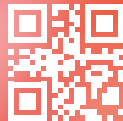

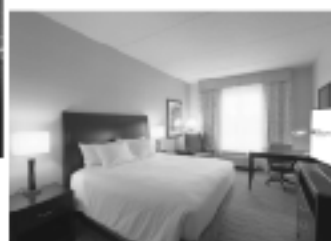

## IUP HEAD COACH PAUL TORTORELLA



Paul Tortorella enters his eighth season at the helm of the Crimson Hawks in 2025 and has put together the best start by any head coach in program history.

The 2025 season marks the 31st overall season at IUP for Tortorella. He is 61-19 at IUP since taking over as head coach in 2017, winning seven or more games in a season six times.

The Crimson Hawks secured a 14th consecutive winning season in 2024 with a 7-3 overall record.

Over the last few seasons, IUP has been well represented in the professional ranks. In 2024, the Crimson Hawks had a pair of former players on NFL rosters - Irvin Charles (Jets) and Dondrea Tillman (Broncos).

The 2022 PSAC West Coach of the Year, Tortorella helped the Crimson Hawks to a sterling 10-2 record that included a PSAC Championship and a bye in the opening round of the 2022 NCAA DII Football Playoffs.

Tortorella reached 30 wins faster than any other coach in IUP history, hitting the mark in just 35 games during the 2019 season. College Football Hall of Famer and legendary IUP head coach Frank Cignetti (1985-2005) took 38 games to reach his first 30 victories back in the mid '80s.

Through his first six seasons, Tortorella posted a 55-14 (.797) overall record with three NCAA playoff berths; regional, two PSAC and two division titles; and a 10-5 record against ranked opponents. The .797 win percentage is the fifth-best mark of any Division III team and best of any PSAC program - during that time.

He's earned Division II, Super Region One, and two PSAC West Coach of the Year honors.

Tortorella also had the Crimson Hawks ranked in the top-25 in 50 of the possible 64 national polls during his first five seasons, including a three-week run at No. 1 in the media poll during the 2017 season.

IUP began the 2022 season with seven consecutive victories, notching a 10-2 mark overall. The Hawks won the PSAC Western division with key victories over rival Slippery Rock and Cal U throughout the season, advancing to the "State Game."

The Crimson Hawks held off Shepherd for a 24-21 victory at rainy Miller Stadium on November 12, 2022. The Crimson Hawks recorded two shutout victories in 2022, eventually earning the top seed and a bye in the 2022 NCAA DII Super Region One Playoffs. IUP opened its playoff run with a 19-13 home victory against Ashland on November 26, 2022 at Miller Stadium.

Tortorella got his coaching start on the prep level in 1985, serving as linebackers coach at Mount Lebanon High School. He then began a nine-year stint as an assistant coach at a pair of Division I universities, including six at Maryland and three at Akron.

During his career, Tortorella has coached two players who went on to successful NFL careers. Defensive back Victor Green (Akron) played with the New York Jets from 1993-2001, the New England Patriots in 2002 and the New Orleans Saints in 2003 while tight end Frank Wycheck (Maryland) retired after the 2003 season following an 11-year pro career which saw him catch 505 passes.

Tortorella is a 1985 graduate of Slippery Rock with a bachelor's degree in health and physical education. He and his wife, Michele, are the parents of Luke, Annalise, Zachary and Michael.

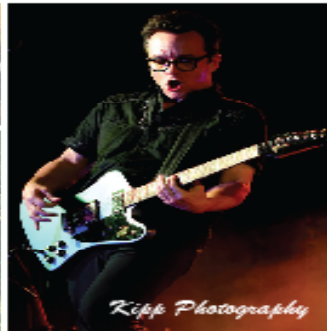

IUP Athletics thanks the following individuals and organizations who have invested in the future of IUP's student-athletes by creating an endowment.

The Regis' Peck' McKnight Memorial Scholarship is named in honor of the legendary IUP basketball coach, McKnight coached the sport for 17 years, compiling a record of 201-122. His best season was 1957-58 when his Indians were 25-3, won the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference title and advanced to the NAIA National tournament in Kansas City, McKnight also coached the football team for two years. As a student-athlete, he earned 14 varsity letters while playing four sports at IUP. The McKnight Scholarship is awarded to a member of the men's basketball team.

Louis J. Nocco, a long-time resident of Homer City, was a lifelong sports fan. His interest centered on football, basketball, golf, and track and field. He played on Indiana High School's 1938 undefeated football team, and during the 1940s he was active in the Indiana County Umpires League. A regular at IUP sporting events his entire life, he passed away in 1987. The Louis J. Nocco Memorial Scholarship supports the IUP football team.

Dr. Willis E. Pratt served as university president from 1948 through 1968, guiding it from a state teachers college of 1,500 students to a university with 9,600 students. Not only did IUP grow in numbers during that period, but it developed the diverse academic program that led to university status in 1965. Dr. Pratt was also a long-time director of the S&T Bank. Dr. Pratt passed away in January 1992 at the age of 85. S&T Bank, along with alumni, colleagues, and friends, established the Willis E. Pratt Football Scholarship to honor his distinguished career and support of athletics at IUP.

After 11 years as a teacher and coach in the Purchase Line School District, Gerald Stossel, a 1972 IUP graduate, changed careers to become a partner in GARD Mining of Barnesboro. He passed away in 1987 and is survived by his wife Darlene and daughter Kelly. In announcing the establishment of the Gerald Stossel Memorial Football Scholarship in honor of her husband Darlene Stossel said, "Football was one of the loves of his life."

S.W. Jack, a highly successful businessman, was a generous benefactor of the university and many other community organizations and causes. He had been a member of the IUP Council of Trustees and chaired a capital campaign that raised more than \$4 million for campus projects. He made possible the construction of a new exercise addition to the Indiana Regional Medical Center, a head quarters building for Citizens Ambulance and the restoration of IUP's John Sutton Hall. He was also responsible for the creation of a new sports complex and fine arts building at the Kiski School. He has been sadly missed since his death in 1990. The S.W. Jack Memorial Athletic Scholarship supports student-athletes participating on the IUP football team.

Sam Smith made many contributions to the IUP football program. As the head coach from 1949 to 1961, he left an indelible impression on everyone with whom he came in contact. Among his players was former IUP head coach Frank Gignetti. In addition to serving as coach, Smith was athletic director, intramural director, baseball coach, and a member of the physical education faculty. He retired in 1972 and passed away in 1982. The Sam Smith Memorial Football Scholarship provides financial assistance to talented and deserving student-athletes.

Michael Gendich, a 1935 graduate, was named a member of IUP's pre-1960 all-time football team. After teaching and coaching for five years at Moon High School in Pittsburgh, he moved to Detroit to become a tool designer/engineer and, ultimately, a highly successful industrialist. President and general manager of Manor Industries, he received the distinguished IUP Alumni Citation in 1959 and was a 1997 IUP Athletic Hall of Fame inductee. Gendich served as director of Detroit's Economic Development Corp., to promote new industry in the city and contributed to that area's public library system, zoos, museums, churches, Boys Club activities and sports leagues. Mr. Gendich passed away in May 1999. The Michael Gendich Athletic Scholarship supports IUP football.

Thomas W. Zuch has spent over 40 years in the health care profession. After graduating from the University of Pennsylvania, he was the director of physical therapy at Indiana Hospital from 1969-75 while also serving as an athletic trainer at IUP in 1979. Zuch founded the Keystone Rehabilitation Systems. He grew KRSTo over 100 outpatient centers in Pennsylvania and Ohio, and today KRST is a subsidiary of Physiotherapy Associates Inc., the nation's second-largest provider of outpatient physical therapy services. In addition to his primary business of commercial real estate development, Zuch is a consultant to Physiotherapy Associates. Zuch was honored as the Health Care Entrepreneur of the Year in western Pennsylvania in 1992, Civic Leader of the Year in Indiana County in 1996 and received the IUP Athletic Hall of Fame honor award in 2002. He served as president of the Foundation for IUP in 1997, and during the same time he co-chaired an IUP capital campaign that raised \$25 million. Zuch and his wife, Alice, reside in Indiana. They have four children: Tom, Jonathan, Stephanie, and Jennifer. Jennifer and her husband, Brent Bodner, have four children: John, Hanna, Hailey, and Abby. He has established the Tom and Alice Zuch Men's Basketball Scholarship to support IUP Athletics.

The Ward C. and Sally B. Johnson Memorial Scholarship was established by David L. Johnson, a 1953 IUP graduate and a former Council of Trustees member who passed away in February 2009, in honor of his parents. Both Mr. and Mrs. Johnson had lifelong interests in athletics. Mrs. Johnson, who passed away in 1974, was a 1921 graduate of the Indiana Normal School and a former trustee of Indiana State Teachers College. Johnson Hall on the IUP campus is named in her honor. Ward Johnson, who passed away in 1976, was a graduate of Illinois State University, where he excelled as a basketball player. In addition to teaching career at Indiana High School, he served for many years as a football and basketball official on both the high school and college levels.

The Cecil and Ann Spadafora Scholarship benefits players on the IUP football team. The Spadafora's founded Colonial Motor Martin in 1946 as a Cadillac and Oldsmobile franchise. Today, it is also the Indiana dealership for Pontiac, GM Truck, Mazda, Mitsubishi, and Toyota. Since 1972, Cecil Spadafora, a 1935 Penn State graduate, concentrated his efforts on building Colonial Land, a family corporation which operated Wyoming Hall (a private residence hall) and Meadow Lane Golf Course. Mr. Spadafora passed away in April 2006 and Mrs. Spadafora passed away in 2013. Also supporting this scholarship are their children, Chuck, W.H., Cecil Jr., and Jo-Una.

Jack Dee Ferguson son of Marion Center has established the Nancy L. Ferguson Memorial Scholarship in honor of his late wife, an oncology nursing specialist who worked with the Veterans Administration Medical Center. Mr. Ferguson attended IUP in the late 1950s and was a member of the football and wrestling teams. A native of Blairsville, he retired from Indiana upon his retirement. This scholarship provides financial assistance to a talented student-athlete associated with the football team and playing in a lineman position.

Saul and Louise Waxler were community figures and business owners well known to generations of IUP students. The scholarship was first initiated in Mr. Waxler's memory by Mrs. Waxler, who with her husband had owned and operated Waxler's Men's Store until 1984. Since Mrs. Waxler's death in 1988, the scholarship was renamed the Saul and Louise Waxler Memorial Football Scholarship to honor them both.

Ascholarship honoring the late Owen J. and Virginia Dougherty is a fitting tribute. Owen passed away in 1991 after having served IUP as a member of the faculty since 1956. He was the baseball coach from 1963 through 1969 and again in 1990 and head football coach from 1979 until 1981. Dougherty was also the university's director of housing and food service, an assistant dean of admissions and athletic department staffer for fundraising and game management. Virginia passed away in 1987. The Owen J. and Virginia Dougherty Memorial Scholarship, initiated by Owen Dougherty Jr., supports IUP baseball.

Ruth Podbielski was a leader in IUP Athletic administration from 1955 until she retired in 1987. In her tenure, women's basketball, fencing, tennis, volleyball, field

hockey, gymnastics, swimming, track and field and cross country all attained varsity status. Affectionately known as "Pod" by many, she passed away in April of 2017. In 1987, the Ruth Podbielski Women's Athletic Scholarship was established in honor of her service to the university. The endowment provides scholarship support to student athletes in a variety of sports.

The Larry R. Panaia Endowed Scholarship for Football was established in May 1996 by friends and colleagues in honor of Mr. Panaia's tenure as president of the Foundation for UP Board of Directors. Larry, a 1965 and 1971 graduate of IUP with a bachelor's degree in education and master's in counseling services, played football during his undergraduate years. He also served as an assistant coach for the IUP team for 13 seasons. He retired as regional sales manager for QSP, Inc., a subsidiary of the Reader's Digest Association. His wife, Carole, is a 1988 graduate of IUP. Panaia passed away in January 2008.

Lynn and Nancy Doverspike established the Lynn and Nancy Doverspike Scholarship for Men's Basketball in the spring of 1992. Lynn is the president of the Victory Development Company. Nancy is a 1977 IUP graduate and served as a member of the Foundation for IUP Board of Directors.

The Raymond P. Phillips Memorial Scholarship provides support to talented student-athletes on the IUP football team. Mr. Phillips, a 1948 graduate of Indiana State Teachers College, played guard on the STC football team. He was also an active member of the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. After teaching math and science, Mr. Phillips became an investment broker, travel agency owner and property developer in California. This scholarship is dedicated in his memory by his loving wife, Meriam, and his children.

Mr. and Mrs. Paul E. Spears graduated from IUP in 1949 and 1948, respectively, and have maintained a close affiliation with their alma mater. In 1995, they established the Paul E. and Josephine F. Spears Scholarship for Football to provide scholarship award to talented and deserving student-athletes at IUP. Mr. Spears was president of Hanover Shoe Farms, Inc., in Hanover. He received the IUP Distinguished Alumni Award in 1980 and was inducted into the IUP Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997. Paul passed away in August of 2012.

Indiananative Bob McQuaide Sr. was the first Indiana High School football player to be recognized as a member of the all-state football team in 1951. He earned a scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh, and his athletic ability enabled him to play in the East-West Shrine Game, the only all-star game in existence for college athletes at that time. Bob enjoyed the game of football all his life, playing on the Inter-Service Championship League Team while on active duty during the Korean War and with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. After his playing days were over, Bob turned to coaching for several high school teams in western Pennsylvania. In 1969 Bob returned to Indiana to operate a family restaurant, The Coney. He also coached football at IUP for several years under Bill Neal. Bob passed away on April 2, 1992. Donna McCrady McQuaide was head cheerleader, yearbook editor, and in the National Honor Society. She also served in the USAF. She was a business owner in Downtown Indiana for over 50 years. She is remembered as a devoted mother, grandmother, and a favorite aunt to all. To recognize Bob's love of football and to provide young student-athletes with the opportunity to pursue education while continuing to play ball, family and friends established the Robert C. McQuaide Sr. and Donna McCrady McQuaide Scholarship.

Mr. and Mrs. C. Frederick Bowser, owners of the C. Frederick Bowser Funeral Home, Inc. in Homer City and the Bowser Monument Company and Bowser-Ondrizek Funeral Home in Nanty Glo, established the C. Frederick and Joyce M. Bowser Athletic Endowment to support men's and women's basketball, football, and tennis. As alumni of IUP and local business owners, the Bowsers have supported IUP athletics throughout their years, participating in the Corporate Crimson Club Scholarship program and the IUP President's Council.

In 1985 the Sons of Italy Recreative Club created an endowment fund to award academic scholarship to students who further their education at IUP. In 1998 Lodge 1279 of that organization established the Indiana Sons of Italy Recreative Club, Inc. Athletic Endowment Fund for IUP athletes who participate in baseball, men's and women's basketball, softball, football, or golf. The scholarship benefits deserving student-athletes who excel in both their athletic and academic pursuits.

Edwin H. Long attended Indiana Normal School and attained nine letters for his achievements in football, baseball, and track. He was a star running back on the football team and was a member of the 1907-mile relay champions of Pennsylvania. His wife, Dorothy Marcy Long, joined the faculty of Indiana State Teachers College in 1925. The Edwin H. and Dorothy M. Long Memorial Scholarship for Football was established by their son, Edwin M. Long, who passed away in July 2015 and his late wife Linda, who passed away in May 2009.

The Philip and Rose Condino Memorial Scholarship has been established by Dr. Frank L. Condino, former director of intercollegiate athletics at IUP, and his wife, Marty, as a lasting tribute to his late parents. The scholarship provides financial assistance to talented and deserving student-athletes participating in the IUP football program.

The William F. and Louise R. Nee Scholarship was established to provide scholarship support to talented and deserving student-athletes participating in the women's athletic program. Residents of New Kensington, Mr. and Mrs. Nee are the parents of Frances A. Nee, former associated director of intercollegiate athletics at IUP. Mr. Nee, a respected attorney, passed away in March 2001.

The S&T Bank Athletic Scholarship was established to assist IUP students who reside within the S&T market area and participate in athletics. From community to community, and branch to branch, S&T continues to demonstrate our dedication to providing the best financial products and services to our customers, right where they live and work. And we share in their responsibility for a better community in the way we provide loans to municipalities and nonprofit organizations, donations to qualified charities and assistance to local housing authorities in providing affordable housing for low-income families and senior citizens. Leonard B. DeFabo was a skilled educator and teacher, a talented musician and a dedicated community member who enjoyed life to the fullest. He joined the faculty at IUP in 1960. During his tenure, he served as the founding director of the UPPERS, a campus musical performance group that enjoyed tremendous success and toured the country in the 1970s. He also organized and staged IUP's annual Homecoming parade for several years in the 1960s, and he was among the academic advisors and mentors for the IUP intercollegiate athletic department. He retired from IUP in 1991 and was awarded status as professor emeritus in educational psychology. Upon his untimely death in 2002, his wife, Gloria, and their children, Dr. Francis DeFabo, Andrew DeFabo, and Gloria DeFabo McElwain, established the Leonard B. DeFabo Memorial Scholarship to benefit participating members of varsity sports at IUP who are enrolled as education majors and preparing for student-teaching responsibilities.

The children of Chuck and Joann Klausung established the Chuck and Joann Klausung Scholarship for Football as a holiday gift for their parents in December 2002. This scholarship honors Coach Klausung's dedication to the sport of football and his wife Joann's dedication as the team's head cheerleader and as Klausung's head assistant coach over the years. Mrs. Klausung passed away in July 2011. Coach Klausung has worked with thousands of young athletes throughout his 50-plus years of coaching and coaching around the world. Coach Klausung has been recognized nationally and internationally with his selection to the College Football Hall of Fame; for his undefeated record as coach at Braddock High School; for taking IUP to the Boardwalk Bowl in 1968; for winning the Lambert Trophy in 1979; for being named ABC TV's "Coach of the Year" in 1979 and 1983; and for introducing the finer points of football and sportsmanship to generations of student-athletes.

The Frank Scerbo Memorial Scerbo Pharmacy Athletic Scholarship honors the long-standing relationship between the Scerbo family of Clymer and Indiana County athletics. The children of the late Frank and Mary Jane Scerbo, Lou, Mary Beth (Scerbo) Marcoline and Luci (Scerbo) Holuta, have followed their parents' example of community goodwill. Lou, a 1983 graduate of IUP, was a kicker on the football team for three seasons from 1979-81 and is now a registered pharmacist. Mary Beth, also a pharmacist, operates Scerbo Pharmacy along with Luci, a 1989 graduate of IUP with a degree in accounting. The scholarship will provide financial assistance to talented and deserving graduates from Penns Manor, Purchase Line, or Marion Center high schools who are members of the IUP football team with secondary preference given to the team's placekicker.

Jack Pidgeon, the retired headmaster of The Kiski School in Saltsburg, established the John A. Pidgeon Scholarship for Swimming, Agifted student and athlete as a youth. Jack excelled at several sports, including swimming, baseball, and football, and earned All-American honors several times during his years at Phillips Andover Academy. As a student at Bowdoin College, he earned a spot on the 1948 United States Olympic swimming team despite back and leg injuries suffered while serving in the U.S. Navy during World War II. After his 45-year tenure at Kiski, Jack began to serve as a volunteer coach with the IUP swimming team. He became so impressed with the character and discipline of the student-athletes that he decided to establish a scholarship fund to support the academic and athletic efforts of these young men and women. Jack passed away in May 2008.

Timothy J. Singel was a junior safety, science major and a starting safety on the IUP football team at the time of his unexpected death in 2001. To honor the memory of this exceptional young man and his love for sports, family, friends, coaches, and classmates established the Timothy J. Singel Memorial Scholarship for Football to provide a living legacy for his brief and his spirit to the team. During his high school years at Laurel Valley High School in New Florence, Tim participated in a variety of extracurricular activities. He was a member of the football and basketball teams, served on the student council and was a member of Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD). Well-liked by everyone, he was a school leader throughout the community. Tim served as an example to his fellow students and neighbors. He was elected Homecoming King of Laurel Valley in his senior year—1998-99. Tim enjoyed competitive athletics as well as working out and running for personal fitness. Close to his family and friends, he also absolutely loved his dog, Alex.

James Sledzik and Robert Sledzik joined with the IUP Department of Intercollegiate Athletics to establish the Herman L. Sledzik Scholarship for Men's Basketball in honor of their father and the many athletes, coaches, and staff members who were an integral part of his life throughout his tenure at IUP. A native of Indiana County, Herm excelled in athletics during his days in the Elders Ridge School District. Upon his graduation, he was the first student-athlete to receive a full scholarship in men's basketball at Penn State. After serving as team captain during his senior year at Penn State, he was a draft pick of the Baltimore Colts in the 1953 National Basketball Association draft. In addition, he was drafted by the United States Army. Herm began his career at IUP in 1963 as head coach of the men's basketball team. He achieved a record of 103 wins and 53 losses in six seasons. His 1968-69 team won 21 consecutive games, losing the 22nd in overtime, and led the nation with a winning margin of 24.1 points per game. Herm was named District 18 and Area 8 Coach of the Year in 1967-68 and 1968-69. During his tenure at IUP, Herm served as coach and assistant director and assistant director of intercollegiate athletics. He also served as acting dean of the College of Health Services for a year. He remained actively involved as an unofficial advisor to his colleagues in athletics at IUP. Herm served as president of the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, president of the NIAA District 18 and served on the ECACC Council and numerous NCAA committees. He is a member of the board of directors of the IUP Athletic Hall of Fame and was inducted as a member during its inaugural year in 1996.

Frank Cignetti retired as head coach at IUP following the 2005 season as one of the most successful coaches in Division III history. During his tenure leading the IUP program, the team won 182 games, made 13 playoff appearances, reached the semifinals six times, and played in the 1990 and 1993 national championship game. Including 17 wins as head coach at West Virginia University from 1976-79, Cignetti was on the sidelines for 199 victories in his career. That total made him the third winningest coach in Division III football at the time of his retirement. Cignetti began his relationship with IUP in 1956 as a student and was an All-American end from 1957-59. He earned his bachelor's degree in education in 1960 and a master's in education in 1965. Cignetti returned to his alma mater in 1982 as athletic director before assuming the head coaching duties four years later. For all his accomplishments and the pride he brought to IUP, Alumni Don Gill '62, Bob Cleminson '59 and George Glamer '56 established the Frank Cignetti Football Endowment to add deserving student-athletes who are members of the IUP Football team.

Mr. Joseph A. Massaro, Jr., founder of Massaro Corporation, a Pittsburgh-based construction company offering services in construction management, general contracting, disaster response and real estate, has established the Joseph Massaro, Jr. Quarterback Scholarship. As a student-athlete at Pittsburgh Central Catholic, Joe led the Vikings football team as quarterback in 1952. He continued to play at Saint Francis College, and today is an advocate of students and college athletics. Joe comes from a close family where they share a common love for the game. His brother, Gene, was the starting right guard at the University of Louisville, and his brother, Gerard, was a running back for Thiel College. Joe and his wife, Carol, reside in Pittsburgh and are proud to support IUP student-athletes through this scholarship.

Bill Hoffman led the Indiana Indians on the field as their quarterback during the late 1950s. A 1960 graduate, Mr. Hoffman enjoyed a successful career in business, retiring as president of Coca Cola in France. In recognition of the knowledge, skills, and friendships acquired at his alma mater, he has established the William J. Hoffman Scholarship for Football to provide scholarships up to total ten and deserving student-athletes playing the quarterback position on the IUP football team. Mr. Hoffman and his wife, Marti, live in Sarasota, Fla. In 2007, Mr. Hoffman also established the William J. Hoffman Scholarship for Baseball, which is given to an outstanding student-athlete participating on the baseball team.

Jack H. Reefe, Jr. '69 has established the Jack H. and Dorothy A. Reefe Memorial Endowment for Football in memory of his parents to benefit the football program. A native of western Pennsylvania, Jack Reefe Sr. played football at Apollo High School, where he graduated in 1941. He began his career as a fireman and engineer that summer with the Pennsylvania Railroad. Drafted into the Army during World War II, part of his service took place in the Southwest on the Santa Fe soil-burning steam locomotives which were an important component in the transport of troops, munitions, and supplies to the Pacific theater of conflict in time prior to the existence of the Interstate Highway System. He returned to Pittsburgh after the war and worked for the Pennsylvania, Penn Central, and Conrail until he retired in 1982. Dorothy came from Delaware County and received her education at Haverford Township High School and Drexel University. She enlisted in the U.S. Navy WAVES during the Second World War and served in the use and maintenance of military codes and security. She worked for private firms as well as the U.S. Bureau of Mines and the Customs Service in Pittsburgh. Two of their three sons—Jack Jr. and Bill—are graduates of IUP while Tom is a Pittalumnus. Sadly, Jack, Jr. passed away in the fall of 2015.

Graduating from IUP in 1967, Barry "Buck" Lippencott played football from 1963 to 1966. His education at IUP provided him a solid background for his future endeavors. Entering the U.S. Army through the ROTC program at IUP, he served 22 years on active duty. Barry paid for his education at IUP by working in construction in and around the coal mines of southwestern and central Pennsylvania. "Buck" and his brother Bob, a California University of Pennsylvania graduate, wanted to pay tribute to all the coal miners and the coal industry in southwestern and central Pennsylvania for their hard work and contributions to the local communities. The Lippencott brothers established the annual "Coal Bowl" game in 2009 between IUP and Cal. As part of the "Coal Bowl," Barry and his wife Pattie (68) established the Barry L. "Buck" Lippencott Coal Bowl Football Scholarship to recognize an IUP football player.

The Jack Crossan Memorial Scholarship, established by good friends Gene Abplanalp, Bill Dawson, Bill Eckert, George Glamer, and George Wise, honors the third leading scorer in IUP men's basketball history, scoring 1,564 points. He played for coach Peck McKnight from 1952 to 1956. He passed away in 1974.

T.W. Phillips Gas & Oil Company, now named Peoples, TWP headquarters in Butler, established the T.W. Phillips Gas and Oil Co. Scholarship in recognition of the importance of academic excellence and the positive aspects associated with participation in intercollegiate athletics to students' educational success. This scholarship benefits student-athletes from the company's service area in western Pennsylvania.

In 2010, a group of former players established the Coach Chuck Mills Scholarship for Football in honor of their head coach who was inducted into IUP's Athletic Hall of Fame. Coach Mills was the head coach at IUP for only two seasons, but the impact he had on the university's football program continues to this day. He won twelve games against only three losses and two ties, and in 1963 the Indians earned their first national ranking.

The Richard T. and Mary Stella Wolfe Athletic Scholarship was established by their family to honor and recognize Dick and Mary Stella's dedication to IUP and its students. After his discharge from the United States Marine Corps, Dick attended and graduated from IUP in 1961 with a degree from the department of geography and regional planning. He served as assistant business manager, director of alumni relations, and then assistant to the vice president for institutional advancement at his alma mater. Mary Stella worked closely with generations of students, serving as the secretary for the dean of women and in the office of student activities until her retirement. They attended nearly every university event; often in the company of their children—all graduates of IUP: their children are Sally '71, Allan '77 and Richard, Jr. '91. Jean and James O. Toole, sister and brother-in-law of the Wolfes, joined the children to establish the scholarship. James, who passed away October 2009, was a 1941 graduate with a degree in business education and received his law degree at Georgetown University. He served as an assistant postmaster

general during President Lyndon Johnson's administration.

The Bob and Kathy Prokay Boardwalk Bowl Scholarship was established by Kathleen Prokay as a lasting tribute to her late husband. It is said that the measure of a man's life is not how long he lives but how fully. Few have lived their life more fully than Bob Prokay. Unfortunately, his days were all too few, as he passed away at the age of 50 following a two-year battle with brain cancer. Many at IUP recall Prokay as the 1968 Boardwalk Bowl and 1969 football team captain who became one of Coach Chuck Klausinger's best offensive linemen after never having played football in high school. He was selected to the 1969 Associated Press All-Pennsylvania team, one that included both Division I and II players, was named to the Pittsburgh Press All-district team and was voted to IUP's all-sixties football team. Married in 1971 to the former Kathleen Darks, they are the parents of three children – Kecia Newman, Ryan, and Kara.

The Martha Crooks Douds Scholarship, established in 1987 by Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Douds from Plumville, provides aid to deserving and talented student-athletes competing in football and basketball at IUP. Mr. and Mrs. Douds operated the successful furnishing and decorator showroom, Douds of Plumville, Inc.

Ed Bratton, owner of the Giant Eagle grocery store in Indiana, established the Edward Bratton-George Hathaway Scholarship Endowment to support outstanding and talented student-athletes enrolled at IUP and competing in the football and baseball programs. Mr. Bratton, who passed away in 2013, was a great friend to the university and to the community. The lives he touched and continues to touch are a testament to his passion and commitment to making Indiana and IUP a better place.

Generations of student-athletes at IUP have been challenged, inspired, and mentored by Robert "Doc" Raemore during their years with the track and field and cross-country programs. Coach Raemore died suddenly in February of 2013. To recognize his dedication to the sport and his student-athletes, Coach Ed Fry and several of Doc's former athletes initiated the Doc Raemore Track and Field Endowment. As Coach Fry stated, "It's hard letting go of a friend, but knowing that Doc's name will always be part of IUP track and field lessens the sorrow."

The Edward E. and Cecelia A. Mackey Scholarship was established in 1994 to provide scholarship support to students enrolled in the Eberly College of Business and Informational Technology who participate in the IUP football program. Mr. Mackey, senior vice president of Merrill Lynch, and his wife have been long-time benefactors of IUP, contributing financial gifts as well as serving in volunteer leadership roles with the Foundation for IUP Board of Directors.

The Tom and Jamie Ellis Scholarship for Football was established in memory of Tom, who died in 2012. Before their marriage, Tom wanted to take Jamie on a date and asked if she would like to go to an IUP football game; little did he know what would follow. They became avid fans of the program, going to all games home and away, even taking a drum when the band couldn't make the trip. Tom also convinced Jamie to continue her education. Both are alumni of IUP.

Douglas R. Niesen, a 1987 graduate of IUP, joined with his parents, Raymond and JoAnn Niesen, to establish the Niesen Family Athletic Scholarship in August 2001. Doug played on the IUP football team during his undergraduate years at IUP. He currently resides in Venetia. Raymond passed away in 2013.

The Richard "Moe" Smith Endowed Scholarship for Football was established by team mates and friends in 1994 after his untimely passing. "Moe," who played football at IUP in the 1960s and later coached at his alma mater, is remembered for his love of the game and the sportsmanship he displayed as a player and coach.

Nell Jack, a generous benefactor of IUP, has been an enthusiastic advocate for women's athletics. In recognition of her commitment and dedication as well as her personal athletic prowess, an annual golf tournament is raised to help fund for women's athletics. It has been named in her honor. Proceeds from the Nell Jack Golf Classic fund the Nell G. Jack and Christine J. Toretti Scholarship for Women's Athletics.

The Tom Norman Soccer Fund was established in memory of Tom Norman following his untimely death in a car accident in the summer following his freshman year. Tom was an integral member of the men's soccer team and scored a number of key goals as a freshman. Head Coach Vince Celtnieks established this fund in memory of Tom to assist the soccer program with scholarship funds and program support.

The Spadafora family established the Howard Jacoby Memorial Scholarship for Golf in tribute to long-time friend, Howard Jacoby, who passed away in 1996. Mr. Jacoby was a avid golfer and helped design the Meadow Lane golf course, owned and operated by the Spadafora family. Mr. Jacoby served as the golf pro at the course by its opening until his retirement in 1985.

YouTube cofounder Chad Hurley '99 established an endowment in 2012 to provide scholarship support to the men's cross-country team. Chad was a member of the cross-country team under Coach Ed Fry before he earned his BFA degree. The Chad Hurley Endowed Scholarship Fund for Men's Cross Country will benefit the program.

The Bill and Cass Neal Football Scholarship was established in 2013 to honor and recognize Coach Neal and Cass for their tremendous contributions to IUP Football, the IUP Health and Physical Education Department, and the Indiana community. Bill was IUP's head coach from 1970 to 1978 and was an Associate Professor in the Health and Physical Education Department for 26 years. He also played a active role in the Indiana community by serving as the director of Camp Orenda, a residential summer camp for children and adults with disabilities. Spearheaded by Jim Mill, Rich Hornfeck, and Jim Haslett, as well as many former players, the scholarship will be awarded to an IUP football player who participates in community service activities beyond what is expected.

The IUP Student Cooperative Association has been a long time supporter of IUP Athletics. During the Campaign for IUP, the Co-op established the Student Co-Op Women's Athletic Scholarship to provide scholarship support to benefit women's athletics at the university. Two endowed scholarship funds have also been established to support student-athletes participating in men's and women's varsity sports at IUP through the IUP Crimson Commons Brick Program. Alumni, coaches, and other individuals who have been directly associated with varsity athletic program at the university are eligible to purchase a brick in the Crimson Commons Courtyard adjacent to Memorial Field House. The courtyard was dedicated in September 2000.

Barry D. Gasdek '64 lettered in football, wrestling, and track every season he participated. He entered military service through the ROTC program and spent several tours in Vietnam and Korea. He is recognized in the IUP Sports Hall of Fame and was the inaugural Inductee for Excellence in the IUP ROTC Hall of Fame in 2013. In recognition of the ROTC program, IUP Athletics, and the football program, Barry has established the following scholarships: Captain Barry D. Gasdek Scholarship, Frank C. and Eleanor M. Gasdek Scholarship for Football (in honor of his parents), and the Walter F. and Barry D. Gasdek Sports and ROTC Hall of Fame Scholarship for Football.

Family and friends have established the Cecil C. Spadafora IUP Golf Invitational Endowed Fund to recognize the lifelong passion Mr. Spadafora demonstrated for the game of golf and his long time support of IUP Athletics. The fund supports the annual golf tournaments sponsored by members of the Indiana Country Club for college and university teams.

Dr. Debra Joseph Bell '77, M'85, her husband, Kermit '80, Bill Joseph '79, his wife, Deb, and their families have established the William and Jean Joseph Family Scholarship. William and Jean have a lifelong dedication to family and education, serve as examples of generosity and humility, and believe in service to country and community. The endowment will provide scholarship support to the football program, in which William participated in the 1940s and 50s, and the music department, from which Jean graduated in 1952.

Friends, teammates, and the brothers of Sigma Phi Epsilon have joined together to establish the John William "Whitey" Schrock Football Scholarship to recognize his passion for athletics and life. Whitey was an outstanding athlete, serving as a member of the varsity wrestling team and anchoring the Indiana football team at center. After his graduation from IUP in 1965 with a degree in mathematics education, Whitey became a teacher and football coach, ultimately serving as the wrestling coach at Dickinson College. An unfortunate and untimely accident left Whitey with devastating injuries; however, the same discipline and determination that served him so well as a nation's athlete and coach enabled him to recuperate after several difficult years of rehabilitation. John R. Kennedy '67 and Ron Peters '65, Sig Ep brothers of Whitey, initiated the scholarship fund at their alma mater to serve as an example for future generations of students-athletes.

The Eleanor Van Halanger Memorial Football Scholarship has been established by Josephine Paganini in memory of her sister, Eleanor Van Halanger, who passed away in 2005. Eleanor is the grandmother of Jason Warning, a 2010 graduate who was a 6'6" offensive lineman for the football team from Monroeville. This scholarship will provide support to talented and deserving student-athletes who are members of the IUP football team.

The Rod Ruddock Baseball Scholarship provides scholarship support to student-athletes who are actively participating in the varsity baseball program at IUP. This scholarship was established in 2004 by MG Rodney D. Ruddock USA (Ret.) and his wife, Ellen Syllvers Ruddock, graduates from the Class of 1965 and 1966, respectively. Rod, an All-American athlete at IUP, holds an unbroken record for pitching two no-hitters in one season. During his college days, Rod participated in varsity baseball and ROTC and was president of the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. He was inducted into the IUP Athletic Hall of Fame in 2005.

The Shirley and Julius Filcik Scholarship for Women's Basketball provides financial award to outstanding members of the women's basketball team. This scholarship was established by Mrs. Filcik, a 1953 graduate of the university who resides in Cincinnati, Ohio. The Filcik family also established the Julius Filcik Doctoral Fellowship in memory of Mr. Filcik, a 1953 alumnus who played on the IUP men's basketball team and who passed away in 1992.

Shirley Ullom Filcik, a 1953 graduate of Indiana State Teachers College, established the Jules Filcik Memorial Scholarship for Men's Basketball to honor the legacy of her late husband, Jules, also a 1953 graduate of Indiana, who joined the team as a walk-on and enjoyed playing during his undergraduate years. Upon graduation, Jules continued his education and worked as a corporate counsel for Procter & Gamble prior to his passing in 1992. Continuing the strong ties of the Filcik family with IUP and honoring the family's values of quality education and athletics, Mrs. Filcik established this scholarship to support academic excellence among student-athletes on the men's basketball team.

The 1968 Boardwalk Bowl Football Team Endowment was established in recognition of the 1968 IUP football team, under the direction of Chuck Klausning, that went into Atlantic City's Convention Hall as a prohibitive underdog to play for the NCAA Atlantic Region Football Championship. Despite a valiant effort, Delaware's core da touchdown in the final fifteen seconds to win the game 31-24. Led by Jerry Clark '69, a defensive back on that squad, members of the team joined together and have been providing support since 2012.

In honor of Walt and Sue Lewis, Nell Jack established the Walter and Suzanne Lewis Basketball Scholarship, which will benefit members of the IUP men's team. A 1970 graduate of IUP, Walt Lewis is a partner of the CPA firm Smith Lewis Chessand Company, of Indiana and Uniontown. A 1971 IUP graduate, Sue Lewis taught for many years in the Indiana Area School District. In recognition of their support of IUP Athletics, they both received the 2012 Bell Ringer Award as part of the IUP Athletics Hall of Fame.

The Donnie Mash Memorial Baseball Scholarship was established by Donnie's father, Donald J. (Don) Mash '64, in memory of his son, who passed away in 1979 at age 11. Active in baseball, Donnie was chosen "Outstanding Player" in his Little League division and led the division with a .737 batting average. This scholarship will benefit IUP baseball players.

Robert W. (Bob) Basehor, Jr. and Katie Kuvinka Basehor graduated with Bachelor of Science Degrees in Education in 1971. He played for the IUP football team for four seasons as a running safety and was chosen as a member of the All 70's Team as a defensive back. He is currently a financial advisor at Merrill Lynch. One of Nick's favorite memories of playing football in the 70's was the game - day ritual. After pre-game warmup drills, the entire team would gather in the locker room beneath George P. Miller Stadium to check their equipment, gather their thoughts, and await the coach's pep talk. Back then, they were known as the "Big Indians" and the IUP marching band would come down Fisher Hill playing the fight song, "Cherokee," which would get the team's adrenaline pumping. They would then file out to the edge of the field for the late, great Marv Goslin to announce the starting lineup one by one, followed by, "and now here is Coach Neal and the Rest of the Big Indians!" The "Rest of the Big Indians" came to be known as the "RB's," which symbolizes the team mates who practiced hard and prepared to be ready when their opportunity came along. The starting lineup couldn't perform to their potential without the help of their backups, coaches, and the supporting cast. As with most things, the best results come from organizations that pull together and work as a team. Mr. Palombi is so thankful for the opportunity to have played at IUP with the "RB's" and hopes that the Nick Palombi "RB" Football Scholarship will help another young man pursue his dreams, too!

T.G. is an alum of IUP, having earned his Bachelor of Science in Education degree in Spanish Education in 1970 and his Master of Education degree in Spanish Education in 1972. He always enjoyed playing IUP Men's Basketball during his time at college and continues to do so after graduation. He has established the TG Scholarship for Women's Basketball to provide support to the university.

The purpose of the Wayne Tinstman Sink 'Shorty' Scholarship for Business is to recognize an Indiana University of Pennsylvania graduate, Wayne Tinstman 'Shorty' Sink, who subsequently distinguished himself as a credit to his family's business heritage and to his business education at IUP. Wayne Tinstman graduated from Homer Center High School, Class of 1962, where he was a member of the track team. His school record in the 220 yard/200 meter dash still stands. He decided to stay in San Diego and was named Director of Finance and Administration for the entire San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), from which he retired after 30 years of service. 'Shorty' passed away in August of 2016. This scholarship will go to a Homer Center High School graduate enrolled in the Eberly College of Business with a preference for a member of the track and field team.

Eugene (Gene) Schmidt attended what is now known as Indiana University of Pennsylvania from September 1959 until his graduation in May 1964. While there, he was skilled enough to participate on the men's basketball team (initially as a starter on the freshman team and then elevated to the varsity for the next 7 semesters). Gene went on to a successful career first as a junior high school guidance counselor and then as a UniServ Representative and eventually a Regional Field Director for the PSEA, Pennsylvania State Education Association, the largest teacher and vocational grouping in Pennsylvania.

William (Bill) Grant graduated from IUP in 1975 with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. He subsequently received his Master's in Business Administration from Wilkes University where he serves on the Board of Trustees. Bill's early business career path included positions in public and corporate accounting. Bill's entrepreneurial spirit led him into establishing a child care company specializing in employing related child care programs that he subsequently took public and was listed on the over-the-counter market. After 5 years in the public arena, Bill moved to establish Hildebrand Learning Centers that also specialized in the employer-related child care market. Hildebrand grew to over 400 centers with over 1,000 employees as was listed as the 19th largest child care company in the United States. Bill played football at IUP in the early 70's and has established the William J. Grant Family Football Scholarship to assist football student-athletes enrolled in the Eberly College of Business.

Dan Radakovich graduated from IUP in 1980 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Finance. He went on to attain a Master's in Business Administration from the University of Miami (FL). Richard Dale was born, grew up, and died (June 19, 2001) in White Township, Indiana County. He played football for Indiana Area High School. Mary Emma was born in Blairsville, PA, and moved to Indiana when she married Richard Dale. They resided on East Pike for more than 50 years. After retirement, they became active in several local social groups, including the FVW, Lions, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks (BPOE), and AARP. Richard Dale became interested and did volunteer work for all of these groups, commencing with the challenge presented in life. IUP and the football program made an important impact in his life and provided the groundwork for future success over the years in education and business. George "Butch" Aggen '76, M'78 played football at Indiana University of Pennsylvania and earned a bachelor's degree in Criminology and a master's degree in Student Affairs in Higher Education. His experience with IUP football has allowed during his grad assistantship to provide a solid foundation for understanding the importance of teamwork, commitment to excellence, and how to deal with the challenges encountered in life. IUP and the football program made an important impact in his life and provided the groundwork for future success over the years in education and business. The Dennis A. and Regina D. Stover Legacy Fund has been established by Dennis Stover '76 and Regina Dressel Stover '75 to provide scholarship support to student athletes in the Eberly College of Business, with a preference for Women's Athletics.

Bruce Schoner '71 attended Indiana University of Pennsylvania where he was a collegiate swimmer, member of the band, and graduated with an undergraduate degree in music education. He later went on to receive a master's degree from Temple University. Bruce was an educator at heart, spending over 30 years teaching music, directing the marching and concert band, and producing musicals in the Schuylkill Valley School District where he will be remembered for his humor and always trying to get the best from his students. Bruce also spent many years passing on his talents by providing private instruction on the trombone. A avid supporter of local arts and theater, he spent many years in leadership roles and participating in groups such as the Ringgold Band, the Pagoda Brass, and the

Reading Civic Theater. Outside of hearts, Bruce had a wide array of interests including scuba diving, working in his woodshop making renovation to his home, and was an active member of Mohnton-Cumrulis Club. He established several endowments, including the Bruce Schouner Enhancement Fund for the IUP Swim Team, to support his alma mater.

James Shea '56 and Darlene Shea have established two scholarship support student athletes – the Jim and Darlene Shea Scholarship for Men's Basketball and the Jim and Darlene Shea Sutton Scholarship. "We have always been proud of the accomplishment of the university," James Shea said. "We value all of the lifelong relationships we have formed with many of the faculty and staff at IUP, and we want to support a place that has given us and the region a lot of opportunities."

The Curtiss Family Baseball Scholarship was established by Thomas Curtiss and Helma Curtiss to provide lasting support for the IUP Baseball team.

The IUP Women's Volleyball Alumni Scholarship was established by an anonymous donor to support the IUP Women's Volleyball team.

The Jerry and Cheryl Clark Boardwalk Bowl Scholarship is one of a family of individual Boardwalk Bowl endowments all established to recognize the legacy of the Boardwalk Team and perpetuate the annual Boardwalk Bowl Team Scholarship started in 2012. Jerry, a two-sport athlete, excelled not only on the football field, but also on the baseball diamond, and was a three-year starter for both teams. During his time on the football field, he gained three varsity letters as a defensive back and had 12 career interceptions. The team would go combined 24-4 during his time between the hashes. He was named to the 1968 AP All Pennsylvania Football first team and IUP's 60s All Decade team. He also received the 1969 Coaches Big Indian Athletic Award for Athlete of the Year. As a baseball player, Jerry gained three more varsity letters and compiled 18 career steals, which is in IUP's top 20 all-time. He also hit .300 or better twice in his career. Jerry and his wife Cheryl, an IUP Alumna, have two children, Nicole and Derek. Jerry is retired and worked 30 years in the banking field and Cheryl retired after 25 years as a middle school science teacher.

The Charlie and Kate Hasse Boardwalk Bowl Scholarship was established by Charles Hasse '71 and Kathleen Hasse to honor the Boardwalk Bowl Team.

Robert W. (Bob) Basehore, Jr. and Kathie Kuvinka Basehore graduated with Bachelor of Science degrees in Education in 1971. Bob and Kathie met at IUP and married during their senior year. While at IUP, Bob was a member of the varsity football team from 1968 to 1970 and played in the 1968 Boardwalk Bowl in Atlantic City. That team produced many great players and IUP Hall of Famers and ranks as one of IUP's all-time great teams. Keeping that memory alive and providing scholarships for players who would come later is the primary reason the Bob and Kathie Basehore Boardwalk Bowl Scholarship was created. There was a special bond the 1968 Boardwalk Bowl Team shared and being a part of the Boardwalk Bowl Scholarship endowment is a way of perpetuating that memory.

Bob Strouse graduated from IUP in January 1970 with a B.S. Ed. degree in Mathematics. After serving 2 years active duty in the Army, Bob returned to PA to teach mathematics and coach football in the Altoona Area School District. While teaching in Altoona, Bob earned a M. Ed. degree at Penn State. In March 1980, he passed up a graduate assistantship at Penn State to pursue a business career with Hobart Corporation in Troy, Ohio. In 1982, Bob earned an M.S. degree in Management Science from the University of Dayton College of Engineering. He started his Hobart career as an Engineering Analyst Programmer and moved through various engineering services and information technology management positions. When Hobart was acquired by Illinois Tool Works in November 1999, Bob was Director of Technical Services leading a team of 55 employees responsible for corporate global computing infrastructure. With a new corporate direction under Illinois Tool Works, Bob transitioned to Business Systems Manager where he led the implementation of enterprise Resource Planning systems for five business units in Ohio and Georgia. Bob retired from the Army Reserve as a Colonel in April 2002 and from Illinois Tool Works in April 2011. He resides in Dubois, PA with his wife, Sue. They have established the Bob and Sue Strouse Endowed Scholarship to support the family of Boardwalk Bowl scholarships.

The donor of the IUP Alumni Veterans Scholarship for Athletics is a lifelong resident of Johnstown, PA. He was drafted into the Army during the Vietnam War. After his discharge, he attended the University of Pittsburgh with the help of the GI Bill and scholarships. He worked for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and eventually enrolled at IUP for a master's degree. He graduated from IUP with his degree in 1992. This scholarship is meant to honor all alumni who served in the military prior to, during, or after their experience at IUP.

C.J. Spadafora's family has a long history in the Indian community. His grandfather, Cecil Spadafora, started a car dealership business in Indian in 1946 featuring Oldsmobiles and Cadillacs. In 1973, C.J.'s father and uncle, Chuck Spadafora and W.H. Spadafora, returned to Indian to take over the family business and grew from one location to three. Then in 2000, C.J., the third generation of Spadafora's, returned to the Indian area and worked with his father until his passing in August 2019. The Spadafora's have a long legacy of supporting IUP Athletics. Their family created one of the first IUP Football endowments and established the annual Cecil Spadafora's Golf Invitational. C.J. and his family feel that without the Indian and IUP communities, their business wouldn't have thrived and achieved the success it has to date. C.J. feels very fortunate of what IUP has made possible for him and his family and wants to give back to the community by supporting the IUP Swim Team and future generations of student athletes through the Spadafora IUP Swim Team Enhancement Fund.

Coach Ed Fry served as a coach and faculty member of the IUP Department of Music. Fry had the longest tenure of any active head coach at IUP. He has completed his 43rd season coaching men's cross country and track and field. He has coached women's track and field for 30 years and women's cross country for 29 years. He has been the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Coach of the Year four times. Arunner himself, Fry finished with a personal best placement of 17th in the New York Marathon. He set an American group record in the 10-miler run, outperforming competitors from 33 countries to win the Submasters Olympic 10,000-meter race in Toronto in 1975. Family, friends, colleagues, and athletes have established the Coach Fry Scholarship to honor his memory.

The Anthony J. and Kitty Ferrari Boardwalk Bowl Scholarship was established by Anthony Ferrari '70 and Kitty Ferrari to honor the Boardwalk Bowl Team.

The Coach Ed Receski Boardwalk Bowl Scholarship was established by his children, Edward Receski and Andrea Fako, to honor their father's legacy at IUP and support the Boardwalk Bowl Team.

Lee M. (Johnson) Faulconbridge was a 1978 graduate of Haverford High School and a 1982 graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania where he majored in Family and Consumer Science Education. She also completed a M. Ed. from Villanova University in 1986. A dedicated distance and marathon runner, she lettered in varsity track and cross country throughout high school and college. The Lee M. Johnson Faulconbridge Scholarship was established to honor her memory.
