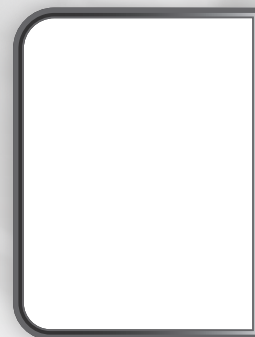

MEET THE GAMECOCK HEAD COACH

HEAD COACH

SEAN FRASER FIRST SEASON

Jacksonville State hired a proven winner at multiple levels to lead its women's soccer program with the hiring of Sean Fraser in December of 2022.

In 10 seasons as a head coach, he has compiled a 120-69-12 record on the field and

won three conference titles, two in Division II and one in NAIA. Jax State is his fourth head coaching stop after coaching the men's team at NAIA Midland University from 2011-14 and the women's teams at Div. II Lincoln Memorial from 2017-19 and Division I ULM from 2020-22.

At ULM, he took over a team that also went 3-13-2 prior to his arrival and had 14 wins by season's end of his second season in Monroe, La. That 2021 Warhawks team had a program-best RPI of 128 and won in the postseason twice with Sun Belt Tournament wins over Troy and No. 1 seed Arkansas State after not holding a postseason win since 2004.

He also claimed three United States Soccer Coaches Team Academic Awards in three seasons



at ULM, while also earning the United States Soccer Coaches Team Ethics and Sportsmanship Award in 2020. He also had two All-Sun Belt players, matching the total number of honorees the school had in its 15 previous seasons in the conference.

Fraser was hired at ULM after a three-year stint at Lincoln Memorial in Harrogate, Tenn., that saw him take over a team that went 3-10-2 and then post a 38-20-2 record and win two South Atlantic Conference titles over his tenure. He won seven games in his first season before posting a 14-5-2 record in 2018 and a 17-5 record in 2019, winning the SAC Tournament in both of those campaigns. He was the 2018 SAC Coach of the Year after leading LMU to the NCAA Division II Sweet 16. One year later, he led the Railsplitters to the Round of 32.

At LMU, Fraser coached 10 All-SAC selections and seven All-Southeast Region player, as well as one SAC Freshman of the Year. He also led LMU to an impressive run in the classroom, where his 2019 squad placed 19 student-athletes on the SAC Honor Roll and posted a team GPA of 3.38.

Prior to his time at LMU, he was the Assistant Men's Coach at the University of Charleston in Charleston, W.Va. for the 2016 season. The Golden Eagles went 19-3-2 with a Division II Nation Runner-Up finish, while also claiming the Mountain East regular season and tournament titles. Charleston won the Atlantic Region title, had three All-Americans and eight All-MEC players, while also claiming the Team Academic Award for that season.

From 2011-15, Fraser turned the Midland men's team around. He took over a Warriors team that went 4-10-2 prior to his arrival and posted double-digit wins in each of his four seasons. MU went 53-25-6 under his guidance, including the 2013 Great Plains Athletic Conference Tournament title.

Midland reached the conference championship in all four seasons under Fraser, who coached 32 All-GPAC players and three All-Americans.

He got his coaching career started as a graduate assistant at his alma mater of Bethel University from 2008-10, winning a 2008 NAIA National Championship and the 2009 TranSouth Conference crown.

A native of Durham, England, Fraser received his bachelor's degree in PE, teaching and coaching from Bethel in 2008. He also has a master's degree in education from Bethel, as well as a master's in strategic leadership from Charleston and an MBA from Southwestern College.

International Experience

Hailing from Durham, England, Fraser brings international coaching experience with him to Jax State. While coaching in England, he coached Lucy Bronze and Demi Stokes, who went on to participate in the 2019 Women's World Cup for England, placing fourth.

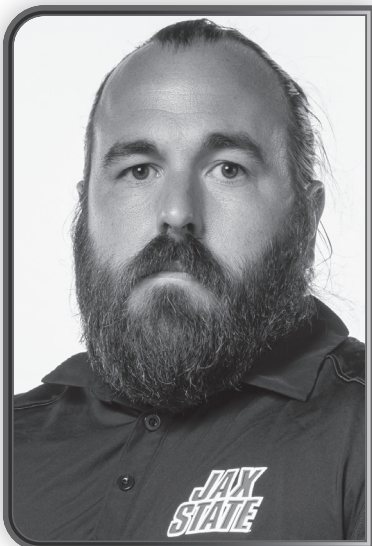
Building Programs

Fraser has a history of building successful collegiate programs. He opened his head coaching career at Midland (Neb.) University, leading the men's program. Over four seasons, Fraser led the Warriors to a 53-25-6 record, including an 18-2-2 season in 2013 with a Great Plains Athletic Conference regular season and tournament championship.

Fraser arrived at Lincoln Memorial (Tenn.) University in 2017 as the head coach of the women's program. Prior to his arrival, LMU had not qualified for the South Atlantic Conference Tournament since 2014. Fraser broke through in his second season in 2018, leading LMU to a 14-5-2 record, a SAC Tournament championship and an appearance in the NCAA Division II tournament, reaching the Sweet 16. In 2019, Fraser and the Railsplitters claimed their second consecutive SAC tournament title and reached the NCAA Division II tournament, advancing to the round of 32.

At ULM, he took over a team that also went 3-13-2 prior to his arrival and had 14 wins by season's end of his second season in Monroe, La. FIRST SEASON

One of Sean Fraser's first additions to the Jacksonville State soccer program was Brandon Ponchak, one of the top mentors in goalkeeping in the college ranks.

Ponchak joined the Gamecocks after spending two seasons on the men's soccer staff at Northern Kentucky.

While at NKU, Ponchak managed the budget, travel, equipment and other administrative duties for the Norse program. On the field, he mentored the goalkeepers and helped the club to a 6-11 over mark in 2021 and achieved the best Horizon League finish in the history of the program at 4-6. Ponchak tutored Jesse Randall, who was named the 2021 Horizon League Freshman Player of the Year. Randall also earned All-League First Team and All-Freshman Team selections after his first season at NKU.

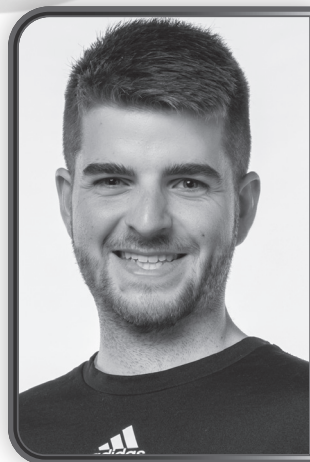
Head coach Sean Fraser added a familiar face to his Jax State staff with Kat Yarbrough joining the Gamecocks as a graduate assistant.

CUSA



The next era of Jacksonville State Athletics got underway on July 1, when the Gamecocks' officially became members of Conference USA.

Jax State accepted CUSA's invitation to join the league in November of 2021 and immediately got to work on its application for the league and specifically Football's Bowl Subdivision. The Gamecocks saw that work come to fruition on Saturday, when they joined eight other programs to make up the new-look conference that has been a force in Division I athletics since 1995.

Joining Jax State as new members in CUSA are Liberty, New Mexico State and Sam Houston. They team up with FIU, Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee, UTEP and Western Kentucky to make up the nine-school membership for the 2023-24 academic year. Kennesaw State will join as the conference's 10th team in 2024.

CUSA is Jax State's third Division I conference home after spending 18 years in the Ohio Valley Conference and 10 total years in the ASUN, which was the Gamecocks' first Div. I conference home from 1995-03 and again from 2021-23.

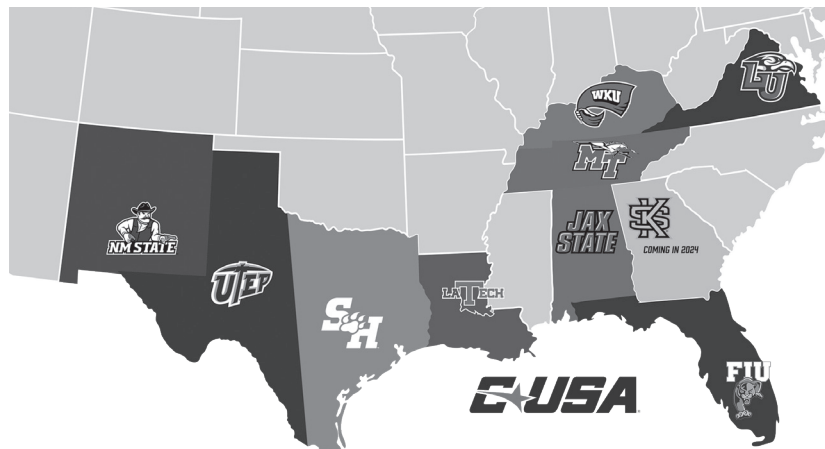
The Gamecocks have had tremendous success in their previous Div. I leagues, winning more than 80 total conference titles since making the move from Div. II in 1993. Jax State Football has seen a great deal of that success at the FCS level, where it won 10 conference titles in the past 20 years, including the first ASUN Football Championship in 2022.

Jax State's move to FBS and CUSA has already paid off, with the league announcing a new multimedia rights deal with CBS Sports and ESPN that will begin with the 2023-24 academic year. The multi-year agreement positions CBS Sports Network with tier one selection status for C-USA football (18 games annually) and men's basketball (18 games annually) over the length of the partnership, while also televising the football championship, men's basketball semifinal and championship games, the women's basketball championship game, and baseball and softball championship games.

The Gamecocks will play at least six football games on national television in 2023, with the possibility of up to four more being picked up during the season. CUSA will be able to stand alone in front of its national television audience in October, when all league games will be played on weeknights and on linear networks.

Jax State will begin competition as a member of CUSA this fall, when the Gamecock soccer team begins its season on Aug. 17. Jax State Volleyball will open its campaign on Aug. 25. Football will play the first-ever CUSA game for Jax State on Aug. 26, when the Gamecocks host UTEP to open the 2023 season at Burgess-Snow Field.

In conjunction with its new membership coming on board for July 1, CUSA unveiled a new brand identity that included a new logo and refreshed identity to celebrate the league's 29th year.



Why We Are The Gamecocks

“Go Eagle Owls!” would be the resounding cry from Paul Snow Stadium today if ardent fans hadn’t decided 50 years ago that the school mascot should be a bird of a different feather.

Jacksonville State University’s first football team was fielded in the late 1800’s and nicknamed in honor of a rare predatory bird found near the Arctic circle.

The exact details are lost to history, but a group of fans decided it was hard for the school’s image to soar like an eagle if the team’s name was something of a turkey. People like E.C. Wilson, Bruce Chase and Charles Sprayberry felt a more collegiate-sounding moniker would be more appropriate.

The supporters looked to Southern culture rather than the north pole to symbolize the school’s tough spirit. Tongue firmly planted in beak, Gamecock supporters crowed the loudest, and the University found itself with a new identity: a mascot familiar to everyone, including the farm boys who comprised most of the student body back then.

For nearly a half-century – up until 1946 – the fledgling Eagle Owls hooted with pride from the scanty facilities adjacent to the field at John Forney National Guard Armory.

The State Normal School (SNS) team was sparse by today’s standards, but the gridiron action was competitive from the start. Present day rivalries such as Samford (Howard College) and Troy State were rooted in those early games.

The team had only 23 players when SNS was renamed Jacksonville Teachers College in 1946, with Head Coach Don Salls beginning his first season, but there was a “big school” atmosphere developing in the foothills.

Along with the new name came new colors. The blue and gold were tossed out in favor of the familiar red and white worn by the area high school players.

The story goes that there were two camps - those who wanted to keep the Eagle Owl nickname and those who wanted new colors. Legend has it that a compromise was worked out; new colors for a new mascot.

It was all worked out by 1947 when the Fighting Gamecocks took to the field for the first time. And, as is true to the nature of the warlike bird itself, the football team and other athletes fought their way to respectability in intercollegiate ranks - eventually bringing home a national championship in every major sport.

Friendliest Campus in the South



From modest beginnings, Jacksonville State University has evolved into the educational center of Northeast Alabama. The Alabama Legislature in the 1882-83 session created a state normal school when Governor Edward O'Neal signed into law a bill creating the school on February 22, 1883. Jacksonville State Normal School acquired the facilities and equipment of Calhoun College, consisting of 12 acres of land and a two-story brick building. The Board of Directors elected James G. Ryals, Jr., as the first president. The school opened with three instructors: W. J. Borden, Mathematics; Eliza A. Bowen, English; and Ida J. Woodward, primary department. As stipulated in the establishing act, the Normal School administered a preparatory school for children of the town and surrounding areas. At the end of the first year, on August 15, 1884, William Mark Hames, President of the Board of Directors, reported that funds totaling \$4,751.25 had been received, including \$2,500 from the state; that 25 students were enrolled in the normal school; and that 222 were in the preparatory school.

The Normal School remained in operation until 1930, when it became Jacksonville State Teachers College. Five years later, the College earned regional accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The name again changed to Jacksonville State College in 1957 when the first graduate program—the master's degree in elementary education—was created. On August 2, 1966, the Legislature authorized the State Board of Education to elevate the College to university status. On August 17, 1967, the Legislature established an independent Board of Trustees for the University and divested jurisdiction from the State Board of Education.

Jacksonville State University has been served by 11 presidents: James G. Ryals, Jr. (1883-85), J. Harris Chappell (1885-86), Carleton Bartlett Gibson (1886-92), J. B. Jarrett (1892-93), Jacob Forney IV (1893-99), Clarence William Daugette (1899-1942), Houston Cole (1942-71), Ernest Stone (1971-81), Theron E. Montgomery (1981-86), Harold J. McGee (1986-99), and William A. Meehan (1999-present).

Jacksonville State University has developed into a modern regional university serving Northeast Alabama on a 392-acre campus with 63 buildings. In addition, the University operates an off-campus center in Gadsden and video-conferencing sites throughout Alabama and Northwest Georgia. Through its programs of teaching, research, and service, Jacksonville State University has served the region and state for more than 100 years.

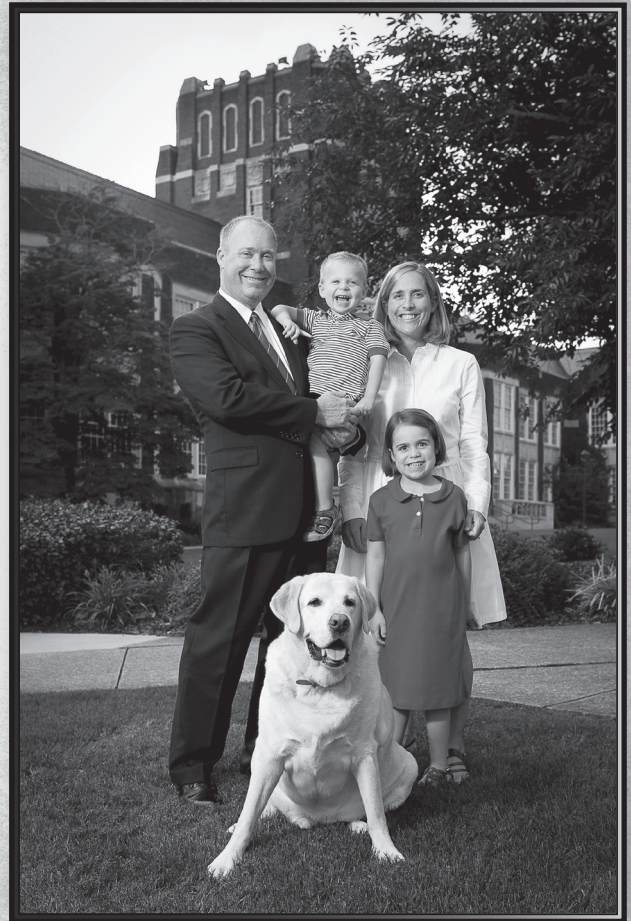
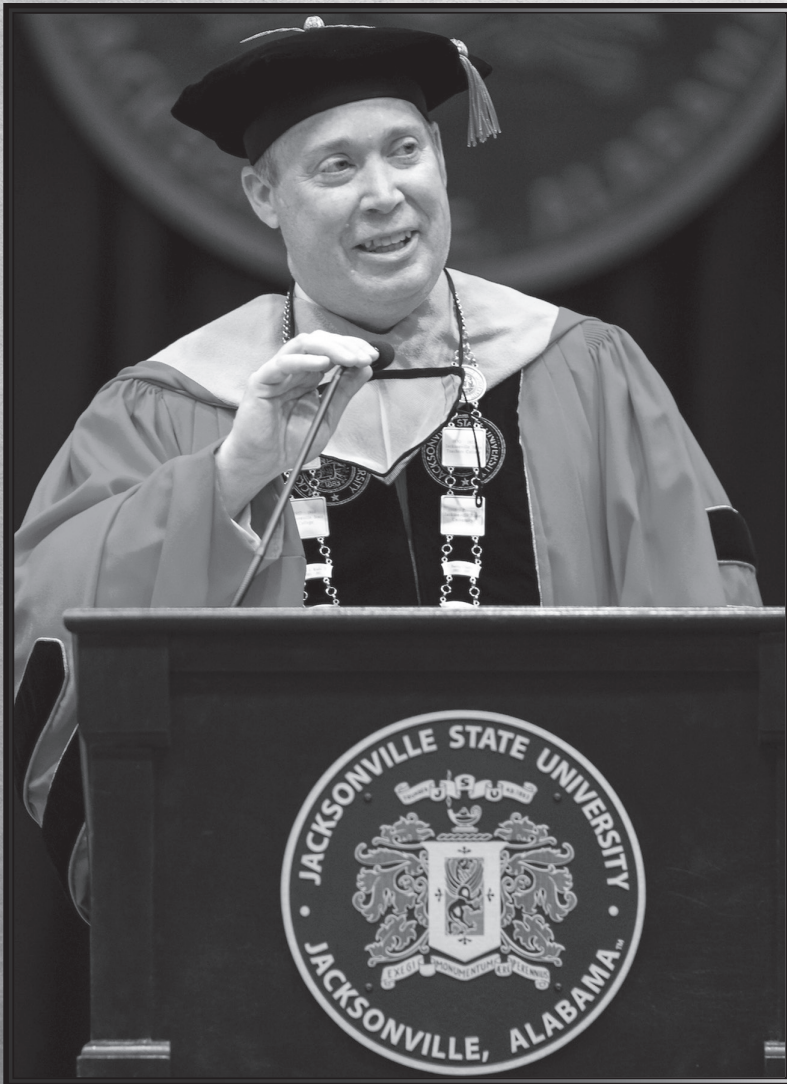

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Greg Seitz was named Director of Athletics at Jacksonville State on February 26, 2016 after more than two decades of service to the University.

Seitz, who is in his 30th year in the athletic department at JSU, served

as interim Athletic Director for 14 months, marking his third term as the interim Athletic Director for the Gamecock athletic department.

In Seitz's six-plus years at the helm, the Gamecocks have seen unprecedented success on the field and in the classroom. The 2015-16 season saw JSU's highest ever finish in the men's Capital One Cup at No. 18, ranking the Gamecocks in the top 20 athletic departments among 347 NCAA Division I athletic programs. The 2016-17 season also saw JSU finish in the top 40 at No. 39, tied with Louisville, Harvard and South Carolina and 35 spots ahead of the next Ohio Valley Conference program.

The 2015 football season saw the football team post its first-ever No. 1 ranking in school history, and earn the No. 1 National seed in the FCS Playoffs before advancing to JSU's first Division I National Championship Game appearance. The Gamecocks set more than 50 school records and ranked in the top three in attendance at the FCS level after hosting three-straight home playoff games.

The Gamecocks won a JSU and Ohio Valley Conference-record five consecutive league titles and won a league-record 36-straight OVC games from 2014 to 2018, the second-longest conference win streak in FCS history. The Gamecocks were the only Division I program to win its conference title outright during those five seasons.

In the classroom, the Gamecock student-athletes posted a record 3.31 GPA for the 2019-20 academic year, the highest cumulative GPA in school history. The Spring 2020 semester guided the year to its record-breaking mark with an impressive 3.47 GPA for the term. It

marked the eighth-straight year the student-athletes achieved at least a 3.0 cumulative GPA. Additionally, all 17 sports at Jax State posted a team grade point average higher than a 3.0. Prior to 2019-20, a 3.26 cumulative grade-point average in 2017-18 and a 3.20 in 2018-19 were the two highest cumulative GPAs in program history.

Seitz has been with JSU since 1993, when he began working as assistant sports information director. In 1999, he became Sports Information Director and was promoted to Associate Athletic Director in 2002, before being promoted to Senior Associate Athletic Director in 2011.

During his term as interim and Athletic Director, Seitz has been instrumental in many of the facility upgrades at Jacksonville State, including renovations at Rudy Abbott Field at Jim Case Stadium, Pete Mathews Coliseum, the Riley Green Athletic Sports Performance Center. Seitz was involved in the design and addition to the football stadium in 2010, and is now guiding the stadium's second major renovation, which will include a new football operations center, locker room and additional suites

state-of-the-art high definition video boards in Burgess-Snow Field, Rudy Abbott Field and University Field, while also placing new scoreboards at the JSU Soccer Field and the JSU Tennis Courts. That project went one step further in 2019, when a pair of video boards were installed inside Pete Mathews Coliseum.

The videoboard additions at The Pete was just one part of a major coliseum renovation project following the 2018 EF-3 tornado that hit campus and the surrounding Jacksonville community. Seitz brought the athletic department's administrative home to Pete Mathews Coliseum as part of the renovation, creating new office space throughout the third floor of the facility. The transition paved the way for a new main athletic ticket office in the coliseum lobby, updated basketball, soccer and volleyball locker rooms, and the installation of a full-size practice court on the east end of the building.

Under his guidance, JSU athletics transitioned into the ASUN Conference in 2021, to better align with the evolving college landscape, and has since accepted an invitation to join Conference USA beginning in 2023. The move will take the Gamecocks' football program up to the highest level of college football.

Among his notable hires since taking over as AD, Seitz landed Rich Rodriguez to lead JSU's efforts into FBS and Conference USA. One of his first hires was men's basketball's Ray Harper, who has since led the Gamecocks to their first two Div. I NCAA Tournaments.

Seitz has served on the NCAA Men's Final

Four Media Coordinator team for the last 11 years and is currently a member of the NCAA Championships Financial Working Group that was formed in 2019. He was named to the NCAA FCS Football Committee in 2016 and served as the chair of that committee in 2019. In addition, he served as a member of the NCAA Football Oversight Committee in 2019-20 and is as a site representative for the NCAA during the Division I Baseball Regionals and Super Regionals.



on the north side of the field.

In the summer of 2016, Seitz unveiled plans for a \$7.5 million renovation to JSU's Baseball Stadium, Rudy Abbott Field at Jim Case Stadium. The project was completed in time for the 2019 season and includes a 1,000-seat spectator grand stand with a shade canopy, an elevated, shaded entertainment or hospitality deck and service amenities, a new state-of-the-art press box and a game operations center.

In 2017, Seitz announced an extension of a 14-year partnership between JSU Athletics and Adidas, securing the Portland, Ore., based company as the Gamecocks' official athletic apparel and footwear brand.

Also during 2017, Seitz and the Board of Trustees announced plans to install new

The Riley Green Athletic Sports Performance Center at Stephenson Hall opened in spring 2020. The renovated 12,000 square foot space, once home to the Gamecock basketball program in its formative years, serves all 17 of Jacksonville State's intercollegiate teams. Renovations to the Stephenson gym began in January 2020 and was completed at the end of March 2020.

The weight room features 14 custom Hammer Strength racks, wall-to-wall rubber flooring and a 35-yard artificial turf area that stretches hashmark to hashmark.

Additional upgrades include a state-of-the-art surround sound and speaker system, more than 100 barbell sets, over 300 Hammer Strength olympic weights and two corner projectors and 12-foot video screens.

The open area and 14 double-sided racks translate into 28 working stations, allowing for multiple teams to use the facility at once without overcrowding.

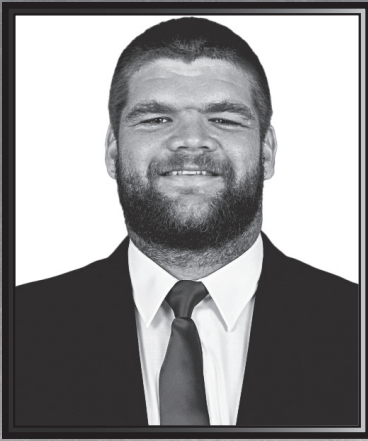

The turf serves as a warm-up area prior to workout sessions while doubling as a space for super sets during lifts. The turf is rated to withstand heavy drills such as sled pulls and tire flips.

Also, JSU is putting the finishing touches on an additional 5,000 square foot room located adjacent to the main workout area, formally the home of the University Recreation Fitness Center, into a rehabilitation and recovery center for injured student-athletes that require individual training. Both facilities will combine to provide more than 17,000 square feet of training space for Gamecock athletes.

The athletic performance facility previously presided inside Kennamer Hall. Total floor space of the former weight room was 5,000 square feet with 10 racks and a two-speaker sound system.

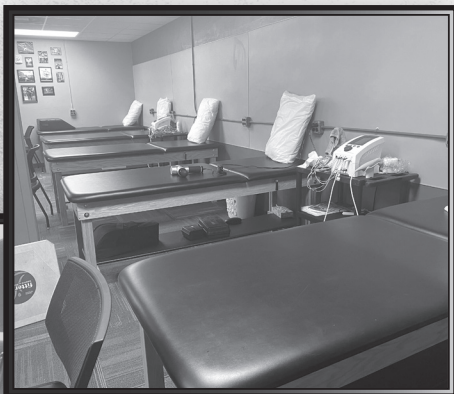
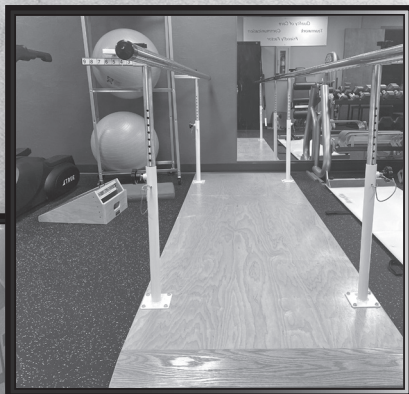
PMC TRAINING ROOM

In addition to the football training room at Burgess-Snow Field, Gamecock student-athletes enjoy a spacious training room at Pete Mathews Coliseum. The PMC Training Room features six training tables, four taping tables, two whirlpools and ice, along with stationary bikes and treadmills. The training room is open to all JSU student-athletes and is home to the training staff's offices.



The football team's main training room is located inside Gamecock Field House. Following a remodel of the facility, the team's training room doubled in square footage and houses state-of-the-art features.

Under the direction of six full-time certified athletic trainers, three certified assistant athletic trainers and numerous student trainers, the staff oversees all the medical needs for all 17 Gamecock teams. In the summer of 2016, Jacksonville State and Andrews Sports Medicine and Orthopedic Center announced a partnership that made the Birmingham-based practice JSU's primary provider for orthopedic care.



ATI PHYSICAL THERAPY ROOM

Opened in fall 2018, Jacksonville State's physical therapy room is located inside Pete Mathews Coliseum, just steps away from the PMC Training Room. Operated by ATI Physical Therapy, the facility is available to all student-athletes recovering from injuries and surgeries. ATI, named the best physical therapy practice in the nation by multiple publications, offers multiple tables, free weights and exercise equipment for Gamecocks looking to return to play.

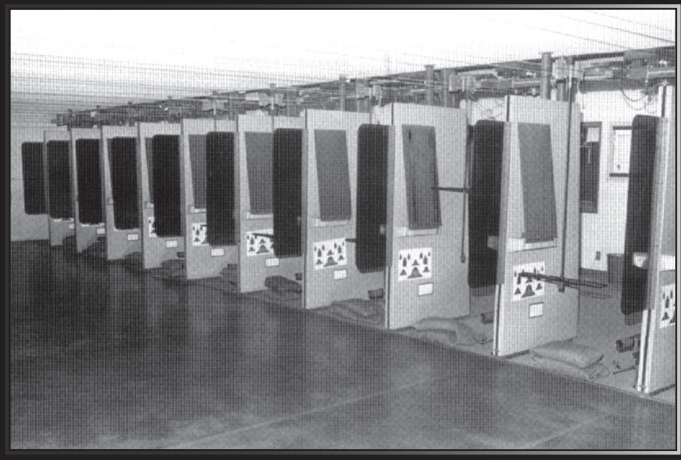

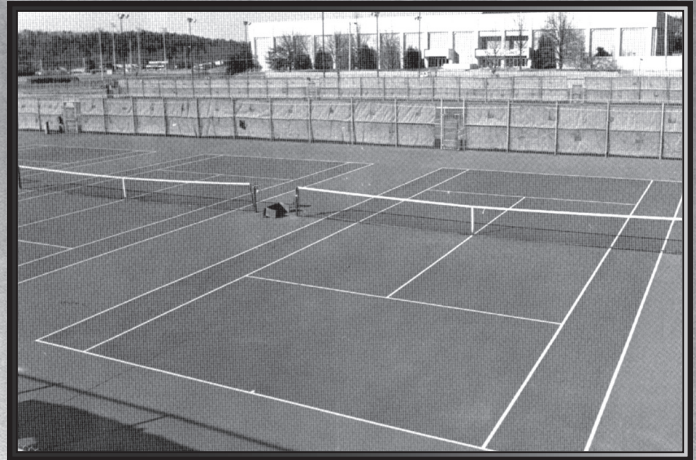


The JSU soccer team began play on the JSU Soccer Field in 2003.
