History Introduction

Lewis & Clark football has two separate and distinct eras. The first took place in Albany, Oregon, and dated back virtually to the beginning of football in the state. The second, or “modern era,” started in 1946, just four years after the college had moved to its present location on Palatine Hill and changed its name from Albany College to Lewis & Clark.

This compendium of football facts and figures attempts to cover the modern era from 1946 on. It is as complete and accurate as available records will allow. Actually, statistical recording and reporting of football games prior to the 1950s was sketchy and incomplete. Often, the final score of the game is the only statistic to survive, and that only because it was reported in a newspaper story. Individual and team rushing and passing statistics were either not kept or only spasmodically reported in the years prior to 1950. Statistical recording of games became a regular practice beginning in 1950 but the Lewis & Clark Gymnasium fire of 1966 destroyed many one-of-a-kind records so gaps still exist in materials necessary for compilation of a more complete history.

An attempt is underway to reconstruct the Albany football era. As time allows, a search will be made of the College archives, the Oregon Historical Society records, and microfilmed files of the Albany Democrat Herald and The Oregonian for game scores, leagues standings, names of coaches and key players, and other information necessary for compiling such a history. College yearbooks and student newspapers, normally a good source of information, unfortunately provided only sketchy details about some of the Albany years. To illustrate, here is what appeared in the December, 1898, Albany College Student, the official monthly student publication.

“Football is over. Our boys have played it and been defeated. We have no reason to complain of the work done by our players. They played well but were inferior in weight. More interest has been taken than ever before. Not we alone suffer defeat. Also the Farmers (Oregon Agricultural College later known as Oregon State University), the Indians (probably an early nickname for Willamette University) and the U. of O. boys.” That was the complete season summary for 1898. No game scores were reported in this or previous issues of the paper, and no college yearbook was produced that year. Thus, other sources will have to be employed to reconstruct what happened on the football field in Albany. But for now, football on Palatine Hill...

History On Palatine Hill

Pioneer football teams provided Lewis & Clark College with an early standard of accomplishment which has since been emulated in other areas of athletics as well as in the College’s academic, cultural and community service endeavors. President John R. Howard, in paying tribute to the late Joe Huston, head coach for 18 years, recognized the Huston-coached teams of the late 1940s and early 1950s as ones that “gave this college a vision of excellence in achievement which has never been relinquished.” Lewis & Clark’s winning football tradition, maintained in concert with a high standard of academic excellence, has earned the College a deep respect throughout the community, state, and nation.

The College's return to football to begin "the modern era" in 1946 was modest, to say the least. Albany College, one of the founding members of the Northwest Conference in 1922, had dropped the sport in 1931. Several factors contributed to the sport's discontinuation, including a declining enrollment on the campus in Albany Oregon, and a parallel, worsening economic situation. The College began its move to Portland in 1935 and in 1937 closed its Albany campus. With no campus and only rented and borrowed facilities in the downtown Portland area, the College hovered on the edge of extinction until 1942 when, acquisition of the magnificent estate of former Portland merchant M. Lloyd Frank, and the arrival of an energetic and visionary new president in Dr. Morgan S. Odell, began things on an upward climb.

Surrender of Japan brought an end to World War II in 1945 and started an influx of veterans returning to college classrooms. Enrollment at Lewis & Clark took a dramatic jump in the mid-1940s and naturally, there arose an increased demand for intercollegiate athletics.

Dr. Odell hired Robert L. (Matty) Mathews, a veteran college coach with 37 years experience, to start an athletic program at the school. In that first year, he coached football and basketball. The Pioneer football team competed as an independent and finished with a 3-4-1 record, playing such teams as Reed, Pacific College (now George Fox) and the University of Portland JVs along with Linfield, College of Idaho and Humboldt State. The 1946 Pioneers opened the modern era on an optimistic note, defeating Oregon College of Education (now Western Oregon), 19-6. One of the big surprises of that first year was Lewis & Clark holding a strong Pacific University squad to a 0-0 tie.

Lewis & Clark rejoined the Northwest Conference the following year and took little time becoming one of the dominant powers in the league. The Pioneers won or tied for nine conference championships, finished in the top three 10 other times and won 58 percent of its conference games and 60 percent overall. The college produced more than its share of excitement on the football field; players and teams have become legend, but naturally, there have been disappointments and failures. On the following pages, we will attempt to summarize some of the seasons which have highlighted the "modern football era" on Palatine Hill.

1947: ENTER JOE HUSTON

Coach Matty Mathews was looking forward to his 38th year as a football coach with special zeal: Lewis & Clark had rejoined the Northwest Conference and, with most of his players returning from the previous season, Mathews figured to field a championship contender right away. But the local sports world and the College community was shocked when Coach Mathews died on September 1st, after the team had already started to gather for fall practice. President Odell immediately started to search for Mathews' successor. He was fortunate to be able to attract to Lewis & Clark one of the state's outstanding, young high school coaches in Joe Huston. Huston, who would coach the Pioneers for 18 years, had precious little time to get his team ready for its first season back in the NWC. Considering the circumstances, the record that year of 2-3-3 must be considered a success.

1949: LEWIS & CLARK'S FIRST FOOTBALL TITLE

The Pioneers gave indication they'd been challengers in 1948 when they finished in a tie for second in the NWC and an overall record of 6-2. A big win that year was a 14-13 upset of Conference favorite Willamette, breaking a 26-game Bearcat winning streak in NWC play. The 1949 Pioneers surprised many by tying the College of Idaho for the championship. Lewis & Clark earned the tie by upsetting heavily favored Pacific, 13-6, in the final league game.

In the final game of the season, Lewis & Clark lost to the University of Portland, 35-20, before 12,000 fans in Portland Civic Stadium (then known as Multnomah Stadium). It was one of the largest crowds ever to watch the Pioneers play football. Lewis & Clark stunned the Pilots, who were courting major-college football status, by taking a 20-0 lead to the locker room at halftime. University of Portland gained its composure and came back in the second half to claim the victory. That was the last college football game to be played by the University of Portland, which dropped the sport after the 1949 season for economic reasons.

1950: A LEGEND THAT STILL LIVES

The 1950 season produced a small-college football legend that has not been dimmed by subsequent college gridiron accomplishments of the past half-century. The undefeated and untied 1950 Lewis & Clark team was considered at the time to be one of the very best to play in the Northwest Conference. Some still will argue the point. The late Bill Hulen of The Oregonian extolled: "Lewis & Clark's football team was the very best I've ever seen in its class of competition." Oregon Journal Sports Editor George Pasero said that it was "one of the finest clubs in fundamentals with vicious tackling and exceptional blocking." And, the late Oregonian Sports Editor L. H. Gregory, who covered University of Oregon and Oregon State, that year called the Pioneers "the top football team in Oregon."

The 1950 team was deserving of the recognition. It won eight regular-season games without being pressed, then demolished previously unbeaten San Francisco State in the fifth annual Pear Bowl game in Medford, 61-7. The NCAA ranked the Pioneers second in its final poll of all the nation's small colleges (that being before the NAIA was formed). Lewis & Clark ranked first in the nation in rushing defense, second in total defense, second in rushing offense and eighth in total offense. The Pioneers outscored five Northwest Conference foes by a whopping 173-6 margin; they still hold the school record for the most points scored (327) in a season, and the fewest points (31) scored against. The 1950 team rushing game was awesome averaging 332 yards-per-game and 6.3 yards-per-carry, to its opponents' meager 50 yard-per-game average.

Of the team's 37 members, 11 earned first team All-Conference honors and another 12 made honorable mention. Reuben Baisch, who scored 14 touchdowns and gained 918 yards, was a first team Williamson System All-American and gained Associated Press honorable mention. Baisch, linebacker Bud Cox, fullback Stan Blair and offensive tackle Bill O'Hara all were named to the little All-Coast team. Captain of the great 1950 defensive unit was Fred Wilson, who 15 years later would succeed Joe Huston as the Pioneer head coach.

1951: OFFENSE AND UPSETS

Lewis & Clark tied for the NWC title in 1951 despite graduation of a big share of the 1950 team. The 1951 team was paced by a trio of lightning quick freshman running backs in Caley Cook (10.5 yards per carry), Neil Andersen (9.6 per carry) and Jim Smith (7.8 per carry). It wound up as the fifth-ranked team in the nation in total offense, 424.2 per game, which was then an L&C record. Lewis & Clark was forced to share the NWC crown with Pacific after the Boxers (then known as the Badgers) upset the Pioneers, 20-12 in L&C's homecoming game.

Coach for Pacific was Dr. Paul Stagg and the Forest Grove team was led in the victory by an All-American tailback named Frank Buckiewicz. Lewis & Clark wound up the season with an upset of its own, and a bizarre one at that. The Pioneers were scheduled to play a good Idaho State team from the Rocky Mountain Conference in a night game in Pocatello. Because of mechanical difficulties and extremely rough weather over the mountains, the plane carrying the L&C team did not arrive in Pocatello until 20 minutes after the game had been scheduled to start. Idaho State officials agreed to delay the game's start and some 6,000 fans sat patiently waiting the Pioneer arrival. When the plane did land, most of the Pioneer players were suffering from air sickness. They had to dress on the bus and were given little warm-up time once they arrived at the stadium. Despite all the handicaps, and the fact that Idaho State was favored by three touchdowns, L&C registered an amazing 40-2 upset. It was no contest, with the Portland team scoring in every quarter. Rookie Jim Smith scored four touchdowns to lead the Pioneers.

1955: TWO 7-6 LOSSES SPOIL GREAT SEASON

Coach Huston was preparing for a big one in 1955; his team the previous year had surprised many by gaining a share of the NWC championship with an 8-2 record. The entire Pioneer backfield in 1954 had earned All-Conference honors and three of the four were back, along with most of the regulars in the line. Add to this collection of talent a rookie by the name of Mel Gillett, who was the outstanding player in that summer's Shrine Game and was one of the most sought-after prep stars in the state that year and the Pioneers were poised for success. L&C opened the season with a disappointing 7-6 loss to heavily-favored Montana State in Bozeman. The Bobcats got their TD in the final minutes after a blocked punt. L&C stormed to impressive victories in the next six games, outscoring its opponents 208-63,

Then, in the final game it was Pacific again, upsetting the Pioneers 7-6 and dumping them into a title tie with College of Idaho, a team they had beaten earlier, 34-14. Fullback Earl Engebretson and guard Dean Soule earned All-American honors that year and five Pioneer backs--Engebretson, quarterback Jim Johnson, and halfbacks Gene Flippin, Frankie Fair and Gillett, all earned All-Conference honors. A tackle by the name of Mike Clock was also named to the All-NWC team. He was the first of three brothers from Newberg to earn All-NWC lineman honors for L&C. Clock went on to become a highly successful head wrestling coach and faculty member at Pacific University.

1958-62: MC DANIEL, GRILL, HERGERT & CO.

This period saw no Conference championships, but the Pioneers, in that span, went 27-17-2 and never finished lower than third in league standings. It did usher in the era of three of the finest athletes ever to put on the Orange and Black on Palatine Hill. Royce McDaniel came to L&C in 1957 and was the team's starting quarterback virtually from the day he set foot on campus. The Sweet Home, Oregon product also was a standout guard for four years in basketball and a good enough outfielder in baseball to be offered a bonus contract following his senior year. McDaniel earned 12 varsity letters in his four years at L&C, and was named to nine All-Conference teams--twice in football, three times in basketball and all four years in baseball.

Another player to come out of the Willamette Valley, this time from Albany, was Gary Grill in 1957. A halfback with tremendous speed and balance he could turn the corner better than any player in the school's history. He led the Pioneers in rushing for four years--1957, 1958, 1960 and 1961 (he missed the 1959 season). Grill's performances were next to sensational week after week but what he did to Southern Oregon his sophomore year is still in the record book. That afternoon in Griswold Stadium, Grill turned the corner the first three times he had the ball and sped for touchdowns on runs of 75, 62 and 36 yards. Coach Huston rested him after five carries in which he amassed 175 yards--the Pioneers won 60-13. Grill finished his career with 3,422 yards rushing and a 6.3 yards per carry average.

The player who gained more yards in four years was Grill's running mate in the backfield in 1960 and '61, Mickey Hergert. Hergert, who came out of the great Jefferson High School football program of the late 1950s that had produced such greats as Mel Renfro and Heisman Trophy winner Terry Baker. Hergert's 3,836 yards rushing in four years was just 108 yards short of the NAIA national rushing record at that time. Hergert, who joined the L&C staff as head baseball and assistant football coach in 1968, was a running back with exceptional balance, instinct and leg power. He also became a prolific scorer. Hergert tallied 15 touchdowns his junior year then came back to break his own record with 17 TDs and 102 points as a senior.

Hergert, a three-time All-NWC selection, was named to the NAIA All-American third team as a senior. His biggest game was against Pacific Lutheran as a senior when he scored five TDs as the Pioneers routed the Lutes, 63-27. Hergert led the team in rushing two seasons while his teammate Grill topped him twice, in 1960 and 1961. In 1960, Grill had 971 yards and Hergert 967; in 1961 it was 960 for Grill and 929 for Hergert--enough to frustrate any defense. Pat Clock and Don Lund were a pair of three-time All-NWC picks.

1963: UNDEFEATED, UNTIED AND UNINVITED

"Undefeated, United and Uninvited." So went the proud epitaph on the 1963 season in which Coach Huston's Pioneers scored eight wins without a loss. The uninvited part of the phrase was added after NAIA officials passed over the Pioneers in selecting teams for the post-season playoff bowls. L&C was only pressed once during the season, that being a 16-14 decision at Chico State. The Pioneers outscored five NWC foes, 179-27.

While Hergert justifiably gained wide recognition for his contributions to the 1963 success, there were many others. Gary Boggs, considered one of the best offensive tackles ever to play for L&C, was named as a first-team NAIA All-American. Guard Jan Kelley and middle guard Mike Kostrba were stellar while a kicker by the name of Ken Byers converted on 33 of 40 PATs that season. Quarterback Bill Henselman completed 53-of-97 passes for 806 yards and had only 3 intercepted all season. The next year would be Joe Huston's last as head coach of the Pioneers. It was a rebuilding year for L&C, with most of its stars, Hergert, Henselman, Boggs, graduated. Except for a late-game rally by Linfield, that pulled a 21-13 win out for the Wildcats and gave them the NWC title, the Pioneers would have had another undefeated season and another championship. As it was, L&C finished 6-1-1 and second in the league. Huston had two All-Americans on that team--defensive tackle Roger Paul and linebacker Jack Hambleton.

1965-66: A FRED WILSON TURNAROUND

Fred Wilson, who had been Huston's assistant for the previous eight years, took over as Pioneer head coach in 1965. With a number of returnees from the 1964 team and some fine looking rookies, Wilson had high hopes. But Wilson ran into the worst injury jinx in the modern football era on Palatine Hill. After the fourth game, 17 players Wilson had counted as starters were lost for the season because of injuries. The new coach had to press into service as starters a number of rookies he had hoped to be able to bring along slowly. Still, the Pioneers finished 3-5, with four of the losses by a total of 18 points. L&C was fifth in league standings that year and experts weren't expecting much from Palatine Hill when the 1966 campaign got underway. But Wilson worked his magic, and the Pioneers climbed the heights to win the 1966 NWC championship straight-out. In fact, only a 22-16 loss to strong Cal Lutheran in Thousand Oaks in the season's opener, marred the Pioneers record which read 8-1 at season's end.

L&C shut out three Conference foes and allowed only four TDs to three others, outscoring them all 155-27. A big win that season was a 19-17 upset of non-league foe University of Puget Sound. There were all kinds of standout players that season: sophomore quarterback Skip Swyers who passed for 1,120 yards; split end Jack Head who caught a school record 44 passes for 657 yards; Tom Boyle, who led the team in rushing and shared scoring honors with Swyers with 42 points each; and linemen like Bob Lindemann, a second team NAIA All-American offensive tackle, Jim Grady, Gary Peterson, end Bart Wilson and safety Dee Wolfe. Head, Swyers, and Boyle all gained NAIA honorable mention. L&C tied for the crown again in 1967 with virtually the same cast.

A sidelight to the success in 1966 was a tragedy that nearly cancelled the whole thing. Shortly after fall practice started, a fire destroyed the Lewis & Clark gymnasium and with it most of L&C's football equipment. With only two weeks till the start of the season, Coach Wilson and his aides were scrambling to find equipment enough to field a team; the new uniforms arrived virtually on game day and makeshift dressing facilities were used.

1969: JON JAQUA MAKES THE CHANGE

L&C's last championship of the 60s was shared four ways, with Linfield, Pacific Lutheran and Whitman also owning a piece of the crown. That was 1969. It was the same year that a two-time all-conference defensive back was pressed into service as a running back. And Jon Jaqua took it in stride. He went on to lead L&C in rushing and scoring and was named all-conference on offense. But Jaqua, who is a cousin of three other Jaquas who have played for L&C in the 1970s--Evan, Dave and John--wasn't through. He had a burning desire to play professional football. The NFL clubs looked him over and said he was too small for a running back. He was completely passed over in the draft. Then the late Vince Lombardi okayed his signing as a free agent with the Washington Redskins. He made it through tryout camp and the final cuts under new 'Skin coach George Allen to become the first Lewis & Clark graduate ever to make it with the pros. Jon not only made it but became a standout on the Redskin specialty teams and even saw some action at defensive back before an injury eventually forced him to the sidelines and out of the game after three years.

1969-72: THE PAT MIGUEL ERA

In 1969, a freshman quarterback from Lemoore, California, arrived on campus. This talented signal caller was destined in four years to break virtually every passing record in the books, including several Northwest Conference marks. In all, he set 16 passing and offense records for the College. His best year was 1971 when he completed 144-of-253 passes for 1,860 yards and 13 TDs. The .569 completion mark was also a record. Ironically, the school single-season rushing record was also set in that 1971 season when Mike Gano, a hard-running tailback from Rainier, gained 1,075 yards--8 more than Hergert in 1962. Miguel was blessed with the finest set of pass receivers ever to be collected on one team in the NWC in the years 1970 through 1972. The group included Bill Gassner, Mike Strader, Jerry Warren, Gary Daniels and Doug Skille. These five caught 326 passes for 4,869 yards and 35 touchdowns in the three-year span. At that time, their total represented nearly 25 percent of all the passing yardage in 30 years of football on Palatine Hill.

1976: SCOTT MC CORD, "RUN AND SHOOT" AND NATIONAL RECORDS

Pat Miguel's passing records stood until 1976 when a junior quarterback by the name of Scott McCord, at the throttle of a new "run-and-shoot" double slot offense, literally hurled L&C into the national limelight. McCord, a junior from Gresham's Centennial High School, was only the eighth best passing quarterback in the eight-team Northwest Conference his first two years. The Pioneers had struggled to an unimpressive 1-8 finish in 1975 and McCord, the regular QB that year, was considering asking to be moved to defense. But Coach Wilson decided to open up with the pass-oriented double-slot offense and tabbed McCord as the man to make it click. McCord's hard work over the summer in improving his passing arm, and his quick mind and leadership qualities helped transform the Pioneers in one season into the most prolific passing team in the history of small college football. Lewis & Clark, which had completed only 86 passes for 1,100 yards in 1975, exploded for a national record 3,407 yards on 260 completions in 435 attempts the following year.

McCord personally accounted for 3,146 yards passing on 242 completions in 392 attempts and 25 touchdowns. His yards and game average (349.6) were both NAIA national one-season records. Scott also set a one-season national mark in total offense with 3,107 yards. McCord was named to the NAIA Division 2 All-American second team but more significantly shared NAIA national Player-of-the-Year honors with three-time first team All-American quarterback Joe Washington of Texas Lutheran. McCord was also a finalist for Oregon Athlete of the Year at the annual Hayward Banquet of Champions. A shoulder injury in the second game of the 1977 season limited his effectiveness as a senior but Scott wound up with his name on no less than 31 national, Northwest Conference and Lewis & Clark passing and total offense records.

1978-81: THE DAN JONES ERA

When Dan Jones arrived on Palatine Hill as a freshman in 1978, some people predicted the young man from Portland's Marshall High School would become one of the finest all-around athletes ever to set foot on the Lewis & Clark campus.

When the 6-1, 195-pound scholar athlete received his degree four years later, he had fulfilled those predictions abundantly. He earned twelve varsity letters, was a four-year starter in football and baseball and three years in basketball. He earned All-American honors twice in baseball and twice in football. As a senior, he was selected to the NAIA All-America second team and the AP college division honorable mention list.

Even more important, he was selected 1st team Academic All-American (College Division) in football and baseball and was on the regional academic All-American team in basketball. Jones was selected to the All-Northwest Conference and All-NAIA District 2 1st teams three years each and as a senior not only was all-conference and all-district as a wide receiver but was also selected on the first team as a place kicker. Jones led Lewis & Clark all four years in pass receiving and scoring, and was the Conference leader in both categories as a sophomore and senior. He set L&C and NWC records for reception yards in his career (2,704) and became the second all-time leading pass receiver (148 catches) and scorer (218 points). Further, during his career he set every school game, season and career field goal kicking record, including the longest at 56 yards. His senior year, he was successful on 8-of-12 field goal attempts--his successes averaged 43.8 yards in distance! In baseball, he finished with a career batting average of .366 with 137 runs batted in 130 games; in basketball, he averaged 11.1 points a game as a point guard and shot 50 percent from the field. In the classroom, he compiled a 3.43 accumulative grade average as a business and administrative studies major.

The list of honors he garnered in his four-year career was substantial, but none was more deserving than a nine-page spread about Dan Jones in the May 11, 1981 issue of Sports Illustrated.

1986: A REMARKABLE HOMECOMING

The 1986 Pioneer football team had little to brag about, competing in the rugged Columbia Football League, as they earned just one victory in nine games – but, oh what a victory it was.

A homecoming crowd of nearly 2,000 saw the Pioneers mount a furious fourth quarter comeback to top the Pacific University Boxers 47-46. It was a game that coach Don McCarty called, “The greatest comeback in my 23 years of coaching.” Pacific got a fast start to lead 29-7 early in the second period and, with tailback/kick returner Mike McCarty injured, it didn't look good for the Pioneers. However, L&C scored twice before the half to narrow the margin to 29-22. Pacific again pulled away in the second half and led 43-22 going into the fourth quarter. But, in the space of eight minutes, Tim Norton, Ken Oellette and Craig Nelson all scored on touchdown runs to give the Pioneers a 44-43 lead. The Boxers marched back to kick a field goal – after L&C defensive back Gary Peterson knocked away a third down pass in the end zone with about three minutes remaining and left the Pioneers with one last gasp.

L&C drove down field but had to convert a big fourth-and-nine play (the fifth fourth down conversion of the day for the Pioneers in as many tries) on a pass from Norton to Darren Dimmick to set up the game-winning field goal. With 27 seconds showing on the game clock, little Darren Oreste, a 140 pound freshman, attempted his first-ever college field goal and split the uprights from 27 yards away. L&C had out-scored Pacific 25-3 in the final period to win 47-46.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS: AGAIN

In 1987 and 1988, the Pioneers played in the Mt. Ranier (Northern) League of the CFA. Fred Wilson came back for one season, 1987, bridging the gap between Don McCarty's coaching tenure and the beginning of a new era on Palatine Hill: the Tom Smythe years. Smythe took the core from a 0-9 1987 squad to a Conference championship in 1989, this time in the Mt. Hood (Southern) League of the CFA. Smythe, with an impressive track record of success wherever he coached, led the Pioneers to two Conference titles and two more second-place finishes in his six years at the helm. The Pioneers won the championship outright in 1989, earning a first-round post-season playoff game at Central Washington. With horrible weather conditions and temperatures below freezing, the team fell 51-0 in a game that most would rather not remember. In 1991, the Pioneers shared the title with Linfield, and earned a post-season matchup with the Wildcats, falling 59-30.

Dan Ruhl was one of the key factors in the success of the late 80s-early 90s Pioneers. Ruhl scored 54 touchdowns in his four seasons in the Orange and Black, breaking a 28-year old scoring record by finishing with 326 career points. In 1991, Ruhl scored 20 touchdowns. He accumulated over 4,000 yards rushing as a Pioneer with five games of over 200 yards.

BACK IN THE NCIC/NWC AND INTO THE NCAA

In 1996, the Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges (NCIC) resumed governance of football from the CFA, changing the name of the Conference to the Northwest Conference. It wasn't the only change for the Pioneers with Chuck Solberg taking over the coaching duties in 1994. The Pioneers also made the transition from NAIA to NCAA III in his tenure. Though out of the CFA, the Pioneers continued to play Eastern Oregon, Western Oregon, Simon Fraser, and Southern Oregon as non-Conference games throughout the Solberg era.

FRONT ROW SEAT FOR RECORD-BREAKING PERFORMANCES

After spending five seasons as an assistant coach, former Pioneer standout Mike Fanger took over the head coaching position, replacing the retiring Chuck Solberg. Fanger had the best seats in the house to watch his passing records fall to the Pioneers' top gun, Trent Thompson. Thompson led the Pioneer offense into the new millennia, lining up under center for the home opener against Redlands in 2000. 1,259 passing yards later, Thompson would erase his coach's records for career passing yards, attempts, completions, touchdown passes, and total offense. Though victories were hard to come by in the Thompson/ Fanger years, Thompson did lead his team to a very memorable victory in the Wagon Wheel game at Willamette in 2000.

SHORTENED SEASON

2005 was, beyond a doubt, the darkest year in the history of the Pioneer football program. Citing low participation numbers in key positions (offensive and defensive line), half of the football season was cancelled. The small but determined Pioneers battled through their four-game schedule. It was a testament to the focus and poise of the young men on that squad that they managed to put the distractions hovering around the program aside and concentrate on playing football. Though the team came up winless, it was definitely not due to lack of effort.

The players weren't the only ones to battle through 2005 and come out stronger. The program itself went through an outside advisory council, internal examination, and personnel change, coming out on the other side with a full schedule of games for 2006 and the beginnings of a new era of football on Palatine Hill. This new era had a new leader in Chris Sulages. Sulages was promoted from assistant coach to lead the Pioneers into the new era of football on Palatine Hill.

Pioneer Head Coaches

Matty Mathews, 1946

Robert L. (Matty) Mathews was a highly respected football coach with 37 years experience at such schools as the University of Washington, University of Idaho and University of Portland. President Morgan S. Odell brought him to Palatine Hill in 1945 to put together an athletics program for the College.

His 1946 football team, made up primarily of veterans returning from service in World War II, played an independent schedule and registered a respectable 3-4-1 record. The team had no home field and practiced at Collins View School and on the grassy area of the campus's formal gardens above the outdoor swimming pool. In addition to football, Mathews also coached the 1945-46 Pioneer basketball team. He died on September 1, 1947, while football players were gathering for the start of fall practice.

Joe Huston, 1947-1964

Joe Huston was one of Oregon's real gentlemen of athletics. His coaching accomplishments at Lewis & Clark put him in the front ranks of the nation's small college football coaches. During his 18 years as head coach, his teams went 100-52-7, won six Northwest Conference championships and had a winning record against every league foe. His teams twice went undefeated and had only five losing seasons.

He earned numerous honors, including being named Oregon's Man of the Year in Sports at the 1963 Hayward Banquet of Champions. He twice was named NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year and was runner up for the National honor in 1963. He is an inductee in the NAIA District 2 Hall of Fame. Joe was a place-kicker and guard for University of Oregon football teams of the late 1930s. He started his coaching career at Bend, Oregon in 1940 and in his first season led Bend High School to Oregon's first prep state championship.

He moved to Roosevelt High in Portland in 1941, then served as a Navy Lieutenant during World War II. He returned to coaching after the war and immediately led Grant High of Portland to the 1946 state championship.

In addition to coaching and teaching duties at Lewis & Clark, he also served as Dean of Men from 1951-1960. He became Director of Athletics after giving up the football post in 1964. He retired from the college after 25 years of service in 1972 and died on March 21, 1975 at the age of 60.

Fred Wilson, 1965-1983, 1987

Fred O. Wilson, a native of Warrenton, Ore., joined the Lewis & Clark staff in 1957 as head baseball coach and assistant football coach.

Wilson, who graduated from Lewis & Clark in 1951, was a standout football, basketball and baseball player for the Pioneers. He was a defensive captain of the great undefeated 1950 team and was an all-NWC defensive back.

Wilson took over the head coaching job in 1965 when Huston moved to the athletics director's post. When Huston retired in 1972, Wilson also took on the duties of Director of Athletics. He also served as the Pioneer golf coach.

He coached at Rainier and Albany, Oregon high schools before returning to his alma mater in 1957. He was named the NAIA District 2 Coach of the Year in 1966 after leading his team all the way back from a disastrous 1965 season to the league championship the following year. He resigned at the end of the 1983 season to devote full time attention to duties as athletic director but returned one year as interim coach in 1987.

Wilson retired from the college in 1989. His 20-year coaching record on the Hill is 79-99-2.

Don McCarty, 1984-1986

Don McCarty came to Lewis & Clark in 1984 with a 17-year record of developing winning high school football programs. McCarty had been highly successful at Oregon City where his teams were 38-7 in his final five seasons there. Before that, he coached Centennial of Gresham to the 1972 state title and had strong teams at Lebanon High School. McCarty was a 1963 graduate of Lewis & Clark where he was a two-time all-NWC defensive back in 1961 and 1962 and captain of the defensive unit. In his three years at Lewis & Clark, McCarty compiled a 7-20-0 (.350) overall record. McCarty's 1984 team was the last LC team to play in the Northwest Conference, finishing 0-4-0. He also coached the school's first 2 entries in the then newly formed Columbia Football League (CFL). His 1985 and 1986 teams finished with identical 1-5-0 records in the new conference.

Tom Smythe, 1988-1993

Tom Smythe returned to his alma mater in 1988 after a story book ending at Lakeridge High School in Lake Oswego. His final team there went undefeated and claimed Tom's first Oregon AAA State Championship trophy. He completed his career at Lakeridge with a 157-32-1 record over 17 seasons. His teams won eight league titles and made 11 state playoff appearances.

In his first season at Lewis & Clark, the Pioneers began the season with two consecutive victories before suffering seven straight losses. The next season, 1989, the Pioneers turned the corner of mediocrity, going 7-2 and claiming the first winning season on Palatine Hill in 10 years and the first championship in 20 years. Two years later, the Pioneers went 7-1-1 and tied for the Conference championship. Over his six-year career at Lewis & Clark, Smythe tallied a 29-25-2 record, leading the Pioneers to a Conference title and two national playoff appearances.

Chuck Solberg, 1994-1998

Chuck Solberg took the reigns of the program in 1994 in the most challenging of circumstances, 3 days prior to the first Pioneer game. Solberg, a legendary high school coach in both Oregon and Washington, came to Lewis & Clark in 1988 as the Pioneers defensive coordinator. He was best known for his time at Corvallis High School in Corvallis, Oregon where his teams won two Oregon State Championships. He would go on to assist at Oregon State University, then return to the Washington High School ranks before coming to Lewis & Clark. His tenure as head coach at Lewis & Clark would not produce a championship team, as he had done in every previous job he had held, but he did provide the stability for the program to once again build. His 1995 team went 5-4 overall and his 1996 team, while only managing a 4-6 record, was perhaps, one of the more exciting teams of the era. Unfortunately, the Pioneers lost several games that year in the final minute of play.

In his five seasons, Solberg compiled a 14-32-0 (.304) overall record, including a 6-19-0 (.240) Conference record. Solberg also managed the Pioneers through the transition from the NAIA and the Columbia Football League into the NCAA III and back into the Northwest Conference.

Mike Fanger, 1999-2003

Mike Fanger took over the Pioneer football program after spending five seasons as the offensive coordinator and quarterback coach under Chuck Solberg. If there were two things that Fanger knew well, it was Pioneer offense and Pioneer quarterbacking. A two-time All-CFA selection and an NAIA All-American honorable mention Pioneer quarterback himself, he seemed the natural choice to coach the offense upon his return to the states after serving as a coach and player in professional leagues in the United Kingdom and Austria. Fanger was also the natural choice to succeed Solberg when he retired from Palatine Hill.

Fanger got off to a rocky start, going 0-9 in his first season of 1999. Fanger earned his first collegiate coaching victory the first game of the 2000 campaign, edging out the University of Redlands in the familiar surroundings of Griswold Stadium 21-17. Fanger also pulled off a huge victory that season, winning the battle of the Wagon Wheel with Willamette, edging the Bearcats 23-20 in Salem. It was the first time in seven years the Pioneers had won back the wheel. The Pioneers finished 2000 with a 3-6 mark (1-4 in conference). The duplicated those records every subsequent season of Fanger's coaching tenure.

Fanger was elected into the Lewis & Clark College Sports Hall of Fame in 2000 for his accomplishments as a player. At the time of his induction, he held 11 different school records. During his five-year head coaching stint, he saw five of his records fall at the hands of his quarterback Trent Thompson.

In his five seasons, Fanger compiled a 12-42 record (.222) overall and a 4-25 (.137) record in the Northwest Conference.

Roger VanDeZande, 2004-2005

Roger VanDeZande had the second-shortest tenure of any Pioneer football coach. Only Matty Matthews, the first Pioneer football coach who passed away a week before the start of his second season, had a shorter tenure. VanDeZande was winless in the Northwest Conference and won just one game in his two seasons at the helm. He left the College after the shortened 2005 season.

Chris Sulages, 2006-2014

Chris Sulages went from being an assistant coach to taking over the reigns of the program at a crucial juncture in the program's history. Under Sulages, the Pioneers fielded a full team and played a full season in 2006 after it looked like football's end might be in sight after the 2005 season. Sulages continues to build the program, actively recruiting talented student-athletes to help rebuild the Lewis & Clark football tradition of excellence.

Jay Locey, 2015-2021

Locey was named the 10th head coach in Pioneer history in December of 2014. Locey is no stranger to the Northwest Conference, having served as head coach of the Linfield Wildcats from 1996 to 2006. Considered one of the most successful coaches in small college football, Locey has been named the Northwest Conference Coach of the Year five times, earning an 84-18 overall record with the Wildcats. Under Locey, the Wildcats won the 2004 NCAA Division III National Championship and made the Division III playoffs six times. Locey guided Linfield to 41 consecutive regular season wins from 2001-05, including a 23-game unbeaten streak in the Northwest Conference. In total, Locey has coached 16 Division III All-Americans. Locey led the Pioneers to their most wins in a two-season period in his final two seasons (2019 and 2021). He retired in February of 2021.

Joe Bushman, 2022-present

Bushman was named head coach in the winter of 2022. He led the Pioneers to a win in their first-ever Northwest Scholars Series game in his first game as head coach, when the Pioneers downed the University of Puget Sound 41-15. The Pioneers posted four wins, tied for their most since 2011, and won their Wagon Wheel rivalry game against Willamette for a record-setting fifth-straight time.
