KEENE, N.H. 10/28/98 —Lakota Denton (Bernardson, Mass.) and Mike Norton (Plymouth, Mass.) each had two goals and two assists to lead the Keene State College men's soccer team to a 6-1 non-conference victory over Colby-Sawyer College at Owls Stadium on Wednesday. It was the first game between the two intra-state rivals.

It was the fourth straight win for Keene State which improves to 12-5. Colby-Sawyer falls to 7-11.

The Chargers gave the Owls an early scare when they scored just 16 seconds into the game on a goal by Zac Pinard (Penacook, N.H.) But it was all Keene State from there.

Phil DaRosa got the Owls on the board when he finished off a fine lead pass into the box from Denton. It was DaRosa's seventh goal of the season. Denton would give KSC a 2-1 lead when he headed in a free kick from Gerry Boggis. Norton would give KSC a 3-1 half-time lead two minutes later when he headed in a corner kick from Derek Bell.

Keene State would score three unanswered goals in the second half. Norton's second goal of the game gave him eight for the season. Denton headed in a crossing pass from Norton for his eighth goal this year. And Shin Teratanni finished the scoring when he connected from the side of the net for his second tally this year.

According to Denton, the Owls executed their game-plan to perfection. "We definitely had an advantage up front with our speed," said the sophomore midfielder. "Our plan was to come in from the outside with crossing balls which we did all night."

"We don't want to look past Southern Maine, but the big game for us will be Salem State," he added. "If we can win our last three, I still think we have a chance at the NCAAs."

Keene State played the game without starting midfielder Chris Brunette (Manchester, NH), who received a head injury in the Owls' game on Sunday against Western Conn. KSC's starting netminder Charlie Bailey(Charlestown, NH) also had to leave the game midway in the first half with a leg injury.

Keene State will return to Little East play on Saturday at 2:30 p.m. when they host Southern Maine.
