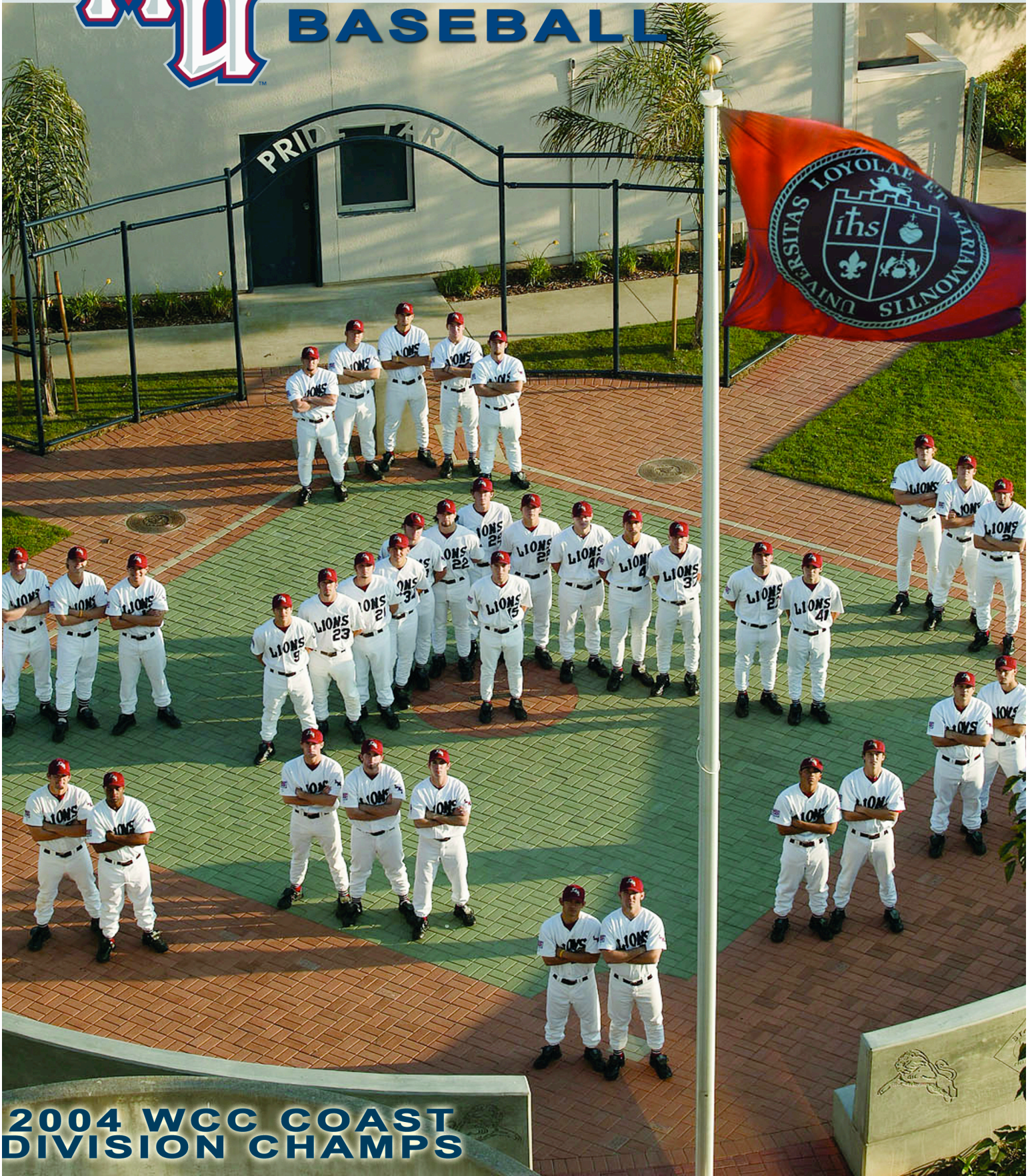

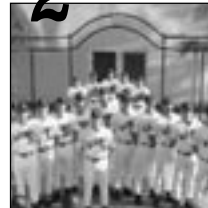

***Key returners and impressive newcomers look to turn heads in 2005 by stepping up to fill the void left by a crucial Class of 2004.***

READY, SET, WIN: Elvis Herrera, Kyle Mura, and Anthony Soto return to the defending WCC Coast Division Champions.



After the 2004 Lions turned a preseason standing of fourth place in the West Coast Conference into a league-best 20-7 WCC record, this season's squad has LMU fans looking forward to the Lions' fourth WCC Baseball Championship appearance in seven years. The Lions, led by 2004 WCC Coach of the Year Frank Cruz, sit atop of the 2005 WCC coaches' preseason poll.

Cruz, who returns to LMU for his ninth season after leading the USA Baseball National Team to a gold medal and being named National

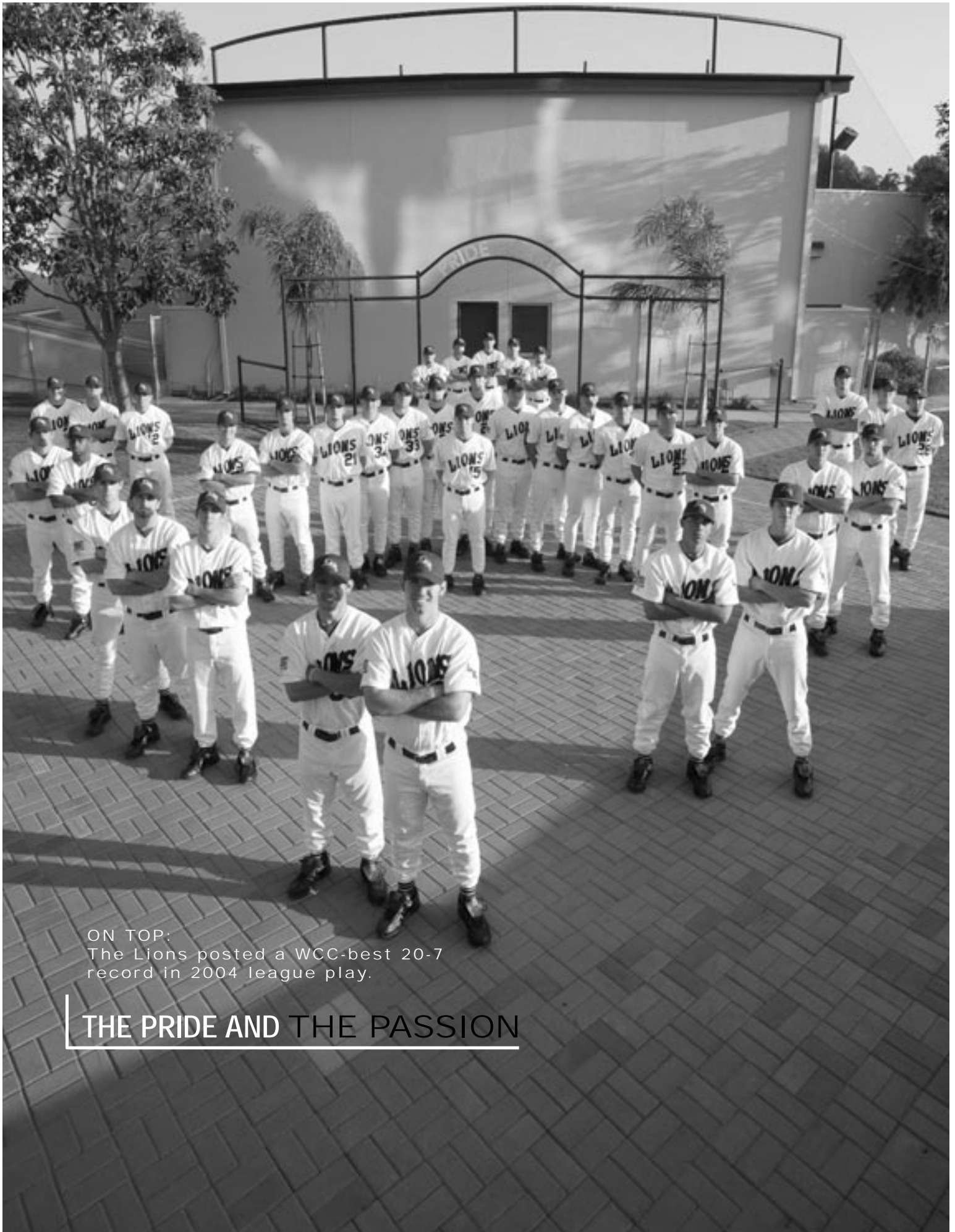
Development Coach of the Year during the summer, welcomes back seven starting position players and three starting pitchers. The returning squad is highlighted by 2004 WCC Pitcher of the Year Stephen Kahn and All-WCC honorees Jeff Stevens (RHP), Joe Frazee (OF), James Cooper (OF), and Kyle Mura (3B).

The Lions enter this season as the preseason favorite to win the 2005 WCC championship and defend its 2004 Coast Division title. LMU earned 44 votes in the preseason poll, edging West Division

favorite Pepperdine.

LMU will have to fill the voids left by three position starters, All-WCC honorees Clint McGill (2B/RHP), Billy Lockin (SS), and Jonathan Higashi (C). In addition to the defensive void these three left, each hit well over .300 in his final campaign. The Lions will also be without starter Will Quaglieri, now with the New York Mets, who was named WCC Pitcher of the Month after his efforts during the first month of the 2004 season.

## THE PRIDE AND THE PASSION

**GET IT STARTED**

“This year will be a challenge because we have to replace a group of seniors who played a big part in our successful season last year,” Cruz said. “Replacing our middle infield, catcher, and pitchers will be very challenging and a key ingredient to having a quality 2005 season.”

#### *Infield*

Fans will see some familiar faces at the corners, with 2004 All-WCC honoree Mura returning as the frontrunner for the starting third baseman job and several players battling to start at first base. Mura was among team leaders before ending his sophomore season early in April with a hip injury. Sophomore Brandon DiTolla will also compete for time at third. Fellow sophomore Elvis Herrera and freshmen Patrick Ferguson and Justin Bunkis will likely all see time at first, as may returning senior Jon Oller.

Behind the plate, freshman Sean Dovel will look to step into Higashi’s shoes as the Lions’ starting catcher. The 6-1 Dovel was a first-team All-CIF South Division III selection for La Mirada High School during his senior season. Dovel will share innings with Oller, who will catch for the first time in his collegiate career. Oller led the 2004 squad with eight home runs. Senior Evan Shahak, sophomore Adrian Nevarez, and freshman Sean Travis will also compete for time behind the plate.

The Lions will need this year’s middle infielders to step up and fill the shoes of Lockin and McGill. Sophomore A.J. LaMonda, who saw some quality playing time at first base as a freshman, is in the mix for the starting second baseman job along with junior transfer Jason Lefkowitz and freshman Matt Carter. Redshirt freshman Michael Glomb and true freshman Eric Farris continue in a heated battle for the shortstop spot.

#### *Outfield*

Perhaps the most recognizable outfield in the conference, the LMU starting trio returns for its third season together. Juniors Chris Pettit and Cooper once again join Frazee as the foundation of the competitive outfield. Fleet-footed sophomore Anthony Soto saw some action in left field as a redshirt freshman in 2004, and will be joined by fellow returners Matt White and Anthony Santana, both fifth-year seniors. The Lions benefited from Santana’s offensive effort in 2004, as he hit .328 in WCC play.

#### *Pitching*

Fans of LMU baseball are expecting great things from this year’s pitching staff, and they have reason to. The Lions return Kahn, the 2004 WCC Pitcher of the Year, who is fresh off a golden summer with the USA Baseball National Team. Kahn, a preseason All-American, is Baseball America’s pick to repeat as WCC Pitcher of the Year in 2005. In addition, fellow starter and All-WCC honoree Stevens returns, following his perfect 6-0 campaign in 2004. The two, along with 2004’s third starter Quaglieri, posted three of the WCC’s top five ERAs last season.

Kyle Huddy returns after redshirting his 2004 campaign and, along with freshman Brad Meyers, provides the Lions with some strong options for this year's starting rotation. Huddy had a team-best 3.81 ERA in 2003, while Meyers, drafted in the 14th round of the 2004 MLB Draft, was voted among the top three "ones that got away" by Baseball America when the New York Mets lost him to the Lions.

Returners Gabe Bueno, Blake Feaser, Erik Reyes, Daniel Macias, Ezequiel Ruvalcaba, and Jamie Mah will look for some quality innings this season, while newcomers Andy Beal, Nathan Keadle, Greg Nagy, and Alex Toth will look to contribute from the start.

#### *Schedule*

The Lions once again play as tough a schedule as any team, featuring annual home and away match-ups with perennial powerhouses including USC, UCLA, Long Beach State, and defending national champion Cal State Fullerton.

LMU will begin its season with ten straight home games and will look to mirror the success the Lions had at Page Stadium in 2004, when the team posted a 19-4-1 home record. Two additional three-game series have been added to the home schedule for 2005, which features weekend visits from non-conference opponents California, San Jose State, and Utah.

In WCC action, the Lions will once again battle the teams in their Coast Division with home and away series with San Diego, Saint Mary's, and Gonzaga. They will also face West Division foes, Pepperdine, Portland, Santa Clara, and San Francisco with one three-game series.

"As usual, we feel like we're playing the very best competition in the country" Cruz said. "The tough competition comes not only in our conference schedule, but also with teams we will play outside our conference both at home and on the road, beginning with a very talented Cal team."

# LMU BASEBALL TRADITION



*Now in its eighth decade, the colorful tradition of LMU baseball dates back nearly to the origin of the university. Head Coach Frank Shellenbach's 1930 team, one of the first to represent the institution, captured 14 games in an original 20-game schedule. Opponents that season included a number of various organized club teams and local junior colleges. LMU defeated USC that season — the USC Dental School to be precise. # ON TOP OF THE WORLD

## *The 1986 College World Series squad highlights the tradition of postseason play for LMU Baseball.*



The 1986 LMU baseball team had the best season in program history. It was also one of the best overall seasons in the history of athletics at LMU. Following a 1985 season in which the Lions did not have a winning record at 27-28, the program performed one of the best turnarounds in LMU athletics history. They finished the season with a program-best 50 wins and wrapped up the season at 50-15, a 23-game improvement from the previous year.

The season started with the Lions winning their first eight games and 12 of their first 13. As the season progressed, LMU produced a 13-game winning streak from March 21 through April 11, and won 20 of 21 games in the middle of the season.

With the winning streak came the nation's top ranking by the ESPN/Collegiate Baseball National Poll. The Lions never looked back, finishing tied with Pepperdine for first place in the West Coast Athletic Conference at 19-5, setting up a one game playoff to determine the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Regional. Played at Jackie Robinson Stadium on the campus of UCLA, the Lions defeated the Waves 14-9 to earn the bid to the NCAA West Regional.

LMU was placed with UCLA, UC Santa Barbara and the University of Hawaii in Los Angeles at UCLA. It looked as though it might be two-and-out for the Lions, as they dropped their first game to UC Santa Barbara 11-5 to move down to the elimination bracket. However, LMU

would reel off its next four games, fighting through four separate elimination games to earn a bid to the school's first appearance in the College World Series. In game two of the Regional, the Lions defeated UCLA 12-10, eliminating the Bruins and earning a rematch with UC Santa Barbara. LMU advanced past the Gauchos with a 14-6 win, and would then have to beat the University of Hawaii twice to com-

pete in Omaha. After 10-6 and 12-5 victories, the Lions earned a trip to the 1986 College World Series.

On May 30, the Lions opened up their first World Series trip with a 4-3 win over perennial power LSU, to earn a two-day rest and play in the winner's bracket. The Lions played the University of Arizona on June 2 and lost a heartbreaker 7-5 to drop to the elimination bracket to face Oklahoma State. The Cowboys were too much for the Lions, as they went on to an 11-5 win.





# POSTSEASON PLAY

## 2000

For the fifth time in conference history a team has won three consecutive WCC titles, as LMU swept West Division Champion Pepperdine in the WCC Championship Series at Page Stadium. The Lions join Santa Clara and Pepperdine as the only programs in the WCC to have won back-to-back-to-back championships. In only its second year, the WCC Championship Series was a repeat from the first one, as the Lions took two games over Pepperdine. In Game 1, the Lions' offensive weapons broke out for 19 runs on 23 hits in a 19-5 win as junior Billy Traber struck out eight in eight innings for the win. Scott Walter did most of the damage for the Lions, hitting his 18th and 19th home runs of the season, both coming with two runners on base. WCC Co-Player of the Year Anthony Angel finished the game 5-for-6 with 3 RBI. It was a different atmosphere, but similar outcome in Game 2, as the Lions won their third straight title with a 6-2 victory to close out the best-of-three series. Junior Michael Schultz went the distance, striking out five and scattering two runs on four hits. With the conference championship once again in hand, the Lions earned their third consecutive automatic bid to the NCAA Regionals, accepting an invitation to play in the West Regional hosted by Cal State Fullerton. The Lions, who rose to No. 12 in the national rankings prior to the tournament, were seeded No. 3 and opened the Regional against the host, Cal State Fullerton. Traber concluded his collegiate career throwing a gem. He went the distance, striking out 13 Titan batters and scattering four runs on nine hits to help the Lions to the first round win, 6-4. The Lions gave Traber a 5-0 lead to work with after three innings thanks in part to David Maffei's two-run homer in the first inning. USC was up next for the Lions in the winner's bracket of the West Regional. After jumping out to a 5-3 lead, LMU could not hold on as the Trojans scored five in the ninth for the 13-5 win. The 3 1/2 hour game took its toll on the Lions, as they had to turn around and face Cal State Fullerton once again in the elimination game that same night. Fullerton defeated the Lions, 5-2, ending the Lions' season at 40-19, the fourth best win total in program history.

## 1999

The Lions successfully defended their conference crown, defeating Pepperdine in a three-game series for the WCC Championship at Page Stadium. RHP Michael Schultz tossed nine complete innings and beat the Waves, 7-6, to clinch the title in the third and deciding game. The victory helped LMU win back-to-back titles for the first time in program history. The Lions advanced to NCAA Regional play for the second-straight year, traveling to Stanford in Palo Alto, Calif. LMU lost to the Cardinal in the opening round, 10-2, then was eliminated after a 4-3 loss to Nevada. LHP Billy Traber led the team and the WCC with 135 strikeouts while earning first-team all-conference honors. 2B Anthony Angel also earned first-team honors, the only member of the squad to do so in two-consecutive seasons. CF Matt Riordan was drafted follow-

ing the season by the Baltimore Orioles, and SS/1B Curt Fiore was selected in the draft by the Atlanta Braves.

## 1998

Second-year head coach Frank Cruz guided the Lions to their first WCC title in eight years. With the nation's 16th best recruiting class, nearly all of which were freshmen, LMU narrowly edged rival Pepperdine by a half game for the conference crown earning the NCAA automatic bid to the West Regional at Stanford. Freshman RHP Michael Schultz nearly no-hit Stanford in the first round (Stanford was ranked No. 2 in the country) shutting out the Cardinal through the seventh inning. Schultz went on to win the game (6-2) while throwing a two-hitter. With the win, LMU posted its first postseason victory since May 28, 1989 in a 6-5 win over Oklahoma. Schultz and freshman C Scott Walter were named West Coast Conference Pitcher and Player of the Year, respectively, the first time in WCC history two freshmen ever from the same school garnered the awards.

## 1990

Capturing sole possession of the league title for the first time in 17 years, LMU breezed to its third consecutive postseason appearance. The Lions posted 45 wins, the third highest total in school history, before being eliminated by host Arizona State. LMU representatives were honored by the league with WCC Player of the Year, Newcomer of the Year and Coach of the Year accolades.

## 1989

The Lions finished a game and one-half behind Pepperdine in the league race but were once again invited to the NCAA tournament. LMU lost its opening round game to Oklahoma but fought through the consolation bracket before losing to host Arizona in the regional championship game.

## 1988

An outstanding non-conference record against a strong schedule aided the LMU cause as the Lions were selected to the NCAA tournament as an at-large team. The Lions, who finished in third place in the WCC, were one of three teams in the WCC to post at least 40 wins and receive a postseason berth. LMU won two games but lost to host Oklahoma State in the regional semifinal game to end the season.

## 1973

Marv Wood's squad brought LMU its first West Coast Conference Championship after a 13-game win streak allowed the Lions to clinch the title on the final weekend of the season over second place Santa Clara. USC knocked off the Lions and Cal State Los Angeles in the NCAA District 8 regionals and eventually won its fourth consecutive national championship.

# USA BASEBALL NATIONAL TEAM



## usa baseball national team trials

After LMU Head Coach Frank Cruz was selected to serve as manager of the 2004 USA Baseball National Team, the selection process began as he and his assistant coaches kept an eye on the top talent in the nation. Eventually, two LMU players, Stephen Kahn and Jonathan Higashi, were among the elite pool of 36 invited to attend the trials in Durham, North Carolina. Sending both Kahn and Higashi to June's national team trials, LMU was just one of seven schools (LMU, Long Beach State, Mississippi, Texas, Stanford, Vanderbilt, and

USC) to have multiple players invited. Though Higashi would leave the trials to sign with the Texas Rangers, LMU was well represented this summer on Team USA. "All 36 players at the trials would represent our nation well," Higashi said during the trials. "There is not a single bad player here. The coaches could literally close their eyes and draw players' names out of a hat, and they would have a team that's a contender for the gold medal."



After representing LMU on the USA Baseball National Team this summer, LMU Head Coach Frank Cruz and right-hander Kahn returned to Los Angeles with a gold medal from the FISU II World University Championship in Taiwan. Cruz, who served as Team USA's manager, and Kahn helped the national team to a perfect 8-0 run at the championship, including a 4-2 come-from-behind win over Japan in the title game. Cruz led Team USA to an 18-7 record on the summer, including winning 12 of the last 14 games.

Kahn became the third Lion to play for the national team since they began selecting the official squad in 1984. He joined former LMU baseball standouts Joe Ciccarella (1989-1991) and Chris Gomez (1990-91), who played a combined three seasons for the Red, White, and Blue. Cruz was selected in January to serve as the 2004 squad's field manager after serving as an assistant for Team USA in 2000.

Sending both Kahn and catcher Jonathan Higashi (now with the Texas Rangers) to June's national team trials, LMU was just one of seven schools (LMU, Long Beach State, Mississippi, Texas, Stanford, Vanderbilt, and USC) to have multiple players invited to the trials pool of 36 players. "When the guys at the trials asked me what Cruz is like as a coach, I told them that they'll definitely enjoy the summer with him," Kahn said. "I smile inside knowing that I am his player all year and that I get to be there with him this summer with USA Baseball. He is a great representative for our school and our program. Cruz is one of the top Division I coaches and that's why he is where he is right now: coaching the best players in the nation. It's nice for our incoming freshmen, as they can know they are coming to play for the coach that was the manager for the USA National Team."

In December, USA Baseball named Cruz National Development Coach of the Year for leading the National Team of collegiate players to the program's first gold medal at the FISU World University Championships.

In 20 years of national team competition, USA Baseball has now won five gold medals. In his two stints with the national team, Cruz has played a role in two of those five gold medals. He is now one of just three coaches to be a part of multiple gold-medal-winning squads.

Cruz and Team USA went a perfect 6-0 in round robin pool play and then defeated Chinese Taipei (5-2) and Japan (4-2) to capture the gold medal. The Americans entered the championship with a 10-7 record, but then won eight

straight in Taiwan and 12 of their last 14 under Cruz.

The Americans captured the gold with a combined dominating performance at the plate, on the mound, and in the field. Cruz's offense led the eight-team field hitting .307 with six home runs. His pitching staff was nearly untouchable, combining for a 1.19 ERA and striking out 83 batters in 68.0 innings. For continuing a tradition of excellence with the national program, Cruz was named the 2004 USA Baseball Developmental Coach of the Year.

With the honor, Cruz, along with the other national award winners named by USA Baseball, advanced to the United States Olympic Committee pool of award winners from every Olympic sport's national governing body.

His team, the 2004 National Team, was also named USA Baseball Team of the Year. The Americans finished summer 2004 with an overall record of 18-7 and became the first National Team to ever record a no-hitter, as five pitchers combined to pull off the feat in a game against Canada.

Cruz and Kahn opened the FISU World University Championship with wins over Chinese Taipei (2-1) and Canada (15-1), in their final leg of the tour with the USA Baseball National Team. The right-handed Kahn helped Team USA cruise to the 15-1 route of Canada, throwing a hitless sixth inning.

Earlier in the summer, Kahn helped the National Team to a 19-2 victory over the New England Collegiate Baseball League's Danbury Westerners in Danbury, Conn. Kahn threw two innings in Team USA's first game back in the states following its five-game Japan road swing. Kahn entered the game in the eighth inning and got the first batter to pop up to second base before striking out two to end the inning. He added a third strikeout in the ninth, completing the 19-2 victory for the Red, White, and Blue at Rogers Park. Kahn's three strikeouts in two innings helped Team USA move to 7-5, including a perfect 7-0 on American soil.

The summer of 2004 was Cruz's second tour of duty with USA Baseball, but his

first as a head coach. Cruz served as an assistant on the 2000 USA Baseball National Team that posted an overall record of 27-3-1 and captured a gold medal at the 2000 Haarlem Baseball Week Championships in The Netherlands. This past summer, he became the first USA Baseball National Team Head Coach to be affiliated with the West Coast Conference.

After the 2004 National Team players were added to USA Baseball's all-time roster, the organization named LMU one of the nation's top 50 college baseball programs in relation to national team representation. LMU, which has produced three national team players since 1984, ranks 39th on USA Baseball's Top 50 National Team Collegiate Programs. Since USA Baseball began selecting players and operating an official national team to represent the United States in 1984, over 385 collegiate players have donned the Red, White, and Blue uniform from 116 colleges and universities across the country. Despite Cruz's two-time involvement, the top 50 listing did not award points for coaching selections.

## how to get here

The Loyola Marymount University campus is located in Westchester at One LMU Drive, approximately four miles north of the Los Angeles International Airport. There are two entrances to the campus, the main entrance off of Lincoln Blvd. on LMU Drive. The other entrance, which serves the Athletic Complex, is off Loyola Blvd. and 80th Street. Those seeking handicap parking must use the main entrance.

**From LAX:**

Travel north on Sepulveda Blvd. Remain in either of the left two lanes and merge onto the Lincoln Blvd. Follow Lincoln Blvd north past Manchester Blvd. Turn right onto LMU Drive. You can get a parking pass from the guard at the front gate. *For events*, follow Lincoln Blvd north and turn right on Manchester. Take next left on Loyola Blvd. Follow Loyola to campus. Parking is on the left.

**From the South:**

Travel on 405 North, exit on Jefferson Blvd., and turn left. Head west and make a left onto Lincoln Blvd. Head south and turn left into the campus on LMU Drive. You can

get a parking pass from the guard at the front gate. *For events*, follow Lincoln Blvd past the main entrance and turn left on Manchester. Follow rest of airport directions.

**From the North:**

Travel on 405 South, exit on Jefferson Blvd., and go north. Remain in either of the left two lanes and merge onto Lincoln Blvd. Follow Lincoln Blvd north past Manchester Blvd. Turn right onto LMU Drive. You can get a parking pass from the guard at the front gate. *For events*, follow Lincoln Blvd and turn right on Manchester. Take next left on Loyola Blvd. Follow Loyola to campus. Parking is on the left.

**From the East:**

Travel on 105 West, exit on Sepulveda Blvd., and go north. Remain in either of the left two lanes and merge onto Lincoln Blvd. Follow Lincoln Blvd north past Manchester Blvd. Turn right onto LMU Drive. You can get a parking pass from the guard at the front gate. *For events*, follow Lincoln Blvd and turn right on Manchester. Take next left on Loyola Blvd. Follow Loyola to campus. Parking is on the left.

**From the East (10 Freeway):**

Travel on 10 West to 405 South, exit on Jefferson Blvd., and turn right. Follow the remainder of the directions as coming from the south.



Now in its 23rd season as the home of Lion baseball, George C. Page Stadium has established itself as a tough place for opponents. With the Mikos Blue Monster and the addition of Pride Park, Page Stadium continues to stake its claim as one of college baseball's most unique ballparks.

## lions at page stadium

Thanks to a gift from Paul Mikos, a wall containing a manual scoreboard was installed in left field, complete with out of town scores reminiscent of some of Major League Baseball's classic ballparks. The Mikos Blue Monster is a replica to Boston's Fenway Park's Green Monster. The Mikos Blue Monster stands 130-foot wide and 37-foot tall. Within the wall is one of only a handful of manual score boards in all of baseball. The board itself isn't small, standing 18-foot tall and 46-foot wide. Complete with the LMU line score and other score updates, the scoreboard combines some old-time baseball charm with today's technology. The scoreboard has electronic balls, strikes and outs

lights, along with electronic at-bat and hit/error identification. Every other component is tallied using 2-foot square aluminum score cards slipped in behind the scoreboard manually.

Giving Page Stadium additional character is a five-foot indent connecting the Blue Monster with the existing outfield fencing, similar to the odd outfield shapes of the classic Fenway Park in Boston and Minute Maid Park in Houston.

Since 1997, when Frank Cruz was hired as head coach of the Lions' baseball program, LMU has established an 129-94 record at Page, a winning percentage of 58



percent. The Lions' have posted a 374-250-2 record (.599) overall in the park's 22 seasons.

Some of the best years have come in the five conference titles the Lions have won while calling Page Stadium home. The first Page Stadium conference title came in 1986, when the Lions posted a 24-8 record at home. The best record came in 1988, when LMU was 30-4 at home (88 percent). In the years the Lions have won conference crowns, they are 168-55 at Page (75 percent). Since going to a Championship tournament format in 1999, three of the West Coast Conference Championships have been played at Page Stadium with the Lions winning two conference crowns over Pepperdine.

The stadium, built at the site of LMU's old baseball field, was completed at a cost of more than \$250,000 with the Incentive Aid Foundation of Los Angeles providing the majority of the funding. Boasting grandstand seating for more than 600 people, the facility features a "VIP" section with 200 theater-type seats. The remaining 400 seats are aluminum with backrests and are located along the first base and third base lines. Field accommodations include spacious field-level dugouts and bullpens, a double batting tunnel, windscreen around the perimeter of the field, and grandstand. A picnic area, located down the first base line, was added prior to the 1996 season.

The backstop has been modified to enhance spectator viewing of the action on the field. The press box, fully equipped to meet the needs of all media, is located behind the "VIP" seating. A convenient concession stand is located near the north entrance of the stadium.

In the summer of 2004, Cruz spearheaded the construction of Pride Park, the stadium's new entrance. The park, resembling a scaled-down baseball infield, recognizes alumni and friends of LMU baseball and provides fans with a gathering point for athletic events at LMU.

Page Stadium has been the site of filming for numerous commercials as well as feature films. It served as the site for the baseball scenes in the hit movie "My Blue Heaven" starring Steve Martin. It is also home to many camps, clinics, Little League and prep all-star games. The facility, which has also been used

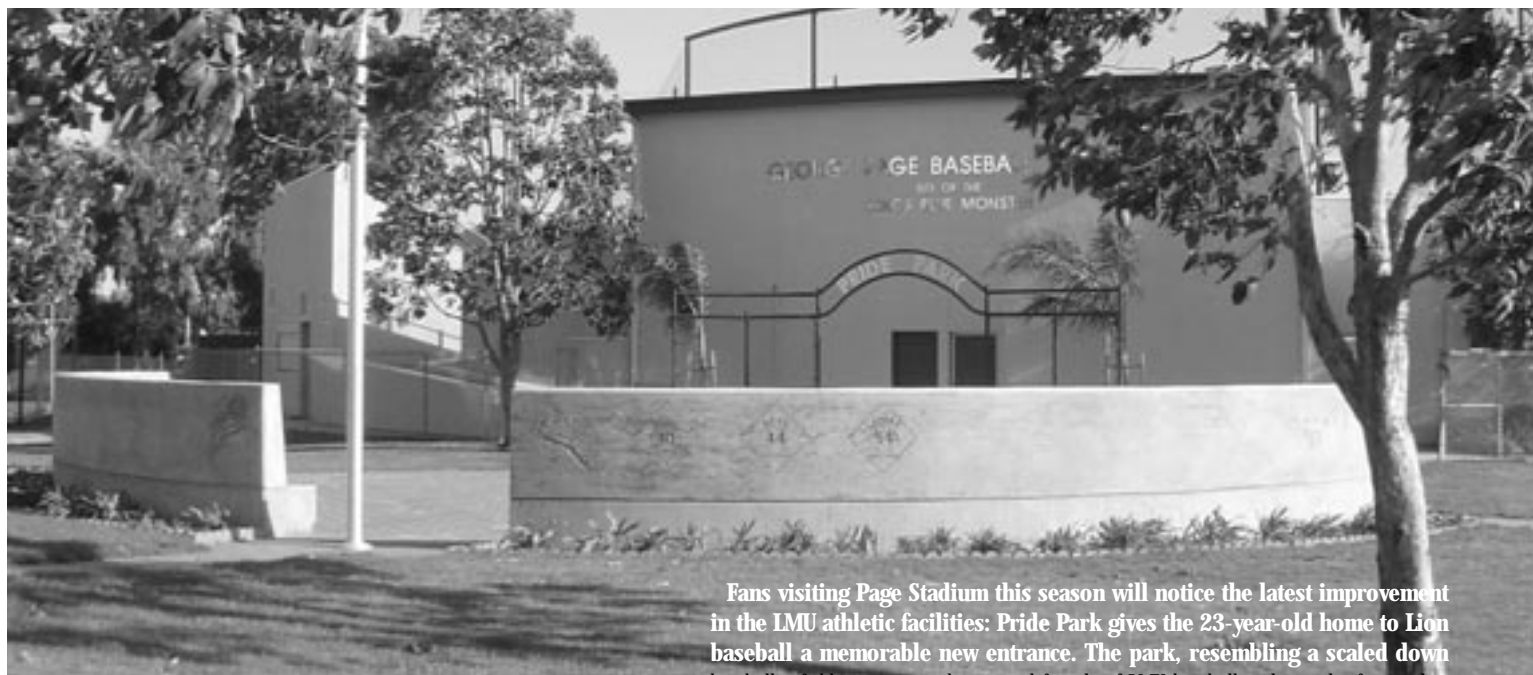


for outdoor community cultural shows and events, is named in honor of George C. Page, president of the Incentive Aid Foundation. Assisting Mr. Page and IAF in the stadium's completion was Maynard Kambak, father of LMU baseball alumnus Jeff Kambak.

LMU's historic first game in Page Stadium was played on March 19, 1983 with a 5-1 loss to Cal State Fullerton.



# PRIDE PARK



Fans visiting Page Stadium this season will notice the latest improvement in the LMU athletic facilities: Pride Park gives the 23-year-old home to Lion baseball a memorable new entrance. The park, resembling a scaled down baseball infield, recognizes alumni and friends of LMU baseball and provides fans with a gathering point for any athletic event at LMU.

Pride Park consists of a brick infield with concrete benches surrounding the area. LMU baseball's West Coast Conference Championship teams, NCAA tournament appearances, and those players who have had their jersey numbers retired are recognized on the benches. LMU fans sponsored the bricks that form the infield. The park now serves as the entrance to George C. Page Stadium, the home of the Lions for 23 seasons.

Head Coach Frank Cruz oversaw the design and development of the park, which also offered fans the opportunity to purchase home plate, first, second, and third base, and the flag pole that stands in center field to honor loved ones.

"We hope Pride Park will become a place where everyone associated with LMU, and specifically LMU baseball, can gather and reminisce," Cruz said. "We would like to see that all of those involved with our program's rich history, both fans and former players, are represented in our brick infield."

Though the design of Pride Park lends itself toward baseball, the location provides a natural focal gathering point for LMU guests that attend any function inside of Gersten Pavilion and Page Stadium, or games on the soccer field or softball diamond. Pride Park is an important initial step in achieving the athletic department's dream of a sports complex. Following the construction of Pride Park and the current creation of the tennis tournament court, fans of LMU athletics will see a modern athletic center surrounding the southwest area of Gersten Pavilion, fundraising for a new softball facility, and beautification of the grounds surrounding the southeast portion of our athletic facilities.

Inspired by the death of Cruz's mother, Narcisca Cruz, Pride Park is the latest baseball facility improvement spearheaded by Cruz in his eighth season at LMU. During the winter of 2003, Cruz oversaw the renovation of the baseball weight room. Similar to the weight room, which recognizes the accomplishments of LMU baseball alumni, Pride Park honors the great moments in LMU baseball history and inspires current players to reach that level of excellence.

"The park displays the honor and tradition of LMU baseball and reflects LMU's long-time pride in having a family community," Cruz said.

### *Strength & Conditioning*

With the addition of the \$20-million Burns Recreation Center and state-of-the-art athletic facilities of Gersten Pavilion, LMU offers one of the most extensive strength and conditioning programs in the West Coast Conference.

Students have access to the 8,000 square foot weight and fitness training facility within the Burns Recreation Center that opened in August of 2000. In addition, LMU baseball student-athletes benefit from specialized programs developed by Assistant Coach Robbie Moen.

With strength training at the cornerstone of the LMU baseball program, Moen has developed goals for the individual players that implement a program that will develop each athlete. The development is focused to enhance each athlete so that he may reach his athletic potential through proper training in strength, conditioning, flexibility, and agility.

With the program in place, the LMU staff works with the team to give specialized individual attention to ensure proper growth for the sport and the student-athlete. Each workout is documented to assure progression. The programs are also designed to limit injury to the team while on the playing field.

Athletes are often affected with minor injuries that limit participation. The program developed by Moen has special equipment and protocols in place to ensure that the injured athlete continues to train so that deconditioning does not take place. This will allow for a more rapid return to full participation.

In addition, the programs developed are designed with the student in mind. Time is always an issue with students, and the workouts have been created to be very intense, but to allow balance for academics.

During the winter of 2003, Coach Cruz oversaw the renovation of the baseball weight room. The room, which features wall-to-wall mirrors and new equipment, displays program and individual honors, including past conference player/pitcher of the year recipients. The improvements encourage LMU players to reach that level of excellence, emphasizing that success is earned through daily effort.

### *Athletic Training*

The LMU athletic training room is one of the busiest places within the athletic facilities at LMU, servicing the needs of 17 varsity sports and more than 300 student-athletes. In addition to providing the best care available in the nation to LMU athletes, the training program services the needs of opponents in a first class manner and provides an opportunity for students in the field of athletic training to earn valuable experience.

The training program is committed to providing the highest quality sports medicine services to the student-athletes of Loyola Marymount University. Using available technology and the continuous upgrading of equipment used in the delivery of sports medicine services, LMU assures student-athletes the most modern care available in the nation. The program strives to be recognized for its excellence in care and prevention of athletic injuries.

With more than 25 years of experience in the field, the Training Program has four full-time staff members and 15 student athletic trainers to provide services to the student-athletes. Those include access to sports medicine services for student-athletes, a philosophy that places a high value on health and wellness, a program that allows injured student-athletes to return to their sport as soon as medically safe and to substantially reduce the risk of athletic injury for those student-athletes.

The Training Room at LMU features state-of-the-art equipment in a 1,000-square foot sports medicine complex. The equipment includes whirlpools, paraffin bath, ultrasound, muscle stimulation and hydrocalators.

# HEAD COACH FRANK CRUZ

Having established himself as one of the most respected collegiate coaches in the nation, Frank Cruz is in his ninth season directing the LMU baseball program. Cruz turned the program into an instant winner, claiming three consecutive West Coast Conference Championships (the first time in school history) and earning three straight appearances in the NCAA Regionals from 1998-2000. Cruz, who was selected by USA Baseball last January as head coach of the 2004 national team, is also currently serving a four-year term on the NCAA's Baseball Rules Committee.

Cruz's impact on the WCC was almost immediate. In his first season at the helm he took a team that finished sixth in the conference in 1997 with an overall record of 21-39 to three straight first-place finishes. That includes finishes of 34-23-1 in 1998, 33-28 in 1999 and 40-

19 in 2000. The 40 wins ranks fourth all-time at LMU for victories in a single-season. The success in 2000 earned Cruz his second WCC Coach of the Year honor, following his first in 1998.

In 2004, Cruz led an LMU squad that was picked to finish fourth in the conference to their best WCC record in eight seasons, going a league-best 20-7 en route to his third WCC Coach of the Year selection. The Coast Division Champions, LMU earned the right to host the WCC Championship Series at Page Stadium for the third time in sixth seasons. Lion pitcher Stephen Kahn brought the WCC Pitcher of the Year selection to LMU for the second time in four seasons, as Billy Traber won the conference award in 2000.

The rise in the WCC is a tribute to Cruz's reputation as one of the nation's top recruiters. In 1997, Collegiate Baseball tabbed Cruz as the Recruiter of the Year. He accomplished that honor after formulating the nation's 16th best recruiting class, most of whom graduated in the last four seasons, including the 16th overall draft pick in Traber.

His tireless efforts also helped Cruz earn a position as an assistant coach with the 2000 USA National Baseball program. The team wrapped up the 2000 Qwest Red, White and Blue Tour with a 27-3-1 record, including a 6-0 mark in the final tournament of the summer season leading to the 2000 Olympics in Australia. Cruz helped lead Team USA to finish the season with a 21-game unbeaten streak which included 20 wins and one tie. Cruz and the Team USA coaches led the National Team to a .900 winning percentage, the best in team history. The 1984 team, featuring future Major League All-Stars Mark McGwire, Barry Larkin, Will Clark and B.J. Surhoff, was 37-5-1, for an .881 winning percentage.

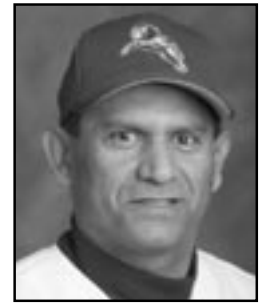
His success with the 2000 National Team led to his 2004 selection as head coach of Team USA. Cruz led the 2004 USA Baseball National Team of collegiate players to the program's first gold medal at the FISU World University Championships in Tainan, Taiwan. Cruz and Team USA went a perfect 6-0 in round robin pool play and then defeated Chinese Taipei

(5-2) and Japan (4-2) to capture the gold medal. The Americans entered the championship with a 10-7 record, but then won eight straight in Taiwan and 12 of their last 14 under Cruz.

The USA captured the gold with a combined dominating performance at the plate, on the mound, and in the field. Cruz's offense led the eight-team field hitting .307. His pitching staff was nearly untouchable, combining for an 1.19 ERA and striking out 83 batters in 68.0 innings. For continuing a tradition of excellence within the national program, Cruz was named 2004 USA Baseball Developmental Coach of the Year.

In 20 years of national team competition, USA Baseball has now won five gold medals. In his two stints with the national team, Cruz has played a role in two of those five gold medals. He is now one of just three coaches to be a part of multiple gold-medal-winning squads and is the first USA Baseball National Team Head Coach to be affiliated with the West Coast Conference. Kahn joined Cruz on the award-winning national team in 2004.

Named to his current post on June 20, 1996, Cruz has employed a highly successful coaching and teaching philosophy from his experience as a high school coach and a former assistant coach under Mike Gillespie at USC. Cruz literally made a 180-degree turn with the LMU

baseball program seven years ago. Entering just his second season, the Lions won the WCC title and earned a trip to the NCAA Regionals in 1998, where they shocked the baseball world by upsetting No. 2-ranked Stanford in Palo Alto thanks in part to a complete game effort by freshman Michael Schultz. Schultz and catcher Scott Walter were named Freshmen All-Americans, and Schultz earned a spot on the West Regional team after helping LMU defeat Stanford for the first time in school history. Walter was the 1998 WCC Player of the Year, while Schultz garnered WCC Pitcher of the Year honors.

The Lions found themselves in the Regionals again in 1999 and 2000, as Cruz has led LMU to eight NCAA Regional games in just six years. In 1999, LMU defended its WCC Championship against Pepperdine, winning its first back-to-back conference title in school history. Traber and Anthony Angel each earned first-team All-WCC honors, with Traber posting a team-high 135 strikeouts in 120.0 innings. The selection marked Angel's second straight all-conference honor after he hit .322 with 16 doubles, four home runs, and 38 RBI.

Behind the efforts of All-American Traber in 2000, LMU earned a 6-4 NCAA postseason win over No.2-seed Cal State Fullerton. Traber's complete game, 13-strikeout performance advanced the Lions to the Regional winner's bracket. Walter joined Traber as an All-American after leading LMU to its third-straight WCC Championship.

Other accomplishments for Cruz include coaching MLB's top prospects. Matt Riordan (14th round, Baltimore Orioles) and Curt Fiore (34th round, Atlanta Braves) kicked-off the now common development of post-collegiate careers for Cruz's players when they were selected in the 1999 MLB draft. Joe Sulentor also signed with the Minnesota Twins following his 1999 season. Six players were then selected in the 2000 draft, including Traber (first round, New York Mets), Schultz (second round, Arizona Diamondbacks), Walter (third round, Kansas City Royals), Jason Aspiro (ninth round, Chicago White Sox), Angel (14th round, Houston Astros) and Ben Bonilla (free agent, Arizona Diamondbacks). Two more were taken in 2001, with C.J. Wilson (5th Round, Texas Rangers) and James Clelland (free agent, Montreal Expos) moving to the next level of their playing careers.

The 2003 draft saw four more draft selections for Cruz and the Lions: Joshua Muecke (fifth round, Houston Astros), Joshua Whitesell (sixth round, Montreal Expos), Vince Cordova (ninth round, New York Mets), and Ryan Yurek (24th round, Houston Astros). Following the 2004 season, Will Quaglieri signed with the New York Mets pre-draft as a fifth-year senior, just before Kevin Jenson (30th round, San Francisco Giants) and Billy Lockin (37th round, Arizona Diamondbacks) added to the list of drafted Lions. Jonathan Higashi (Texas Rangers) and Brady Koch (Houston Astros) also signed professional contracts in 2004.

During his eight seasons, Cruz's teams have set many single-season records. In 2000, his squad made its mark in the LMU record book with home runs (81, 2nd all-time), hits (702, 3rd all-time), doubles (132, 3rd all-time), runs (516, 5th all-time), wins (40, 4th all-time), winning percentage (.678, 4th all-time) and batting average .331, 4th all-time). Many of his players have broken into a variety of single-season and all-time record categories in both the LMU and WCC record books.

One of the keys in the drastic turnaround has been Cruz's involvement in the improvements of LMU's baseball facilities. The six-time conference champions enjoy one of the most notable enhancements to Page Stadium, the Mikos Blue Monster. The massive left-field wall makes the ballpark one of the most unique in all of college baseball. In addition, the team has been playing on a new grass infield, and the stadium was equipped with backstop netting, windscreens, a new sound system, backstop padding, astroturf dugouts, and lighted batting tunnels.

During the winter of 2003, Cruz initiated the renovation of the baseball weight room. The room, which features wall-to-wall mirrors and new equipment, displays program and individual honors, including past conference player/pitcher of the year recipients. The improvements encourage LMU players to reach that level of excellence. Cruz's ultimate goal is to eventually see construction on a new clubhouse for the LMU baseball program.

Cruz also oversaw the construction of Pride Park, the new entrance to Page Stadium, beginning in May 2004. The park, resembling a scaled down baseball infield, recognizes alumni and friends of LMU baseball and provides fans with a gathering point for athletic events at LMU. Pride Park features a brick infield with concrete benches surrounding the area. LMU baseball's WCC Championship teams, NCAA tournament appearances, and those players who have had their jersey numbers retired are recognized on the benches.

Prior to coming to LMU, Cruz spent four seasons as an assistant on the USC coaching staff. Cruz's primary responsibilities were with the Trojan hitters and outfielders, two of the team's strongest areas. In Cruz's four years at Southern California, the Trojans were one of the most successful programs in the nation, boasting an overall record of 169-86-1 (.662). During that span, USC made four NCAA Regional final appearances, captured two Pacific-10 championships, and advanced to the 1995 College World Series championship game.

Cruz moved to USC after a successful stint at Los Angeles' University High School, where he taught health and physical education. While at University, Cruz posted a 152-68 career record and led his team to the 1988 L.A. City baseball title, four Western League crowns (1988-90-91-92), and six trips to the city baseball playoffs. Cruz was honored as area Coach of the Year on three occasions. He remained a part-time teacher through the 1995-96 academic year.

Cruz attended Santa Monica College and then transferred to Pepperdine, where he earned both a bachelor's (physical education, 1983) and master's (education, 1989) degree. He is a graduate of Saint Monica High School.

## ASSISTANT COACH ROBBIE MOEN

Robbie Moen is in his fifth season as the Lions' hitting coach. With the conclusion of the 2004 season, which saw the Lions host the West Coast Conference Championship series for the third time in six seasons, Moen had coached the Lions to three straight .300 or better offensive seasons.

Moen, who came to LMU in 2001, brought a background of offensive power to the program, helping the 2003 team to a WCC-leading batting average (.309), slugging percentage (.443), on-base percentage (.443), and hits (602). Prior to LMU, he spent four seasons at Kansas State as the hitting and outfield coach. His history of building averages continues to be an asset to LMU's traditionally potent offense.

Moen and the 2002 Lions put up WCC-leading offensive numbers in batting average (.352), on base percentage (.425), hits (386), doubles (76), and stolen bases. Among the WCC's batting average leaders, Moen coached numbers four (Lockin, .421), six (Smith, .404), ten (Frazier, .383), 15 (Higashi, .362), and 16 (Perez, .361). Moen also tutored successful LMU hitters C.J. Wilson (5th round, Rangers) and Josh Whitesell (6th round, Expos).

In 1997, Moen's first season at Kansas State, the team shattered school records in at-bats (2,052), hits (669), doubles (145), home runs (75), RBI (477) and total bases (1,099). His tenure at K-State also included two of the program's three batting champions that hit over .400 the past decade. This included one of KSU's most potent offensive weapons in outfielder Kasey Weishaar, who ranked second in the Big 12 and 16th nationally with a .429 batting average. The first-team All-Big 12 and All-America honorable mention player established a single-season batting record with his performance under the guidance of Moen.

A 1993 graduate of the University of Arizona, Moen was an assistant at his alma mater following a four-year playing career for the Wildcats. He finished his career at Arizona second in career at-bats (843) and doubles (63), third in career hits (325) and total bases (465) and fifth in career RBI (185). He was recently selected to the All-Century team at Arizona.

A former minor leaguer for the Florida Marlins, Moen was a first-team All-Region Eight, first-team All-Pac Six, and a Baseball America, Sporting News, and Collegiate Baseball All-American in 1993 at Arizona. A year prior, he was an All-Pac Six honorable mention selection. In 1991, he won the Hank Lieber Award as Arizona's best hitter with a .402 batting average. Following that season, he was a first-team All-Pac Six designated hitter and a first-team All-Region Eight selection.

In October of 2003, Moen was honored by his high school, Flowing Wells, with an induction into their Athletic Hall of Fame for his accomplishments as a player. The Tucson, Arizona, native was a member of the first class of inductees.

Moen has a degree in health sciences. He and his wife, Chrisdee, currently reside in Playa del Rey with their daughters, Payton and Paige.



## ASSISTANT COACH JON STRAUSS

Jon Strauss is in his third season with the Lions. Working as LMU's pitching coach and recruiting coordinator, three of Strauss' pitchers were selected in the 2003 MLB draft: Josh Muecke (5th round, Houston Astros), Vince Cordova (9th round, New York Mets), and Ryan Yurek (24th round, Houston Astros). Kevin Jensen (30th round, San Francisco Giants) became the fourth LMU pitcher drafted in two years after his 2004 selection. In addition, Will Quagliari signed with the New York Mets pre-draft in May of 2004.

The 2004 season saw much success for Strauss and the LMU pitching staff. Sophomore Stephen Kahn was named 2004 WCC/Rawlings Pitcher of the Year after going 5-1 with a 3.88 ERA in WCC play. Overall, three of the leagues' top five ERAs belonged to LMU pitchers.

Kahn went on to become the only player from the West Coast Conference to be selected to pitch for the USA Baseball National Team during the summer of 2004.

Before coming to LMU in the fall of 2002, Strauss spent two seasons as the head coach at Glendale Community College, where he accumulated a 66-25 record and a pair of Western State Conference titles.

In his first season at Glendale, Strauss led the Vaqueros to a school-record 32 victories and the final game of the first round of the Junior College Regionals. In 2002, Strauss earned his second consecutive WSC Coach of the Year honor, while again setting the school mark with 34 victories and another trip to regionals.

During the summers of 1997 and 1998, Strauss served as the pitching coach for the Chatham A's of the prestigious Cape Cod Summer Collegiate League. His 1998 squad defeated Barry Zito to win the league title.

Strauss began his coaching career in 1995 as an assistant for Dave Snow at Long Beach State. In his six seasons with the 49ers, working primarily with the pitchers and catchers, Strauss helped lead the Dirtbags to a 221-150 (.596) record. Long Beach State won two Big West crowns, advanced to the NCAA Regionals five times, and finished third in the 1998 College World Series during Strauss' tenure.

After a stand-out career at Glendale High School, Strauss played two years at the College of the Canyons, before accepting a scholarship to play at Long Beach State. In his two years as a player at LBSU, the Dirtbags won two Big West titles and finished third at the 1993 College World Series.

Strauss then signed with the New York Yankees and played one season in the organization before returning to Long Beach State to pursue his coaching career.

Strauss earned his bachelor of science degree in psychology in 1996 from Long Beach State. He and his wife, Nickie, live in Lakewood with their sons, Casey and Brady.





## ASSISTANT COACH VINCE BERINGHELE

Vince Beringhele joins the LMU baseball staff for the 2005 season after 15 years as UCLA's assistant coach. Serving as the hitting instructor and recruiting coordinator for UCLA, Beringhele tutored the likes of Troy Glaus, Chase Utley, Eric Valent, Eric Byrnes, Ryan McGuire, Michael Moore, Chris Pritchett, Joel Wolfe, and Paul Ellis, all of whom were top five round draft picks. During his final eight seasons with UCLA, Beringhele's hitters posted a .301 batting average and averaged over 80 home runs per season.

In his time with UCLA, the Bruins credited Beringhele with bringing the top high school talent in California to the program. Beringhele's 1997 signees were named the top newcomers in the nation by Collegiate Baseball. His 2003 recruiting class also received a top-five ranking from Baseball America.

Beringhele helped guide the Bruins to the College World Series in 2000. After losing the first game of the Midwest Regional, Beringhele's 1997 team battled back to win five in a row (including two over Oklahoma State on its home field) to advance to the Series.

Before beginning his coaching career, Beringhele played in the Los Angeles Dodgers' minor league system for three years for Lethbridge, Vero Beach, and Bakersfield. In 1983, he batted .338 at Lethbridge. He tied for the league lead in hits (94) with teammate and former Dodger Jeff Hamilton. In 1984, he batted .256 for the Vero Beach Dodgers, collecting 100 walks in 100 games. Beringhele completed his playing career in 1985, playing for Vero Beach and Bakersfield.

Beringhele graduated from Loyola High as a two-sport standout in baseball and football before becoming UCLA's starting center fielder from 1981 to 1983 and a career .319 hitter. He signed with the Dodgers after his junior year, but not before leaving a mark on the Bruin record book after three seasons of play. Beringhele's 138 career walks is the second-highest total in Bruin history, while his 46 career stolen base mark is tenth-best in school history. His 61 walks in 1982 is fourth on the single-season chart.

The former UCLA great now rejoins LMU Head Coach Frank Cruz's staff, as he began his coaching career as an assistant for Cruz's University High School team before spending two seasons (1988-89) at Cal State Los Angeles.

Beringhele also worked with Cruz this summer during the selection process for the gold-medal winning USA Baseball National Team.

Beringhele has a bachelor of arts in sociology from UCLA. He and his wife, Trudy, along with their daughter, Betina, currently reside in Culver City.

## TRAINER JOE GONZALEZ

Joe Gonzalez enters his second year at Loyola Marymount. This will also be his second year working with the baseball team.

Gonzalez graduated from LMU in 1997 with a bachelor's degree in Biology. During his four years at LMU, Gonzalez worked in the athletic training room as a student athletic trainer under the direction of LMU's current head athletic trainer, Keith Ellison. A few months after graduation, Gonzalez earned his certification with the National Athletic Trainers' Association.

In the summer of 1998, Gonzalez moved to Salt Lake City, UT to work at The Orthopedic Specialty Hospital. Gonzalez worked in the physical therapy department, dealing with both athletes and non-athletes. He was also a part of the hospital's high school outreach program, which provided certified athletic trainers for surrounding area high schools. In 1999, Gonzalez earned his certification as a strength and conditioning specialist, and soon after became an instructor for the hospital's eight-week strength and conditioning programs.

In 2000, Gonzalez moved back to Los Angeles to work at The Center for Athletic Medicine at USC's University Hospital. There, he was deeply involved in the High School Outreach Program, which provided certified athletic trainers for 18 high schools in the LA area. Gonzalez also developed and conducted the Coaches' Seminar Series, which were free monthly seminars that focused on specific athletic medicine topics aimed toward coaches and athletes of all levels.

In February of 2002, Gonzalez had the opportunity to work at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City. He was assigned to long-track speed skating, and was stationed on the ice as a "field-of-play" athletic trainer.

In August of 2002, he returned to LMU to begin his career as a member of the Lions' Athletic Medicine staff.

### **Championship Finish to 2004...**

LMU won the 2004 WCC Coast Division title after finishing league play with a conference-best 20-7 record. It placed the Lions in the WCC Championship Series for the third time in six seasons. LMU entered the title series on a six-game winning streak, but fell to West Division champion Pepperdine.

### **Top WCC Finish...**

Despite the Gonzaga series rain out during the final weekend of conference play, LMU concluded its WCC regular season with the best record in Head Coach Frank Cruz's eight seasons with the

program. The previous best, set by the 2000 squad, was 22-8, good for a .733 winning percentage. This season, the Lions finish at 20-7, giving them a .741 percentage, a program-best conference mark against the current WCC institutions.

### **With Honors...**

LMU placed four Lions on the All-WCC first and second-teams and had four more receive honorable mention recognition. In addition, Cruz was named the WCC Coach of the Year for the third time in his eight-season career. Stephen Kahn was named to the All-WCC first-team after being named WCC Pitcher of the Year and bringing the

award to LMU for the second time in four seasons. Joe Frazee, Jeff Stevens, and Clint McGill were all second-team selections. Jonathan Higashi, Billy Lockin, James Cooper, and Kyle Mura rounded out the all-conference selections for the Lions. Five of those eight honorees return to lead the Lions into the 2005 campaign.

### **ERA Games...**

Giving the Lions three of the top five conference ERAs, the Lions' rotation of Stephen Kahn, Will Quaglieri, and Jeff Stevens completed the WCC season with identical ERAs of 3.88 in conference play.

**W**est Coast Conference baseball competition continues its long history in 2005. After six years of conference play with a two-division format, the alignment from the 2004 season will carry over into 2005. Division opponents meet twice during the course of the season (three-game series) with non-division opponents meeting once. Of the two division winners that compete in the WCC Championship Series, the winner of the non-division series earns home field advantage. The winner of the WCC Championship Series wins the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. The post-season bracket was extended to a 64-team field for the first time in NCAA history in 1999.

Loyola Marymount, Pepperdine, Saint Mary's, Santa Clara, San Francisco, San Diego, Portland and Gonzaga comprise the baseball alignment. Gonzaga and Portland, long-time members in every other conference sport, joined the league in baseball in 1996 after migrating from the Pacific-10 North Division.

Baseball was originally established as a conference sport in 1968. From 1977-84, WCC teams competed with teams from the Big West Conference in the Northern California Baseball Association (Saint Mary's, San Francisco, and Santa Clara), and the Southern California Baseball Association (LMU, Pepperdine, and San Diego).

The WCC sponsors championships in 13 sports for men and women: baseball, men and women's basketball, women's crew, men and women's cross country, men and women's golf, men and women's soccer, men and women's tennis, and women's volleyball.

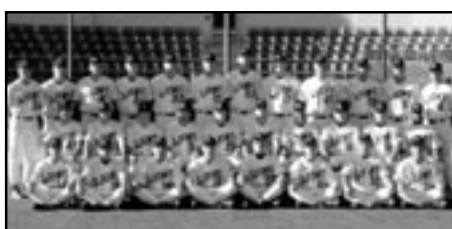

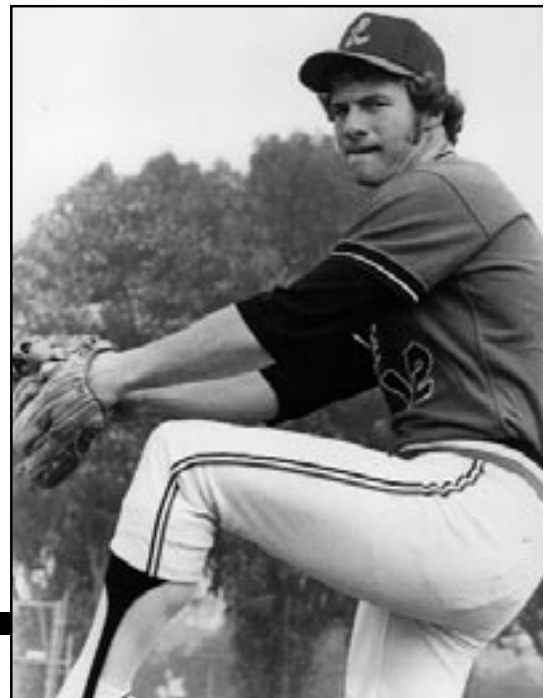

For the first time in the history of LMU Athletics, the jerseys of three former Lion baseball players were retired during the 2000 season. The three individuals, Tim Layana (No. 54), Jerry Stone (No. 10) and Billy Bean (No. 44), not only distinguished themselves as some of the very best athletes in the country, but also represented Loyola Marymount with dignity and pride. A ceremony was held to officially honor and retire the jerseys of these outstanding individuals. Their names, numbers and accomplishments will forever be etched into LMU history.

One of the greatest pitchers in LMU history, Tim Layana had his jersey retired during pregame ceremonies prior to LMU's game against San Francisco on March 11, 2000. Layana's prowess helped guide the Lions to the College World Series in 1986. A first-team All-WCC pick as a senior, Layana was tabbed the conference Pitcher of the Year and earned first-team All-District VIII honors. Selected a second-team All-American by the American Baseball Coaches Association following the 1986 campaign, Layana rewrote many of the pitching records in LMU baseball history. His 12 complete games, 17 wins, 139 strikeouts and 170.2 innings pitched all set new single-season school records his senior year. The career-record holder in innings pitched (511), strikeouts (405), complete games (33), and wins (35), Layana's marks will be difficult for future LMU players to surpass. Guiding the Lions to their second conference title and second Regional berth in 1986, Layana, who tragically passed away in an automobile accident on June 25, 1999, remains etched into 19 different pitching record categories. He completed a fantastic collegiate career and was drafted in 1986 in the third round by the New York Yankees. Inducted into the LMU Athletic Hall of Fame, Layana played professionally with the Yankees, Cincinnati Reds and San Francisco Giants. Although he did not appear on Cincinnati's roster during its World Series sweep of the Oakland Athletics in 1990, Layana posted a record of 5-3 that year with a 3.49 ERA. He also had two saves in 55 appearances. Layana totaled a 5-5 career record in the majors with two saves in 78 appearances.

A three-year starter for the Lions, Jerry Stone played an integral role in guiding Loyola University to its first conference baseball championship in 1973. One of the greatest catchers in school history, Stone had his jersey retired on March 11, 2000, prior to LMU's game against USF. Stone, a first-team All-WCAC and All-District VIII pick his junior year, also earned first-team All-America accolades issued by Collegiate Baseball. A switch-hitter during the wooden bat era, Stone still ranks as an all-time top-ten statistical leader at LMU in single-season walks (45) set in 1972 and 1973, while his 106 career walks rank No. 5. By the end of his final season with the Lions, Stone had set the program records for games played in a season (54, twice), doubles in both a season (17, 1972) and career (42, 1971-73), home runs in both a season (11, 1973) and career (16), RBI in both a season (45, 1973) and career (102), slugging percentage in a season (.638, 1973), and fielding percentage in a season, fielding 388 chances with no errors. He hit above .300 for each of his three seasons with the Lions. One of Stone's greatest accomplishments included leading the Lions to their first post-season appearance in school history, a berth in the NCAA District VIII playoffs in 1973.

Possibly one of the greatest hitters to ever grace the diamond at LMU, Billy Bean had his jersey retired on March 11, 2000 during pregame ceremonies prior to LMU's game against San Francisco. Bean was one of many great players who helped guide the Lions to the 1986 College World Series. A two-time first-team All-WCC and All-District-VIII pick, Bean earned honorable-mention All-America honors following his junior year by Collegiate Baseball. With an even greater performance his senior year, Bean was tabbed a second-team All-American by the American Baseball Coaches Association in 1986. Holding a top spot in 20 different statistical categories throughout his career, Bean ranks second in seven of those categories including at bats (822), runs scored (216), hits (290), RBI (204), triples (16), total bases (449) and walks (150). In 225 career games, Bean's career average of .353 ranks 10th in the all-time record books. He also holds the distinction of driving in the most runs in a single game in school history with eight against San Francisco on April 20, 1985. The top record holder in a single season with 84 runs scored and 66 walks, Bean also enjoyed a great professional career as he was picked in the fourth round of the MLB Draft by the Detroit Tigers.

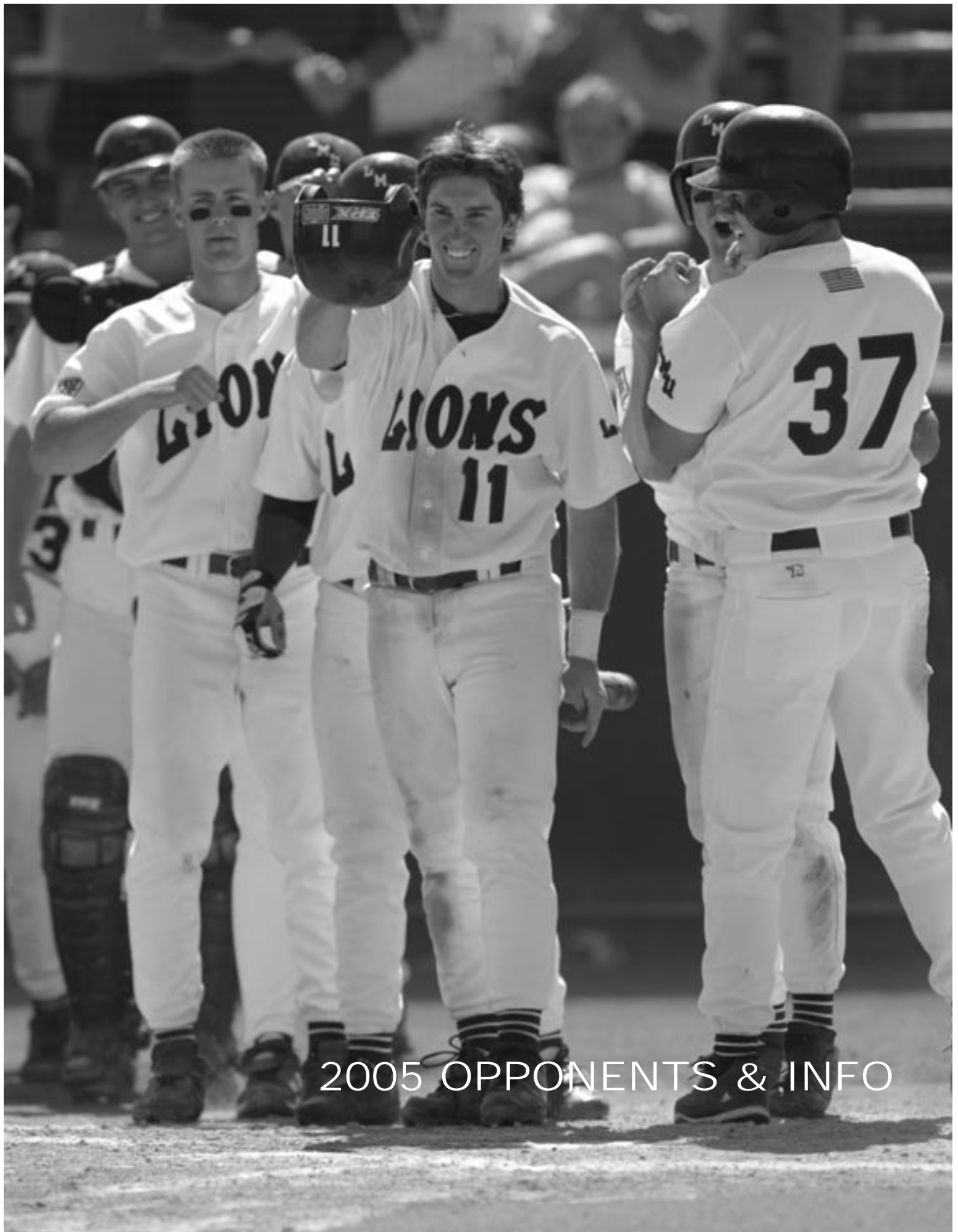

LMU Director of Athletics

Dr. William S. Husak begins his seventh year as the Athletics Director at Loyola Marymount University. Since taking over the program in 1998, LMU has reached a new level of success. While the Lions' success has been some of its best in program history, Husak firmly believes the program has "just scratched the surface."

His administrative efforts have focused on developing a team of coaches, support staff and administrators who believe that LMU's athletics program can be among the elite in the nation. This period of time has been marked by enhancing the support of the athletic teams through the creation of the Student-Athlete Academic Center and the Lions Strength and Conditioning Center, increased scholarship and operational support and enhancing the coaching and support staff.

"The last six years have been a high energy environment in the Athletics Department," Husak said. "Because of the support of so many people at LMU, the program has been producing a winning record on the field and in the classroom. The 2003-04 season smashed all previous records for success. While we recognize our success this past year, we realize that the potential here at LMU is so much greater and we are just beginning to realize what can be accomplished at LMU."

The past six years have been some of the most successful seasons in school history as the Lions won over 58 percent of its dual competitions in that span. Since 1998, LMU has claimed 14 conference championships and 18 NCAA postseason appearances. Off the field, the Lions have had a 50 percent increase in national scholar-athletes as 128 claimed the honor in the 2002-03 academic year, the most in school history. Last year 91 student-athletes were named to the West Coast Conference honor roll.

Husak attributes the current success and the future growth of the program to the staff that is in place. Since he took over the program, the coaching and administrative staffs that lend support to the more than 330 student-athletes has more than doubled in size. The summer following the 2003-04 athletic year was one of the busiest ever in terms of hiring, as two support staff positions and a full-time head swim coach were added. A full-time head coach will lead each of the 17 varsity sports sponsored at LMU. When Husak took over, only nine of the programs were led by full-time coaches.

In addition, support for the student-athletes was enhanced with the addition of eight brand new staff positions, which included an athletic academic coordinator, marketing/promotions manager, corporate relations manager, two assistant athletic trainers, a strength and conditioning assistant coach and an assistant media relations director.

Robert B. Lawton, S.J., fourteenth president of Loyola Marymount University, is a classicist, scripture scholar, administrator, and priest.

Born in Cumberland, Maryland, he entered the Society of Jesus in July 1965.

A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Fordham University (summa cum laude) with a major in classics in 1971, he went on to earn his Ph.D. in Near Eastern Languages and Civilizations from Harvard University in 1977 where he was a Danforth and a Woodrow Wilson Fellow. He was ordained on June 13, 1981.

From 1977 to 1979, Father Lawton served in several positions at Georgetown University, including assistant professor in the Department of Theology. After a year of further studies in Germany, he taught Hebrew and Aramaic at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome from 1982 to 1984.

In 1984, he became an Assistant Dean of Georgetown College and, in 1989, he was named its Dean. Prior to accepting the position of president at Loyola Marymount in May of 1999, he was a trustee of the University of Scranton, and Fairfield University. He is a trustee of Loyola Marymount, Boston College, and the William H. Hannon Foundation.

Father Lawton holds the rank of professor in LMU's Departments of Theological Studies and Classics.

"We have begun to establish a winning tradition at LMU and we have done that through the people that we now have in place," said Husak. "It was my goal to assemble a staff that would bring success to this program." That success has led to improved facilities, enhanced fan support both by students and the general public and increased fund raising.

"Although much has been accomplished, there is still a great deal to achieve," Husak said. "If our athletics program is truly to become consistently great, we must achieve the objectives of our campaigns for facilities and endowments. We cannot do this without the support of all those who believe that athletics is an integral part of the LMU experience for not just the student-athletes but all who are associated with this great University."

Husak comes from a long and accomplished background as an administrator, fundraiser and professor during a 19-year career at California State University, Long Beach. Between 1993-1998, he served as the Senior Associate Athletics Director and was mainly responsible for Athletics fundraising. While at CSULB between 1983 and 1997, Husak served as an assistant commissioner for the California Collegiate Athletic Association (CCAA). Between 1986 and 1993 he served as chairman of CSULB's
