Head Coach Mike Gillian

Longwood University named Mike Gillian as the seventh head coach in the 27-year history of men's basketball at the institution on May 2, 2003. Gillian led Longwood to an overall record of 5-22 during his initial season of 2003-04.

Coach Gillian had previously been an assistant at George Mason University under head coach Jim Larranaga from 1997-2003. He had also worked under Larranaga for one season at Bowling Green State (Ohio) University (1996-97) prior to arriving at George Mason with Larranaga.

"Mike brings an excellent Division I background to our University," explained Director of Athletics Rick Mazzuto. "He has worked with an outstanding head coach in Jim Larranaga and is ready to move the Longwood program forward."

During Gillian's six seasons as an assistant coach at Mason, the Patriots went 100-74 overall with a 66-34 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) record, winning two CAA Tournament championships (1999, 2001) and two CAA regular season titles (1999, 2000). George Mason also earned two NCAA Tournament appearances (1999, 2001) and made

one National Invitation Tournament (NIT) appearance (2002). The Patriots were 57-18 overall at home in the Patriot Center, posting a 41-8 CAA homecourt record.

At Bowling Green, the Falcons finished 22-10 while winning the 1997 Mid-American Conference regular season title (13-5) and earning an NIT appearance.

"I'm very excited and would like to thank President Cormier (Dr. Patricia P. Cormier) and Rick Mazzuto for the opportunity to be the head basketball coach here at Longwood University," said Gillian. "It's been a long-time goal of mine to be a head coach, and to do so at the highest level. At Longwood, it's exciting to be leading a program through the transition to Division I status.

"This first full season of Division I competition is both a tremendous opportunity and a great challenge for everyone in the Longwood University Basketball Program. It is going to be a lot of fun."

"The leadership and direction of the Division I transition plan at Longwood, as established by Dr. Cormier and Rick Mazzuto, is outstanding. Their unique insight and involvement has made being here a natural fit for me, and I look forward to the challenges ahead.

"I will certainly draw upon the experience of working with Jim Larranaga, and at George Mason University, to establish a successful Division I men's basketball tradition at Longwood."

Prior to joining Larranaga at BGSU, Gillian was an assistant coach at Division II American International (Mass.) from 1989-95. During that six-year stint working for current Indiana Pacers assistant coach Jim Powell, the Yellow Jackets went 117-58 overall with a 75-33 Northeast-10 Conference (NE-10) record, winning both the NE-10 regular season and tournament championships in 1994 (26-6). American International also advanced to the second-round of the Division II Tournament that year.


Education is the #1 priority. Basketball can teach you many things, but it does not guarantee your future. Your diploma from Longwood does. School will come first.

He was a YES Clinic speaker at the Division I Men's Final Four from 1998-2000, and has extensive public speaking experience through his involvement with numerous booster, local business and civic organizations, and charity events.

Gillian was a four-year letterwinner as an undergraduate at Division III North Adams State (now the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts), and served as a team captain during his final two years. He received a bachelor of science degree in business administration from North Adams State, and earned a master of business administration degree from American International.

A native of Ayer, Massachusetts, Gillian (40) and his wife, Janet, have a three-year-old daughter, Emma. The Gillian family resides in Farmville.





Bill Reinson is in his third year as an assistant coach for men's basketball at Longwood University during 2004-05. He joined the program prior to the 2002-03 campaign after having spent the previous two seasons (2000-02) as an assistant coach at North Carolina-Greensboro.

Reinson served as the interim head coach for two games (1-1) late in the 2002-03 season due to an illness of the head coach.

At Longwood, Reinson is involved with the most important aspects of the men's basketball program. These include on and off campus recruiting, opponent scouting and game plan preparation, player skill development, as well as assisting head coach Mike Gillian with practice preparation and scheduling of opponents.

During Reinson's two seasons as an assistant coach at UNCG under head coach Fran McCaffery, the Spartans went 39-23 overall, winning the 2001 Southern Conference Tournament Championship. North Carolina-Greensboro earned one NCAA Tournament appearance (2001) and made one National Invitation Tournament (NIT) appearance (2002).



Prior to his time with the Lancers and Spartans, Reinson was an assistant coach at NAIA King College in Tennessee during the 1988-89 season. He has also coached at Seton Catholic High School (freshman boys basketball) in Chandler, Ariz. and at Mesa High School (assistant football) in Mesa Ariz..

A native of Mesa, Arizona, Reinson earned his bachelor of science degree in business administration from the University of Phoenix. He and his wife, Lana, have three daughters: Megan (19), Bria (13), and Taylor (10).

He previously was the head men's basketball coach at Jamestown Community College in Olean, N.Y. during 2001-02 where he was the youngest junior college head coach in the country at age 25.

Thibault has also been an assistant coach at North Idaho College (2000-01), Howard (Texas) College (1999-2000), Washington (Tenn.) College Academy Prep School (1998-99), and at Treasure Valley (Ore.) Community College (1994-98).

Thibault has been an integral part of the Longwood basketball program running smoothly. His responsibilities include on and off campus recruiting, coordination of team travel, opponent scouting and game plan preparation, player skill development, and assisting with practice preparation.

Thibault has been involved with many successful seasons. These include the most conference wins in school history at Jamestown, the #1 team defense in the nation at Howard,



a team ranked as high as #3 and Top 20 all year, a 28-3 record at Washington College Academy, including an 18-3 record as head coach of the undergraduate team, and a top 10 ranking in team defense for three-straight years at Treasure Valley.




Taylor is involved with all recruiting, especially in the Richmond area, opponent scouting and game plan preparation, player skill development, assisting with practice preparation, and administering the team's weight training and conditioning program.

At John Marshall High School, Taylor was named Virginia Group AAA All-State first team by the Associated Press and the Richmond Times-Dispatch as a senior. He was also the 1996-97 Richmond Times-Dispatch player of the year and the Central Region player of the year, while earning first team All-Metro accolades as well. Additionally, Taylor was the most valuable player of the 1997 Virginia High School Coaches Association All-Star game.

2004-05 Campaign

At Wake Forest. At Illinois. Vs. Cincinnati in Las Vegas. Tournaments in New York City and San Francisco. Reads like a schedule for an ACC or Big Ten member institution, right? Wrong. These are just some of the games that Longwood University, under the direction of second-year head coach Mike Gillian, will play during the 2004-05 men's basketball campaign. The Lancers are operating under all NCAA Division I rules and regulations this year, including the scheduling requirements, during the second year of their four-year Division I reclassification period toward official certification in September 2007. The program will be a countable Division I opponent this season, and the Lancers will also be included in the all-important Ratings Percentage Index (RPI).

Coach Gillian returns eight letterwinners from a year ago, including three starters, and has added seven newcomers to the team. Among the 15 players are one junior, eight sophomores, and six freshmen. The young group will be playing 30 Division I games, including 11 home contests. The schedule is highlighted by the December 27 road game at Big Ten member Illinois, the December 30 game against Conference USA member Cincinnati in Las Vegas, and the February 23 road game at ACC member Wake Forest – each NCAA Tournament teams from a season ago.

"This first full season of Division I competition is both a tremendous opportunity and a great challenge for everyone in the Longwood University Basketball Program," explained Gillian. "We are all excited and ready to take advantage of the opportunities that lie ahead and rise to the challenges that we are going to face in playing against some of the best college teams in the country throughout the season. It is going to be a lot of fun."

The returning starters are second-year team members Michael Jefferson, Maurice Sumter, and Husein Pistoljevic, and along with Leland Beale -- comprise Coach Gillian's first recruiting class.

"Our returning players, now all sophomores, gained a great deal of valuable playing experience last year that will help them be prepared for the schedule we are playing this season," said Gillian. "If they can continue to improve at the pace they have over the past nine months, especially physically, they will all make a significant contribution to our team being successful."

Jefferson, a 6-3 guard and team captain, started all 27 games a year ago while leading the team with his 15.1 points, adding 5.3 rebounds, and 1.9 assists. He shot 41% from the field, including 27% on three-point field goals, and 64% at the free throw line, adding 31 steals and 24 blocks. Jefferson enjoyed eight 20-point games among 22 double-figure scoring games overall, and led the team in scoring 12 times while posting three double-doubles in scoring and rebounding. His season-highs were 28 points and 14 rebounds.

"Michael is a dynamic offensive player and an explosive athlete," said Gillian. "He is capable of affecting the game in many different ways. Mike is coming off a superb freshman year in which he not only scored effectively but improved a great deal defensively and as an all-around player."

Sumter, a 6-5 guard-forward, also started all 27 games a year ago while leading the team with his 5.4 rebounds and 1.3 blocks, adding 11.1 points. He shot 47% from the field, including 29% on three-point field goals, and 50% at the free throw line, adding 41 assists and 37 steals. Sumter had one 20-point game among 15 double-figure scoring games overall, and led the team in blocks 15 times, and rebounding six times while posting three double-doubles in scoring and rebounding. His season-highs were 29 points and 12 rebounds.

"Maurice is a fantastic multi-dimensional player," explained Gillian. "He had to play a lot of minutes for us last year at a number of different positions. This season, he will have the opportunity to utilize his talents in playing primarily at his natural position, small forward."

Pistoljevic, a 6-1 guard, started 15 of 27 games a year ago while leading the

team with his 65 three-point field goals, adding 10.5 points and 1.0 assists. He shot 39% from the field, including 36% on three-point field goals, and 64% at the free throw line, adding 18 steals. Pistoljevic established a new single-game record for three-pointers with nine against Virginia Union, also a Willett Hall record. He had two 20-point games among 16 double-figure scoring games overall, and led the team in scoring three times. His season-highs were 27 points and nine rebounds.

"Husein has an impact on the game because he can really shoot the basketball," said Gillian. "He is going to take and make a lot of 3-point shots for this team, as evidenced by his school-record nine three's in one game last year."

Beale, a 6-8, 250-pound forward, played in 12 games a year ago, averaging 5.8 points and 3.5 rebounds. He shot 47% from the field, and 70% at the free throw line. Beale had three double-figure scoring games, and led the team in rebounding one time. His season-highs were 13 points and eight rebounds.

"Leland is a big guy who has very good basketball skills and is a fine athlete for his size," explained Gillian. "He has made tremendous strides physically and in adjusting to the college game over the course of the last year."

The other four returning letterwinners include second-year team members Jon Larson, Wes Hager, Darren Holmes, and Joel Rowe.

Larson, a 6-6 forward, played in 14 games a year ago, averaging 1.7 points and 1.9 rebounds. He shot 30% from the field, and 44% at the free throw line. Larson's season-highs were seven points and six rebounds.

"Jon had an opportunity last year to compete for playing time on our team and he did just that, compete," stated Gillian. "He has shown a great deal of improvement over the last nine months, especially physically, and we are thrilled to have him at full strength now competing to add some depth to our frontcourt positions."

Hager, a 6-1 guard, played in 18 games a year ago, averaging 0.8 points and 0.8 rebounds. He shot 25% from the field, and 40% at the free throw line. Hager's season-highs were 10 points and four rebounds.

"Wes is an outstanding shooter who had a very good high school career in Las Vegas, Nevada," added Gillian. "He played for a great high school coach and has an understanding of the game."

Holmes, a 6-6 forward, played in 23 games a year ago, averaging 2.6 points and 0.9 rebounds. He shot 53% from the field, and 74% at the free throw line. Holmes' season-highs were eight points and three rebounds.

"Darren is an inside player who makes up for his lack of height with strength and desire," explained Gillian. "He is an important part of our team in that he adds depth to the frontcourt."

Rowe, a 6-1 guard, played in 17 games a year ago, averaging 1.0 points and 0.6 rebounds. He shot 38% from the field, and 57% at the free throw line. Rowe's season-highs were six points and four assists.

"Joel epitomizes what being a college student-athlete is all about," emphasized Gillian. "He is a hard worker who pushes himself and his teammates to the best of their abilities on a daily basis, whether it be in practice, workouts, the weight room, or conditioning."

Coach Gillian's second recruiting class numbers six, including one junior college transfer to the program this season in 6-11, 245-pound center Chad Kosmo, and freshmen 6-6 forward Lamar Barrett, 6-4 guard-forward Jason Davis, 5-10 guard Brandon Giles, 6-2 guard Kevin Schneider, and 6-5 guard-forward Dana Smith. In addition, 5-11 guard Stanley Boateng has earned a spot on the roster as a first-year walk-on player.

"What we love about this group of incoming players is not only that they are quality players but that they all come to us out of successful programs, they are all

winners," explained Gillian. "They are a diverse group in that they come from different areas of the country but what they have in common outside of basketball is that they are great kids. All six of them made the decision to join the Longwood Basketball Program for the right reasons and they want to be part of building something special here at the University."

Kosmo played at St. Petersburg (Fla.) Junior College during the past two seasons. He started six of 29 games a year ago, averaging 4.1 points, 3.6 rebounds, and 1.4 blocks while shooting 57% from the field, and 54% at the free throw line. Kosmo's season-highs were 14 points and eight rebounds.

"Chad brings something to our program that we did not previously have, size," stated Gillian. "He is a big guy who runs well and is very agile for his size. We are looking for Chad to make an immediate contribution for us in a number of areas including scoring around the basket, rebounding, and defending our own goal. We are pleased to have a motivated, developing player like Chad in the program here."

Barrett averaged 11.3 points and 8.9 rebounds as a high school senior while leading St. Andrew's (R.I.) to a record of 25-7 and the New England Final Four. He was a McDonald's All-American nominee while earning honorable mention All-America from *Street & Smith's* magazine, All-New England, and All-State honors in Rhode Island. St. Andrew's School has retired his jersey.

"Lamar is just the type of player we like to have in the Longwood Basketball Program," stated Gillian. "He is an all-around player that can play a number of positions, is very athletic, loves the game and is a winner."

Davis averaged 17.1 points and 8.2 rebounds as a high school senior while leading Windsor (Conn.) to a record of 23-1 and the Connecticut State Tournament Quarterfinals. He earned All-State honors from the Connecticut High School Coaches Association (CHSCA), The Hartford Courant, and the New Haven Register, adding two All-Conference selections as well.

"Jason is a high energy player," added Gillian. "He is an unbelievable athlete who loves the game. His work ethic, positive attitude, and desire for success will be instrumental in his development as a player. Jason's teams have experienced a lot of success throughout his high school career and playing in those type of situations should help him as he goes into playing against college opponents."

Giles averaged 13.5 points and 4.1 assists as a high school senior, adding 59 three-pointers (41%) while leading Magruder (Md.) to a record of 22-3 and Maryland's Montgomery County Region 4A finals. He earned All-Gazette and All-Journal honors as well as honorable mention All-Met by The Washington Post. Giles played in the regional game of the Jordan Capital Classic and scored 17 points, including five three-pointers. He helped Magruder to a three-year record of 66-11, including two State Tournament Final Four appearances.

"Brandon is a point guard, a true leader, and as good a three-point shooter as you will find," said Gillian. "He comes to Longwood very well prepared to play an important role in leading our program both on and off the court. As a point guard, we will look to him to be a quarterback on the floor. Brandon played in a very successful high school system that utilized the three-point shot effectively. We'll be expecting him to do some more of that for us at Longwood."

Schneider averaged 13.1 points, 5.2 rebounds, and 5.0 assists as a high school senior at Brophy Prep (Ariz.). He earned All-State and All-Region honors, and he was selected to play in the Arizona All-Star Game.

"Kevin is a point guard who has an outstanding knowledge of the game of basketball and an understanding of how it should be played," explained Gillian. "He grew up around college basketball with his Dad (Jeff Schneider) being a successful Division I Coach. Kevin comes to Longwood from one of the best high school programs in the state of Arizona. He is ready for the college game."

Smith missed the majority of his senior year at C.D. Hylton in Northern Virginia after suffering a season-ending knee injury. He averaged 15.3 points and 7.3 rebounds as a junior, and also played for the Woodbridge Hawks at the 2003 AAU National 17-Under Tournament in Orlando, averaging 18.1 points and 8.2 rebounds while leading the Hawks to the round of 16.

"Dana is a tremendous athlete and talented player," stated Gillian. "His combination of basketball and physical ability make him an offensive threat every time he touches the ball. He can make open jump shots and is very good scoring around the basket. He also has the desire to be a fantastic defensive rebounder which is a very underrated ability in today's players. We love having players like Dana, from right here in Virginia, who want to help put Longwood Basketball on the map in this state and around the country."

Boateng averaged 7.3 points and 8.6 assists as a high school senior at Mount Pleasant (R.I.). He earned All-Conference and All-Academic honors, and was named a Rhode Island Top 40 All-Star.

"Stanley is a point guard who has excellent quickness and strength and is here at Longwood and part of our basketball program for all of the right reasons," added Gillian.

Besides the three Top 20-caliber opponents already mentioned, Longwood will face two other NCAA Tournament teams from a year ago. The Lancers play at Northern Iowa and will play Valparaiso in Las Vegas as part of the exempt Las Vegas Classic. The Classic will be brutal, as Longwood plays four NCAA Tournament teams during an eight-day period Dec. 23-31, in order against Northern Iowa, Illinois, Cincinnati, and Valparaiso. The Cincinnati contest is slated for regional television broadcast on Fox Ohio and Fox Chicago.

Longwood will participate in two other tournaments this season as well. The Lancers will open the 2004-05 campaign in a tournament hosted by Ivy League member Columbia in New York City on November 19-20, joining the host Lions along with Morehead State and Mount St. Mary's. In early December, Longwood will participate in a tournament hosted by San Francisco in California on December 10-11, joining the host Dons, along with another NCAA Tournament team in Saint Joseph's, as well as UC Davis.

"We are very excited to be playing in these three great tournaments in our first year of full Division I competition," explained Gillian. "It gives our team a chance to play around the country in great locations, and certainly play against some tremendous competition."

"We are going to compete against basketball programs that have well established traditions and, in many cases, national reputations. It's great preparation for us to take the basketball program at Longwood where we eventually want it to go."

The schedule also features in-state road contests against CAA institutions Old Dominion, James Madison, and William and Mary, along with home contests against Big South Conference members Radford and VMI. The Lancers will also play at VMI, while traveling to nearby Division III school Hampden-Sydney in their only non-Division I competition.

The remainder of the home schedule includes Quinnipiac, Hofstra, Howard, South Carolina State, Appalachian State, Northern Colorado, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, UMKC, and Utah Valley State. Additional road games include Howard, Hartford, Quinnipiac, Utah Valley State, Northern Colorado, and Appalachian State.


"Putting the rest of our schedule together to play as an independent Division I program and working to put a competitive team on the floor every night for those games has had a lot of parallels," added Gillian. "It has been very challenging and worked its way into a very fulfilling accomplishment. We have a lot of quality opponents on the schedule, a number of home games for our fans to come out and enjoy, and are ready for the challenges that lie ahead. The coaching staff has done a great job getting us to this point where our schedule is complete and our team is ready to go. We need to continue to work hard and take on every positive opportunity we can to move the Longwood Basketball Program in the right direction."

When Longwood informed the NCAA in November 2002 of its intention to reclassify its intercollegiate athletics program to Division I status, the institution indicated the decision to move to Division I was part of an overall strategic plan to raise the visibility and profile of the University. This year's schedule for men's basketball, no doubt the toughest in school history, goes a long way toward accomplishing that plan.

The Review

2003-04 Season Wrap

Longwood University finished 2003-04 with a final overall record of 5-22 during the initial season under the direction of head coach Mike Gillian. Highlights to the campaign included a season-ending 76-66 victory over Northern Colorado in Fort Myers, Florida, a 63-62 win at NCAA Division II nationally-ranked Lenoir-Rhyne, and a season-opening 71-70 triumph at Winston-Salem State.

The Lancers fought through a difficult season, beginning the year with just four returning lettermen, and adding 10 newcomers to the program. Life was not made any easier with the first six games played on the road, and nine of the first 11 contests overall being played away from Farmville. Adding insult to injury, two players did not return after the first semester, one for academic reasons, and the other for personal reasons. Very unfortunate, senior All-America candidate Charles Stephens' mother, Rachel Dean Calloway, passed away on January 3, 2004 after a battle with cancer, and he would subsequently leave school and the men's basketball program.

Stephens had provided the team with great excitement in the season-opener at Winston-Salem State when he hit a three-point field goal at the buzzer to lift the Lancers to the exciting one-point win, giving Coach Mike Gillian a victory in his first game at the institution. Stephens nailed his decisive three-pointer while fading away from about 23-feet just right of the circle on an in-bounds play under the Longwood basket with just nine-tenths of a second remaining. Winston-Salem State had missed on a pair of free throw attempts with 12.8-seconds left, and the Lancers had missed on a shot attempt in the lane with the ball going out of bounds off the Rams before the game-winning in-bounds play. Freshman Michael Jefferson led the Lancers with 22 points in his first game wearing the Longwood uniform.

Longwood followed the win with two losses at the 38th Pickle Classic in North Carolina, falling 87-82 to host Mount Olive, and 92-82 to Elizabeth City State. Stephens continued to lead with his two-game totals of 52 points and 19 rebounds to earn All-Tournament honors.

Next up was the huge win at Lenoir-Rhyne as freshman Maurice Sumter made two free throws with 15.2-seconds left to lift Longwood past the #14 Bears on their own floor. Stephens led the Lancers with his game-high double-double of 25 points and 16 rebounds. Lenoir-Rhyne had taken its first lead of the game at 60-59 with 3:40 remaining, and the Bears led 62-61 at the 1:50 mark on a basket following two free throws at 2:06 by freshman Leland Beale. Longwood missed on a couple of scoring opportunities down the stretch to set the stage for the final seconds and Sumter's game-winning free throws.


Unfortunately, a 10-game losing streak would follow the impressive road win. Included were losses to Pfeiffer (97-79), a re-match four days later against Lenoir-Rhyne (67-64), nationally-ranked Division III Hampden-Sydney (80-76), Virginia Union (95-63), at Division I South Carolina State (78-56), Shaw (86-76), Belmont Abbey (64-60), a third game against Lenoir-Rhyne (78-58), a second game against Belmont Abbey (74-71), and Saint Augustine's (87-74). Pfeiffer would go on to advance to the Division II Elite Eight, while Virginia Union made it to the Division II National Tournament as well.


The Lancers halted the skid with a 64-61 overtime win at home past Saint Paul's, led by freshman Husein Pistoljevic's career-high 21 points, including 15 points in the second half. Again, though, a losing streak ensued - this time over the next seven games. The results included Southern Virginia (82-63), District of Columbia (61-53), Saint Paul's in the re-match at its place (83-69), District of Columbia a second time (67-62), nationally-ranked Virginia Union (82-62), and at Division I Radford (84-61). Against #23 VUU, Pistoljevic tied a school-record with nine three-point field goals, a new Willett Hall-record as well, for a career-high 27 points. He finished the game 9-16 on three-pointers. District of Columbia would also later qualify for the Division II National Tournament.

This time the Lancers stopped the disappointing outcomes with an 84-63 win past Southern Virginia at home, getting a game-high 26 points from Jefferson who finished 10-15 from the field, adding 10 rebounds for his third

double-double of the season. Following the SVU win, Longwood would drop three more games before the much-deserved and come-from-behind triumph past Northern Colorado in Florida at the National Provisional Tournament. In the season finale, Longwood rallied from an 18-point deficit in the second half as the Lancers trailed 43-25 with 18:27 remaining before an 11-0 run sparked the comeback. Sumter finished with a career-high 29 points to lead all scorers in the contest, shooting 12-18 from the field, including 2-3 on three-point field goals, and 3-4 at the free throw line. Sumter also had nine rebounds, three steals, and two blocks. Senior Nathan Fortener added a career-high 18 points along with six rebounds, while Jefferson contributed 16 points, five rebounds, five steals, and two blocks. Senior Ryan Earl dished-out a season-high nine assists for the Lancers as well. For his two-game efforts, Jefferson was named to the All-Tournament Team after posting 40 points, nine rebounds, eight steals, and six assists.

Overall, Longwood lost 10 games by 10 points or less, including six games by five points or less.







Longwood 71, Winston-Salem State 70
November 15, 2003 • Winston-Salem, N.C.

Charles Stephens hit a three-point field goal at the buzzer to lift Longwood past Winston-Salem State 71-70 in North Carolina. The exciting win by the Lancers gave first-year head coach Mike Gillian a victory in his first game at the institution.

Stephens nailed his game-winning three-pointer while fading away from about 23-feet just right of the circle on an in-bounds play under the Longwood basket with just nine-tenths of a second remaining. Winston-Salem State had missed on a pair of free throw attempts with 12.8-seconds left, and the Lancers had missed on a shot attempt in the lane with the ball going out of bounds off the Rams before the decisive in-bounds play.

The game was close throughout with 11 lead-changes and nine ties, including a 31-31 deadlock at the intermission. It was a pair of freshmen who kept Longwood in the game early as Maurice Sumter and Michael Jefferson totaled nine and six points, respectively. Sumter's third trey of the half gave the Lancers their largest lead of the half at 19-12 (8:17).

In the second half, W-SSU took its largest lead at 57-52 with 6:57 remaining before Longwood made its final run to lead 67-66 at 2:55 on a layup from Ryan Earl. Jefferson then tied the game at 68-68 with a free throw at 1:05, but the Rams went ahead 70-68 with 30-seconds remaining on a shot-clock-beating jumper from the baseline.

Jefferson led the Lancers with a game-high 22 points, adding six rebounds. Stephens finished with 19 points, nine rebounds, and two blocks, while Sumter had 15 points on perfect 5-5 shooting from beyond the arc. Audley Wehner led Winston-Salem State with 20 points.





#5 Hampden-Sydney 80, Longwood 76
December 1, 2003 • Farmville, Va.

Hampden-Sydney, ranked #5 in NCAA Division III, defeated Longwood 80-76 in front of a near-capacity 2,231 vocal fans in Lancer Hall, the first game between the two local institutions since 1978.

Hampden-Sydney led 42-36 at halftime, and increased its advantage several times during the final 20 minutes and led 71-59 with just 5:42 left before a furious comeback attempt by Longwood. The Lancers fought back to within 76-74 at 1:02 on a layup from Ryan Earl as the hosts outscored the Tigers 15-5 during a 4:40 stretch. H-SC sealed the outcome with 4-4 free throws over the final 25-seconds -- getting two each from Brian Gunn (0:25) and Mike Edwards (0:11) -- sandwiched around a jumper with 13-seconds left from Longwood's Maurice Sumter who finished with a career-high 18 points.

Longwood had led early in the contest, jumping in front 24-15 at 10:50 on a layup from Leland Beale. The Tigers rallied back, though, finally taking their first lead 29-28 at 6:39 on a layup from Mike Thompson. The Lancers built their early advantage with four three-pointers over the first 8:48, getting back-to-back treys off the bench from Husein Pistoljevic. Hampden-Sydney got back into the game early by pounding the ball inside to Jason Holman who scored 10 first-half points.







Sumter finished with a career-high 29 points to lead all scorers in the contest, shooting 12-18 from the field, including 2-3 on three-point field goals, and 3-4 at the free throw line. Sumter also had nine rebounds, three steals, and two blocks. Nathan Fortener added a career-high 18 points along with six rebounds, while Michael Jefferson contributed 16 points, five rebounds, five steals, and two blocks. Ryan Earl dished-out a season-high nine assists for the Lancers. Vincent Jackson and Erik Olson each scored 16 points to lead Northern Colorado, also reclassifying to Division I.



The History

Former Longwood All-American Jerome Kersey played 17 years in the NBA, including 11 years in Portland before winning an NBA Championship in San Antonio.

28-Years: 1976-2004

Longwood University embarks upon its 29th year of men's basketball competition during 2004-05. The Lancers finished 5-22 a year ago, their first season under the direction of head coach Mike Gillian, beginning the four-year reclassification to NCAA Division I. Coach Gillian's appointment signified **a new foundation** to Longwood Basketball.

Men's basketball at Longwood University has become the institution's most visible and popular intercollegiate athletic program since beginning competition with the 1976-77 season. Since that beginning, the Lancers have compiled an overall record of 394-334 for a winning percentage of .541%.

Longwood celebrated 25 years in style during 2000-01. That year, the Lancers enjoyed their fourth 20-win season, fourth NCAA Tournament appearance, and first-ever CVAC Tournament Championship. The season was one to remember as Longwood finished 23-8 while winning its first conference tournament title. The Lancers advanced into the NCAA Division II East Regional, defeating West Chester (Pa.) 103-95 in the first round before falling 77-76 in overtime to Queens (N.C.) in the NCAA regional semifinals. Also that year, Colin Ducharme became the first Longwood men's basketball player to earn National Player of the Year honors and was a consensus first-team All-America selection.

Longwood's four NCAA Tournament appearances include back-to-back participation following the 1994-95 and 1993-94 campaigns. In 1993-94, Longwood defeated Carson-Newman (Tenn.) 76-63 in the first-round of the NCAA South Atlantic Regional before Norfolk State edged the Lancers 61-59 to halt a school-record 20-game winning streak. In an NCAA regional consolation game, the blue and white fell 88-87 to Elizabeth City State (N.C.). The following year, Longwood lost to Shaw (N.C.) 83-76 in the first-round of the NCAA regionals. These two seasons proved to be the finest back-to-back years ever for the Lancers

as they achieved a two-year record of 42-15, an outstanding winning percentage of .737%.


Longwood made its first appearance in an NCAA Tournament at the conclusion of the 1979-80 season, in just the fourth-year of the program's existence. The Lancers advanced all of the way to the NCAA Division III Final Four played in Rock Island, Illinois. That squad compiled a school-record of 28-3, with two of the losses taking place during the NCAA Final Four to North Park (Ill.) and Wittenberg (Ohio).

The following season, 1980-81, Longwood stepped up to NCAA Division II certification and has accumulated 12 winning seasons since, including three 20-win campaigns, and three other years at an even .500 record. Over the years, the Longwood men's basketball program has produced a talented lineup of players. At the top of the list is former two-time All-American Jerome Kersey (1980-84), who still holds six school-records and enjoyed a solid 17-year NBA career after his Longwood playing days ended.

Colin Ducharme has led the charge of outstanding Longwood players since 2000. Joining Ducharme in recent years have been Jason Pryor (2000-02), Marques Cunningham (2000-02), and John Parker 2001-03). Pryor ranks 11th in points, scoring 1,148 career points in just two seasons. He had seven games with 35 or more points during his brief tenure, including four of the top five single-

game totals all-time. Cunningham is 15th in scoring (1,045) and fifth in assists (276). Parker ranks second in rebounding average (8.5), and once grabbed 19 rebounds in a game (12th all-time).

A talented group of players during the 1990's included Lee Farrior (1996-2000), Jason Outlaw (1994-98), Vince Walden (1994-98), DeVonne Johnson (1992-96), Joe Jones (1992-96), Benji Webb (1992-96), J.B. Neill (1991-95), Matt Watkins (1991-95), Charles Brown (1991-94), Adam Huffman (1991-

94), Michael Druitt (1990-94), and Bryan Weaver (1989-93). Farrior ranks sixth on the all-time scoring list with 1,300 career points. Outlaw scored 901 career points and ranks among the top 10 in rebounds (500), assists (248), steals (193), and blocks (48). Walden ranks fifth in three-point field goals (89). Johnson is the career leader in three-pointers (167). Jones is seventh on the all-time scoring list (1,254), and has since played professionally in the International Basketball Association (IBA) and overseas. Webb scored 962 career points, and ranks seventh in rebounds (550). Neill is second in three-point field goals (157). Watkins ranks sixth in steals (154). Brown ranks 13th in scoring (1,100) and seventh in assists (271). Huffman is eighth in blocks (47). Druitt ranks second in assists (400). Weaver scored 918 career points, and is fifth all-time in rebounds (595).

The decade of the 1980's produced such standouts as career scoring leader Kevin Jefferson (1986-90), Doug Poppe (1986-90), Dale Shavers (1986-90), Darryl Rutley (1986-89), Lonnie Lewis (1982-86), Ron Orr (1979-83), Joe Remar (1979-83), Kenny Ford (1978-81), and Shack Leonard (1978-80). Jefferson totaled 1,806 points during his outstanding career, including a phenomenal school-record 107 dunks over four years, and also grabbed 467 career rebounds. Poppe is 12th in scoring (1,139), and third in both

rebounds (653) and blockeds (91). Shavers ranks 10th in scoring (1,188). Rutley only played three seasons and is eighth in scoring (1,230), once scoring 37 points in a game, still equal to the seventh-best single-game total all-time. Lewis ranks fourth in scoring (1,452). Orr is fifth all-time in scoring with 1,335 career points, and fourth in rebounds (648). Remar is the all-time assist leader with 531, and also scored 1,479 career points to rank third all-time. Ford is 16th in scoring (1,040). Leonard was an All-Northeast Region selection in 1980, and was the Northeast Regional Tournament Most Valuable Player during the magical 1979-80 run to the NCAA Division III Final Four.

The original Longwood Basketball standout was Jimmy Yarbrough (1976-78), who is still owns the school-record for single-game points. Yarbrough, now the institution's associate director of admissions, scored 46 points against Bluefield College during the 1977-78 season, including a school-record 16 field goals. Yarbrough's 22.5 scoring average during the inaugural 1976-77 campaign still ranks #4 all-time.

Standouts on this year's team, such as the sophomore trio of Michael Jefferson, Maurice Sumter, and Husein Pistoljevic will look to add their respective names among the elite Lancers in the history of Longwood Basketball.

1979-80 Division III Final Four Team

It was a magical season for a program in only its fourth year of existence. The 1979-80 Longwood College men's basketball team made believers out of everyone while compiling a school-record 28-3 campaign en route to the 1980 NCAA Division III Final Four Tournament. In only its second year as an NCAA member, the Lancers came within three points of winning a National Championship.

At the Final Four, played in Rock Island, Illinois, Longwood played two-time defending national champion North Park (Ill.) in a semifinal contest that nobody gave the Lancers a chance to win. The blue and white trailed just 30-28 at halftime before the Vikings went ahead 42-36 midway through the second half. LC battled back to tie the contest at 45-45, and led 53-52 with just 39-seconds left. A pair of controversial traveling calls against the Lancers allowed the Chicago school to take a 56-53 lead at :13. A Joe Remar layup made it 56-55 at :06 before North Park made one of two free throws at :05 to provide for the final score of 57-55. A potential game-tying layup by LC was blocked at the buzzer.

Playing Wittenberg (Ohio) in the consolation game, LC jumped to a 30-24 advantage at the intermission. The Tigers forged ahead in the second half before Thomas Alston connected on a baseline jumper to tie the game at 45-45 with 37-seconds remaining. Wittenberg got a basket at :09, but Remar forced overtime with a 22-footer just ahead of the buzzer. The extra period was scoreless until a questionable foul call against the Lancers put a Tiger at the free throw line with no time on the clock at the end of the OT. After missing the first attempt, the second free throw was good to secure the 48-47 decision.

The unbelievable year witnessed Longwood advancing further in the NCAA Division III Tournament than any previous Virginia school at the time. Ranked #12 in the final national poll, the Lancers had winning streaks of 16 and 12 games during the season, and entered the Final Four with the best record in the nation

(28-1). LC advanced to the Final Four with post-season tournament wins past Framingham State (Mass.) 73-63, Clark (Mass.) 70-60, and Potsdam State (N.Y.) 78-61.


The two narrow losses at the Final Four concluded what former SID Hoke Currie described as an *"unbelievable, indescribable, and yes, amazing season."*

2000-01 Conference Champion Team

The remarkably amazing one-season turnaround of the 2000-01 Longwood men's basketball program concluded with the Lancers tough and disappointing 77-76 overtime loss to Queens (N.C.) in the NCAA Division II East Regional semi-finals in Fort Mill, South Carolina.

Longwood accomplished the best one-season turnaround in Division II men's basketball at a +19-game about-face. The Lancers finished 23-8 after a 4-22 season the year before (1999-2000), equaling the most wins in the program's 22-year Division II history (23), and equaling the second-most wins in the program's history. Longwood also claimed its first-ever Carolinas-Virginia Athletic Conference (CVAC) Tournament Championship.

Longwood shattered the school's record-book during 2001-02 with 41 new school-records. The Lancers attained 15 new team season records, 11 new individual season records, four new team single-games records, five new individual single-game records, and six new individual Lancer Hall records.

Longwood, ranked #21 in the final NABC/*Division II Bulletin* Top 25, opened the campaign with seven-straight wins, including a convincing 94-65 victory past Charleston (W.Va.) -- seeded #2 for the East Regional and ranked #18 nationally in the final poll at 23-6. The 7-0 beginning was the finest start to a season since 1979, and opening 11-2 overall was the best Division II start in the program's history.

The Lancers went 9-7 from Jan. 8 to Feb. 15, dropping five games by six points or less, including three games by three points or less. Four of the team's eight overall losses were to nationally-ranked opponents, and six of the eight losses overall were by six points or less.

Longwood responded well by winning seven of its last eight games, and 12 of its final 16 contests overall, including the CVAC Tournament Championship to earn just the third Division II Tournament appearance in school history.

Leading the one-season turnaround were Colin Ducharme and Jason Pryor, each DAKTRONICS All-Americans. Ducharme, a consensus first-team All-American and the NABC, DAKTRONICS, and *Division II Bulletin* National Player of the Year, posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national-best 15.8 rebounds, shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the line. He added a new school-record for season blocks with 130 (4.2) and also had 100 assists (3.2). Among his 10 new school-records, Ducharme also posted 29 double-doubles and 31-straight double-figure scoring games.

Pryor led Longwood with his 24.8 points, shooting 49% from the field and 84% at the free throw line. He added 4.8 rebounds, 2.7 assists, 63 three-pointers, and a team-best 54 steals (1.8). Pryor scored a new school-record 745 points that season, and posted 30 consecutive double-figure scoring games en route to establishing six new school-records, including a Lancer Hall-record

41 points against Barton (N.C.).

Marques Cunningham added 11.9 points, with a team-best 4.1 assists per game. Chris Isaacs and Zech Boyd, along with Jay Louden -- each averaged 4.2 points, while other scoring averages included Isaac Lartey (3.2), Russell Thompson (2.9), B.J. Buford (2.6), along with Marek Zielinski (1.3) and walk-on Matt Donohue (0.4).

The Lancers averaged 88.0 points, shooting 49% from the field as a team, a school-record 38% on three-pointers, and 74% at the line. Longwood limited opponents to 76.0 points and 40% shooting from the field, including just 32% on treys.

Jerome Kersey - Retired Jersey #54

Jerome Kersey (6-7), a former Longwood men's basketball All-America selection, played 17 years in the National Basketball Association (NBA) from 1984-2001. Jerome played for six NBA teams, finishing his career with the Milwaukee Bucks after two years with the San Antonio Spurs, including his participation with the 1999 NBA Champions.

He was a Lancer from 1980-84, gaining first-team All-America honors following the 1983-84 season, and third-team All-America accolades after the 1982-83 year. A second-round draft selection of the Portland Trail Blazers, the 46th-player selected in the draft that year, Kersey completed his outstanding Longwood career with 1,756 career points, second all-time at Longwood, and 1,162 career rebounds, tops on the Lancer career list.

Kersey played 11 NBA seasons in Portland, becoming only the second player in franchise history to score 10,000-plus career points, and grabbed 5,000-plus career rebounds. He then played the 1995-96 season with the association's Golden State Warriors, before completing the 1996-97 season with the Los Angeles Lakers. Kersey played for the Seattle SuperSonics during 1997-98 before joining San Antonio.

A native of Clarksville, Va., Kersey led Longwood to a record of 64-39 during his career at the institution. Additionally, he



was the Virginia College Division Player of the Year following the 1983-84 season when he averaged 19.6 points and a national-best 14.2 rebounds. Jerome still holds six school-records at Longwood.



Kersey spent 2003-04 as Director of Player Programs for Portland before being named as an assistant coach with the Milwaukee Bucks on July 2, 2004. In Milwaukee, Kersey is reunited with Bucks head coach Terry Porter, a former teammate for 10 seasons with the Blazers. While together in Portland, Kersey and Porter helped the Trail Blazers to 10 NBA Playoff appearances, including two trips to the NBA Finals (1991, 1993).

"Jerome was a tremendous competitor as a player and I look forward to him bringing that same tenacity to his work as a coach," said Porter at the press conference announcing his appointment.

Colin Ducharme - Retired Jersey #52

Colin Ducharme (6-9) was named the 2001 Verizon/NABC NCAA Division II National Player of the Year. The consensus 1st-team All-America selection was chosen player of the year by select Division II member coaches of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC). Ducharme was honored in Minneapolis, Minn. during the Division I Final Four where he received his award April 1, 2001.

Ducharme had previously been named the DAKTRONICS/CoSIDA and *Division II Bulletin* magazine National Player of the Year, and was a 1st-Team All-American by the NABC, DAKTRONICS/CoSIDA, *Division II Bulletin*, and *Basketball Times* magazines.

Ducharme was also named the 2000-01 CVAC Male Athlete of the Year as voted by the conference athletic directors. This prestigious award is presented annually in recognition of outstanding athletic contributions and achievements. He was also named the Longwood Male Athlete of the Year for 2000-01.

Ducharme posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national-best 15.8 rebounds during 2000-01, adding 4.2 blocks (2nd nationally) and 3.2 assists while shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the free throw line. He led the Lancers to a 23-8 record, the school's first CVAC Tournament Championship, and into the East Regional semifinals while establishing 10 new school-records.

Ducharme was named one of the Top 10 players in the 2001 Blu Summer League, a premier European showcase event for professional and aspiring professional players. He was also named the BSL's Best Rebounder among the 96 players participating in Treviso, Italy. Ducharme played four games in Italy and averaged his usual double-double of 12.8 points (51) and 13.0 rebounds (52),



including single-game highs of 19 points and 18 rebounds in separate contests. After a slow start in game one (11 rebounds, four points), he bounced back to average 15.7 points and 13.7 rebounds during his final three games.

Ducharme has the only two triple-doubles in Longwood history: 20 points, 21 rebounds, and 11 blocked shots at Belmont Abbey; and 24 points, 18 rebounds, and 10 assists vs. West Chester in the regionals. His 2000-01 season and career-bests included 33 points, 22 rebounds (three times), 11 blocked shots, and 10 assists.

Ducharme was also the only Division II player invited to the 49th Portsmouth Invitational Tournament (PIT) where he



helped his team to the PIT Championship with solid three-game totals of 18 points (6.0), 22 rebounds (7.3), four blocks, two assists, and one steal.

Ducharme played in the French Pro B League during 2003-04 with Evreux, averaging 14.2 points and 9.7 rebounds in 27 games. He played in the French Pro A League during 2002-03 with Paris Basket Racing, averaging 11.7 points and 6.5 rebounds in 10 games. Ducharme had played for Antibes of the same league at the end of the 2001-02 season, averaging 16.9 points and 10.9 rebounds in the final 14 games. He had begun his European career with Avellino of the Italian A-1 League at the start of 2001-02, seeing limited time in just five games (3.4 points, 2.0 rebounds) before suffering a knee injury that required subsequent surgery and rehabilitation.



WILLETT HALL

Willett Hall (formerly Lancer Hall) is home to Longwood Basketball and one of the finest athletic and physical education facilities of any similar size institution in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The facility was completed in 1980 at a cost of \$4.5 million.

Longwood University honored three former institution presidents, including Dr. Henry I. Willett Jr., on September 9, 2004 with three major buildings on campus named in their honor. Lancer Hall was named Willett Hall for the president from 1967 to 1981. Dr. Willett oversaw the transformation of Longwood into a fully coeducational institution.

Willett Hall features a 2,522-seat arena that had its floor replaced just prior to this 2004-05 season, as well as convenient concession stands located in the main lobby just recently-renovated during last season (2003-04), four locker rooms, training room, weight room, swimming pool, and other facilities for the University's 14-sports.


The men's basketball program at Longwood has compiled a homecourt record of 203-99 during 24 seasons of action in Willett Hall, an overall winning percentage of .672%.

Last season, Longwood drew 2,231 fans to the facility for the game against nearby Division III Hampden-Sydney. This year, Longwood will play 11 home contests, all Division I opponents, including games against Radford, Quinnipiac, Hofstra, VMI, Howard, South Carolina State, Appalachian State, Northern Colorado, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, UMKC, and Utah Valley State.

Longwood averaged a record 1,173 during the memorable 2000-01 season when the Lancers posted a 23-8 record, including 11-3 (.786%) at home. That season included a near capacity 2,213 for a contest against former rival Queens (N.C.).





Longwood University

With a legacy of learning dating back over 160 years, Longwood University has developed a meaningful learning environment that extends far beyond the classroom. Founded in 1839 as the Farmville Female Seminary Association, the school was a pioneer first in private and later in public education. The State of Virginia acquired the school in 1884 and renamed it as the Normal School, the first state institution of higher learning for women in Virginia. Over the years, the school expanded its curricula and had a succession of names, becoming Longwood College in 1949 and fully coeducational in 1976. On April 24, 2002, history was again made at Longwood when Governor Mark Warner signed legislation that designated Longwood as a university, effective July 1, 2002.

The legacy that began in 1839 continues today as Longwood University offers over 100 majors, minors and concentrations through its various academic programs. Given its historical roots, Longwood University enjoys an enviable reputation for teacher preparation. But the excellence has expanded throughout the university with strong programs in the liberal arts and sciences, business, professional and pre-professional programs. Today, the coeducational, comprehensive state university has an enrollment of over 4200 students and is comprised of three separate colleges plus a graduate division: the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Business and Economics, and the College of Education and Human Services.


Under the leadership of President Patricia P. Cormier, Longwood is committed to developing citizen leaders and provides a meaningful learning environment where students learn skills, knowledge and theory and then translate learning into action by doing research, internships, field work and community service. Recognizing the value of experiential learning, Longwood is one of the few universities in the country to require all students to complete an internship or similar learning experience before graduation. Additionally, Longwood was the first institution in Virginia to require that every freshman have a laptop computer. Technology is integrated throughout the learning process—an essential element for preparing the leaders of

tomorrow.

The Longwood learning environment is enriched further by the library that holds 245,000 book titles, 2,100 print journal subscriptions, and some 100 electronic data bases including access to 11,000 full-text electronic journals and provides state-of-the-art technology for information retrieval from libraries throughout the world, as well as satellite reception of foreign programs and web access.

Longwood students continue to rate their university as one of the most engaging in the country, according to results from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE). In the 2002 survey, seniors rated Longwood at or above the 80th percentile on 6 of the 9 NSSE benchmarks when compared with Masters institutions; freshmen rated Longwood at or above the 60th percentile on all 9 benchmarks when compared with Masters institutions. "Student Engagement with Technology" continued to lead the way at the 90th percentile or higher. The survey was developed by national assessment experts as an alternative to the U.S. News & World Report rankings, which are strongly influenced by resources and reputation. NSSE is sponsored by The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and The Pew Forum for Undergraduate Learning.

Additionally, Longwood University is one of only 20 "high performing" institutions nationwide selected to participate in the Documenting Effective Educational Practices (DEEP) project being conducted by the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) and the American Association for Higher Education (AAHE). Basically, the main purposes of the project will be to discover what practices enhance the learning process for college students and then to share that information with colleges and universities throughout the nation. Longwood was selected for the project because it was identified as an "educationally effective institution" based upon NSSE benchmark results and "promising persistence and graduation rates." Additionally, the new U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges Survey ranks Longwood with the 10th highest graduation rate (62 percent) among all master's level universities in the South.



Longwood University

Longwood provides leadership and services in the region and the state through the Longwood Small Business Development Center, the Longwood Center for the Visual Arts, and the Southern Virginia Higher Education Center in South Boston.

Additionally, Longwood University has a tremendous economic and cultural impact on Farmville and the surrounding communities. A recent study conducted by the Longwood Small Business Development Center estimates that university employees, students, and visitors spent over \$100 million in 2001—with 54 percent of that amount being spent in Farmville and the eight surrounding counties.

The Longwood campus, located in the heart of historic Farmville, Virginia, provides excellent facilities while reflecting the charm, beauty, and character associated with its long heritage. The campus community was enhanced recently with the opening of Brock Commons, a beautiful pedestrian promenade that provides a central focal point for the Longwood campus while eliminating traffic congestion and safety hazards. Fountains, walkways, outdoor sculpture and beautiful landscaping contribute to Brock Commons, creating a park-like atmosphere for students, faculty, staff, and the public.

The University has almost completely recovered from the devastating fire of April 24, 2001 that destroyed several historic buildings on campus including the Ruffners, Grainger Hall, and the signature Rotunda. A completely rebuilt Grainger Hall opened last year and reconstruction is well underway on Ruffner Hall and the Rotunda, scheduled for a re-dedication and grand opening in Spring 2005. Construction is also underway for a new science building that will provide the latest technology and scientific equipment for students and faculty.

One of the newest buildings on campus is the two-story, 60,000 square foot dining hall located on Brock Commons that opened for the spring semester 2000. This multi-purpose facility, with its curved, colonnaded portico overlooking Iler Field, is the first on campus to utilize geothermal heating and cooling. The flexible interior design provides space for banquets, meetings, and special events along with a Grand Dining Room seat-

ing 500 and an arcade seating an additional 700.

Behind and alongside this area are broad malls, lawns, 11 tennis courts, four athletic fields, an indoor-outdoor swimming pool, and numerous late-20th century buildings, including the library, residence halls, the Lankford Student Union, and various academic facilities. The campus has six auditoriums ranging in size from 150 seats to over 1200.

Willett Hall is a \$4.5 million health, physical education, and recreation complex. It has a gymnasium with 3,000 seats; a complete weight-training laboratory; an Olympic-size pool with a three-meter board and underwater sound, lighting, and observation window; a 500-seat natatorium; a modern dance studio with a floating floor and staging capacity; and one of the state's best-equipped laboratories for the study of human performance as it relates to exercise, sports, health, and the arts. Nearby, is a nine-hole golf course and Longwood Estate, the home of the President.

Longwood University is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award bachelors and masters degrees. Other accreditation includes the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Virginia State Board of Education, the National Association of Schools

of Theatre, and the National Association of Schools of Music. Specific program endorsements include the undergraduate Social Work Program that is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education; the undergraduate Therapeutic Recreation Program that is accredited by the National Recreation and Park Association in cooperation with the American Association for Leisure and Recreation; and the undergraduate Business Administration Program that is accredited by Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB- International).

Finally, for the seventh year in a row, Longwood is ranked among the top regional public schools in the South in the 2005 U.S. News & World Report "Best Colleges" Guide.



The Farmville Area, Commonwealth of Virginia

THE FARMVILLE AREA

Longwood University is located in historic Farmville, Virginia -- 65 miles west of Richmond, 48 miles east of Lynchburg, and 60 miles south of Charlottesville -- the Heart of Virginia. The Town of Farmville has a population of 6,500.

The Farmville Area is comprised of the town of Farmville, along with the counties of Prince Edward and Cumberland. This area serves as a retail hub and commercial activity center for eight counties of Southside Virginia and has a service market of more than 100,000 people. Education is a dominant factor in the area, with three outstanding colleges offering educational and training opportunities. In addition to Longwood University, Hampden-Sydney and Southside Virginia Community colleges are located in the area.

The Farmville Area has a diversified economy with strong manufacturing, trade, service, and agricultural sectors. Manufacturing activity centers around natural resources, textiles, and a variety of industrial and consumer goods.

The Town of Farmville is also home to the annual Heart of Virginia Festival (first Saturday in May) and many historical sites, including Appomattox Courthouse and Sailor's Creek Battlefield. These points of interest make the Farmville Area a very attractive place to be. Located in and near town are churches, hotels, motels, a country club, a municipal airport, and a community hospital. Many additional points of interest are within a short distance of the Farmville area.

COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA

The Commonwealth of Virginia is one of the original 13 colonies. Named for the Virgin Queen, Elizabeth I of England, Virginia was England's first successful overseas colony and the site of the first permanent English settlement in America. West Virginia was part of Virginia until 1863.

Virginia's rich political heritage helped shape the democratic principles on which the United States was founded. Virginia played an important role in the American Revolution (1775-1783), and it entered the Union as the tenth of the original 13 states on June 25, 1788. During the American Civil War (1861-1865) the state's capital, Richmond, was also capital of the Confederacy. The state has long been nicknamed Old Dominion.

George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, and James Monroe, all Virginians, were founding fathers of the United States and were among the first five U.S. presidents. Virginia is also the birthplace of U.S. presidents William Henry Harrison, John Tyler, Zachary Taylor, and Woodrow Wilson.

Virginia is the 35th largest state in the United States, bounded on the east by the Atlantic Ocean, on the north and east by Maryland and the District of Columbia, on the west by West Virginia and Kentucky, and on the south by Tennessee and North Carolina.

According to the 2000 national census, Virginia's population was 7,078,515, ranking it 12th among the states. Virginia Beach (425,257) is one of the most popular resort destinations on the East Coast, as well as Virginia's largest city. Richmond (197,790) is the state capital and a center of banking and insurance, and of both retail and wholesale trade. The Naval Base at Norfolk (234,403) and the Naval Shipyard at Portsmouth (100,565) employ thousands of civilians and military personnel. Hampton (146,437) is important for its aviation activities such as Langley Air Force Base and a National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) facility. In Newport News (180,150) is a shipyard that builds naval ships, including aircraft carriers. Alexandria (128,283) is part of the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. Lynchburg (65,269) is the site of light industries. Roanoke (94,911) is the largest city in western Virginia.

Civilian and military employment, mostly with the federal government, is an essential part of the Virginia economy. The Pentagon, which houses the Department of Defense, is located in Virginia and is the leading federal employer in the northern part of the state. There are also important military bases in Virginia, particularly the massive complex of army, navy, and air force bases in the vicinity of Norfolk.

Average January temperatures range from less than 32°F in the west to more than 42°F in southeastern Virginia. Average July temperatures range from more than 78°F in the southeast to less than 68°F in the western mountains. Total precipitation ranges from about 35 to more than 50 inches. Snowfalls are moderate, except in the mountain regions.

Besides Virginia, three other states - Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania - use the term commonwealth as part of their official names. The delegates to the convention in Williamsburg, when the first Constitution of Virginia was adopted on June 29, 1776, used commonwealth as the name for the new form of government. It is very likely they had in mind the Puritans' rebellion against the Crown in England more than 100 years earlier.

Pennsylvania and Massachusetts also chose to be called commonwealths after independence from Great Britain. The other 10 former colonies took the name "state," the term used in the Declaration of Independence. Kentucky was once part of Virginia. When Kentuckians joined the Union as the 15th state in 1792, it also kept the name commonwealth.

PATRICIA PICARD CORMIER

Known for her warmth, enthusiasm and dynamic personality, Dr. Cormier is now in her ninth year as president of Longwood University.

She has been an administrator in higher education for over 36 years, serving as chief academic officer at Winthrop University, in key vice presidential positions at the University of Pennsylvania where she was also an associate dean and a tenured member of the faculty, and as vice president for development and alumni relations at the Medical College of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Cormier has master's and doctoral degrees in education from the University of Virginia and a bachelor's degree in health education from Boston University. Her honors include selection as one of 30 fellows nationwide to participate in the American Council on Education's fellowship program in academic administration in 1982-83, a master's degree *Honoris causa* from the University of Pennsylvania in 1982, election to three national honor societies, and selection as a Fellow of the College of Physicians of Philadelphia. She has published two highly regarded in her field: *Community Oral Health: A Systems Approach and Educating the Dentists of the Future*.

In addition to her many community and collegiate responsibilities, Dr. Cormier is the past chair of the Executive Committee of the Renaissance Group, past chair of the NCAA Division II Presidents' Council, and past chair of the Council of Fellows of the American Council on Education. She serves as a Commissioner on the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and is the Chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

Dr. Cormier has worked with the campus community to develop and implement a new Mission, Vision, and Goals Statement for the University. This strategic plan for the future of Longwood is embodied in the first sentence of the Mission Statement: "Longwood is an institution of higher learning dedicated to the development of citizen leaders who are prepared to make positive contributions to the common good of society."

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS **RICK MAZZUTO**

Rick Mazzuto is in his third full year as Director of Athletics for Longwood's 14-sport intercollegiate athletics program, an independent member of the NCAA entering the second year of a four-year reclassification period toward Division I certification. He began at Longwood University on March 1, 2002.

Mazzuto previously was the AD at Division I Saint Mary's (Calif.) College from 1989-2000 after serving as AD at Division I Iona (N.Y.) College from 1980-89.

While athletic director at Saint Mary's in Moraga, Calif. for 11 years, Mazzuto oversaw a \$5-million budget, 16-sports intercollegiate athletics program with 60+ employees. During his time there, Saint Mary's participated in the 1999 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament, the 1997 Division I Men's Basketball Tournament, and the 1992 Division I Women's Soccer Tournament. The 2000 women's basketball team participated in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) as well, while the women's cross country team won the 1990 West Coast Conference Championship, and the softball team won three Western Intercollegiate Softball League titles.

At Iona in New Rochelle, N.Y. for nine years as AD, Mazzuto managed a 20-sport Division I program with 40+ employees. While there, Iona participated in two NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Tournaments, and made two NIT appearances. The school won five conference championships in men's cross country, three in men's basketball, two each in baseball and softball, and one in men's ice hockey. Additionally, the men's cross country and water polo programs were nationally-ranked annually. Mazzuto worked at Iona from 1977-80 as the institution's associate AD.

Mazzuto has served on numerous committees during his career, including the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee from 1991-97. He has also served as an instructor at both California-Berkeley's extension program and at Iona. Mazzuto has extensive community service activities, serving on the Board of Directors of both the Moraga, Calif. and New Rochelle, N.Y. Rotary Clubs. He is a past president of the Moraga, Calif. Rotary Club as well.

Mazzuto earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in political science from Trinity (Conn.) College where he began his career in intercollegiate athletics as the school's sports information director for two years. He also served as SID at Lafayette (Pa.) College for four years, and was the publicity director for the East Coast Conference (ECC) for two years.

Mazzuto was married to the former Janet Johnstone in September 2002.


FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE DR. RAY BRASTOW


ATHLETIC TRAINING ASSISTANT ANN PORADA, ATC

A native of Midlothian, Virginia, Porada served as VP of the Longwood Athletic Training Association. She resides in Farmville.







Facilities & CHAMPS/Life Skills Program

LANCER STADIUM: BASEBALL

Lancer Stadium, one of the finest collegiate facilities in this area, was renovated and ready for play in the 1994 season. The home for Longwood baseball includes a stadium which seats 500, an air-conditioned press box, new dugouts, irrigation, and landscaping. The most prominent feature of the stadium is a 90,000-dollar scoreboard/message center, compliments of the Pepsi-Cola Company. Outfield dimensions of the park are 335' in right and left, 375' in the power alleys and 400' to center.

LANCER FIELD: SOCCER, SOFTBALL, & LACROSSE

Longwood University plays its home soccer, softball, and lacrosse games on-campus at Lancer Field, adjacent to Lancer Stadium. The excellent facility sports a soccer/lacrosse field and softball field.

Lancer Field's soccer/lacrosse venue has a natural Bermuda grass playing surface with irrigation and spectator seating capacity for approximately 500.

Lancer Field's softball venue is fan-friendly with seating for approximately 250, fences, backstop, dugouts, batting cage, irrigation, and landscaping. The natural grass field's dimensions are 190-feet down the right and left-field lines, and 220-feet to straight-away center field. Additionally, the dugouts are equipped with water fountains, restroom facilities, and storage areas.

Additionally, the Lancer Field facilities feature prominent scoreboards, compliments of the Pepsi-Cola Company. Softball began play on its new field during the 1999 spring campaign, while soccer began in the fall of 1999, and lacrosse began use of its field in the spring of 2000. Both venues have lights available for playing night contests.

BARLOW FIELD: FIELD HOCKEY

Nestled in the northeast corner of campus, Barlow Field is a natural grass playing surface with a capacity of approximately 1,000. The field is conveniently located adjacent to the university dining hall and several student residence halls; and provides an excellent backdrop for collegiate field hockey. The field was renovated for the 1999 season.

LONGWOOD GOLF CLUB: MEN'S AND WOMEN'S GOLF

The Longwood Golf Club, adjacent to the President's house one mile from the institution, is one of only three collegiate-owned golf courses in Virginia. The Longwood course is known for its challenging layout, lush fairways and manicured greens. The 6,000 yard layout plays to a par 69 for men and 72 for women and is equipped with two large practice greens, practice sand traps, club house, driving range and pro shop.

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

Longwood University is a member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program. The mission of the program is to assist student-athletes in acquiring education and experiences that develop, challenge, and prepare them for future success in life.

BOYS BASKETBALL CAMP





NCAA Division I Reclassification Update

RECLASSIFICATION PERIOD ENTERS YEAR TWO DURING 2004-05

Longwood University President **Dr. Patricia P. Cormier** received a letter dated July 23, 2004 from the NCAA that stated the organization's Division I Management Council Membership Subcommittee had approved the institution's move into the second year of a four-year reclassifying process. The most significant aspect of year two during the Division I reclassification period toward official certification in September 2007 is that Longwood's intercollegiate athletic program must operate under all Division I rules and regulations, including the scheduling requirements.

During 2004-05, Longwood must comply with the following requirements: full compliance with all Division I legislation and membership requirements; attendance at the NCAA Convention by the chief executive officer, the director of athletics, the senior woman administrator, the faculty athletics representative, and the compliance coordinator; attendance (*by the same representatives mentioned previously*) at an orientation session conducted by the national office related to the application of Division I legislation and issues impacting Division I; and submit an annual report and updated strategic plan by June 30, 2005 based on feedback received from the previous year's annual report.



DIVISION I RECLASSIFICATION APPROVAL FROM NCAA

Longwood University President **Dr. Patricia P. Cormier** received a letter dated August 15, 2003 from the NCAA that stated the organization's Division I Management Council Membership Subcommittee had approved the institution's move into the first year of a four-year provisional membership period toward Division I reclassification. Dr. Cormier had informed the NCAA in November 2002 (see below) of Longwood's intention to reclassify its intercollegiate athletic program to Division I as part of an overall strategic plan to raise the visibility and profile of the University.

As Dr. Cormier stated recently, "We have made our first successful step to Division I and this is a natural and logical move for Longwood. Our academic profile has been raised over the past few years and we believe that Division I status will enhance both our institutional image and our recruitment efforts. Our student-athletes deserve to play at that level and we look forward to developing some great rivalries."

During 2003-04, Longwood satisfied the following requirements of the NCAA: compliance with all minimum contests and participation requirements for sports sponsorship as set forth in Bylaw 20.9.3.3; submit a strategic plan based on feedback from the previous plan; apply Division I legislation to the greatest extent possible; participation at the NCAA Convention (*by the same representatives mentioned previously*); attendance (*by the same representatives mentioned previously*) at an orientation session conducted by the national office related to the application of Division I legislation and issues impacting Division I; and submit an annual report and updated strategic plan by June 30, 2004 based on feedback from the previous year's annual report.

"The receipt of this letter from the NCAA is just one more step in the evolution of the Longwood athletics program," commented Director of Athletics **Rick Mazzuto**. "It's also one more indication that we're handling reclassification the right way and are on schedule."

EXPLORATORY PERIOD COMPLETED DURING 2002-03

Longwood University President **Dr. Patricia P. Cormier** informed the NCAA in a letter dated November 12, 2002 of Longwood's intention to reclassify its intercollegiate athletic program to Division I status. By doing so, the institution began an NCAA-mandated five-year process, including a one-year "exploratory period" (2002-03), to change its membership from Division II to Division I.

The decision to move to Division I is part of Longwood's overall strategic plan to raise the visibility and profile of the University. According to President Cormier, "We believe that Division I status will enhance both our institutional image and our recruitment efforts. And we think our student-athletes deserve to play at that level. We look forward to developing some great rivalries."

Those sentiments are shared by Longwood Director of Athletics **Rick Mazzuto** who stated, "One of the tremendous positives generated out of moving to Division I is the opportunity to use intercollegiate athletics as a vehicle to raise the public profile of the institution. The increased opportunities to play other high profile educational institutions, and to travel to major metropolitan areas where they are located, will greatly benefit Longwood -- in terms of more media interest and visibility."

A key date during the early reclassification process is September 1, 2003 - a date by which all Longwood student-athletes and the athletic program will be evaluated under Division I academic rules. Another important date will be September 1, 2004 - a date by which the athletic program must operate under all rules and regulations of Division I and continue to do so for the following three years until the actual reclassification by the NCAA (September 1, 2007). This date is significant because of compliance with the scheduling requirement that, for example, will require the Lancer men's and women's basketball teams to each play a minimum of 26 Division I opponents.

"The fact is, that as of September 1, 2004 - the significant change in terms of scheduling will already be in place," added Mazzuto. "While official reclassification will come on September 1, 2007, essentially, we will act as a Division I athletic program beginning with 2004."

"This is an exciting time for Longwood University Athletics and its student-athletes. There are tremendous changes at hand that will benefit both the University and its students."
