Jim Parady, who has guided the Marist football program through a quarter-century of growth, is in his 25th season as the program's head coach and 26th overall with the Red Foxes.

Entering the 2016 season with 124 victories, Parady is the winningest coach in program history. He has made Marist a force to be reckoned with at the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS), formerly known as I-AA, level. During his tenure, Parady has coached conference championship teams and has had student-athletes excel both on and off of the playing field. The Red Foxes have made the jump from Division III to FCS status, moved into a newly-renovated stadium, won four league championships and joined the Pioneer Football League on Parady's watch. Three former Marist football players have signed contracts with NFL teams since 2013. In 2014, the Miami Dolphins' Terrence Fede became the first former Marist football player to appear in an NFL game. In 2015, two former Marist football players shared the field for the first time when Fede and the Dolphins faced the Jacksonville Jaguars and kicker Jason Myers.

In his tenure as head coach, Parady has posted a 124-126-1 record, including 11 winning seasons. The Red Foxes won the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Football League championship in 1994, 2006 and 2007, and the Pioneer Football League championship in 2013. Parady also coaches the team's quarterbacks.

The 2015 season included explosive offensive play and a four-game winning streak following a 1-4 start. Sophomore Mike White made his first career start in the season's third game, and finished with 2,564 passing yards and 14 touchdowns. A total of six Red Foxes were either named First or Second Team All-PFL, and 10 more were named Honorable Mention All-PFL.

In 2014, Marist rebounded from an 0-5 start to win four of its last six games. The Red Foxes went 4-4 in PFL and finished tied for fourth place in the league. Senior free safety Zach Adler was named Honorable Mention All-America by the Associated Press, and three Red Foxes (Adler, Paul Sakowski and Demetrius Williams) were named First Team All-PFL. Marist also enjoyed success in the classroom, as a school-record 48 Red Foxes were named to the PFL Academic Honor Roll.

In 2013, Parady led the Red Foxes to one of their most memorable seasons in program history. Marist won a share of the PFL championship for the first time, set a varsity program record with eight victories and set single-season records for total yards and points scored. Parady was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award as the Football Championship Subdivision's Coach of the Year, and



was named PFL Coach of the Year. The Red Foxes had their first NFL Draft choice in program history following the season, as defensive end Terrence Fede was chosen in the seventh round with the 234th overall pick by the Miami Dolphins. Fede was named PFL Defensive Player of the Year, and was a finalist for the Buck Buchanan Award as top defensive player in the FCS. Parady was also instrumental in the development of Chuckie Looney, who set the program's single-season and career records for completions, attempts, passing yards and passing touchdowns.

The 2012 season was one of the most historic in program history, particularly on the offensive side of the ball. Wide receiver Michael Rios set the program's career record for touchdown receptions, the single-season program records for receiving yards and receiving touchdowns, and the single-game record for receiving yards. He became the first player in program history to sign an NFL contract when he signed a rookie free-agent contract with the Arizona Cardinals. Marist also had its second-highest total of passing yards in program history, and second-highest total of rushing yards in the last 10 seasons. The Red Foxes also had their longest play from scrimmage in program history, and tied their longest run from scrimmage. Additionally, Marist was number one in the FCS ranks in Red Zone Defense.

In 2011, Parady won his 100th game as head coach in the season opener, a 20-7 triumph at Sacred Heart. The Red Foxes boasted talented playmakers on both sides of the ball, as a total of 11 Red Foxes earned Pioneer Football League honors, including

four First Team selections. Following the season, wide receiver Kevin Fitzpatrick and cornerback Jaquan Bryant were invited to the rookie minicamps of the Buffalo Bills and Oakland Raiders, respectively.

Parady presided over record-setting production in the Marist passing game during the 2010 season. The Red Foxes set a single-season program record with 2,950 yards through the air. Quarterback Tommy Reilly set the program's single-game and single-season records for completions, attempts and passing yards, and Chuckie Looney became the first true freshman to take snaps under center.

The 2009 season was a historical one for the Marist program. The Red Foxes played their first season as a member of the Pioneer Football League, tied a program record with seven victories, and set a program record with a six-game winning streak. Wide receiver James LaMacchia became the first player in program history to have a 1,000-yard receiving season, and also set the program record for receptions in a season with 62. Five Red Foxes were named CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine First Team Academic All-District, which was tied for the most First Team selections of any Division I school in the country.

The 2008 season saw the Red Foxes compile a 4-7 record competing as an FCS independent. Marist won three of its final five games, including a triumph at future Pioneer League foe Davidson to close out the season. Running back Obozua Ehikioya set the program record for touchdowns and the school's FCS record for career rushing yards, while quarterback Chris Debowski tied the program record for touchdown passes in a game with four in the Red Foxes' 34-7 win over Bryant. Right guard Jake Dembow was named an FCS Academic All-Star and was a national semifinalist for the Draddy Award. Both Dembow and Ehikioya were selected to play in the East Coast Bowl.

In 2007, Marist had perhaps its most historical season in program history. The team moved into its beautiful new home - Tenney Stadium at Leonidoff Field - and played its first game there on Oct. 6, 2007 against Duquesne. After a rough start to the season, the Red Foxes rebounded to win their last two games and earn a share of the MAAC title for the second straight year, enabling Parady to win MAAC Coach of the Year honors.

During the 2006 campaign, the Red Foxes captured a share of their second MAAC title in school history when they snared a 24-17 victory on Senior Day at the Old Leonidoff Field. Marist secured a 3-1 league mark with the win.

In 2005, the Red Foxes had one of the best seasons in recent history, tying a school record for wins with a 7-4 overall record and winning three of four MAAC

contests. Seniors James Luft (quarterback) and Guy Smith (receiver) worked their way into the school's Division I-AA record books and Marist outscored its opponents by a 305-283 margin over 11 contests. Eight players earned honors on the All-MAAC first and second teams, with another seven named to the league's All-Academic team. In one of the most productive offensive seasons in team history, the 2005 squad set Division I-AA school records in passing yards (2,232), total offensive yards (3,891) and scoring (305 points).

The 2004 season was marked with a number of important honors for Parady's Red Foxes squad. Winning their first three MAAC Football League contests by a combined margin of 103-69, the Red Foxes were in contention for their second league title in history heading into the final MAAC game of the season. A hard-fought, but heartbreaking 7-3 loss to Duquesne saw the Marist squad finish second in the conference standings, the team's highest ranking since tying for second in 2002. Against MAAC opponents La Salle and Iona, the Red Foxes posted 41 points on the scoreboard in both games. In addition to placing a total of 14 players on the All-MAAC first and second teams, Marist players were named both the Offensive and Defensive Rookies of the Year. Parady himself earned honors as the Anaconda Co-Coach of the Year, sharing the honor with Greg Gattuso of Duquesne. Parady's premium on effort in the classroom as well as on the field was also brought to life in a noticeable way, with a record 10 Marist players being named to the conference's All-Academic team.

Marist played one of its most challenging schedules in program history during the 2003 season. The Red Foxes began a series with Patriot League power, Lafayette, and took Marist football national, playing on the West Coast for the first time at the University of San Diego. The Red Foxes set numerous school records during the campaign, highlighted by John Healy setting the I-AA school record for career tackles (276). Marist also snapped 12 single-game and single-season school marks.

The 2002 campaign was one that Marist fans have

come to expect of a Parady-coached team, as the Red Foxes went 7-4 overall, equaling the school record for wins in a single season. Marist posted a 5-3 record in MAAC Football League play, and finished in a tie for second place. The squad wrote itself into the record books against La Salle on November 9th, with single game records of 590 total yards of offense, 509 rushing yards and 80 rushing attempts. In the season opener, the defensive unit set a school record, holding the 2001 Mid-Major National Champions, Sacred Heart, to a school record minus-14 yards of rushing offense in the game. Ten Red Foxes were honored with All-MAAC accolades during the 2002 season, led by four on the first team. Chris Price, along with Juwan Jackson and Mike Loniewski were First Team offensive selections, with Adam Ercoli earning First Team accolades on the defensive side of the ball. Alfredo Riullano, Steve Evans and Brett Biggs were all named to the offensive Second Team, while Charles Fowler, Aubrey Bennett and Ike Ibeh were on the defensive Second Team. Ercoli went on to earn I-AA Mid-Major All-America honors from the Football Gazette, and Jackson earned the same honor from The Sports Network. The Red Foxes received national recognition during the season, as Price and Fowler earned National Player of the Week accolades during the campaign.

The 2001 edition of Marist football struggled early during the fall, but under the direction of Parady rebounded to win three of its last four games, to finish the year at 3-6 overall, and 2-4 in MAAC Football League play. There were plenty of highlights to go around during the season, including a thrilling overtime win over Georgetown, 38-35, on Homecoming Weekend, the first-ever win over the Hoyas in program history. Marist also defeated Siena, the 10th win in as many games against the in-state rival during Parady's tenure. Honors abounded for Marist during the year, with nine players being tabbed as All-MAAC performers, with five making the first team. First Team All-MAAC performer Tim Cullen, a member of the Red Foxes defense, earned I-AA Mid-Major All-America honors from The Sports Network. Cullen, Mike Loniewski and Brett Biggs, were all Football Gazette All-America Honorable Mention selections. Eight of the players also showed their success in the classroom as well as

excellence on the field, earning MAAC All-Academic Team honors.

The 2000 campaign was one of milestones, both personally for Parady and for the program. Marist won its 100th game in its 23rd year of varsity competition, and Parady reached the 50-win plateau in a 34-31 win over Wagner. Marist had a then-program-record 11 athletes named to the All-MAAC teams at the end of the season, and had seven players named All-America recognition from the Football Gazette. It was the Red Foxes' seventh straight winning season.

Offense was the name of the game in the final year of the decade as Parady's squad finished the 1999 campaign at 6-5. One of the most productive offensive years in program history, the Red Foxes eclipsed the 40-point mark in four games, including scoring 49 points, second most in a single game in program history, in a win over Canisius. The offensive unit was a balanced weapon, putting up nearly 1,500 yards both rushing and in the air.

The 1998 campaign saw Marist again ranking among the best in the nation defensively. The Red Foxes ranked second in the nation in pass efficiency at 78.3, and total defense, allowing just 219.6 yards per game. Marist also ranked third in the nation in rushing defense at 73.8 yards per game, and was the sixth-best in the country in points allowed, giving up just 12.9 a game. The offense was not to be outdone that season, rewriting 15 school records, six on the legs of the school's all-time single-season touchdown leader (21), the late J.J. Allen.

Parady and his Red Foxes broke into the national

spotlight in 1997 by setting national records. The Marist defense set a pair of I-AA records in the fall of 1997, breaking the opponent rushing yards per game and fewest yards allowed per rush marks, that had been held by Florida A&M. The Red Foxes allowed just 39.8 rush yards a game, eclipsing the 1978 record of 45.4 yards per game. The stingy Marist defense also allowed just 1.2 yards per rush, which snapped the Rattlers 1984 national record of 1.3 yards a carry

The 1994 season saw a step forward for Marist football, when it joined the MAAC Football League, and then took it by storm. Marist was chosen to finish fourth that season, but Parady engineered a 7-3 campaign, and a 6-1 mark in the inaugural

season as a MAAC member to capture the league crown. The seven wins tied the school record, and the six league wins were the most in the Red Foxes' MAAC tenure. Marist followed that championship season with back-to-back winning seasons, going 6-4 in 1995 and 7-3 in 1996.

After taking over the head coaching reins for the 1992 campaign, Parady led Marist into uncharted territory in 1993, as the Red Foxes jumped from Division III to I-AA. The Red Foxes went 5-5 in their first season in Division I. Parady had first joined the Marist coaching staff in 1991, as the offensive coordinator to head coach Rick Parady.

Parady began his coaching career at Colby College in 1984, before moving on to Hamilton in 1985. He spent the 1986 and 1987 seasons coaching at Syracuse University. He served as a member of legendary coach Dick MacPherson's staff and helped lead the Orangemen to an 11-0-1 season and a

birth the 1988 Sugar Bowl versus Auburn. After Syracuse, Parady coached for two seasons at Brown, before taking over as the quarterback and receivers coach at Northeastern in 1990.

A native of Nashua, N.H., Parady attended the University of Maine, earning a bachelor's degree in education in 1983. He was a four-year member of the football team as a quarterback.

Parady and his wife, Kristen, reside in Poughkeepsie with their two children, Sarah Jane and Brett Kenneth. Sarah is a senior at Marist in the 2016-17 school year.

SCOTT RUMSEY

19th season

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH / DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR



Scott Rumsey is in his 19th season on Head Coach Jim Parady's staff at Marist. He will once again serve as associate head coach and defensive coordinator. Rumsey is in his 12th season as associate head coach, and this is his 16th as the Red Foxes' defensive coordinator.

Rumsey will coach the team's safeties in the 2016 season, a duty he previously held from 2008-09. He also coached linebackers from 2001-07, 2011-13, and in 2015. He served as defensive line coach from 1998-2000 as well as the 2010 and 2014 seasons. In his time as defensive coordinator, Rumsey has coached 72 all-conference selections, and has been the position coach for 25 all-conference honorees.

During this time, the Marist defense has earned national recognition. In the 2014 season, free safety Zach Adler led the FCS in interceptions per game. Adler was named Honorable Mention All-America by the Associated Press and was one of three Red Foxes – along with linebacker Paul Sakowski and defensive end Demetrius Williams – who earned First Team All-PFL honors. The Red Foxes ranked second in the league in scoring defense and total defense.

Rumsey was instrumental in the continued development of Terrence Fede, who became the first NFL draft choice in program history in 2014. Fede set the program's single-season and career record for sacks. He is set to enter his third season with the Miami Dolphins in 2016.

In Marist's PFL championship season of 2013, the Red Foxes recorded home shutouts against Valparaiso and Stetson, marking the first time since 2002 that the team recorded two shutouts in a season.

In 2012, Marist finished first in the FCS ranks in Red Zone Defense. The Red Foxes allowed the opposition to score on just 23 of its 40 trips (57.5 percent) inside the Marist 20-yard line. Marist also ranked among that national leaders in turnover ratio, going plus-9 in turnovers over 11 games last season.

The Marist defense was one of the best in the FCS ranks in 2011. The Red Foxes finished sixth in the FCS and first in the PFL by allowing an average of just 285.64 yards per game. Linebacker Ryan Cronan was a First Team All-PFL selection who led the team in tackles, and signed a contract to play professionally in Germany in the summer of 2012.

In 2009, the Marist defense was ranked 10th in the country in total defense and tied for 12th in scoring defense. The Red Foxes also recorded their first shutout in four years in a 24-0 victory over Valparaiso on Oct. 31. Nine Marist defensive players earned PFL honors.

Rumsey oversaw a change in the team's defensive philosophy heading into the 2008 season, as the Red Foxes changed from a 3-4 to a predominantly 3-3-5 look which they still utilize. Safety Rory Foley emerged as a star, setting a single-season school record with seven interceptions - a total which placed him third in the FCS ranks.

Rumsey's association with the Red Foxes football program dates back further than his coaching days. He starred as a defensive lineman at Marist and helped begin the building process of a winning program. As a rookie, Rumsey saw the Red Foxes win just two games, but by the time he graduated, he had led Marist to the top of the ACFC. In 1990, Rumsey, a two-time all-conference defensive tackle, helped the Red Foxes to a 7-2-1 overall record, and the first conference title in program history and an ACFC crown. The .750 winning percentage that season is still the best in program history.

Rumsey began his coaching career in 1991 as the defensive coordinator at Valley Central High School, before moving into the college coaching ranks at Bates College. He spent four seasons at Bates, coaching with former Marist coach Rick Parady. During his stint at Bates, Rumsey coached both the linebackers and defensive line, before returning to the Poughkeepsie campus for the 1998 season.



Rumsey earned his Bachelor's in communications from Marist College in 1991 and a Master's in Public Administration in the spring of 2006. He and his wife, the former Casey Hollister, along with their daughters Kalie, Caden and Codi, currently reside in Montgomery, N.Y.



NATE FIELDS

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR /
RUNNING BACKS8th
season

Nate Fields is in his eighth season as an assistant coach at Marist, and is now in his 11th year of association with the program dating back to his days as a student. This season marks Fields' fourth as offensive coordinator, and second as running backs coach.

In 2015, Fields directed an explosive offensive attack which featured 52 plays from scrimmage of at least 20 yards. Running back Marcellus Calhoun, who averaged 5.5 yards per carry and scored 11 touchdowns, was an Honorable Mention All-PFL selection.

In the 2013-14 seasons, Fields coached the team's offensive linemen in addition to his duties as offensive coordinator. During this time, Fields aided in the development of four All-PFL selections: right tackle Phede Celestin (first team, 2013), left tackle Peter Evans (first team, 2013), left guard Rocco Manfre (second team, 2013) and center Mike Mangino (second team, 2014). Celestin was named a Football Championship Subdivision All-American by The Sports Network.



In 2013, the Red Foxes enjoyed their most prolific season offensively in program history. Marist set program records with 378 points scored and 4,582 yards of total offense. The Red Foxes also set program records by scoring at least 30 points in five consecutive games, and eight contests overall.

From 2009-12, Fields served as the team's wide receivers coach, and also held the responsibilities of special teams coordinator and tight ends coach. Under Fields' leadership, Marist's wide receivers have left numerous marks on the team's record book. In 2012, Michael Rios set the program's career record for touchdown receptions, the single-season program records for receiving yards and receiving touchdowns, and the single-game record for receiving yards. Rios was a unanimous First Team All-PFL selection, and became the first player in program history to sign an NFL contract when he signed a rookie free-agent contract with the Arizona Cardinals.

In his first season as receivers coach in 2009, Fields' tutelage helped James LaMacchia become the first player in program history to have 1,000 yards receiving in a season en route to being a unanimous First Team All-Pioneer Football League selection. In 2010, LaMacchia set the program's single-season record with 74 receptions and broke the career marks for receptions, as he once again was named First Team All-PFL. Fields also mentored Kevin Fitzpatrick, who received an invitation to Buffalo Bills rookie minicamp in the spring of 2012.

Fields spent the 2006-08 seasons as a student assistant on the Red Foxes' staff. He spent one season on the Marist video staff, filming games and practices, before moving onto the field for the 2007 season. He worked specifically with the offensive line, assisting offensive line coach Bill Roos in practice with preparation and drills. On game day, Fields staffed the coaches' booth, charting game situations as well as defensive personnel, front and blitzes. Off the field, Fields assisted the coaching staff with game planning, opponent film breakdown, and all facets of video editing.

MARC BOURQUE

Marc Bourque, who has over two decades of collegiate coaching experience, is in his fifth season on the Marist coaching staff. For the fourth straight year, Bourque will coach the team's wide receivers. He will also serve as special teams' coordinator for the second straight year.

Bourque's tutelage helped fuel an outstanding freshman season from Justin Christian in 2015. Christian led the FCS in yards per reception and was named Second Team All-PFL, while Matt

Tralli was named Honorable Mention All-PFL as a wide receiver and return specialist. The Red Foxes had their first kickoff return for a touchdown in 11 years when Lawrence Dickens ran one back 100 yards in a victory over Stetson.

In 2014, wide receiver Matt Tralli was named Second Team All-PFL after a 69-catch season – the second-highest single-season total in program history. On special teams, Lawrence Dickens was second in the PFL with a 23.2 yard average on kickoff returns.

In the 2013 season, three Marist wide receivers – Matt Tralli, Bart Leneghan and Armani Martin – caught at least 45 passes for the first time in program history. All three were named Honorable Mention All-PFL. Martin set Marist's single-season record with 12 touchdown receptions.

In his first season on staff 2012, Bourque worked with Marist's running backs. The Red Foxes amassed 1,665 rushing yards – the team's second highest total in the past 10 seasons – and totaled 13 rushing touchdowns. Three backs totaled over 300 yards on the ground, and the team tied its longest run from scrimmage in program history.

Bourque coached at Western Connecticut State from 2003-12 and 1995-98. In his most recent stint, Bourque served as offensive coordinator for a team which set 20 school records in his tenure. He was also responsible for coaching the team's quarterbacks. Bourque also served as recruiting coordinator and academic coordinator. In his first stint at Western Connecticut, Bourque coached the team's running backs, quarterbacks, special teams, and was also the passing game coordinator.

From 2000-03, Bourque was quarterbacks coach, passing game coordinator, and academic coordinator at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. He was the tight ends coach at Columbia from 1998-2000.

Bourque began his coaching career at New Hampshire in 1994. As a volunteer assistant, he aided a variety of the team's skill positions.

Throughout his career, Bourque has gained extensive experience recruiting New England, New York, and New Jersey.



TOM KELLY

SPECIALISTS

33rd
season

The longest-tenured member of the Red Foxes' coaching staff, Tom Kelly is in his 33rd year on the Marist sidelines. Kelly will continue to work with the Red Foxes' specialists.

Under the tutelage of Kelly, kicker Jason Myers established himself as one of the best at his position in the PFL. Myers, who graduated in 2013, was an Honorable Mention All-PFL selection the previous three seasons, and led the league in touchbacks all three years. He holds Marist's all-time record for most points by a kicker. In 2011, he set a school record with a 49-yard field goal at Davidson. In March of

2015, Myers signed a free-agent contract with the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Punter Kevin Pauly wrapped up a prolific career in 2011. Pauly was a two-time Honorable Mention All-PFL choice. In 2009, he set the then-program record for longest field goal (46 yards). In 2008, Pauly set a Marist program record by averaging 41.0 yards per punt. Pauly also tied a school record with a 76-yard punt in 2010.

In 2005, Bradley Rowe set a Division I-AA school record with 36 successful extra point conversions in a single season.

Kelly himself was a placekicker for Marist in its days as a club program, kicking over the course of four seasons before his 1975 graduation. In 1976, Kelly received a tryout with the New York Giants.

Kelly lives in Wappingers Falls, N.Y., with his two sons, Brian and Patrick.



LARRY RILEY

CORNERBACKS

29th
season

Larry Riley is in his 29th season as an assistant coach at Marist.

Riley will be working with the team's cornerbacks this season. Riley has worked with both the defensive backs and linebackers in his Marist tenure of nearly three decades. This past season, both of Marist's starting cornerbacks - Zachary Quarles and Cameron Gibson - were named Honorable Mention All-PFL.

In his career, Riley has worked closely with some of the most talented players in program history. In 2011, cornerback Jaquan Bryant was a First Team

All-PFL selection. Bryant intercepted four passes, and later took part in the FCS Senior Scout Bowl and Oakland Raiders rookie minicamp. Riley also worked closely with Rory Foley (Class of '11), who graduated as Marist's all-time leader in tackles in the program's FCS history. Riley's tutelage helped Joe Riccardi set Marist's all-time tackles record with 484 from 1989-92 when the program was in Division III.

In 2007, Riley was honored by the Hudson Valley Federal Credit Union as part of their "Legends of the Hudson Valley" campaign, which was held in conjunction with Black History Month. It was just one of several awards Riley has earned for his dedication to the youth of the Hudson Valley.

After starring locally in his scholastic football career at Arlington High School, Riley attended Salem College in West Virginia, where he saw time as both a defensive back and running back, and earned All-America accolades two times during his career. In 1975, he led Salem to the NAIA National Championship and earned NAIA Offensive Player of the Year honors in the state of West Virginia. He was inducted into the Salem International University Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006.

He signed with the Denver Broncos and was a member of the famous "Orange Crush" defense and played on the 1977 Super Bowl team. Riley played one year with the New York Jets before embarking on a three-year stint in the Canadian Football League.

After his retirement from pro football, Riley became a voice for the world of football. His television appearances soon turned into a career in motivational speaking for universities and local school districts. His voice helped students to understand the pros and cons of a famous lifestyle. He encourages children to protect their dreams.

Riley earned his undergraduate degree in public relations and organizational communication in 2002 from Marist. In 2003, he also earned his Master's Degree in Educational Psychology from the school.

Riley began his coaching career as an assistant coach at nearby Arlington High School and in the Hyde Park school system. Riley resides in Poughkeepsie, N.Y., and has two children, a son Larry, and daughter, Laurissa. Laurissa was a member of the 2006 Marist women's softball team that won the program's first MAAC Championship and advanced to the Tuscon, Ariz. regional in the NCAA Tournament.



CLARENCE JOHNSON

7th season

LINEBACKERS/RECRUITING COORDINATOR



Clarence Johnson is in seventh season as an assistant coach at Marist. He will coach the team's linebackers in 2016 after having served as safeties coach from 2010-15. Johnson also added the title of recruiting coordinator in 2011.

Johnson's position group has annually been among the most talented on the Marist roster since his arrival. In the 2015 season, free safety Zach Adler closed out his impressive career with 17 interceptions, and was named Second Team All-PFL. Safety Mike Marston was named All-PFL Honorable Mention.

In 2014, Adler led the FCS in interceptions per game, was named Honorable Mention All-America by the Associated Press, and was named First Team All-PFL.

In the 2013 season, the Red Foxes had two Second Team All-PFL safeties in Adler and senior captain Nick Kaszei. In 2012, his position group made a significant impact on Marist's defense. Senior captain Nick Mainiero was named Second Team All-PFL, and Adler burst onto the scene by leading the PFL with four interceptions.

Johnson came to Marist from West Chester University in West Chester, Pa., where he coached from 2007-09. As defensive backs coach, Johnson was responsible for coaching the team's safeties and cornerbacks. He also worked with the kickoff and punt returners. In his tenure with the Golden Rams, he coached five All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference players, including three safeties and two return specialists. He coached in two NCAA Tournaments there.

A member of the American Football Coaches Associations and Black Coaches and Administrators Association, Johnson also has served as a football official in the Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Johnson is a 1992 graduate of West Chester, with a B.A. in Political Science and Public Administration. He was a three-year member of the Golden Rams as a cornerback and safety, and played on two NCAA playoff teams.

A resident of Poughkeepsie, Johnson and his wife, Gina, were married in July 2010.

JAKE DEMBOW

4th season

OFFENSIVE LINE/VIDEO COORDINATOR



A four-year starter on the Marist offensive line in his playing career, Jake Dembow is in his fourth season as assistant coach on the Marist staff. He will serve as offensive line coach in 2016, in addition to his responsibilities as the team's video coordinator.

Dembow is in his second season as offensive line coach. In 2015, a pair of offensive linemen - center Mike Mangino and right guard Sean Foley - were named Second Team All-PFL. Mangino concluded his career by starting every game in each of the last four seasons.

In the 2013-14 seasons, Dembow coached the team's running backs. In this time, Atiq Lucas earned second team (2013) and honorable mention (2014) All-PFL honors. In Marist's PFL championship season of 2013, Dembow's position group was responsible for 1,339 rushing yards and 15 rushing touchdowns.

Dembow came back to Poughkeepsie following one season as assistant defensive line coach at Tufts University in Medford, Mass. During his time with the Jumbos, Dembow assisted in various facets of defensive game planning, on-field instruction, video coordinating and day-to-day football operations.

Prior to Tufts, Dembow spent three seasons abroad as player-coach for football clubs in Denmark and Norway. In 2012, Dembow played and coached for the AFC Show in Stavanger, Norway. He served as a two-way lineman and helped the team to a playoff berth in its first season competing in Norway's elite division.

In 2010 and 2011, Dembow played both offensive and defensive line for the Aarhus Tigers in Aarhus, Denmark. In these two seasons, he helped the team not only gain promotion to the country's top league, but return to the post-season for the first time since 2000. In addition to his playing responsibilities, Dembow served as an assistant coach for both the senior and youth teams in the Tigers organization.

Following his undergraduate career at Marist, Dembow returned to his hometown of Merrimack, NH and began coaching at Merrimack High School, from where he was a 2005 graduate. This came after two stints playing arena football as an offensive lineman during the spring and summer of 2009.

Dembow is a 2009 graduate of Marist, where he studied history and adolescent education. He was an offensive lineman for the Red Foxes, starting all 44 of the team's games from 2005-08. An All-MAAC honoree in 2007, Dembow served as team captain in 2008. He received his Master's degree in educational psychology from Marist in 2015.

The defensive line was one of the Red Foxes' strongest areas in the 2015 season. Defensive end Demetrius Williams was named First Team All-PFL, while three Red Foxes - defensive ends John Brennan and Landon Moore, along with nose tackle Nicholas Foster - earned All-PFL Honorable Mention.

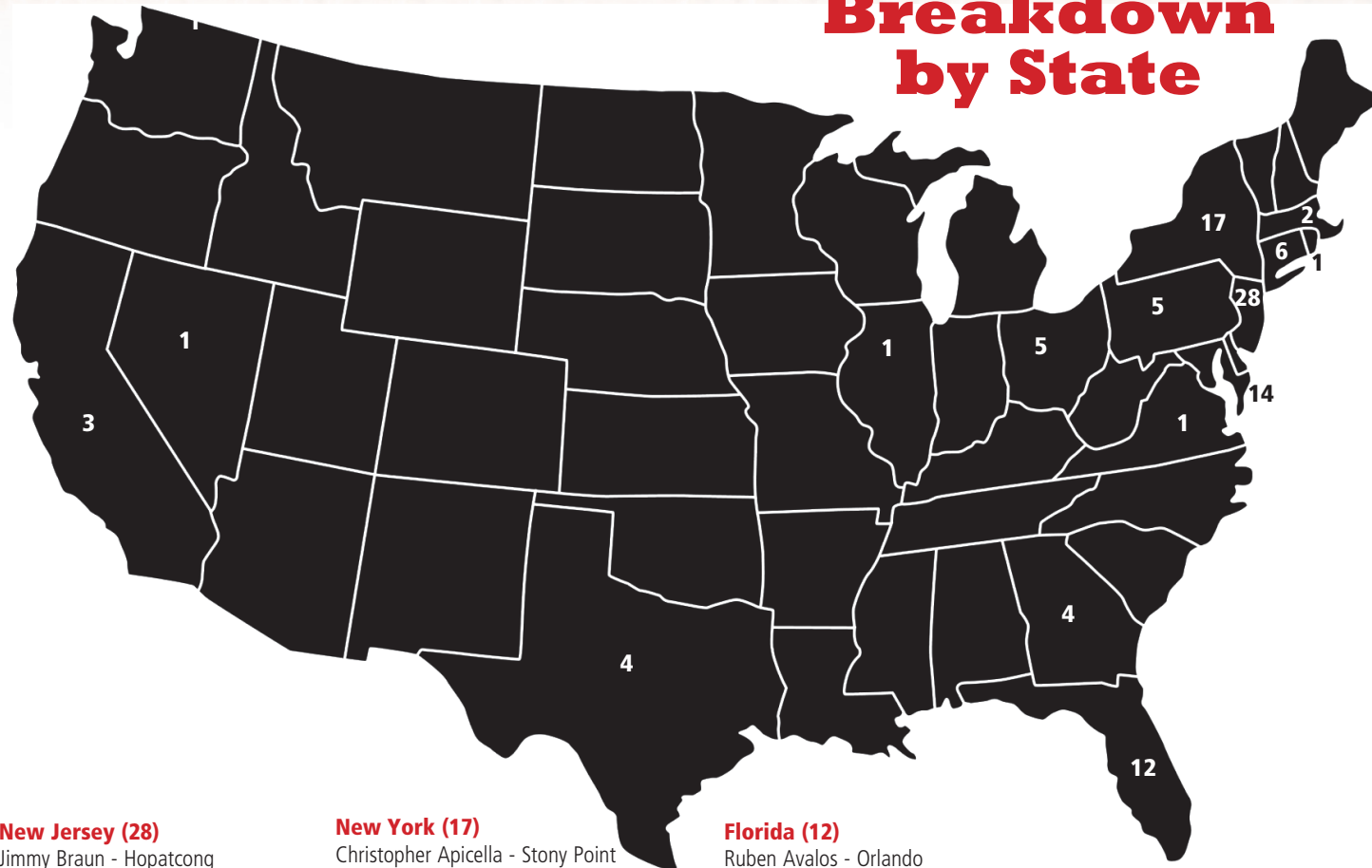
