PLAYER OF THE YEAR

The MAC Hermann Trophy is annually presented to the nation's top collegiate soccer player. Indiana men's soccer has a rich tradition of producing the most excellent players in the country, with seven Hoosiers winning the trophy a combined eight times.

Indiana also boasts three Soccer America Player of the Year winners: Paul DiBernardo (1984), Aleksey Korol (1999) and Grant Lillard (2017).

NOTE: The MAC Player of the Year Award and the Hermann Trophy merged in 2002, allowing for multiple winners between 1986-2002. The Soccer America award was discontinued following the 2019 season.

50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION: In May 2023, Indiana men's soccer celebrated its Tradition of Excellence with a 50th anniversary celebration on the campus of Indiana University. 2023 marked 50 years since the IU Board of Trustees voted to grant men's soccer its varsity status, and, since then, the program has set the standard for NCAA men's soccer.

That weekend, May 19-21, the program welcomed over 325 guests - national champions, hall-of-famers, and those who love the program. Festivities included a golf outing, reception, kickaround, celebration dinner and tours of the athletic facilities.

FAMILY MATTERS: So many families have made Bloomington their second home while joining the greater Indiana men's soccer family, creating a special environment in and around the program.

The Yeagley family has set this pattern — Jerry Yeagley lobbied for men's soccer to become a varsity sport at IU in 1973 and, as head coach, went on to win six national championships. The Yeagley family's involvement in the program now spans three generations, as Todd Yeagley, an IU player under his father from 1991-94, has led the team since 2010 and coached his two sons, Ben and Grant, the latter of which is a current player.

Twenty-one sets of brothers have contributed to the program either as players, coaches or student managers. Four members of the current squad are part of family legacies within the program:

Luka Bezerra: Brother, Victor, was an All-America forward from 2019-2021 before signing an MLS Homegrown Contract with Chicago Fire FC.

Josh Maher: Brothers, Jack (2018-19) and Joey (2020-23) both played at IU. Jack was an All-America defender from 2018-19 and now plays for MLS club Nashville SC. Joey helped IU to two NCAA College Cup finals, graduated in 2023 and was selected in 2024 MLS SuperDraft before playing at Saint Louis University as graduate transfer last season.

Assistant Coach **Tanner Thompson:** Brother, Tommy, was teammate in 2013 and currently plays for MLS club San Jose Earthquakes; Father, Gregg, played between 1978-82 and scored winning goal in Indiana's first national championship.

Todd Yeagley: Father, Jerry, was head coach from 1973-2003, leading program to six national titles. Sons Ben (2019-2022) and Grant (2020-24) both played for program.

#PROIU: Combining Major League Soccer Draft picks (54), MLS Supplemental Draft picks (4) and MLS Homegrown selections (8), the Indiana men's soccer program has seen 66 Hoosiers selected into the top flight of American soccer. Additionally, 19 Hoosiers have earned United States Men's National Team caps.

BIG TEN DOMINANCE: With 35 total conference trophies, Indiana has set the standard for Big Ten men's soccer. Owning a 151-36-32 (.762) record in league play all-time, IU is one of two program's owning at least 100 Big Ten wins, followed only by Penn State's 111.

Indiana has totaled 124 first-team All-Big Ten selections all-time, 59 more than the next-best program (Penn State, 65).

Additionally, Jerry Yeagley and Todd Yeagley are two of the winningest coaches in Big Ten history, by percentage.

EIGHT STARS

1982: After being denied in the NCAA College Cup final three times (1976, 1978 and 1980), the Hoosiers won the program's first NCAA National Championship via a 2-1, eight-overtime marathon victory over Duke.

1999: IU won the treble for a second straight season, capping the century with its fifth national title. After surviving a four-overtime victory over UCLA the day before, Indiana bested Santa Clara, 1-0, in the title match.

1983: Following an overtime loss in the season opener the Hoosiers went undefeated the rest of the way (21-1-4 overall) including a 1-0, overtime win in the national championship match. IU won back-to-back titles for the first time in program history.

2003: Jerry Yeagley retired following the 2003 season after once again leading IU to a championship treble. On a snowy day in Columbus, Ohio, the Hoosiers scored two-first-half goals to bury St. John's, 2-1, in the championship match.

1988: Ken Snow tallied 22 goals and seven assists to lead IU back to the mountaintop in 1988. In a matches played at IU's home, Bill Armstrong Stadium, the Hoosiers won 1-0 decisions versus Portland and Howard to win their third title.

2004: Indiana won back-to-back NCAA Championships for the third time in program history as former Hoosier All-American Mike Freitag led IU in his first season as head coach. After a 1-1 full-time result, the Hoosiers beat UC-Santa Barbara, 3-2, on penalties.

1998: Indiana captured its first of three championship trebles in program history, winning the Big Ten regular season and tournament titles in the same year. IU outscored its two NCAA College Cup opponents 7-1 to win its first title in a decade.

2012: It took Todd Yeagley just three seasons to continue the family legacy and win his first national title as head coach. The No. 16 national seed in the NCAA Tournament, IU beat four national seeds and allowed just one goal in its title run.

TEAM NOTES

OPENING DAY: Indiana men's soccer owns a 30-14-8 (.654) record, all-time, in season openers.

IU will open its season at home for the first time since the 2019 season. The program owns a 32-10-10 (.712) record in home openers.

OUR INDIANA HOME: Passionate IU fans and the lively Hoosier Army student section create a unique atmosphere at Bill Armstrong Stadium that is rarely rivaled. The Hoosiers hold a 373-65-53 (.814) record all-time at "The Bill."

Since 2016, Indiana owns an 84-9-16 record (.844) on its home ground, posting 62 shutouts in those 109 matches.

In 2024, Indiana welcomed 32,183 fans to Armstrong Stadium and ranked No. 3 nationally and No. 1 in the Big Ten for total attendance. Despite a shaky start to the season in general, the Hoosiers won their final six home matches. IU celebrated a second consecutive Big Ten regular season title and an NCAA Tournament golden goal on Jerry Yeagley Field.

BIG TEN PRESEASON POLL: The Big Ten men's soccer coaches selected Indiana to "three-peat" as conference regular season champion in the 2025 season preview.

2024 SEASON RECAP: After a 2-3-4 start to its season, Indiana used a 2-2 draw at No. 4 Ohio State to kickstart a 10-game unbeaten run. The Hoosiers went 8-0-2 in their final 10 matches of the regular season to become Big Ten regular season co-champions for the second-straight season.

Indiana scored 32 goals in that stretch – an average of 3.2 goals per game – and recorded multiple goals in each game. It was IU's longest run of multi-goal performances since 1997.

IU earned a national seed for the ninth time in 10 seasons, earning an NCAA Tournament Second Round start against Akron. The Hoosiers showed resilience again, coming back from a 1-0 deficit to win 2-1 on Jansen Miller's 100th-minute golden goal. In its 10th consecutive trip to the round of 16, IU ran out of steam with a 1-0 loss at No. 3 national seed Denver.

DRAFT DELAY: Two members of Indiana's 2025 roster earned MLS SuperDraft selections last December. Each retained eligibility and elected to return to collegiate soccer.

KEVIN ROBSON: Indiana men's soccer associate head coach **Kevin Robson** is in his 12th season on Todd Yeagley's coaching staff, further extending his successful run as a coach and player at IU.

Since Robson became recruiting coordinator in 2017, the Hoosiers have led the NCAA in College Cup appearances (4), Sweet 16 appearances (8) and NCAA Tournament victories (20).

FIRST ROUND TALENT: Indiana is the only program to produce a top-10 MLS SuperDraft selection each of the last eight years.

800th win. Coming within 50 seasons, it is the quickest ascent to 800 wins in NCAA Division-I men's soccer history – 10 years better than the next-fastest program.

With an 833-203-122 record all-time, Indiana is the winningest program in NCAA DI men's soccer history by percentage (.772).

STREAKING: Indiana owns several notable active streaks:

- The Hoosiers have reached the NCAA Tournament in 38 consecutive seasons (NCAA record).

- IUMS boasts the nation's longest active streak of NCAA Tournament Third Round appearances, making it 10 straight with a second round victory over Akron.

- IU has produced an All-American in each of the last 11 seasons – the nation's longest active streak.

BOUNCING BACK: Indiana has played 182 consecutive regular season matches without back-to-back defeats. The streak spans 4,311 days (11 years, nine months, 20 days) in total dating back to November 1, 2013.

SUMMER AT THE SOCCER TOURNAMENT: For the third-straight year, Hoosier Army, a team made up of Indiana men's soccer alumni, participated in The Soccer Tournament (TST), a seven-versus-seven competition in Cary, North Carolina, for a \$1 million dollar prize.

Hoosier Army was the first-ever college soccer alumni team to play in TST in 2023 and returned for more in 2025.

Current IU associate head coach Kevin Robson served as head coach of the Hoosier Army team. Assistant coaches Christian Lomeli and Tanner Thompson both saw minutes in the tournament.

HEAD COACH TODD YEAGLEY



BIO

After a standout Hoosier playing career, Todd Yeagley was named Indiana head men's soccer coach on December 18, 2009. Since then, no NCAA Division-I men's soccer head coach has more wins (204) or College Cup appearances (5) than Yeagley.

In 2025, Yeagley begins his 16th season at the helm of the Hoosier program. Yeagley is a four-time Big Ten Coach of the Year, has led the region staff of the year three times and in 2012 was named the Soccer America Coach of the Year.

Yeagley's program has produced an All-American in each of the last 11 seasons – the nation's longest active streak – as well as 14 of his 15 seasons as IU head coach. During the 11-year run, 13 different Hoosiers have combined for 19 All-America honors.

Additionally, IU also owns the nation's longest active streak of top 10 MLS SuperDraft selections, developing one in each of the last eight seasons. Thirty Hoosiers have heard their names called in the MLS SuperDraft during Yeagley's tenure, including 13 in the first round.

Indiana has reached the NCAA Tournament Round of 16 in 10 consecutive seasons and in 13 of 15 seasons under Yeagley.

2024 SEASON RECAP

An undefeated October and 5-0-0 end to conference play helped Yeagley and the Hoosiers capture their second consecutive Big Ten regular season championship, sharing the title with Ohio State. IU earned the No. 14 national seed and returned to the NCAA Tournament Round of 16 for the 10th consecutive season after a 2-1 comeback victory over Akron at Armstrong Stadium.

The Hoosiers would fall in their Sweet 16 road match to No. 3 national seed Denver, who would eventually make the NCAA College Cup.

Senior forward Samuel Sarver repeated as a United Soccer Coaches third-team All-American, while junior defender Quinton Elliot developed into a second-team All-America performer during his first season in Bloomington. Four Hoosiers earned first-team All-Big Ten honors: Elliot and Sarver as well as seniors Tommy Mihalic and Patrick McDonald. Mihalic was also the Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year as the conference's joint leading scorer with 10 goals.

Senior defender Jansen Miller kept IU's top 10 draft selection streak alive as Sporting KC's pick at No. 8 overall. Sarver (FC Dallas) and sophomore forward Collins Oduro (Orlando City SC) each heard their names called in the second round.
