Television Coverage

ESPN2 will broadcast the game to a national audience. Adam Amin (play-by-play), Dusty Dvoracek (color analyst) and Molly McGrath (sideline) will call the game.

Outback Bowl Bound

The Wolverines will participate in their Big Ten-leading sixth Outback Bowl/Hall of Fame Bowl. U-M has compiled a 3-2 record in the Outback/Hall of Fame Bowl, with appearances in the 1988, 1994, 1997, 2003 and 2013 games. The Wolverines defeated Alabama (1988), North Carolina State (1994) and Florida (2003) and suffered setbacks to Alabama (1997) and South Carolina (2013).

Wolverines and Gamecocks

This will be the fourth meeting between Michigan and South Carolina. The Gamecocks hold a 2-1 edge in the all-time series and won the only bowl game match-up, a 33-28 affair in the 2013 Outback Bowl. Michigan has compiled an 8-5 record against the Southeastern Conference in bowl games and is 24-8-1 against schools from the SEC.

Bowl-ing for the 46th Time

The Wolverines will participate in a bowl game for the 46th time in school history. U-M has compiled a 21-24 record in bowl games, listing 11th in the NCAA in appearances and 17th in victories. Michigan will be making its 38th January bowl appearance and will play in a January bowl game for the 16th time in the past 19 bowl trips.

- It will be a re-match of the 2013 Outback Bowl won by South Carolina, 33-28, in the waning seconds
- The Gamecocks hold a 2-1 advantage in the all-time series between the two schools
- The program's split regular season games, with South Carolina winning 17-14 at Michigan Stadium in 1980 and Michigan claiming a 34-3 win in Columbia during the 1985 season

Michigan vs. SEC

- This will be the 14th time that Michigan faces a Southeastern Conference school in a bowl game
- The Wolverines have a 8-5 mark against the SEC in bowl games
- Michigan is no stranger to the Southeastern Conference and will face an SEC school for the 35th time in school history
- The Wolverines have a 25-8-1 all-time record against schools from the SEC
- The most recent bowl match-up with the SEC came in the 2016 Citrus Bowl, a 41-7 victory over Florida on New Year's Day
- The Wolverines have yet to face Louisiana State in a cross-conference match-up; U-M has played both Missouri (2-2) and Texas A&M (2-1) in the past but those games were prior to their inclusion in the SEC

Outback Bowl Bound

- Michigan will be playing in the Outback Bowl, previously the Hall of Fame Bowl, for the sixth time in school history
- The Wolverines have compiled a 3-2 mark all-time in the Tampa area bowl, with appearances in the 1988, 1994, 1997, 2003 and 2013 games
- The six appearances are the most of any Big Ten school; Iowa and Wisconsin have played in the game five times and Ohio State and Penn State have appeared on four occasions

- U-M claimed victories against Alabama (1988), North Carolina State (1994) and Florida (2003) and suffered setbacks to Alabama (1997) and South Carolina (2013)

Florida Bowling

- This will be the 17th time that Michigan plays a bowl game in the state of Florida
- The Wolverines have won six of their last 10 bowl appearances in the state of Florida
- U-M has compiled a 9-7 bowl record in the Sunshine State and has won eight of its last 14 bowl games in Florida
- The Wolverines are 3-1 against schools from the state of Florida in bowl games played in the Sunshine state; defeated the Florida Gators in the 2003 Outback and the 2008 and 2016 Citrus bowls while losing to Florida State, 33-32, in last year's Orange Bowl

- U-M has 10 players on the roster from the Sunshine State this season, with each of these student-athletes starting or earning playing time during the year
- Senior center Mason Cole has started 50 consecutive games along the offensive line and earned All-Big Ten second team honors for the second straight season; he will tie the school record for career starts with a start in the Outback Bowl
- A Butkus Award finalist and second-team All-America, Devin Bush leads the Wolverines in tackles with 94 stops this season
- A third-team All-Big Ten performer, Karan Higdon needs 71 rushing yards to become the first back since Fitzgerald Toussaint in 2001 to reach 1,000 yards in the season
- John O'Korn has started five games at quarterback this season; leads U-M's signal callers having completed 83-of-156 passes for 956 yards and two touchdowns

January Bowling

- U-M will play in a January bowl game for the 16th time in the past 19 bowl trips
- The Wolverines will be looking for their ninth Jan. 1 bowl game victory in the last 15 tries
- Michigan had its streak of nine straight New Year's Day game appearances (1996 through 2004 seasons), the fifth longest stretch in NCAA history, end with a trip to the Alamo Bowl on Dec. 28, 2005

- This will be the 38th all-time January bowl game for the Wolverines in 45 bowl appearances
- U-M has a .514 record in January bowl appearances (19-18)

Harbaugh in Bowl Games

- This will be Jim Harbaugh's fifth bowl game as a collegiate head coach
- Harbaugh enters the Outback Bowl game with a 2-2 record in bowl games
- He will be making his first coaching appearance in the Outback Bowl as a head coach
- Last season, the Wolverines lost a last-second 33-32 game to Florida State in the Orange Bowl
- In his first season at Michigan, Harbaugh's squad posted a 41-7 victory over Florida in the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl
- He led Stanford to the Sun Bowl against Oklahoma (L, 31-27) and the Orange Bowl against Virginia Tech (W, 40-12) during his final two seasons with the Cardinal

Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- The Michigan football team drew 669,534 fans to its six-game home schedule in 2017
- The Wolverines averaged 111,589 fans over the six-game slate, which lists as the fifth highest season average in school history
- There were 111,000-plus fans at five of the six games played at the Big House, including a season-high 112,028 fans for the match-up with Ohio State
- The 883,741 fans are the second-highest total attendance in school history; trails the 897,431 fans that attended the eight-game home slate in 2011

Michigan Players Excelling in the Classroom

- Not only has the U-M program done well on the field, the players have achieved at a high level in the classroom under head coach Jim Harbaugh, posting a perfect APR score each of his three seasons leading the program
- The Wolverines had 48 players achieve Academic All-Big Ten honors this fall, including 15 players listed as the starter or backup at their respective position

2017 Michigan Wolverines

- The Wolverines returned the fewest starters of any FBS program in the country: six starters from 2016 (players who made six or more starts)
- U-M had one returning starter on defense: LB Mike McCray who started all 13 games in 2016
- Michigan returned four players on the offensive side of the ball, including both fullbacks that split starting duties: LG Ben Bredeson, C Mason Cole, FB Khalid Hill, FB Henry Poggi and QB Wilton Speight
- The Wolverines had one returning specialist from the 2016 season: holder Garrett Moores
- U-M has players from 28 different states and two different countries this season, including 46 players from the state of Michigan, 12 student-athletes from the neighboring state of Ohio, 12 from New Jersey and 10 from Florida
- Michigan welcomed 11 early enrollees to campus in January, the most for the program at the mid-point of the academic calendar
- A total of 21 Wolverines made their career debut this season: Tarik Black, Camaron Cheeseman, Nico Collins, Devin Gil, Will Hart, Brad Hawkins, Jaylen Kelly-Powell, Ben Mason, Quinn Nordin, Jameson Offerdahl, Kwity Paye, Donovan Peoples-Jones, Brad Robbins, Josh Ross, O’Maury Samuels, Aubrey Solomon, Stephen Spanellis, Benjamin St-Juste, Andrew Stueber, Ambry Thomas and J’Marick Woods
- With 21 players making their career debut this season, a total of 82 student-athletes have seen the field for the Wolverines
- 15 true freshmen have seen game action
- Heading into 2017, a total 19 players have started at least one game in their career
- Senior Mason Cole leads the team with 50 consecutive starts along the offensive line

Harbaugh in Elite Company

- Jim Harbaugh is one of four Big Ten coaches to win 10-plus games in each of his first two seasons directing a conference school
- Harbaugh joined Fielding Yost (1901-02) as the only head coaches to collected back-to-back 10-win seasons in their first two seasons at U-M
- In addition to Harbaugh and Yost, Ohio State’s Urban Meyer (2012-13) and Wisconsin’s Paul Chryst (2015-16) also accomplished the feat
- Harbaugh is the second fastest coach to 20 wins at Michigan, trailing only Yost; Harbaugh accomplished the feat in 24 games and Yost won the first 29 games of his U-M career before tying Minnesota (6-6) in 1903
- Harbaugh has compiled a 28-10 overall record in three seasons at Michigan
- He was a finalist for the Paul “Bear” Bryant Coach of the Year award in 2016, and was a semifinalist for the George Munger Collegiate Coach of the Year honor
- Harbaugh is one of 21 coaches who is currently the head coach at his alma mater; Harbaugh, Paul Chryst (Wisconsin) and Pat Fitzgerald (Northwestern) are the only Big Ten coaches to be coaching at their alma mater

NFL Coaching Pedigree

- The Wolverines’ football staff boasts an impressive 158 years of playing, coaching and adminis-

trative experience at the NFL level

- Michigan has 65 years of NFL experience among the 10 coaches on staff
- The staff has logged 38 years of NFL coaching experience and 27 years of playing experience
- Seven of Michigan’s 10 assistants have coached in the NFL: Jim Harbaugh, Tim Drevno, Pep Hamilton, Jay Harbaugh, Greg Mattison, Brian Smith and Mike Zordich
- Two of the Wolverines coaches played in the NFL, with both of those individuals logged more than 10 years in the league: Harbaugh (15 years) and Mike Zordich (12)
- This does not include the seven years of NFL experience logged by strength and conditioning coach Kevin Tolbert or the 16 years of experience by head athletic trainer Dave Granito

The Team under Coach Jim Harbaugh

- Michigan posted consecutive 10-win campaigns for the first time since 2002-03
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in top of possession: 9th in 2015 and 15th in 2016
- The Wolverines have committed 230 penalties in 38 games (6.05 per contest); flagged 87 times in 2015, 63 times in 2016 and 80 times this year
- Michigan has scored 153 touchdowns while allowing just 71 to its opponents
- The Wolverine defense has listed in the top five nationally all three seasons
- A total of 33 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team) in the past three years, including 16 players in 2016 and nine players this season
- Three players earned first-team All-America honors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16) and Jabrill Peppers (2016)
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award

U-M in the Big Ten Conference

- Michigan became the first school in conference history to win 500 games, claiming the milestone win in a 27-20 overtime victory at Indiana
- U-M has compiled a 503-206-18 record all-time in conference play, tops in Big Ten history
- Michigan has a 18-8 mark in Big Ten action under third-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- Harbaugh’s only setbacks in the conference came against Michigan State and Ohio State in 2015 and 2017, Iowa and Ohio State last year and Penn State and Wisconsin this season
- Four of the eight losses came in top 10 matchups and four of the contests came down to the final play of the game
- U-M finished with a 7-2 mark in Big Ten play during the 2016 season; the team’s only conference setbacks came on the final play at Iowa (FG) and on the final play of the second overtime at Ohio State (TD)

THE OFFENSE

U-M's Offense Under Drevno and Harbaugh

- U-M has posted consecutive 5,000 yard total offensive seasons for the first time since the 2010 and 2011 seasons: 5,147 yards in 2015 and 5,524 in 2016
- The Wolverines have posted 1,241 points in 38 games for an average of 32.7 points per contest; tallied the fifth-highest total in school history last year (524 points) and scored 408 points during the 2015 season
- Scored more points in 2016 than any team in the modern era of U-M football and trailed only the Point-a-Minute teams of the early 1900s
- The red zone offense has converted over 90% in three seasons, 148-163 (90.8%); scored 103 TDs in those 148 conversions (70% of scores are TDs)
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in red zone efficiency: currently 42nd in the NCAA this season (87.2%) after finishing 13th in 2016 and seventh in 2015
- Averaged over 33 minutes of possession time in each of the three seasons
- Converted 41.6% percent of third down chances (225-541): 35% this season, 43% in 2016 and 46% in 2015
- The offense has worked to limit its turnovers on offense: 16 in 2015 (16th nationally), 11 in 2016 (12th nationally) and 16 in 2017
- The Wolverines lost 19 fumbles in 38 games: six in 2015, five in 2016 and eight in 2017
- U-M has scored 93 rushing touchdowns in three seasons: 25 in 2017, 41 in '16 and 27 in '15
- Quarterbacks have tossed 20 or more passing touchdowns in consecutive seasons
- Michigan's quarterbacks have ranked either first or second in completion percentage in the Big Ten: Jake Rudock led the league at 64.0 pct. in 2015 and Wilton Speight with second at 61.6 pct. in 2016
- Rudock and Speight were the third-most efficient passers in the league the past two seasons
- Michigan is a perfect 15-0 under Harbaugh when a player gains 100 yards rushing and is 23-1 when outrushing the opposition

A Look at the 2017 Offense

- Michigan, Maryland and Houston are the only schools in the country to have three different quarterbacks record a victory this season
- Three running backs have gained more than for 1,100 career yards: Karan Higdon (1,373), Chris Evans (1,275) and Ty Isaac (1,170)
- Michigan has three running backs with 500 rushing yards on the season: Higdon (929), Evans (661) and Isaac (548); this is the first time since 1991 - Ricky Powers, Jesse Johnson and Tyrone Wheatley - that three running backs have gained 500-plus yards in a season
- U-M has 18 players that have carried the football in a collegiate game
- Eight Wolverines have reached the end zone on the ground, combining to score 52 touchdowns: Karan Higdon (17), Khalid Hill (13), Ty Isaac (8), Chris Evans (10) and one each for Henry Poggi, Kareem Walker, Ben Mason and

Wilton Speight

- Mason Cole, Ben Bredeson and Patrick Kugler are the only players on offense to start every game this fall
- U-M's tight end corps has collected 50 receptions for 654 yards and scored five touchdowns
- Eight players have hauled in receiving scores during their careers: Khalid Hill (3), Sean McKeon (3), Grant Perry (3), Kekoa Crawford (2), Zach Gentry (2), Tarik Black (1), Chris Evans (1) and Tyrone Wheatley (1)
- A total of 19 Wolverines have caught passes during their career
- Wilton Speight, John O'Korn and Brandon Peters have taken snaps under center during the collegiate career, with each of the three players tossing touchdown passes: Speight (22 TDs), Peters (4) and O'Korn (4)
- Khalid Hill was the team's top returning scorer with 13 total trips to the end zone, all during the 2016 season (10 rushing and three receiving)

Grounding out the Yards

- Michigan has gained more than 2,000 rushing yards in a season for the third straight year under Harbaugh: 2,057 yards in 2015, 2,768 in 2016 and 2,236 in 2017
- The Wolverines have carried the ball 496 times for 2,236 yards and scored 25 rushing TDs
- The offense has attempted at least 36 rushing attempts in every game this season
- U-M has produced its best rushing efforts in back-to-back games, gaining a season-high 371 rushing yards vs. Minnesota after rushing for 334 yards vs. Rutgers
- The offense has rushed for more than 190 yards six times this season
- The Wolverines have carried the pigskin across the goal line 25 times this season, scoring a season-high four TDs against Rutgers and Minnesota
- U-M scored at least one rushing touchdown in 11 of the 12 games; held without a TD against Cincinnati

U-M Maintains Balanced Offense

- Michigan has continued to maintain its offensive balance this season, averaging 186.3 yards rushing and 168.6 yards passing
- The Wolverines have gained 4,259 yards on 797 plays this season for an average of 5.3 yards per attempt (355-yard average per contest)
- The offense has gained more than 400 yards of total offense in five games this fall: 433 yards vs. Florida (215 rushing, 218 passing), 414 yards vs. Cincinnati (193 rushing, 221 passing), 423 yards at Purdue (139 rushing, 284 passing), 471 vs. Rutgers (334 rushing, 137 passing) and 427 vs. Minnesota (371 rushing, 56 passing)
- Michigan has 25 rushing touchdowns and nine passing scores this season

Red Zone Efficiency

- The Wolverines rank as one of the nation's most efficient teams in the red zone, converting 87.2 percent of their opportunities
- U-M lists 45th nationally and sixth in the Big Ten this fall, converting 34-of-39 chances (22

- Cole represents the offense and McCray the defensive side of the football
- Cole is the 21st offensive linemen and McCray the 24th linebacker to be named a captain since Bo Schembechler instituted co-captains at the outset of the 1970 season
- This is the fourth time in the past five seasons that a linebacker has been selected as captain
- McCray is the second straight Ohio native to be defensive captains (Chris Wormley last year)

Michigan Leads FBS in Father-Son Duos

- Michigan is tied with Clemson for the most sons of former players on the roster at the same school; Iowa (8), BYU (7), Georgia Tech (7), Florida State (6), Hawaii (6) and Virginia (6) are some of the other notable schools

- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year apparel agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

Ty Isaac

THE DEFENSE

Michigan's Defense under Harbaugh

- Don Brown has led the nation's No. 1 ranked defense the past two-plus seasons: 2016 at Michigan and 2015 at Boston College
- The Wolverines' pass defense has been the nation's best the past three seasons: No. 3 in 2015 and No. 1 in 2016 and 2017
- U-M led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2015, finished second in 2016 and is currently third in 2017
- Michigan ranks in the top four in total defense for three straight seasons: No. 4 in 2015, No. 1 in 2016 and No. 3 in 2017
- The Wolverines have held 16 of their 38 opponents to 10 points or less in three seasons, including four shutouts; only 13 teams have managed to score more than 20 points vs. U-M
- U-M has scored seven defensive touchdowns: 1 in 2015, 3 in 2016 and 3 in 2017
- The defense has held the opposition to less than 100 rushing yards in 21 of the 38 games
- The Wolverines have posted 312 tackles for loss in 38 games (8.21 avg. per game); 103 in 2017, 121 in 2016 and 88 in 2015
- Quarterbacks have been sacked 117 times (3.1 avg.): 39 in 2017, 46 in 2016 and 32 in 2015

U-M's Defense One of the Nation's Best

- U-M lists in the top 15 nationally of eight (8) defensive categories; including five categories where the team lists in the top three
- The defense leads the Big Ten in five categories and is second in two additional categories
- The Wolverines lead the nation in pass defense, allowing just 142.7 yards per contest
- The defense ranks third in the NCAA in total defense (268.6 avg.), pass efficiency defense (100.17 rating), first downs allowed (166 total) and third down defense (27.1%)
- Michigan lists in the top 10 of the NCAA rankings in tackles for loss (fourth, 8.4 avg.) and sacks (seventh, 3.25 avg.)
- The defense has held five opponents to less than 200 yards of total offense: 192 vs. Florida, 200 vs. Cincinnati, 189 at Purdue, 195 vs. Rutgers and 164 vs. Minnesota
- Eight Wolverine defenders have 49 or more stops this season; three of those players are defensive linemen
- U-M has five players with double-digit TFLs and Devin Bush needs an assisted TFL to reach that 10-TFL mark: Chase Winovich (17), Khaleke Hudson (16.5), Maurice Hurst (13.5), Mike McCray (13), Rashan Gary (11) and Bush (9.5)
- Six Wolverines have collected five or more sacks this fall, led by defensive end Chase Winovich (8) and viper/linebacker Khaleke Hudson (7); Bush, Gary, Hurst and McCray have five sacks each
- Michigan posted a season high 13 tackles for loss against Minnesota and reached double-digits four times during the year
- A total of 19 players have recorded stops in the opposition's backfield with 11 of those Wolverines collecting sacks
- The only returning starter on U-M's defense

- was fifth-year senior linebacker Mike McCray
- The team has five players that logged starting assignments during their careers prior to the 2017 season: McCray, Hurst, Josh Metellus, Bryan Mone and Winovich
- Six players on the defense have recorded interceptions, with McCray, Tyree Kinnel, Lavert Hill, Hudson and David Long each collecting two apiece; McCray, Kinnel and Hill have returned interceptions for touchdowns
- Twenty-two (22) Wolverines have recorded tackles in the opposition's backfield, led by Maurice Hurst (33.5), Chase Winovich (28), Mike McCray (26.5), Khaleke Hudson (16.5) and Rashan Gary (16); the 22 players have combined to post 143 TFLs
- Twelve (12) U-M players have registered quarterback sacks in their career, led by Winovich (14), Hurst (13), McCray (7.5), Devin Bush (5), Hudson (6) and Gary (6)
- McCray (9), Hill (9), Hudson (9), Kinnel (9), Bush (8), Watson (5), Long (4), Metellus (4), Hurst (2), Noah Furbush (1), Jordan Glasgow (1) and Mone (1) have tallied pass breakups in their careers
- Gary, Hurst, Winovich, Bush, Hill, Metellus, Kinnel and Long have started every game this season for the defense with Hudson and McCray earning the nod in all but one game

Wolverines' Lead the NCAA in Pass Defense

- For the second straight season, U-M is leading the NCAA in pass defense, allowing just 142.7 yards through the air this season
- Michigan has held three opponents to less than 100 passing yards and yielded just 101 yards threw the air to Rutgers
- The defense has allowed only nine passing touchdowns all season with no team earning more than one through the air against U-M
- The Wolverines have batted down 56 passes by the opposition, including nine interceptions
- Devin Bush, Lavert Hill, Khaleke Hudson and Tyree Kinnel are tied for the team lead with nine pass breakups apiece; 11 different players have collected at least one PBU

Michigan Third Nationally in Total Defense

- Michigan is third in the NCAA in total defense, allowing the opposition to gain just 268.6 yards per contest
- U-M has held five opponents to less than 200 yards of total offense: Florida (192), Cincinnati (200), Purdue (189), Rutgers (195) and Minnesota (164)
- Penn State (506 yards), Maryland (340), Wisconsin (325) and Ohio State (350) are the only teams to gain more than 280 yards of total offense against Michigan's defense this fall
- Overall, U-M has yielded just 3,223 yards on 721 plays by the opposition (4.5 avg.) with 24 touchdowns
- The defense has forced the opposition into a NCAA-leading 89 punts this fall
- Six of the 12 opponents had their lowest yardage totals of the season against Michigan
- U-M is third in the Big Ten in conference play, allowing just 288.8 yards per contest

Defense Not Yielding Points

- The Wolverines are third in the Big Ten and 14th nationally in scoring defense, yielding 18.3 points per contest
- U-M has held seven of its 12 opponents to 14 points or fewer this fall
- The opposition has scored just 24 touchdowns this fall, with U-M allowing 15 rushing touchdowns and nine passing scores
- The defense has contributed to the team's scoring output with 21 points on three defensive TDs (two interceptions and one fumble recovery); ranks 17th nationally in defensive TDs
- U-M's defense has allowed just 198 points by the opposition: 24 TDs and 10 FGs
- Six teams scored multiple touchdowns against the defense; Penn State scored a season-high six touchdowns against Michigan
- Michigan's defense held 10 straight opponents to 14 points or less at Michigan Stadium, which was the longest active streak in the NCAA, prior to Ohio State tallying 31 points in the regular season finale

Michigan Stopping the Run

- The Wolverines are 21st nationally and sixth in the Big Ten in rushing defense, yielding 125.9 yards per contest
- U-M has allowed just 1,511 yards on 425 carries (3.6 avg.) with 15 rushing touchdowns
- The Wolverines have held six opponents to less than 100 rushing yards this season
- The defense held Florida to just 11 rushing yards and allowed only 20 yards to Purdue

U-M Second Nationally in Forcing 3-and-outs

- For the second straight season, U-M has been the nation's best at forcing three-and-outs by the opposition's offense
- U-M is second in the NCAA averaging 6.25 three-and-outs per contests which is just behind Indiana (6.5 avg.)
- The defense leads the NCAA by forcing a three-and-out on 51.4 percent of the opponent possessions this season: 75 of 146 series
- The Wolverines forced 56 three-and-outs in Big Ten play: 5 vs. Ohio State, 7 at Wisconsin, 4 at Maryland, 5 vs. Minnesota, 6 vs. Rutgers, 2 at Penn State, 8 at Indiana, 9 vs. Michigan State and 10 at Purdue
- The defense has forced 46 three-and-outs in 82 possessions (56.1 pct.) in the second half: 2-6 vs. Ohio State, 4-8 at Wisconsin, 2-5 at Maryland, 3-6 vs. Rutgers and Minnesota, 1-5 at Penn State, 6-10 at Indiana, 6-8 vs. MSU, 5-6 at PU, 5-7 vs Air Force, 5-8 vs. Cincinnati and 4-7 vs. Florida

Among the Nation's Best on Third Down

- Michigan lists third nationally in third down defense this season; set a school record in 2016 by allowing the opponent to convert just 21 percent on third down
- This season, the defense has allowed its opponents to convert just 27.1 percent of its third down chances (45-166)
- Six opponents have converted three or less

third down opportunities this fall: Florida (2-13), Air Force (3-13), Purdue (0-12), Michigan State (2-14), Rutgers (3-11) and Maryland (3-16)

- The Wolverines held the Boilermakers without a third down conversion (0-12)
- One team has converted more than six third-down chances against the Wolverines and second-year defensive coordinator Don Brown: Ohio State in 2017
- U-M has held eight opponents with two or less third down conversions over the past two seasons, including Florida, Purdue and Michigan State this year

Defense Playing in Opposition's Backfield

- The Wolverines have spent a lot of time in the opposition's backfield this fall, racking up 103 tackles for loss and 39 sacks
- This is the first time since the early 2000s that Michigan's defense has accumulated 100 or more TFLs in back-to-back seasons
- Michigan is seventh nationally in sacks (3.25 avg.) and lists fourth in the NCAA in tackles for loss with an average of 8.4 per contest
- U-M has recorded six or more TFLs in every game this season, including four games in double digits: Florida (11), Rutgers (11), Minnesota (13) and Ohio State (10)
- Nineteen (19) different players have accounted for a tackle for loss while 11 Wolverines have sacked the quarterback
- Michigan has five defenders with double digits in tackles for loss and six players with five-plus sacks on the season
- Chase Winovich leads the Big Ten in both tackles for loss and sacks
- Michigan recorded a season-high six sacks against Florida and dropped the quarterback five times in conference games against Purdue, Rutgers and Minnesota

Forcing Miscues by the Opposition

- The defense has forced 14 turnovers this season, nine interceptions and five fumbles
- Eight different players have forced fumbles this fall with the Wolverines recovering five of the opponent's mistakes
- Khaleke Hudson and Chase Winovich lead the team with two forced fumbles apiece
- The defense forced four fumbles by Florida with two recoveries; the third recovery came on kickoff coverage by Ambry Thomas
- The first defensive points of the season were registered by Noah Furbush, who fell on a loose football in the end zone following Chase Winovich's sack and strip of Malik Zaire
- Tyree Kinnel and Lavert Hill lead the team with two interceptions apiece
- Kinnel and Hill returned interceptions for touchdowns against Cincinnati, with Kinnel returning his pick for 28 yards in the first quarter and Hill weaving his way for a 24-yard TD during the fourth quarter

- Butt finished as Michigan's career leader in receptions (138) and receiving yards (1,646) by a tight end
- A total of 22 Wolverines received All-Big Ten recognition, including all 11 starters on defense, 10 players on offense and punter/kicker Kenny Allen

MICHIGAN'S NFL FACTS AND INFORMATION

- U-M led all schools with 11 players selected during the 2017 NFL Draft.
- The Wolverines had a school record 14 players attend the 2017 NFL Scouting Combine.
- All 19 Wolverines that worked out at the school's pro day were signed to NFL contracts (11 draftees and eight free agents).
- Michigan is the only school to have a player selected in every NFL Draft; 79 consecutive selection meetings with a Wolverine chosen.
- There are four Wolverines that were selected in the first round of the NFL Draft still active in the league: CB Leon Hall, DE Brandon Graham, OT Taylor Lewan and S Jabrill Peppers.
- Since the inaugural draft in 1938, a total of 362 Michigan players have been selected.
- A total of 52 players have been chosen in the first round of the draft (AAFC, AFL and NFL).
- Tom Harmon (1941) and Jake Long (2008) were the first overall picks in the NFL Draft.
- Seven individuals have been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame: Elroy Hirsch (1968), Bill Hewitt (1971), Len Ford (1976), Dan Dierdorf (1996), Tom Mack (1999), George Allen (2002) and Benny Friedman (2005)

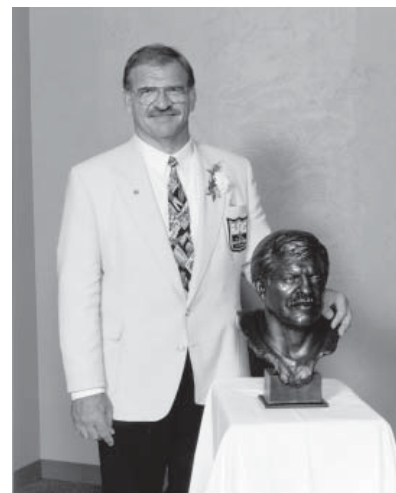

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2016 (90 Years)

The football program is in its 90th season in the "Big House" in 2016, with a 424-129-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 279 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 49,756,878 fans have watched the Wolverines play 568 games. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 279 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh is in his third season as the J. Ira and Nicki Harris Family Head Football Coach at the University of Michigan. Named the 20th coach in U-M football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30, 2014, Harbaugh became the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Jim Harbaugh is one of four Big Ten coaches to win 10-plus games in each of his first two seasons directing a conference school. Harbaugh joined Fielding Yost (1901-02) as the only head coaches to collected back-to-back 10-win seasons in their first two seasons at U-M. In addition to Harbaugh and Yost, Ohio State's Urban Meyer (2012-13) and Wisconsin's Paul Chryst (2015-16) also accomplished the feat.

Harbaugh is the second fastest coach to 20 wins at Michigan, trailing only Yost; Harbaugh accomplished the feat in 24 games and Yost won the first 29 games of his U-M career before tying Minnesota (6-6) in 1903.

In his first year, Michigan finished with a 10-3 record, including a 41-7 win over No. 19 Florida in the 2016 Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl. The Wolverines finished in the top 12 of the national polls for the first time since 2011, ranking 11th in the Amway Coaches poll and 12th in the Associated Press media poll.

In 2017, the Wolverines took another step forward, coming within inches of claiming their first Big Ten East Division title and a spot in the conference championship game. U-M finished 10-3 and listed 10th in both polls at year's end.

Harbaugh has coached U-M players to five first-team All-America honors; back-to-back honors for Jake Butt and Jourdan Lewis and consensus accolades for Jabrill Peppers in 2016. Butt won the Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end and Peppers received the Lott IMPACT Trophy, Paul Hornung Award and was a fifth-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy.

A total of 21 players have earned all-conference recognition in both seasons. Harbaugh's 2016 team set a program record with 23 Academic All-Big Ten honors.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League

with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular-season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved in each of Harbaugh's four

seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, in the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls, and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular-season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

Harbaugh began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. He spent eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA national championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years. Harbaugh won the Chicago Tribune Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top 12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister,

Joani, is married to former Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.
