U-M will be making its first appearance in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl; it will be the 12th different bowl game that Michigan has played in all-time.
U-M looks to capture 11 wins for the 10th time in school history.
The Wolverines have secured three 10-win seasons in Coach Harbaugh's four years leading the program.
Michigan leads the NCAA in total defense and is second in pass defense.

Bowl-ing for the 47th Time

The Wolverines will participate in a bowl game for the 47th time in school history. U-M has compiled a 21-25 record in bowl games, listing 11th in the NCAA in appearances and 17th in victories.

Michigan in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl

This will be the first-ever appearance in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl for Michigan. The Big Ten has played in the Peach Bowl on seven previous occasions, compiling a 2-5 record with all five setbacks coming by seven points or less. It will be the first time since 1990 that a Big Ten team will play in the Peach Bowl, as Indiana suffered a 27-24 loss to Auburn. The only conference schools to play in the Peach Bowl are Illinois (1985), Indiana (1987, 1990), Iowa (1982, 1988) and Purdue (1978, 1984).

Wolverines and Gators

This will be the fifth overall meeting between Michigan and Florida. The Wolverines have a 4-0 all-time record against the Gators and head coach Jim Harbaugh is 2-0. It will be the fourth meeting in a bowl game.

Wolverines Seek 11th Victory

The Michigan football team heads into bowl season looking to capture its 11th win of the season. With a victory, the Wolverines would become the 10th team in school history to secure at least 11 wins in a season. U-M has won 11 games on seven occasions, with the school record 12 victories coming in the 1905 and 1997 seasons. The last time Michigan won 11 games was 2011, completing an 11-2 campaign with a victory in the Sugar Bowl.

THE TEAM

Wolverines and Gators

- This will be the fifth overall meeting between Michigan and Florida
- The Wolverines have a 4-0 all-time record against the Gators and head coach Jim Harbaugh is 2-0
- In the only regular season match-up between the two schools, Michigan defeated Florida by a 33-17 score in the 2017 AdvoCare Classic at AT&T Stadium in Dallas
- The prior three games with the Gators were contested in bowl games, with the Wolverines posting victories in the 2003 Outback Bowl and the 2008 and 2016 Florida Citrus Bowl games

Michigan's UF Connections

• The Wolverines have two links to the University of Florida Gators in video coordinator Phil Bromley and defensive line coach Greg Mattison
• A four-starter at UF, Bromley played center and anchored the offensive line from 1981-84 and was an All-SEC selection in 1983 and 1984; earned his bachelor of science degree in psychology (1985) and master's in education (1988)
• Greg Mattison was the Gators' co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach for three seasons (2005-07)

Michigan vs. SEC

- This will be the 15th time that Michigan faces a Southeastern Conference school in a bowl game
- The Wolverines have an 8-6 mark against the SEC in bowl games
- Michigan is no stranger to the Southeastern Conference and will face an SEC school for the 36th time in school history
- The Wolverines have a 25-9-1 all-time record against schools from the SEC
- The most recent bowl match-up with the SEC came in the 2018 Outback Bowl, a 26-19 loss to South Carolina on New Year's Day
- The Wolverines have yet to face Louisiana State in a cross-conference match-up; U-M has played both Missouri (2-2) and Texas A&M (2-1) in the past but those games were prior to their inclusion in the SEC

Harbaugh in Bowl Games

- This will be Jim Harbaugh's sixth bowl game as a collegiate head coach
- Harbaugh enters the Peach Bowl game with a 2-3 record in bowl games, including a 1-2 mark at Michigan
- He will be making his first appearance in the Peach Bowl as a head coach
- In his first season at Michigan, Harbaugh's squad posted a 41-7 victory over Florida in the Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl
- The last two seasons, the Wolverines suffered last minute losses by less than seven points, fall 33-32 to Florida State in the Orange Bowl (2016) and 26-19 to South Carolina in the Outback Bowl (2017)
- Harbaugh led Stanford to the Sun Bowl against Oklahoma (L, 31-27) and the Orange Bowl against Virginia Tech (W, 40-12) during his final two seasons with the Cardinal

Six of U-M's 2018 Foes Headed Bowling

• Six of the Wolverines' 12 regular-season opponents are heading into postseason bowl action this season

2018 MICHIGAN RECORD WHEN...

- Notre Dame, Michigan's season-opening opponent has qualified for the College Football Playoff semifinal in the Cotton Bowl
- Five of Michigan's Big Ten opponents earned a bowl berth -- Michigan State (Redbox), Northwestern (Holiday), Ohio State (Rose), Penn State (Citrus) and Wisconsin (Pinstripe)
- The Big Ten is sending nine teams into bowl competition this year

U-M Ranked Eighth in National Polls

- The Michigan football team heads into the bowl season listed No. 7 in the College Football Playoff rankings and No. 8 in the Associated Press media poll and the Amway Coaches polls
- The Wolverines have been ranked in the top eight nationally for the past eight polls
- U-M has a 3-2 record against ranked teams this fall, defeating No. 15 Wisconsin, No. 24 Michigan State and No. 14 Penn State while falling to No. 11 Notre Dame and No. 10 Ohio State; the last time that U-M beat three top 25 teams in the same season was 2005 and the last time it defeated three straight top opponents was 1997
- Michigan began the season ranked 14th in both national polls

2018 Michigan Wolverines

- The Wolverines tied for the Big Ten East Division title with Ohio State, each posting an 8-1 conference mark this season
- Michigan posted a 10-2 regular season record with its only setbacks coming on the road against No. 11 Notre Dame and No. 10 Ohio State; had a 10-game winning streak in between those losses
- U-M has the nation's 23rd toughest schedule in 2018, with the cumulative winning percentage of all 12 regular season opponents sitting at .598 (79-53); began the season with the NCAA's second toughest schedule based on team performance from the 2017 season
- Michigan has played 97 student-athletes this fall, including 27 players that are walk-ons or began their careers as walk-ons
- Thirteen (13) true freshmen have seen their first collegiate action this fall: Michael Barrett, Ronnie Bell, Vincent Gray, Hassan Haskins, Aidan Hutchinson, Jalen Mayfield, Ryan McCurry, Cameron McGrone, Joe Milton, Jake Moody, Luke Schoonmaker, Christian Turner and Ben VanSumeren
- A total of 28 Wolverines have made their career debut this season: Jordan Anthony, Michael Barrett, Ronnie Bell, Matt Brown, Tyler Cochran, Dane Drobocky, Joseph Files, Chuck Filiaga, Hassan Haskins, Joel Honigford, James Hudson, Aidan Hutchinson, Jalen Mayfield, Dylan McCaffrey, Jake McCurry, Ryan McCurry, Cameron McGrone, Joe Milton, Jake Moody, Phillip Paea, Hunter Reynolds, Michael Sessa, Drew Singleton, Ben VanSumeren, Christian Turner, Jacob West and Brendan White
- The Wolverines returned 20 starters from 2017, which was tied for the third highest total of any FBS program
- The 17 position starters offense and defense - ranked fourth nationally behind Florida (19), Michigan State (19) and Utah State (18)
- U-M has players from 29 different states and

two different countries this season, including 50 players from the state of Michigan, 13 student-athletes from Florida, 12 student-athletes from the neighboring state of Ohio and nine (9) from New Jersey

- U-M had three early enrollees in January: Joe Milton, Myles Sims and Taylor Upshaw
- Heading into 2018, a total of 33 players had started at least one game in their career: 19 on offense and 14 on defense
- Junior offensive lineman Ben Bredeson leads the team with 32 starting assignments
- Senior defensive end Chase Winovich leads the defense with 27 career starts

U-M in Top 30 of Scoring 'O' and 'D'

- The Wolverines have outscored the opposition by a 442 to 211 margin this fall
- Michigan lists 19th in scoring offense at 36.8 points per contest while listing 12th in scoring defense at 17.6 points allowed
- U-M has tallied points in 40 of the 48 quarters
 The Wolverines surrendered 164 points across
- nine Big Ten contests, second-best in conference action (18.2 avg.)
- U-M was second in the league with 331 points scored during Big Ten play (36.8 avg.)
- Michigan has outscored the opposition, 218 to 107, during the first half this season, including 154 to 55 in the second quarter
- In the second half, U-M has outscored the opposition, 224 to 104: 100 to 36 margin in the third quarter and 124 to 68 in the fourth stanza
- The Wolverines have tallied a quarter-high 154 points in the second stanza
- Michigan has tallied at least 64 points in every quarter this season, including the final three quarters where the team has surpassed the 100point mark
- The team scored 31 or more points in each home game this fall
- U-M has 10 scoring drives that took less than a minute: 8 touchdowns and two field goals
- The offense has scored in three or less plays on 10 drives

U-M Dominating the Clock

- Michigan has been one of the nation's best controlling the football this season, averaging 34:46 minutes per game of possession time
- In fact, U-M has never ranked outside the top 20 nationally in time of possession during Jim Harbaugh's four seasons as head coach
- The Wolverines lead the Big Ten and are fourth nationally in time of possession
- U-M has held the ball for more than 31:30 in every game except one contest (25:49 against Western Michigan), including more than 33 minutes in the past nine games
- The offense possessed the ball for over 37 minutes in three straight Big Ten games: a seasonhigh 41:03 at Michigan State, 37:56 against Penn State and 37:01 against Wisconsin
- The Wolverines held possession of the football for more than 35 minutes in seven of the nine Big Ten games

Creating Points off Turnovers

- U-M has gained 75 points off turnovers while yielding just 28 points to the opposition following a sudden change situation
- Michigan scored a season-high 21 points off three Penn State turnovers, including a 62-yard interception return by Brandon Watson
- The Wolverines tallied 10 points following a pair of turnovers secured against Nebraska and Wisconsin; scored TDs following miscues against WMU, SMU, Maryland and Ohio State

Wolverines Limiting Turnovers

- The Wolverines are third in the Big Ten and 22nd nationally in turnover margin (0.73 avg.)
- U-M has forced 17 turnovers by the opposition while committing only 10 miscues
- Michigan is 48th nationally with 11 interceptions, with four of those picks returned for TDs
- The defense leads the Big Ten and is third nationally with four defensive touchdowns
- The Wolverines have lost three fumbles and put the ball on the ground only six times this fall
- Michigan is sixth in the NCAA and leads the conference in fewest turnovers (10)
- U-M is second in the Big Ten in fewest interceptions thrown (7) and fumbles lost (3); third nationally in fumbles and 30th in interceptions

Wolverines Complete Perfect Home Slate

- Michigan posted a perfect 7-0 record at home this season
- U-M won all seven home games by at least 11 points: Western Michigan (+46), SMU (+25), Nebraska (+46), Maryland (+21), Wisconsin (+25), Penn State (+35) and Indiana (+11)
- This is the second time in Coach Harbaugh's tenure that the Wolverines have been perfect at home; posted an 8-0 mark during the 2016 season
- U-M has posted an unblemished home slate on 23 occasions since 1940, including the 1973 and 1992 season where they recorded ties at home: 1940, 1947, 1948, 1953, 1970, 1971, 1972, 1973*, 1974, 1976, 1977, 1983, 1985, 1992*, 1997, 2000, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2011, 2012, 2016, 2018 (* denotes seasons with ties)

The Team under Coach Jim Harbaugh

- The Wolverines have won 38 games during Coach Harbaugh's four seasons
- Michigan posted consecutive 10-win campaigns (2015-16) for the first time since 2002-03 and have won 10 games in three of Harbaugh's four seasons leading the program
- U-M has ranked in the top 20 nationally in time of possession all four years: 9th in 2015, 15th in 2016, 20th in 2017 and 4th in 2018
- The Wolverines have committed 320 penalties in 51 games (6.3 per contest); flagged 87 times in '15, 63 times in '16, 86 times in '17 and on 84 occasions this fall
- Michigan has scored 209 touchdowns while allowing just 101 to its opponents
- The Wolverine defense has listed in the top five nationally all four seasons
- A total of 33 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team) in the past three years, including 16 players in 2016 and nine players in 2017
- Five players earned first-team All-America hon-

- ors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16), Jabrill Peppers (2016), Maurice Hurst (2017) and Devin Bush (2018)
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award
- Bush earned second-team All-America honors in 2017, consensus first-team accolades in 2018 and was a two-time finalist for the Butkus Award

Harbaugh in Fourth Year Leading U-M

- Jim Harbaugh has compiled a 38-13 overall record in four seasons at Michigan
- Harbaugh has guided the Wolverines to three
 10-win seasons in his four years leading the
 Michigan football program
- He was a semifinalist for the George Munger Collegiate Coach of the Year award this fall and was on the watch list for The Dodd Trophy and Paul Bear Bryan Coach of the Year awards
- Harbaugh is one of 22 coaches who is currently the head coach at his alma mater; Harbaugh, Paul Chryst (Wisconsin), Scott Frost (Nebraska) and Pat Fitzgerald (Northwestern) are the only Big Ten coaches leading their alma mater
- Harbaugh is one of four Big Ten coaches to win 10-plus games in each of his first two seasons directing a conference school; joined Fielding Yost (1901-02) as the only head coaches to collected back-to-back 10-win seasons in their first two seasons at U-M
- In addition to Harbaugh and Yost, Ohio State's Urban Meyer (2012-13) and Wisconsin's Paul Chryst (2015-16) also accomplished the feat
- Harbaugh is the second fastest coach to 20 wins at Michigan, trailing only Yost; Harbaugh accomplished the feat in 24 games and Yost won the first 29 games of his U-M career before tying Minnesota (6-6) in 1903
- Harbaugh was a finalist for the Paul "Bear"
 Bryant Coach of the Year award in 2016, and was a semifinalist for the George Munger Collegiate Coach of the Year honor that same season

NFL Coaching Pedigree

- The Wolverines' football staff boasts an impressive 158 years of playing, coaching and administrative experience at the NFL level
- Michigan has 54 years of NFL experience among the 11 coaches on staff
- The staff has logged 27 years of NFL coaching experience and 27 years of playing experience
- Six of Michigan's coaches have worked in the NFL: Jim Harbaugh, Pep Hamilton, Jay Harbaugh, Greg Mattison, Jim McElwain and Mike Zordich
- Two of the Wolverines coaches played in the NFL, with both of those individuals logging more than 10 years in the league: Harbaugh (15 years) and Mike Zordich (12)
- This does not include the 16 years of experience by head athletic trainer Dave Granito and 30 years of expertise by Tom Gamble, Senior Advisor to Coach Harbaugh/Player Personnel

THE OFFENSE

- Michigan has gained 400-plus yards of total offense in nine games and exceeded 375-plus yards in the past 11 contests
- Since gaining a season low 307 yards at Notre Dame, the offense is averaging 438.2 yards per contest; has nine 400-yard outputs, including a season-high 507 yards vs. Indiana
- Finished fourth in conference play in total offense (437.2 avg.)
- Michigan has gained more than 160 rushing yards in 11 straight games
- The Wolverines have scored a rushing touchdown in every game this season
- Michigan has allowed nearly half as many sacks (18) as the defense has generated (31)
- The offense has gained 20 or more first down in 10 games this fall; had a season low 18 at Northwestern while gaining a season-high 28 at Ohio State
- The team's top two rushers, the tandem of Karan Higdon and Chris Evans, have combined for 1,581 yards on 298 carries (5.3 avg.) and scored 14 rushing TDs this fall despite both players missing four total games due to injury
- U-M has 16 players that have carried the football in a collegiate game
- Seven Wolverines have reached the end zone on the ground, combining to score 53 touchdowns: Karan Higdon (27), Chris Evans (14), Ben Mason (9), Shea Patterson (2), Dylan McCaffrey (1), Joe Milton (1) and Tru Wilson (1)
- A total of 20 Michigan players have caught passes during their career
- Eleven players have hauled in receiving scores during their careers: Donovan Peoples-Jones (7), Nico Collins (6), Zach Gentry (4), Sean McKeon (3), Grant Perry (3), Ronnie Bell (2), Chris Evans (2), and one each for Tarik Black, Nick Eubanks, Oliver Martin, Jake McCurry and Jared Wangler
- Shea Patterson, Brandon Peters, Dylan McCaffrey and Joe Milton have taken snaps under center during the collegiate careers, with three players tossing touchdown passes: Patterson (44), Peters (4) and McCaffrey (2)

Balanced Offensive Effort

- The Wolverines continue to be one of the most balanced offenses in the country under head coach Jim Harbaugh
- U-M is averaging 214.3 yards rushing and 212.9 yards passing per contest
- The offense has gained 2,572 yards on the ground and 2,555 through the air
- Michigan has run 829 offensive plays for 5,127 yards; averaging 427.2 yards per contest

One of the Most Efficient Passing Games

- Michigan's offense has been one of the nation's most efficient passing games this fall, listing second in the Big Ten and 18th nationally in pass efficiency (153.72 rating)
- The Wolverines have completed 64.5 percent of their passes (200-310) for 2,555 yards
- U-M has tossed 23 touchdown passes with just seven interceptions
- Shea Patterson is second in the conference and 18th nationally in pass efficiency (154.28 rating)
- Michigan has eight 200-yard passing games

and has tossed TD passes in all but three games; has not thrown an interception in six games

Converting on Third Down

- The Wolverines have been one of the most efficient teams on third down this season, converting on 49 percent of its chances
- The offense has converted 84-of-170 third down opportunities to lead the Big Ten and list seventh in the NCAA
- Michigan has converted over 45 percent of its third down tries in all but three contests, all on the road: Northwestern (43.8, 7-16), Michigan State (41.2, 7-17) and Ohio State (42.9, 6-14)
 U-M converted a season-high 69.2 percent of its third down chances against Maryland (9-13)
- This season, U-M's offense has moved the chains on nearly twice as many third downs (84) as the defense has allowed (51)

Red Zone Scoring

- Michigan has scored 275 points in the red zone this fall, converting on 48 of 55 chances
- The offense has scored 33 TDs (21 rushing, 12 passing) and has converted 15 field goals
- U-M is sixth in the Big Ten and 40th in the NCAA, converting at 87.3 percent this season
- The only miscues came on a pair of interceptions (SMU and Nebraska), two turnovers on downs (Notre Dame and Rutgers), a missed field goal try (Michigan State), end of the half situation (Indiana) and a kneel down situation at the end of Wisconsin game

Reaching the End Zone

- Michigan has scored 49 offensive touchdowns this season, balancing the effort with 26 rushing TDs and 23 receiving scores
- Seven different players have contributed to the scoring on the ground and 10 Wolverines have caught receiving touchdowns
- Karan Higdon leads the team with 10 touchdowns
- Donovan Peoples-Jones and Ben Mason are tied for second with seven scores and Nico Collins is four with six touchdowns
- Higdon and Mason have collected their scores on the ground while Peoples-Jones and Collins have gained their TDs in the passing game
- Peoples-Jones has eight overall touchdowns (7 receiving and 1 punt return); his seven receiving TDs are tied with Amara Darboh (7, 2016) and two shy of Jehu Chesson (9, 2015) for the most receiving TDs in a season under Jim Harbaugh
 Michigan has had an offensive player score
- Michigan has had an offensive player score three touchdowns on two occasions this fall: Peoples-Jones (3 receiving) vs. SMU and Mason (3 rushing) vs. Nebraska

- U-M has posted three straight seasons with more than 4,500 yards of total offense: 5,147 yards in 2015, 5,524 in 2016, 4,536 in 2017 and 5,127 in 2018
- The Wolverines have posted 1,702 points in 51 games for an average of 33.4 points per contest; tallied the fifth-highest point total in school history during the 2016 season (524 points)
- Scored more points in 2016 than any team in the modern era of U-M football and trailed only the Pointa-Minute teams of the early 1900s; tallied the fifth-highest point total (524) in school history during the 2016 season

THE DEFENSE

National & Big Ten Leaders Across the Board

- The Wolverines lead the nation in total defense (262.5 avg.) and list second in pass defense
- The defense has allowed 70 fewer yards than any team in the nation despite playing the 23rd toughest schedule in college football this fall
- Michigan has 75 points off turnovers and leads all FBS teams with four pick-sixes
- U-M leads the Big Ten in five defensive categories - total defense, pass defense, pass efficiency, first downs allowed and defensive touchdowns; ranks second in scoring defense
- In conference games, the Wolverines lead the Big Ten in four of the eight major defensive categories, while listing second in three of those other categories
- Michigan is 17th in the NCAA in rushing defense, allowing 116.6 yards per contest and a paltry 3.4 yards per rushing attempt
- U-M ranks 12th nationally in scoring defense at 17.6 points allowed per contest; held five opponent to 10 points or less
- The Wolverines are 16th nationally in third down defense this fall, allowing the opposition to convert at 32.1 percent (51-159)
- · Michigan held three straight ranked opponents to a combined 4-of-34 on third down: #15 Wisconsin (2-11), #24 Michigan State (0-12) and #14 Penn State (2-11), including an 0-16 streak
- Teams are afforded 2.1 red zone chances per game against U-M, which is the third fewest in the NCAA (25 total trips); only 17.9 percent of drives reach the red zone

Suffocating the Opposition

- Michigan has held eight of its 12 opponents to their lowest yardage total of the season
- U-M has held all but two opponents to under 320 yards of total offense, including three teams below 190 yards: 94 yards by Michigan State, 132 yards by Nebraska and 186 vs. Penn State
- The Wolverines have held seven (7) opponents under 260 yards of total offense, tied for the most in the country; the rest of the Big Ten defenses combined have only accomplished this 23 times in 158 games
- Six opponents recorded their season lows in both rushing and passing against U-M: Western Michigan, Northwestern, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Michigan State and Penn State
- Michigan is the only team in country to hold six of its 12 opponents to under 100 passing yards; the rest of the Big Ten defenses combined have accomplished this 15 times in 158 games
- Six opponents have recorded 12 or fewer first downs; no other team has done that five times
- The defense has allowed the opposition to reach the red zone only 25 times this season, including just 19 times in Big Ten action; yielded 135 points on 17 touchdowns (10 rushing, 7 passing) and six field goals
- Opposing quarterbacks have completed just 48.9 percent of their passes (150-of-307)
- The defense has allowed just 13 passing touchdowns while collecting 11 interceptions; only two teams, SMU and Ohio State, have thrown more than one touchdown against the defense

- and six opponents did not throw a TD pass • The Wolverines have collected an interception
- in nine contests, including a season-high two picks against both Wisconsin and Penn State
- The defense has contributed 54 pass breakups. including 11 interceptions, with 15 different players have recorded at least one breakup
- Michigan has batted down four or more passes in seven games; swatted away a season-high six breakup against Western Michigan
- The defense has forced the opposition into 52 three-and-out situations in 140 possessions (37.1%) this fall; included a stretch of 20-of-37 possessions against three straight top 25 teams
- -- #15 Wisconsin (5-11), #24 Michigan State (7-14) and #14 Penn State (8-12)
- In addition to stopping opponents on third down and turning them over, U-M generates a massive amount of negative yardage for opposing offenses with 221 sack yards as part of 343 negative rushing yards created; paired with 247 interception return yards, that totals 590 negative yards for the opponent (-49.2 avg.)

Nation's Best Defense under Don Brown

- Don Brown has coached the nation's top defense three of the past four seasons: 2015 at Boston College (254.3 avg.), 2016 at Michigan (245.6 avg.) and 2018 at Michigan (262.5 avg.)
- The defense has held the opposition to less than 225 yards of total offense 15 times in 38 games under Brown; tied for the most in the country with Alabama (42 games) over the past three seasons
- The Wolverines have held 12 opponents under 200 yards of total offense the past three seasons
- Michigan has held the opposition under 100 yards of offense in the first half a FBS-leading eight times this fall
- U-M led the nation the past two seasons in pass defense and third downs allowed (2016-17)
- Over the last three seasons, Michigan has allowed 140.2 passing yards per game in league play; the next-best Power 5 program in that category is Georgia (186.0), a difference of 46 yards per contest
- In three seasons, 16 of 20 opponents have been held at or under 14 points at Michigan Stadium and only two have score 28 points or more (averaging 12.65 points per game)
- U-M has listed in the top four nationally in six defensive categories in consecutive seasons
- The Wolverines have held 14 teams to less than 100 passing yards in a game, the most in the country since 2016
- Only seven teams have exceeded 200 passing yards against U-M under Don Brown; held 31 of 38 opponents under 200 passing yards with the next best team nationally accomplishing the feat only 27 times
- The Wolverines have allowed 9 or fewer completions in a game 16 times in 38 games, the most in the country; no other Power 5 team has accomplished it more than 12 times
- U-M has held 19 of 38 opponents the last three years to under 100 yards rushing; the team has an 18-1 record when holding the opposition to less than 100 rushing yards
- Michigan has registered six or more tackles for loss in all but seven games under Don Brown

- U-M has recorded at least one sack in 35 of 38 games under Brown
- The defense has generated negative rushing yards in six separate quarters this season (against three opponents) and 20 times overall under Don Brown; opposing offenses have been held to 10 or fewer rushing yards in 40 quarters during Brown's tenure
- The Wolverines have allowed fewer than 10 passing yards in eight separate quarters this season (against six different opponents); opposing quarterbacks have been held at or below that mark in 34 different quarters under Brown
- The defense has batted down or intercepted 162 passes over the past three years (55 in 2016, 53 in 2017 and 54 in 2018)
- Since 1997, only three Michigan teams have had four or more players record doubledigits in tackles for loss: 1999 and both of Don Brown's defenses (2016, 2017); has four players with 7.0 or more TFLs this season
- The sack totals each of the past two seasons (46 in 2016, 42 in 2017) rank behind only the school record 51 sacks registered during the 2001 season; this year's squad has 31 sacks
- That same 2001 defense holds the school record with 123 tackles for loss; second and third on the list are the defenses the last two seasons (118.5 in 2016 and 114 in 2017); the team has 80 TFLs in 2018
- U-M racked up 315 tackles for loss and 119 sacks since Brown's arrival prior to the 2016 season (38 games)
- U-M has recorded double-digit tackles for loss in 17 games since Don Brown became defensive coordinator (2016-present; twice in 2018)
 2016-17 marked the first time since the early 2000s that Michigan's defense has accumulated 100 or more TFLs in back-to-back seasons
- Brown was a finalist for the 2016 Broyles Award, presented to the nation's outstanding assistant coach, and a semifinalist in 2018

- For the third straight season, Michigan has been dominating the NCAA in pass defense
 U-M led the national rankings in pass defense during both the 2016 and 2017 seasons and currently lists No. 2 in the NCAA (145.9 avg.)
- behind leader Miami, Fla. (140.8 avg.) this fall
 The Wolverines have allowed the opposition
 to just 145.9 passing yards per game in 2018
- The opposition has been held to less than 100 yards passing five times this fall and to fewer than 174 yards on nine ocassions
- The 59 passing yards allowed against Rutgers was the lowest total for any opponent this

- season and the third-lowest figure in Brown's tenure with the Wolverines
- Michigan has held 14 opponents to 100 passing yards or less over the past three seasons
- U-M allowed just 150.1 yards through the air in 2017, and was the nation's only defense to hold 11 opponents under 200 passing yards; no other team reached double-digits
- Michigan led the NCAA by yielding just 142.5 yards per game through the air in 2016; held five opponents to less than 100 passing yards
- U-M also became the first defense to allow less than 1,750 passing yards in back-to-back regular seasons since Alabama (2004-05)

Defense Making Stops in the Backfield

- U-M is among the national leaders in stops behind the line of scrimmage, listing 37th in sacks (2.58 avg.) and 40th in TFLs (6.7 avg.)
- U-M has recorded 80 TFLs this season, with 21 different players contributing to the team's total
- The defense has posted six or more TFLs in eight games; tallied a season-high 14 TFLs vs. Nebraska and had 10 at Northwestern
- Chase Winovich leads the team with 14.5 TFLs
- Michigan recorded a season-high six sacks at Northwestern and tallied five vs. Penn State
- Twelve (12) different players have contributed to the team's 29 sacks, led by Josh Uche with seven stops of the quarterback
- U-M has posted at least two sacks in 10 games this fall; held without a sack against Rutgers and Ohio State
- Michigan's 14 TFLs against Nebraska are the highest known total since at least 1997; the previous high was 13 TFLs attained on multiple occasions, including five times over the past two seasons: Minnesota in 2017 and against Penn State, Rutgers, Maryland and Ohio State in 2016

- Three Wolverines earned All-American honors: Devin Bush [1st, Walter Camp Football Foundation (WCFF), Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), American Football Coaches Association (AFCA), Sports Illustrated, Sporting News; 2nd, Associated Press], Chase Winovich [2nd, WCFF and AFCA; 3rd, AP] and Lavert Hill [3rd, AP]
- Bush was a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and Dick Butkus Award; also one of the top 10 players to watch for the Walter Camp Player of the Year award
- Two players were semifinalists for national awards: Lavert Hill (Jim Thorpe Award) and Chase Winovich (Chuck Bednarik Award)
- A total of 12 defensive players earned some form of All-Big Ten Conference recognition, led by first-team honoree Devin Bush, Rashan Gary, Lavert HIII, David Long and Chase Winovich
- Bush was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and the Linebacker of the Year

U-M'S DEFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- Don Brown has led Michigan's defense in three of Coach Harbaugh's four seasons
- Brown has directed the nation's No. 1 ranked total defense three of the past four seasons: 2015 at Boston College, 2016 at Michigan and currently has the No. 1-ranked squad in 2018; finished third behind Alabama and Wisconsin in 2017
- The Wolverines' pass defense has been the nation's best the past three-plus seasons: No. 3 in 2015, No. 1 in 2016, 2017 and 2018
- U-M led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2015, finished second in 2016, placed fourth in 2017 and is currently leading the NCAA in 2018
- Michigan has ranked in the top four nationally in total defense for four straight seasons: No. 4 in 2015, No. 1 in 2016, No. 3 in 2017 and No. 1 in 2018
- The Wolverines have held 21 of their 50 opponents under Harbaugh to 10 points or less, including four shutouts; only 17 teams have managed to score 20 or more points vs. U-M
- U-M has scored 11 defensive touchdowns in four years: 1 in 2015, 3 in 2016, 3 in 2017 and 4 in 2018
- The defense has held the opposition to less than 100 rushing yards in 26 of the 50 games
- The Wolverines have posted 397 tackles for loss in 50 games (7.94 avg. per game): 76 in 2018, 114 in 2017, 121 in 2016 and 88 in 2015
- Quarterbacks have been sacked 151 times (3.02 avg.):
 31 in 2018, 42 in 2017, 46 in 2016 and 32 in 2015
- Michigan led the nation in third down defense in consecutive seasons (2016-17); set a school record in 2016 by allowing the opponent to convert just 21 percent on third down and followed up by allowing the opposition to convert just 26.1 percent of its chances during the 2017 season
- Only three teams have converted more than six thirddown chances against Michigan during Don Brown's tenure: Ohio State (2017), Notre Dame (2018) and Indiana (2018)
- U-M has held 12 opponents with two or less third down conversions over the past three seasons
- Michigan has finished in the top five in three-and-outs forced the past two seasons: first nationally in 2017 (83 in 162 series, 51.2%) and fourth in 2016 (73 in 164 possessions, 44.5%)

MICHIGAN IN THE CLASSROOM

- Not only has the U-M program done well on the field, the players have achieved at a high level in the classroom under head coach Jim Harbaugh, posting a perfect APR score each of his three seasons leading the program
- Michigan is one of seven schools to earn Division I Academic Progress Rate (APR) Public Recognition Award each of the past four seasons: Air Force, Duke, Northwestern, Stanford, Vanderbilt and Wisconsin are the others
- For the fourth consecutive year, the Wolverines are the only Big Ten institution to earn APR Public Recognition in both football and men's basketball
- The 2018 team has 59 players with better than a 3.0 cumulative GPA, including 16 studentathletes with higher than a 3.5 GPA
- Junior offensive lineman Stephen Spanellis has a 3.901 cumulative GPA, which is the highest on the football team

MICHIGAN FOOTBALL COMMUNITY SERVICE

IN THE COMMUNITY

More than 60 student-athletes are active participants in the Ann Arbor community, serving the program and charitable organizations:

- A tradition for more than 25 years, football players and student-athletes in other sports across Michigan Athletics visit patients at **C.S.**Mott Children's Hospital on Thursday nights throughout the year
- Team IMPACT with teammate Larry Prout drafted as a member of the football team, Larry has had over 100 surgeries in his young life; 100 of our players sent videos to Larry when he had his 100th surgery back in the winter. Larry vists practice frequently and participates in different team activities.
- The **Youth Impact Program (YIP)** has been a summer program partnership between the Michigan Football program and middle school students from the city of Detroit. YIP allows football players to be mentors and teach the game of football to approximately 100-125 young men. Football partners with the Detroit Public School (DPS), the U.S. Marines and the School of Social Work at Michigan to provide education, leadership, discipline and football skills for the participants.
- The football team makes annual visits to the **Veteran's Hospital** in Ann Arbor, allowing the players a chance to give back to our military and thank them for their service to our country.
- Players partnered with **Wolverine Human Services** and former running back Vincent Smith and his Team Gardens program; played and spoke to the youth participants and helped build gardens at HOOP HOUSE
- The coaches and student-athletes work with the **KIDSPORT** Program to teach youngsters from around the Washtenaw County area about football, complete with youth run drills and demonstrations
- Student-athletes participate in reading programs throughout the Ann Arbor School system and attend and speak at ACT (Athletes for Community Transformation) at Bryant Community Center
- Football players engage with special needs students from across the area at **Victors Day**, an event put together by the T. Wall Foundation

Community Service Overseas

During both of its foreign trips, the Michigan football team participated in multiple community service activities

- In Rome, the team engaged in several servicebased activities, including an afternoon with refugees at Borghese Gardens. Coach Harbaugh, his family and five players visited the SOS Children's Village, which provides stable homes to orphaned or abandoned children. The contingent provided Michigan apparel, played games and visited with the youth and their surrogate mothers, who dedicate their lives to providing a stable environment for these children.
- The team also interacted with representatives from the Federazione Italiana de American Football (FIDAF), an Italian football team, which included refugee players on its roster. The team met two individuals, Kana Jallow and Saikou

Sanneh, and watched a documentary about their journey, struggles and the hard work it took to overcome these difficulties, and how the lessons learned in football apply to their every day life.

- In Paris, the Wolverines spent a morning providing a free instructional clinic to French, German, Hungarian and Italian youth and coaches to help spread the game of football across the globe. After the clinic concluded, a group of players broke off and played two soccer games against refugees from Somalia, Afghanistan, Sudan, Bangladesh, Guinea and Chad.
- Michigan Football partnered with Salomon Kabongo-Kooper and his initiative, Feed the City, where players and staff put together food and boxed meals for Paris' homeless. A group of Michigan players went to the northern part of the city to spend time interacting with refugees while another group spent time preparing food, packaging clothing and delivering the items to the homeless. The players at the refugee camp played soccer, ran races and taught the young people the game of American football.

• Winovich has been active with the Chad Tough Foundation, helping the organization raise over \$350,000 for pediatric cancer research. Chase, teammates



and Coach Brown died their hair/mustache orange for the Outback Bowl to raise awareness and funding for pediatric cancer research; generated \$211,246 (does not include matching gift made by U-M Regent Ron Weiser). In addition, Chase danced at the "Dancing with the Michigan Stars" event in March 2018 that generated \$143,000 for research





Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2018 (91 Years

The football program is in its 91st season in the "Big House" in 2018, with a 431-129-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capcity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 286 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators.

Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0. **REDEDICATION GAME:** September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 50,532,034 fans have watched the Wolverines play at Michigan Stadium. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 286 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh has led the University of Michigan football program to three 10-win seasons in his first four years in Ann Arbor, becoming one of just four Big Ten coaches to accomplish the feat in the history of the conference.

The J. Ira and Nicki Harris Family Head Football Coach, Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in Michigan football history on Dec. 30, 2014. He became the sixth Michigan football player selected to lead college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh is the second fastest coach to 20 wins at Michigan, trailing only Yost; Harbaugh accomplished the feat in 24 games and Yost won the first 29 games of his U-M career before tying Minnesota (6-6) in 1903.

In his first two seasons as the Michigan head coach, Harbaugh guided the Wolverines to 10-win seasons. U-M has appeared in a bowl game in all four seasons with Harbaugh at the helm of the program, including two New Year's Six Bowl games (2016 Orange Bowl and 2018 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl) and two other New Year's Day bowls (2016 Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl and 2018 Outback Bowl).

Seven Wolverines have secured 11 All-America honors under Harbaugh: Devin Bush (first team, 2018; third team, 2017), Jake Butt (first team, 2015-16), Maurice Hurst (first team, 2017), Jourdan Lewis (first team, 2015-16), Jabrill Peppers (second team, 2015; first team, 2016), Chase Winovich (second team, 2018) and Chris Wormley (second team, 2016). Four of them were consensus All-Americans: Butt. Hurst. Lewis and Peppers.

Additionally, Butt won the Mackey Award as the nation's top tight end in 2016, while Peppers received the Lott IMPACT Trophy and Paul Hornung Award and was a fifth-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy race. Several other athletes have been national award finalists under Harbaugh, including Lewis (Jim Thorpe Award, 2016) and Bush (Butkus Award, 2017-18; Nagurski Award, 2018).

A total of 21 student-athletes have earned All-Big Ten first team recognition in Harbaugh's four seasons (four in 2015, six in 2016, three in 2017,

eight in 2018). Those accolades have extended to the class-room as well, with Wolverines accruing 137 Academic All-Big Ten honors during his tenure, including a program-record 48 in 2017.

Michigan finished with a 10-3 record in 2015, including a 41-7 win over No. 19 Florida in the 2016 Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl. The Wolverines finished in the top 12 of the national polls for the first time since 2011, ranking 11th in the Amway Coaches poll and 12th in the Associated Press media poll.

In 2016, the Wolverines took another step forward, coming within inches of claiming their first Big Ten East Division title and a spot in the conference championship game. U-M finished 10-3 and listed 10th in both polls at year's end.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular-season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved in each of Harbaugh's four seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, in the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls, and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular-season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

Harbaugh began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. He spent eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA national championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years. Harbaugh won the Chicago Tribune Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical catego-

ries still listing among the top 12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister, Joani, is married to University of Georgia men's basketball coach Tom Crean.
