Indiana's win against rival Purdue (2-10, 1-7) was fittingly imperfect. Not much about this season came easy for the Hoosiers.

IU (6-6, 2-6) let the Boilermakers hang around throughout most of the game, never pulling away enough to feel comfortable until five minutes into the fourth quarter. Senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld delivered the decisive blow to a wide open senior wide receiver Andre Booker down the sideline for a 72-yard touchdown with just over 10 minutes remaining in the game.

The touchdown extended IU's lead to 15 points after Purdue had pulled within a score. Purdue failed to get any closer after that.

"We just wanted an aggressive mindset," Wilson said. "We wanted our team playing on edge. We gave up some stuff. We made some stuff. It wasn't pretty..."

"Really just proud of the seniors and thankful for them. To me, it's more about them than any of the coaches."

The senior class, Wilson's first true recruiting class in Bloomington, had its shining moments in their final Bucket game.

Sudfeld finished completing 18-of-29 passes for 350 yards, giving him 7,490 career yards. He now owns the program record for career passing yards and touchdowns.

Fellow senior defensive end Nick Mangieri had two sacks in the game. Sophomore running back Devine Redding ran for a career-high 144 yards on 22 carries. Redshirt sophomore kicker Griffin Oakes made a pair of field goals to give him 22 on the season, setting an Indiana record himself.

Purdue's Austin Appleby threw for 332 yards, two passing touchdowns and rushed for two touchdowns in place of normal starter David Blough. Running back Markell Jones aided him with 96 rushing yards on 16 carries.

But four offensive turnovers and giving up 659 total yards was too much for the Boilermakers to overcome.

"Every time we were down by 10, we'd give up one over our head or they made a big play," Purdue head coach Darrell Hazell said. "We had some early turnovers that shifted the momentum of the game."

Unlike Indiana's two most-recent Bucket wins, the Hoosiers' job isn't over yet. They'll wait for their bowl invitation and begin formulating a practice schedule for the next month.

But that will come in its due time. Wilson wasn't quick to go into details about what's next. He was more keen to talk about what had just happened.

The Hoosiers gave Wilson a reason to dance.

"Those fourth and fifth-year guys, to me, they've already done a lot—win, lose or draw," Wilson said. "And they have a high esteem in my world. I'm just glad we get a chance to spend a few more weeks together."





### Oliver's 'It' Has Him Among IU's Best

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Each week, Indiana's coaching staff awards the best offensive, defensive, special teams and scout players of the week with public recognition. The award winners have their picture placed on the wall just outside IU's team meeting room at Memorial Stadium.

The Hoosiers who get recognized are setting the best example on the field. Sometimes weeks pass without any players being recognized. Other weeks have two or three players get their pictures put up on the wall.

Earning the award once is difficult to begin with. That sets the expectation.

Winning multiple weeks means the player continues to elevate his game and stand out among his teammates.

In 11 possible weeks, redshirt sophomore linebacker Marcus Oliver has been named Indiana's defensive player five times. He leads the team in recognition, impressing head coach Kevin Wilson week in and week out with his ability to consistently make plays.

"Week to week, he's been banged up. He's been out there hobbling at times, but always on gameday, he brings it," defensive coordinator Brian Knorr said. "He's a guy just by his actions, certainly he has all our guys' attention."

Oliver isn't particularly overwhelming. The 6-foot-1, 238 pound Hamilton, Ohio, native wasn't receiving notoriety of extra attention in the preseason. He wasn't even listed as a starter on Indiana's initial depth chart.

By the time games started, it was difficult for the coaches to keep Oliver off the field. He was making the plays he needed to and had a knack for forcing turnovers. He quickly emerged as one of IU's most consistent defensive players at the highly touted linebacker position.

So what separates Oliver? What were people missing?

Ask linebackers coach William Inge, and he'll tell you Oliver has "it."

"It's the it," Inge said. "And the 'it' has to deal with high care value, 100 percent effort on the field, great attention to details and focus and a high care value for your teammates. If you possess that, and Marcus does, typically a lot of things are going to work out pretty good."

Oliver said he knew he had "it" all along. He just hadn't had the opportunity to show it.

"I had confidence in myself," he said. "I have the expectations to be one of the best linebackers in the Big Ten and college football period. It's just understanding football and taking coaching. The coaches put me in good spots. From there, I'm able to make plays."

Oliver's third year in Bloomington has been a comeback story of sorts. His true sophomore season was cut short only four games in after suffering a knee injury in IU's win against Missouri last season.

Fully healthy, Oliver leads Indiana with 91 tackles, a mark that ranks ninth in the Big Ten.

What's been more impressive has been his ability to force turnovers. Oliver has four forced fumbles this season, sharing fifth nationally. He also has one interception, three pass break-ups and a sack.

Inge said Oliver's playmaking ability is a result of his preparation. In IU's win against Maryland last week, he said there were about five or six plays where he recognized the Terrapins' play before the snap and benefited from being able to anticipate where he needed to be.

"I've always been pretty good at getting turnovers since high school," Oliver said. "The mindset just helps me and everyone else keep pressing."

Oliver rotates in at linebacker with junior T.J. Simmons and sophomore Tegray Scales. The three of them make bets among themselves during games where the loser has to do pushups or run sprints after practice while the winner watches.

Oliver does more watching than he does pushups.

"It just keeps us competitive," he said.

Inge explained that one of IU's program goals is to see constant, consistent improvement.

Oliver is a living example.

He may not have been at the top of the scouting report at the beginning of the season, Inge said, but he's surely there now. If he wants to be one of the best linebackers in the Big Ten, Inge sees no reason why he can't.

He's got the "it" to be one of the best, Inge said.

Whatever that is.

"All the small things you need to do to be great, Marcus does those things," Inge said. "It's unexplainable. It's in his actions. He wants to make a difference, and he wants to be great."



## Corsaro Brings The Juice For Indiana

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Anthony Corsaro doesn't necessarily like the spotlight on him.

It just happens to wind up there more often than not.

"If someone has to bring the juice, I'll bring it," the senior tight end said. "To say this game is hard is an understatement. As a leader on this team, I think the most important thing is to learn how to work smart and hard at the same time while enjoying it. If you don't enjoy it, you're not going to get better. I want our guys enjoying it."

Corsaro sometimes doubles as a hype man at practice, doing whatever he can to add some flair or crack some smiles during the grind of a long, physical workout.

His voice has become one of the more recognizable ones on the practice field, keeping everyone engaged as best he can. He'll joke and yell during practice with as many teammates as he can, never taking practice any less seriously, but trying to break the tension and keep everyone loose.

"Every team has to have a person who's like that," redshirt junior offensive tackle Dimitric Camiel said. "When everything is kind of in a lull and practice is long, you feel like you want to stop."

But then he comes out with a loud yell or just screaming across the field at somebody, that kind of gets everybody's moral moving."

Back in August at an open practice, Corsaro drew laughs on the sidelines after yelling "Suddy Manziel" when senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld took off running on an option play.

Sudfeld, normally not known for his running ability like former Texas A&M quarterback Johnny Manziel was, picked up a chunk of yards and some

more words of encouragement from Corsaro along the way.

"I think there's some real value to enjoying yourself and the game when you're playing," Corsaro said. "It's something I learned myself and something I try to pass on to the rest of these guys."

Corsaro still hasn't forgotten the frustrations he felt as a walk-on his freshman year from being pushed around by guys like Jason Spriggs and being awed by former Hoosiers tight end Ted Bolser.

Seeing the way Bolser played, Corsaro initially doubted himself playing with scholarship players recruited to come to Indiana. He was undersized and not quite used to playing with standouts like Bolser, who went on to play in the NFL.

"I remember seeing Ted Bolser and looking at myself and just thinking, 'Oh my god. How am I ever going to do that?'" Corsaro said.

Corsaro's solution was actually simple. He worked. He studied. He "brought the juice."

Corsaro went from being named Indiana's Outstanding Walk-On Player of the Year in 2012 to earning scholarships in three consecutive seasons since. Now he's one of the senior leaders for an Indiana team still with goals of having a winning season.

"Corsaro sets the tone for that group," tight ends coach James Patton said. "He's got an infectious energy. He works hard. He does everything you want out of a senior."

Corsaro has had the most productive season of his career, catching eight balls for 199 yards through eight games. He's part of a four-man rotation at tight end that includes fellow senior Michael Cooper and sophomores Dan-

ny Friend and Jordan Fuchs.

Though he's a regular starter and one of the most experienced of the group, Corsaro said he doesn't consider himself or any of the other tight ends as Indiana's true No. 1. He said he measures everything he does as part of the unit.

"We've really embraced as a group being each other's fans and being each other's biggest critics," Corsaro said. "So when a tight end scores, the other four or five guys want to be the first ones in the end zone celebrating with him, but we'll also be the first to say, 'Hey, you need to clean that up.'"

Corsaro doesn't have much time left to clean things up now. He's got four games left, and he's come to realize his time is running out.

He said at the beginning of the year that Indiana has enough talent to be a winning football team.

If the Hoosiers get there, Corsaro can at least assure one thing:

He'll bring the juice.

"It's definitely a surreal feeling knowing this is your last go around," Corsaro said. "As a senior, a guy that's been around now, I don't think anyone is satisfied yet. I just want to leave it out there and do my job and make an impact on this football team."



## Howard Still Has Something To Prove

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Jordan Howard—somehow—still isn't satisfied.

He wasn't after starting the season as the nation's leading rusher before an ankle injury held him out of 10 quarters and ruined his chances of finishing among the country's best in total yards.

He still wasn't even after rushing for 174 yards and two touchdowns against Iowa's formerly top-ranked rush defense. Formerly, as in Howard's individual performance ballooned the Hawkeyes' numbers.

Even after rushing for 238 yards and two touchdowns against Michigan's No. 1-ranked scoring defense, nearly leading the Hoosiers to an upset victory in the process all while becoming the Big Ten's leading rusher at 149.9 yards per game—nope.

Still not good enough.

"He's a guy who doesn't take compliments well," running backs coach Deland McCullough said. "He feels like there's so much more he can do."

Howard is an example of when perfectionist meets hypercritical student of the game. Nothing he does is ever enough in his mind because there's always something he could have done differently.

He's chasing unobtainable flawlessness.

During team meetings, he'll watch himself cut up the field on film for a 15-yard gain and shake his head.

"I could have made this cut instead of that one," Howard will say, completely serious. "Maybe I would have picked up a few more yards."

McCullough said he has a room full of Jordan Howards now. His running backs don't hand out compliments or celebrate much of anything. The occa-

sional "good run" is about all they'll get out of each other.

Like Howard, they all expect nothing short of being the best.

"Nothing is ever enough for him," McCullough said. "He established in our room quickly that he has high standards for himself. Now, everybody in our room holds themselves to those same standards."

Howard made the jump to Indiana and the Big Ten conference after UAB discontinued its football program during the offseason. He came to Bloomington expecting to win and prove he's one of the best running backs in the country.

"I want to show people I can play with anybody," Howard said, pausing. "I haven't yet."

That last part is where Howard continues to lose his teammates, coaches and competitors who see him play every week.

He's ran for 490 yards and averaged 7.2 yards per carry over the last three weeks against top-20 rush defenses from Michigan State, Iowa and Michigan, doubling their previous per-carry allowance in the process. He's fit right in at Indiana, quickly gathering local and national media attention for his combination of power and speed as he racks up hundreds of yards each week.

What's left to prove?

"I still feel like people doubt me sometimes," Howard said. "They think maybe I'm not that good."

Howard isn't trying to sound arrogant or unappreciative of what he's accomplished. It's just part of who he is.

McCullough said it might stem from Howard only having one scholarship offer out of high school. He was over-

looked then and doesn't want to be missed when he one day tries to transition into the NFL.

"He's got a perpetual chip on his shoulder," McCullough said. "And he's better because of it."

After each game, Howard will turn on his phone and scroll through his Twitter mentions to read all his fans' congratulatory messages. There's normally a few dozen, but he tries to respond to every single one of them.

"@jhoward\_8 is an absolute warrior," one fan writes.

"Thank you," Howard responds.

"Hats off sir, amazing game. You ran through our defense," a Michigan fan Tweets.

"Thank you a lot," Howard Tweets back.

Nearly every Tweet in Howard's feed is the same. He thanks just about every fan who sent a kind word his way with a short message back. He started responding to Tweets when he was at UAB and carried the transition with him up north to Indiana.

He wants fans to know he hears their appreciation.

It's just not enough yet.

"My whole thing was just come here and play as hard as you can play and let the numbers, wins and losses speak for themselves," McCullough said. "He's somebody who feels like he can do more. Who's going to stop him?"



### Reed Looking To Leave IU Better Off

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - As the 2014 season wound down, Jake Reed had a career-altering decision to make. Though, he didn't actually need much time to think about it.

Reed was finishing his fourth season at Indiana. Having redshirted his sophomore year, he could have been done. Not all players opt to return for a fifth season and go through the gruel and grind of a football season.

Only, the more he thought about it, the more he realized he had to return. When Reed, a lifelong Indiana fan from nearby Columbus, Ind., reflected on his career in private, something was missing.

He couldn't leave, Reed thought. He wasn't finished yet.

"I kind of came here to change the culture. I believe in these coaches and this team," Reed said, now a fifth-year senior center. "I really didn't want to give it up the way it was. I wasn't ready to go into the real world yet. I've enjoyed it so much and I love all the coaches and love all the players. It wasn't my time to leave yet."

Reed came to Indiana as part of a pivotal recruiting class.

Originally a commit under the previous coaching staff, Reed elected to honor his decision to play for Indiana after meeting with head coach Kevin Wilson and hearing his vision for the program. Reed is one of just four remaining players from that initial class, partially responsible for launching a new era of Indiana football.

Reed said there's an extra pride among that first class of players, many of whom graduated after last season. With a new coaching staff and evolving expectations, the players shared responsibility for building Indiana football into the program it and Wilson envisioned it as being.

"And now there's four of us left. It's crazy," Reed said. "I think there's a certain expectation about our class to have left our mark on this team that we've spent all this time with."

Reed's own Indiana career has been full of change ranging from the coaching staff to his own playing position.

After lining up at tight end and defensive end at Columbus North, Reed committed to Indiana intending to play defensive end. But when a pair of tight ends went down with injuries before his true freshman season began, Reed was moved to tight end to fill the void.

Tight end proved to only be a short-term home for Reed, who redshirted the following season as he put on weight to move to the offensive line. His eagerness to move to the offensive line came as a bit of a surprise to those who knew Reed, who turned down multiple scholarship offers from schools who wanted him to play offensive tackle.

"It's funny because that really turned me away at first," Reed said. "I couldn't see myself playing O-line. I really didn't want to in high school, but I can honestly say that I love what I do now."

Reed has since moved over to center, where he's the latest in a line of dependable Indiana centers. He's following the likes of Will Matte, who started 45 games at center and Collin Rahrig, who played in 40 games himself.

Reed studied Matte and Rahrig, looking up to them and learning from their work habits. Midway through last season, Rahrig moved to guard, allowing Reed to take over at center and play alongside one of his mentors.

Since then, Reed has started 12 games at center.

"Jake Reed's a special kid," offen-

sive line coach Greg Frey said at Indiana Media Day. "I mean, all my guys are special, but Jake has just worked so hard. That kid is a product of hard work. He never complained. He never whined. He never took time off. He worked."

He worked because he had work to do.

Reed wasn't ready to leave after his fourth season. He bought into Wilson's vision that Indiana had a winning football program.

That would be an ideal way to end his career, Reed said, but it's not his only definition of success.

"I wanted to leave this program better off than it was when I got here, and I'm not sure we're there yet," Reed said. "We've made tremendous strides, but there's still work to do apart from just winning. I still think we can get so much better, and it really does mean a lot to be able to have said I was a part of that."





## Fant Embracing Life As No. 1 Cornerback

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Rashard Fant has gotten tested this season.

Maybe even more than he originally expected.

The redshirt sophomore is Indiana's No. 1 cornerback in an injury-depleted backfield that was already inexperienced to begin with. As a result, Fant has been on the field for virtually every snap—defensive and special teams—since Indiana's win against Wake Forest in week four.

"He hasn't had one break," secondary coach Brandon Shelby said. "That's what he's got to do."

Michigan ran 74 total offensive plays against Indiana last week. Of those 74 plays, 46 were passes and seven more were quarterback scrambles that forced Indiana to respect the pass coverage 53 times.

Shelby said a majority of those 53 pass plays left Fant in man-to-man coverage with no help against Michigan's top receiver on the field. It's a scenario Fant has quickly gotten all too familiar with this season.

"That's life when you want to be the top corner," Fant said. "It's not always going to be easy, but somebody's got to do it."

Being a cornerback requires isolation. Opposing offenses want their top receiver in space to make plays one-on-one against an oftentimes undersized corner.

Fant's job is finding a way to slow them down. Then he lines up to do it again.

Then again.

"We put a lot on his hands," Shelby said.

Fant tries to stay locked in as best he can knowing he's not getting relieved

any time soon. His 16 pass breakups are tied for fifth in the nation.

That part is good, Fant said, but not great. He's more concerned with what he doesn't have.

"I really need a pick," he said.

He's well aware he still doesn't have an interception to his credit this season and knows time is running out to get one. He said turning batted balls into picks is what separates the good corners from the great corners.

Fant expects to be great.

"I'm never pleased," Fant said. "There's always room to get better. There's always something you can add to your game."

This season is still all relatively new for Fant, who redshirted his true freshman season before playing in all 12 games last fall.

Fant has moved up the chain of command as the veteran cornerback of a cornerbacks' room a little earlier than he'd have anticipated.

"You start looking around the field and realize, 'Man, I'm that guy now,'" Fant said. "When you're suddenly the guy people are looking at, it changes you a little bit. You really want to start making the plays not only for yourself, but you're making plays for these other guys you're playing with"

Fant is going to get beat. He's going to get scored on. He knows that already.

It's a product of modern football, Shelby said. Offenses are as talented and as technical as ever, but he said Fant can't allow that to become his excuse.

"We need more from him," Shelby said. "He's a guy that's a leader for us as far as defending the pass. With the game on the line, he's got to make

those plays."

Fant will have his opportunities against Maryland this weekend. He's not getting a break any time soon.

He doesn't mind either. That's the life of a No. 1 cornerback.

"I love it," Fant said. "You make a play, it's the greatest feeling. If you get beat, you've got another chance to make a play. So go make it."



## IU's Seniors Reflect On Program They've Built Before Senior Day

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Football programs are more battleship than speedboat. Turning a team around is a process that requires time.

Zack Shaw knew that. Jason Spriggs did, too. So did Jake Reed, Nate Sudfeld and the rest of the players scheduled to graduate.

Indiana's senior class understood what they were signing up for when they faxed in their national letters of intent to join head coach Kevin Wilson's Indiana Hoosiers.

When they committed, Wilson was only beginning to lay the foundation for what he envisioned the program being. They were joining the movement in a new era of

Indiana football that they, along with Wilson, would champion.

"I think there's definitely a lot of pride in this group," Reed said. "It's really weird to think about because it doesn't feel like it's ending. I don't think anyone thought it would be easy. We came in here to help coach and everyone build this team into what we think it can be."

Four years later, Indiana's seniors are nearly out of time. The senior members of Hoosier football will be honored before the start of Saturday's Indiana-Michigan game for their commitment to the program as part of IU's annual Senior Day festivities.

"It's a good group," Wilson said. "There's so much football to play. Not all teary-eyed and emotional...These guys have been unbelievable in what they've done every day."

Ask a senior and he'll likely say everything began in Ashton Residence Center the summer before his freshman year.

The football players took up entire floors in Ashton together during the first month of camp and rarely closed their doors. During those first few weeks, the freshmen did what freshmen do. They got lost. They explored campus. They bonded together doing some things they'd rather not go on record about.

Harmless things, Nick Mangieri was quick to point out. Pranks. Jokes. Things they'd bond over.

Up and down the senior class, players talk about how close they are with their teammates and how much they enjoyed their time from day one in Ashton. Their friendships span further than football.

"I look at all the other guys in my senior class just like my family away from my blood family," Mangieri said. "I don't think people really understand what it's like unless you experience it yourself, just how close you get."

In one sense, an era is ending. For nearly half a decade, this senior class has been on the front line as Wilson rebuilt the program from the ground up.

They played through coaching changes and scheme remodeling. They played through a 4-8 record in their freshman seasons after Wilson's Hoosiers went just 1-11 the year before they arrived in Bloomington.

In the case of the fifth-year seniors, they were even part of Wilson's initial season, opting to stick with Indiana's new coach through the brunt of the change. There's a certain bond between the four remaining members of that first class, Shaw said. They've been with Wilson every step of the way.

"When we first got here with this staff, everything was so different. It's crazy,"

Shaw said. "We all really talk about it and we all really take pride in seeing where the program is now and thinking that we've been part of that."

Then there was a 5-7 season as sophomores in 2013 that seemingly ended one breakthrough away from an elusive bowl appearance. Then the struggles of a 4-8 season as juniors after Sudfeld, now a senior, was injured.

Now they're sitting 4-5 heading into Senior Day with a winning record still left to be played for.

"I still feel like there's a lot to accomplish for myself and for the team," Sudfeld said. "Ultimately, with the guys I came in with and what the guys on our team want is to get the wins we know we can and finish this season extremely strong."

Indiana's seniors have played through growth and setback. They've won and lost. The Hoosiers may not even see the day where Wilson's vision of excellence—they're vision of excellence—is met.

But that doesn't necessarily matter, Spriggs said. It's not only about them. It's about the program they bought into when not many players would. It's about the program they still buy into when outsiders doubt them.

They're closer this year than they were last. And they're closer today than they were yesterday.

So if he has to watch Indiana win a Big Ten Championship one day from the grandstands or the seat of his couch, he'll be happy just the same knowing he was a part of ushering in a new era of Indiana football.

"Coming in to when I first signed here, I wanted to change the program," Spriggs said. "I think we all did. We

wanted to come out being the team that you look at like Michigan State, Ohio State or one of those teams that constantly wins and goes to a bowl game.

"I don't think our record shows that, but I hope that future tams will carry on what we're trying to do here and carry on what we're leaving behind."

When Wilson talks about the importance of winning the three remaining games this season, he's not doing so with only himself in mind. He's doing it for his seniors. He mentions them all the time.

He talked about their hard work Monday, taking only a brief time to reflect on their careers. Wilson isn't in the business of looking backward. He's nearly always looking ahead to the next day, the next game, the next opponent or the next meeting. He wants to move forward.

But he broke his usual character for a few minutes Monday to recognize the work his seniors have done. He had to. As Wilson would say, they're "his guys."

And he's grateful for them.

"These guys have given a lot," Wilson said. "I've tried to take the greedy part out of things. But I want these kids to experience success because I know the effort, energy, true energy they've given our program. It's been very impressive. Very proud of that group."



## Camiel Becoming 'A Dude' For Indiana

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Dimitric Camiel is a dude. Or maybe he's a guy. Kevin Wilson isn't quite sure yet.

Two weeks ago, Indiana's head coach praised Camiel's play against Michigan State, calling him "a dude." He backed off his claim Monday, instead saying Camiel is more of "a guy."

There's a difference between the two classifications, though Camiel said he isn't quite sure what it takes to go from "guy" to "dude" status or vice versa. Indiana's starting right tackle doesn't really care.

"I'm just a kid from Texas trying to play ball," Camiel said.

The kid from Texas is a 6-foot-7, 310-pound redshirt junior that's been tasked with protecting his quarterback from some of the Big Ten's most elite pass rushers.

In October alone, Camiel was matched up against the likes of Joey Bosa, Carl Nassib and Shilique Calhoun in a matter of four weeks. All three rank in the top eight in the conference in tackles for loss, and all three picked out Camiel.

Camiel said he understands why they'd rather attack his side of the offensive line. Senior left tackle Jason Spriggs—who has been projected as an early-round pick in next spring's NFL Draft—holds down the other side and has already proven his worth.

Camiel is still making a name for himself. The kid from Texas said he hasn't proven anything yet.

"He knows what he's up against," offensive line coach Greg Frey said. "But Dimitric is working hard and he cares. And really, guys that work hard and care can become what they want to become. The question that's asked is 'What does he want?' Because that's what it will come down to."

Camiel has started all eight games this season after getting his number called five times last fall to replace Ralston Evans as he dealt with injury. He initially redshirted as a freshman before appearing in all 12 games in 2013 and getting onto the field regularly as both a starter and rotation player in 2014.

When Evans opted to end his career short with a medical hardship, Camiel won the position in fall camp. He said there's no secret to what he did. He worked as hard as he could and tried to be as consistent as possible, all with the help of Evans now coaching him at his former position.

Camiel is open in analyzing his own game, repeatedly saying he needs to get better. He looks up to players like Jamaal Brown and Trent Williams—both Wilson products—and says he knows he's not nearly as talented as them yet.

But Camiel wants to get there. Wilson does too.

"He's on me a lot, telling me he's seen some really good guys, and he always says, 'You're not one of those guys,'" Camiel said. "I use that as motivation, because I look up to those guys."

Camiel may not be as naturally talented as NFL-caliber players yet. He may never be.

But he promises to work. Under Wilson's guidance, the guy could become a dude one day just like Brown and Williams did before him.

Whatever that really means.

"Dimitric wants to be great," Frey said. "And to be honest with you, he's now starting to become the player we thought he could be. Quite honestly. And I think he's starting to feel that as well."





## Halford Humble As A Walk-On After Marine Service

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - James Halford didn't want to talk about it.

But he was going to.

Halford, a 26-year-old veteran of two tours of active duty in Australia and various parts of the Pacific as a U.S. Marine, sat at a table in the Henke Hall of Champions surrounded by media members interested in his story. The walk-on downplays his accomplishments as he shares them.

He didn't serve for the attention.

"Nothing spectacular," Halford says. "Nothing to brag about. We usually don't go into it too much." 71372

Halford, a student again pursuing a degree in secondary education in hopes of one day becoming a school teacher, now suddenly plays football in the Big Ten East where the defending national champions call home. He studies football tendencies now, not military strategies. He prefers talking about the game.

Bloomington is a world away from the active military, a job Halford would rather not go into detail about. He was in the infantry where he trained almost constantly all day and all night for months at a time keeping his assault skills sharp. He specialized as a tow gunner and cross-trained on machine guns.

Halford can't immediately recall how long he served overseas. His best guess is that it was either 13 or 14 months. When people ask him about his job, he normally lies and says he's a construction worker to avoid going into the details of the armed forces.

"Just because I was in the Marines, I don't deserve any special treatment," Halford said. "I feel like it's service for a reason. You serve for the country, not to get attention. I almost hate kind of getting a little extra attention just be-

cause I served."

Organized football is still new to Halford. He only played one year as a freshman at Carmel Catholic in Mundelein, Ill., before quitting to focus on track and field where he was a stand-out runner. He picked up a handful of Division II offers before a lower back injury prompted him to give up competitive running and join the Marines to serve his country like his Grandfather, a World War II veteran, had done before him.

"That was my inspiration," Halford said. "He'd definitely be proud."

Having completed his four active years of service, Halford is now considered part of the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR). He doesn't train and isn't necessarily expected to return overseas, but if something were to break out, he could be reactivated at any time and return to active duty.

While serving, Halford would have conversations with the men he worked alongside about his dreams of playing college football when he returned. He knew it was a long shot of sorts, maybe even a pipe dream, but he was a standout in the weight room and during Marine football tournaments.

Friends and family, including former All-American track standout sister Hilary, supported Halford's dreams of playing. By chance, Halford's sister told him to potentially look into Indiana.

She had competed for St. Francis as a runner in Bloomington and liked the campus.

Not knowing much about Indiana, Halford contacted assistant athletic director for alumni relations Mark Deal about two years ago and discussed walk-on tryouts. The more the two talked, the more realistic playing football at Indiana seemed to be.

"They told me based on my numbers, I might have a shot," Halford said. "I told them I'll apply to IU and come here."

Halford left active duty with the Marines on Aug. 1 and was in Bloomington later that month with about 15 other hopefuls for four days of walk-on tryouts. Halford, who's listed at 6-foot-1, 215 pounds, didn't really have a position he was trying out for in particular. He just wanted to make the team.

Throughout the tryout, Halford said he was inspired by his mother Lisa. She had contracted a rare spine disease that he said had her on her deathbed while he was on active duty.

Thanks to what Halford described as a miraculous recovery, Lisa recovered well enough to have recently gone on a run with her son and is now cheering her son on from afar.

"She was my motivation," Halford said.

The coaches saw enough in Halford during those four days to offer him a position on the scout team. He's technically classified as a linebacker and spends the majority of his time working with linebackers coach William Inge, but Halford said he also spends time at fullback and just about anywhere else he can line up.

At this point, he doesn't even know his true position.

"To be honest, I'm so raw I couldn't tell you," Halford said. "I'm open to anything, but I've been working with Coach Inge a lot. It seems to be going well so far, so we'll see. In the off-season, maybe it will change. If we keep progressing, maybe we'll see. I'm just worried about helping the scout team now."

Halford doesn't expect to be on the field any time soon. After all, he's only been a football player for three **months**

now. He said he's just thankful for the opportunity head coach Kevin Wilson has given him to help on the scout team.

At practice, Halford said he fits right in with his teammates who are mostly younger than him. Many of the players he shares a locker room with don't know all he's gone through with the Marines, which is how he likes to keep it.

He doesn't need the attention. He'd rather earn it with his game.

That's the Marine way.

"I feel like I'm just one of the boys," Halford said. "This says a lot about the program. They have a guy who played one year of high school ball a tryout. It allowed me to fulfill a dream."



## Dutra Learned From Time Away, Making An Impact Again

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Chase Dutra's role was evolving.

At the beginning of the season, the redshirt sophomore was expected to be a leader in an IU secondary without much experience. He moved from strong safety to free safety in the spring, taking on the responsibility of lining up his defense according to what he saw pre-snap and trusting all the film he's watched.

Dutra wasn't, and still isn't, close to being finished learning the game himself. Regardless, he dove head first into a leadership role his coaches say he's embraced from the beginning, even sacrificing his off time in the summer to help catch teammates up to speed.

Then he got hurt.

Just days before Indiana's season-opening win against Southern Illinois, Dutra suffered an injury that left him sidelined for two games and limited him for two more. His football responsibilities immediately changed, but his leadership role didn't. Indiana's newly-found anchor in the secondary was forced to lead from off the field.

And it worked.

"I think seeing things from the sidelines probably helped him in a weird way," defensive backs coach Noah Joseph said. "I think him just seeing what we're seeing as coaches and how we're trying to get it corrected gave him that aspect that coach isn't just nagging or anything like that. It's all part of the process."

Standing on the sidelines with copies of the play sheets in hand, Dutra studied his teammates just as his coaches did. He saw at practice and in games what Joseph saw and analyzed his own team's play like an outsider.

Dutra couldn't participate himself, but he said his injury couldn't be an excuse

to take time away from the freshmen and sophomores who needed him.

"Without him, I can honestly say I wouldn't be where I am today," true freshman safety Jonathan Crawford said. "If I'm hesitant on a play, I'll look at him and he'll give me a call and I'm just comfortable."

Comfort is hard to teach, Joseph said, but Dutra instills it.

The calmness in his voice and the thoroughness of his explanations make understanding the game easier, Crawford said. Dutra's experience is a rare commodity in a secondary that at times rotated in four first-year players during the time he was limited.

"I've done a lot of teaching this year," Dutra said. "They've all had a lot of questions, and I would talk with Coach Joseph about them and all of us would be sharper. Especially in those two weeks I was out, I got to talk to the younger guys and prepare them for what's to come."

Healthy again, Dutra's role as a teacher really hasn't stopped.

At free safety, Dutra is in many ways as valuable to the defense as the quarterback is to the offense. In most formations, he sees more of the field than any of his teammates and has the freedom to float around to wherever he deems necessary.

Before the snap and as plays develop, Dutra will yell out orders in the same calm, thorough way he teaches at practice. An extension of defensive coordinator Brian Knorr on the field, Dutra keeps everyone in check and is there to clean up any messes left uncleaned.

"I'm still teaching and working just as much in that aspect as I was," Dutra said. "I have a little more space to play in and talk where I don't have to be dialed in on one specific person on

the field. It just gives me a little more range to talk and communicate and get everyone on the same page."

Dutra said he's been full-go since the start of Big Ten play after taking a couple of weeks to get his strength back. Before making his season debut against Western Kentucky, he only had two days of practice under his belt and wasn't yet comfortable playing as fast as he's needed to.

In the weeks since, he's regained his form and is second on the team averaging 6.4 tackles per game and a forced fumble. Joseph said Dutra is playing some of the best football he's played, and it's exciting for him to think that he still has two full seasons ahead of him.

"I think he understands that people listen to him," Joseph said. "He's done a good job with that and can do better still, but he's played really good football for us. I think he's played really well and has been good as far as bringing the emotion and leadership we need from him."



## Indiana's Blind Side In Good Hands With Spriggs

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Indiana's offensive linemen take turns passing off credit to one another. In a position room full of recognizable talent, nobody takes credit by themselves.

They pass block as a unit. They open up running lanes as a team. A lineman is typically only as effective as the teammates lined up beside him because everything they do is connected.

Within the unit, each player has a role, a specialty. Each individual player carries a responsibility based on what he does best for the group's cause.

For senior Jason Spriggs, the job is simple: Protect the quarterback.

"It's definitely something I take very seriously," Spriggs said. "There's a lot of pressure that comes with lining up on the blind side."

Spriggs is the left tackle for an Indiana team with right-handed quarterbacks. On every snap, it's his job to neutralize opposing pass rushers from taking advantage of the quarterback's blind side for a sack.

It's a burdensome role for any left tackle. Quarterbacks are more susceptible to injury when they can't see the pass rusher before he hits them. Each play, the pass-throwers health rests on Spriggs' shoulders.

"Not everyone can do it, but Jason takes a lot of pride in what he does," offensive line coach Greg Frey said. "He's very good, very consistent. He's really done a good job of leading our group, and really, he's come a long way with that."

That may be an understatement.

Spriggs earned the starting job at left tackle as a true freshman despite weighing only 268 pounds. The year before arriving in Bloomington, Spriggs was a tight end while playing

for Elkhart (Ind.) Concord High School. Suddenly, he was protecting his quarterback against future NFL Draft picks William Gholston and John Simon in back-to-back weeks.

Just more than three years later, Spriggs has become a staple of Indiana's offensive line. He's grown to a sturdier 6-foot-7, 305 pounds, and he has made 40 of a possible 41 starts. Indiana head coach Kevin Wilson has described Spriggs as the type of player who will "be playing on Sundays" in the future. Wilson would know—while an offensive line coach and offensive coordinator at Oklahoma, Wilson sent three offensive tackles to the NFL via the first round in Jamaal Brown, Davin Joseph and Trent Williams.

CBS Sports ranked Spriggs as a top-10 player at left tackle and is only one of a handful of media outlets projecting him as between a second-to-fourth-round draft pick next spring. Even at the professional level, finding a sturdy lineman to protect a quarterback's blind side in a quarterback-driven league is no easy task.

"He's as talented as any lineman I've coached, and a couple of them were high picks," Wilson said. "You don't go high playing at that position by combine numbers. You go by consistent play. They're going to pay that quarterback \$120 million, so you better be able to block, too."

Spriggs has had to adjust on the fly throughout his career to a changing offense.

His freshman season featured a balanced attack, but injuries at quarterback forced a handful of different players to take snaps. IU ran a similar offense his sophomore season, but a two-quarterback system with one pro-style quarterback and a mobile threat kept him on his toes.

During his junior season, Indiana

pounded the ball on the ground behind All-American running back Tevin Coleman. Now in his final season, Spriggs is blocking for a mix of both a potent ground attack with junior Jordan Howard and a proven passing game behind the arm of senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld.

Spriggs said he's comfortable blocking in whatever offense Wilson and offensive coordinator Kevin Johns want to use. He adapts to whoever's behind him and does his job just the same as always.

Because regardless of who's in the game, Spriggs' priority remains the same.

Protect his quarterback.

"I don't think there's anyone else I'd rather have protecting me," Sudfeld said at Big Ten Media Day with Spriggs fielding questions just a few feet away.

"Jason Spriggs is as good as they get."





## Mangieri, Shaw Leading Indiana Pass Rush

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Head coach Kevin Wilson made the decision in the offseason to get seniors Nick Mangieri and Zack Shaw on the field together as often as possible.

That meant moving Mangieri from bandit to defensive end to open up more snaps for Shaw at bandit. Both natural pass rushers, Wilson's theory was that Indiana would be stronger with Mangieri and Shaw lined up opposite one another.

Six weeks into the season, Wilson's move is paying off.

Shaw and Mangieri combined for four sacks at Penn State last weekend. On the season, they've accounted for 10 sacks, 54 total tackles and 12 tackles for loss.

"It's cool having Zack and I out there consistently," Mangieri said. "He's making plays. I'm making plays. It's just fun out there."

It's more fun because they're having more success, Shaw said.

Mangieri ranks sixth in the nation with seven sacks. Shaw sits second on the team behind Mangieri with three sacks. Last year, Indiana's sack leader was current New Orleans Saints defensive end Bobby Richardson, who had 5.5 sacks.

IU's leading pass rushers have reached a point where they're competing to take sacks away from one another in practice and in games.

On some plays, it's not enough to just get around the opposing blocker. They need to worry about beating the other to the ball carrier to make the play.

"With him on the other edge, you've got to fight to be the first one there," Shaw said. "We kind of made a joke about it on Saturday. We really push to be one of the best pass rushing teams

in the Big Ten, and I think we've really started to get after it."

Statistically, Indiana isn't quite there yet, but the Hoosiers are getting closer.

IU is tied for No. 6 in the conference with 16 total sacks. Mangieri's seven sacks puts him third among individuals. Shaw's three puts him in a tie for 18th, but defensive coordinator Brian Knorr was quick to point out he nearly had a fourth sack against Penn State before Christian Hackenberg was able to escape at the last possible moment.

Shaw said Mangieri's success is making his job easier, evident in his two sacks last weekend against the Nittany Lions. He said when offenses focus too much effort on Mangieri, it leaves players like himself with open lanes at the quarterback.

"Nick's playing as well as he has," Shaw said. "When we're both getting after it, (the quarterback) isn't really sure who to look at."

When the quarterback isn't sure who's coming, he's more susceptible to making mistakes. Sometimes, all it takes is one hard hit from either Mangieri or Shaw to make him think twice before stepping up in the pocket, Shaw said.

"They're both amazing pass rushers, so it helps having them both out there," redshirt sophomore linebacker Marcus Oliver said. "They're getting more freedom as they're growing, and I think that's great too because it's allowing them to play how they want to play. They're more comfortable."

They've become comfortable making opposing quarterbacks uncomfortable. Lined up on opposite edges, Shaw and Mangieri are quickly developing a reputation for being among the best pass rushers in the conference.

And in the seniors' final seasons, their success couldn't have come at a much

better time.

"Both of them over their careers have been very good edge pass rushers," Knorr said. "Both of them, seniors, have played a lot of football and are probably playing their best right now."



## His Guys: From Harmony To Indiana, McCullough Has Always Been A Mentor

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Deland McCullough is the first to admit he doesn't know everything about football.

There are smarter coaches out there, the fifth-year Indiana running backs coach admits. There are coaches that are better at teaching technique. Some draw up better plays. Others know how to train their players more effectively.

But McCullough doesn't doubt himself. Not for a second. He may have built a career around football, but life has never revolved around the game.

It revolved around the players.

"The one thing I've always prided myself in is being able to get the most out of people," McCullough said. "I can get you at another level if you'll let me. I'm going to work you, and it might not always be fun, but we'll get there together."

McCullough's career didn't start off easy, but, a teacher at heart, McCullough knew he would rather help a kid through a difficult moment in his life than teach him how to avoid a tackle.

Coaching simply wound up being his platform.

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Understanding McCullough begins with understanding Harmony.

Harmony Community School, formerly located in Cincinnati, Ohio, was where McCullough's teaching and coaching careers began. With a student population that consisted mostly of kids coming from socioeconomically-challenged backgrounds, many of McCullough's students lived near the poverty line, surrounded by drugs and crime. Some showed up to school wearing the same clothes every day.

Others hardly showed up at all.

McCullough was working as a group home manager in Cincinnati when a former teammate told him about potential job openings at Harmony. McCullough, then an aspiring teacher, saw Harmony as an opportunity to make an even greater impact on underprivileged kids.

He met with David Nordyke, Harmony's founder, one day in the spring of 2001 in front of the school and wasted no time getting involved. Within two weeks, he was teaching a high school class. The next year, he was coaching the football team in its second full season.

"I took the job not knowing exactly what to expect, but knowing I could be successful with it," McCullough said.

Months before his first full season as football coach, news broke out that Harmony was beginning the school year without a building. Classes were being held in a downtown public library. Soon after the discovery, Harmony held classes at Lower Price Hill in former corporate offices and a warehouse of a fountain drink company.

Harmony's football players, carrying their unmatched gear, had to walk a half-mile down the road to the practice field from the school building. Then, they'd walk a half-mile uphill on the way back.

McCullough and his players knew their time at Harmony would be just that: an uphill battle.

"Playing football at Harmony wasn't like most schools," said Wymon Parham, one of McCullough's first running backs he coached at Harmony. "We dealt with what we had. And we didn't have much of anything."

But Harmony, as people knew it, was about to change.

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Getting the job was one thing. Earning the students' respect was another.

Many of McCullough's students were "street kids," Parham said. They were the ones looking for trouble for the sake of trouble, the types of kids who didn't always respect authority figures.

Yet here McCullough was, a 28-year-old fresh face in the school coming off an accomplished NFL career, walking into their territory. Early on in his tenure, there was a certain tenseness to things, Parham said. The students weren't going to back down to McCullough, and he made it clear he wasn't going to back down to them.

"McCullough came in and set the tone," Parham said. "Not many people could have walked in there and started doing the things McCullough did."

McCullough earned his students' respect by showing he could relate to them and that he cared about them.

He told them he grew up in Youngstown, Ohio, which he describes as anything but a "Utopian circumstance." As a kid, drugs, crime and violence were nearby, but he managed to keep it out of his life while earning a scholarship, getting drafted into the NFL and beginning his post-sports professional career.

When he became a coach, McCullough was determined to help his players do the same. He shared his own story with his players, relating everything he did to them. He was always honest and went out of his way to make a connection, even if it meant going to a student's home or staying with them late after class.

For the first time in their lives, Parham



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said, he and his teammates started to believe in a world outside of their own.

"The young people would listen to him for the simple fact that he's coming from the same place, the same background," Parham said. "It's not Mr. Roger's neighborhood, you know? Football and education was your ticket out. You needed to take it and you could make it like he did."

McCullough earned the players' respect with a no-nonsense, but loving attitude, Parham said. When a stadium-wide fight broke out in the middle of a football game with rival Dayton Jefferson, McCullough calmly broke up fights between parents, coaches and kids and ushered his players safely back onto the bus.

While everyone in the stadium was losing their heads, McCullough kept his. He needed to set an example for his players.

"McCullough never backed down," Parham said. "That wasn't what we did. He set the example right there. That wasn't us. That wasn't his Harmony."

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Over seven years at Harmony, McCullough was responsible for sending over 100 student athletes to college on scholarships.

Parham was his first.

Before McCullough was hired, Parham was teetering on the verge of dropping out of school. Parham was one of many kids at Harmony who went through the day feeling unappreciated. At 15 years old, Parham didn't see the point in attending class.

McCullough wouldn't stand for it.

He worked with Parham after class and convinced him to stay in school and play football. He gave him a chance at running back, and Parham earned it.

To this day, Parham credits McCullough for saving his life.

"Coach McCullough, he believed in me when nobody else did," Parham said. "I'll be real, if it wasn't for coach McCullough, I wouldn't have just not graduated. I would be dead. Plain as that. I would be dead."

Parham rushed for over 1,000 yards his senior season. He earned a football scholarship at Urbana and later walked on at Cincinnati. After his college career, McCullough helped Parham get a tryout with the Cincinnati Bengals, but he was unable to make the roster. He's still pursuing an NFL career to this day.

"Anyone who had an excuse for why they weren't going to make it out, McCullough obliterated it," Parham said. "The man made kids who had no reason to believe in themselves start to care."

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Zak Nordyke, the son of Harmony's founder David Nordyke, describes his father as "almost impossible to impress."

McCullough impressed him.

David would give McCullough ambiguous tasks like "make Harmony a winning football team" or "improve test scores" without much direction. Every time, McCullough surpassed expectations.

"Deland took it upon himself from day one to take initiative and prove he could get results," Zak said. "My dad always respected that."

One of McCullough's major projects was a co-curricular group called Sports Academy. The program incorporated sports and sports marketing into core classes like English, math and science. McCullough's goal was to generate student interest in school by relating classroom studies to sports.

Only 16 students enrolled into the new program the first year, but by the end of the second year, 88 kids were involved in Sports Academy, many of whom were receiving the best grades of their academic careers.

Sports Academy was a booming success.

"When my dad saw what Deland did with Sports Academy, I think he knew he had a special person working for him," Zak said. "The students all respected him in a way not many other teachers were."

David died in 2003, two years after hiring McCullough in front of the school. Before passing away, he asked McCullough to take on an expanded role as the school's athletic director. It was his first step toward working in administration.

McCullough was involved in practically everything in his student's lives. He coached the football team, taught class, made schedules, spent Tuesdays and Thursdays teaching a weight training class and focused all other remaining time on growing the school.

Within a few years, he was named Harmony's principal, leading the school to become one of the top-ranking academic and athletics schools in the state of Ohio. All at the same time, he never gave up his role as athletic director.

"He was good at it because he loved it," Parham said. "He loved Harmony. Nobody loved Harmony back then."



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McCullough made people care about school, about us and about themselves. There's a lot of kids that would have done anything for him."

But why did he do it? Why was McCullough so invested in these kids nobody otherwise cared about?

"Those were my guys," McCullough said. "You've got to have your guys."

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Harmony Community School closed Dec. 31, 2008.

It was one of multiple charter schools in the Cincinnati area to close around that time. When it did, McCullough essentially became an administrative free agent. Within a year, he was named principal of Cincinnati's King Academy School which taught grades K-8.

There were no sports programs at King Academy, and that bothered McCullough. When he suggested starting competitive teams, the woman running the school told him the school was strictly academic.

McCullough said he enjoyed working with the students, but the gap in his life without sports was too burdensome. He only stayed at King Academy for one year before agreeing to return to Miami (Ohio), his alma mater, as an offensive and special teams intern in 2010.

"I was really fortunate that they wanted me," McCullough said. "I saw it as an opportunity to get back into the game I loved."

McCullough returned to the RedHawks coaching staff in 2011 as the running backs coach. He spent one season there before head coach Kevin Wilson hired him to fill the same position at Indiana on March 2, 2011. McCullough had previously played under Wilson

at Miami from 1992-95 while Wilson served as the RedHawks' offensive coordinator.

McCullough still keeps in touch with the woman at King Academy who told him he couldn't start a sports program.

Looking back, he said he's glad she told him no.

"She kind of makes fun of me to this day," McCullough said, laughing. "Like, 'Hey, I really should have let you start that team.' That's what really pushed me in a new direction and ultimately brought me to Indiana."

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Before the start of every practice, McCullough and his running backs outline their standard together.

Every goal starts the same:

"Today, I will..."

One by one, each player adds something to the list. When one says it, they all do it.

Redding says he wants to have 100 percent ball security. They write it down.

Howard says he wants to run with velocity. Add that to the list, too.

Together, McCullough and his running backs develop their positional standard each and every day. It's a fluid list, changing over time while keeping the same values of being a good teammate, playing every down hard and not settling short of your ultimate goals, among other things.

"Coach McCullough really gives us freedom to be what we want to be," Redding said. "As a group, we sort of decide who we are. I don't think many

coaches would do that."

McCullough admits he's not an "X's and O's" type of coach. He prides himself in being a motivator. He knows firsthand what it takes to be a successful running back and primes his players to be the same by focusing on the intangibles rather than fretting over fitting a mold.

The results: Indiana's rushers have broken 19 school records in a little over five seasons under McCullough. Tevin Coleman, his star pupil, was drafted in the third round of the 2015 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons. Stephen Houston, another McCullough product, split time between the New England Patriots and Pittsburgh Steelers.

His current one-two punch of Howard and Redding have already grabbed national headlines this season, and they both still have two and three years of eligibility remaining, respectively.

Ask McCullough and he says their success is a reflection of the standard they set together every practice.

His peers say it's a result of McCullough's relationships with his players. Whether that means spending an hour with Coleman in a car in the Memorial Stadium parking lot discussing life late one night before the NFL Draft or playing NBA 2K with Howard on a recruiting visit, McCullough finds ways of understanding and bonding with his running backs.

"He does a tremendous job of relating to his players," IU offensive coordinator Kevin Johns said. "He has a very high standard of what it looks like to be a running back that's going to play for him in our offense. That shows a great teacher. That shows a great recruiter."

It's a skill not easily taught, one that's developed over years of working with





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students on all levels from all backgrounds.

"Deland is an awesome coach, has a great relationship with those guys," Wilson said. "We're blessed to have him."

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McCullough's accomplishments haven't fallen on deaf ears. His list of suitors is growing.

This past summer, he was a coaching intern with the Atlanta Falcons through the Bill Walsh NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship. He completed the same internship with the New Orleans Saints and Seattle Seahawks the previous off-seasons.

Wilson has said multiple times that NFL franchises were calling about McCullough, never going into the specific details. Now in his sixth year of coaching collegiately, McCullough's late-blooming coaching career has left the 42-year-old with options.

Today, McCullough has no interest going anywhere.

"I'm not leaving my guys. They're my guys," McCullough said. "I like the community and all, but it's my guys. These are the guys I fought for. These are the guys I want to see successful. These are the guys that want to be coached by me. It's important that I do everything I can to put myself in the position to keep teaching them and getting the most out of them."

"Teaching them...getting the most out of them."

In that sense, McCullough has never changed.

He's still the upstart football coach who was teaching kids the value of

hard work at Harmony. School is, and always will be, a platform for learning more than facts or football. McCullough's ultimate lesson is on being a better person.

"He's saved, not just coached, but saved so many kids that you can't keep count," Parham said. "But you want to know the best part about coach McCullough? I don't think he knows. I really don't. I don't think he has any idea how deep his roots go, the difference he's made."

Maybe Parham's right. Maybe McCullough doesn't truly understand the span of his reach.

Or maybe he prefers to stand off to the side and soak everything in. He doesn't like shouldering any of the credit for his running backs' accomplishments on or off the field. He never really has.

He'll leave that for his guys.



## Simmons' Study Habits Give Him His Edge

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Not long ago, linebackers coach William Inge walked into what he thought was an empty meeting room to recover something he had left behind earlier in the day.

The room was dark, except for a little light in the corner. When Inge turned on the lights, he found junior linebacker T.J. Simmons quietly studying film by himself.

With any other player, Inge may have been surprised. But not with Simmons.

The third-year linebacker's study habits are well known in the Indiana training complex.

"The number one thing that stands out is the thing people don't see: his preparation," Inge said. "His preparation may be above and beyond in the upper-echelon of the leaders on the team. He prepares very well and studies the game. He understands how to play football."

Simmons is more battleship than fighter jet. At 6-foot, 232 pounds, he accepts not being the fastest or most athletic linebacker in the Big Ten and uses film study as his leg up.

Through five games, Simmons leads Indiana with 23 solo tackles and is tied with redshirt sophomore linebacker Marcus Oliver for the team lead with 34 total stops. He credited a majority of his tackles to recognizing an opponent's play and being in the right place for the stop ahead of time.

"I know I'm not the best athlete, so I try to get a mental edge," Simmons said. "I try to study more than other guys. I'm not as athletically blessed, so I try to fill that with knowing what's coming at me so I'm there for it."

After Saturday games, Simmons will grab a copy of the tape and watch it either Saturday night or early Sunday morning by the absolute latest, he said.

By the time the team meets together to study film Sunday afternoon, Simmons has already watched a majority of the tape they'll watch.

Simmons' early film study is mostly self-assessment. He'll grade his footwork, his tackling technique and a whole list of other things each week. From there, he'll develop a personal plan to get better during the upcoming practices.

After Simmons finishes developing his own game plan, he starts studying the upcoming opponent. He'll watch as much game footage as he can, taking notes on tendencies, formations and which key players could give him trouble as he goes.

"People don't always realize how much of an advantage it really is," Simmons said. "Even though somebody may be faster than me or stronger than me, I can react faster and make the play because I already know what's going to happen."

By Tuesday or Wednesday during a practice week, Simmons' voice spills over the practice field. At middle linebacker, he's responsible for making sure everyone is lined up in the right place, and if they're not, he lets them know about it.

When Simmons recognizes a play, he'll shout it out for his teammates to hear. He might not always be able to stop the ball himself, but a teammate might.

"When they line up in certain formations, T.J. will be yelling out what they're favorite run is or if they'll pass on certain plays," senior defensive end Nick Mangieri said. "He's definitely on top of his stuff. That's what you want. Somebody who knows the other team's offense."

Simmons said his mental rolodex is becoming larger and larger with each passing season. Before even watching

film of Penn State, he remembered tendencies and tricks they used from previous seasons.

He said judging the Nittany Lions is a little tougher this week considering they've played in mostly poor weather all season and likely won't be at full strength this weekend after suffering a number of injuries.

Regardless of what Penn State does, Simmons said he'll be ready. By now, he's watched just about everything Penn State could throw at him.

"We've got to pin our ears back as a defense and tackle this week," Simmons said. "We've got to get them on third-and-long and get them off the field."



# Shaw Remains Versatile, Dependable for IU

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Zack Shaw embraces the unpredictability about playing at bandit. The fifth-year senior likes the mind games he gets to play with opposing quarterbacks.

He walks around stalking the edges prior to the snap. Sometimes he'll put a hand on the ground showing blitz, only to drop back into coverage. Other times he'll play back, biding his time to make a run and get after the quarterback for a sack.

"I'd say it's one of the more versatile positions on the field," Shaw said. "That's what I like about it. I get to do a little bit of everything, and the other team normally doesn't know what's coming until I'm already there."

Much like his position, Shaw's Indiana career has been far from set in stone.

He arrived in Bloomington as a highly-touted inside linebacker but never actually played there. He redshirted in 2011 and made the switch to defensive end before the 2012 season, where he appeared in all 12 games and was named to the All-Big Ten Freshman team.

After having similar production as a sophomore, Shaw was moved to bandit when defensive coordinator Brian Knorr took over the defense and started installing his 3-4 base set.

Knorr said Shaw's 6-foot-3, 253-pound frame and past playing experience made him an ideal fit for the bandit spot, which is a hybrid mixing the responsibilities of a linebacker and a defensive end. It became clear in practice that the move would fit his skillset, Knorr said.

"Zack was one of those guys who just seemed like an ideal fit for the position," Knorr said at IU's Media Day. "He kind of had that ability to do everything that was going to be asked of him whether it be disrupting the quar-

terback or stopping the run. Whatever we needed, he could do."

Shaw averaged about 30 snaps per game last season, splitting time with fellow senior Nick Mangieri, who has since moved to defensive end. IU head coach Kevin Wilson said part of the thought process behind Mangieri's position change was to allow Shaw to take more snaps.

"That meant a lot to me, honestly," Shaw said. "I guess it just means he has confidence in me to get the job done. I'll go out there and play as much or as little as they need me to. Whatever the team needs."

Mangieri, who became good friends with Shaw when they split time together, said he expects Shaw to have an even bigger impact this season. He said he's been the clear leader of the bandits, teaching younger guys the ins-and-outs of the position.

"It's like it was built for him," Mangieri said. "Just the way he plays, he's perfect for it."

While learning how to play the bandit, Shaw said Indiana watched film of former NFL Defensive Player of the Year James Harrison, who played bandit for the Pittsburgh Steelers. Shaw said he tries to incorporate some of Harrison's game into his own.

Shaw works closest with Knorr, who's practically taught the bandit position himself. Shaw said it's exciting for him as one of the first players to play the position at Indiana because he can set the tone and make the position his own as he works to establish the group.

"I feel really good about where I'm at as a fifth-year senior," Shaw said. "My role on this defense, it's my job to be a vocal leader out there."

Shaw said he's been impressed with the way the younger bandits have

been developing. He said Greg Gooch and Nile Sykes, his backups, have been pushing him in practice and doing a good job of embracing the position as their own.

As a group, Shaw stresses that they need to play more physical. He wants the bandits to be attacking players that other teams have to gameplan around, just like opposing NFL teams would need to plan around Harrison.

"You've got to be that all-around defensive player," Shaw said. "That's just what bandits do."

Having already proven himself as one of Indiana's most versatile, dependable players, Shaw said there's only one thing he wants out of his Hoosiers career—a bowl appearance.

He said this year's defense is as talented as any he's played alongside, adding that the key was getting everyone on the same page. If they can do that, Shaw said there's no reason to doubt Indiana's potential.

"It would mean a lot to go to a bowl, there's no hiding that," Shaw said. "I've been fortunate to have the career I've had, and I just want to end it the right way."



## Sudfeld Leading IU In Final Season

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - The twists and turns of Nate Sudfeld's Indiana career have left him in a peculiar spot.

The senior quarterback is the Hoosiers' unquestioned leader. He was predominantly featured on the Big Ten Network Bus as it toured the conference's campuses in preseason camp, represented IU at Big Ten Media Days in Chicago and addresses the media weekly behind a podium. Over time, Sudfeld has gotten used to being a face of the program.

Only, he isn't done yet. He can't afford to get complacent with where he's at because he's never been where he thinks he can go.

"I still feel like I have so much more to do," Sudfeld said.

Despite being named Indiana's starter before the beginning of last season, Sudfeld has yet to complete a full season as IU's starting quarterback. He cracked into the rotation as a true freshman, appearing in 29 total games and making 18 starts up until this point in his career.

In that sense, Sudfeld is a proven veteran. But in another, head coach Kevin Wilson and offensive coordinator Kevin Johns still consider Sudfeld a new starter trying to own the spot for an entire season.

"There's no doubt about it that he has that sense of urgency," Johns said before the season. "He knows he's running out of time. He lost half his junior season (due to injury). He understands he can't take anything for granted. He has 12 guaranteed games left. That's it."

Sudfeld's urgency is evident in the way he carries himself.

In the offseason, he directed player practices with his wide receivers, tight ends and running backs to ensure ev-

eryone would be on the same page when they returned to camp. When they weren't on the field, Sudfeld would help cut up game tape to study with his receivers.

In film sessions and on the practice field, Sudfeld is constantly asking his receivers questions, redshirt junior Ricky Jones said. Sudfeld wants to find any advantage he can while making his receivers' jobs as easy as possible.

"Nate works about as hard as anyone I've ever seen," Jones said. "He's always asking us, 'What should I do to help you?' The way he plays, he's just trying to make everyone around him better."

Even when they were apart, Sudfeld and his receivers stayed in near-constant communication.

Jones said he'd always needed to keep an eye on his phone in case he'd get a call or text from Sudfeld wanting to discuss film they'd looked at earlier in the day. No time was off limits.

"Us receivers and Nate, as well as the other quarterbacks, are always talking," Jones said. "When one of us messes up or makes a mistake, he's the first one on you. I like that out of him. He holds you accountable and wants me and the other guys to be great."

It's a reflection of his leadership style, sophomore Simmie Cobbs, Jr., said. Sudfeld treats everyone on the offense as a unit. They're only going to be as strong as their weakest players.

"Nate's really big on just getting everyone prepared," Cobbs said. "When we're watching film or studying tape, he's everyone's biggest critic, but he's also good at complimenting things, too. It sort of works both ways, but you know the quarterback is only trying to make everyone better."

Sudfeld's preparedness is a reflection

of the quarterbacks he grew up watching and continues to learn from.

This last summer, he spent time learning from Peyton and Eli Manning at the Manning Passing Academy. He also worked Andrew Luck's Change The Play camp for the second consecutive summer.

When Sudfeld talks about team goals, he doesn't stop at a number of wins. He doesn't want success to be limited to whether or not Indiana qualifies for a bowl.

"I don't think, by any means, that's our ceiling," Sudfeld said. "I think to say 'a bowl team' is really kind of setting ourselves short. Because I think this team has a very high ceiling. I'd be disappointed with just that many wins."

With weapons like Jordan Howard or an offensive line featuring senior Jason Spriggs and redshirt junior Dan Feeney, Sudfeld has some talented company on the offensive side of the ball.

But he needs to be the team's leader, Wilson said. He needs to set the tone in the locker room and on the field. He's become almost a player-coach in some aspects, helping with weekly game plans and leading the offense vocally and by example.

Sudfeld's tried chasing perfection, but it's eluded him. He's since realized the need to balance between his success and shortcomings, never getting too high or too low.

"He keeps us all under control," Howard said. "He never lets the moment get too big."

Howard, a UAB transfer, spoke highly of Sudfeld. It didn't take him long to realize why his teammates spoke about him with such high praise.

"He ranks at the top," Howard said. "He's a great quarterback."





## Feeney Lets Work Ethic Define His Play

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Dan Feeney remembers the play, but he'd rather not talk about it.

It came last November on the road against Rutgers. One mistake, that's all it was.

The redshirt junior guard got beat. He couldn't slow down a Scarlett Knights defender and allowed a sack.

It's the only one he's allowed in his career.

"I try to shut it out," Feeney said. "I really hate getting beat. I had trouble sleeping for a few days. It's not something I like to ever think about."

The way Feeney regrets his one costly mistake reflects the standard he holds himself to. He expects perfection.

He's taken over 1,800 snaps in 27 career starts at right guard and got beat once. To put that in perspective, that means Feeney allowed a sack on 0.056 percent of his snaps.

That's why when asked who his most consistent player was, head coach Kevin Wilson didn't waste time coming up with his answer: Dan Feeney.

"Hands down, the best," Wilson said. "Dan Feeney's real good. He walks in and puts his socks on good, I guarantee it."

Feeney laughed when he found out what Wilson said about him. He shook his head and promised he didn't put his socks on any different than anyone else. He doesn't keep any sock secrets.

"One foot at a time, I guess," Feeney said.

Socks aside, Wilson has long praised Feeney's consistency on the offensive line. He's developed a reputation among his coaches and teammates for

being one of the hardest working players in the locker room.

That's easy to say, offensive line coach Greg Frey said, but it's entirely different when it's true. He said Feeney makes up for any technical skill he lacks by outworking the players around him.

"Dan has a unique quality that he really tries as hard as he can on each play," Frey said. "Whether it's practice, whether it's walk-throughs, whether it's a game—whatever it may be. You don't have to coach effort with him."

Feeney's become a favorite among NFL scouts who have stopped by practices and games to see him up close. CBS Sports' 2017 NFL Draft board ranks him as the No. 3 guard available, meaning he could one day end up being a first round pick.

After earning honorable mention All-Big Ten last season, Feeney was named to the Rotary Lombardi Award Watch List (best lineman or linebacker) and the Outland Trophy Watch list (best interior lineman) in the preseason.

Feeney will find out if he wins those awards in December, but his quarterback, senior Nate Sudfeld, doesn't need the awards to back him up.

"If you were to try to create an offensive lineman, you'd create Dan Feeney," Sudfeld said.

Whether he's on the field, off the field or even just playing Ping Pong in the locker room, Feeney attacks everything with the same intensity.

If it's a game, Feeney wants to win it. More importantly, he wants to crush his opponent doing it.

"He's selfless," Sudfeld said. "He sets the tone with that O-line."

Feeney said there's an art to playing at his intensity level. It's not something

that just happened overnight, he said.

He mentally resets before every snap. He needs to clear his head, refocus and start fresh each and every play to perform to his standard.

"You definitely have to think about it every play," Feeney said. "The human body is naturally lazy. It's definitely an uphill battle. You've just got to keep fighting, keep grinding, keep wanting to get better."

Feeney's aware of the awards. He knows he's gaining the attention of NFL scouts and that opponents are eager to tack on another sack to his name. But none of that changes anything, he said.

He didn't get as far as he did by taking days off. Feeney goes in to practice the same way every day, and despite what Wilson may think, he puts his socks on one foot at a time and gets to work.

"He's always been that guy who's done everything as hard as he could, whatever it is," Frey said. "Whether it be physical, mental, spiritual or whatever it is in his life, I think he goes hard at it. That's all he knows."



# Sudfeld “Instrumental” in Weekly Game Plan

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Nate Sudfeld doesn't just build the house. He designs the blueprints.

The senior quarterback is becoming an increasingly prominent face in the war room when Indiana's coaches are developing game plans each week. Head coach Kevin Wilson and offensive coordinator Kevin Johns work closely with Sudfeld to tailor Indiana's offense to fit his needs and preferences.

Indiana's game preparation reflects the coaches' confidence in Sudfeld. Wilson and Johns trust the veteran quarterback with the keys to the offense and allow him to dictate what the Hoosiers will do on the field come Saturdays.

"We work very closely with all our quarterbacks, but specifically with Nate right now to get him the plays that he feels best about," Johns said. "You want to do the plays the quarterback believes in. Obviously, the input he has is very instrumental in what we do."

Sudfeld said he's always had an impact on the game plan to an extent, but his role in developing Indiana's attack has increased in his final season.

By Wednesday or Thursday, Johns will have a pool of plays ready on his play-call sheet that he's considering using. He'll ask Sudfeld for his input on particular plays in drills and in the film room to narrow the playbook down to a more manageable number of plays.

If Sudfeld likes a play, he'll keep it and see it again on Saturdays. If he doesn't, it's thrown out.

"Just kind of having that communication makes me feel a lot better on gameday out there knowing there's a pool of plays he's going to call from I feel great about," Sudfeld said. "That's really been huge for me and given my confidence a boost."

Indiana's developed a three-headed

monster of sorts with Wilson, Johns and Sudfeld all grooming the playbook. When they disagree about particular plays or concepts, they're able to discuss their thoughts and resolve any potential conflicts.

Just last week, Sudfeld and Wilson discussed an on-field incident that resulted in Sudfeld adjusting a route when he shouldn't have. Sudfeld changed one of his receiver's routes at the last moment and eventually scored on a scramble in Indiana's win against Florida International.

Sudfeld changed the play because he recalled seeing a defensive look on film, Wilson said. But the play wasn't the same, and Wilson recognized it. In those situations, Wilson said Sudfeld needs to work on trusting his coaches more to make the right decisions.

"Sometimes intelligence can be a hinder," Wilson said. "You can have too much clutter in your mind."

Sudfeld said Indiana (2-0) needs to clear the "clutter" this week to keep up with a high-powered Western Kentucky (2-0) offense Saturday at 4 p.m. at Memorial Stadium.

On between 30-40 plays a game, Sudfeld has the option to select a run or pass play based on what he sees in an opposing defense, Wilson said. He'll survey the field, make a decision and run the play.

"I feel like I know what I like out there a lot more," Sudfeld said. "I know what I'm seeing and what I want to try to exploit."

Sudfeld's confidence has been evident in the red zone where the Hoosiers have scored on all 10 trips, leading the Big Ten. His only complaint was that he'd like to see Indiana's three field goals turn into touchdowns with powerful running backs like junior Jordan Howard and sophomore Devine Red-

ding lined up behind him.

Chasing perfection can be an impossible task, and Sudfeld knows that. There's going to be times where the opposing defense makes a play and forces Indiana to settle.

But Sudfeld doesn't want to settle. He's holding his offense to a high standard because he realizes how much impact he has on its success. And if not being completely perfect is his biggest complaint, Wilson and Johns can walk away happy.

"Every single week we need to be able to play a high level and execute," Sudfeld said. "You're never going to be perfect, like coach says, but we need to strive to be close to it."



## Rayner Eyeing Successful Senior Season

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Indiana's most improved player has no intention of slowing down any time soon.

Adarius Rayner, a fifth-year defensive lineman, was named Hoosier Football's most improved defensive player by head coach Kevin Wilson at the conclusion of spring practice.

The offseason honor was humbling, Rayner said, but being named most improved only means he's getting better. It doesn't mean it's where he wants to be.

"To me, that means I need to keep working harder," Rayner said. "Most improved is just what it sounds like—most improved. I've got a lot to keep working on to get to the next level and keep playing."

Rayner's aspirations of playing professionally after college highlight how far he's come in his eight years of playing organized football.

A basketball player growing up in Largo, Fla., Rayner didn't pick up football until prompted by one of his aunts as a sophomore in high school. She thought his size and athleticism would give him a chance to be pretty good.

Her intuition paid off.

Rayner was a four-year basketball letterwinner, but his versatility and skill-set on the gridiron ultimately brought him to Indiana to play football. In his time since, he's gone from being relatively new to the game to earning a spot in the rotation on a deep, experienced defensive line.

"Even in some high school camps, I felt like I was a little behind just because I started playing late," Rayner said. "I feel like now I've learned all of that and just need to make plays this year to where I can be able to take it to the next level and help this team as well."

Rayner built on his strong spring with another fall camp he said was productive. He's keying in on being a more consistent playmaker in what will be his final season with the Hoosiers.

In years past, Rayner has had his fair share of highlight plays, but he's expecting more out of himself and his teammates this season. With a group of young defensive backs playing behind him, Rayner said it's more important now than ever to pressure opposing quarterbacks and make the defensive backs' jobs easier.

At the same time, Rayner said it's been enjoyable working with new players lined up behind him. He's liked their eagerness and willingness to ask him for help.

"Having a young defensive backfield is good for an older front because the defensive backs listen more and are sometimes more eager to take our advice," Rayner said. "It actually helps us as a defense, and it should help us with our pass rush."

The Hoosiers ranked 82nd in the country with 23 sacks last year. Just more than half of those sacks (12.5) came from the defensive line.

Rayner is part of the group looking to replace graduated defensive end and current New Orleans Saint Bobby Richardson's production. He led the team with 5.5 sacks.

Rayner's been studying off the field, watching film to where he said he has a much stronger conceptual understanding of what second-year defensive coordinator Brian Knorr is trying to do. At this point, it's a matter of going out on the field and making the plays he's capable of.

"Adarius has been very, very good for us," Knorr said at Indiana's media day. "He's one of those guys for us that I think hasn't shown his full potential

just yet, and that can be good. Adarius is expected to be a good player for us."

There hasn't been any shortage of veteran leadership in Rayner's defensive lineman room. Veterans like himself and Mangieri have stressed the importance of chemistry between themselves and the new additions on the team.

"He's done a good job," Mangieri said. "He's more of a vocal guy now and kind of brings the younger guys along."

Players young and old are learning each other's physical limits and personalities. Rayner said it's important for teammates to know these things so they can lift each other up and perform better during games the rest of the season.

From what he's seen so far, Rayner likes where the Hoosiers are at.

"With the way that everybody's coming along, I feel like we can be as good as we want to be," Rayner said.

Of course, it's only natural that Rayner sets the expectations high. But just how good can IU's defense?

Rayner senses another case of being most improved.

"I feel like this year, we should be one of the top defenses in the Big Ten," Rayner said. "We just need to attack every day."



## From Fan to Player, Paige Has Come a Long Way

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - It was Nov. 17, 2007. Indiana and Purdue were tied 24-24 in front of a capacity crowd at Memorial Stadium.

With 30 seconds left, IU's Austin Starr went out for a 49-yard field goal. The Old Oaken Bucket and an Indiana bowl bid were on the line.

A 14-year old Mitchell Paige was there. A life-long Hoosier fan, Paige was sitting in the front row on the West side as Starr trotted out for the kick. His eyes light up as he recounts the ball sailing through the uprights and the moment he ran out onto the field with thousands of other Hoosier fans.

"It was crazy," Paige said. "One of those things you'll never forget."

Paige had another one of those unforgettable moments last weekend. Making his second career start, the redshirt junior receiver hauled in his first touchdown on a 16-yard bubble screen with 10:02 left in the fourth quarter.

It proved to be the game-winner in IU's win over Florida International.

"It's an accomplishment, definitely," Paige said. "It's a great feeling, getting in the end zone. I kind of get it off my back. It sort of shows the work is paying off."

Paige's journey from the front row to starting slot receiver took sacrifice.

The 5-foot-7 Carmel, Ind., native walked on to the team in 2012 after a stand-out prep career at Guerin Catholic. He graduated high school with 2,006 receiving yards, 965 rushing yards, 1,794 returning yards and 37 touchdowns.

Despite his high school success, schools weren't showing interest. He had garnered attention from Butler, but Paige wasn't interested in a Butler education. He wanted to be a Hoosier regardless of whether or not he was an

athlete.

Paige attended a few Indiana camps, slowly picking up interest from offensive coordinator Kevin Johns. Paige said he rarely spoke with head coach Kevin Wilson—maybe two or three words before actually joining the team—but Johns told Paige to consider walking on if he wanted a chance to play.

"Coach Johns told me about it a bit and kept the option open if I ever wanted to try," Paige said. "Eventually, I just decided to come."

Paige put in his time working mostly behind the scenes in his first three seasons. He showed up, went to work and didn't worry about playing time, he said.

All the work paid off. When sophomore receiver J-Shun Harris was lost for the year and Indiana needed a new starting slot receiver, the coaching staff turned to Paige.

"Mitchell is so smart and understands the offense so well," Johns said. "He understands space, and as an inside receiver, that's really what you need. More importantly, I feel like he has (senior quarterback) Nate Sudfeld's trust."

Working in space has become Paige's specialty of sorts. He prides himself in being able to see gaps in opposing defenses before they form, giving him just enough time to get open.

Redshirt junior receiver Ricky Jones described it as a sixth sense. Paige said it's an ability he developed playing other sports. In high school, he lettered in basketball, track and field and golf in addition to football.

"I can kind of read where people are going," Paige said. "I can feel spaces. I can see and read things. Other sports really helped. Out here, I'm always looking at guys and feeling where

they're going to be."

Paige still plays golf, too. He's a scratch player. But even Indiana's golfers tower over Paige, who said he picked up tips from former Hoosier receiver Shane Wynn about compensating for a lack of size.

"When you look at him, he doesn't look like a Big Ten, 6-foot-4 receiver," Johns said. "But when he steps on the football field, he's one of those wiggle guys that can just get down the field and catches everything you throw to him."

Paige said he doesn't have expectations. He earned a scholarship last spring and again in the fall, but he said he still embraces a walk-on's mentality.

That's never going away, Paige said. It's what earned him the scholarship in the first place.

"I wanted to come in and make an impact," Paige said. "I was under-recruited, but I had a ton of confidence. I knew I could play...I wanted to kind of set an example for the future guys to see how we work, our standard."

Paige proved himself in week two against Florida International. He said he expects to be involved even more against a high-powered Western Kentucky team Saturday at 4 p.m. at Memorial Stadium.

Paige—who didn't have a catch until this season—has six catches for 63 yards and a score through two games.

One touchdown. That's an affirmative accomplishment for a walk-on, Paige said. Not everyone who walks on even sees the field.

It's nice—but he isn't stopping there.

"I definitely haven't made it," Paige said. "There's more to come."





# Mangieri Leading, Transitioning Back to DL

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Heading into his senior season, Nick Mangieri had to hit the reset button.

Indiana head coach Kevin Wilson moved Mangieri to the defensive line in spring practice after playing the bandit position last year.

Now Mangieri is learning—or rather, re-learning—how to play on the defensive line with goals of being named All-Big Ten and leading Indiana to the postseason.

"The more you're there, the more comfortable you get," Mangieri said. "It's funny, you kind of see things now that you didn't see when you were younger like stances, other formations or just how to do certain things. Even though I've been away from it, I feel like I've still grown as a defensive lineman anyway."

Mangieri's switch back to his old position comes after one full season playing bandit after Indiana switched to a 3-4 base defense under now second-year defensive coordinator Brian Knorr.

He wasn't moved because he wasn't successful, Knorr said, but rather because they thought it was obvious that he was better as a true pass rusher.

"I just think he's more comfortable," Knorr said. "It's not that he was necessarily uncomfortable at the bandit, but we thought he could make a bigger impact for us returning back to the defensive line and disrupting the pass game. He's athletic enough and smart enough where it wasn't too much to ask of him."

Even though he has past experience playing on the defensive line, Mangieri said playing the position in the 3-4 isn't quite the same as playing in the 4-3. The 4-3 involves more vertical pass rushing while the 3-4 relies more on lateral movements and rewards speed and agility.

"The change should work out in my favor as far as my quickness and athleticism goes," Mangieri said. "I'm comfortable with the transition. Once you get comfortable, you start looking at the offense and their tendencies. That's how you get better."

While Mangieri has spent the better part of the last year working to improve himself, he said he's also put an increased emphasis on helping to make his teammates better.

After spring practice ended, Wilson announced that Mangieri had earned the Defensive Leader Award. One of his closest friends and roommates, senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld, earned the Offensive Leader Award.

Mangieri said he aims to lead young defensive players much in the way Sudfeld leads the offense. He likes to lead by example, setting the tone early in practice and setting the standard for how Indiana players need to play.

"You just want to show them the right way and just be in their ear and let them know what the right thing to do is," Mangieri said. "But really, you've got to lead by example. Everybody can talk, but if you don't back it up by your actions, nobody is going to follow you."

Mangieri has seen firsthand the peaks and valleys the defense has had.

As a senior leader, Mangieri takes it upon himself to ensure Indiana continues to make progress in 2015. The key, he said, is for everyone to be more consistent across all defensive positions.

"We had a good spring where we were able to build on the last few games of last season where we started to come together and play as a defense," Mangieri said. "I think we were able to add a few more things this fall that should make us even better as long as we keep doing the things we need to do."

Mangieri, like many of his teammates, said he's excited for the start of the new season and a chance to hit someone else.

The Hoosiers open up the year at Memorial Stadium against Southern Illinois.

A win in the opening game could be crucial for veterans like Mangieri who know they're running out of chances to put together the winning season they believe they're capable of.

"My time is ticking," Mangieri said. "You never think this time would come as a freshman, but now it's here."



# Jones Comfortable, Ready to Play Outside

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Ricky Jones is undersized for an outside wide receiver. That's not changing anytime soon.

The redshirt junior measures 5-foot-10, 170 pounds. He gives up six inches and 45 pounds to sophomore Simmie Cobbs, Jr., who starts opposite Jones on the other side of the field.

Naturally, Jones is already thinking about matchup problems against much taller, heavier cornerbacks. But he's not about to modify his own game or playing style.

He's more preoccupied with figuring out how opponents are going to limit him.

"They've got to stop me, too," Jones said Monday. "If you play with confidence and learn the offense, you can get open."

Jones—who's been limited throughout his career with a pair of ankle injuries—didn't come to Indiana to line up on the outside. He arrived at fall camp in 2012 as a slot receiver where players of his physical stature are more accustomed to playing.

But in the spring of 2014, Jones was moved to the outside around the same time former-Hoosier slot receiver Shane Wynn was making the same transition.

When Jones found out he was moving, he grabbed a playbook and started studying. He started watching different film and asking senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld for help.

He was only moving about 10 yards or so farther away from the ball, but the slot and outside positions are "very different," Jones said.

Instead of working to find space among linebackers and safeties, Jones was dealing with the constant pestering of cornerbacks in more one-on-one man

press situations that initially caused him some trouble.

"I sat down with Coach (Kevin) Johns and learned the ways of getting off the press and getting off different techniques," Jones said. "Nate loves to throw it to the sidelines, so I have no problems playing out there."

Jones spent last season learning his new craft behind the scenes with Wynn, who he calls his best friend.

Jones doesn't play quite as small as Wynn, head coach Kevin Wilson said. He considers Jones more of a hybrid who has some of the advantages of a slot receiver without giving up all the traits of a more conventional outside threat.

"He doesn't play small to me," Wilson said. "What he gives you is that speed that sometimes the big guy doesn't have. So the big guy can make the jump ball, but the smaller guy can separate. So bottom line, you just kind of find those routes that he likes."

Jones said he won't be picky when it comes to his own routes, but he understands his own strengths and weaknesses.

He'll leave the jump balls for teammates like Cobbs, who are more comfortable using their size to outjump opponents. Jones is more likely to rely on his speed whether it be in making a sudden cut to find space or getting down the field to chase down a deep ball.

"He's an outstanding route runner, and I think more than anything else, he's developed some really strong hands," Johns said. "And I mean Cody Latimer strong where you throw him the ball in the slant on third down, he's going to make the grab and he's going to hang onto it...You feel good about calling that guy's number in a big-time situation."

Jones has been patiently waiting for that moment when the ball is thrown his way. For the last three years, he's been held back.

Now healthy and comfortable on the outside, Jones couldn't be more set to take the field.

"It's the greatest feeling ever," Jones said. "Every night, it's hard to sleep just realizing that I'm going to be finally back up there 100 percent. Not being able to play since freshman year, it's been a long time. So I'm ready. That's all I can say. I'm ready."



## Toth Leading Special Teams Unit

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Erich Toth's moment comes and goes in a matter of seconds, and the last thing the senior punter wants is to be remembered.

When Toth jogs out onto the field, morale is already trending downward. His number being called means Indiana failed to get on the scoreboard.

People tend to forget the good punts, Toth says, but they don't struggle to recall the bad ones. That's why his favorite games are the ones people forget he even exists.

"If I have a game where nobody mentions my name, I call it a pretty successful game," Toth said. "You can have 10 good punts and one bad punt and everyone points to the bad one like the good ones never happened."

Unfair? Maybe. But that's the life of a punter. Toth has gotten used to it as he begins to enter his third season as the Indiana starter.

"I tend to think it's one of the tougher positions," Toth said. "A quarterback may throw an incomplete pass, but he knows he has another throw right after that. With punting, you get one kick and you're off the field regardless of how good it is."

Toth is constantly seeking unobtainable perfection. Football may be a game of yards and inches, but kicking is one of centimeters and launch degrees.

For every punt, the long snapper has .75 seconds to get the punter the ball. From there, Toth has between 1.25 and 1.3 seconds to get off his kick. Any slower and he risks getting his punt blocked.

Those are the ones that get him remembered. He wants to avoid those.

"You don't even have time to think about it," Toth said. "You're out there and you literally black out so you just

do what you do."

In five seasons, Toth has emerged as one of the Big Ten's most veteran punters, which doesn't surprise former IU standout kicker Mitch Ewald.

Toth arrived in Bloomington raw with potential, Ewald said. He was long, lean and flexible. He had all the physical tools a punter needed and the drive to separate himself, Ewald said.

"He came in as a guy that really, really wanted to work hard," Ewald said. "And really, he kind of pushed me because I was kind of the opposite. I came in with a little more talent from the beginning that he didn't have. He had to really work for it, and that rubbed off on me."

Toth and Ewald became best friends that did practically everything together.

They were fraternity brothers at Beta Theta Pi. They took the same car to practice together. They ate meals together. They sat next to each other on practically every bus ride and every team meeting.

"He's basically my big brother," Toth said. "He took me under his wing my freshman year. He taught me how to be a great leader and a great player. I wouldn't be the player I am without him, honestly."

The Hoosiers don't have a coach dedicated to teaching kicking and snapping, which makes Toth's job even more important.

He'll spend hours with the other specialists examining every last detail of their snaps and kicks just like Ewald did before him.

He may not be a long snapper, but that doesn't matter. Toth knows what's right and what's wrong and will do his best to study film and give advice that gives his teammates an advantage just

like Ewald did years before.

"I knew that Toth would take on that role when I left because that's just the type of guy he is," Ewald said. "I guess I kind of took him under my wing, and I don't know, guys tend to give me the credit but he was the guy from day one that really wanted to learn. I don't think he gets nearly enough credit himself."

Toth said he's not as interested in credit. He'd rather have the spotlight on someone else.

Toth averaged 40.7 yards on punts last season, downing 18 inside the 20-yard line. He wants to pin opponents even deeper this season while decreasing his touchbacks after having seven last year.

At the end of the day, the numbers don't mean all that much, Toth said. He just wants to limit his mistakes.

In a perfect world, Toth won't hear his name called at all. But when he does, he'll be ready to go.

"I just want to do my job," Toth said. "That's the number one goal. Go out there, do your job and be reliable. Be dependable. That's what makes for a great punter."



### Four is Better Than One at Tight End

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind. -** Indiana may not have a clear-cut No. 1 tight end this season, but Anthony Corsaro isn't concerned.

He says Indiana is better off without one. He even has the math to prove it.

"We really feel like we have four number one tight ends," Corsaro said. "We don't need one. We have four. And you know, four is better than one in all the math classes I took. So we feel really comfortable with that."

Indiana head coach Kevin Wilson has gone on record calling this year's group of tight ends the deepest, most competitive groups he's had in his time at Indiana.

The Hoosiers' competitiveness shows in the way they practice, Corsaro said. Nobody can afford to take the day off at the risk of losing reps to the guy next to him, which gives tight ends coach James Patton options when he's deciding who needs to be on the field.

"(They're) just a competitive group, and that's why I like them," Patton said. "Because when guys use one tight end, two tight ends, three tight ends, it's all based on who's playing the best. Who's practicing the best first of all will determine who's getting the most reps."

Despite having to constantly compete for reps against teammates, Corsaro said the camaraderie in the position group is as strong as it's been in his time at Indiana.

Not having a standout starter has motivated the group, he said. It also allows for players to take breaks during games when they're fatigued without much drop off.

"We've really embraced as a group being each other's fans and being each other's biggest critics," Corsaro said. "So when a tight end scores, the other

four or five guys want to be the first ones in the end zone celebrating with them, but we'll also be the first to say, 'Hey, you need to clean that up.'"

Last season, Corsaro combined with fellow senior Michael Cooper and sophomore Jordan Fuchs to catch 10 passes for 95 yards and one touchdown.

Admittedly, that production fell short of the numbers they wanted out of the passing game. The decrease in production was partly to blame on senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld's injury and an increased emphasis on running the ball with All-American running back Tevin Coleman.

The tight end group sometimes risks being overlooked on that spectrum, Corsaro said. But the Hoosiers' tight ends were opening holes for Coleman, too.

The tight ends look to have more balance in the attack this season. With the options they have at the position, Corsaro said there's reason to believe the tight ends will see an increase in production in 2015.

"Last year we obviously had reason to run the ball," Corsaro said. "There definitely is more need to get involved in the passing game and even more in the running game. We'll all just do whatever is called upon us. But we want to make plays. We know we can help this offense and be game-changing playmakers."





## Jones Poised to Break Out in 2015

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Ricky Jones only needed one word to describe the mindset he's had throughout his Indiana career. Patient.

The redshirt junior receiver hasn't made the impact he confidently believes he will up to this point. A crowded depth chart and injuries combined to limit Jones to just four catches for 60 yards in 16 career games.

But Jones hasn't gotten frustrated. He's kept working. The receiver that teammates are calling "Grandpa" in the locker room recognizes this may be his crucial season to break out into the player only few have had a chance to see.

"I haven't really had the chance to show people who the real Ricky Jones is," he said. "This year is my chance. I'm just excited to be healthy and ready to go. I've got some great teammates around me, and I know this could be a good year for me to really come out."

But who is Ricky Jones?

He describes himself as fast, reliable, confident and maybe underrated at wide receiver. He's shown glimpses of who he is at practice, but he hasn't had the opportunity to show the public his skillset.

Ask offensive coordinator Kevin Johns and he'll call Jones "poised" as a leader. He's someone who's waited a long time to be in the position he's in. Now that he has the opportunity to make an impact, he's taken things in stride.

His quarterback, senior Nate Sudfeld, says he just catches balls. His athletic ability and reach makes up for his 5-foot-10 frame, Sudfeld said.

"Ricky is one of those guys who's just going to go get it," Sudfeld said. "He's been great at really finding ways to get open. He's been super consistent, and

I think he's got something to prove, too."

What Jones is proving is that he can play. Up until this point, his career has been plagued by a few more downs than ups.

In 2012, Jones broke his ankle and was forced to redshirt after Indiana's season-opening win against Indiana State. The next year, Jones was limited once again after reinjuring his ankle in practice.

Jones said the effects of two broken ankles slowed him down again last season. He had an increased role, but he was never 100 percent healthy. He still couldn't be the player he wanted to be.

"These last few years, I'm not going to lie, they've been tough," Jones said. "Now, I'm just trying to keep confidence in myself and work to be the best I can and just have a great season to help this team win."

One of Jones' biggest aids through the difficult years struggling with injury was former Hoosier Shane Wynn.

The two grew close at Indiana, both mostly playing in the slot. Like Wynn did before, Jones is expected to play more on the outside this season.

"Shane, that's my best friend right there," Jones said. "He helped me out a lot and kept me confident in myself and motivated. He's given me a lot of advice and just helped me stay positive."

With Wynn's help, Jones managed to grind through the difficult years.

He returned to camp with a renewed sense of confidence evident in the way he carried himself, sophomore wide receiver Simmie Cobbs said. It was obvious to Cobbs that he was excited.

Jones is always talking on the field to

anyone willing to listen. Off the field, he keeps talking in the locker room and the film room sharing advice and tips with the rest of his receivers.

"He's really taken on a leadership role, and I think he likes that," Cobbs said. "He's helped out everyone. He's able to share his experiences and make us all better as a group."

Jones said he likes the added pressure of being the group's leader. He understands that some people doubt them because they're young and don't return much production, but like Jones himself, he's reminding his teammates that the 2015 season is a chance to break out.

"We're a young group, but age doesn't mean anything," Jones said. "That's what I keep reminding these guys is that it doesn't matter how old you are. You just need to go out there and play, and I'm really proud of them and the way they're competing."

Jones won't have to wait long to get his chance.

The Hoosiers are under two weeks away from opening up the season Sept. 5 against Southern Illinois at Memorial Stadium. And for the first time in nearly three years, Jones is healthy and confident that he can finally show the world the type of player he is.

"This has been a longtime coming for Ricky," Johns said. "He has a tremendous attitude and has taken everything in stride. I really think this is his time to really break out and be a leader for us on the outside."



## Young Secondary Growing Up Fast

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Indiana's defensive backs will be forced to grow up quickly this season.

The Hoosiers don't have a single upperclassman among the 13 players listed as defensive backs. The most veteran players are a group of seven redshirt sophomores who have mostly had supporting roles up until this point in their Indiana careers.

Redshirt sophomore safety Chase Dutra—the most veteran and battle-tested defensive back—said he knows there's doubt surrounding his position group. He tries to ignore social media or whatever else is written about him and his teammates, but he understands why more than a few people have questioned IU's defensive backs.

Dutra doesn't worry too much, though. He said he's eager to answer those questions on the field.

"You hear about the talking, that we have a big question mark because a lot of us haven't played," Dutra said. "That just motivates us in a way because they do question us, and we want to go out there and prove them wrong and show them that we can play regardless of how young we are."

Ironically, Dutra likely has the least questions surrounding his playing ability among the defensive backs.

He was named to the BTN.com honorable mention All-Big Ten Freshman team as a redshirt freshman in 2014, playing in all 12 games and starting one. He made 34 tackles, two for loss, and proved to excel in pass coverage, grabbing three interceptions to go along with a forced fumble.

Dutra recognized early on in the offseason that the Hoosiers would need a vocal leader in the secondary. He quickly embraced the role, leading his teammates in summer workouts and trying

to add stability at an evolving position.

"You think Chase Dutra, he may not be the fastest safety in the Big Ten, but from a heady, understanding of what we do—that's the guy we want back there running the ship," defensive coordinator Brian Knorr said. "He's been very good for us."

Barring injury or other unforeseen circumstance, Dutra will be Indiana's starting free safety come opening weekend. Who he lines up alongside isn't as clear.

Indiana secondary coaches Noah Joseph and Brandon Shelby have both repeatedly mentioned the increased level of competition at the cornerback and safety spots.

At cornerback, redshirt sophomores Rashard Fant and Noah Padmore have risen up the depth chart and are likely candidates to start at the corner spots, but that's still an open competition.

Starters or not, Fant and Padmore—like Dutra—have tried to take on leadership roles at their position.

"We were just talking a week ago. We're the oldest ones in the room. Who would have ever thought?" Fant said. "We've got more of a leadership role, but we're still learning. The kids younger than us look up to us, so that's cool and fun at the same time."

There's been an increased emphasis on sharpening up the fundamentals in the defensive backs room, Shelby said. Just a few practices ago, the Hoosiers spent a portion of their time working on the details of open-field tackling.

Sharpening up the fundamentals of the position can go a long way toward making the transition easier, Shelby said. It's not a total remedy for a lack of experience, but it can help.

"Of course you're going to have doubters because a lot of us haven't been on the field, but I really think this is a good group that's working hard," Padmore said. "We have depth everywhere. If one person goes down, we'll be okay because we've got another guy who's just as ready."

Part of last season's struggles against the pass contributed to Padmore's sense of readiness.

While players like Padmore and Fant or sophomore safety Tony Fields didn't take the majority of the snaps, they did get worked in the rotation. They'll be able to lean on those brief moments of game action as they get adjusted into increased roles.

"We've got a lot of young guys—guys that aren't scared," Fant said. "My big thing is I tell them all the time, 'Don't be scared to get beat.' It makes you a better player. You're going to get beat sometimes, but sometimes you'll make a play. And when you make a play, there isn't a better feeling when everyone's looking at you."

Padmore agreed, adding one thing.

"Then you swag out," Padmore said.

Indiana's secondary will be young, but it won't lack confidence.



## Wilson Awards Eight Walk-On Scholarships

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - One by one, Fred Glass called their names.

"Ben Bach...Erich Toth...Come on guys," Glass said. "...Griffin Oakes...Anthony Corsaro...Michael Cooper...Mitchell Paige...Damon Graham...Ricky Brookins..."

This was uncommon. It isn't every day IU's Director of Athletics joins practice and begins talking about the value of leadership with a list of names. The players weren't told what was coming or why Glass was making them stand in front of their entire team.

But they were about to find out.

"Guys, because you've had the courage to set high expectations and the confidence to meet and exceed it," Glass said, "I'm pleased to let you know that Kevin Wilson is extending you scholarships for the 2015 season."

Chaos ensued. A huddle formed with the seven walk-ons in the center. Everyone else was jumping up and down, yelling and congratulating their teammates.

At Indiana, a walk-on earning a scholarship is cause for celebration.

Within the Hoosiers' locker room, there's a wall dedicated to celebrating what Wilson calls "walk-on successes."

The wall is covered in a collage of nearly life-size photos of every walk-on who's earned a scholarship at Indiana during Wilson's tenure. Their names join their pictures on the wall to the left.

"Now we've got to add some guys to our wall," Wilson said.

Wilson, a former walk-on offensive lineman at North Carolina, takes pride in the success of his walk-on program. He uses the walk-on wall as a reminder to every player—scholarship or no

scholarship—that those who work hard will be rewarded.

Wilson knows the emotions walk-on goes through. After paying for school himself for two seasons, he himself earned a scholarship as a junior playing for the Tar Heels.

"For me, it was special for Mom and Dad," Wilson said. "I had the same number. I had the same locker. I had the same role in practice. But the bill was now paid for. All these families sacrificed. They've got loans. They've invested time.

"I know these guys are going to be making some calls to parents, and as a parent now, I really think about that."

Wilson has awarded 41 walk-on scholarships over his five-years in Bloomington. He has two more available this year and said he may be adding two more names to the walk-on wall before too long.

But that's down the road still. Friday was reserved for celebrating the eight men who no longer need to worry about paying for school this year.

"It's kind of a motivator, but it's also an honor thing," Wilson said. "Those kids, they've done good work for us and deserve the recognition."



## Virtual Reality, 3D Videos Making Progress

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - When Mark Cuban donated \$5 million to Indiana University to build a state-of-the-art sports media technology center, he said it would be transformative.

He just wasn't sure what that exactly meant.

"It's like the internet or streamlining—when we first started streaming, who'd have thought we could possibly do all the things we can do?" Cuban said. "But once you get it going, you learn new things. That's what's going to happen here."

Cuban's premonition proved to become reality. In the two and a half months since the Mark Cuban Center for Technology was founded, Indiana University's technology team has been exploring the possibilities of 360 and virtual reality videos.

"It's exceeded my wildest expectations even in the short run," IU Director of Athletics Fred Glass said. "I think what distinguishes us is we actually have the product in house. We have technicians here full time that are able to custom make our product to what our needs are."

Patrick Dhaene and Brian Hulley—the two technicians Glass alluded to—showcased some of their recent projects in front of members of the media Wednesday.

Media members wearing virtual reality glasses were able to stand in between Indiana senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld and sophomore running back Devine Redding as they ran a draw out of the shotgun formation right in front of the camera.

A 360 video let the viewers watch women's soccer practice around a camera set up in the middle of the field. At one point in the video, the ball nearly hit the camera as it went flying by.

"We like what we're doing with what we've seen so far, but we're just beginning," Hulley said.

The next projects on tap are a shoot with the men's basketball and volleyball teams.

The football team has already gotten a chance to experiment with the technology in practice through a process head coach Kevin Wilson calls "flashcarding."

In the drill, players see brief clips of plays and are able to read the play as they would in practice without actually being out on the field with teammates. Cameras have the potential to be set up anywhere from next to the quarterback to beside defensive ends and even at center.

"What we're trying to do with it is create plays," Wilson said. "It's intriguing. The kids like it."

Sudfeld is already working with the technology at practice.

While wearing the virtual reality goggles, Sudfeld can view film while holding a joystick allowing him to fast forward, rewind and pause plays from his view at quarterback.

Sudfeld said the best part about the technology is being able to see other formations in real time and getting the chance to read what is coming. He added that the video will only become more helpful as the technology progresses and the videos are logged.

"I am really able to play the play without getting dressed up in pads, so that is really cool," Sudfeld said. "You just can't simulate how fast guys are coming up on you or how fast windows close. You'll get everything there is about playing quarterback except getting hit, which is also an important part of the game, but I think it is tremendous."

The Hoosiers plan to continue adding plays to the film library in the upcoming weeks. Other sports will soon be doing the same at film sessions of their own.

The technology team plans to give fans the opportunity to view some of the video in the upcoming months at gamedays or other Indiana functions. But as Cuban said, the possibilities are likely to reveal themselves over time.

"It's a phenomenal piece of equipment," Wilson said. "It's where the game is going."





### O-Line Aims to be Best in the Big Ten

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind. -** Indiana head coach Kevin Wilson takes a special liking to his offensive line.

Wilson can relate to the guys in the trenches. He earned a football scholarship at North Carolina after playing two seasons as a walk-on center and guard. He began his coaching career as an offensive line coach at Winston-Salem State and took off from there.

Between his time as a player and as a coach, Wilson has been working with offensive lines longer than anyone on staff. So when he says he likes the group he has, he means it.

It also makes offensive line coach Greg Frey's job that much tougher. He knows Wilson will always keep an eye on the big guys up front.

"I would say Coach Frey has the hardest job on the team just because coach Wilson's an O-line guy," senior tight end Anthony Corsaro said. "He's probably watching him harder than anyone else."

So far, Frey's offensive line has met Wilson's standards.

"This is a line of scrimmage league and game, and that is the strength of this team," Wilson said. "That's why we have a lot of confidence we can be a solid team."

Part of Wilson's confidence stems from his returning talent.

The Hoosiers welcomed back three starters—Jason Spriggs, Dan Feeney and Jake Reed—and have even more experience backing them up.

Wilson said at Big Ten media day in Chicago that he could envision going as far as eight, sometimes nine guys deep into his rotation to keep players fresh.

Frey took Wilson's sentiment one step

further, saying he'll play any number of players if it means helping the Hoosiers win.

"The goal is to get every one of the guys that sits in my room ready," Frey said. "As many of those guys that are ready, I'll get on the field."

In a roomful of capable bodies, getting out onto the field may be one of the biggest challenges for Indiana's offensive linemen.

The closeness in talent level between first and second string has made every practice a challenge, fifth-year senior Jake Reed said. There are no days off when the second unit is pushing the starters as hard as they are.

"The competition is as good as it's been since I've gotten here," he said. "Every day, someone's pushing you harder. Every day, someone else is having the best day."

The guys who get out on the field will no doubt have size to go along with their experience.

The average measurements of a starting offensive lineman on Wilson's initial depth chart is 6-foot-5, 305 pounds. In all, eight tip the scales at more than 300 pounds.

Redshirt junior Dimitric Camiel is the biggest of the big men, lining up at 6-foot-7, 319 pounds. He stands alongside Spriggs, who at 6-foot-7, 305 pounds said he feels small when looking toward Camiel.

"Our size is a big advantage for us as a unit," Camiel said. "It's good for the pass block, the run block and just ranging out. It helps us in a lot of ways, and you can't teach it either. We've just got it."

Indiana's combination of size and depth allows the Hoosiers to be more versatile, Frey said.

The veterans remember being one of the nation's elite passing teams two years ago. Last season, the run game became the focal point thanks to All-American rusher Tevin Coleman.

The common denominator in both seasons was the offensive line. This year, Feeney said the Hoosiers will look to be somewhere in between.

"I think the whole team is better when we have balance," Feeney said. "Us as offensive line guys, we'll do whatever you need us to do. The touchdown is worth the same whether you throw it or run it."

Feeney was just one of a few linemen to bring up the pride among the offensive linemen. More than one of them has brought up the idea of being not only one of Wilson's best groups, but potentially being the best line in the conference.

The Hoosiers certainly think it's a possibility. Just ask Camiel.

"I don't think we could be the best," he said. "I know so."



# McCullough Learns from Time in Atlanta

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Deland McCullough reunited with Tevin Coleman in Atlanta during the summer break, but he wasn't there just to catch up with the former All-American.

McCullough was there to work.

The fifth-year running backs coach joined the Atlanta Falcons coaching staff as part of the Bill Walsh NFL Minority Coaching Fellowship. The internship—named after the Pro Football Hall of Fame head coach—aims to give talented minority college coaches the means and opportunities to coach NFL teams.

"It was a good deal, and I was very excited and very fortunate to have been able to do it," McCullough said. "It was a great learning experience not only for me but the players as well. It confirmed a lot of the things I've been doing."

McCullough spent a little less than a week coaching the Falcons running backs under head coach Dan Quinn's guidance. By total coincidence, the internship meant McCullough was coaching Coleman again as the former Hoosier adjusted to life in the NFL.

Atlanta marked McCullough's third coaching opportunity as a Bill Walsh intern. He had previously spent time with the New Orleans Saints and the Seattle Seahawks.

"It's pretty cool seeing your coach working with an NFL team," sophomore running back Devine Redding said. "It shows he's one of the best, and he brought back some stuff, too."

McCullough said one of the most rewarding parts of the trip was seeing how similar the professional camp was to the way Indiana runs its own practices.

He could spot the similarities in the way drills were run and found parallels in the terminology. At the same

time, McCullough said the players and coaches were also impressed with the things he was doing differently.

As a former NFL running back himself, McCullough made it obvious to his new players that he knew his stuff.

"They even said, 'Hey man, you're on top of it. Your stuff is pretty tight,'" McCullough said. "But what I learned from those guys is just attention to detail and continuing to be demanding of your guys. Demanding perfection and making sure these guys not only know their assignments, but they own them."

McCullough relayed what he was learning back home to his own running backs in Bloomington each day.

While the coaching internship was first and foremost an opportunity for McCullough to grow as a coach, he said his players are the ones who get the most benefit because of how much they'll learn through the trip.

"I was texting my guys the whole time," McCullough said. "I was able to come back and tell the guys in our room that I feel even that much stronger about them. I said to them, 'There's not a guy in this room that couldn't be running there.' And I'm not talking about just one. There are several that could hang with those guys."

That's good news for the Hoosiers heading into the 2015 season where they'll look to replace the production of two graduated seniors.

"It just gives us that much more confidence," Redding said.

Before McCullough parted ways with Atlanta, he had one final debriefing with the Falcons running backs.

He thanked them for their time, and they did the same. McCullough said the trip was well worth it, and that the

program gives elite coaches opportunities they wouldn't normally have.

As a case in point: Pittsburgh Steelers head coach Mike Tomlin, who won the Super Bowl with the Steelers in 2008-09, was at one time a Bill Walsh intern.

"When I left there, Devonta Freeman and all the other backs came up to me and said, 'Hey man, we're happy to have had you. You really know your stuff,'" McCullough said. "Meanwhile, Tevin was sitting in the back like, 'Yeah. I know he does.'"



## Shelby Excited to be Teaching Again

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind. -** When Brandon Shelby was asked about working with young cornerbacks again, he couldn't help but crack a smile.

Knowing the question would be coming, Shelby removed his hat to reveal a freshly shaved head. It's a new look he's sporting that reflects his player personnel.

"Well, as you guys have noticed, I cut my hair off," Shelby said, drawing a laugh. "It's the stress right there."

But it's a good stress, Shelby says. The kind of stress that motivates him. Because in a way, the 2015 season is his chance to start fresh again.

Shelby is entering his fifth season at Indiana. He has a new job title—secondary coach, not cornerbacks coach—and a group of mostly untested players to work with.

Absent are the names Tim Bennett, Michael Hunter, and Kenny Mullen that Shelby, and Indiana fans, had become familiar with seeing lined up at cornerback over the last four seasons.

They've been replaced by names like Andre Brown, Jameel Cook and Devonte Williams—young corners eager to make an impact as early as they can.

Those three aren't alone, either. The only cornerback to register a tackle last season and return to camp healthy is Rashard Fant, but even he's only a redshirt sophomore. It's a reflection on the youth movement Indiana has had in the secondary.

For the first time in four years, Shelby is teaching youngsters again.

"The great thing is you get to kind of go back to your mental rolodex of things that you've done to prepare these young guys for when Saturday comes along and they're playing against juniors and seniors," Shelby said. "At

the end of the day, you're teaching kids. Sometimes, you've got to slow it down."

Slowing things down begins with mastering the basics. Shelby can't throw his whole playbook at freshmen and sophomores like he could with his senior-heavy group last season.

Shelby breaks plays down to the small details at practice and in the film room. He's constantly asking his players questions and putting them on the spot to speak up.

"If you don't know what you're doing, you're going to play slow," Shelby said. "So in meeting rooms, you've got to make them speak up. Make them sit up. Make them take notes. Put them up in front of the board in front of everyone and make them speak clearly and loudly. Let them tell you what they know."

Even when Shelby asks questions, the answer isn't always cut and dry.

There are times where Shelby will play "mind games" with his guys. He'll ask them a question and even when they respond with the right answer, he'll get on them and act like he's upset with their response.

"I want them to say, 'No, coach. I got it right,'" Shelby said. "I'm playing with them so they can have that same confidence out on the field. Because I can't go out on the field for them. When I'm out on the sideline, they've got to have the confidence in themselves."

That confidence is key for defensive backs, Shelby said, because they're constantly being put on the spot.

A receiver is trying to beat them down, burn them and make them look silly. Shelby likes his corners to have a "swagger" about them. He looks for a bit of cockiness out of his corners because if they believe in their own abil-

ities, they're more likely to go out and perform.

But at the same time, Shelby can't have his guys getting big heads.

He and co-secondary coach Noah Joseph will design situations where the defensive back is going to be in a bit of trouble.

There isn't a cornerback in the league that doesn't know what it's like to be beat, Shelby said. He doesn't want his guys panicking whenever they're in pressure situations.

"They've got to feel that stress because sometimes, it brings the best out of them," Shelby said. "They've got to feel that receiver behind you and be able to keep running. Sometimes, you're not going to be in the greatest position to make a play. What are you going to do when you're not there?"

Naturally, there have been growing pains. Shelby didn't expect things to go perfectly.

Some days are better than others and some days are worse. His corners will make big plays on one series but mess up the next.

But that's okay, Shelby said, because it means they're learning. Mistakes are bound to happen in the classroom—a place Shelby feels right at home again.

"These young guys, they're fun," Shelby said. "And I'll tell you what, I'm really proud of them."



### D-Line Expects to Anchor IU Defense

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Indiana head coach Kevin Wilson is still getting a grasp for his team's strengths this early in fall camp, but at least one thing appears already certain: the Hoosiers' coach likes his defensive line.

Wilson has said on multiple occasions that his defensive line has the potential to be one of the best in the Big Ten, and he anticipates being able to lean on his men in the trenches often this season.

Led by second-year defensive line coach Larry McDaniel, the early reports have indicated that the experienced line has been one of the most consistent and talented position groups in practice.

"Collectively as a group I think they're more mature," McDaniel said. "They understand me a little bit better, me going into my second year. They understand our standards of doing things and they've embraced that."

The Hoosiers look to build on last year's growth under defensive coordinator Brian Knorr. Using Knorr's 3-4 scheme, Indiana ranked 10th in the Big Ten against the run and 11th in total defense.

The second-year coordinator admitted at Saturday's media day that Indiana still isn't where it needs to be defensively against the pass. The Hoosiers will be relying on four new starters in the secondary, but Wilson trusts his defensive line to make life easier for a relatively untested group of corners and safeties.

"I think you can go through some growing pains if your line of scrimmage is kicking butt," Wilson said. "As we go through camp, it will be interesting to see just how strong our line of scrimmage is because that will really help those young guys, not stress them out so much."

Senior defensive tackle Adarius Rayner took Wilson's sentiment one step further by saying the Hoosiers' young secondary has actually made life easier on the defensive line.

"Having a young defensive backfield is good for an older front because the defensive backs listen more and are sometimes more eager to take our advice," Rayner said. "It actually helps us as a defense, and it should help us with our pass rush."

Although the 3-4 defense has a focus on stopping the run, developing a pass rush has been a major point of emphasis this offseason.

The Hoosiers ranked 82nd in the country with 23 sacks last year. Just over half of those sacks (12.5) came from the defensive line.

Graduated defensive end Bobby Richardson led the Hoosiers with 5.5 sacks last season, leaving sophomore nose tackle Nate Hoff as the leading returner with 3.5 sacks. He expects to see the sack totals rise this season now that everyone's comfortable lining up in the 3-4.

"It's actually awesome not having to learn a whole new defense," Hoff said. "Everything's a lot quicker...Right now for us, it's more about pass disruption and attacking the quarterback a lot more. We've focused more on pass rushing and being disruptive in the backfield."

Nick Mangieri could factor into increasing the pressure this season. The senior moved from back to the defensive line after playing bandit last season.

Mangieri said he enjoyed his time at the bandit before saying that his size and style of play may be better suited for the defensive line. McDaniel praised Mangieri's work ethic and his ability to return to the position he was recruited to play.

"It's been pretty seamless," McDaniel said. "I think that he's comfortable down there. He's back with the group of guys that he's been with for his first couple years here. From the standpoint of him coming into the room and just fitting in like an old shoe, he's able to do that."

With Mangieri back in the mix, most of last year's production returning and a young crop of freshmen already catching the coaches' attention, Rayner said there's a noticeable excitement in the defensive linemen's meeting rooms.

He said the Hoosiers feel like they've hit on something in McDaniel's second season as their coach. With expectations rising, Rayner said he and his teammates are excited for the challenges ahead.

"Everybody's energized and willing to work," Rayner said. "I just feel like it's going to continue. Everyone's running. Everyone's getting to the ball great, and that's what we're going to need during the season. Everybody has to do their job."

"I really like what we've got."





## Sudfeld Shines at 2015 B1G Kickoff Luncheon

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind. -** Nate Sudfeld earned the country's attention for his play on the football field. Now, he's trying to use his influence to help others.

The Indiana senior quarterback joined Ohio State linebacker Joshua Perry in addressing a crowd of just under 2,000 fans, colleagues and media members Friday at the Big Ten's 44th Kickoff Luncheon.

A well-rehearsed Sudfeld didn't miss a beat in his roughly six minute speech after spending the better part of the last two weeks rehearsing in his Bloomington home and around the football facilities.

Sudfeld admitted he was "a little nervous" before taking to the podium, but he quickly found his confidence on stage. He left Chicago happy with the way his speech was accepted and hoped he gave the audience advice to reflect on.

Sudfeld rarely looked down at his notes, speaking with poise as he shared stories of his time at Indiana and the impact of his work with Assist International, a humanitarian organization founded by his grandfather.

Sudfeld narrowed his speech topic by first mapping out what he thought was important to share and then cutting back as best he could.

At one point, he said he had about 30 different ideas before cutting his speech to fit into the allotted time he was given.

Reflecting on his speech, Sudfeld said he hoped people listening took away two major pieces of advice.

First, he wanted to remind the audience that many of the football players representing their schools at the Big Ten media days wouldn't have been there without the help of others.

He wanted to thank those who helped

him get to Indiana and hoped others would do the same.

Second, he wanted to stress that athletes have a platform to help people in need, and it's their duty as influential people to do all they can to help others.

Sudfeld told the audience he learned the benefits and thrill of helping others first hand in his trip to Uganda as a 14-year-old and again during his trip back to Uganda over his 2015 spring break.

"Why do I have so much, and they have so little? That experience partly shaped my world view," Sudfeld said in his speech. "To appreciate what I have and to see it as my responsibility to make the most of my opportunities. It's important not only to recognize that we stand on the shoulders of others, but also to give back and to make the most of the platform we've been given. Otherwise, we can lose perspective."

Sudfeld's own perspective that he's gained through his journeys both playing football and with Assist International continue to shape him.

The Modesto, Calif. native said he was intimidated by the football crowds packing Memorial Stadium to watch him as a freshman, but he's gotten used to the pressure. He's since realized how much of an impact he can make thanks to that same spotlight that once left him nervous.

"We have a unique opportunity, and quite frankly, the responsibility to use the platform we've been given to touch the lives around us," Sudfeld said. "From our local communities, all the way to the furthest regions of Africa, and everywhere in between."

"I'm looking forward to playing against the majority of you this fall," Sudfeld concluded. "What a ride we're on, and we're just getting started. Thank you, and Go IU!"



### Sudfeld Gains Perspective in Africa

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - In Bloomington, Nate Sudfeld is the quarterback. He's a rising senior. A leader. A player who's focused on leading Indiana football back to a bowl game for the first time since 2007.

But on a service trip to Africa, Sudfeld was "Okello," meaning "follower of twins." Other times, he was "Mzungu," which he was told simply means "big white man."

"We were playing soccer, and right away they kept yelling, 'Mzungu! Mzungu,'" Sudfeld said. "I looked around like, 'Is that me?' They told me what it meant and I was like 'Alright. I like it.'"

Sudfeld quickly became adjusted to responding to a variety of names while on his week-long trip to northern Uganda last spring. He traveled there with his family to visit construction on an orphanage representing Assist International, the humanitarian group that his grandparents founded in 1990.

Since being founded 25 years ago, Assist International has completed more than 500 projects in 63 countries all helping to address the needs of what the company describes as "the world's most vulnerable people."

The organization has continued to grow over the last quarter century and now includes many members of the Sudfeld family.

Nine members of the Sudfeld family went on the most recent trip to Uganda to visit the orphan house Assist International is funding for Sister Rosemary, a Catholic nun whose humanitarian work has recently helped name her one of Time magazine's 100 most influential people in 2014.

Nate was joined by twin brothers Matt and Zach, his younger sisters Juliana and Sarah, father Ralph and mother Michelle and his grandparents Bob and Charlene Pagett.

Each Sudfeld grandchild's 13th birthday marks the opportunity to travel with grandparents on a service trip. The journeys have become a sort of family rite of passage, Sudfeld said. When he turned 13, his trip was to Africa, the very same land he returned to in the spring.

"Since going on that first trip, I knew I wanted to go back whenever I could," Sudfeld said. "I'd been kind of annoying everyone and pestering everyone to get another trip in motion and my brother, Zach, ultimately made it happen because he decided he wanted to build an orphan house in Atiak, near Gulu."

The house Sudfeld travelled to work on is being funded by Assist International and is modeled after the many orphan homes and orphan villages they have built. The house is now in the closing stages of its development and is expected to be just one of multiple homes they hope to build.

Each of the homes will house eight children, most of whom are orphans. Sudfeld said many of the women and girls Assist International helped had been recovering from being abducted as part of the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA), the terrorist group led by Joseph Kony.

"These women and kids really needed a place to go," Sudfeld said. "What's really cool about these orphanages is it's like putting these kids into a family. They'll raise the orphan kids, but they'll also normally have a few biological as well. They sort of grow and become a family together."

After Sudfeld and his family spent a few days playing with local children and checking in on the progress of the build, they headed off to Jinja, Uganda, a town Assist International began working in several years ago. They have built nearly 20 homes for AOET,

the Aids Orphans Education Trust in Jinja.

Assist International's project in Jinja started out similarly to the newest project in Atiak. Sudfeld said it has since grown from starting as an orphanage and school with about 200 children to helping more than 3,000 children to this date.

Sudfeld's older brother Zach, who plays tight end for the New York Jets, went to Jinja last year and helped start sports programs by building courts and fields for basketball, soccer and volleyball teams.

Just one year removed from building the facilities, the Sudfeld family was pleasantly surprised when they saw how well the teams were doing.

"We went back a year later and saw they had a bunch of trophies," Sudfeld said. "Their team was up playing on a national level. That was really cool to see and rewarding for us to see that they were making good use of the fields and courts."

Sudfeld said the most rewarding part of the journey was the time spent with the children.

He was able to dance and play games with the children. Sudfeld even tried to teach them how to throw a football with a tight spiral, but he joked that they'd make better long snappers because they tended to want to throw with two hands.

Despite traveling to Africa to help the children, Sudfeld said it was the children who ended up helping him.

"It's hard to articulate just what it's like," Sudfeld said. "In one aspect, you think you're going for them, which you are, but they were helping me and giving me perspective. There's a certain joy about them and a happiness that they have figured out that I don't know

if people in the U.S. really do as much.”

He said it was the children’s hearts that impressed him the most. Despite living in poverty, the children were sharing.

“The kids, they were selfless,” Sudfeld said. “I’d give them a football and they’d start sharing it with one another and trying to teach each other how to throw after I taught one kid. It was incredible just how caring they were. It was really special.”

Since returning to Bloomington to prep for his senior season on the football field, Sudfeld has been receiving updates on the builds from Sister Rosemary.

He recently saw pictures of the orphanage in Atiak and said it’s starting to look nearly complete. The plan is for a family to move in within the next few months and to eventually start building another.

Sudfeld admitted even he has a hard time putting in perspective just how the trip to Africa changes his outlook. He said before going as a child, he was stuck in his “California bubble,” but that bubble has since been burst.

Not even two months after the trip ended, Sudfeld said he already wants to return to Uganda. He’s eager to fly back and spend time with the children and plan more projects with his family as soon as he can.

“The journey was just incredible,” Sudfeld said. “I’ll be back soon.”



# Hoosiers Join Andrew Luck at Change the Play Camp

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Before he was a high school standout, a Heisman finalist for Stanford or an NFL Pro Bowl quarterback for the Indianapolis Colts, Andrew Luck was a kid who liked to play outside with his sisters.

On Sunday, playing was once again on Luck's agenda.

The Colts quarterback enlisted the help of Indiana athletes to join him in playing with some 500 kids at his second annual Change the Play Camp hosted in Mellencamp Pavilion.

"I remember when I was a kid, a college athlete, that was the epitome of life was to become one of those," Luck said. "They're definitely heroes of mine. They're definitely heroes to all these Hoosier fans down here, and it's great for them to be out here and be accessible and open to all these kids."

About 40 Hoosier athletes, including senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld, joined Luck and experts from the Riley Hospital for Children at IU Health to hold two camps on Sunday.

"I know when I was their age, if I'd have seen a college athlete my eyes would have gotten so big, let alone an NFL athlete," Sudfeld said. "I think it's great for these kids to kind of get these values implanted in them at a young age."

The Indiana athletes joined Luck in promoting a healthier lifestyle through sports in an effort to improve overall health.

One of the camp's major goals is to lower childhood obesity, which has almost tripled since 1980. As it stands, nearly one in every three children is overweight or obese, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"It's awesome just getting our youth ready for a healthier lifestyle and having

great influences like Andrew and other IU athletes," Sudfeld said. "It's really important letting these kids know it's cool to stay fit. It's important for your lifestyle."

Sudfeld and Luck both said they were impressed by the campers enthusiasm.

Each kid had an opportunity to go through various drills on the Indiana practice field, one of which included catching passes thrown from Luck himself.

Luck said there weren't any opportunities for him to participate in camps like Change the Play when he was a kid, but he's trying to change that in Indiana now that he has the chance.

Change the Play encourages kids to remember that it doesn't take an organized sports league to go out and play. Luck recalled times that he and his sisters would invent games themselves and play after school until it got dark to stay active.

Thanks to the Change the Play camp, those children in attendance will have games and activities they can take home, too.

"It's been a great turnout," Luck said. "It's been a lot of fun. I'll tell you, what's also neat is the student-athlete volunteers that come out. I think that's special for these kids to see."





## Sudfeld Enjoys Time Spent at Manning Passing Academy

**BLOOMINGTON, Ind.** - Indiana senior quarterback Nate Sudfeld was back in the classroom last weekend.

Only he wasn't studying in Bloomington. He was at Nicholls State University in Thibodaux, La., where he and 36 other college quarterbacks were invited to learn from Archie, Peyton, Eli and Cooper Manning at the 20th anniversary edition of the Manning Passing Academy.

By the time Sudfeld left for home, he had taken down pages of notes filled with tips and advice from one of football's most celebrated families.

"It was an awesome experience that was everything I hoped it would be," Sudfeld said. "It was a lot of work, but at the same time it was very rewarding to be able to learn from the best and work out with a bunch of talented quarterbacks."

Sudfeld's time at the camp was split between learning hands on from Super Bowl MVPs Peyton and Eli and coaching the roughly 1,200 high school quarterbacks in attendance.

When he was working with the campers, Sudfeld was one of the superstars turning heads. He helped teach the younger players the basics of mastering things like the three-step drop and analyzing which types of throws to make in different scenarios.

Sudfeld said his time as an instructor turned out to be one of the more worthwhile parts of the four-day camp.

"I got to council some of the younger quarterbacks, which was very rewarding to see them so interested and working hard at the position I love," he said. "When I was with the kids, it was always fun."

Sudfeld said the time working with the campers was "a lot of work," but he was rewarded with the chance to par-

ticipate in a workout and closed-door Q&A session with Peyton and Eli, who have combined to win three Super Bowls in the last nine years.

Sudfeld found comfort in learning that many of the same things he's been working on with Indiana head coach Kevin Wilson and offensive coordinator Kevin Johns are the very same things Peyton and Eli emphasized.

"I'd do everything I could to soak up what they were talking about," Sudfeld said. "Going into his 18th year, (Peyton) still watches his mechanics and small things. Even when I wasn't asking questions, just watching him workout, every single rep was like it's his last. It was really impressive to see the best do what they do."

Sudfeld himself was able to impress the Mannings and everyone else in attendance during the Papa John's Quarterback Challenge, where he finished second to Baylor's Seth Russell.

The competition tested both arm strength and accuracy by having the college quarterbacks throw at moving targets placed on golf carts moving 10 yards, and then 20 yards, down the field. Then they each had to hit a final golf cart driving about 50 yards down the field along the sidelines.

Sudfeld admitted the first throw was a bit nerve racking, but once he found his stride he was able to advance to the final round.

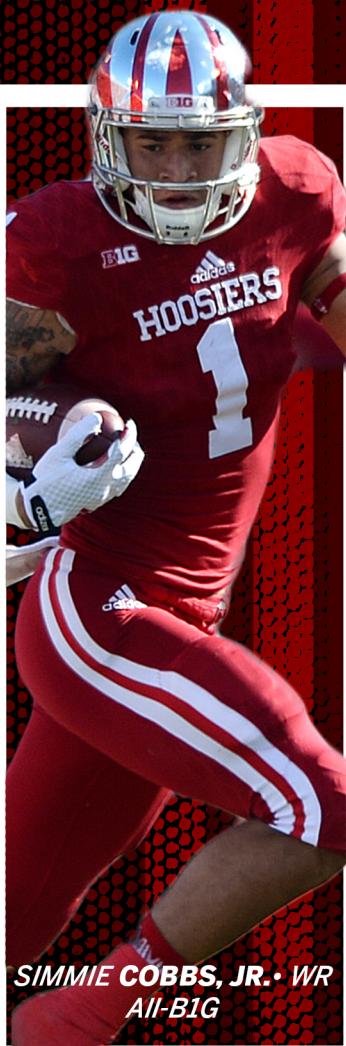
"(The competition) was something I was really looking forward to, stacking myself up against guys who are thought of to be the best or premier quarterbacks in college football," Sudfeld said.

Up next for Sudfeld will be another chance to pick the brain of one of the NFL's elite quarterbacks.

He'll be at Memorial Stadium on Sunday with Indianapolis Colts quarterback Andrew Luck, who will be in Bloomington along with the Change The Play tour, which aims to inspire kids to live healthier lifestyles.
