## EVAN MARSHALL

Arizona Diamondbacks, Seattle Mariners, Cleveland Indians, Chicago White Sox

A 2011 fourth-round draftee by Arizona, Marshall made his Major League debut on May 6, 2014 at Milwaukee, striking out two in 1 1/3 shutout innings to help him earn his first career win. The right-hander was the third D-backs relief pitcher in franchise history to earn the victory in his MLB debut. The Sunnyvale, Calif. native also became the first Wildcat to play his entire collegiate career under head coach Brad Hill and go on to play in the big leagues. Marshall split time between the majors and Triple A from 2014-19, spending time with the Seattle Mariners (2017), Cleveland Indians (2018) and Chicago White Sox (2019).

Marshall was called up to the White Sox on May 1 during the 2019 season before having his best season in the big leagues. During the 2019 campaign, Marshall appeared in 55 games, going 4-2 with a career-best 2.49 ERA. He set career bests in innings pitched (50.2) and WHIP (1.30). Marshall struck out 41 while allowing 24 walks and 14 earned runs. During a pandemic-shortened 2020 season, Marshall recorded a career-best ERA of 2.38 with eight holds in 23 relief outings. He struck out 30 in 22 2/3 innings while going 2-1. Marshall signed a one-year contract extension prior to the 2021 season.

## NICK MARTINI

Outfielder (2018-2021, 2023-24)

Oakland Athletics, San Diego Padres, Chicago Cubs, Cincinnati Reds

After being drafted in the seventh round of the 2011 MLB Draft by St. Louis, Martini was called up and made his Major League debut on June 6, 2018 against the Texas Rangers. He entered the game as a pinch hitter, going 0-for-2, as the A's fell to Texas, 8-2. Martini appeared in three games for the A's before being optioned to Nashville before being recalled on June 23 when he collected his first major league hit with a go-ahead, pinch-hit single in the eighth inning against the Chicago White Sox. He was again recalled on July 7 and is currently on the A's roster. While with Sounds, Martini was named a Pacific Coast League All-Star and has run his current on-base streak to 65 games, the longest by a Nashville player in the PCL era and the longest active streak in professional baseball (second-longest in professional baseball since 2009).

Martini was claimed off waivers by the Padres on August 28, 2019. In 26 games while in San Diego, he hit .244 with four doubles, a home run and five runs batted in. Martini was designated for assignment by the Padres on November 20, 2019 and was claimed by the Cincinnati Reds on November 25. Martini was again claimed off waivers by the Philadelphia Phillies before electing free agency after the 2020 MLB season. He agreed to a minor league contract with the Chicago Cubs prior to the 2021 season.

On February 3, 2023, Cincinnati signed Martini as free agent to a minor league contract and was assigned to the Louisville Bats. Martini slashed .275/.371/.393 with Louisville, totaling 95 hits including 15 homeruns. He made his debut with the Reds on August 23 against Los Angeles (AL). Just two days later, Martini went 2-for-3 with a pair of home runs and four RBI. Martini finished the season with a slash line of .268/.362/.412 with Cincinnati.

## BOBBY RANDALL Second Base (1976-80) Minnesota Twins

Randall was stalwart in the Minnesota Twins' infield for four seasons. He was involved in the Twins' league-record 203 double plays turned during the 1979 season. Randall had his finest season in 1976, his first in Minnesota, as he played in 153 games, hit .267, scored 55 runs and hit his only major-league home run. In 1978, he hit a career-best .278. Randall, a pure contact hitter, averaged one strikeout for every 13 at bats during his major-league career.

## ANDY REPLOGLE Pitcher (1978-79) St. Louis Cardinals, Milwaukee Brewers

Originally drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals, Replogle made his major-league debut with the Milwaukee Brewers in 1978. Earned his first major-league victory on April 16, 1978, vs. Baltimore as he allowed two runs in 5.2 innings pitched. In his rookie season, Replogle posted a 9-5 record and a 3.75 ERA. He began his professional career in the St. Louis farm system in Johnson City and St. Petersburg in 1975. He garnered Cardinals Minor League Pitcher-of-the-Month in April of 1976.

## CARLOS TORRES Pitcher (2009-10, 2012-19) Chicago White Sox, Colorado Rockies, New York Mets, Milwaukee Brewers, Washington Nationals, Detroit Tigers

Carlos Torres, a five-year veteran of the Chicago White Sox minor-league system, broke through with the South Siders as he was called up and made his debut on July 22, 2009, against the defending American League Champion Tampa Bay Rays. He became the first K-State baseball alum to play in a Major League game since Craig Wilson's last game in 2000. Torres earned his first Big League victory against the cross-town rivals Chicago Cubs on Sept. 3, 2009. Against the Cubs, Torres threw seven shutout innings, allowing five hits with no walks and six strikeouts in 98 pitches. Torres went on to pitch as a reliever for the Colorado Rockies in 2012 and spent two seasons pitching for the Milwaukee Brewers. In 2016, Torres appeared in 72 games with Milwaukee, posting a career-low 2.73 ERA with 78 strikeouts in 82 1/3 innings pitched and appeared in 67 games in 2017, going 4-4 with a 4.21 ERA over 72 2/3 innings. Torres signed with the Washington Nationals prior to the 2018 season and has split time between the Nationals and Syracuse Chiefs in 2018, appearing in 10 games at the big-league level this season.

Torres began 2019 with El Paso (Triple A, San Diego) before eventually making four appearances for the Detroit Tigers. Torres appeared with four Triple A clubs, including Toledo (Detroit), Rochester (Minnesota) and Sacramento (San Francisco). He was released by

Sacramento on August 27, 2019 and is currently assigned to Toros de Tijuana in the Mexican League.

## JORDAN WICKS Pitcher (2023-24) Chicago Cubs

K-State's first-ever first round draft pick made his Major League Debut on August 23, 2023, for Chicago (NL) against Pittsburg, striking out nine to pick up the win. Wicks, who was selected No. 21 overall by the Cubs in the 2021 MLB Draft, became the fourth Cubs pitcher since 1901 to strikeout at least nine batters in an MLB debut, joining Thomas Diamon, Dutch Ruether, and Mark Prior.

A native of Conway, Ark., Wicks earned his first MLB win against Pittsburg after he held the Pirates to one run on two hits and a walk before he retired 15 consecutive batters - the most by a Cub in their MLB debut since 1974 - during his five-inning start.

Wicks was called up to the big leagues following a short stint with Triple-A Iowa Cubs. In seven starts, he went 3-0 with a 3.82 ERA and 30 strikeouts including a season-high seven in his final outing.

## CRAIG WILSON Utility Infielder (1998-2000) Chicago White Sox

Craig Wilson spent three years with the Chicago White Sox before being traded to the Kansas City Royals in 2001. He signed a free agent contract with the Detroit Tigers in 2002, where he played for the team's AAA affiliate, the Toledo (Ohio) Mud Hens. He saw action in 119 games for Toledo, posting a .263 average with 48 runs scored on 109 hits and 46 RBIs. He played three years for the White Sox from 1998-2000, posting a career .272 average with 54 runs scored and 40 RBIs. He saw action at three positions in 28 games in 2000, compiling a .260 average with 12 runs scored and four RBIs. He saw action in 98 games for in 1999, posting a .238 batting average with 28 runs on 60 hits. His .468 average (22-of-47) in 1998 was the highest in major league history among players with a minimum of 50 plate appearances. He went 3-for-4 with two doubles, a home run, two RBI and three runs scored in his major-league debut on 9/5/98 vs. New York. He singled off Andy Pettitte in his first career at-bat. He played in 754 minor-league games before making his debut at age 28. He went 4-of-7 with two home runs, five RBIs, four runs scored and 10 total bases in extra-inning victory at Detroit on 9/14/98.
