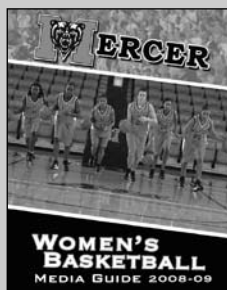

Credential Requests

The Sports Information Office will issue credentials to working press only. All credential requests should be made in writing at least 24 hours in advance of the scheduled game.

Practices

Interview Policy

Media interviews of players and coaches are encouraged, and every effort will be made to accommodate media requests. Under no circumstances will student-athletes' residence numbers be supplied to the media.

Interviews

All interviews with Mercer student-athletes should be coordinated through the Sports Information Office. Players are generally available for interviews up to 30 minutes prior to the start of practice and directly afterward.

Following a 10-minute "cooling off" period, coaches and players from both teams will be made available to media members outside each team's respective locker room. The Sports Information Office will poll the media prior to the end of the game to determine any player requests.

THE SEASON AHEAD...





All the signs of fall - the reddening of the leaves, the shortening days, the crisp chill in the air - are welcome sights for Mercer head coach Janell Jones and her team. After enduring a difficult, but necessary, transition season in 2007-08, Jones and a retooled Bears squad cannot wait to get back onto the court this year to show their fans (and the Atlantic Sun Conference foes) what they are truly capable of.

"I think there is a new excitement in the air," Jones said. "We feel like we are going to be much more competitive in our non-conference and our conference this season."

With a solid core of returning players, a hatful of talented young newcomers, and a challenging schedule designed to push the team to their very best, the Bears are aiming to turn a few heads in the A-Sun this season. Though the conference's preseason poll estimated the team would finish in a tie for eighth place, Mercer's team believes it is fully capable of shaking up those early rankings.

"Of course, we certainly have higher expectations than what the poll reads," Jones said. "[Our ranking] is something we will use as a motivational tool for the girls to get them to really push themselves and exceed those expectations."

THE BACKCOURT

Perhaps the Bears' deepest position, the Orange and Black will have plenty of quality options to fill the guard roles on the team, including returning their top scorer from a year ago, LaToya Jackson. Jackson paced the team with 13.8 points per game (good for fifth-best in the Atlantic Sun Conference) in her first season with the Bears following a transfer from Barton County Community College in Great Bend, Kan. The Oklahoma City native will look to pick up where she left off last season, when she scored a season-high and a team season-best 28 points on the big stage against ETSU in the Atlantic Sun Quarterfinals.

Starting every game in the point guard position, Jackson, who cracked double-digits in her first two Division I games, hit double-digit points in 21 of the team's 30 games last season, including scoring 10+ points in 10 of the last 11 games. Dishing out 105 assists for the season as well, Jackson finished the year as the sixth-best passer in the conference, averaging 3.5 assists per game. Running the point for the Bears



again this season, it is safe to say the majority of the team's offense will again come through Jackson in 2008-09.

"LaToya is such a great shooter, we would love to have her in the two position, but she's got the most experience at the point guard position as well," Jones said. "She had to do everything for us last year: bring the ball up, score and assist. This year, having some help around her will allow her to focus on scoring and not having to do so many other things."

In addition to Jackson, Mercer also returns senior guard Megan Lewis. Lewis enjoyed a solid campaign last year as well, averaging 4.9 points per game from the backcourt. A three-year veteran of the Orange and Black, she went on to set career-highs in most every major offensive category in 2007-08, including an impressive 20-point performance against Gardner-Webb on Feb. 11, where she knocked down eight of her nine shots from the floor. The Pace, Fla. Native just missed out on her

first career double-double against Kennesaw State in the final regular season game as well, contributing 12 points and a career-best nine rebounds.

Another familiar figure in the guard spot for the Orange and Black this season will be Cristin Seymour. Playing in all but one game, Seymour was a consistent performer for the Bears last season, averaging 6.4 points and 3.3 rebounds per game. Seymour scored in double-figures in 10 contests last season, including posting career-bests in both points (14) and assists (five) in the team's penultimate regular season game against Jacksonville.

Besides a solid core of veterans, the Bears will also have plenty of fresh faces battling for time in the backcourt as well. Junior Courtney Ford will be among the newcomers capable of making a significant impact on the team this season. A junior-college transfer from Orange Coast College in the competitive Orange Empire Conference, Ford set a new school record for career points with the Pirates last season, finishing with 1,416 in two seasons with Orange Coast. She also helped the school to back-to-back OEC championships, and was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 2007-08 after averaging 23.2 points, 10 rebounds, and four assists per game for the Pirates.

"What separates Courtney Ford from so many other players is that she is just an extreme competitor," Jones said. "She hates to lose, and she will do whatever it takes for her team to win. She is going to go down fighting. She is a girl that will take a charge, that will go down on the floor after a loose ball; that isn't afraid to take anyone to the hole. We didn't have that last year. She knows the pressure she is going to have to face in the conference this season, and she is working hard every day to get her game better."

True freshman Lorin Hammer should also see plenty of minutes in 2008-09 after joining the Bears from Sequoyah High School in Oklahoma where she helped the team to three state champi-



onships in her four-year career. Hammer, who is a Cherokee Indian, averaged 7.0 points, 2.8 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 3.0 steals per game in an all-around senior season at Sequoyah, boosting the program to an impressive 107-7 record in her time there.

A transfer from Oklahoma State, Natasha Doh will likely play a large role for the Orange and Black as well. Doh averaged 2.9 points and 2.1 rebounds for the Cowgirls last season, shooting over 50 percent from three-point range. Doh also has a history with Jones, having played under her at Oklahoma City University in her freshman season (2004-05), helping the team to a 32-7 record.

"Having Natasha is good because both she and LaToya can share time at point guard," Jones said. "You can never be too deep in the point guard position."

Freshmen Kara Powell, Anqaneice Lewis, Eryka Menzies and Porschea Jeffries will round out the minutes in the backcourt for the Bears this season.

THE FRONT COURT

Senior TaShera Lewis tops the list of Bears competing for time at the forward position. Lewis finished second on the team in scoring last season, adding 6.9 points per game to the Mercer attack and an impressive 9.1 ppg in A-Sun conference play. Lewis really seemed to find her stroke as the season went on, scoring in double-figures in nine of the team's final 17 games. The Orange and Black hopes that Lewis (who averaged 10.5 in her 2006-07 sophomore campaign) can carry that momentum into this season.

While Lewis' offensive numbers may have taken a slight drop last season, she more than made up for it with an increased presence on the glass. The Eastman, Ga. native finished third on the team with a career-best 120 rebounds, topping her previous season total by over 30 boards. Her career-best 13-rebound performance in the team's 74-61 win against USC Upstate

on Feb. 2 tied a team season-high; Lewis would complete the double-double with 18 points in that game as well. All told, she finished 15th in the Atlantic Sun in offensive rebounds, hauling in 59 boards at a 2.11 rpg clip.

Senior Dominique Chism should also be a prominent feature of the Mercer frontcourt. The forward was a standout performer with Oklahoma State during the 2006-07 season, starting 17 of the 31 games she appeared in for the Cowgirls. Jones and the Bears hope Chism's debut in the Orange and Black is as impressive as her first outing with OSU, where she scored 11 points in just 12 minutes. She would also grab a career-high 14 rebounds in a contest against Nebraska on Feb. 24, 2007: the best single-game performance by Oklahoma State on the season.

"Interestingly enough, when Dominique was at Oklahoma State, she was just expected to play defense and rebound," Jones said. "But here, we want her to do more: she knows how to score with two or three people on her, she can see the floor and knows how to pass. She is extremely athletic as well, as she can score in the post, take people off the dribble or step out and hit a 15-foot jump shot. She is such a presence on the court: she demands defensive coverage, which will really open our guard play up."

Returning senior Nicole Leonard and incoming junior Holly Bawden will also see time at forward for the Bears this season. Leonard averaged 2.6 points and 1.8 rebounds in 30 games for the Bears last season, while Bawden averaged nearly a double-double while playing both the three and the four slots for Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College.

In addition to its forwards, Mercer will have two up-and-coming talents to choose from in the center position. The lone sophomore on the roster, Kourtney Carter earned 19 starts in her first season with the Bears last year. The Fullerton, Calif. native finished the season tied for fourth on the team with

a 6.9 points per game average, and led the team with her 4.8 rebounds per game. Carter was the team's second-highest scorer in the Atlantic Sun quarterfinal game against ETSU, posting 12 points and four boards against the Bucs.

Carter will be joined in the middle by newcomer Lacy Ramon. The Norman, Okla. native took her Mustang and Norman High School squads to four straight state tournaments, winning a state championship in 2006. Ramon averaged 12.1 points, 6.3 rebounds and 2.9 assists on her way to a McDonald's All-American nomination in her senior season.

"Lacy is just a hard-nosed, tough, competitive player that understands the game," Jones said. "She is going to be playing against posts that are bigger than her, but she is not afraid to take on anyone. She is only going to get better as the year develops. She is another player that will bring us the toughness we lacked last year: when you have got someone that is diving on the floor and



picking up charges, it fires up everyone around them."

SCHEDULE

The Bears open the regular season with a four-game road swing beginning on Nov. 14, when they battle Texas A&M in College Station. The Aggies are coming off an outstanding 2007-08 season in which they went 29-8, garnered the No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament's Oklahoma City Regional, and advanced



to the Elite Eight before falling to eventual national champion Tennessee, 53-45. They also finished the season ranked No. 8 in the country and defeated Oklahoma State to claim the Phillips 66 Big 12 Tournament Championship.

"Starting out against Texas A&M will give us a real test of pressure and playing against great athletes," Jones said. "We are getting to play the No. 8 team in the country, and it's a great opportunity for us to go down there and play with nothing to lose."

Mercer then heads to South Carolina State (Nov. 18), Louisiana-Lafayette (Nov. 21) and South Alabama (Nov. 24) before returning to the University Center for the home opener on Nov. 28 against High Point. The Bears upended SCSU and ULL in Macon to open up the 2007-08 campaign while the meeting with High Point will be the first in the program's history.

Due to the additional conference games this season, Atlantic Sun play will start up Dec. 3 when USC Upstate invades Macon. Two days later, Mercer hosts ETSU before embarking on a season-high seven-game road swing. The Lady Bucs represented the A-Sun at last year's NCAA Tourney, though they were downed by Oklahoma State in first-round action.

The tough road stretch begins with

another NCAA Tournament squad from last season as the Bears travel to Tallahassee, Fla. for a tilt with Florida State on Dec. 14. FSU defeated Ohio State in the first round and lost to Oklahoma State in the Round of 32.

Mercer then travels to the Bahamas for a pair of games on Dec. 18-19, where the Bears will face off against East Carolina and former A-Sun foe Florida Atlantic before heading to Kansas for a difficult test at Wichita State to close out the non-conference portion of the schedule. This will also mark the Bears first ever meeting with the Shockers.

"Any time you have an opportunity to go on the road and play tough opponents like Florida State and Wichita State, and go out there and fight and battle, your team is always going to be better, no matter what the outcome," Jones said. "Most of our non-conference games are on the road, and I think that experience will help us. In a road game, it's just you and your coaches: you have to fight as a team. I think we will grow a lot from our non-conference schedule."

The Bears resume conference action with a Jan. 8 match-up at Jacksonville and the lengthy road swing concludes with a contest against UNF on Jan. 10. After 40 days without a home game, Mercer will welcome 2008 WNIT partic-

ipant FGCU to the University Center on Jan. 15. The quick two-game home stand will see longtime rival Stetson visit Macon on Jan. 17.

A trip to Music City is next on the slate as Mercer takes on Belmont (Jan. 22) and Lipscomb (Jan. 24). The Bears then enjoy a season-high four-game home stand in which they will compete against Kennesaw State (Jan. 29), Campbell (Feb. 2), UNF (Feb. 5), and Jacksonville (Feb. 7).

The Bears travel up I-75 on Feb. 9 for a date with in-state rival Kennesaw State before heading to the Sunshine State for match-ups with Stetson (Feb. 12) and FGCU (Feb. 14). Mercer's final home contests are against Lipscomb on Feb. 19 and Senior Day is set for Feb. 21 when Belmont comes to town.

"Our conference is going to be tough from top to bottom," Jones said. "There are several talented teams in the A-Sun and we'll have to be ready to play every game."

Mercer closes out the regular season at USC Upstate (Feb. 26) and ETSU (Feb. 28). For the second consecutive year, Lipscomb will host the A-Sun Championship on Mar. 4-7 at Allen Arena.

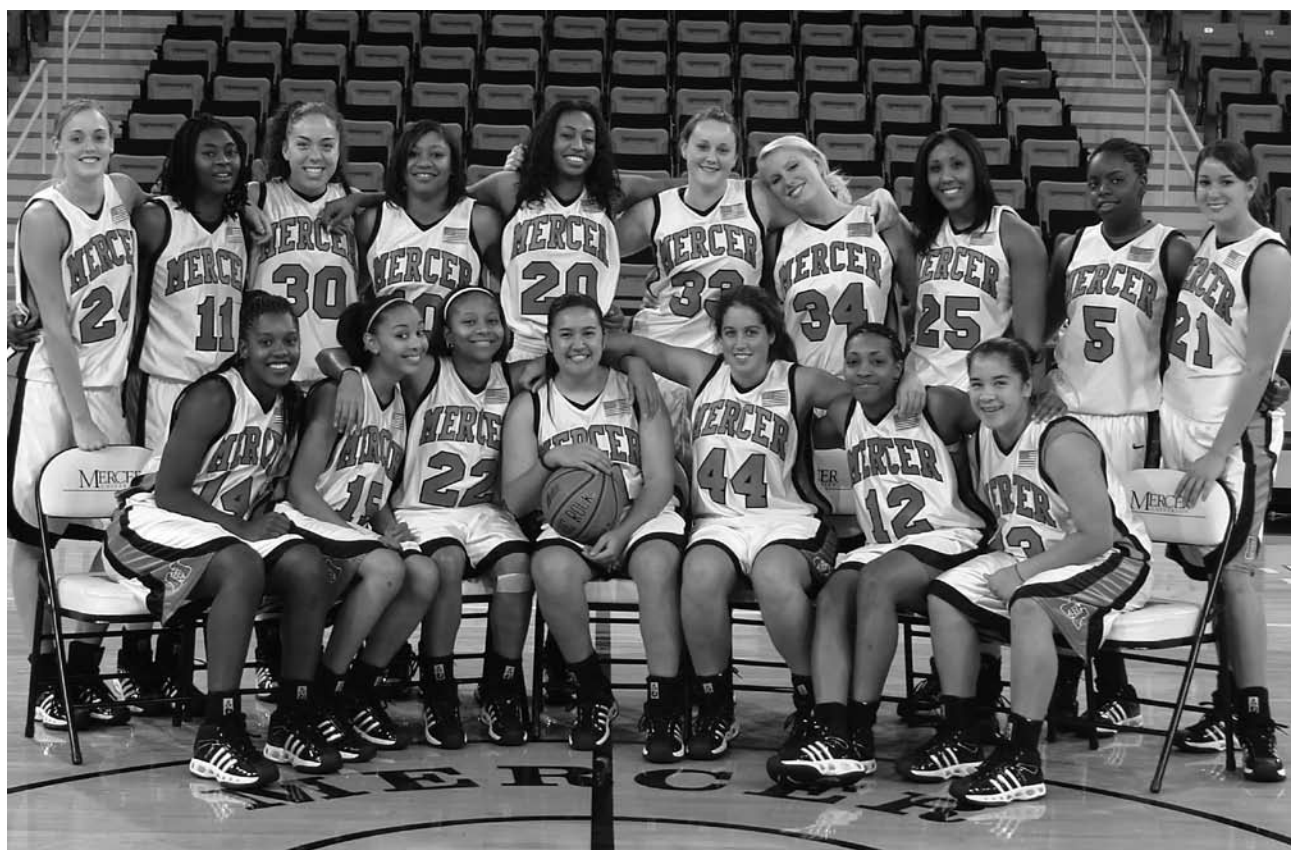

Head Coach

Second Season at Mercer

Record at Mercer: 4-26 (one season)

Career Record: 229-50 (eight seasons)

Janell Jones prepares to enter her second season at the helm of the Mercer Bears program. Jones will look to progress from a rebuilding season last year, and hopes to record the team's first winning season since the 2001-02 campaign.

Building winning programs, however, happens to be a forte of Jones', as she joined Mercer in the spring of 2007 having won more than 90 percent of her games in seven seasons as a head coach. She sports a career record of 229-50 at Mercer, UC San Diego and Oklahoma City University, where she won two NAIA national championships and was national runner-up three times.

In her first game on the sidelines for Mercer, Jones recorded her first win as a Division I head coach on November 9, 2007, logging a 58-55 victory over South Carolina State. Two days later, Jones and the Bears would rally from a seven-point deficit midway through the second half, going on a 15-4 run to chalk up a 72-61 win over Louisiana-Lafayette.

Jones' first Atlantic Sun Conference win would come on February 2, when Mercer trounced USC Upstate, 74-61, in Spartanburg, S.C.

Under Jones' guidance, LaToya Jackson would finish the 2007-08 season as the fifth leading scorer in the Atlantic Sun conference; the sophomore guard put up a 13.5 points per game average.

Jones joined Mercer last season after two seasons at UC San Diego. After taking over at UCSD in 2005, Jones compiled a 50-10 record and led the Tritons to the NCAA Division II Tournament in consecutive years. She led the team to the Final Four in 2006, where UCSD lost to eventual national champion Southern Connecticut State. For her efforts during the 2006-07 campaign, Jones was named California Collegiate Athletic Association Coach of the Year. One of her players on the Final

Four team, Leora Juster, was named a Division II Kodak All-American.

Prior to her arrival at UC San Diego, Jones distinguished herself as the winningest coach in Oklahoma City University history. She was part of four NAIA Division I national championship teams (two as head coach and two as an assistant) and posted a record of 175-14 (.926) over five seasons. Her squads never finished a season with fewer than 32 victories. At OCU she was responsible for recruiting and coaching All-American Miriam Sy, who was drafted by the WNBA's Washington Mystics in 2006, and coached five Kodak All-Americans, including two Kodak Players of the Year. She was named NAIA Coach of the Year in 2001 and 2002. Jones joined OCU as an assistant coach in 1998 and quickly helped the Stars win their first national championship since 1988, which initiated a string of four straight national titles. She has also helped several players to play professionally in leagues overseas.

Before joining the Oklahoma City staff, Jones was an assistant coach at Oral Roberts in Tulsa, Okla. Her appointment at Oral Roberts followed a successful three-year stint as head girls' basketball coach at Carl Albert High School in Midwest City, Okla. At Carl Albert High School, she led the Titans to the 1996 Oklahoma Class 5A State Championship and compiled a 69-13 mark. Her program produced three NCAA Division I players, including Paige Sauer, a former WNBA player.

A native of Midwest City, Okla., Jones earned a bachelor's degree in science education, summa cum laude, from Oklahoma Christian University, where she was a member of the women's basketball team. She completed a master's degree in educational leadership, summa cum laude, from Southern Nazarene University.

In addition to her coaching duties, Jones also has served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association. Jones has one son, Kyle Jones, who is currently a graduate student at Mercer University Medical School in the Nurse Anesthesia Program.

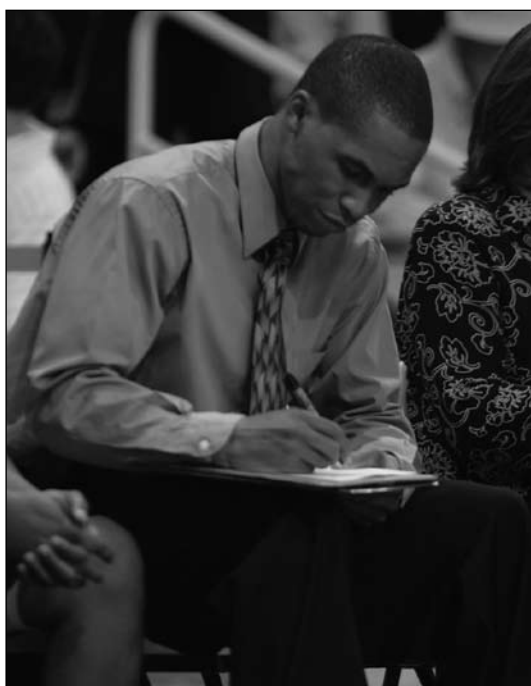

Kenneth Cooper, formally an assistant coach at Seminole State Community College in Seminole, Okla., begins his second season on the sidelines with the Bears alongside head coach Janell Jones.



Cooper spent three seasons as an assistant with the Belles, helping the team reach the Bi-State Conference Tournament each year during his tenure. Cooper compiled a 51-40 (.560) record during his three-year stint as an assistant coach with Seminole State. The team improved each season, going from 10-21 in 2004-05 to 16-13 in 2005-06 to 25-6 in 2006-07. The Belles won the Bi-State West Conference championship in 2007 with a 14-0 mark at home. Seminole State also finished third at the 2007 Region II Tournament.

Born in Oklahoma City, Okla., Burge attended Oklahoma City University for his freshman and sophomore seasons, playing basketball for the Stars in 2003-05. In his second season, Burge helped OCU into the second round of the NAIA tournament.

Burge then transferred to Valdosta State, where he spent his junior and senior seasons with the Blazers.

Burge currently lives in Macon and is working towards his master's degree in collaborative education while with the Bears.

Christen Roper joins the Bears and Janell Jones for her first season with the Orange and Black. Roper played four years at the University of Hawaii (1999-2003) under head coach Vince Goo, winning a handful of accolades while helping the team to postseason play in each of her four seasons.

Shortly after, Roper was drafted to the WNBA's Sacramento Monarchs, where she played a partial season before heading overseas to play for BC Univrsitat Marburg in Marburg, Germany and a half a season with Panserrikos in Serres, Greece. Roper then returned to Hawaii to finish her last semester, graduating in December, 2004. Roper was one of the last to graduate from Vince Goo's era of coaching, completing his 100% graduation rate.

After graduation in January 2005, Roper was hired to play for Portugal's BC Barreiro, where she helped the team to the Portugal Cup at the end of that season. Treatment and Rehabilitation Areas



The Mission of Mercer University's **Sports Medicine Department** is to provide quality comprehensive healthcare to student-athletes. The health and well-being of student-athletes is the number one priority. Student-athletes have access to therapeutic services such as ultrasound, electrical stimulation, hydrotherapy, rehabilitation, nutritional counseling and preventative physical medicine.

The Mercer Sports Medicine department utilizes a state-of-the-art athletic training facility in the University Center. The athletic training room consists of a treatment, taping and rehabilitation area. The rehabilitation area is equipped with a treadmill and exercise bikes in addition to a variety of weights, resistance bands, medicine balls, and other rehabilitation equipment which can be used to facilitate injury rehabilitations.

The athletic training area also has an enclosed hydrotherapy room with an eight-person cold whirlpool and smaller extremity whirlpools. There are also offices for the staff and a physician exam room. The athletic training room also has easy access to the weight room and the University Center pool.

The facility is staffed by two full-time certified athletic trainers and five graduate assistant certified athletic trainers, a family practice physician and an orthopedic surgeon. The staff works with other groups of health-care providers to bring a comprehensive care to the student-athletes and acts as a liaison with nutritionists, dentist, cardiologists, and many other specialists.

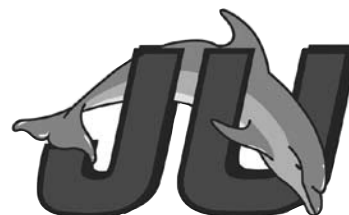

The Bears (1-0) exhibited toughness down the stretch in holding off the visiting Lady Bulldogs. With the score 55-52 in favor of South Carolina State and just under three minutes remaining, junior Cristin Seymour drained a huge three-pointer to tie up the back-and-forth contest and swing momentum back to Mercer.

Senior Sarah Russell scored a team-high 15 points and sank one-of-two from the free throw line with 2:06 left giving the Bears a lead it would not relinquish. Following three empty trips for the Bulldogs, sophomore LaToya Jackson calmly made two free throws extending the Bears' lead to three with 15 seconds remaining.

On its next possession, SCSU's senior point guard Brittany Baity had a good look from three, but her shot rattled off the rim. The ball went out of bounds off of Mercer, but SCSU proceeded to turn it over for the 28th time as the Bears secured the first win in the Janell Jones era.

"Sometimes it's tough finding ourselves this early in the season," said Jones. "It was a sloppy game but we still found a way to win."

In the first half, Mercer jumped out to an early five-point lead, but SCSU had its largest lead of the evening at 24-17 with 3:41 remaining in the period. The Bears went on a 9-2 run to close out the half, highlighted by six points from Jackson including a lay-up to knot things up at 26 heading into intermission.

The Bears also received a solid effort from junior Shaquita Bell (13 points) and Jackson showed a stellar all-around game with 10 points, five rebounds and four assists.

South Carolina State (0-1) was led by Solphilia Hipps' game-high 22 points. Also scoring in double-figures for the Lady Bulldogs were Jenell Moore (15 points) and Baity (10 points).

The early-season battle saw 28 turnovers from SCSU and 27 from Mercer, but each team shot well from the field. The Bears shot 45 percent while the Bulldogs finished the game at a 44-percent clip. Mercer enjoyed the rebounding edge, 34-28, but they shot themselves in the foot going only 9-for-19 from the line.

MACON, Ga. - The Mercer women's basketball squad was defeated by South Alabama, 57-39, on Tuesday evening at the University Center. The contest evened up the Bears' record at 1-1 against opponents from the Sun Belt Conference this season.

"We're a young team that's struggling right now," said head coach Janell Jones. "We can't make any excuses, we just have a long way to go."

The Lady Jaguars were solid inside and out-rebounded the Bears, 40-33, which led to 30 points in the paint. USA also shot 43 percent from the field while MU put home 28 percent of its shots.

Jessica Starling then hit back-to-back threes from the same spot extending the lead to nine at the six-minute mark and USA used a 17-6 run to close out the half with a 36-20 advantage. Jones led all scorers with 11 first-half points.

Each team struggled to hold onto the ball coming out of the break as the squads combined for nine turnovers in the first five minutes. After falling behind 40-20, the Bears put together an 8-0 run with a balanced attack. Essex started the run with a pair of free throws, and Bell notched a pair of baskets sandwiched around a lay up from junior TaShera Lewis.

The Bears never got closer than 12 the rest of the way as the Jags moved the ball well tallying 15 assists on their 23 field goals. USA was also strong in transition out-scoring Mercer, 12-0.

"The defense wasn't bad, but we couldn't put the ball in the hole," added Jones. "We just need to keep working and find a way to make shots."

Mercer was paced by Lewis (10 points and seven rebounds) while freshman Kourtney Carter continued to do the little things on the floor and finished with eight points and three boards.

Jones led South Alabama (5-1) with a game-high 15 points as teammate Patrice Brunner also finished in double-figures with 10 points while adding eight rebounds.

Louisville 99, Mercer 74 (Dec. 28, Freedom Hall)

LOUISVILLE, Ky. - The Mercer women's basketball squad continued its stretch of difficult road games with a 99-74 loss at Louisville on Friday evening at Freedom Hall.

"We played hard for 40 minutes," said head coach Janell Jones. "We held the leading scorer in the country to nine points and left this game with a lot of positives."

After jumping out to an early 6-4 lead, Louisville reeled off an 11-2 run to open up a double-digit advantage. Junior Cristin Seymour ended the spurt with a three-pointer, and following a Cardinals' trey, sophomore LaToya Jackson knocked down a shot from behind the arc pulling the Bears within eight at the 12-minute mark.

Louisville (10-2) was tough inside as its high-powered offense poured in 28 points in the paint and shot 44 percent in the opening half. Mercer (3-9) did a solid job on Angel McCoughtry in the opening 20 minutes limiting her to five points on 2-of-8 shooting, but the All-American candidate contributed in other ways with four rebounds, three steals and a pair of assists. McCoughtry entered the contest leading the country in scoring and steals.

The Bears cut the deficit to 11 on a trey from junior Shaquita Bell with five minutes remaining in the opening stanza, but the Cardinals proceeded to finish the half on an 11-6 run and take a 49-33 advantage into intermission.

Mercer was plagued by turnovers in the first half as 14 giveaways led to 14 Louisville points. Freshman Kourtney Carter played well and finished with nine first-half points while senior Sarah Russell and Seymour each scored eight in leading the balanced attack.

The Cardinals opened the second half with another 11-2 run pushing their lead out to 61-34 with 16 minutes remaining. Carter scored four of Mercer's first five points coming out of the locker room and the Bears continued to fight as they hit 44 percent of their shots including five treys. Jackson went 6-for-9 from behind the arc and garnered 17 points in the final 20 minutes.

Louisville opened up its largest lead of the game, 68-38, at the 14-minute mark, but Mercer out-scored the hosts by five the rest of the way.

The Cardinals shot 51 percent from the floor for the game as the Bears countered with 40 percent shooting. Louisville enjoyed a 50-38 advantage on the boards and was led by Chauntise Wright. The junior netted a game-high 22 points. UL had four other players in double figures in Candace Bingham (20), Laura Terry (18), Patrika Barlow (14) and Keshia Hines (10). McCoughtry never caught fire and finished with nine points, 16 below her season average.

Jackson topped the Bears with 19 points and added four assists while Russell pitched in with 16 points and seven boards. Mercer had five players in double figures for the first time this season as Carter contributed 13 points and a team-high nine rebounds. Seymour and Bell each notched 10 points.

"The girls feel good about themselves right now," added Jones. "We want to create an atmosphere where playing hard is fun and one-by-one they are starting to buy into it."

CINCINNATI, Ohio - The Mercer women's basketball squad closed out its non-conference schedule with a 79-54 loss at Xavier on Sunday at the Cintas Center.

"We played better in the second half than we did in the first," said head coach Janell Jones. "I'm glad that the non-conference season is over and am looking forward to the conference portion."

Mercer (3-10) played the defending Atlantic 10 champions tough early hitting four of its first five shots to open the game and headed into the first media timeout down 13-9. Xavier has been led all season by its twin towers, 6-foot-5 Amber Harris and 6-foot-6 Ta'Shia Phillips, but outside shooting propelled the hosts to an early advantage.

Four treys, two from Maureen Hester, allowed the Musketeers to open up an 18-11 lead with 12 minutes remaining in the opening half. Xavier (8-4) entered the game as one of the top defensive teams in the country and used its full-court press and constant pressure to force Mercer into 15 first-half turnovers leading to 20 points.

The Musketeers used a 13-0 run midway through the first half to open up the game and take a commanding 26-11 lead. Sophomore LaToya Jackson silenced the run with her second three-pointer of the game, but Xavier out-scored Mercer by 13 over the final eight minutes of the half to take a 47-22 lead into the locker room.

Freshman Kourtney Carter scored eight points in the first seven minutes of the second half to help cut the deficit to 21. The Bears stepped up their play on the defensive end forcing 14 second-half turnovers and converted those into 14 points.

Like Friday's contest at Louisville, Mercer was able to take some positives from this game. After being out-scored by 25 in the opening half, Xavier and Mercer played even in the second stanza. The Bears also went 10-for-14 from the charity stripe, but ultimately the Musketeers were too much.

The Musketeers shot 45 percent from the field in the contest while the Bears countered with 38 percent shooting. Xavier owned a 49-24 advantage on the boards including 18 offensive rebounds, and used its decisive height advantage to register 36 points in the paint.

The Bears were led by Jackson's 14 points and Carter chipped in with 12. Senior Sarah Russell added eight points and a team-high five boards.

Ta'Shia Phillips and Hester paced the Xavier attack with 15 points apiece while Harris added 13. Phillips also recorded a game-high eight boards and Harris, who set the Xavier career blocks record as a freshman, blocked three shots in the game.

Kennesaw State 68, Mercer 52 (Jan. 5, KSU Convocation Center)

KENNESAW, Ga. - The Mercer women's basketball team was downed 68-52 at Kennesaw State on Saturday at the KSU Convocation Center.

"We didn't come ready to play today," said head coach Janell Jones. "(Kennesaw State) shot well and I was proud of the way we cut the lead to eight, but they came right back with a run after that."

Both teams began the game sluggishly going a combined 2-for-13 from the field and turned the ball over five times before KSU's one-point advantage was erased when junior Shaquita Bell nailed a trey four minutes in to give Mercer its first lead.

After the respective slow starts, both teams caught fire with the Bears shooting 48 percent over the final 14 minutes of the half and the Lady Owls countered with 58-percent shooting. With the score knotted at 22, junior TaShera Lewis gave Mercer (3-11, 0-1 A-Sun) its final lead of the game with a jumper before Kennesaw State (6-7, 1-0 A-Sun) reeled off a 12-2 run over the final five minutes to take a 34-26 advantage into the locker room.

The back-and-forth first half consisted of four ties and 10 lead changes. Lewis paced the Bears going 5-of-6 from the field for 10 first-half points while Greteya Kelley led the hosts with eight.

Aided by four Mercer turnovers, the Lady Owls went on a 7-2 run coming out of the locker room to take a 43-28 lead with 16 minutes remaining in regulation. Both teams traded baskets over the next eight minutes until junior LaToya Jackson drained a three-pointer cutting the deficit to 10 with seven and a half minutes left.

Two possessions later, senior Sarah Russell notched a lay up off a nice feed from Jackson to bring the Bears within single digits for the first time since the opening seconds of the second half at 58-50.

Following a timeout, the Lady Owls scored seven unanswered points highlighted by a conventional three-point play from reigning A-Sun Co-Player of the Week Britteny Henderson. The 5-foot-11 junior was dominant inside scoring 16 points and grabbing 11 boards.

Mercer was never able to get closer than 13 the rest of the way as Kennesaw State defeated the Bears for the third time in five all-time meetings.

"It was only the first conference game," added Jones. "We look forward to getting home next weekend."

The Bears lost the battle on the boards, 40-35, knocked down 38 percent of its shots in the game and committed 26 turnovers. The Lady Owls shot 39 percent and converted the Mercer giveaways into 19 points.

The Bears were paced offensively by Russell who went 8-for-13 from the field in scoring 16 points and garnering a game-high 13 rebounds. Lewis and Jackson contributed 10 points apiece.

KSU had three other players in double-figures besides Henderson in Nikki Gurley (12), Montinique Nixon (11) and Greteya Kelley (10). Ashley Johnson and Jennifer Baker each registered six assists.

MACON, Ga. - The Mercer women's basketball team fought back from an 18-point deficit to pull within five, but were downed by Jacksonville, 74-60, at the University Center on Saturday afternoon.

Both teams started out the contest on fire as Mercer hit four of its first seven shots and JU went 4-for-6 to take a slim 11-9 lead into the first media timeout. Coming out of the break, the Dolphins went on a 6-0 run over the next three minutes to open up an eight-point lead. The run was spearheaded by a pair of Jacksonville (13-3, 3-0 A-Sun) steals that led to easy baskets in transition.

Freshman Kourtney Carter silenced the run with a put back and sophomore LaToya Jackson nailed a three-pointer to pull Mercer (3-12, 0-2 A-Sun) back within three before the Dolphins' Regina Omoite drained her second trey of the game to put the visitors back up by six with 12 minutes remaining in the half.

Omoite's three-ball sparked another spurt for JU, this time an 8-0 run that stretched its lead to 25-14 midway through the stanza. The coaches' preseason favorite to win the A-Sun took a 38-20 lead, its largest of the game, with seven and a half minutes to go before the Bears reeled off a 9-0 run of their own. Mercer stayed close with four first-half treys from Jackson and headed into intermission down 46-34.

Turnovers were the story in the opening 20 minutes as 10 Mercer giveaways led to 14 points for JU. The Dolphins committed only three turnovers and registered nine assists on their 18 field goals.

Jackson hit another three-pointer two minutes into the second half to pull the Bears within 11, but preseason A-Sun Player of the Year Ashley Williams answered with a long-range bomb to put JU back up 53-39.

Mercer (3-14, 0-4 A-Sun) jumped out to an early 6-2 lead two minutes into the contest courtesy of four points from junior TaShera Lewis. Stetson recovered from its slow start as Ashli Jackson nailed a three-pointer to begin a 5-0 run in taking a 7-6 lead at the first media timeout.

After Brittany Carannante hit a trey to put the Hatters up 10-8, the Bears proceeded to go on an 8-2 run, but Stetson's Jessica Conner silenced the run with a bucket at the 11:55-mark.

TaShera Lewis continued to excel inside as she hit her fourth field in five tries with nine and a half minutes left in the opening stanza to put Mercer on top, 18-14. On its next possession, Ashli Jackson then converted a conventional three-point play to pull Stetson back within one.

"Their pressure forced us into 28 turnovers and you can't have that against this type of team," said head coach Janell Jones. "In the first half we missed too many easy shots. They came out strong in the second half and we didn't respond."

ETSU's full-court press gave Mercer (4-18, 1-8 A-Sun) problems early on as three turnovers allowed the hosts to jump out to an early 5-2 lead. Sophomore LaToya Jackson responded for the Bears draining a three-pointer to knot the game at five just over two minutes into the contest, but the Lady Bucs took the lead from that point on.

Over the next five minutes, the Lady Buccaneers (12-10, 8-1 A-Sun) reeled off a 17-0 run taking a commanding 22-5 advantage. Preseason all-conference selections Sierre Evans and Michele DeVault keyed the spurt as Evans notched a trey and DeVault hit a pair of her own.

Both squads traded baskets over the next four and a half minutes until Mercer junior Cristin Seymour drained a triple to cut the deficit to 26-12 with 8:18 to play in the opening half. Seymour's basket sparked a 10-3 run that featured a pair of buckets from junior TaShera Lewis and a three-pointer from freshman Shakeda Richie.

Evans ended the Lady Bucs' drought with a triple and the hosts out-scored the Bears by four over the remainder of the half to take a 40-27 lead into the locker room. Jackson and Seymour each contributed seven first-half points for Mercer while DeVault and Evans led the way for ETSU. DeVault garnered 10 points and Evans netted eight while pulling down seven boards.

The second half was more of the same as ETSU put its foot on the pedal scoring the first six points of the stanza to take a 46-27 lead with 15 and a half minutes remaining.

The Lady Bucs out-scored the Bears 48-30 in the final 20 minutes to secure the win.

ETSU drained 51 percent of its shots in the game while Mercer countered with 40-percent shooting. The Lady Bucs controlled the boards to the tune of 40-27, and converted 28 Mercer turnovers into 31 points. The Bears received solid production from their bench for the second straight game with 26 points.

The Bears were paced by Jackson's 15 points. The Oklahoma City native netted three long-range bombs and dished out a game-high five assists. Seymour pitched in with 10 points and five rebounds, and TaShera Lewis contributed an eight-point, five-rebound effort.

DeVault led five Lady Buccaneers to finish in double-figures with 15 points. Evans produced 11 points and a game-best eight boards, Brittany Daniels tallied 11 points, and Kelly Turman and Latisha Belcher each garnered 10.

MACON, Ga. - The Mercer women's basketball squad took a four-point lead into the half, but were unable to hold on dropping a 53-49 decision against Campbell on Saturday evening at the University Center.

Senior Sarah Russell calmly sank a pair from the free-throw line with 51 seconds left in regulation to pull the Bears within two and they had a chance to tie the game on their next possession, but missed a couple of last ditch attempts and Campbell's Maggie Rich hit a pair from the charity stripe with five seconds remaining to ice the win.

The Lady Camels scored the game's first four points, but the Bears (4-19, 1-9 A-Sun) responded with a 10 unanswered points to take a 10-4 lead at the 14:36 mark. Russell netted four points during the early spurt.

Campbell (10-13, 5-5 A-Sun) ended a four-minute scoring drought with a trey from Rich, but Mercer sophomore LaToya Jackson came right back to nail a three-pointer of her own to extend her string of games with a triple to 16.

The Bears went 7-for-9 to open the game and a Russell mid-range jumper gave the hosts a 15-7 midway through the half forcing Campbell head coach Wanda Watkins to call a timeout.

Another Jackson three-pointer with four and a half minutes until halftime gave the Bears their largest lead of the game at 22-11.

Mercer exhibited excellent defense in the opening half forcing 10 turnovers and holding Campbell to 32-percent (8-for-25) shooting. The Lady Camels ended the opening 20 minutes on a 5-0 run, but balanced scoring led the Bears to a 26-22 lead at the intermission.

The teams traded baskets to open the second stanza and with 13:40 left Rich drained another trey to give Campbell a 33-31 advantage, its first lead since the 16:50 mark of the first half.

Russell hit a jumper to tie the game, but Campbell's Kelly Hufstetler answered right back with a three to give the Lady Camels the lead for good. The trey sparked a 9-2 run as Campbell opened up a 42-35 lead with nine minutes remaining in regulation.

With four minutes left, the Bears were able to close the gap to four on a Russell triple, but the Lady Camels hit their shots when they needed to in securing the conference road win.

Campbell heated up in the second half to shoot 36 percent for the game while Mercer cooled down shooting 35 percent. The Lady Camels out-rebounded their opponents, 42-31. Both teams scored 20 points in the paint and Mercer was able to convert 27 points off of 19 Campbell turnovers while CU only netted 10 tallies off 15 MU give-aways.

The Bears were led by Jackson's 15 points. The Oklahoma City native drained four from behind the arc and Russell chipped in with 13 points. Russell is only 12 points shy of the career 1,000-point plateau. Freshman Kourtney Carter grabbed a game-high seven boards.

Campbell's leading-scoring and top rebounder, Marlena Murphy, led the Camels attack with 12 points and six rebounds. Rich also notched double-figures with 10 and pulled down six boards.

BOILING SPRINGS, N.C. - The Mercer women's basketball squad was downed at Gardner-Webb, 76-65, on Monday evening at Paul Porter Arena.

"We gave up too many transition points early in the game and that proved to be the difference," said head coach Janell Jones. "It was the first time since Stetson that we fought on the road like this and I was proud of our effort."

The final Atlantic Sun battle between the teams started off back-and-forth as the teams traded baskets and leads over the first 13 minutes of the contest. During that stretch neither team took a lead of more than three points as there were eight lead changes and five ties.

Sophomore LaToya Jackson led the charge early on for Mercer extending her streak with at least one trey to 17 games while notching 10 first-half points. With the Bears (4-20, 1-10 A-Sun) clinging to a 22-19 lead, the Bulldogs (10-14, 5-5 A-Sun) reeled off 11 unanswered points to grab an eight-point advantage with 5:25 remaining until intermission.

Aided by 16 points off turnovers and nine second-chance points, GWU took a 37-30 lead into the locker room. Laura Povilonyte garnered 13 points and six rebounds including four on the offensive glass to help the hosts take the halftime advantage.

The Bears closed to within six early in the second half, but the Bulldogs steadily opened up their lead and with 13:39 left in regulation, Gardner-Webb took its largest lead of the game at 57-43.

Mercer began to show some fight, especially after senior leader Sarah Russell went down with an injury, cutting the deficit back to seven on a jumper from freshman Kourtney Carter midway through the half.

Two minutes later, freshman Shakeda Richie drained a three-ball to make the score 63-57 and with 6:56 remaining junior Megan Lewis hit a transition jumper narrowing Gardner-Webb's lead to four.

The game shifted momentum when the shot clock malfunctioned with five minutes left, a problem that was consistent throughout the game, and forced Mercer to waste a big possession. GWU was able to stretch its lead back out to double-digits and held off a late Mercer push.

The Bears shot at a 47 percent clip for the game including 50 percent in the second half while the Bulldogs countered with 42 percent shooting. GWU edged Mercer on the boards, 37-35. The Bears entered the game second in the conference in free-throw shooting, but shot themselves in the foot tonight going 5-for-13 from the charity stripe.

Mercer was paced by Megan Lewis who went 8-for-9 from the field and registered a career-high 20 points. Lewis also dished out a career-best six assists to go along with six boards and three steals. Jackson finished with 11 points, seven rebounds and six assists while Carter and Russell each pitched in with 10 points. Russell concluded the game two points shy of 1,000 career tallies.

MACON, Ga. - Playing without senior Sarah Russell the Mercer women's basketball squad put forth a quality effort, but it was not enough as Stetson grabbed a 77-65 win at the University Center on Saturday.

Mercer coughed up the ball 17 times to only six giveaways for Stetson. The Hatters enjoyed a 21-0 advantage on points off turnovers and knocked down big shots all game.

The opening 20 minutes featured 10 ties and six lead changes while both teams were scorching from the field. The Bears (4-21, 1-11 A-Sun) connected on 12-of-29 (41.4%) including 4-for-8 from behind the arc and 6-of-8 from the charity stripe while the Hatters (6-19, 4-8 A-Sun) went 18-for-34 (52.9%) from the floor in the first half.

After the Bears knotted the score at 33 on a trey from sophomore LaToya Jackson, the Hatters reeled off an 11-1 run to close out the half and take a 44-34 advantage into the intermission. Stetson's leading scorer, Sharnesha Smith, led the way with 14 points on 6-for-9 shooting while teammate Tierra Brown chipped in with 13 including a trio of three-pointers.

Jackson paced Mercer in the opening half with 12 points and extended her streak to 18 consecutive games with at least one three-ball.

Stetson was able to convert eight points off of nine Mercer turnovers, but the Bears made up for those mistakes with a 9-0 advantage in second-chance points courtesy of six offensive rebounds.

LaToya Jackson nailed her third trey to open the second stanza, but Stetson's Ashli Jackson, who scored a career-high 22 points in the first meeting between the teams, answered right back with a triple of her own to stretch the lead back out to 10.

Following Ashli Jackson's bucket, the Bears produced six unanswered points to pull within 47-43 at the 16:41 mark, but that was as close as Mercer would get. MU continued to go at the visitors, but Stetson answered every Mercer run with hot shooting from the outside. The Hatters held a 66-53 with just over eight minutes to go, but LaToya Jackson helped gain some momentum back with a conventional three-point play on the Bears next possession.

Stetson continued to shoot the rock well and led by as many as 15 in the second half. Mercer was not able to get any closer than 10 after that point as the Hatters finished the game shooting 44.3 percent from the field including 10-for-24 from behind the arc.

For the game, Mercer knocked down 42.9 percent of its shots. The Bears won the battle on the boards, 42-29, including 14 on the offensive glass but the difference in turnovers was the Bears' Achilles heel.

Jackson led all scorers and matched a career-best with 25 points and dished out a team-high six assists. The sophomore point guard went 7-for-9 from the floor, 4-of-5 from three-point land and drained all seven of her attempts from the free-throw line. Junior TaShera Lewis had a solid game with 12 points while grabbing a game-high eight boards.

The Hatters' balanced attack was led by Brown's 18-point effort and career-high seven assists. Smith pitched in with 16 points, Carannante added 12 and Ayesha Barkley contributed 10 points.

The Bears (4-22, 1-12 A-Sun) out-scored the Eagles (15-8, 10-3 A-Sun) by 10 over the final five minutes of regulation after FGCU held a 17-point advantage, its largest lead of the second half. Mercer narrowed the deficit to as little as five with four seconds showing on the score-board and could not complete the comeback.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. - The Mercer women's basketball squad was downed at UNF, 63-55, on Saturday afternoon at the UNF Arena. The Lady Ospreys out-scored the Bears by nine over the final six minutes to grab the conference win.

"We are still a young team that is learning how to finish," said head coach Janell Jones. "We need to gain more mental toughness."

Following the earlier overtime meeting this season between the teams, one could assume this contest would be a slugfest. It certainly was as each team had to work extremely hard for every basket and the game took on a physical nature.

The squads traded buckets in the early going before the Bears (4-23, 1-13 A-Sun) took a 16-10 following back-to-back three-pointers from sophomore LaToya Jackson midway through the first half. Jackson drained three treys in the opening half and extended her streak with at least one three-ball to 20 straight games.

Each time UNF (12-14, 7-6 A-Sun) would attempt to chip away Mercer would answer right back and when Jackson drained another triple with just over five minutes remaining she gave her squad a 23-14 advantage.

A pair of Megan Lewis free throws extended the Bears lead to 27-16, its largest of the game, but a 10-0 run to close out the stanza helped the hosts cut the deficit to 27-26 heading into the break.

Mercer did a solid job of moving the ball in the opening half recording eight assists on its nine field goals. Aided by Jackson's sweet stroke, the Bears went 4-for-8 from behind the arc, but were out-rebounded by seven including giving up eight offensive boards to the Lady Ospreys.

Shennette Sheffield's put back two minutes into the second stanza gave UNF a 30-29 lead, its first advantage since the 18:18 mark of the first half and prompted an 8-2 run to open up a five-point lead for the Lady Ospreys.

With 12 minutes and 15 seconds left, senior Sarah Russell dropped in a lay up to score her 1,000th career point and pull the Bears within 38-35.

Both teams traded baskets over the next few minutes until freshman Kourtney Carter put the Bears ahead, 43-42, with a tough bucket in the lane with six minutes left in regulation. The lead changed three times over the next minute until the Lady Ospreys went back up by three when Sheffield hit a pair from the charity stripe.

With 3:35 left, Shandrea Moore drained a trey to give UNF a 51-45 lead and the clutch basket propelled the Lady Ospreys to a homecoming victory. The Bears never got closer than four the rest of the way.

UNF finished the game 21-for-49 (42.9%) from the field and Mercer went 21-for-51 (41.2%). After shooting well from long distance in the first half, the Bears lone three-pointer of the second stanza came with 11 seconds remaining.

In a physical contest, the Lady Ospreys won the battle on the boards, 36-27, and scored 20 points in the paints to 12 for the Bears.

Jackson paced the Bears and lead all scorers with 22 points while junior Megan Lewis added 10.

Jacksonville 84, Mercer 66

(Feb. 25, Swisher Gymnasium)

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. - The Mercer women's basketball squad played a solid first half and entered halftime tied at 36, but Jacksonville showed why they are one of the elite team's in the conference downing the Bears, 84-66, on Monday evening at the Swisher Gymnasium.

"I was pleased with the way we played in the first half," said head coach Janell Jones. "I thought Cris (Seymour) was real aggressive."

The Dolphins (21-6, 11-3 A-Sun) quickness gave the Bears (4-24, 1-14 A-Sun) fits early on as they hustled their way to seven offensive rebounds in the first five minutes. Mercer was able to take a 12-9 lead at the 15-minute mark courtesy of some efficient shooting as they hit six of their first eight shots.

Mercer continued to shoot the rock well stretching its lead to 16-10 on a jumper from junior Cristin Seymour, but JU proceeded to go on a 9-2 run over the next three minutes capped by a three-pointer from Virginia Gregoire.

The spurt gave the Dolphins a one-point advantage until the Bears came right back with some clutch baskets off of good ball movement to go back up by six. Mercer reeled off seven unanswered points on a bucket from junior TaShera Lewis, a trey from sophomore LaToya Jackson and runner in the lane by junior Megan Lewis. Jackson's triple extended her streak to 21 straight games with at least one three-pointer.

The Bears trend this year has been to fall flat for spurts especially towards the end of a half and even though the Dolphins made a push heading into intermission, Mercer was able to sustain the run going into halftime.

The Bears played fairly consistent basketball during the opening 20 minutes using balanced scoring and 51.6 percent shooting to let one of the top teams in the league know they were ready to play. TaShera Lewis poured in 10 and Seymour chipped in with eight first-half points hitting 4-of-5 from the field.

JU came out of the gates strong to open the second half notching 10 points in the first four minutes to grab a 46-40 lead. Gregoire and DaVina Hamilton each netted four during the run.

The Dolphins turned up the heat with their pressure defense leading to a 10-0 spurt giving the hosts a comfortable 56-41 lead with 14 minutes remaining. The Bears made a couple of runs and cut the lead to single-digits on two occasions, but the nine-point deficit is as close as they would get. JU was strong down the stretch and moved its record to 11-2 at home this season.

"We tried to take away their inside and they beat us from outside," added Jones. "They are just a really talented team."

Jacksonville finished the game 30-for-63 (47.6%) from the field while Mercer shot the ball well for the third consecutive outing connecting on 27-of-57 (47.4%). The Bears won the battle on the boards, 35-33, but the Dolphins converted 31 points off of 22 Mercer turnovers.

Freshman Kourtney Carter led the Bears with 15 points while Seymour notched 12 points and five assists. TaShera Lewis finished with 12 points. Megan Lewis contributed eight points, a game-best eight rebounds and a team-high six assists.

MACON, Ga. - The Mercer women's basketball squad honored its three seniors on Saturday afternoon at the University Center but a late surge aided visiting Kennesaw State to a 77-70 win.

The Bears (4-25, 1-15 A-Sun) came out of the gates shooting the ball well jumping out to a 15-9 lead seven minutes into the contest while hitting six of their first 12 attempts from the field. The Lady Owls (16-12, 11-5 A-Sun) responded right back and began taking it to the rim reeling off a 6-0 run to knot things up at 15.

Junior Megan Lewis paced the Bears early on netting seven first-half points on 3-for-4 shooting including a nifty reverse lay up to put the hosts up 19-15 midway through the opening half. Mercer stayed on the attack as senior Sarah Russell, who played her final home game in a Mercer uniform, drained a trey and junior Karen Dorris followed that up with a basket to push Mercer out to an nine-point advantage, its largest of the game.

KSU entered the contest as one of the top four teams in the conference even though they are not eligible for postseason play due to reclassification rules and turned up the heat during the final eight minutes of the first half. The Lady Owls out-scored the Bears 16-7 during that span to take a 34-33 lead into the locker room.

The teams traded baskets over the first five minutes of the second stanza as neither team took a lead of more than three points until the Lady Owls' leading scorer and rebounder, Brittney Henderson, garnered a put back to put KSU up 45-41.

The Bears fought back to tie the score at 46 courtesy of a lay up from freshman Kourtney Carter and on their next possession, a Megan Lewis jumper gave Mercer a 48-46 advantage at the 12-minute mark. After taking a 51-45 lead on a three-pointer from sophomore LaToya Jackson, Kennesaw State scored five unanswered points to cut the deficit back to one with nine minutes left.

The contest remained tight throughout the final eight minutes of the game as the lead changed hands five times, but an 8-0 run sparked KSU down the stretch securing its 11th conference win, its best mark since joining the A-Sun in 2005-06.

Mercer shot the ball well to the tune of 43.8 percent, but were plagued by turnovers once again allowing KSU to convert 31 points off of 26 giveaways. The Lady Owls shot 40.6 percent from the field and won the battle on the boards, 40-35.

Carter led four Bears in double-figures with 15 points. Megan Lewis contributed 12 points and a team-best nine boards. Russell chipped in with 11 points and four rebounds in her final game at the UC. Jackson nailed four triples to extend her streak with at least one three-pointer to 22 games while netting 14 points and dishing out four assists.

Henderson was a beast inside and netted game-highs with 21 points and 12 boards for her 12th double-double this season. Greteya Kelley added 19 points and added three steals to her conference-leading total while DeAndrea Bullock came off the bench to score 10.

ETSU 77, Mercer 70

(Mar. 5, A-Sun Quarterfinal)

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - The Mercer women's basketball squad's season ended with an 83-62 loss to ETSU in quarterfinal action at the Atlantic Sun Tournament on Wednesday evening at Allen Arena.

The top-seeded Lady Bucs (19-11) came out of the gates strong opening up a 9-0 lead one and a half minutes into the contest using its full-court pressure defense.

After falling behind early, the Bears (4-26) hung tough cutting the deficit to 14-10 at the 14:27 mark on a lay up from junior Cristin Seymour prompting ETSU head coach Karen Kemp, the A-Sun Coach of the Year, to call a timeout.

Kemp's squad answered out of the timeout reeling off eight unanswered points until sophomore LaToya Jackson stopped the bleeding for Mercer with a three-pointer. Jackson concluded the 2007-08 campaign by draining at least one trey in 23 straight games.

After falling behind by 18, the Bears out-scored the Lady Bucs 9-2 over the final four minutes cutting ETSU's lead at the half to 44-33.

First team all-conference selection Michele DeVault led the Lady Bucs in the first half by draining three treys to net 11 points to go along with five boards. Jackson led the Mercer attack as she hit 6-of-11 from the field scoring 15 in the opening 20 minutes.

The Lady Bucs aided their cause by shooting 45.2 percent in the first half while connecting on 4-of-9 from behind the arc and going 12-for-14 from the charity stripe as Mercer committed 10 fouls to only five for ETSU. The Bears shot only one free throw heading into intermission, but hit 42.9 percent of its shots including 3-of-6 from three-point range.

ETSU opened the second stanza with a 13-5 run over the first five minutes opening up a comfortable 57-38 advantage and from there were able to advance to Friday's semifinals. Mercer fought hard the entire second half and trimmed the gap to 69-57 at the 6:01-minute mark on a triple from Jackson, but that was as close as it would get.

For the game, Mercer connected on 24-of-60 (40%) from the floor while the Lady Bucs finished 23-for-62 (42.9%) including 26-for-28 at the free-throw line. ETSU out-rebounded the Bears, 42-32, and converted 35 points off of 23 Mercer turnovers. The Bears also forced 23 turnovers, but scored only 19 points off the giveaways.

Jackson led all scorers with 28 points notching her sixth 20-plus point game this season. It also marked a career-high for the Oklahoma City native. Freshman Kourtney Carter chipped in with 12 points. Junior TaShera Lewis grabbed a team-best six boards. Senior Sarah Russell contributed two points and three rebounds in her final game as a Bear.

First team All-Atlantic Sun member Sierre Evans paced five Lady Bucs in double-figures by pouring in 16 and registering a game-high 11 rebounds. Evans collected her seventh double-double this year. Latisha Belcher tallied 16 points, eight boards and eight steals while TaRonda Wiles added 13 points. The Bears held DeVault scoreless in the second half as the senior guard finished with 11. Devin Thompson came off the bench to score 10.

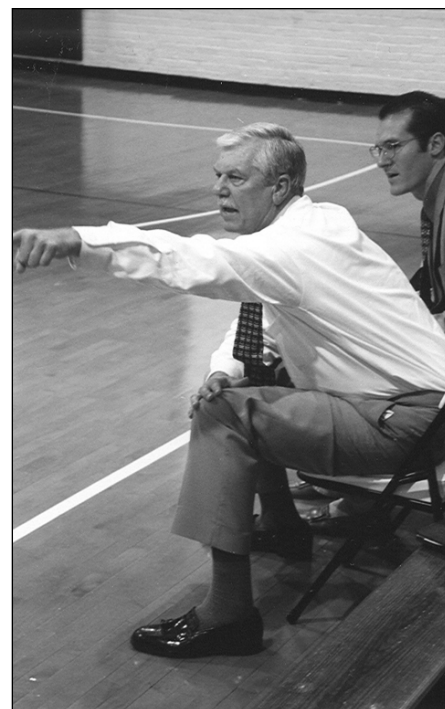

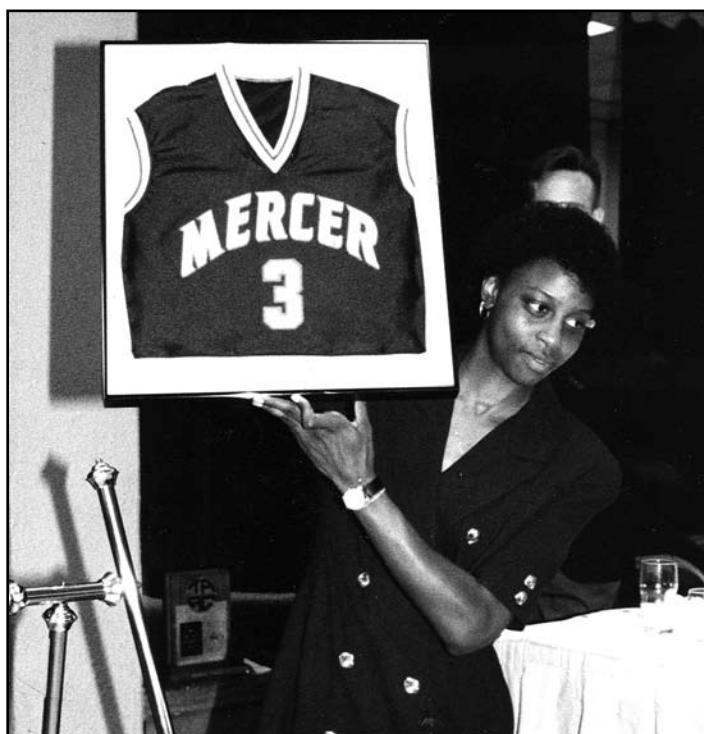


A list of legendary players at Mercer begins with Andrea Congreaves.

Congreaves re-wrote the Mercer record book during her dazzling four-year career. She was a three-time Conference Player of the Year, and a member of the 1993 Kodak All-America team. She is the all-time leader in points, field goals and field goal percentage. She is second in free throws made, blocked shots, three-pointers made and attempted, third in rebounds and rebounding average.

She led the Bears to back-to-back conference championships in 1990-1991 and 1991-1992. She led the nation in scoring in 1991-92 (33.0 ppg) and 1992-93 (31.0 ppg).

Congreaves' incredible season also included a field goal percentage of .633, 11.6 rebounds per game and 77 three-point field goals made on 185 attempts for a .416 percentage.



Andrea Congreaves is the only player to be named Atlantic Sun Player of the Year three times. She also earned a spot on the all-conference team each of her four years at Mercer.

Congreaves went on to play four seasons in the WNBA after her Mercer career, spending two seasons with the Charlotte Sting and two seasons with the Orlando Miracle. She is also the only Bear to have her jersey retired, as she was honored with a ceremony in 1993.

Vivian Humphrey is Mercer's second all-time leading scorer with 2,284 points during her career between 1977-81. She held the top spot on the scoring list until Congreaves claimed the throne.

Humphrey ranks second all-time in field goals made (925), and first in field goals attempted (2,125) as well as free throws made, edging out Congreaves with a career total of 434.

Humphrey led the Bears during one of the most successful periods in the program's history. During the 1978-79 season, the Bears won 22 games with just 10 losses under coach Jane Fontaine and went on to win the GAIW state championship.

After that season, the Bears came back strong to defend their title. The team posted a program-high 29 wins during the 1979-80 campaign. The Bears rolled through the GAIW Tournament, and into the Region III tournament. The Bears hosted Texas in the AIAW National

Tournament. The 81-80 loss ended Mercer's season, but not before adding another title, and a 12-game win streak before the loss to Texas.

That season also marked the beginning of another Mercer legend, Emma Mumphy. She finished her career as the third member of the 2,000-point club with 2,098. Mumphy is second in field goal percentage, finishing her career with 859 made on 1,524 attempts, a .564 shooting percentage, a mark that stood until the 1992-93 season.

Vivian Humphrey and Emma Mumphy made a powerful combination, but they were not the first "Dynamic Duo" to wear the Orange and Black.

From 1971-75, Myrel Huskey and Sybil Blalock formed a scoring force that helped Mercer to the most dominant four-year run in the program's history.

Huskey (1,867) and Blalock (1,856) rank fourth and fifth respectively on the scoring list, and were the first players to record 1,000 points in their career. Under head coach Peggy Collins, the Bears went 87-13, a .870 winning percentage.

Myrel Huskey held the top spot on Mercer's all-time scoring list for less than a decade, when Vivian Humphrey surpassed her career total, but her name still remains near the top in every major offensive category.

Sybil Blalock, former Mercer head coach and current SWA, has

achieved many accolades that are still remembered throughout the Mercer record books. She was honored as a member of the WNIT All-America Team in 1975.

Cindy Brogdon played only two seasons for Mercer, but she made an impact in her time here. She averaged 30.1 points per game for each season, the third highest total in school history.

Brogdon finished with 1,746 points, placing her sixth on the scoring list. But her two individual seasons of 902 points in 1975-76 and 844 points in 1976-77 stood as the best single seasons until Congreaves' remarkable 1991-92 season.

After her Mercer career she played for the 1976 U.S. Olympic women's basketball team in Montreal. Brogdon averaged 5.8 points and 2.0 rebounds, helping the American squad bring home a silver medal.



Mercer women's basketball began play in 1970 and it didn't take long for the program to find success. In just its second year of existence, the Bears finished with a 21-1 record in 1971-72 and claimed the regular-season and tournament titles in the Southern Women's Athletic Conference.

The Bears went on a run of six-straight winning seasons under their first head coach, Peggy Collins, who is Mercer's all-time winningest coach with 133 wins and has an .801 winning percentage. After a one season stumble in 1977-78 under new coach Jane Fontaine, the Bears rebounded quickly winning 51 games in the next two seasons under Fontaine.

In 1978-79, under the direction of Fontaine, the Bears won the GAIWA state championship. That team was led by one of the legends of Mercer women's basketball, Vivian Humphrey. Humphrey is the second leading scorer in Mercer history, and is one of three members of the exclusive 2,000-point club. Charlotte Nicholson was finishing up her brilliant career with 1,256 points, 11th in the Mercer record books. Kathy Singletary, eighth on Mercer's all-time scoring list, was in her first year with the Bears.

Mercer went 22-10 that season, notching victories over Georgia, Georgia Southern, Florida State, Florida, Ole Miss and Auburn. The Bears defeated Valdosta State for the GAIWA state title, but would lose to them in the third round of the Region III Tournament.

The Bears kept right on rolling during the 1979-80 season, setting a school record with 29 wins. Humphrey returned to lead the Bears along with Singleton. That season saw the emergence of another future legend of Mercer, Emma Mumphrey. Mumphrey would finish her career with 2,098 points, third on Mercer's all-time list.

That Mercer team came out of the blocks on fire, ripping off seven wins in a row. The Bears had a one game stumble at Mississippi College, then notched three more wins over Auburn, Stetson and Pittsburgh.

The Bears suffered back-to-back losses only once the entire season, against Clemson and Ole Miss. They went on a tear to end the season and went into the GAIWA Tournament having won 12 in a row, the third-longest win streak in the program's history. Mercer's tournament run consisted of wins over Valdosta State and Georgia Southern to win the GAIWA State Title, before moving on to the Region III tournament in Cleveland, Miss.

Mercer swept the Region III tournament with wins over South Alabama, Florida State and Georgia Southern. This put the Bears at home hosting Texas in the AIAW National Tournament, after a tight game, the Longhorns prevailed 81-80 ending Mercer's season, but the success of the 1979-1980 season still remains.

Mercer went through some rebuilding after that magical season, but the success returned to Porter Gym for the 1984-85 season. The Bears were led by the senior leadership of Anita Meadows. She finished her career with a total of 1,088 points, which is 15th all-time for the Bears. Throw on top of that the strong play of freshmen and eventual 1,000-point club member Dawn Jackson (1,120 points, 14th all-time). Their 24 wins equaled the second highest total in school history. They compiled a 14-game win streak, a mark only be topped by the remarkable 19-0 start for the 1971-72 squad.

This team found national success on a level the program had never seen before, reaching the NCAA Division II Tournament and

continuing their run of great play. A victory over North Alabama clinched the NCAA South Championship, followed by a victory over Quinnipiac in Hamden, Conn., in the NCAA Quarterfinals put the Bears into the Final Four in Springfield, Mass. Central Missouri squared off against the Bears and their 14-consecutive wins, but Central Missouri prevailed 82-79.



The 1985 team that reached the Division II Final Four gave Mercer its first appearance in a national tournament since the 1980 squad played in the AIAW National Tournament.

Mercer's most decorated player brought home the next two championship banners. Andrea Congreaves patrolled the hardwood of Porter Gym from 1989-1993, and filled up the stat sheets with 2,796 points, 1,107 field goals made including 153 3-pointers, 429 free throws made and 1,141 rebounds.

She was supported by Stephany Raines during the two championship seasons; Raines is by no surprise, the all-time leader in assists with 851.

Mercer opened its 1990-91 season against perennial powerhouse Old Dominion, on the road, under the guidance of first-year head coach Lea Henry. The Bears went into ODU and walked out victorious and carried that momentum to a 4-0 start.

After the fast start, the Bears lost two in a row for the only time during their title run. The Bears finished 1990-91 with an 18-9 overall record, and a 10-2 conference record. Congreaves led the nation in scoring average that season, with 33 points per contest. The Bears lost to Florida A&M in the conference tournament, ending their season, but not before the first New South Women's Athletic Conference banner in program history adorned the rafters of Porter Gym.

The 1991-92 Bears started slowly by dropping the first two games to Tennessee State and South Florida. After drawing back to .500 with consecutive wins over Marist and UCF, the Bears fell to 2-4 after two straight losses to Georgia and College of Charleston.

Then things started clicking. The Bears ran off nine straight victories, a loss to Southeastern Louisiana slowed the roll, but it did not stop it. Mercer reeled off eight more wins, then traded consecutive losses to Florida International and Florida Atlantic with consecutive wins over Georgia State and Florida A&M.

Mercer clinched a share of the regular season title yet again, this time sharing with Florida International as both finished 10-2. The Bears finished 20-8 that season, Andrea Congreaves led the NCAA in scoring once again, averaging 31.0 points. She won her second Conference Player of the Year award, and set the stage for her selection to the Kodak All-America team in 1993.

THE UNIVERSITY





What distinguishes a good university from a great university extends far beyond the boundaries of its curriculum and its campus.

The competence and character of an institution's graduates are, more often than not, the hallmarks by which its reputation is both earned and measured.

As a private, co-educational institution, Mercer University has emerged as one of the premier universities in the Southeast and the nation.

Mercer is truly a dynamic and comprehensive center of undergraduate, graduate and professional education. Mercer's outstanding faculty take students beyond the rigors of academic programs to explore the challenges of reason, responsibility, compassion and character.

Through learning, living and leading, Mercer students are prepared not only to confront, but also to embrace the challenges of their future.

Under the leadership of prominent Georgia Baptist leader Jesse Mercer, Mercer University was founded in Penfield, Ga., in 1833 and later moved to Macon in 1871. From its humble beginnings as a small liberal arts college, Mercer now offers programs in 11 schools and colleges.

Conveniently located in the middle of the state, Macon serves as the educational, medical, cultural and commercial hub of central Georgia. Located just one hour from Atlanta - one of the nation's most popular international cities - and two hours from the Atlantic coast, Macon is easily accessible from two interstate highways - I-75 and I-16.

Consistently ranked by U.S. News & World Report and The Princeton Review among the nation's leading universities, Mercer University considers one of its greatest strengths to be its superior faculty, who "teach from the heart."



THIS IS MERCER

At Mercer, students benefit from learning experiences guided by caring faculty, not teaching assistants as is the case at many universities. The Higher Education Research Institute at UCLA named Mercer as a "highly selective" university, and The Princeton Review has placed Mercer among the Best 351 Colleges in North America.

The University is comprised of the College of Liberal Arts, Walter F. George School of Law, College of Pharmacy and Health Services, School of Medicine, Eugene W. Stetson School of Business and Economics, School of Engineering, James and Carolyn McAfee School of Theology, Tift College of Education, Georgia Baptist College of Nursing, College of Continuing and Professional Studies and the Townsend School of Music. The University also operates the Mercer University Press in Macon and the Mercer Engineering Research Center in Warner Robins.

Mercer's enrollment is nearly 7,500 students. While many students come from the Southeast, more than 38 states and 30 countries are represented among the student body. The average class size at Mercer is 21, with a student/faculty ratio of 13:1 -





unusually low for a major university.

CAMPUS LIFE

Even with its picturesque setting, the spirit of Mercer is not in the grandeur of its buildings, but in the graciousness of its people - a friendly, family-like community of faculty, staff and students who strive for excellence in all that they do.

The University offers a wealth of fascinating experiences and activities both in and outside the classroom. From academic clubs and honor societies, to performing arts and special interest groups, to 16 national fraternities and sororities on campus, students can choose from more than 80 on-campus organizations to discover new talents and interests and to gain important leadership skills they will need for life after college.

RESIDENCE LIFE

The benefits of campus living are numerous - the development of life-long friendships, a sense of community, enhancing campus involvement and higher academic performance.

For many new students, this is the first time they have lived away from home, and the community that develops on campus and in residence halls becomes a second family.

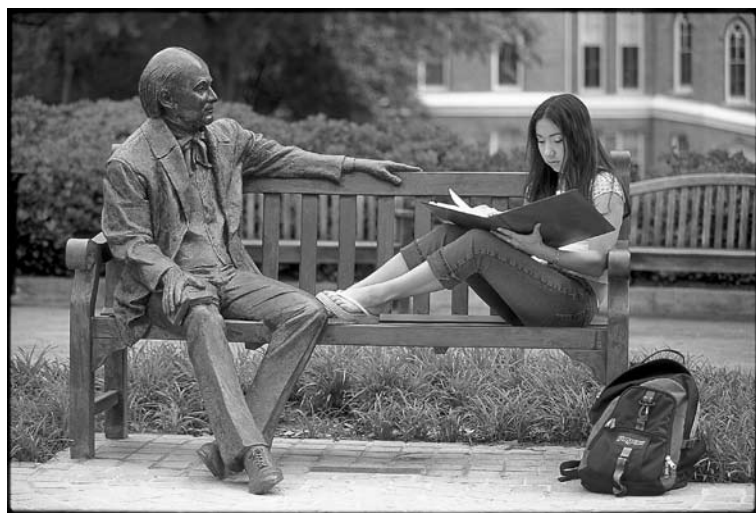

age of 21, students with children and/or students who live at home with a parent or guardian within reasonable commuting distance.

In each of Mercer's residence halls, safety comes first and foremost. The exterior doors are locked at all times, and students use their identification cards to gain access into their residence hall.





THIS IS MERCER

Mercer broke ground on the centerpiece of the Macon campus in the fall of 2001. The University Center has become one of the premier venues in the nation for college basketball and volleyball. The \$40 million facility has become the focal point for almost all campus activities, providing students with an area for study, a food court, and a coffee shop.

The "Street" is a tree-lined, sunlit indoor patio, providing students with an area to study, socialize, and dine on cuisine from the food court, including Chic Fil-A, Subway, Grille Works, and Sushi Hot Bowls. Java City is a coffee shop and internet café for students to use either with high-speed connections throughout the floor area with the wireless internet connections, or with Java City's computers. Students can also relax and watch either of two flat screen televisions, or relax outside on the Patio overlooking the Greek Village and campus.

Both students and athletes have state of the art fitness facilities, with weight training equipment and cardiovascular theater, as well as a 1/8 mile indoor track. The track overlooks the lower level, which has three full-size basketball and volleyball courts for intramural and recreation use.

Another distinguishing feature of the University Center is the 25-meter indoor swimming pool for use by both students and teams for lap swim and water strength and speed drills. Athletes have a separate weight room for use during team workouts with all the latest free weight and weight machine technology. Athletes and trainers also have the use of a complete athletic training room, with the latest in injury treatment and prevention equipment.

The University Center is also home for Mercer

University Athletics, with offices for all the athletic administration and coaching offices. These offices give coaches at Mercer an incredible advantage in recruiting, allowing potential student-athletes to see first hand the facility that will be their home base for their career at Mercer.

The University Center, on top of all the other amenities, is the home for Mercer basketball and volleyball. There are two full courts, one designated as the practice court, and the main floor in the center of the arena in the University Center. The main court is surrounded by 3,200 seats for basketball and volleyball, but can be expanded for up to 4,080 with floor seating for concerts. Three skyboxes at mid-court provide a birds-eye view of the action on the floor. Full access to both phone and high-speed internet is available courtside for media members and visiting sports information directors. The media room in the athletic offices below court level is capable of handling up to 10 separate phone lines and 20 internet connections.

The main entrance into the Arena at the University Center is Mercer's Heritage Hall. This is a collection recognizing some of Mercer's most important alumni, faculty and staff. There are many different displays, including the Mercer Hall of Fame which honors the accomplishments of Mercerians through the years. Displays also include the history of Mercer Athletics and a History of Mercer itself.

The University Center has provided Mercer University students, athletes, faculty, and staff with a state of the art facility for study, recreation, and community. Potential students and potential student-athletes view the facility as something they can use to improve their college experience.



Locker Rooms

Each of Mercer's team sports has a state-of-the-art locker room in the University Center. Attached to each locker room is a player lounge, complete with a big-screen TV, sound system and comfortable seating.



Weight Room

Another state-of-the-art addition to Mercer, the weight room is home to power-lifting stations, abundant free weights and state-of-the-art cardio equipment.



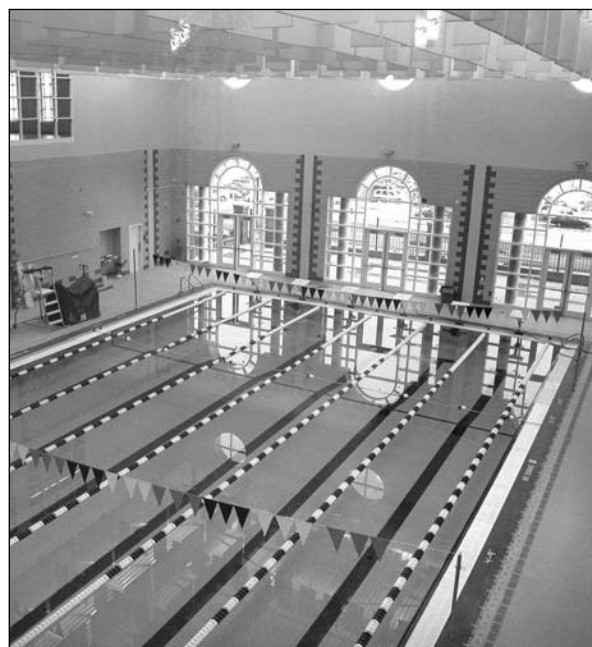
Sports Medicine

William D. Underwood was selected to serve as the 18th president of Mercer University beginning July 1, 2006. Prior to joining Mercer, Underwood served at Baylor University as Interim President and held the prestigious Leon Jaworski Chair at the Baylor School of Law, having joined the law faculty in 1990 after practicing law with a large firm in Dallas. He also took a leave of absence from the Law School from 1997-98 to serve as Baylor's general counsel.

Underwood is an accomplished educator and scholar. He was designated a Master Teacher at Baylor in recognition of extraordinary classroom teaching and was named an Outstanding University Professor in 2005. He is an elected member of the American Law Institute and the American Bar Foundation.

He has published extensively on a range of topics and has presented a number of papers on how faith relates to higher education, especially at universities that share the historical and theological commitment of Baptists to intellectual and religious freedom and respect for religious diversity.

Underwood is a summa cum laude graduate of the University of Illinois College of Law, which awarded him the juris doctor degree. He graduated as class salutatorian and was an editor of the University of Illinois Law Review. Following graduation, he clerked for the Honorable Sam D. Johnson of the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

He also holds a bachelor's degree from Oklahoma Baptist University, where he met his wife Lesli.

They have two teenage children, Jessica and William.

Athletics Director Bobby Pope



The dean of Atlantic Sun Conference athletics directors, Bobby Pope is in his 19th year at the helm of Mercer athletics.

During his tenure, he has seen the growth of the program to 14 sports, as well as the addition of the first full-time coaches for men's and women's golf, men's and women's tennis and cross country.

Facility upgrades have been a priority since he became athletics director, as evidenced by the state-of-the-art University Center, home to the men's and women's basketball teams as well as volleyball. The \$40-million facility opened in January 2004. The building houses offices for all coaches as well as locker rooms for all teams.

Claude Smith Field, the home field for baseball, received a facelift in the fall of 2003. A new softball facility has been recently completed, and the Bears are set to open play at the new Sikes Field this February. A practice facility for the golf teams is also on the drawing board.

Pope is also very active in the Atlantic Sun, having served two years as president in the late 1990s. He has served on virtually every committee and currently is a member of the tournament committee.

He is also very active in the community, serving as treasurer of the Macon Touchdown Club as well as serving on the Mayor's Recreation Master Plan Committee and serving as chairman of the

Georgia Sports Hall of Fame Authority. He also serves in the Honorary Commander's Program at the Robins AFB Air Logistics Center.

Pope's involvement with Mercer athletics began in 1970 when he was the "Voice of the Bears." In recognition of his contributions to sports in Middle Georgia, Pope was inducted into the Macon Sports Hall of Fame on April 18, 2006.

A native of Thomaston, Ga., he graduated from Georgia College in 1970. He and his wife Carol have two children, Andy, who works with the Georgia Soil and Conservation Commission, and Kristen, a children's minister at the First United Methodist Church in Perry, Ga.
