Head Coach Mike Gillian

Longwood University named Mike Gillian as the seventh head coach in the history of men's basketball at the institution on May 2, 2003. Coach Gillian, in his third year during 2005-06, is charged with building an NCAA Division I program, and has been doing so from the ground up during his first two seasons while compiling a record of 6-52. The program begins this season with 11 scholarship players and four returning starters among 11 letterwinners on the 14-player roster.

Longwood finished 1-30 during 2004-05, year two of the University's *Division I Reclassification* and first year playing a full Division I schedule. The Lancers competed with nine scholarship players, no seniors, and 13 freshmen and sophomores on the 14-player roster. Longwood was 5-22 during 2003-04, year one of the transition while competing with seven scholarship players and only four returning letterwinners on the 14-player roster. That team was depleted even further at mid-season with the loss of the team's leading scorer.

Prior to his arrival at Longwood, Coach Gillian had been an assistant coach at George Mason University under head coach Jim Larranaga from 1997-2003. He had also worked under Larranaga for one season at Bowling Green State (Ohio) University (1996-97) before going to George Mason with Larranaga.

"Mike brings an excellent Division I background to our University," explained Director of Athletics Rick Mazzuto. "He has worked with an outstanding head coach in Jim Larranaga and is ready to move the Longwood program forward."

During Gillian's six seasons as an assistant coach at Mason, the Patriots went 100-74 overall with a 66-34 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) record, winning two CAA Tournament championships (1999, 2001) and two CAA regular season titles (1999, 2000). George Mason also earned two NCAA Tournament appearances (1999, 2001) and made one National Invitation Tournament (NIT) appearance (2002). The Patriots were 57-18 overall at home in the Patriot Center, posting a 41-8 CAA homecourt record.

At Bowling Green, the Falcons finished 22-10 while winning the 1997 Mid-American Conference regular season title (13-5) and earning an NIT appearance.

"We have established ourselves as a competitive Division I Basketball Program. Our returning players have done a great job of preparing themselves for the upcoming season and we will look to our new guys to make an immediate impact. Longwood Basketball is ready to take the next step forward, and we are going to have a lot of fun doing just that."

"I'm very excited and would like to thank President Cormier (Dr. Patricia P. Cormier) and Rick Mazzuto for the opportunity to be the head basketball coach here at Longwood University," said Gillian. "It's been a long-time goal of mine to be a head coach, and to do so at the highest level. At Longwood, it's exciting to be leading a program through the transition to Division I status.

"The leadership and direction of the Division I transition plan at Longwood, as established by Dr. Cormier and Rick Mazzuto, is outstanding. Their unique insight and involvement has made being here a natural fit for me, and I look forward to the challenges ahead.

"I will certainly draw upon the experience of working with Jim Larranaga, and at George Mason University, to establish a successful Division I men's basketball tradition at Longwood."

Prior to joining Larranaga at BGSU, Gillian was an assistant coach at Division II American International (Mass.) from 1989-95. During that six-year stint working for current Indiana Pacers assistant coach Jim Powell, the

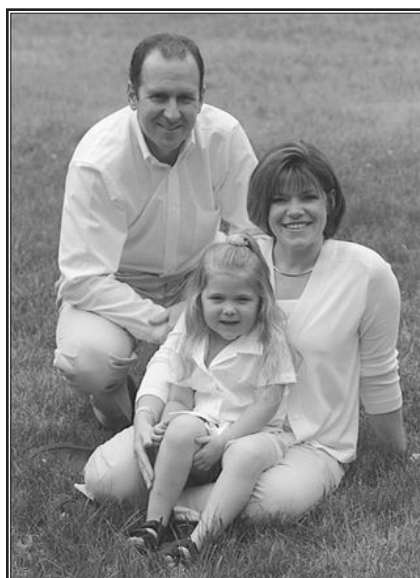
Yellow Jackets went 117-58 overall with a 75-33 Northeast-10 Conference (NE-10) record, winning both the NE-10 regular season and tournament championships in 1994 (26-6). American International also advanced to the second-round of the Division II Tournament that year.

Gillian was a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) "Assistant Coaches Committee" from 1999-2003. He was a YES Clinic speaker at the Division I Men's Final Four from 1998-2000, and has extensive public speaking experience through his involvement with numerous booster, local business and civic organizations, and charity events.

Gillian was a four-year letterwinner as an undergraduate at Division III North Adams State (now the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts), and served as a team captain during his final two years. He received a bachelor of science degree in business administration from North Adams State, and earned a master of business administration degree from American International.

A native of Ayer, Massachusetts, Gillian (41) and his wife, Janet, have a four-year-old daughter, Emma. The Gillian family resides in Farmville.

Bill Reinson is in his fourth year as an assistant coach for men's basketball at Longwood University during 2005-06. He joined the program prior to the 2002-03 campaign after having spent the previous two seasons (2000-02) as an assistant coach North Carolina-Greensboro.

Reinson served as the interim head coach for two games (1-1) late in the 2002-03 season due to an illness of the head coach.

At Longwood, Reinson is involved with the most important aspects of the men's basketball program. These include on and off campus recruiting, opponent scouting and game plan preparation, player skill development, as well as assisting Mike Gillian with practice preparation and scheduling of opponents.

During Reinson's two seasons as an assistant coach at UNCG under head coach Fran McCaffery, the Spartans went 39-23 overall, winning the 2001 Southern Conference Tournament Championship. North Carolina-Greensboro earned one NCAA Tournament appearance (2001) and made one National Invitation Tournament (NIT) appearance (2002).

Prior to his time with the Lancers and Spartans, Reinson was an assistant coach at NAIA King College in



Bristol, Tennessee during the 1988-89 season. He has also coached at Seton Catholic High School (freshman boys basketball) in Chandler, Arizona and at Mesa High School (assistant football) in Mesa, Arizona.

A native of Mesa, Arizona, Reinson earned his bachelor of science degree in business administration from the University of Phoenix. He and his wife, Lana, have three daughters: Megan (20), a student at Virginia Tech, Bria (15), and Taylor (11).

Michael Huger is entering his first season as an assistant coach for men's basketball at Longwood University during 2005-06. Huger has played professionally in Europe for the past 12 years after graduating from Bowling Green State University.

"Having just completed a successful and lengthy professional playing career, Mike Huger brings with him to Longwood a wealth of practical basketball knowledge that we will put to great use, especially in the continuing development of our young players," explained Gillian. "Mike has always wanted to get into the coaching profession when his playing career came to its conclusion, and I am very pleased that his opportunity to do just that is with us here at Longwood.

"He has tremendous energy, is a great person, very positive and upbeat, and I'm certain will be a great addition to our coaching staff."



Huger has played in Belgium since 1996 for Basket Club Liege (2001-05), FLV Athlon Ieper (2000-01), and Racing Antwerp (1996-2000). He began his professional career in Finland for Turku (1993-94) before playing in Holland for two years (Goba Gorinchem, 1994-95; Rotterdam, 1995-96). Huger was the Dutch League's MVP for 1995-96, averaging 25.3 points and 5.8 assists. He has also earned first-team All-Belgium honors in both 2000 (15.7 points, 5.3 assists) and 2004 (13.6 points, 4.0 assists), leading both of those respective teams to Belgium Cup Championships. Additionally, Huger has coached and mentored the Liege Basket Club Junior League program since 2001.

A native of New York City, Huger earned his bachelor of science degree in education from Bowling Green State in 1994. He was a standout for the Falcons from 1989-93, twice earning Mid-American Conference honors (1993, 1992) while also a Naismith Award nominee in 1993 (16.0 points, 4.1 assists). That year (1993), he was also runner-up for conference player of the year honors to Ohio's Gary Trent. Huger totaled 988 career points and 283 career assists at BGSU.

Huger and his wife, Tonya, reside in Farmville.



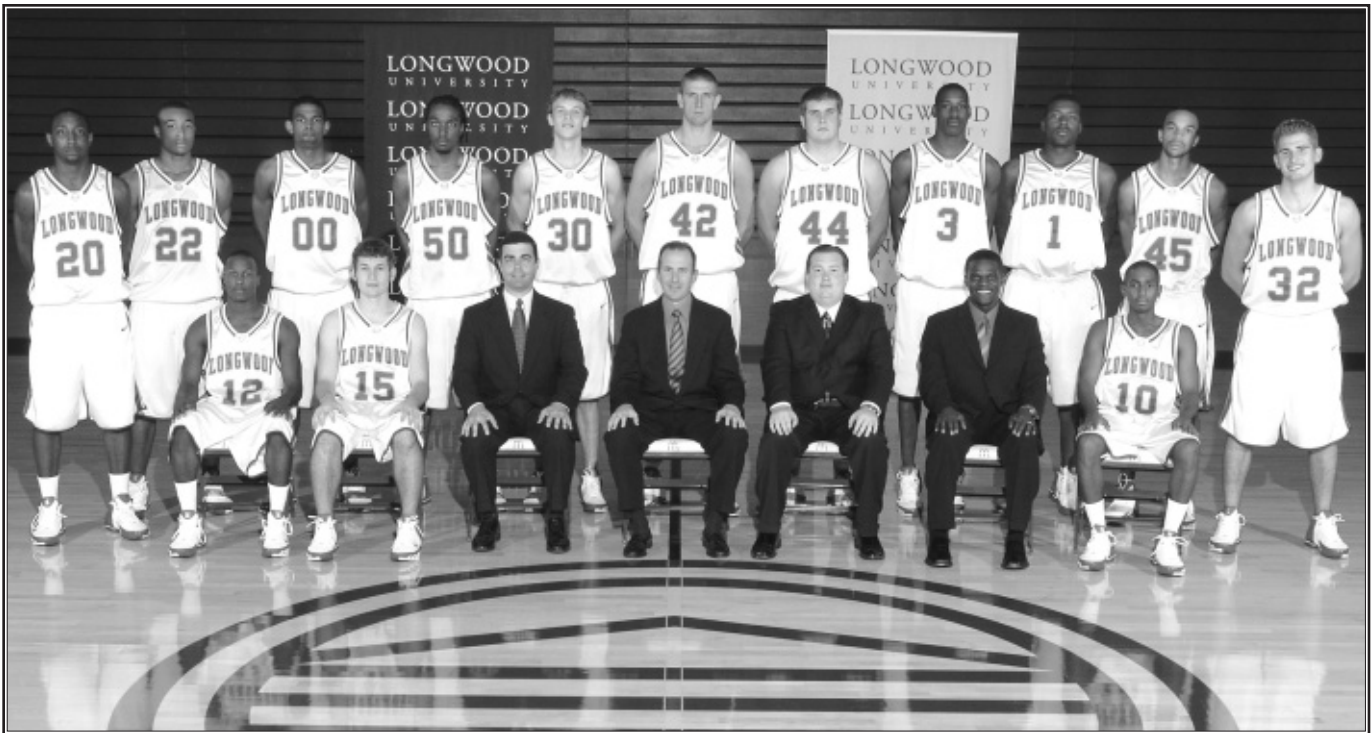

2005-06 Campaign

Villanova in Atlantic City. At Virginia. At Kansas State. These three games highlight the 2005-06 Longwood University men's basketball campaign under the direction of third-year head coach Mike Gillian. A year ago, it was #1 Illinois, #6 Wake Forest, and #17 Cincinnati. The Lancers enter the upcoming season while competing in year three of the University's four-year *NCAA Division I Reclassification*. Coach Gillian's program continues to be a countable Division I opponent for everyone with inclusion in the all-important Ratings Percentage Index (RPI) as well.

Longwood returns four starters among 11 letterwinners from a year ago, including the top eight scorers overall who combined for 94 percent (1,865 of 1,978 points) of the team's offense. The same eight combined to play 5,688 of the squad's 6,275 minutes overall (91%), each of the eight players averaging at least 15.0 minutes per game. To this group, Coach Gillian has added three talented newcomers.

RETURNING STARTERS (4)

Among the returning starters are juniors Michael Jefferson (6-3) and Maurice Sumter (6-5) who have each started all 58 games of their respective careers. The other returning starters are senior Chad Kosmo (6-11) and sophomore Lamar Barrett (6-6).

"All of our returning players gained incredibly valuable experience last year, playing against a complete Division I schedule for the first time," explained Gillian. "They did a great job helping our program achieve competitiveness at the Division I level and we feel like they are ready now to make the next step forward.

"Mike, Mo, Chad, and Lamar started all 31 games together last year. They have developed the kind of cohesiveness in their approach to the game, the effort in which they play, and their belief in one another that should start to pay off for us collectively, and them individually."

Jefferson has led the team in scoring for each of the past two seasons, and averaged 15.4 points a year ago, including a career-high 30 points at #1 Illinois. The third-year player added 4.6 rebounds, and 2.8 assists while leading the team in eight offensive statistical categories. Jefferson also grabbed a career-high 14 rebounds at Quinnipiac with two double-doubles among 24 double-figure scoring games. He posted 11 20-point games, and the one 30-point game while leading team in scoring 17 times. Jefferson was named to the Las Vegas Holiday Classic All-Tournament Team after averaging 24.6 points, 5.4 rebounds, and 4.2 assists against four NCAA Tournament teams from the previous year; including #1 Illinois (30 points, 6 assists) #17 Cincinnati (27 points), Northern Iowa (20 points), and Valparaiso (22 points). His 30 points at top-ranked Illinois were the second-highest individual point total against the Fighting Illini last season, only surpassed during the second-round of the NCAA Tournament. Not surprisingly, Jefferson was deservedly named to the Division I All-Independent second-team.

Sumter averaged 10.9 points as a sophomore, and also led the Lancers in rebounding (6.0) while adding 2.4 assists, 51 steals, and 23 blocks. He scored a season-high 23 points against South Carolina State and had two dou-

ble-doubles among 18 double-figure scoring games. The versatile Sumter led the team in rebounding 12 times, in steals 15 times, and in blocks 10 times.

Kosmo was a pleasant addition to the program a year ago from the junior college ranks and promptly started all 31 games while averaging 6.2 points, 5.7 rebounds, and 1.5 blocks. He posted a career-high 12 points at #1 Illinois, a perfect 6-6 from the floor with seven rebounds in 16 minutes. Kosmo also grabbed a career-high 11 rebounds against Utah Valley State, and blocked a career-high five shots on two occasions. He posted one double-double, and led the team in rebounding 12 times and in blocks 17 times.

"We are going to compete against basketball programs that have well established traditions and, in many cases are playing against teams everyone will be watching in the NCAA Tournament."

Barrett also started all 31 games while averaging 9.7 points, 4.9 rebounds, and 1.9 assists, adding 28 steals and 26 blocks. He scored a career-high 23 points at Northern Colorado, and grabbed a career-high 11 rebounds at Quinnipiac. Barrett had one double-double among 15 double-figure scoring games, including the 20-point game. Another versatile player, he led the team in scoring seven times, in rebounding five times, in assists eight times, in steals nine times, and in blocks eight times. Barrett was named to the Columbia Classic All-Tournament Team while making his collegiate debut a year ago, averaging 17.5 points during his first two appearances. He was also selected to the Division I Independent All-Newcomer Team.

TOP RETURNING LETTERWINNERS (4)

Other top returning letterwinners include juniors Husein Pistoljevic (6-2) and Leland Beale (6-8), along with sophomores Dana Smith (6-5) and Brandon Giles (5-10).

"This group of returning players will play a vital role in showing the quality of the depth we now have in our program," said Gillian. "Husein was a starter for half of last season and Leland, Dana, and Brandon all played major minutes on a consistent basis. There is an expectation that these guys have for themselves and for the team that will push us to be better. We are going to count on all of them to make a significant, productive contribution during the upcoming season."

Pistoljevic started 14 of 31 games while averaging 7.6 points, including 67 three-point field goals. He scored a season-high 19 points at Quinnipiac, including a season-high five three-point field goals. The sharp-shooting Pistoljevic posted 11 double-figure scoring games last season.

Beale played in 29 games and averaged 4.3 points and 2.6 rebounds. He scored a career-high 13 points at Utah Valley State with five double-figure scoring games overall.

Smith started four of 30 games and averaged 3.8 points and 3.3 rebounds. He also posted a career-high 13 points against Radford last season.

2005-06 Campaign

Giles played in all 31 games while averaging 2.6 points, 1.7 rebounds, and 1.9 assists. He, too, scored a career-high 13 points a year ago at Howard, and dished out a career-high seven assists at Northern Colorado. Giles led the team in assists and steals six times each.

OTHER LETTERWINNERS (3)

The other three returning letterwinners are redshirt junior Jon Larson (6-6), along with juniors Darren Holmes (6-6) and Joel Rowe (6-1). Larson played in 16 games last season and averaged 0.9 points and 1.1 rebounds. Holmes played in 13 games, averaging 1.2 points and 0.5 rebounds. Rowe played in 13 games as well and averaged 0.5 points and 0.8 rebounds.

"Jon, Darren, and Joel have been with us since the beginning," stated Gillian. "These three guys have an unmatched dedication to the Longwood Basketball Program and have worked very hard to put themselves in a position to make a contribution to our success. They are the epitome of what being a college student-athlete is all about."

NEWCOMERS (3)

Coach Gillian's third recruiting class includes another junior college transfer in Clayton Morgan (6-7), along with true freshmen Kirk Williams (6-6) and Bryan Butler (6-0).

"Our third recruiting class gives us a chance to continue to establish quality depth in the program," said Gillian. "We will expect these three to make an immediate impact and contribute significantly to this season. Clayton, Kirk, and Brian are all here at Longwood for the same reason as all of the coaches and the rest of their teammates.

"It's important to them to be a part of Longwood Basketball as we continue to establish ourselves as a reputable Division I program."

Morgan averaged a double-double of 18.4 points and 11.5 rebounds while earning All-Region XV honors at NJCAA Division III Fashion Institute (N.Y.). Williams averaged 17.1 points and 7.6 rebounds at Woodlands (N.Y.) High School during his senior year and had a very impressive spring against high caliber competition. Butler averaged 14.3 points at prep school Coastal Christian Academy in Virginia Beach last season while shooting 46% (83-181) on three-point field goals.

THE SCHEDULE

In addition to the already-mentioned games against Villanova, Virginia, and Kansas State, the schedule is also highlighted by games against VCU and Richmond, along with Nebraska and Louisiana Tech. It will be the first time Longwood has ever faced these seven institutions in men's basketball.

"We once-again have the opportunity to challenge ourselves against some of the top programs in college basketball, and in some of the best playing environments in the country," said Gillian. "In putting this year's schedule together, we wanted to establish a balance of high-profile opponents, play as many games against in-state opponents as possible, and increase the number of home games we play -- all that has been accomplished."

Longwood will play Villanova (24-8, #13 in final ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll) of the Big East Conference on December 10 at the historic Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic

City, New Jersey. It will be a 7:30 p.m. tip-off against the Wildcats who advanced to last year's NCAA Tournament Sweet 16, losing by one point to eventual national champion North Carolina (67-66), and it will also be the first Division I men's basketball game in Atlantic City in nine years. The game has been arranged by the Atlantic City Convention & Visitors Authority, in conjunction with the New York-based Worldwide Marketing & Media Group.

The Lancers play at Virginia of the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) on February 15 at 7 p.m., at VCU of the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) on December 22 at 7:30 p.m., and at Richmond of the Atlantic 10 Conference on January 2 at 4 p.m..

Longwood plays at Kansas State of the Big 12 Conference on December 5 at 8 p.m., after opening the season at another Big 12 member institution, Nebraska, on November 18 at 8 p.m.. The Cornhuskers will be hosting the Lancers in Lincoln, Nebraska during the John Thompson Foundation Classic November 18-20 where Longwood will face Louisiana Tech on November 19 at 7 p.m.. The three-game exempt tournament will also feature a game against Ivy League member Yale on November 20 at 2 p.m..

Other road games include participation in the the College of Charleston Classic December 29-30 in South Carolina, facing the College of Charleston in the first round and either Long Island or Rider on the second night. Additional road games are at UMKC, IPFW, Valparaiso, Navy, Savannah State, Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Liberty, and Hampton.

The home games are highlighted by visits to Willett Hall from Virginia schools William and Mary, Liberty, and James Madison, along with Valparaiso. The remaining home games include High Point, Hartford, IPFW, North Carolina A&T, Savannah State, and Utah Valley State, as well as Virginia-Wise and Shenandoah.

"We're truly excited to have 12 home games on the schedule for the 2005-06 season," added Gillian. "There are great games for our students and fans to look forward to, especially those against the in-state schools. As we continue our reclassification, it is important to have home games versus established Division I opponents; we've worked hard to do just that."

It should also be noted that Longwood will play home-and-home this season against Savannah State, a program that became the first winless Division I men's basketball team last year (0-28). Without question, the schedule is conducive to earning some victories this season.

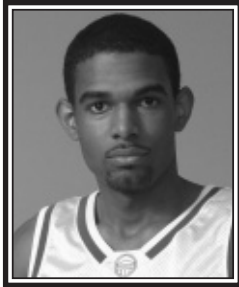
HOW TIMES HAVE CHANGED

2004-05 Season Recap

At #1 Illinois. At #6 Wake Forest. Vs. #17 Cincinnati in Las Vegas. Those three games against Top 20 programs provided a signature, and national awareness among the world of college basketball, for Longwood University men's basketball during 2004-05. The Lancers of head coach Mike Gillian operated under all NCAA Division I rules and regulations for the first time last season, year two of the institution's four-year *Division I Reclassification* toward official certification in September 2007. Longwood competed as a countable Division I opponent for the first time a year ago with inclusion in the all-important Ratings Percentage Index (RPI).

Sure, Longwood finished 1-30 overall while tying an NCAA record for Division I losses that included a school-record 19-game losing streak to end the year. However, those games against eventual national runner-up Illinois, Wake Forest, and Cincinnati brought invaluable national media recognition and exposure to the University and its men's basketball program.

When Longwood informed the NCAA in November 2002 of its intention to reclassify its intercollegiate athletics program to Division I status, the institution indicated the decision to move to Division I was part of an overall strategic plan to raise the visibility and profile of the University. Last year's schedule for men's basketball, no doubt the toughest in school history, went a long way toward accomplishing that plan.

During the season, Longwood was featured in numerous newspapers around the nation, including The Washington Post, The Wall Street Journal, the Chicago Tribune, the Richmond Times-Dispatch, and the Norfolk Virginian-Pilot among many, many others. The team was included in a January episode of ESPN's "The Season", and head coach Mike Gillian also made another national TV appearance on ESPN2's "Cold Pizza" morning sports talk show the morning of the Wake Forest game. Coach Gillian was scheduled for an earlier "Cold Pizza" appearance the morning after the Illinois game, but audio technical problems at the studio in Champaign, Illinois prevented the live segment.

Longwood faced seven institutions that advanced to post-season competition, including five to the NCAA

Tournament. These opponents included Illinois, Cincinnati, and Wake Forest; along with Northern Iowa and Old Dominion, while Hofstra and San Francisco each advanced to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT).

The highlight to the campaign came early in the season when Longwood played the back-to-back games at #1 Illinois and against #17 Cincinnati in Las Vegas. The Lancers played extremely well in each contest, battling to within eight points against both the Fighting Illini and the Bearcats well into the second half of each game.

At Illinois, a capacity crowd of 16,618 applauded the Lancer starters when removed from the game in the final minutes. Earlier, the crowd had been eerily quiet at halftime when LU trailed just 56-43, even that uncomfortable spread for the hosts courtesy a last-second Illini three-pointer. It took a late 16-0 run by top-ranked Illinois to secure the 105-79 victory, one that some had publicly-voiced could be a 50-60 point plus margin of victory for Illinois.

Against Cincinnati, the former Bearcat head coach Bob Huggins felt compelled to call a timeout just 2:03 into the contest that eventually was won by UC 95-69. That margin was aided by a 23-7 run by the Bearcats to close the game. Longwood had been within five points at 47-42 late in the opening half (1:12) before another late three-pointer gave Cincinnati a 50-42 halftime advantage. Longwood outscored UC 12-8 to open the second half, trailing just 58-54 with 14:08 left to play, and the Lancers were within 10 points at 72-62 at 7:35

before the game-ending run by the #17 Bearcats.

Longwood took leads in 20 of its 31 games last year, and was ahead at halftime in six games. Overall, 11 losses were by 10 points or less, including six setbacks by six points or less, and two in overtime. The win over Howard at home witnessed the Lancers outscoring the Bison 15-7 over the final 3:04 en route to the 75-69 triumph.

Throughout the season, Longwood traveled over 4,805 miles on our nation's highways while playing 20 of 31 games away from home. The combined driving and air mileage traveled was over 19,081 combined air and highway miles, figured conservatively, including visits to New York City, San Francisco, and Las Vegas among stops in 10 states overall.

Longwood led 40-34 at halftime, but host Columbia rallied in the second half to outscore the Lancers 48-29, and finished the game making 25-27 free throws for the season-opening win during the Columbia Classic.

Longwood led by as many as 11 points in the first half at 38-27 with 2:23 left before the Lions finished the half with a 7-2 run to close to within 40-34 at the intermission. Columbia continued to narrow the margin in the second half and finally took a 44-43 lead at 13:41. The Lions increased their lead to 54-46 with 11:01 remaining before Longwood used a 10-5 run to pull within 59-56 at 8:26. Longwood and UMKC were tied early at 2-2 with 17:40 left in the first half before the Kangaroos used a 16-2 run to lead 18-4 at 10:51. The Lancers trimmed the advantage to 18-8 with 9:10 remaining in the opening half before UMKC put together another run, this time at 9-2, to lead 27-10 at 4:01. The visitors extended the margin to 21 points while leading 37-16 at the intermission.

UMKC continued with its momentum to lead 47-18 with 16:59 on the clock. The Kangaroos took their largest lead of the contest at 31 points (56-25, 10:11) midway through the second half. Longwood managed to reduce the margin to 22 points down the stretch (68-46) as the Lancer reserves outscored the UMKC bench 10-6.

Jefferson added five rebounds to his team-high 12 points for Longwood. Chad Kosmo finished with six points, five rebounds, and a career-high five blocks for the Lancers. Darren Holmes and Husein Pistoljevic each had six points as well for the hosts, a season-high for Holmes off the bench.

Longwood dropped its school-record 15th consecutive game. UMKC's 13-player roster featured eight transfer student-athletes, including all five of their starters.

Longwood, playing its best game in nearly three weeks, dropped a hard-fought 79-65 decision at Appalachian State in North Carolina. The Lancers battled the Mountaineers to 12 lead-changes and six ties during the closely-played contest as Michael Jefferson scored a game-high 22 points.

Longwood jumped out to an early 9-5 lead at 15:01. Appalachian answered with six consecutive points to lead 11-9 with 13:15 left in the first half. The Lancers responded with a 16-8 run for a 25-19 advantage at 8:35 of the opening period. The Mountaineers outscored LU 17-11 over the remainder of the half to lead 36-31 at the intermission.

Appalachian State led 40-32 early in the second half at 18:09 before Longwood again fought back with a 12-3 run to lead 44-43 with 15:26 left. The Mountaineers finally seemed to take control with a 14-0 run for a 57-44 advantage at 9:36, and ASU extended the margin to 63-47 with 8:26 on the clock. The Lancers, however, refused to quit. Following an ASU three-pointer at 6:42 for a 68-53 lead, LU closed the door defensively. The Mountaineers did not score another field goal in the game (0-6), but were able to secure their win with 11-15 free throws.

Jefferson's game-high 22 points included four three-pointers. Husein Pistoljevic finished with 14 points, also with four three-pointers, while Maurice Sumter also had 14 points along with seven rebounds, five steals, and four assists. Chad Kosmo added nine points and eight rebounds for the Lancers.

Michael Jefferson and Maurice Sumter each scored 17 points for the Lancers. Jomo Belfor and Cavell Johnson each scored 18 points for the Dukes.

In a contest that was closely-played throughout, Longwood had taken a 70-68 lead at 1:04. JMU ran 25-seconds off the shot clock before a three-pointer to put the Dukes ahead 71-70 at 0:39. LU worked the clock down around 10-seconds before a 14-foot jumper in the lane that missed, but the Lancers still managed two offensive put-back attempts in close that just would not fall either. JMU finally rebounded at 0:01.8 and was fouled, making 1-2 free throws.

Overall, the game witnessed 16 lead-changes and nine ties as James Madison ended its eight-game losing streak while extending the Longwood winless stretch to 17 games. Longwood dropped a season-ending 54-50 decision to visiting Utah Valley State College in Willett Hall. UVSC's Sylvester Allison came off the bench to lead the Wolverines with a game-high 16 points in 24 minutes, while Michael Jefferson finished with a double-double of 16 points and 13 rebounds for the Lancers. Longwood completed its first full NCAA Division I campaign with a school-record 19 consecutive losses.

Longwood and Utah Valley State battled closely as there were six lead-changes and four ties, and neither team took more than a seven-point lead. The visitors scored the game's first basket before the Lancers used a 15-7 run to take their largest lead of the game at 15-9 with 14:13 left in the first half. The Wolverines fought back with a 9-2 run to lead 18-17 at 11:42 but LU scored seven unanswered points to lead 24-18 with 7:55 left in the period. UVSC, however, closed the half with a 10-2 run to lead 28-26 at the break.

Longwood rallied back in front with six-straight points, taking the lead at 35-34 with 11:40 remaining. The Wolverines, though, scored eight unanswered points to take their largest lead at 42-35 with 7:49 on the clock. Longwood closed to within two points at 42-40 with 5:22 left, but a three-pointer at 3:05 gave UVSC a 48-42 lead. An LU three-pointer at 0:53 pulled the Lancers to within 50-47, but the Wolverines got another jumper at 0:37, and a pair of free throws at 0:20 secured the outcome.

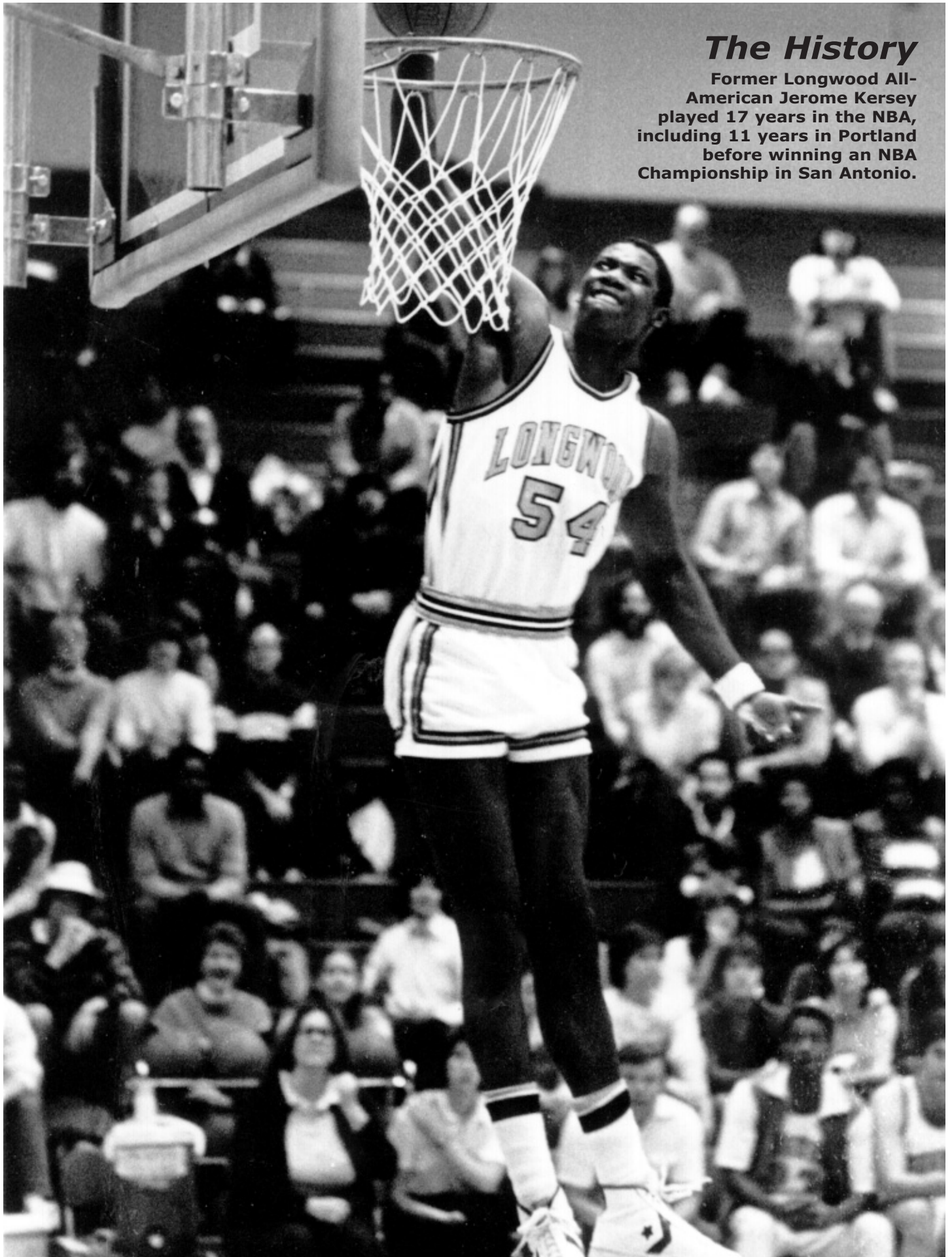

Twenty-Nine Years

Longwood University embarks upon its 30th year of men's basketball competition during 2005-06. The Lancers finished 1-30 a year ago, their second season under the direction of head coach Mike Gillian during year two of the institution's four-year *NCAA Division I Reclassification*. Coach Gillian's appointment as head coach in May, 2003, signified **a new foundation** to Longwood Basketball.

Men's basketball at Longwood University has become the University's most visible and popular intercollegiate athletic program since beginning competition with the 1976-77 season. Since that beginning, the Lancers have compiled an overall record of 400-383 for a winning percentage of .511%.

Longwood celebrated 25 years in style during 2000-01. That year, the Lancers enjoyed their fourth 20-win season, fourth NCAA Tournament appearance, and first-ever Division II CVAC Conference Tournament Championship. The season was one to remember as Longwood finished 23-8 while advancing into the Division II East Regional, defeating West Chester (Pa.) 103-95 in the first round before falling 77-76 in overtime to eventual Elite Eight participant Queens (N.C.) in the NCAA regional semifinals. Also that year, Colin Ducharme became the first Longwood men's basketball player to earn National Player of the Year honors from the NABC and was a consensus first-team All-America selection.

Longwood's four NCAA Tournament appearances include back-to-back participation following the 1993-94 and 1994-95 campaigns. In 1993-94, Longwood defeated Carson-Newman (Tenn.) 76-63 in the first-round of the Division II South Atlantic Regional before Norfolk State edged the Lancers 61-59 to halt a school-record 20-game winning streak. In an NCAA regional consolation game, the blue and white fell 88-87 to Elizabeth City State (N.C.). The following year, Longwood lost to Shaw (N.C.) 83-76 in the first-round of the Division II regionals. These two seasons were the finest back-to-back years ever for the Lancers as they achieved a two-year record of 42-15, an outstanding win-

ning percentage of .737%.

Longwood made its first appearance in an NCAA Tournament at the conclusion of the 1979-80 season, in just the fourth-year of the program's existence. The Lancers advanced all of the way to the NCAA Division III Final Four played in Rock Island, Illinois. That squad compiled a school-record of 28-3, with two of the losses taking place during the NCAA Final Four to North Park (Ill.) and Wittenberg (Ohio).

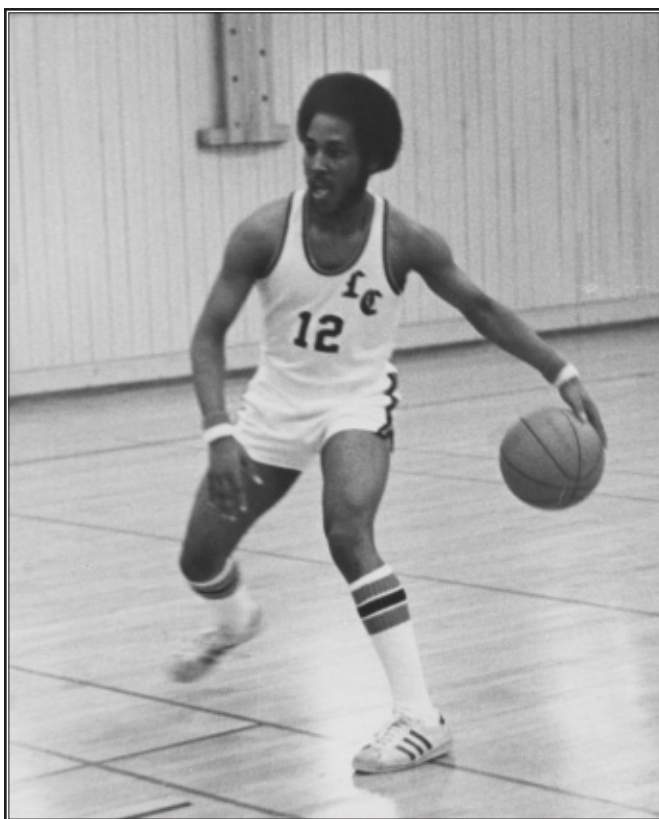
The following season, 1980-81, Longwood stepped up to NCAA Division II certification and has accumulated 12 winning seasons since, including three 20-win campaigns, and three other years at an even .500 record.

Over the years, the Longwood men's basketball program has produced a talented lineup of players. At the top of the list is former two-time All-American Jerome Kersey (1980-84), who still holds 10 school-records and enjoyed a solid 17-year NBA career after his Longwood playing days ended.

Colin Ducharme has obviously been the most outstanding Longwood player since 2000. Ducharme posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national Division II-best 15.8 rebounds during 2000-01, adding 4.2 blocks (2nd nationally) and 3.2 assists while shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the free throw line. He has since played professionally in Europe. Joining Ducharme in recent years as an outstanding player has been Jason Pryor (2000-02). Pryor ranks

10th in career points, scoring 1,148 career points (25.5) in just two seasons (45 games). He had seven games with 35 or more points during his brief tenure, including four of the top five single-game totals all-time. He too has since played professionally in Europe.

Other top Lancer players during the 2000's have included Marques Cunningham (2000-02), Claude Davis (2001-02), John Parker (2001-03), and Charles Stephens (2002-04). Cunningham scored 801 career points (15.1) in just two seasons (53 games), adding 223 assists (4.2). Davis averaged 14.1 points during his one season, includ-

ing numerous highlight-reel dunks for the Lancers, and has since played professionally in the Continental Basketball Association (CBA). Parker averaged 11.5 points and 8.5 rebounds during his two seasons (41 games), once grabbing 19 rebounds in a game (12th-best all time). Stephens scored 907 career points (22.7) in only a season and a half (40 games), adding 393 rebounds (9.8). He posted two 36-point games, tied for 10th-best all time, also once grabbing 19 rebounds in a game (12th-best all time).

A talented group of players during the 1990's included Lee Farior (1996-2000), Jason Outlaw (1994-98), Vince Walden (1994-98), DeVonne Johnson (1992-96), Joe Jones (1992-96), Benji Webb (1992-96), J.B. Neill (1991-95), Matt Watkins (1991-95), Charles Brown (1991-94), Adam Huffman (1991-94), Michael Druitt (1990-94), and Bryan Weaver (1989-93). Farior ranks sixth on the all-time scoring list with 1,300 career points. Outlaw scored 901 career points and ranks among the top 10 in rebounds (500), assists (248), steals (193), and blocks (48). Walden ranks fifth in three-point field goals (89). Johnson is the career leader in three-pointers (167). Jones is seventh on the all-time scoring list (1,254), and has since played professionally in the International Basketball Association (IBA) and overseas. Webb scored 962 career points, and ranks sixth in rebounds (550). Neill is second in three-point field goals (157). Watkins ranks sixth in steals (154). Brown ranks 12th in scoring (1,100) and sixth in assists (271). Huffman is eighth in blocks (47). Druitt is the career leader in games played (112) and ranks second in assists (400). Weaver scored 918 career points, and is fourth all-time in rebounds (595).

The decade of the 1980's produced such standouts as career scoring leader Kevin Jefferson (1986-90), Doug Poppe (1986-90), Dale Shavers (1986-90), Darryl Rutley (1986-89), Lonnie Lewis (1982-86), Ron Orr (1979-83), Joe Remar (1979-83), Kenny Ford (1978-81), and Shack

Leonard (1978-80). Jefferson totaled 1,806 points during his outstanding career, including a phenomenal school-record 107 dunks over four years, and also grabbed 467 career rebounds. Poppe is 11th in scoring (1,139), and second in both rebounds (653) and blocks (91). Shavers ranks ninth in scoring (1,188). Rutley only played three seasons and is eighth in scoring (1,230), once scoring 37 points in a game, still equal to the seventh-best single-game total all-time. Lewis ranks fourth in scoring (1,452). Orr is fifth all-time in scoring with 1,335 career points, and third in rebounds (648). Remar is the all-time

assist leader with 531, and also scored 1,479 career points to rank third all-time. Ford is 13th in scoring (1,040). Leonard was an All-Northeast Region selection in 1980, and was the Northeast Regional Tournament Most Valuable Player during the magical 1979-80 run to the NCAA Division III Final Four.

The original Longwood Basketball standout was the late Jimmy Yarbrough (1976-78), still the school record-holder for single-game points. A former associate director of admissions at the institution, he scored 46 points against Bluefield College during the 1977-78 season, including a school-record 16 field goals. Yarbrough's 22.5 scoring average during the program's inaugural 1976-77 campaign still ranks fourth all-time.

Jimmy, one of Longwood's most beloved employees, died April 14, 2005 following an eight-year battle with non-Hodgkins lymphoma.

Standouts on this year's team, such as the junior trio

of Michael Jefferson, Maurice Sumter, and Husein Pistoljevic, along with senior Chad Kosmo and sophomore Lamar Barrett, will look to add their respective names among the elite Lancers in the history of Longwood Basketball.

1979-80 Division III Final Four

It was a magical season for a program in only its fourth year of existence. The 1979-80 Longwood College men's basketball team made believers out of everyone while compiling a school-record 28-3 campaign en route to the 1980 NCAA Division III Final Four Tournament. In only its second year as an NCAA member, the Lancers came within three points of winning a National Championship.

At the Final Four, played in Rock Island, Illinois, Longwood played two-time defending national champion North Park (Ill.) in a semifinal contest that nobody gave the Lancers a chance to win. The blue and white trailed just 30-28 at half-time before the Vikings went ahead 42-36 midway through the second half. LC battled back to tie the contest at 45-45, and led 53-52 with just 39-seconds left. A pair of controversial traveling calls against the Lancers allowed the Chicago school to take a 56-53 lead at :13. A Joe Remar layup made it 56-55 at :06 before North Park made one of two free throws at :05 to provide for the final score of 57-55. A potential game-tying layup by LC was blocked at the buzzer.

Playing Wittenberg (Ohio) in the consolation game, LC jumped to a 30-24 advantage at the intermission. The Tigers forged ahead in the second half before Thomas Alston connected on a baseline jumper to tie the game at 45-45 with 37-seconds remaining. Wittenberg got a basket at :09, but Remar forced overtime with a 22-footer just ahead of the buzzer. The extra period was scoreless until a questionable foul call against the Lancers put a Tiger at the free throw line with no time on the clock at the end of the OT. After missing the first attempt, the second free throw was good to secure the 48-47 decision.

The unbelievable year witnessed Longwood advancing further in the NCAA Division III Tournament than any previous Virginia school at the time. Ranked #12 in the final national poll, the Lancers had win-

ning streaks of 16 and 12 games during the season, and entered the Final Four with the best record in the nation (28-1). LC advanced to the Final Four with post-season tournament wins past Framingham State (Mass.) 73-63, Clark (Mass.) 70-60, and Potsdam State (N.Y.) 78-61.

The two narrow losses at the Final Four concluded what former SID Hoke Currie described as an "unbelievable, indescribable, and yes, amazing season."

2000-01 Conference Champions

The remarkably amazing one-season turnaround of the 2000-01 Longwood men's basketball program concluded with the Lancers tough and disappointing 77-76 overtime loss to Queens (N.C.) in the NCAA Division II East Regional semifinals in Fort Mill, South Carolina.

Longwood accomplished the best one-season turnaround in Division II men's basketball at a +19-game about-face. The Lancers finished 23-8 after a 4-22 season the year before (1999-2000), equaling the most wins in the program's 22-year Division II history (23), and equaling the second-most wins in the program's history. Longwood also claimed its first-ever Carolinas-Virginia Athletic Conference (CVAC) Tournament Championship.

Longwood shattered the school's record-book during 2001-02 with 41 new school-records. The Lancers attained 15 new team season records, 11 new individual season records, four new team single-games records, five new individual single-game records, and six new individual Lancer Hall records.

Longwood, ranked #21 in the final NABC/*Division II Bulletin* Top 25, opened the campaign with seven-straight wins, including a convincing 94-65 victory past Charleston (W.Va.) -- seeded #2 for the East Regional and ranked #18 nationally in the final poll at 23-6. The 7-0 beginning was the finest start to a season since 1979, and opening 11-2 overall was the best Division II start in the program's history.

The Lancers went 9-7 from Jan. 8 to Feb. 15, dropping five games by six points or less, including three games by three points or less. Four of the team's eight overall losses were to nationally-ranked opponents, and six of the eight losses overall were by six points or less. Longwood responded well by winning seven of its last eight games, and 12 of its final 16 contests over-

all, including the CVAC Tournament Championship to earn just the third Division II Tournament appearance in school history.

Leading the one-season turnaround were Colin Ducharme and Jason Pryor, each DAKTRONICS All-Americans. Ducharme, a consensus first-team All-American and the NABC, DAKTRONICS, and *Division II Bulletin* National Player of the Year, posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national-best 15.8 rebounds, shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the line. He added a new school-record for season blocks with 130 (4.2) and also had 100 assists (3.2). Among his 10 new school-records, Ducharme also posted 29 double-doubles and 31-straight double-figure scoring games.

Pryor led Longwood with his 24.8 points, shooting 49% from the field and 84% at the free throw line. He added 4.8 rebounds, 2.7 assists, 63 three-pointers, and a team-best 54 steals (1.8). Pryor scored a new school-record 745 points that sea-

son, and posted 30 consecutive double-figure scoring games en route to establishing six new school-records, including a Lancer Hall-record 41 points against Barton (N.C.).

Marques Cunningham added 11.9 points, with a team-best 4.1 assists per game. Chris Isaacs and Zech Boyd, along with Jay Louden - each averaged 4.2 points, while other scoring averages included Isaac Lartey (3.2), Russell Thompson (2.9), B.J. Buford (2.6), along with Marek Zielinski (1.3) and walk-on Matt Donohue (0.4).

The Lancers averaged 88.0 points, shooting 49% from the field as a team, a school-record 38% on three-pointers, and 74% at the line. Longwood limited opponents to 76.0 points and 40% shooting from the field, including just 32% on treys.

#54 Jerome Kersey • Retired Jersey

Jerome Kersey (6-7), a former Longwood men's basketball All-American, played 17 years in the National Basketball Association (NBA) from 1984-2001. Jerome played for six NBA teams, finishing his career with the Milwaukee Bucks after two years with the San Antonio Spurs, including his participation with the 1999 NBA Champions.

He was a Lancer from 1980-84, gaining first-team All-America honors following the 1983-84 season, and third-team All-America accolades after the 1982-83 year. A second-round draft selection of the Portland Trail Blazers, the 46th-player selected in the draft that year, Kersey completed his outstanding Longwood career with 1,756 career points, second all-time at Longwood, and 1,162 career rebounds, tops on the Lancer career list.

Kersey played 11 NBA seasons in Portland, becoming only the second player in franchise history to score 10,000-plus career points, and grabbed 5,000-plus career rebounds. He then played the 1995-96 season with the association's Golden State Warriors, before completing the 1996-97 season with the Los Angeles Lakers. Kersey played for the Seattle SuperSonics during 1997-98 before joining San Antonio.

A native of Clarksville, Va., Kersey led Longwood to a record of 64-39 during his career at the institution. Additionally, he was the Virginia

College Division Player of the Year following the 1983-84 season when he averaged 19.6 points and a national-best 14.2 rebounds. Jerome still holds 10 school-records at Longwood.



Kersey spent 2003-04 as Director of Player Programs for Portland before being named as an assistant coach with the Milwaukee Bucks on July 2, 2004. In Milwaukee for the 2004-05 season, Kersey was reunited with Bucks head coach Terry Porter, a former teammate for 10 seasons with the Blazers. While together in Portland, Kersey and Porter helped the Trail Blazers to 10 NBA Playoff appearances, including two trips to the NBA Finals (1991, 1993).

Jerome will be inducted into the inaugural Longwood University Athletics Hall of Fame on November 27, 2005. He is one of six initial inductees into the new Hall of Fame.

#52 Colin Ducharme • Retired Jersey

Colin Ducharme (6-9) was named the 2001 Verizon/NABC NCAA Division II National Player of the Year. The consensus 1st-team All-American was chosen player of the year by select Division II member coaches of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC). Ducharme was honored in Minneapolis, Minnesota during the Division I Final Four where he received his award April 1, 2001.

Ducharme had previously been named the DAKTRONICS/CoSIDA and *Division II Bulletin* magazine National Player of the Year, and was a 1st-Team All-American by the NABC, DAKTRONICS/CoSIDA, *Division II Bulletin*, and *Basketball Times* magazines.

Ducharme was also named the 2000-01 CVAC Male Athlete of the Year as voted by the conference athletic directors. This prestigious award is presented annually in recognition of outstanding athletic contributions and achievements. He was also named the Longwood Male Athlete of the Year for 2000-01.

Ducharme posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national-best 15.8 rebounds during 2000-01, adding 4.2 blocks (2nd nationally) and 3.2 assists while shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the free throw line. He led the Lancers to a 23-8 record, the school's first CVAC Tournament Championship, and into the East Regional semifinals while establishing 11 new school-records.

Ducharme was named one of the Top 10 players in the 2001 Blu Summer League, a premier European showcase event for professional and aspiring professional players. He was also named the BSL's Best Rebounder among the 96 players participating in Treviso, Italy. Ducharme played four games in Italy and averaged his usual double-double of 12.8 points (51) and 13.0 rebounds (52), including single-game highs of 19 points and 18 rebounds in separate contests. After a slow start in game one (11

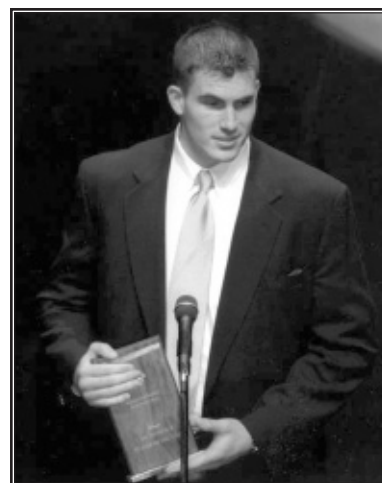

rebounds, four points), he bounced back to average 15.7 points and 13.7 rebounds during his final three games.

Ducharme has the only two triple-doubles in Longwood history: 20 points, 21 rebounds, and 11 blocked shots at Belmont Abbey; and 24 points, 18 rebounds, and 10 assists vs. West Chester in the regionals. His 2000-01 season and career-bests included 33 points, 22 rebounds (three times), 11 blocked shots, and 10 assists.

Ducharme was also the only Division II player invited to the 49th Portsmouth Invitational Tournament (PIT) where he helped his team to the PIT Championship with solid three-



game totals of 18 points (6.0), 22 rebounds (7.3), four blocks, two assists, and one steal.

Ducharme played in the French Pro B League during 2003-04 with Evreux, averaging 14.2 points and 9.7 rebounds in 27 games. He played in the French Pro A League during 2002-03 with Paris Basket Racing, averaging 11.7 points and 6.5 rebounds in 10 games. Ducharme had played for Antibes of the same league at the end of the 2001-02 season, averaging 16.9 points and 10.9 rebounds in the final 14 games. He had begun his European career with Avellino of the Italian A-1 League at the start of 2001-02, seeing limited time in just five games (3.4 points, 2.0 rebounds) before suffering a knee injury that required subsequent surgery and rehabilitation.

The #52 jersey of Colin Ducharme was officially retired on December 1, 2001. Colin, too, is now retired from professional basketball and is currently completing his graduate studies at Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). He is enrolled in MIT's Leaders for Manufacturing Program working toward a dual masters degree in both business and engineering.

WILLETT HALL

Willett Hall (formerly Lancer Hall) is home to Longwood Basketball and one of the finest athletic and physical education facilities of any similar size institution in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The facility was completed in 1980 at a cost of \$4.5 million.

Longwood University honored three former institution presidents, including Dr. Henry I. Willett Jr., on September 9, 2004 with three major buildings on campus named in their honor. Lancer Hall was named Willett Hall for the president from 1967 to 1981. Dr. Willett oversaw the transformation of Longwood into a fully coeducational institution.

Willett Hall features a 2,522-seat arena that had its floor replaced just prior to this 2004-05 season, as well as convenient concession stands located in the main lobby -- recently renovated during 2003-04, four locker rooms, training room, weight room, swimming pool, and other facilities for the University's 14-sports.

The men's basketball program at Longwood has compiled a home-court record of 204-109 during 25 seasons of action in Willett Hall, an overall winning percentage of .652%.

Last season, Longwood drew 1,637 fans to the facility for the game against VMI, its largest crowd of the season. This year, Longwood will play 12 home contests with games against Division I opponents Hartford, High Point, IPFW, James Madison, Liberty, North Carolina A&T, Savannah State, Utah Valley State, Valparaiso, and William and Mary.

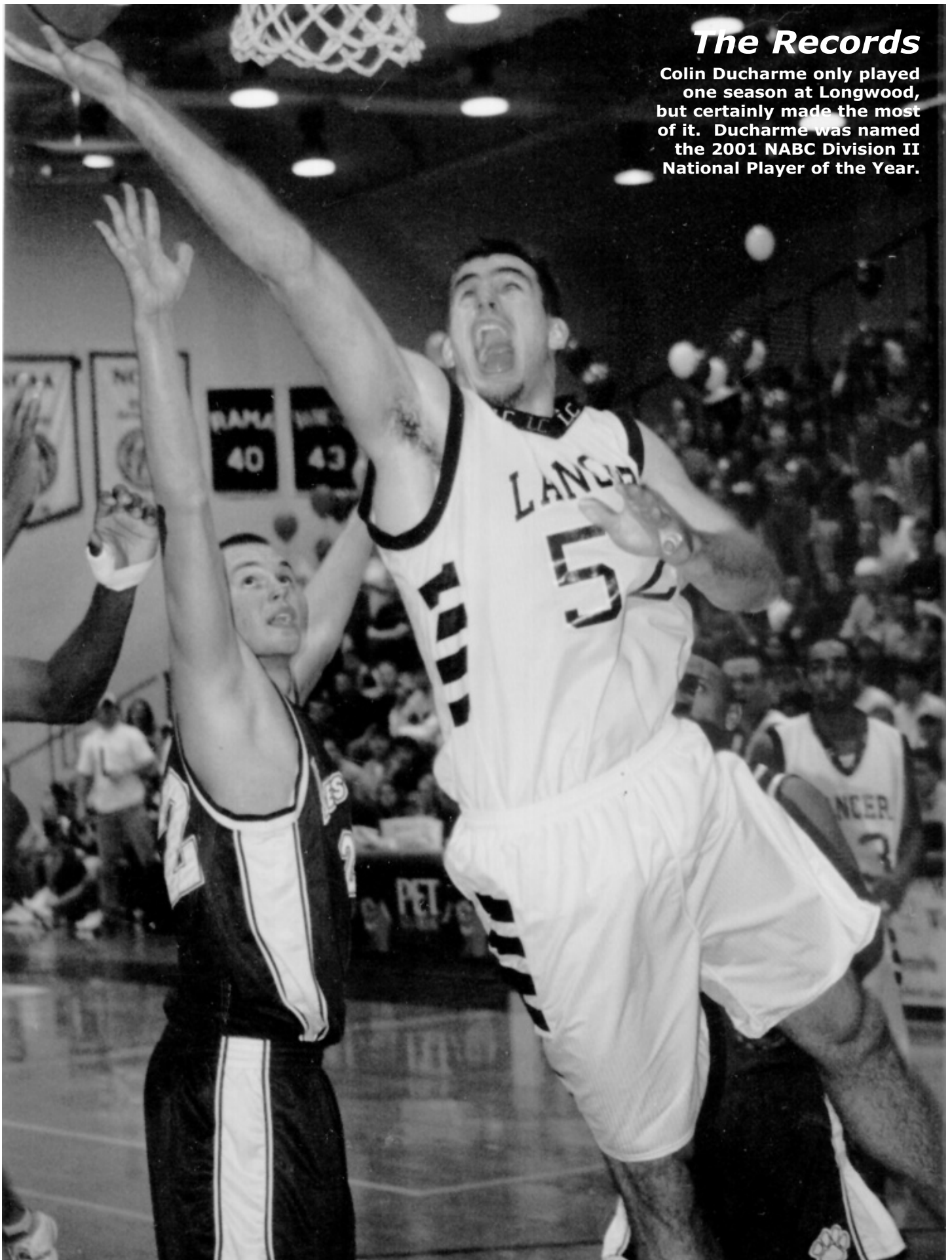
Longwood averaged a school-record 1,173 during the memorable 2000-01 season when the Lancers posted a 23-8 record, including 11-3 (.786%) at home. That season included a near capacity 2,213 for a contest against former Division II archrival Queens (N.C.).



Longwood played on a brand new floor during 2004-05 in the newly re-named Willett Hall. The Lancers have enjoyed a definite home-court advantage over the years, and this year should be no exception. 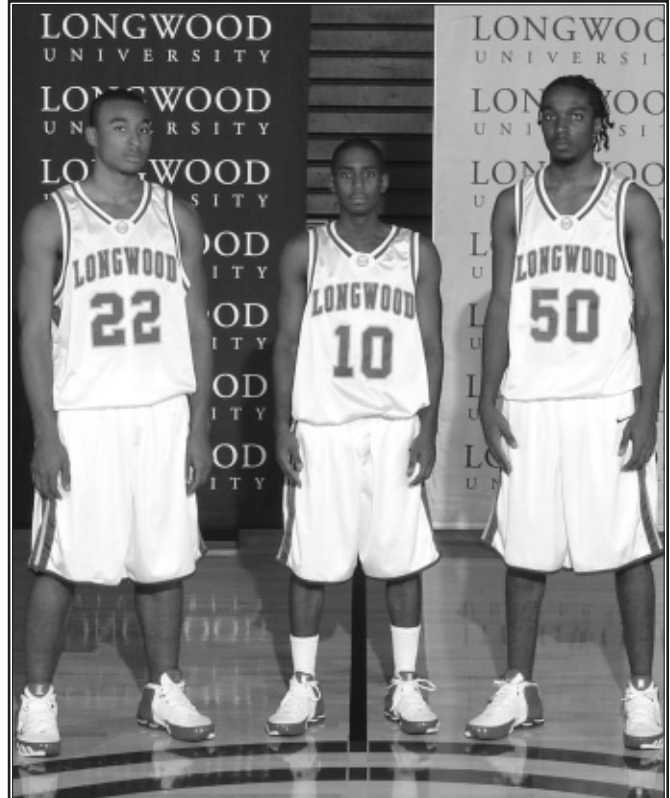

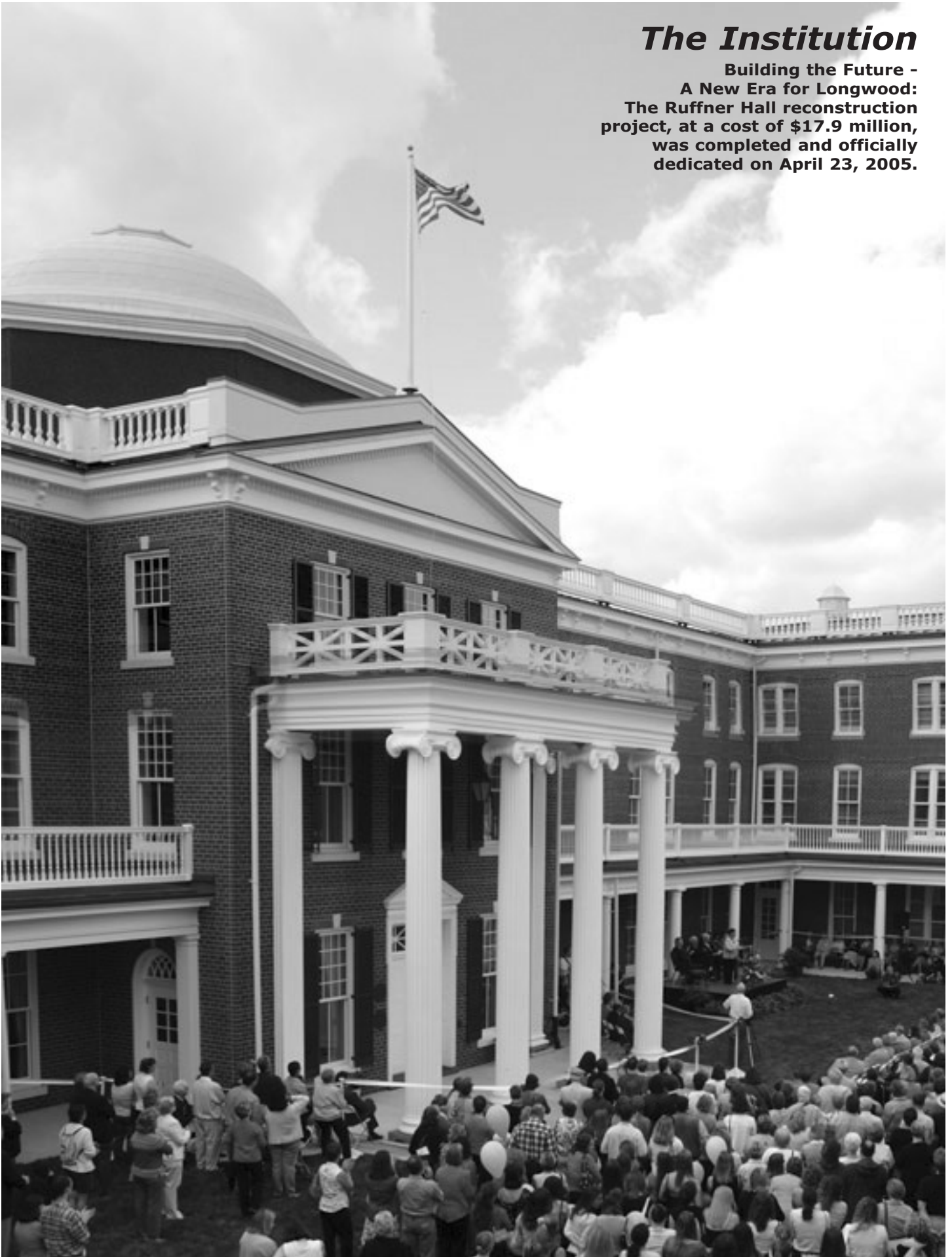

Longwood University

With a legacy of learning dating back over 160 years, Longwood University has developed a meaningful learning environment that extends far beyond the classroom. Founded in 1839 as the Farmville Female Seminary Association, the school was a pioneer first in private and later in public education. The State of Virginia acquired the school in 1884 and renamed it as the Normal School, the first state institution of higher learning for women in Virginia. Over the years, the school expanded its curricula and had a succession of names, becoming Longwood College in 1949 and fully coeducational in 1976. On April 24, 2002, history was again made at Longwood when Governor Mark Warner signed legislation that designated Longwood as a university, effective July 1, 2002.

The legacy that began in 1839 continues today as Longwood University offers over 100 majors, minors and concentrations through its various academic programs. Given its historical roots, Longwood University enjoys an enviable reputation for teacher preparation. But the excellence has expanded throughout the university with strong programs in the liberal arts and sciences, business, professional and pre-professional programs. Today, the coeducational, comprehensive state university has an enrollment of over 4300 students and is comprised of three separate colleges plus a graduate division: the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Business and Economics, and the College of Education and Human Services.

Under the leadership of President Patricia P. Cormier, Longwood is committed to developing citizen leaders and provides a meaningful learning environment where students learn skills, knowledge and theory and then translate learning into action by doing research, internships, field work and community service. Recognizing the value of experiential learning, Longwood is one of the few universities in the country to require all students to complete an internship or similar learning experience before graduation. Additionally, Longwood was the first institution in Virginia to require that every freshman have a laptop computer. Technology is integrated throughout the learning process—an essential element for preparing the leaders of tomorrow.

The Longwood learning environment is enriched further by the Greenwood Library that holds 245,000 book titles, 2,100 print journal subscriptions, and some 100 elec-

tronic data bases including access to 11,000 full-text electronic journals and provides integrated technology for information retrieval from libraries throughout the world, as well as satellite reception of foreign programs and web access. This state-of-the-art facility is named in honor of Longwood's 22nd president, Dr. Janet Daly Greenwood.

Longwood students continue to rate their university as one of the most engaging in the country, according to results from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE). In the 2002 survey, seniors rated Longwood at or above the 80th percentile on 6 of the 9 NSSE benchmarks when compared with Masters institutions; freshmen rated

Longwood at or above the 60th percentile on all 9 benchmarks when compared with Masters institutions. "Student Engagement with Technology" continued to lead the way at the 90th percentile or higher. The survey was developed by national assessment experts as an alternative to the U.S. News & World Report rankings, which are strongly influenced by resources and reputation. NSSE is sponsored by The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and The Pew Forum for Undergraduate Learning.

Additionally, Longwood University is one of only 20 "high performing" institutions nationwide selected to participate in the Documenting Effective Educational Practices (DEEP) project being conducted by the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) and the American Association for Higher

Education (AAHE). Basically, the main purposes of the project will be to discover what practices enhance the learning process for college students and then to share that information with colleges and universities throughout the nation. Longwood was selected for the project because it was identified as an "educationally effective institution" based upon NSSE benchmark results and "promising persistence and graduation rates." Additionally, the new U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges Survey ranks Longwood with the 10th highest graduation rate (62 percent) among all master's level universities in the South.

Longwood provides leadership and services in the region and the state through the Longwood Small Business Development Center, the Longwood Center for the Visual Arts, and the Southern Virginia Higher Education Center in South Boston.

Additionally, Longwood University has a tremendous economic and cultural impact on Farmville and the surrounding communities. A recent study conducted by the Longwood Small Business Development Center estimates that university employees, students, and visitors spent over \$100 million in 2001--with 54 percent of that amount being spent in Farmville and the eight surrounding counties.

The Longwood campus, located in the heart of historic Farmville, Virginia, provides excellent facilities while reflecting the charm, beauty, and character associated with its long heritage. The campus community was enhanced recently with the opening of Brock Commons, a beautiful pedestrian promenade that provides a central focal point for the Longwood campus while eliminating traffic congestion and safety hazards. Fountains, walkways, outdoor sculpture and beautiful landscaping contribute to Brock Commons, creating a park-like atmosphere for students, faculty, staff, and the public.

The University has completely recovered from the devastating fire of April 24, 2001 that destroyed several historic buildings on campus including the Ruffners, Grainger Hall, and the signature Rotunda. A completely rebuilt Grainger Hall opened in 2004 and Ruffner Hall and Rotunda were re-dedicated on April 23, 2005. Construction is also underway for a new science building that will provide the latest technology and scientific equipment for students and faculty. On April 15, 2005, ground was broken for a new Center for Fitness and Wellness that will feature a wide range of programs and amenities for students, faculty, and staff.

One of the newest buildings on campus is the two-story, 60,000 square foot Dorrill Dining Hall located on Brock Commons that opened for the spring semester 2000. Named in honor of Dr. William Franklin Dorrill, Longwood's 23rd president, this multi-purpose facility, with its curved, colonnaded portico overlooking Iler Field, is the first on campus to utilize geothermal heating and cooling. The flexible interior design provides space for banquets, meetings, and special events along with a Grand Dining Room seating 500 and an arcade seating an additional 700.

Behind and alongside this area are broad malls, lawns, 11 tennis courts, four athletic fields, an indoor-outdoor

swimming pool, and numerous late-20th century buildings, including the library, residence halls, the Lankford Student Union, and various academic facilities. The campus has six auditoriums ranging in size from 150 seats to over 1200.

Willett Hall, named in honor of Longwood's 21st president, Dr. Henry Irving Willett Jr., is a \$4.5 million health, physical education, and recreation complex. It has a gymnasium with 3,000 seats; a complete weight-training laboratory; an Olympic-size pool with a three-meter board and underwater sound, lighting, and observation window; a 500-seat natatorium; a modern dance studio with a floating floor and staging capacity; and one of the state's best-

equipped laboratories for the study of human performance as it relates to exercise, sports, health, and the arts. Nearby, is a nine-hole golf course and Longwood Estate, the home of the President.

Longwood University is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award bachelors and masters degrees. Other accreditation includes the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Virginia State Board of Education, the National Association of Schools of Theatre, and the National Association of Schools of Music. Specific program endorsements include the undergraduate Social Work Program that is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education; the undergraduate Therapeutic Recreation Program that is

accredited by the National Recreation and Park Association in cooperation with the American Association for Leisure and Recreation; and the undergraduate Business Administration Program that is accredited by Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB-International).

Finally, for the seventh year in a row, Longwood is ranked among the top regional public schools in the South in the 2005 U.S. News & World Report "Best Colleges" Guide. Longwood was again included in the category "Highest Graduation Rates: Universities—Master's (South) with a 60% Graduation Rate. Longwood was also listed in four new categories: "Campus Diversity: African-American (8%)", "Lowest Acceptance Rates: (70%)", "Most International Students: (1%)" and "Least Debt among Graduates: (84%) Average Debt = \$14,574."



The Farmville Area, Commonwealth of Virginia

THE FARMVILLE AREA

Longwood University is located in historic Farmville, Virginia -- 65 miles west of Richmond, 48 miles east of Lynchburg, and 60 miles south of Charlottesville -- the Heart of Virginia. The Town of Farmville has a population of 6,500.

The Farmville Area is comprised of the town of Farmville, along with the counties of Prince Edward and Cumberland. This area serves as a retail hub and commercial activity center for eight counties of Southside Virginia and has a service market of more than 100,000 people. Education is a dominant factor in the area, with three outstanding colleges offering educational and training opportunities. In addition to Longwood University, Hampden-Sydney and Southside Virginia Community colleges are located in the area.

The Farmville Area has a diversified economy with strong manufacturing, trade, service, and agricultural sectors. Manufacturing activity centers around natural resources, textiles, and a variety of industrial and consumer goods.

The Town of Farmville is also home to the annual Heart of Virginia Festival (first Saturday in May) and many historical sites, including Appomattox Courthouse and Sailors Creek Battlefield. These points of interest make the Farmville Area a very attractive place to be. Located in and near town are churches, hotels, motels, a country club, a municipal airport, and a community hospital. Many additional points of interest are within a short distance of the Farmville area.

COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA

The Commonwealth of Virginia is one of the original 13 colonies. Named for the Virgin Queen, Elizabeth I of England, Virginia was England's first successful overseas colony and the site of the first permanent English settlement in America. West Virginia was part of Virginia until 1863.

Virginia's rich political heritage helped shape the democratic principles on which the United States was founded. Virginia played an important role in the American Revolution (1775-1783), and it entered the Union as the tenth of the original 13 states on June 25, 1788. During the American Civil War (1861-1865) the state's capital, Richmond, was also capital of the Confederacy. The state has long been nicknamed Old Dominion.

George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, and James Monroe, all Virginians, were founding fathers of the United States and were among the first five U.S. presidents. Virginia is also the birthplace of U.S. presidents William Henry Harrison, John Tyler, Zachary Taylor, and Woodrow Wilson.

Virginia is the 35th largest state in the United States, bounded on the east by the Atlantic Ocean, on the north and east by Maryland and the District of Columbia, on the west by West Virginia and Kentucky, and on the south by Tennessee and North Carolina.

According to the 2000 national census, Virginia's population was 7,078,515, ranking it 12th among the states. Virginia Beach (425,257) is one of the most popular resort destinations on the East Coast, as well as Virginia's largest city. Richmond (197,790) is the state capital and a center of banking and insurance, and of both retail and wholesale trade. The Naval Base at Norfolk (234,403) and the Naval Shipyard at Portsmouth (100,565) employ thousands of civilians and military personnel. Hampton (146,437) is important for its aviation activities such as Langley Air Force Base and a National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) facility. In Newport News (180,150) is a shipyard that builds naval ships, including aircraft carriers. Alexandria (128,283) is part of the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. Lynchburg (65,269) is the site of light industries. Roanoke (94,911) is the largest city in western Virginia.

Civilian and military employment, mostly with the federal government, is an essential part of the Virginia economy. The Pentagon, which houses the Department of Defense, is located in Virginia and is the leading federal employer in the northern part of the state. There are also important military bases in Virginia, particularly the massive complex of army, navy, and air force bases in the vicinity of Norfolk.

Average January temperatures range from less than 32°F in the west to more than 42°F in southeastern Virginia. Average July temperatures range from more than 78°F in the southeast to less than 68°F in the western mountains. Total precipitation ranges from about 35 to more than 50 inches. Snowfalls are moderate, except in the mountain regions.

Besides Virginia, three other states - Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania - use the term commonwealth as part of their official names. The delegates to the convention in Williamsburg, when the first Constitution of Virginia was adopted on June 29, 1776, used commonwealth as the name for the new form of government. It is very likely they had in mind the Puritans' rebellion against the Crown in England more than 100 years earlier.

Pennsylvania and Massachusetts also chose to be called commonwealths after independence from Great Britain. The other 10 former colonies took the name "state," the term used in the Declaration of Independence. Kentucky was once part of Virginia. When Kentuckians joined the Union as the 15th state in 1792, it also kept the name commonwealth.

University Administration

PRESIDENT PATRICIA PICARD CORMIER

Known for her warmth, enthusiasm and dynamic personality, Dr. Cormier is now in her tenth year as president of Longwood University.

She has been an administrator in higher education for over 37 years, serving as chief academic officer at Winthrop University, in key vice presidential positions at the University of Pennsylvania where she was also an associate dean and a tenured member of the faculty, and as vice president for development and alumni relations at the Medical College of Pennsylvania.



Dr. Cormier has master's and doctoral degrees in education from the University of Virginia and a bachelor's degree in health education from Boston University. Her honors include selection as one of 30 fellows nationwide to participate in the American Council on Education's fellowship program in academic administration in 1982-83, a master's degree *Honoris causa* from the University of Pennsylvania in 1982, election to three national honor societies, and selection as a Fellow of the College of Physicians of Philadelphia. She has published two highly regarded books in her field: *Community Oral Health: A Systems Approach* and *Educating the Dentists of the Future*.

In addition to her many community and collegiate responsibilities, Dr. Cormier is the past chair of the Executive Committee of the Renaissance Group, past chair of the NCAA Division II Presidents' Council, and past chair of the Council of Fellows of the American Council on Education. She served as a Commissioner on the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and is the Chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), a higher education organization whose membership is comprised of more than 430 colleges, universities, and systems of public higher education throughout the United States and its territories.

Dr. Cormier has worked with the campus community to develop and implement a new Mission, Vision, and Goals Statement for the University. This strategic plan for the future of Longwood is embodied in the first sentence of the Mission Statement: "Longwood is an institution of higher learning dedicated to the development of citizen leaders who are prepared to make positive contributions to the common good of society."

Athletics Administration

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS RICK MAZZUTO

Rick Mazzuto is in his fourth full year as Director of Athletics for Longwood University's 14-sport intercollegiate athletics program. He is guiding the Lancers during year three (2005-06) of their four-year NCAA Division I Reclassification toward official Division I Certification in September 2007. He began at Longwood University on March 1, 2002.

Mazzuto previously was the Director of Athletics at Division I Saint Mary's (Calif.) College from 1989-2000 after serving as Director of Athletics at Division I Iona (N.Y.) College from 1980-89.

At Longwood, Mazzuto has led the transition to Division I while spearheading the institution's Strategic Plan for intercollegiate athletics. He has guided the program through many changes since his arrival, including increases in operating budgets, scholarships, and department personnel -- both administrative and coaching while also overseeing distinct scheduling, fundraising, and marketing changes. Additionally, Mazzuto has been instrumental in developing a comprehensive master plan at the University for new athletics facilities and the complete renovation of some existing facilities.

While at Saint Mary's in Moraga, California for 11 years, Mazzuto oversaw a \$5-million budget, 16-sport intercollegiate athletics program with 60-plus employees. During his time there, Saint Mary's participated in the 1999 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament, the 1997 Division I Men's Basketball Tournament, and the 1992 Division I Women's Soccer Tournament. The 2000 women's basketball team participated in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) as well, while the women's cross country team won the 1990 West Coast Conference Championship, and the softball team won three Western Intercollegiate Softball League titles.

At Iona in New Rochelle, New York for nine years, Mazzuto managed a 20-sport Division I program with 40-plus employees. While there, Iona participated in two NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Tournaments, and made two NIT appearances. The school won five conference championships in men's cross country, three in men's basketball, two each in baseball and softball, and one in men's ice hockey. Additionally, the men's cross country and water polo programs were nationally-ranked annually. Mazzuto worked at Iona from 1977-80 as the institution's associate AD.

Mazzuto has served on numerous committees during his career, including the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee from 1991-97. He has also served as an instructor at both California-Berkeley's extension program and at Iona. Mazzuto has extensive community service activities, serving on the Board of Directors of both the Moraga, Calif. and New Rochelle, N.Y. Rotary Clubs. He is a past president of the Moraga, Calif. Rotary Club, and is a current member of the Farmville Rotary.

Mazzuto earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in political science from Trinity (Conn.) College where he began his

Michelle Meadows is in her first year as assistant athletics director for compliance at Longwood University during 2005-06. She will serve as the institution's NCAA compliance officer and athletics academic advisor while also coordinating the CHAMPS Life Skills program. Meadows previously had been the assistant compliance director at VCU since 2003, earning her master of science in sport leadership that same year from the VCU SportsCenter.

At VCU, Meadows monitored recruiting, financial aid, admissions, camps, promotions, employment, along with playing and practice seasons for 16 sports while also serving as a liaison between the NCAA Clearinghouse and prospective student-athletes and coaches. She provided legislative interpretations for coaches and staff, and enhanced the rules education program while collaborating on the development of an NCAA rules education video and construction of a compliance



website. Meadows has conducted numerous presentations to educate the local community organizations and schools about current NCAA legislation as well.

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE DR. NORM BREGMAN

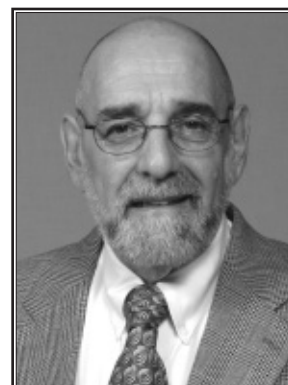

Austin (1970, M.A., experimental psychology), and his bachelor's degree from Kean University in New Jersey (1966, B.A., mathematics). He also attended Syracuse University (1962-64).

Dr. Bregman is married to Debby Colby and the couple resides in Glen Allen, Virginia.

Greg Prouty is in his ninth year as sports information director at Longwood University during 2005-06, and his 13th year overall at Longwood. He was promoted to assistant athletics director for media relations October 1, 2004, and is responsible for the coordination of all publicity and promotion for the Lancers' 14-sport intercollegiate athletics program, including administration of the institution's Internet athletics website while overseeing the daily operation of the sports information office.



He previously was the assistant SID at Longwood from 1991-95 before serving two years (1995-97) as the SID at Lynchburg College. Prouty is a member of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA), and the Virginia Sports Information Directors (VaSID). He has also served as the assistant media coordinator for five NCAA Division II Softball Championships (2002, 2001, 1999, 1997, 1995) in Salem, Virginia, a championship co-hosted by the City of Salem and Longwood. Additionally, Prouty served as the official scorekeeper for the 1999 NCAA Division II Softball Championship. He was elected and served as chairperson of the Carolinas-Virginia Athletic Conference (CVAC) sports information directors from February 1999 until August 2000.

Prouty is a December 1988 graduate of Eastern Kentucky University, earning a B.A. in public relations with an option in sports information. Prior to her time at Robert Morris, Smith served a one-year sports information internship with the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) Office (2001-02). At Longwood, Smith assists in the daily operation of the sports information office with direct responsibility for the sports of women's basketball, men's soccer, field hockey, women's golf, women's lacrosse, and softball. 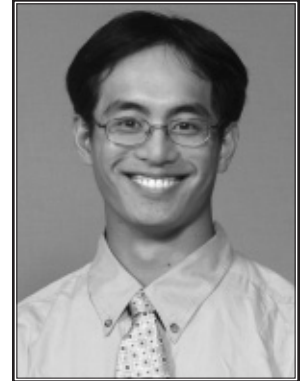
Wen was responsible for 15 sports at Ringgold High (2004-05), providing therapeutic modalities, first aid care, and preventative techniques.

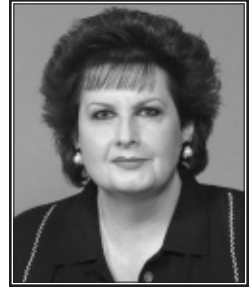

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS DEVELOPMENT TROY AUSTIN

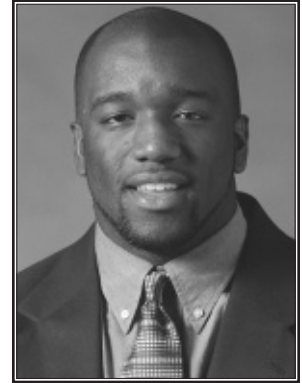

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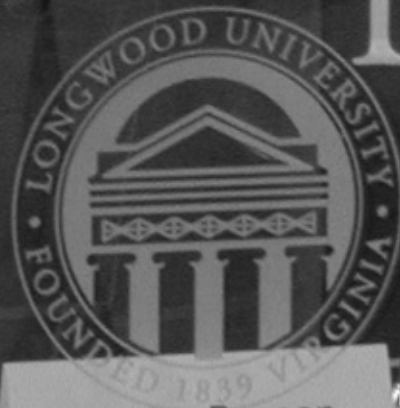

GAME DAY SERVICES

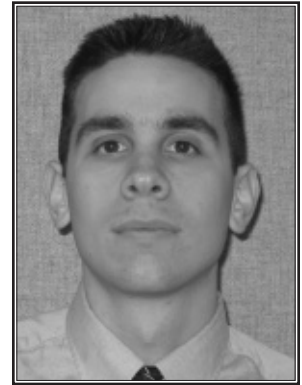

NCAA DIVISION I RECLASSIFICATION TIMELINE

Longwood University President **Dr. Patricia P. Cormier** informed the NCAA in a letter dated November 12, 2002 of Longwood's intention to reclassify its intercollegiate athletic program to Division I status. By doing so, the institution began an NCAA-mandated five-year process, including a one-year "exploratory period" (2002-03), to change its membership from Division II to Division I.

The decision to move to Division I is part of Longwood's overall strategic plan to raise the visibility and profile of the University. According to President Cormier, "We believe that Division I status will enhance both our institutional image and our recruitment efforts. And we think our student-athletes deserve to play at that level. We look forward to developing some great rivalries."

Those sentiments are shared by Longwood Director of Athletics **Rick Mazzuto** who stated, "One of the tremendous positives generated out of moving to Division I is the opportunity to use intercollegiate athletics as a vehicle to raise the public profile of the institution. The increased opportunities to play other high profile educational institutions, and to travel to major metropolitan areas where they are located, will greatly benefit Longwood -- in terms of more media interest and visibility."

MEN'S GOLF, WOMEN'S LACROSSE ACCEPTED INTO MULTIDIVISIONAL RECLASSIFICATION PROCESS

*The NCAA Membership Subcommittee has accepted the Longwood Men's Golf and Women's Lacrosse programs into the **Multidivisional Reclassification** process which will lead to these two sports being officially certified Division I as of September 1, 2006. This certification will come one year ahead of the official certification for Longwood's remaining 12 sport programs.*

*"Selecting sports for this process was not easy," explained Director of Athletics **Rick Mazzuto**. "There are clearly a number of programs that will have the opportunity to compete for an NCAA bid as soon as they become eligible. In the final analysis, we picked two sports that have already proven themselves competitive against Division I competition. I have no doubt that both will be on the board for post-season selection in '06-'07."*

This multidivisional reclassification process is an option available only for those institutions that are reclassifying to Division I. An institution could designate one men's sport, and one women's sport, for the one-year early certification, though not an option for men's and women's basketball.
