# HARRIS FIELD AT ED CHEFF STADIUM



Lloyd Harris had a vision back in the 1930s of establishing a quality baseball field in Lewiston. Known as 'Mr. Baseball,' Harris was a shrewd businessman and baseball fan, and he successfully spearheaded an effort to establish a park.

Today, he would be proud to see what has become of his vision.

During the first few decades after the park was built, small improvements to Harris Field helped it become home to a Class A minor league baseball team for the Oakland Athletics. Harris Field also was the home to the Lewis-Clark State College baseball program, which officially started in 1971, and the Lewis-Clark Twins and Cubs American Legion programs.

The big changes started in 1984 when LCSC served as host to the Avista NAIA World Series for the first time. Fast forward from the first Series to 2020 when Harris Field will host the tournament for the 29th time with more than one million fans passing through its gates. About the only thing that is still the same from 1984 to today is the layout of the field. Everything else, from the grass to the concession area to the grandstand, has changed.



Prior to the 1984 Series, the only seating was the grandstand behind home plate. To help accommodate the expected larger crowds for the first event, LCSC rented and bought bleachers from the University of Idaho and Lewiston High and put them down the left-field line. Permanent bleachers eventually were added behind the left-field fence.

The first seating project eliminated the aluminum bleachers in the grandstand behind home plate and also saw the present press box constructed, which doubled the size of the old press box.

The construction continued with the building of the seating down the first- and third-base lines, along with improvements to the outfield bleachers. A lighting project more than a decade ago had a huge impact. No longer would television broadcasts have a problem with deep fly balls that seemed to disappear into the darkness of the night.



In 2016, the field was dug up and leveled, which eliminated a drop of approximately three feet from home plate to the right-field fence. With the field dug up, it was an optimum time to install a new irrigation system and build new dugouts that were installed below ground level instead of being field level. Finally, a new backstop area was installed.

The most significant makeover occurred in 2017 and turned the facility into one of the finest college baseball venues in the Pacific Northwest.

Under the leadership of then-athletic director Gary Picone, LCSC put together a four-phase project that completely changed the park. This featured new seating, a new façade, and even a new name.

The project, however, didn't come together that easily because of the unusual winter weather Lewiston had. At one point in February, about

The baseball field at Lewis-Clark State College is named Harris Field after Lewiston businessman and sports enthusiast Lloyd Harris. The field had several names before permanently becoming Harris Field on March 4, 1950 in a small ceremony prior to a game.

Harris touched the lives of several baseball players in the Lewiston-Clarkston Valley with his life-long devotion to the sport, particularly with youth and college baseball. A semi-pro baseball player himself, Harris settled in Lewiston in 1917 with his wife Bess. Lloyd helped organize the semi-pro Lewiston Indians squad of the Western International League in 1938, and then a year later, helped organize the Pioneer League in both Idaho and Utah. Harris also had a hand in helping establish the Lewiston Baseball Club in 1952, which later became the Lewis-Clark Broncs Class A team.

Harris was a staunch supporter of the community and the college. He raised money for scholarships, lobbied the Legislature, and donated several books to the library. He is still remembered by his nickname, "Mr. Baseball."

Harris passed away on Jan. 28, 1969 at the age of 85.

(story continued from page 4) a week before the scheduled season opener, crews were installing the new grandstand seats in a major snowstorm in an effort to complete the project on time.

The first phase of the project was the demolition and removal of the old grandstands and seats, which took place in the fall of 2016. A new foundation was poured and a new grandstand was built. The new seats installed allowed for more seating and leg room to help with comfort. That phase of the project cost approximately \$950,000.

The second phase is noticeable in right field with the addition of a state-of-the-art video display board, which replaces the old scoreboard and readerboard. The new board's dimensions are 24-feet, 4-inches tall by 32-feet, 9-inches wide. The cost was approximately \$300,000, which was generously donated by Potlatch #1 Federal Credit Union. The new board has the capabilities of showing videos and game replays, and has a clear view regardless of the location of the sun. The installation of the new board took place in February 2017.



The next phase was the renovation of the first- and third-base decking and seating areas, which was completed in April 2017. Over the winter of 2017-18, new seating was installed in both the left- and right-field bleachers – courtesy of the generous donations of lumber by Bennett Lumber and Idaho Forest Group.

The renovated seating area is connected to the Ed Cheff Stadium, which is named in honor of LCSC's legendary coach, Ed Cheff. During his tenure with the Warriors, Cheff won 16 national titles and is the NAIA's all-time leader in wins at one school.

In April 2017, LCSC held a ceremony to honor Cheff and dedicate the ballpark in his name. Cheff, who now lives in Sequim, Wash., posted a 1,705-430-2 record for a .799 winning percentage. Under his leadership, LCSC won at least 40 games for 30 successive seasons and produced 114 draft picks in the Major League Draft, with 16 of those players making it to the big leagues.



The stadium phase also included the completion of the backside of the grandstand area with the addition of brick columns and displays for LCSC baseball, along with a vendor area. The brick façade continues down both the left-field and right-field bleachers.

The construction also changed the look under the bleachers. Instead of the metal structure that used to exist underneath the grandstands, there is usable storage space or space that can be converted to locker rooms. This phase cost \$250,000.

In all, the changes at the ballpark in 2017 totaled more than \$1.5 million. Over the past five years, more than \$2 million was spent on the field and stadium.

The improvements are part of LCSC's on-going efforts to continue to be the host for the annual Avista NAIA World Series. LCSC recently received a three-year extension to host the tournament through 2024.

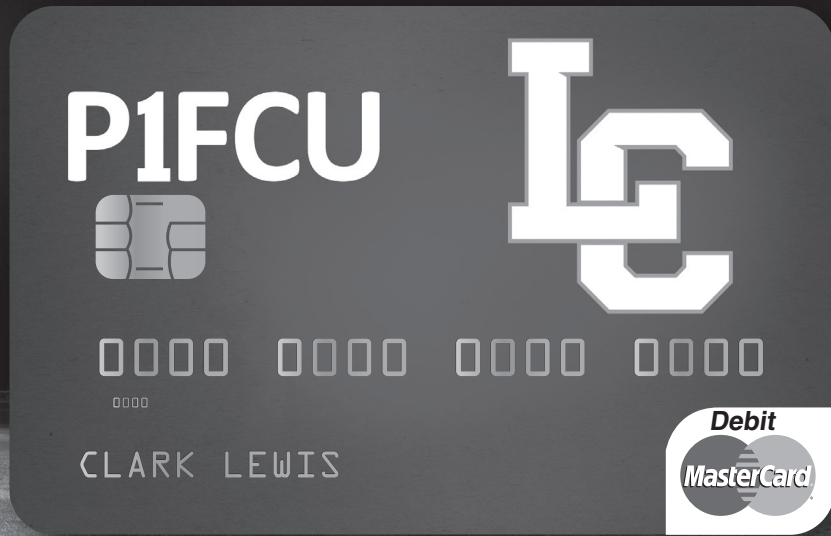

# HEAD COACH JAKE TAYLOR

---

**Third season | Lewis-Clark State College | Rocky Mountain HS (Idaho)  
Member of 1992 Avista NAIA World Series Championship Team**

---

Jake Taylor, a standout for Lewis-Clark State's 1992 National Championship team, will begin his third season as the head coach of Warrior Baseball in 2021. His second year at the helm was cut short due to the novel Coronavirus, ending the season with a record of 15-5, 11-2 in NAIA West play.

In his first year at the helm, the Warriors compiled a 35-15-1 record, and finished first in the NAIA West Conference with a 24-8 record, and Taylor was named the conference Co-Coach of the Year. Taylor had seven players named to the all-conference team, including the Player and Pitcher of the year. The Warriors put together a season-long 10-game winning streak in 2019, and were 20-7 at home. LCSC went 1-2 in the NAIA World Series, winning its opener 10-5 over Freed-Hardeman.

Darren Trainer became Coach Taylor's first NAIA All-American in 2019, and the Warriors were ranked No. 19 in the final NAIA baseball poll.

Taylor is a 1994 graduate of LCSC, after playing in 1992 and 1993, with a degree in Kinesiology/Education. He is in the Warrior Athletics Hall of Fame as a member of the 1992 championship team. While at LC, he was a team captain, team MVP, two-time Gold Glove winner (career fielding percentage of .963), and a two-time member of the NAIA all-District I team. He also was highly recognized as a scholar-athlete as an NAIA Academic All-American and Diamond Award/Outstanding Scholar-Athlete in 1993.

After completing his playing career in 1993, he served as a graduate assistant for the Warriors for one season before embarking on his own coaching career. He was the Idaho High School Coach of the Year in 2005 while at Boise's Borah High School, and the 2012 recipient while at Meridian's Rocky Mountain High School. He coached five conference championship teams, two state title winners and one American Legion champion in compiling 350 career victories. His 2015 Rocky Mountain team was undefeated at 27-0 in the regular season, a feat for which he was honored as the Idaho Baseball Distinguished Coach of the Year.

He is a native of Troutdale, Ore., and graduated from Mt. Hood Community College, where he was highly honored as a student-athlete, before transferring to LCSC.

## **Allen Balmer**

### **Assistant Coach – 13th Season**

A Lewiston native, Allen Balmer enters his 13th season as an assistant coach at Lewis-Clark State College in the 2021 season. He works primarily with position players and is instrumental in both infielder and hitter instruction. He has led recruiting efforts for the Warriors since 2013. During those years the Warriors have seen 17 players drafted and two more sign professional contracts, with Seth Brown making his MLB debut in 2019. With Balmer on staff, the Warriors have seen much success on the field winning three NAIA National Championships. Many of the players also have had great success with 14 of them earning All-American awards.

Balmer played four seasons with the Warriors from 2002-06 and enjoyed tremendous success. He started all four seasons at third base and helped the Warriors capture two national titles, including the championship in the 50th Annual Avista NAIA World Series at Lewiston during his senior year in 2006. He earned the tournament's MVP award after collecting 12 hits, scoring six runs and driving in seven during a five-game stretch. Balmer went on to sign a free agent contract with the San Francisco Giants and played for one year. Overall at LCSC, Balmer recorded 245 hits, established a batting average of .341 and averaged less than 12 errors a season. During his senior year, he hit .377 with a team-leading seven home runs during the regular season. Balmer is a second-generation Warrior baseball player. His father, Gary, was a standout for the Warriors in the early 1980s.

Balmer and his wife, Jenny, live in Lewiston with their three children – Brody, Avery and Reese Lynn.

## **Billy Silvestri**

### **Assistant Coach – Eighth Season**

Billy Silvestri enters his eighth season as an assistant coach with the Warrior Baseball team in 2021. He coaches first base and primarily works with catchers and outfielders. Off the field, Silvestri coordinates recruiting in the Northern and Southern California areas. He was a key part of the coaching staff for the 2015, 2016 and 2017 National Championship teams.

Silvestri graduated from LCSC in 2013 after playing for the Warriors during the 2011 and 2012 seasons. In his Warrior career, he hit .316 with a home run and 54 RBI. He also amassed 103 hits and scored 43 runs in his two seasons in Lewiston.

Balderas is in his fourth season as an assistant coach after playing for two seasons and helping win two Avista NAIA World Series titles for the Warriors. He pitched the final two innings of the championship game his senior year. In 2017, he led LCSC with four saves after appearing in 17 games and averaging 2.33 innings per appearance. As a junior, he had 14 appearances, all in relief, and posted a 4-0 record with a 2.33 ERA and was second on the team with four saves with 27 innings pitched with an outstanding strikeout/walk ratio with 28 strikeouts and only two walks. He had three outings where he pitched at least two innings and did not give up a hit, walk or run.

He came to LCSC from Palomar College where he helped the Comets to California State Finals in 2015. He was a 2015 Honorable Mention All-PCAC after finishing with a 4-0 record in 31 appearances with a 1.12 ERA in 32.2 innings pitched. He also played first base and appeared in 57 games, starting 43, hitting .307 with 51 hits in 166 at-bats, posting 34 RBI and scoring 29 runs.

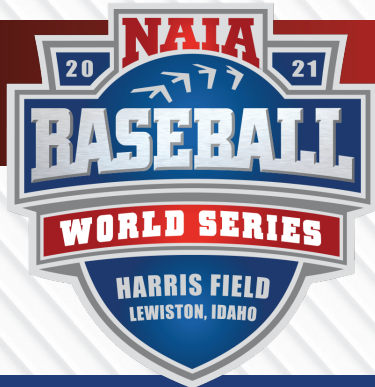

# MILESTONES IN LCSC BASEBALL HISTORY

---

## SEPTEMBER 8, 1910

University of Michigan graduate Guy Chiesman jumped a contract with the Detroit Tigers to teach math and coach baseball at the Lewiston State Normal School (LCSC's name from 1893-1946), a two-year teacher's college.

## MAY 3, 1946

Coach Merel Stonebraker's North Idaho Teachers College (now LCSC) Loggers "lambasted" Eastern Oregon College 17-2 at Bengal Field behind the three-hit, 16-strikeout pitching of Carmen Ulrich. Centerfielder Dwight Church led the Logger hitters with a 4-for-5 effort, including a "devastating" grand slam.

## MAY 16, 1947

In the season's final home game, an enthusiastic crowd (said to be the largest ever to witness an NICE athletic contest) cheered as the Loggers rolled to a 7-0 victory over the Pacific Coast Conference leading Washington State Cougars behind Del Owens' pitching and the hitting of Rollie McNair, Jim Lambert, and Ken Peterson. In the ninth inning after walking Jud Heathcote, Owens got his 15th strikeout by fanning Bobo Brayton, and umpire Joe Miltenberger signaled game's end.

## JUNE 2, 1951

Northern Idaho College of Education (NICE), now Lewis-Clark State College, swept a doubleheader from Eastern Oregon by scores of 8-0 and 6-3. The victories on the final day of the season gave coach Kinzer's Loggers of NICE an 18-6 win-loss record, the best in the school's history.

## JUNE 2, 1976

Coach Ramon Hooker, in his sixth and final season at LCSC, took the Warriors to their first postseason appearance with a berth in the NAIA College World Series. They lost the title game, 16-8, to Lewis University of Lockport, Ill.

## MARCH 4, 1977

The LCSC Warriors opened the season under new head coach Ed Cheff with a 15-0 victory over Northwest Nazarene. Pitchers Terry Hendley and Rod Gehring shut down NNU, while Walt Mason, Sheldon Ireland, Jim Wallace, and Bob Maurer provided the offensive firepower. Cheff had coached at Lower Columbia College at Longview, Wash., where he compiled a 180-30 record, for the previous five years.

## JUNE 2, 1978

At the NAIA World Series in St. Joseph, Mo., the Warriors finished third after a 4-1 loss to Emporia State, Kan., in a semifinal game.

## JUNE 5, 1983

For the second consecutive year, LCSC's Warriors finished second at the World Series played in Lubbock, Texas. With the loss to the home team – Lubbock Christian College, in the title game the Warriors finished the season with a 69-7 record. The .908 winning percentage was the highest collegiate record ever. At a community homecoming picnic in Lewiston after the series, Cheff said, "Winning the title would have been great this year, but we saved it for '84."

## JUNE 2, 1984

The Lewiston Morning Tribune headlines read, 'Warriors Reign in the Rain. LCSC Crowned NAIA Baseball Champions.' Before 4,674 fans, the largest baseball crowd in Lewiston baseball history, the Warriors downed California's Azusa Pacific College, 15-2, in the title game, which was delayed two hours by rain.

## JUNE 1, 1985

The Warriors won their second straight World Series championship with a 10-6 win over Dallas Baptist University before a record-breaking home crowd of 5,121 fans. Series MVP pitcher, Tony Dineen, won three Series' games for the Warriors, including the title game.

## SEPTEMBER 16-30, 1985

The Warriors represented the United States in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic's two week Friendship Tournament. The trip was an eye-opening look at a poverty stricken nation and made the team appreciate living in America.

## MAY 28, 1986

In a 10-inning thriller at Harris Field, the Warriors lost a heart-breaking 6-5 World Series title game to Grand Canyon (Ariz.) before 5,018 fans.

## MAY 10, 1987

Warrior shortstop, Rusty Harris, scores his 103rd run of the season in a 19-9 win over Washington State at Pullman. By scoring his 103rd run, Harris, a Lewiston product, broke the NAIA single season mark of 102, which was set by former Warrior Gary Balmer in 1983.

## MAY 29, 1987

LCSC regained its national championship title by defeating Emporia State, 11-4, at Harris Field. Steve Reed got the title game win. Warrior Pat Mackey set NAIA World Series records with 20 hits and a .741 batting average.

## MAY 31, 1988

The Warriors won their fourth NAIA World Series at Harris Field by defeating Grand Canyon, 9-3.

## JUNE 2, 1989

In the NAIA World Series championship game at Harris Field, the Warriors defended their title by downing the College of St. Francis (Ill.), 5-2, for a 'three-peat.' Warrior catcher John NesSmith was chosen the Series MVP.

## APRIL 14, 1990

LCSC coach Ed Cheff was honored as NAIA Coach of the Decade by Collegiate Baseball magazine. In the 10-year period, Cheff's Warriors compiled a 513-146 (.778) record.

## JUNE 2, 1990

Warriors Mark Rasmussen and Greg Umfleet hit sixth-inning home runs to lead LCSC to a 9-4 victory over the Senators of Auburn University-Montgomery in the World Series title game in Lewiston. Rasmussen was selected the Series MVP.

## MAY 31, 1991

LCSC senior right-hander Joe Misa blanked Oral Roberts University, 7-0, before a standing room only crowd of 5,400 in the final World Series game played at Lewiston's Harris Field. The Series would move to Des Moines, Iowa, the following year.

## MAY 28, 1992

The Warriors proved they didn't need the home-field advantage to win another World Series as they downed Mary Hardin-Baylor of Texas, 14-4, in Des Moines. It was the first Series played outside of Lewiston since 1984.

## MAY 31, 1995

A tough 8-7 loss to Bellevue College eliminated the Warriors from World Series action. LCSC finished in fourth place, while Bellevue went on to claim the title.

## MAY 11, 1996

Warrior coach Ed Cheff captured his 1,000th career win with a doubleheader sweep over Central Washington. He became only the third coach in NAIA history to win 1,000 baseball games.

## MAY 31, 1996

The Warriors reclaimed the NAIA throne by thrashing St. Ambrose University 9-0 in Sioux City, Iowa. Freshman Matt Randel picked up the complete game shutout victory. Troy Silva earned Series MVP accolades.

## OCTOBER 26, 1998

LCSC is chosen as the host institution for the NAIA World Series beginning in 2000.

## MAY 31, 1999

Exactly three years to the day they won their last NAIA World Series championship, the Warriors did it again, this time defeating defending NAIA World Series champion Albertson College, 7-2, in Jupiter, Fla. Jason Ellison was the World Series MVP.

## NOVEMBER 21, 1999

Former Warriors Marvin Benard and Chad Miltenberger, were honored at the Warriors' Ring Banquet Ceremony. Benard, a San Francisco Giant, and Miltenberger, a longtime assistant coach at LCSC and now head coach at Walla Walla Community College, had their jerseys retired in a special presentation.

## MAY 26, 2000

NAIA World Series returns to Lewiston, Idaho.

# MILESTONES IN LCSC BASEBALL HISTORY

---

## **JUNE 2, 2000**

Lewis-Clark State College wins the NAIA World Series for the 11th time and second year in a row. The Warriors defeat Dallas Baptist, 10-1, as World Series MVP Wes Hutchison closed out the last two innings.

## **MAY 28, 2001**

LCSC right-hander Collin Perschon strikes out a World Series record seven-straight batters against Bellevue. He would go on to fan 16 in the game to lead the Warriors to a 7-2 victory.

## **MAY 31, 2002**

Lewis-Clark State makes it a perfect dozen by taking a 12th NAIA National Championship when downing No.1-ranked Oklahoma City, 12-8, in the final game of the tournament. LCSC's Andy Torres broke Series records by throwing 19 innings and 282 pitches during the tournament to earn Series MVP honors.

## **MAY 31, 2003**

Lucky 13 ... Lewis-Clark State College won its 13th NAIA National title by defeating No. 1 Oklahoma City 7-5 in the championship game. LCSC is the third team in the history of the World Series to beat the same team on consecutive nights to win the title. LC's Marc Kaiser won the series MVP after a complete-game performance in the title game. Kaiser, who went 2-0 with an ERA of 3.93, struck out 21 while only walking two batters in 18.3 innings.

## **MAY 18, 2004**

Justin Fuller recorded a hit in 30 straight games to set a program record. The previous record of 27 was set by John McAninch in 1995.

## **JUNE 2, 2005**

Joey Dyche set the single season batting average record by hitting an even .500. The old mark was set by Chad Miltenberger in 1983 when he hit .482.

## **MAY 31, 2006**

With LCSC's 4-1 win over British Columbia, LCSC coach Ed Cheff picked up his 1,500th victory at the school to become the first coach to win 1,500 games at the NAIA level and just the fourth overall to accomplish the feat.

## **JUNE 1, 2006**

Jose Castenon drew a bases-loaded walk with two outs in the top of the 11th inning to force in the winning run as Lewis-Clark State College claimed its 14th national baseball title by defeating Cumberland University, 5-4. After losing its tournament opener, LCSC won five straight to claim the Series.

## **MAY 31, 2007**

Beau Mills blasted three home runs and eight RBI in the NAIA title game to hand LCSC a 9-2 win over Spring Arbor University and claim the Warriors 15th national championship. Mills' home runs gave him 38 on the season, which broke the NAIA single-season home run mark of 37. Mills was voted the NAIA Player of the Year and the NAIA World Series MVP.

## **JUNE 7, 2007**

Lewis-Clark State College junior third baseman Beau Mills became the highest overall draft pick in program history when the Cleveland Indians selected him with the 13th pick in the Major League Baseball draft.

## **APRIL 5, 2008**

Kyle Greene became the first Warrior and ninth player in NAIA history to hit two grand slams in one game. Greene blasted a bases-clearing home run in the sixth inning and then another in the seventh against Dixie State College in St. George, Utah. Ironically, despite Greene's record-tying eight RBI, the Warriors lost the game 10-9.

## **MAY 29, 2008**

Lewis-Clark State College and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) reached an agreement to keep the annual Avista NAIA College World Series baseball tournament in Lewiston through 2012.

## **MAY 30, 2008**

Kyle Greene was chosen the NAIA Player of the Year and Brian Ward was honored as the NAIA World Series MVP as the Warriors rolled to their third straight, and 16th overall, NAIA national championship. LCSC

defeated Lee University 8-3 in front of an all-time record of 5,530 fans.

## **JUNE 11, 2009**

Three Warriors are selected in the Major League draft, pushing the all-time number of Warriors drafted to 110.

## **JUNE 30, 2010**

Legendary LCSC coach Ed Cheff announced he was stepping down after 34 years at the Warrior helm. Arriving in 1977, he posted a 1,705-430-2 record with LCSC for a .799 winning percentage. His win total ranks second only to Wichita State's Gene Stephenson's 1,798 wins with the same program in all of college baseball. His win total also is fourth all-time among all college baseball coaches. Under his leadership, the Warriors captured 16 NAIA national titles during a 25-year span, won at least 40 games for 30 straight seasons, and produced 114 players who were selected in the Major League Baseball Draft, including 14 who made it to the big leagues.

## **MAY 30, 2013**

Despite picking up an early loss, the Warriors, led by first-year head coach Jeremiah Robbins, battled through the loser's bracket to advance to the title game of the Avista-NAIA World Series where they fell 11-4 to Faulkner (Ala.). It was LCSC's 22nd appearance in the championship game (first since 2008) and sixth runner-up finish.

## **JUNE 16, 2014**

Blaine Hardy became the 16th Warrior in program history to play in the big leagues. Pitching for the Detroit Tigers, the left-handed relief pitcher threw two scoreless innings in his debut against the Kansas City Royals

## **MAY 30, 2015**

Exactly seven years to the day, the Warriors captured their 17th NAIA National Championship. They scored six runs in the eighth inning en route to the 10-7 victory. Beau Kerns earned MVP honors.

## **JUNE 10, 2015**

Three Warriors are selected in the Major League draft to push the all-time number of Warriors drafted to 127.

## **JAN. 7 2016**

Lewis-Clark State College and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) reached an agreement to keep the annual Avista NAIA College World Series baseball tournament in Lewiston through 2019.

## **JUNE 3, 2016**

Lewis-Clark State had a blast, in fact six of them, in capturing its 18th Avista-NAIA World Series championship. LCSC hit six home runs in the title game but had to throw out the tying run at third base in the bottom of the ninth to preserve a 12-11 decision over Faulkner.

## **JAN. 3, 2017**

Lewis-Clark State College receives a two-year contract extension to keep the annual Avista-NAIA College World Series baseball tournament in Lewiston through 2021.

## **JUNE 2, 2017**

The Warriors won their third successive national title and 19th overall with their 6-4 victory over Faulkner in the Avista NAIA World Series. J.J. Robinson was the Series MVP and Raymond Pedrina was awarded the Charles Berry Hustle Award.

## **JUNE 2, 2017**

Robinson also was awarded NAIA honorable mention All-America honors.

## **JUNE 13-14, 2017**

Connor Brogdon is drafted in the 10th round of the MLB draft with six of his teammates going in the later rounds.

## **JULY 5, 2017**

Jeremiah Robbins was awarded the ABCA/Diamond NAIA Baseball Coach of the Year.

## **JULY 1, 2018**

Jake Taylor, a member of the 1992 National Championship team, returns to the Warrior baseball program, taking over as head coach for Jeremiah Robbins.

# 19 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

---

## #1 – 1984

### LCSC 15, Azusa Pacific 2

LEWISTON, Idaho—The NAIA World Series finally arrived in Lewiston, but the much anticipated opener for the Warriors was a disaster. Emporia State (Kan.) defeated LCSC, 6-5, to send the Warriors into the loser's bracket.

A uniform change later, the Warriors were on their way. They eliminated Wilmington (Del.), 8-4; Georgia College, 13-4, and then came back to dump Emporia State, 11-2. Next on the list was Azusa Pacific (Calif.) and the Warriors were victorious, 10-6. A 14-11 win over Southwestern (Tex.) set up a rematch with Azusa Pacific for the championship.

The largest baseball crowd in Lewiston history, at 4,674, packed into Harris Field as the Warriors cranked out 19 hits on their way to their first baseball crown.

The crowd and teams had to sit through a two-hour rain delay, in the bottom of the fifth inning, with the Warriors ahead 3-0. LCSC pitcher Trace Czyzewski was voted the tournament's Most Valuable Player as he scattered 11 hits while pitching a complete game, even with the delay. He finished the season with a 12-1 record while LCSC finished the year at 52-13. LCSC's Rick Pegram had four hits and Keith Peterson hit a second inning home run to lead the attack.

## #2 – 1985

### LCSC 10, Dallas Baptist 6

LEWISTON, Idaho—The Warriors hoped for a repeat in 1985 and got off to a much better start than the previous season with a 7-1 thrashing of Grand View (Iowa) in the tournament opener.

Things only got easier as LCSC blasted Georgia College, 17-1, and followed that with a 17-2 win over Southern California College. It became tougher at that point as Dallas Baptist provided a test for the Warriors. But LCSC prevailed, 8-3, setting up a matchup with respected national power St. Francis (Ill.).

The Fighting Saints topped the Warriors 9-7, but then St. Francis was eliminated by Dallas Baptist.

In the title game against Dallas Baptist, the Warriors fell behind 5-0 in the second inning but they fought back with the long ball to take their second straight championship before a record crowd of 5,121 at Harris Field.

Shortstop Brian Thomas belted a two-run triple to right field to break a 6-6 tie in the fifth inning and put the Warriors ahead for good. In all, the Warriors scored five runs in the inning. Jamie Archibald and Kyle Brock hit back-to-back homers in the inning while Joe Padilla added a solo shot in the seventh. Tony Dineen pitched seven innings of six-hit ball, striking out six and walking one. Dineen was named the tournament's MVP as he fanned 16 while walking one in this last two tournament games.

## #3 – 1987

### LCSC 11, Emporia State (Kan.) 4

LEWISTON, Idaho—After dropping a 6-5 heartbreaker to Grand Canyon (Ariz.) in the 1986 championship game at Harris Field, the Warriors were back in 1987, looking to recapture their crown.

The runs kept coming for LCSC as they bombarded Anderson (Ind.), 16-0, in the Series opener, and followed that with a 17-5 rout of Elon College (N.C.). A 13-10 victory over Emporia State was next. Southern Arkansas was the next victim, and the Warriors were victorious, 23-3.

Next in line was Grand Canyon, and LCSC won 25-11 to set up a championship home battle with Emporia State.

In the title game, seven runs in the seventh inning was the difference as the Warriors returned to the top of NAIA baseball. The Warriors had eight hits in the inning, led by Brett Holley's two-run double that wound up being the game-winning hit.

The Warriors finished the season with a 55-10 record, and scored at least 11 runs in all six of their tournament games. Lewiston's Pat Mackey was named the tournament's MVP as he set Series records for most consecutive hits (12), hits in one game (six), most singles (15), and highest batting average (.741, 20-27).

## #4 – 1988

### LCSC 9, Grand Canyon (Ariz.) 3

LEWISTON, Idaho—The Warriors went for title No. 4 in 1988 and opened with a close 8-6 win over Georgetown College (Ky.). A 4-0 shutout of Point Park (Pa.) followed, and after that, LCSC enjoyed an easy 15-2 win over St. Francis (Ill.).

The Warriors continued their run with a 7-4 victory over Oklahoma City, but then were dealt a 13-12 loss by nemesis Grand Canyon.

The Warriors wanted another shot at the Antelopes, but St. Xavier (Ill.) stood in the way. LCSC took care of St. Xavier, 12-4, to set up the much anticipated meeting with Grand Canyon, a team that handed the Warriors a 6-5 loss in the title game in 1986.

In the title game, Lewiston's Mike Murphy drove in four runs and was one of four Warriors to hit home runs as LCSC used the long ball to thump Grand Canyon.

Pitcher Steve Callahan, a Clarkston High product, was chosen the tournament MVP as he tossed a six-hitter through six innings to pick up the decision and finish the season with an 11-2 record.

Steve Reed pitched the final three innings in relief, allowing two hits and no runs.

## #5 – 1989

### LCSC 5, St. Francis (Ill.) 2

LEWISTON, Idaho—The Warriors closed out the decade of the 1980s with their fifth title, all at Harris Field.

LCSC opened Series play with a 7-3 win over Point Park, Pa., and then dumped Hawaii-Hilo, 12-6. St. Francis, (Ill.) put up a fight before falling 7-4, and the Warriors improved to 4-0 in the series with a 12-4 win over Oklahoma Baptist.

After eliminating North Florida 10-5, St. Francis stood in the way of LCSC's fifth national championship.

The title game, won by LCSC, 5-2, was the lowest scoring championship game since 1977. The Warriors posted a 6-0 tournament record, using big performances from different players each night.

Junior southpaw Darrell Wagner allowed 10 hits and five walks in the title game, but pitched out of several jams and recorded nine strikeouts. St. Francis left 11 runners on base.

Five Warriors were selected to the All-Tournament Team, and catcher John NesSmith was named the Most Valuable Player.

## #6 – 1990

### LCSC 9, Auburn-Montgomery 4

LEWISTON, Idaho—LCSC opened the 1990s the same way it ended the '80s – with an NAIA World Series Championship.

The opener matched the Warriors against Lewis & Clark College of Portland, Ore., the alma mater of LCSC coach Ed Cheff, but that did not matter. The Warriors rolled to an 8-0 victory. LCSC then defeated Grand Canyon 13-9, before falling to St. Francis (Ill.). 9-8.

LCSC bounced back by dumping St. Rose (N.Y.) 11-3, and then the Warriors eliminated Southeastern Oklahoma, 5-3, setting up a title game tilt with Auburn-Montgomery (Ala.).

In that title game, Warriors Mark Rasmussen and Greg Umfleet said they could feel it. They made Auburn-Montgomery feel it, too.

They hit two home runs in the sixth inning as LCSC erased a 4-2 deficit to win its fourth consecutive title. Relief pitcher Kevin Logsdon, a freshman, hurled five innings, allowing six hits and one unearned run. He also walked three and fanned five to pick up his second victory of the Series.

Todd Anderson, Umfleet, and Rasmussen had two RBIs apiece for LCSC, which had seven players make the All-Tournament Team: Rasmussen, Anderson, Umfleet, Logsdon, Mark Yockey, Greg Vaughns, and John NesSmith.

# 19 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

## #7 – 1991

### LCSC 7, Oral Roberts 0

LEWISTON, Idaho—The Warriors looked to continue their dominance over NAIA competition when the '91 series rolled around.

In the opener against Lubbock Christian (Texas), the Warriors were victorious, 9-4. Following that, LCSC topped Oral Roberts (Okla.), 13-8.

The Warriors then outlasted South Carolina-Aiken, and the rain, 19-6, before downing North Florida, 11-3. An 11-4 win over surprising Hawai'i Pacific put the Warriors in the title game for the ninth straight year.

Warrior right-hander Joe Misa took the reins and blanked Oral Roberts, 7-0. It was the first championship game shutout since Eastern Michigan blanked Northeast Louisiana, 1-0, in 1970.

A standing room only crowd, estimated at 5,400, packed Harris Field for the World Series title game. It was LCSC's 35th straight home win and completed a perfect 32-0 home season. LCSC wrapped up the season with a 48-7 record. Misa won his second tournament game and finished the season 11-2. He gave up just five hits, struck out eight, and walked only three.



## #8 – 1992

### LCSC 14, Mary Hardin-Baylor 4

DES MOINES, Iowa—One for the road. That was the story for the LCSC baseball team in 1992. After the NAIA World Series was moved from Lewiston to Des Moines (Iowa) following the 1991 Series, many in the world of college baseball were curious to see if the Warriors could qualify for the Series away from home and, if so, could the Warriors win it? Yes.

The Warriors drilled Winona State (Minn.), 20-0, in the opener that set a Series record for the most lopsided shutout and then defeated Mary Hardin-Baylor (Texas), 4-3 in 10 innings in their next game. Wins over Oklahoma City (12-3) and Winona State (8-1) followed before a championship game rematch with Mary Hardin-Baylor.

The Warriors were never in trouble in the championship game, jumping out to an 8-0 lead by the third inning. LCSC's offense pounded out 17 hits and by the third inning, all nine starters had at least one hit. That was more than enough for pitcher Victor Darensbourg who tossed a seven-hitter in going the distance.

LCSC, 55-10, outscored the opposition 58-11 in posting a 5-0 Series record. The Warriors' pitching staff compiled an ERA of 1.85 in the tournament while the hitters batted .363. No one else came close to those numbers.

## #9 – 1996

### LCSC 9, St. Ambrose 0

SIoux CITY, Iowa—It was bound to be an enchanting spring. It began with Ed Cheff standing on the precipice of a rarely achieved coaching milestone and the Warriors eager to reclaim the distinction of being the NAIA's best.

One fulfillment seemed to lead to the other. On the last weekend of the regular season, the Warriors presented Cheff with his 1,000th victory, and three weeks later they furnished themselves with a national championship.

Both were apt landmarks in a weather-marked campaign, which began amid February snow flurries in Lewiston and concluded between torrential thunderstorms at Sioux City on the final day of May. In this 3½-month span, LC compiled a 53-11 record, including 33 wins in its final 36 games, and 15 straight to end the season.

The last nine in the string were indeed poignant. Encumbered only by rain delays, the Warriors breezed through the Far West Region Tournament, outscoring opponents 62-14 in four games.

Then the Warriors moved on to the NAIA World Series at Sioux City where their hitting prowess was upstaged by monumental pitching. In their five Series games, the LCSC staff allowed just eight runs and limited foes to a 0.80 ERA, both national tournament records. This punctuated the team's 2.66 ERA, the second-lowest in Cheff's 20 years at LC.

In the NAIA title game, against St. Ambrose (Iowa), the Warriors piled up 16 hits in the first five innings and rode the four-hit, 10-strikeout complete game from freshman righty Matt Randel, to a 9-0 victory and their ninth national title in 13 years.

## #10 – 1999

### LCSC 7, Albertson College 2

JUPITER, Fla.—Lewis-Clark State College's baseball team captured its 10th NAIA World Series championship since 1984 as the Warriors downed Albertson College (College of Idaho) 7-2 at Roger Dean Stadium.

The Warriors completed a 57-14 season with the victory, their seventh over Albertson in 10 games that year.

LCSC was pushed to an extra championship game when they were dealt a 2-1 loss by Albertson. But in the "if necessary" championship game, Lewis-Clark State erased an early 2-0 deficit and scored five times in the sixth inning to take a 7-2 lead.

Junior southpaw John Foster, who beat Albertson four times during the season, picked up the win in relief.

Warriors Ryan Baerlocher, Clint Camerson, Chad Kline, and Jason Ellison were named to the All-Tournament team. The Most Valuable Player went to LC leftfielder Ellison. Warrior coach Ed Cheff was given the Sears Coach of the Year Award following the game.

The top-ranked and top-seeded Warriors recorded tournament wins over Culver-Stockton (Mo.) 14-0; Bellevue (Neb.) 9-4; Albertson, 7-3, and Birmingham-Southern (Ala.) 3-0, aside from the championship game win over the defending champion Coyotes from Caldwell.

Pitching was the key for the Warriors, as the staff gave up just five earned runs in 54 innings, a 0.83 ERA over six games.

## #11 – 2000

### LCSC 10, Dallas Baptist 1

LEWISTON, Idaho—Southpaw Anthony Ferrari and Tournament MVP Wes Hutchison combined for a three-hitter in pitching Lewis-Clark State to a 10-1 win over Dallas Baptist in the championship game of the 44th annual NAIA World Series, which returned to Lewiston and Harris Field this season.

The host Warriors, the defending champions, completed an unbeaten run, winning all six of their tournament games by a combined margin of 57-20 to claim their 11th NAIA national title.

Ferrari, who improved his season record to 4-2, allowed three hits in seven innings, and one run before giving way to Hutchison in the eighth. Ferrari finished with four walks and five strikeouts.

Hutchison pitched a near perfect final two innings, walking one and striking out three. He did not allow a hit in three tournament appearances. He allowed just six hits and one earned run in 11.1 innings pitched, and was credited with a pair of saves.

The Warriors broke open what was a 2-1 LC lead with a five-run sixth inning. Matt Hellman ripped a two-run homer to right field and Elliot Strankman singled home two more runs to put the game away.

Strankman also collected two more RBI in the seventh inning on a two-run double.

The Warriors finished the season with a 59-12 record. The team won its last seven games in a row and last 17 of 18 games.

## #12 – 2002

### LCSC 12, Oklahoma City 8

LEWISTON, Idaho—The 46th annual NAIA World Series marked the 12th win in 18 years for the Warriors when they defeated Oklahoma City, 12-8, at Harris Field.

In the first game of the Series, LC's Andy Torres threw a complete game to shutout over Bellevue (Neb.) 13-0. Micah Furtado belted two home runs before the end of the seven short innings to help send the Warriors to game two in the winner's bracket.

LC defeated Kentucky's Spalding University 2-0 in a repeat of game one. Tory Haven's eighth inning solo home run accompanied by Tim Petke's complete game gave the Warriors the edge they needed to gain a spot in game three of the winner's bracket.

Unfortunately, LC didn't have all it took to put away NAIA top-ranked Oklahoma City. LCSC's 13-10 loss to Oklahoma City bumped it into the losers' bracket to force the Warriors to battle back to defeat Ohio Dominican 11-4. Collin Perschon threw six innings to keep the Panthers at bay. Brendan Ryan's efforts (second-inning home run and three RBI) were an additional boost in keeping the Warriors on top.

LCSC breezed through game five by shutting out Idaho's Albertson College, 5-0, to earn a berth in the championship game.

LC won its 12th NAIA national championship by beating Oklahoma City, 12-8. Warriors Mike Madrid, Mark Gallagher, and Nick Walker combined for a powerhouse third inning during which all three Warriors added two-run hits to the scoreboard. Madrid's two-run double in the bottom of the sixth broke a 7-7 tie. Andy Torres was voted Series MVP after he combined for a World Series record of 19 innings and 282 pitches that week.

## #13 – 2003

### LCSC 7, Oklahoma City 5

LEWISTON, Idaho—Sophomore third-baseman Emerson Frostad stepped up big in clutch situations both with his bat and his speed to help Lewis-Clark State College capture its second straight NAIA World Series title and third in the last four years.

In the first game of the 2003 Series, hometown product Allen Balmer made the most of his first at-bat by hitting a two-run home run in the seventh inning, and teammate Marc Kaiser added a grand slam an inning later to help defending champion and No. 3 seed Lewis-Clark State College defeat No. 6 seed Spalding of Kentucky, 11-5.

In the Warriors' second Series game, Paul Gallegos' RBI triple broke a 3-all tie in the seventh inning and helped four-time defending champion Lewis-Clark State College remain undefeated with a 7-3 win over No. 2 seed Embry-Riddle of Florida.

In the Warriors' first of three meetings with Oklahoma City, OCU's Joey McLaughlin retired 11 of the final 12 batters he faced to help top seed and top-ranked OCU move into the driver's seat.

A seven-run third inning followed by a six-run fourth got Lewis-Clark State College back in the win column as the Warriors rolled over Bellevue of Nebraska 16-3 in loser-out play.

Facing their second elimination game in two nights, LCSC defeated OCU behind Lewiston native Neil Litchfield's clutch two-run triple in the top of the seventh inning to keep Lewis-Clark State College alive in its quest to repeat as NAIA World Series champion. LCSC won the game 6-5 and a night later, captured the championship with a 7-5 win over OCU.

## #14 – 2006

### LCSC 5, Cumberland 4

LEWISTON, Idaho – Jose Castenon drew a bases-loaded walk with two outs in the top of the 11th inning to force in the winning run as Lewis-Clark State College claimed its 14th national baseball title by defeating Cumberland University 5-4 in the championship game of the 50th annual Avista NAIA World Series.

The Warriors, who finished the season at 47-8, captured the title before a hometown crowd of 5,480, the largest to see a Series game in Lewiston. That also pushed the total attendance for the Series to more than 43,000, which is an all-time Series record.

The Series didn't start out that great for the Warriors, who fell to Lubbock Christian 4-3 in the opening round. LCSC, however, responded with five straight wins to capture the title.

LCSC defeated Saint Xavier 9-3, Concordia of California 17-2, and Embry-Riddle 11-10 to make it to the Final Four. The Warriors then defeated Region I nemesis British Columbia 4-1 to earn a spot in the title game.

LCSC and Cumberland put on a show in the title game with numerous defensive plays, power hitting and impressive pitching late in the game. LCSC's third pitcher, Shannon Wirth, threw five innings of hitless ball after Cumberland collected 12 hits in the first six innings. Wirth walked three and struck out seven to pick up the win and finish 7-1 on the season.

After Cumberland scored a run in the bottom of the sixth to tie the contest at 4-4, neither team could score until the 11th. That's when Mark Thompson started the rally by being hit by a pitch, one of nine hit batters in the game. Matt Vogel singled Thompson to third and then stole second base. With first base open, Cumberland elected to intentionally walk Series MVP Allen Balmer to load the bases. Castenon then drew a full-count walk to force in the decisive run.

The single by Thompson was the only hit in the final five innings by either team.

The contest was the fifth title game to go into extra innings and the first since 1986 when Grand Canyon defeated LCSC, 6-5.

## #15 – 2007

### LCSC 9, Spring Arbor 2

LEWISTON, Idaho – Third baseman Beau Mills enjoyed a remarkable day by hitting three home runs and driving in eight runs to help the Lewis-Clark State College baseball team to its 15th Avista NAIA World Series title by defeating Spring Arbor University 9-2 at LCSC's Harris Field in the 51st annual event.

Mills, who was chosen the NAIA's Player of the Year earlier in the day, also earned the tournament's MVP award after hitting .444 in the Warriors' five games and driving in 10 runs.

The 6-foot-3, 220-pound junior, who was drafted in the first round of the Major League Draft, also set the NAIA single-season home run mark at 38, snapping the old mark of 37 held by Mike Maggers of Mary Hardin-Baylor, who accomplished the feat in 1992.

Mills hit a three-run blast in the first inning and a grand-slam homer in the fourth, both off of Spring Arbor starter Colin O'Connell (6-1). He added a solo shot in the sixth inning for his third three-home run game of the season.

It was the Warriors' fifth title in the 2000s and the 19th time in the last 26 years the program has played in the national championship game.

Mills wasn't the only hero on the night. Senior right-handed pitcher Mike Miller held Spring Arbor (48-5) in check on four hits through seven innings. The Cougars did put up two runs in the eighth, but Miller finished with six strikeouts over eight innings.

Brian Parker pitched the ninth and allowed one hit, but struck out two. Mark Thompson, Jake Wyatt and Mills, the Warriors Nos. 1-3 hitters, finished seven-for-11 in the game with nine RBI and seven runs scored.

Mills also helped LCSC sweep the individual awards. Zach Evangelho won the NAIA Charles Hustle Award, while LC shortstop Mark Thompson won the Golden Glove Award.

# 19 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS



## #16 – 2008

### LCSC 8, Lee 3

LEWISTON, Idaho—Tournament MVP Brian Ward collected three hits and drove in two runs, while Kyle Greene and Sean Halton added two hits and two RBI to help the Lewis-Clark State College baseball team capture its third straight national championship with an 8-3 win over Lee University in the championship game of the 52nd annual Avista NAIA World Series before a record 5,530 fans at Harris Field on Friday night.

LCSC turned the tables on Lee by answering each Flame rally and then put the game away with a three-run eighth inning. The Warriors won three straight loser-out games in the Series in posting a 5-1 record.

LCSC's three-peat marks the fourth time that a school has won three consecutive Series titles.

The Warriors started the tournament as the No. 3 seed and blew away Embury-Riddle 19-0 in their opener. After a bye, LCSC defeated Oklahoma City, 9-5, but fell to top seed Lee, 5-2. The Warriors then won three straight loser-out games as they beat Spring Arbor, 9-4, and then Lee 7-6, before they beat Lee again for the title.

The Warriors jumped out to a 3-1 lead after three innings and held a 5-3 advantage when they scored three times in the eighth to put the game away.

Matt Stabelfeld pitched 3.1 innings of one-hit ball to earn the win.

## #17 – 2015

### LCSC 10, St. Thomas 7

LEWISTON, Idaho — The Warriors generated a six-run salvo in the eighth inning to rally for a 10-7 triumph over St. Thomas of Florida in the championship game. The comeback, occurring in front of 4,975 fans at Harris Field, gave the Warriors their long-awaited 17th national championship.

The Warriors finished the year with a 46-12 record.

Early on, it was St. Thomas doing most of the kicking. The Bobcats, who were playing in the title game for the first time in school history, roughed up LCSC starter Nick Sagendorf for five runs in the first inning.

Even after the Warriors scored a run in the third on a Seth Brown double, cutting the margin to four, the Bobcats answered with two more scores in the fifth. When the Bobcats chased Sagendorf in the fifth, they held a 7-1 advantage.

The Warriors scratch out two scores in the top of the sixth on doubles by Michael Sexton and Cabe Reiten, making the score 7-3.

Lightning then delayed the game for 44 minutes. The contest didn't restart until 9:33 p.m. local time, a break that seemed to help the Warriors more than the Bobcats.

Brown, who went 2-for-5 with two RBIs, led off the seventh inning with a double and eventually scored on a groundout by Max Whitt. That made the score 7-4 heading into the eighth.

Robert Smith Jr. started that inning with a double to right center. Two batters later, Reiten singled to center to slice the Bobcats' lead to 7-5. Brown then reached base on a fielding error by St. Thomas, which allowed another Warrior run to score. All of a sudden, the Warriors, who at one time trailed by six runs, now found themselves in a bases-loaded situation with a chance to seize the lead for the first time. And Whitt delivered. The junior infielder lashed a two-run single up the middle to put LCSC on top 8-7.

## #18 – 2016

### LCSC 12, Faulkner 11

LEWISTON, Idaho – The Lewis-Clark State College baseball team decided to have a blast in the championship game of the 60th annual Avista NAIA World Series baseball championship at Harris Field.

Actually, LCSC had a number of blasts, six to be exact.

The Warriors hit six home runs to defeat Faulkner University (Ala.) 12-11 in front of 5,020 fans to claim its NAIA best 18th national championship and its second in as many years. LCSC finishes the season 52-8.

Faulkner, which hit five home runs in the contest, finished the season at 53-15. Both of its losses in the 10-team double-elimination tournament came against LCSC.

The wild contest ended in the bottom of the ninth when Faulkner had the game-tying run thrown out at third after Dario Polanco's two-run single to left field. The Eagles trailed 12-8 going into the bottom of the ninth, but pushed across three before Onix Martinez was thrown out at third base trying to go from first to third on Polanco's single. LCSC left-fielder Jacob Zanon, the tournament's MVP, cut off the single and threw to shortstop Cabe Reiten, who relayed the throw to Robert Smith Jr. at third, who put the tag on Martinez to end the game. The out emptied the LCSC dugout with a celebration dog pile on the pitcher's mound.

The 11 home runs set a record for most home runs in any Series game. The previous record was eight set in 1987. The previous championship game record was four in 2008 when LCSC defeated Lee University (Tenn.) 8-3 for the title.

LCSC, which struggled at the plate early in the tournament, put up big numbers with seven-extra base hits and more than doubled its run average from its previous four games.

## #19 – 2017

### LCSC 6, Faulkner 4

LEWISTON, Idaho—J.J. Robinson's run-scoring triple in the seventh inning broke a tie and a committee pitching staff led by unlikely hero Daulton Blackwell helped the Lewis-Clark State College baseball team capture its third straight Avista NAIA World Series title with a 6-4 win over Faulkner University of Alabama at LCSC's Harris Field in Ed Cheff Stadium.

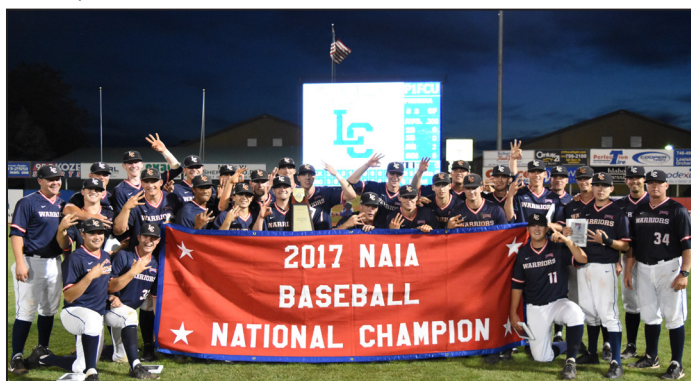
The win gave the Warriors their 19th national baseball title, which is 15 more than any other NAIA program has won. It also marked the second straight year LCSC has defeated Faulkner for the title.

The Warriors, who came into the Series as the No. 5 seed, finish the year 40-14. Faulkner, the No. 2 seed, winds up 54-12.

LCSC went about this title game a little different. The Warriors had relied on three starters and a couple of key relievers to make it this far, but nearly all of those arms needed rest.

Enter starter Tyler Burch, who had only pitched 10 innings since March 10; Rian Bassett, who had pitched 17 innings since March 12, and Daulton Blackwell, who had thrown 12.1 innings overall this season.

Burch went the first three innings and allowed three runs on five hits. Bassett pitched the fourth and allowed one run on one hit. Blackwell was the surprise with three innings of one-hit ball and two strikeouts. The seven innings allowed No. 3 starter Matt Fish to pitch 1.1 innings and set up closer Anthony Balderas for the final two outs.

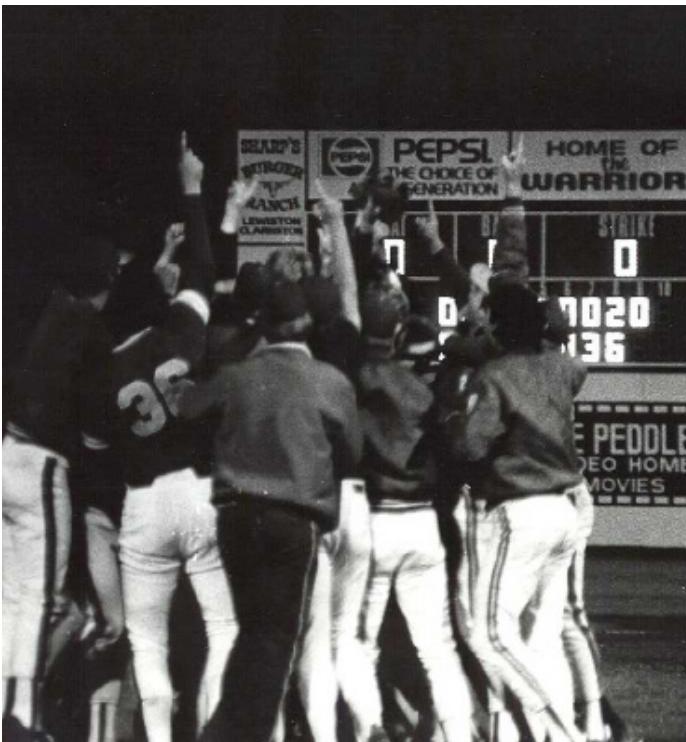

# WARRIORS IN THE MAJORS



## CONNOR BROGDON PHILADELPHIA PHILLIES

Connor Brogdon became the 18th Warrior in program history to play in the big leagues when he debuted with the Phillies on August 13, 2020 at home against the Royals. He struck out three in his first two appearances (2.1 innings).

Brogdon bounced back-and-forth between the Phillies and their alternate site (no minor leagues due to the COVID pandemic), but found solid footing with the club in the second half of September. In his Sept. 13 appearance at Miami, he struck out four and did not allow a hit or walk in 2.1 innings. In his final appearances of the season, Brogdon struck out the side in order.

He appeared in nine games for the Phillies, all in relief, and finished his first big-league stint with a 3.97 ERA. Brogdon struck out 17 batters in 11.1 innings and walked five. He held opposing batters to a .128 batting average.

He was selected in the 10th round (293rd overall) of the 2017 MLB Draft by the Philadelphia Phillies.

The product of Madera Ranchos, Calif., helped the Warriors claim their 19th overall Avista NAIA World Series title. In the Series, he threw eight innings and gave up four hits, three walks and two earned runs in a 7-4 triumph over Keiser of Florida. Along with picking up the win, he struck out 10. He picked up his second win in the tourney with seven strong innings against William Carey. For his two performances, he was named to the all-tournament team.
