- The Wolverines have won 28 of their last 31 games.
- Blake Corum and Roman Wilson are tied for second nationally with six touchdowns apiece.
- The defense has registered consecutive games with 10 tackles for loss; has nine sacks in those two games.
- The Wolverines are second in the NCAA in total defense and leads the nation in scoring defense.
- U-M leads the country in fewest TFLs and is second in sacks allowed.

144th Season of Michigan Football

The 2023 season marks the 144th in Michigan Football history. The Wolverines have an NCAA-leading 991 victories, claimed 44 Big Ten Championships and won 11 national titles since the inception of the program in 1879.

Wolverines and Scarlet Knights

This will be the 10th meeting between Michigan and Rutgers, two of college football's oldest programs. The Wolverines lead the all-time series, 8-1, with victories

in the last eight match-ups. Rutgers won the inaugural meeting at home in 2014 and Michigan claimed victories at Michigan Stadium in 2015, 2017, 2019 and 2021, and won on the road during the 2016, 2018, 2020 and 2022 seasons.

Four Wolverines Hail from New Jersey

Michigan's roster features four players from the state of New Jersey: OL Dominick Giudice, WR Jack Grusser, OL Cole Morgan and DB Keon Sabb.

Harbaugh Set for 100th Game at U-M, Seeks 75th Win

Jim Harbaugh will roam the sidelines for the 100th time as Michigan's head coach against Rutgers and will be seeking his 75th victory with the maize and blue. Harbaugh has a 74-25 record in nine seasons with the Wolverines and is the fourth winningest coach in program history.

- U-M finished No. 3 in the national polls for the second straight season.
- Michigan won its league-leading 44th conference title with a 43-22 win over Purdue in the Big Ten Championship Game.
- The Wolverines won 13 games for the first time in school history.
- Michigan made its second appearance in the College Football Playoff this season (2021, 2022).
- Olu Oluwatimi and Blake Corum were consensus All-Americans.
- Oluwatimi won the Outland and Rimington trophies.
- U-M won 10-plus games for the fifth time under coach Jim Harbaugh and for the 31st time in school history.

THE 2023 SEASON

- Series History with Rutgers**
- This will be the 10th meeting between Michigan and Rutgers
 - The Wolverines lead the all-time series, 8-1, and won the last eight match-ups after dropping the inaugural meeting in 2014
 - U-M defeated Rutgers, 52-17, last season in Piscataway
 - In the four games played at Michigan Stadium, the Wolverines have compiled a 4-0 record: posted victories in 2015 (49-16), 2017 (35-14), 2019 (52-0) and 2021 (20-13)
 - After losing the initial match-up in the series at Rutgers, Michigan has since claimed four straight road wins: 78-0 (2016), 42-7 (2018), 48-42 (2020) and 52-17 (2022)

- Big Ten Openers**
- The Wolverines will play their 118th conference opener against Rutgers on Saturday (Sept. 23)
 - U-M has a 7-1 record in conference openers under coach Jim Harbaugh
 - Michigan has claimed victories in 15 of its last 17 Big Ten openers
 - The Wolverines have compiled an 89-26-2 record in conference openers and have claimed victories in 51 of their last 55 Big Ten openers
 - U-M had a 23-game winning streak in conference openers snapped at Wisconsin in 2005
 - The only setbacks in the past 55 Big Ten openers came on the road against the Badgers (21-14 in 1981, 23-20 in 2005 and 35-14 in 2019) and at home against Minnesota (30-14 in 2014)

- Conference Openers vs. Rutgers**
- This will be the second time that Michigan begins Big Ten play against Maryland
 - U-M has played all 13 of the current Big Ten schools in conference openers

- Homecoming at Michigan**
- This will be the 121st homecoming game (excluding alumni exhibitions) and the 125th all-time homecoming game played by the Wolverines in Ann Arbor
 - Michigan has a 93-27 record in homecoming games (94-28-2 including exhibitions)
 - U-M has won 10 straight homecoming games and 22 of its last 26 homecoming games
 - The Wolverines have claimed victories in 46 of

their last 53 homecoming games dating back to 1968, the year prior to Bo Schembechler's arrival

- Schembechler compiled a 21-0 homecoming record during his Michigan coaching career
- Jim Harbaugh has a 6-0 record at homecoming as U-M head coach

- Michigan Ranked Second in the Polls**
- U-M is ranked No. 2 in the Associated Press media poll and the AFCA Coaches' poll heading into the match-up with Rutgers; lists behind two-time defending national champion Georgia
 - The Wolverines began the 2023 season ranked No. 2, which is the program's highest preseason ranking since listing No. 2 in 1991
 - U-M has been ranked No. 2 in the preseason AP rankings on four previous occasions: 1991, 1986, 1977 and 1976; the Wolverines topped the preseason AP rankings 1989 and 1981
 - U-M finished 2022 ranked No. 3 in the final polls behind national champion Georgia and No. 2 TCU; the Wolverines finished No. 3 in the polls the past two seasons marking just the third time in school history the program accomplished the feat; the only other times that Michigan ranked in the top 5 of the polls in consecutive seasons was 1947 and 1948, capturing back-to-back national championships, and 1940 (No. 3) and 1941 (No. 5)
 - U-M has listed in the top five of the national polls for 19 straight rankings
 - The Wolverines have been ranked in the top 10 of the polls for 31 straight rankings, including four this fall, all 16 in 2022 and the final 11 of 2021
 - The Wolverines have been listed in the national rankings for 34 straight polls dating back to the second poll of 2021, including a current string of 31 consecutive polls in the top 10
 - U-M has been ranked for all but 13 contests during Harbaugh's tenure (89 of 102 games)

- 2023 Schedule Notes**
- U-M will compete for two rivalry trophies during the 2023 season: Little Brown Jug (Minnesota) and the Paul Bunyan Trophy (Michigan State); both games will be contested on the road
 - Michigan is one of 13 Power 5 schools not playing an FCS opponent this season
 - Two of the Wolverines' foes this fall are ranked in the preseason AP Top 25 poll: No. 3 Ohio State and No. 7 Penn State
 - Seven of this year's opponents played in bowl games: Ohio State (Peach Bowl), Penn State (Rose Bowl), Purdue (Citrus), Maryland (Duke's Mayo), Minnesota (Pinstripe), Bowling Green (Quick Lane) and East Carolina (Birmingham)

- Michigan in the Big Ten Conference**
- The Wolverines' 15-game conference winning streak is the program's longest since a 16-game Big Ten winning streak spanning 1996-98
 - U-M has claimed wins in 19 of its last 20 conference games
 - Michigan has a 53-17 mark in Big Ten action under ninth-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
 - The Wolverines have a 26-8 record at home in Big Ten play under Harbaugh and have a 25-9 mark on the road; 2-0 on a neutral site

THE TEAM UNDER HARBAUGH

Michigan on the Field

- U-M has won 12-plus games in consecutive seasons for the first time in history (2021-22)
- The Maize and Blue have won 25 games over the past two seasons, which is the most victories in a two-year stretch in school history
- Michigan has won 10 games in five of Harbaugh's eight seasons leading the program
- The Wolverines have won 77 overall games during Coach Harbaugh's nine seasons (77-25)
- Michigan has the seventh-most victories among all college football team since Harbaugh was hired ahead of the 2015 season
- U-M has scored 427 touchdowns while allowing just 217 to its opponents during that stretch
- The defense has been listed in the top 12 nationally in six of his eight seasons, including four seasons ranking among the top 5 in total defense; finished 2022 listed sixth nationally

Wolverines Excelling in the Classroom

- Not only has the program done well on the field, the players have achieved at a high level in the classroom under Harbaugh
- 344 Academic All-Big Ten Performers (2015-22); fourth-highest total in the conference during that span
- Achieved a school record 60 Academic All-Big Ten performers in consecutive seasons (2021-22)
- More than 80 players have been enrolled in graduate school during Harbaugh's tenure
- 37 student-athletes have been named Big Ten Distinguished Scholars (3.7 GPA or better during the academic year)

Players Earn National and Big Ten Honors

- A total of 95 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors (1st, 2nd or 3rd team): 16 players in 2016, 15 in four seasons (2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022), 9 in 2017, 8 in 2015 and 2 in 2020
- Nine players have earned first-team All-America honors: Jake Butt (2015-16), Jourdan Lewis (2015-16), Jabrill Peppers (2016), Maurice Hurst (2017), Devin Bush (2018), Aidan Hutchinson (2021), Jake Moody (2021) Olu Oluwatimi (2022) and Blake Corum (2022)
- Moody became Michigan's first-ever winner of the Lou Groza Award as the nation's outstanding place-kicker in 2021 and was just the second kicker to earn first-team All-American honors
- Hutchinson finished as the 2021 Heisman Trophy runner-up and won the Rotary Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Trophy and Lott IMPACT Trophy
- Corum (2022) and Hutchinson (2021) were recipients of the Chicago Tribune Silver Football as the Big Ten's MVP as voted by the conference coaches
- Butt and Peppers each collected a pair of national awards during the 2016 season: Butt won the Mackey Award and Senior CLASS Award while Peppers collected the Lott IMPACT Trophy and the Paul Hornung Award
- Additionally, four players have been named finalists for national awards during Harbaugh's tenure: Jabrill Peppers (Lombardi and Bednarik, 2016), Jourdan Lewis (Thorpe, 2016), Devin Bush (Butkus, 2017-18 and Bronko Nagurski, 2018)

and Blake Corum (Hornung, 2021)

- Harbaugh has mentored two Heisman Trophy finalists at Michigan and four in his coaching career, in addition to placing third as a player during his senior year

Harbaugh Earns Accolades

- Harbaugh won both 2022 Big Ten Coach of the Year honors, collecting the Hayes-Schembechler Coach of the Year honor as voted by his fellow coaches and the Dave McClain Coach of the Year recognition as voted by the media
- He was selected as the 2022 AFCA FBS Region 3 Coach of the Year
- Harbaugh was a finalist for four national coach of the year awards in 2022: finalist for Bobby Dodd Trophy, Paul "Bear" Bryant Award, Eddie Robinson Award and George Munger Award
- Harbaugh was named the 2021 Associated Press Coach of the Year in college football, becoming the first U-M head coach to win the honor since the award was established in 1998

Michigan at Home in the Harbaugh Era

- The Wolverines have compiled a 48-8 home record under Jim Harbaugh
- U-M has won 18 straight home games, claiming back-to-back home slates in 2021 and 2022 and is 3-0 this season
- Michigan has a 26-8 mark in Big Ten games at the Big House under Harbaugh's leadership
- The Wolverines have gone undefeated four times; posted a 7-0 mark in 2018 and 2021 and an 8-0 mark in 2016 and 2022
- U-M has put together home winning streaks of 10 games (2016-17), 13 games (2018-19) and 18 games (2021-23) during his tenure
- The only setbacks in Big Ten home games have come in losses to Michigan State and Ohio State as well as Wisconsin and Penn State during the COVID pandemic in 2020
- The Wolverines are a perfect 22-0 in non-conference home games under Harbaugh, outscoring the opposition by a 923-232 margin

Michigan on the Road under Harbaugh

- U-M has compiled a 25-11 record (.694) on the road under head coach Jim Harbaugh
- The Wolverines have posted a 25-9 record (.735) in conference road games during his tenure, including a 4-0 record in 2015 and 2022
- Michigan has won eight of its last nine Big Ten road games dating back to the start of 2021
- The program has posted a 3-5 record in neutral site games: 1-5 mark in bowl games
- The team's only regular season neutral site affair was a 33-17 victory over Florida in the 2017 season opener at Cowboys Stadium

Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- Michigan has led the nation in attendance 45 of the past 48 seasons; only years that U-M did not lead the country in attendance was 1997, 2014 and 2020
- U-M has drawn 100,000-plus fans for 311 straight games at Michigan Stadium (since Nov. 8, 1975)
- The Wolverines averaged 110,246 fans at their eight games played at Michigan Stadium in 2022; had 881,971 fans attend the eight home contests
- In 2022, U-M had 277,959 patrons in attendance at its four Big Ten road tilts for an average of 69,490 fans per game
- The 2022 Big Ten Championship Game against Purdue drew a sellout crowd of 67,107 fans at Lucas Oil Stadium
- In addition, the Wolverines' College Football Playoff Semifinal against TCU in the Fiesta Bowl drew a sellout crowd of 71,723 at State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Ariz.
- Michigan played in front of more than a million fans during the 14-game schedule (1,298,760) in 2022

College Football's Top TV Draw

- U-M has played in a NCAA record 572 televised and streamed football games, compiling a 380-184-8 record
- Michigan was involved in three of the eight highest rated games during the 2022 season: Fiesta Bowl (#2, 21.7M), Ohio State (#4, 17.1M) and Big Ten Championship Game (#8, 10.7M)
- Every single football game since 1995 has been televised or streamed, a streak of 347 consecutive broadcasts
- The Wolverines have played 326 nationally televised football games over the year
- The very first televised U-M football game came on Sept. 27, 1947, a 55-0 shutout of rival Michigan State on WWJ TV in Detroit

Jordan Brand

- The Michigan Football program is in its eighth season wearing brand Jordan apparel
- U-M was the first college and/or professional football program to wear Jordan on its uniforms and sideline apparel, starting with the 2016 season
- The Wolverines were joined by North Carolina as Jordan football schools in 2017; Oklahoma and Florida were outfitted by Jordan starting with the 2018 season
- Jordan outfits Michigan from head-to-toe on all apparel needs for the football and basketball programs
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

- U-M has 86 returning lettermen from 2022: 48 on offense, 34 on defense and three specialists
- The 2023 roster features 113 players who have seen game action in the winged helmet
- The Wolverines had 24 player make their U-M debut this season: 13 freshmen, nine transfers, one junior and one sophomore

Best Two-Year Stretch in U-M History

- Michigan won 25 of 28 games in during the 2021-22 season, with two of the three setbacks coming in the College Football Playoff semifinals the past two seasons
- U-M has won more games (25) over the last two seasons than any two-year stretch in history
- The Wolverines won 13 games for the first time in school history during the 2022 season; previous mark of 12 wins was attained during the 1905, 1997 and 2021 seasons

Wolverines Attacking Big Ten Last Two Years

- Michigan has been the best team in the Big Ten the past two seasons, winning the 2021 and

2022 conference titles

- During that stretch, the Wolverines have posted a 19-1 record against conference foes
- The teams average margin of victory over the past two seasons is 18.6 points per game
- U-M has won 12 of those 20 games by more than 20 points with only five single-digit wins
- The lone setback in the past two years came by four points at Michigan State (37-33 in 2021)

Big House Streak Reaches 18 Games

- U-M enters the Rutgers game with a 18-game winning streak at Michigan Stadium
- The 18-game winning streak is the longest home winning streak under Jim Harbaugh and the program's best since a 21-game streak from 1998-2001 under Lloyd Carr
- Michigan has posted back-to-back undefeated seasons at home, posting a perfect 8-0 record in 2022 and a 7-0 slate in 2021, and has started 2023 with a 3-0 mark
- The Wolverines have posted a perfect home record four times during Coach Harbaugh's tenure: 8-0 (2022), 7-0 (2021), 7-0 (2018) and 8-0 (2016)
- U-M has been unblemished at home on 25 occasions since 1940, including the 1973 and 1992 seasons where they recorded ties at home

15 Starters Return from 2022 Team

- The Wolverines return 15 starters from the 2022 season: 7 offense, 7 defense, 1 specialist
- U-M has four of those returning players (2 each on offense and defense) that started all 14 games in 2022
- Cornelius Johnson and Zak Zinter appeared in the offensive starting lineup in every game while Kris Jenkins and Junior Colson are the returning defender to start every contest
- A total of 24 players have started at least one game in the maize and blue -- 13 on offense and 11 on defense; total does not include any of the transfer student-athletes that joined the roster this year
- Johnson leads the offense with 32 career starts with Zinter listing second with 31 starts
- Colson leads the defense with 22 career starts; DB Mike Sainristil has also started 22 games but split those between the offense and defense

- Zinter is the program's nominee for the 2023 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award

- Running back Blake Corum is one of the top returning players in college football and among the top players earning preseason recognition in 2023

THE OFFENSE

A Look at the 2023 Offense

- The offense is led by third-year offensive coordinator/offensive line coach Sherrone Moore
- Michigan had 13 players entering the 2023 season with at least one starting assignment during their career; added two new starters in the opener against ECU - C Drake Nugent and RT Myles Hinton - and another vs. UNLV in TE A.J. Barner
- U-M returns seven starters from the 2022 season: RT Karsen Barnhart, RB Blake Corum, WR Cornelius Johnson, LG Trevor Keegan, TE Colston Loveland*, QB J.J. McCarthy, WR Roman Wilson* and RG Zak Zinter; * Loveland and Wilson both split time as the starters at their positions
- Michigan is the back-to-back Joe Moore Award winning unit as the nation's top offensive line; became the first team to capture the award in consecutive seasons
- U-M is averaging nearly three rushing TDs per game over the last 21 contests (61 total; 6 this season, 41 in 14 games in 2022, 13 in the final four games of 2021)
- RB Blake Corum is a returning consensus All-American and was a seventh-place finisher in the Heisman Trophy voting
- A total of 19 players have carried the ball in a collegiate game: RBs Blake Corum, Donovan Edwards, Tavierre Dunlap, C.J. Stokes, Kalel Mullings, Leon Franklin, Cole Cabana, Danny Hughes, Henry Donohue, Benjamin Hall and Christian Boivin, WRs Roman Wilson, Cornelius Johnson and Semaj Morgan, TE Colston Loveland and QBs J.J. - 10 Wolverines have scored rushing touchdowns in their careers, combining for 62 scores; Corum leads the group with 37 and is followed by Edwards (11), McCarthy (7), Mullings (3), Orji (2), Wilson (1) and Stokes (1)
- McCarthy, Warren, Orji, Jack Tuttle and Jayden Denegal have seen action under center during their career
- U-M has 16 players with a reception in their careers: WRs Johnson, Mike Sainristil, Roman Wilson, Cristian Dixon, Peyton O'Leary, Will Rolapp, Tyler Morris, Fred Moore and Semaj Morgan; TEs Colston Loveland, A.J. Barner, Matt Hibner and Max Bredeson; and RBs Corum, Edwards, C.J. Stokes, Leon Franklin and Danny Hughes
- 11 Wolverines have scored receiving touchdowns, combining for 41 end zone trips, led by Johnson and Wilson with 14 career TDs apiece; Sainristil (5), Edwards (3), Corum (2), Loveland (2) and Frankin (1) have also caught receiving TDs
- Johnson and Zinter lead the team with 33 starts on offense

QUARTERBACKS

- Michigan has five quarterbacks with playing experience: J.J. McCarthy, Jack Tuttle, Davis Warren, Alex Orji and Jayden Denegal
- Michigan set a record with seven QBs completing a pass and eight signal callers playing vs. UConn last season
- The Wolverines threw for 3,078 yards in 2022; averaged 219.9 yards per contest
- U-M completed 238-of-370 passes (64.3%) for 3,078 yards and 24 TDs with six interceptions
- McCarthy (34) and Tuttle (5) have tossed TD passes in their U-M careers; all five of Tuttle's TDs came at Indiana
- McCarthy has accounted for 41 touchdowns during his career: 34 passing and seven rushing
- McCarthy tossed three passing TDs on five occasions: Hawaii, Indiana, Ohio State and Purdue in 2022 and against ECU in 2023

J.J. McCarthy

U-M'S OFFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- U-M has gained more than 5,000 yards of total offense in six of Coach Harbaugh's eight seasons
- The Wolverines have surpassed 6,000 yards of offense in back-to-back seasons: 6,203 (2021) and 6,423 (2022)
- The 6,423 offensive yards gained in 2022 are a school record, breaking the previous mark of 6,353 yards attained in 2010
- The offense has generated two of the top three total offensive seasons in school history: 6,423 in 2022 (1st) and 6,203 yards in 2021 (3rd); the 2016 squad has the sixth-best offensive season with 5,524 yards
- Two of the three players in school history to pass for more than 3,000 yards in a season have played during Harbaugh's tenure: Jake Rudock (3,017 in 2015) and Shea Patterson (3,061 in 2019); school record is 3,331 yards by John Navarre in 2003
- The Wolverines have scored 3,472 points in 102 games for an average of 34.1 points per contest
- Michigan has three of the top seven scoring outputs in school history: 566 in 2022 (3rd), 524 in 2016 (6th) and 501 in 2021 (7th); the only totals among the top seven in school history are from the Point-a-Minute teams of the early 1900s (1901-04)
- Michigan gained more than 2,000 rushing yards in six seasons under Harbaugh: 2,057 yards (2015), 2,768 (2016), 2,310 (2017), 2,653 (2018), 3,001 (2021) and 3,345 (2022); also finished with 1,959 yards in 2019
- The red zone offense has converted at just under 90 percent, 399-455 (88%); scored 291 TDs in those 399 conversions (72.9% of scores are TDs)
- U-M has ranked in the top 15 nationally in red zone efficiency twice: 10th (2022), 13th (2016) and 7th (2015)
- Converted 42.3% percent of third down chances (595-1,405), including 40% or better in five of those seasons: 51.9% (2023), 45.2% (2022), 46.0% (2021), 49.4% (2018), 43% (2016) and 49% (2015)
- U-M has scored 243 rushing TDs in nine seasons: 6 (2023), 41 (2022), 39 (2021), 11 (2020), 26 (2019), 26 (2018), 26 (2017), 41 (2016) and 27 (2015)
- Michigan has a 48-2 record under Harbaugh when a player gains 100 yards rushing and is 68-5 when out-rushing the opposition
- U-M is 68-7 under Jim Harbaugh when gaining 125 rushing yards or more in a game
- The Wolverines have lost 48 fumbles in 102 games: six (2015), five (2016), 11 (2017), three (2018), 11 (2019), two (2020), five (2021), four (2022) and one (2023)

THE DEFENSE

A Look at the 2023 Defense

- The defense is led by second-year defensive coordinator Jesse Minter, who was a finalist for the 2022 Broyles Award (nation's top assistant coach) in his first season with the Wolverines
- Michigan has one new assistant coach on the defensive side of the ball, linebackers coach Chris Partridge
- The Wolverines have 15 defenders that started at least one game in their career, including six players that have started at least 15 contests
- 38 defensive players have recorded at least one tackle during their career
- Junior Colson leads the defense with 177 career tackles while Barrett is second with 157 stops
- A total of 26 Wolverine defenders have recorded stops in the opposition's backfield during their career, led by Jaylen Harrell (12.5) and Michael Barrett (8.5); transfer Josaiah Stewart accumulated 25.5 TFLs at Coastal Carolina and Cam Goode amassed 13 of his 15.5 TFLs at UCF
- The 26 players have combined to post 126.0 TFLs over their careers; 80.5 of those stops in the backfield were made in a Michigan uniform
- 17 players have combined to register 58.0 sacks during their collegiate careers: Stewart (16.0 at CC), Goode (1.0 at U-M; 6.0 at UCF), Barrett (5.5), Jaylen Harrell (6.0), Mike Sainristil (3.0), Mason Graham (3.0), Derrick Moore (3.0), Kris Jenkins (3.0), Braiden McGregor (2.5), Colson (2.5), Kenneth Grant (1.5), Makari Paige (1.0), Ernest Hausmann (1.0 at UN), Josh Wallace (1.0 at UMass), T.J. Guy (1.0), Keon Sabb (0.5) and Rod Moore (0.5)
- 12 Wolverines have collected interceptions in their career, led by Rod Moore (4), Will Johnson (3), Mike Sainristil (2) and Mike Barrett (2); Goode, Paige, Jenkins, Quinten Johnson and Caden Kolesar have each collected one pick
- Sainristil leads the team with 10 career PBUs
- 17 players have collected at least one pass defended in their career: Sainristil (10), R. Moore (7), Goode (5), Colson (3), Johnson (3), Barrett (2), Harrell (2), Josh Wallace (2), McGregor (2), Paige (2), Kolesar (2), Grant (1), Jaydon Hood (1), Green (1), D. Moore (1), Keshawn Harris (1), Graham (1), Keon Sabb (1), and Ja'Den McBurrows (1); Goode had four PBUs at UCF
- Three Wolverines have scooped up an opponent fumble: Colson and Barrett on defense and Velazquez and Matt Hibner on special teams
- Barrett is the only player with a defensive touchdown, scoring on a 31-yard interception return at Rutgers
- Six defenders have started double-digit career games: Colson (24), Sainristil (24), Barrett (23), Jenkins (21), R. Moore (18) and Harrell (18)

Defense Leading the Nation

- The Wolverines lead the nation in scoring defense (5.3 avg.) and are second in total defense (222.3 avg.)
- Held the opposition to less than 250 yards in all three games and haven't allowed more than seven points in any of the three contests
- U-M has allowed four scores (3 FGs, 1 TD) in 33 possessions by the opposition; two of those drives started in Michigan territory with only one

- gaining points on a field goal by Bowling Green
- The Wolverines are yielded just 0.48 points per possession by the opposition
- The defense has recorded 10 tackles for loss in each of the past two games; registered nine sacks during that stretch
- 33 defensive players have recorded at least one tackle this season (38 total players have registered at least one stop in their career)
- 17 players have contributed to the team's 24 tackles for loss this season; 8 guys have been a part of the squad's 9 sacks

EDGE

- Seven edge defenders have seen game action during their careers
- Jaylen Harrell leads the group in games played (34) and starting assignments (18) in a Michigan uniform; Josaiah Stewart made 17 starts at Coastal Carolina
- Harrell also paces the edge performers in career tackles (56), tackles for loss (12.5) and sacks (6.0) while tying for second in PBUs (2)
- Three of the edge players have made starts during their career: Harrell (18) and Braiden McGregor (6); Stewart started 17 games at Coastal Carolina
- Six players have registered 25.5 tackles in the opposition's backfield during their Michigan careers: Harrell (12.5), McGregor (6.5), Derrick Moore (3.0), T.J. Guy (1.5), Stewart (1.0) and Kechaun Bennett (1.0); Stewart amassed 25.5 TFLs in two years at Coastal Carolina
- 49.0 percent (12.5 of 25.5) of those stops have been sacks: Harrell (5.0), McGregor (2.5), Moore (3.0) and Guy (1.0); Stewart had 16.0 sacks at CC
- McGregor (2), Harrell (2) and Moore (1) are the only players to record pass breakups

U-M'S DEFENSE UNDER HARBAUGH

- Michigan has ranked in the top 10 nationally in total defense five times, including four times in the top four in the country: No. 4 (2015), No. 1 (2016), No. 3 (2017) and No. 2 (2018) and No. 6 (2022)
- The Wolverines' pass defense has been among the nation's top three in four seasons: No. 3 (2015), No. 1 (2016), No. 1 (2017), No. 2 (2018)
- U-M led the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2015, finished second in 2016 and ranked among the top 10 a total of five times; also placed fourth in 2017, fifth in 2022 and seventh in 2018
- The Wolverines have held 39 of their 102 opponents under Harbaugh to 10 points or less, including six shut-outs
- Only 39 opponents have managed to score 20 or more points against Michigan
- U-M has scored 15 defensive touchdowns: 1 (2015, 2020 and 2021), 2 (2022), 3 (2016 and 2017) and 4 (2018)
- The defense has held the opposition to 100 rushing yards or less in 47 of the 102 games
- The Wolverines have posted 667 tackles for loss: 24 (2023), 73 (2022), 72 (2021), 20 (2020), 79 (2019), 76 (2018), 114 (2017), 121 (2016) and 88 (2015)
- Quarterbacks have been sacked 279 times: 8 (2023), 37 (2022), 34 (2021), 9 (2020), 36 (2019), 34 (2018), 42 (2017), 46 (2016) and 32 (2015)
- Michigan led the nation in third down defense in consecutive seasons (2016-17); set a school record in 2016 by allowing the opponent to convert just 21 percent on third down and followed up by allowing the opposition to convert just 26.1 percent of its chances in 2017
- Only 17 opponents have converted more than six third-down chances against Michigan since 2016; held 17 opponents with two or less third down conversions over the past nine seasons
- Michigan has finished in the top five nationally in three-and-outs forced on two occasions: first nationally in 2017 (83 in 162 series, 51.2%) and fourth in 2016 (73 in 164 possessions, 44.5%)

A LOOK BACK AT THE 2022 DEFENSE

- U-M listed top 30 nationally in nine categories
- Michigan finished fifth in the NCAA in pass efficiency defense, sixth in total defense and seventh in rushing defense, scoring defense and fourth down defense
- U-M finished seventh nationally in scoring defense at 16.1 points per game; held eight opponents to 14 points or less, including six to less than 10 points
- The defense allowed 225 points on the year, yielding only 21 TDs (10 rushing, 11 passing) and 17 FGs
- The defense gave up just 292.1 yards per game, the sixth-best mark in the NCAA; 4,090 yards on 879 plays
- The Wolverines held seven opponents under 255 yards of total offense: Colorado State (219), Hawaii (253), UConn (110), Indiana (222), Michigan State (252), Rutgers (180) and Nebraska (146)
- The run defense ranked seventh in the NCAA, yielding just 97.9 yards per contest
- Michigan's opponents gained 1,371 yards on 421 carries, allowing just 3.3 yards per carry
- U-M held eight opponents to less than 100 rushing yards, including four Big Ten teams to less than 40 yards: Iowa (35), Indiana (19), MSU (37) and Rutgers (14)
- 37 defenders recorded at least one stop in 2022
- 20 players helped amass 73 TFLs, with 15 of those individuals contributing to the team's sack total (37)
- The Wolverines made a season-high 11 tackles for loss and seven sacks against Colorado State; also accumulated seven sacks at Indiana
- Michigan was second in the Big Ten and ranked 34th nationally in sacks per contest (2.64 avg.)
- The Wolverines boasted one of the nation's best pass defenses, ranking fifth in pass efficiency (107.58 rating) and 20th in passing yards allowed (194.2 avg.)
- The opposition completed just 55.9 percent of their passes (256-458) for 2,719 yards and 11 touchdowns with 14 interceptions
- U-M held four opponents to less than 150 passing yards, including a mere 24 yards by UConn
- The 11 passing TDs yielded by the defense were tied for the sixth fewest nationally
- The defense intercepted 14 passes, accumulated 61 total passes defended (47 PBUs, 14 Ints.) • The Wolverines collected a season-best three interceptions at Rutgers and batted down a season-high seven passes at Ohio State
- U-M allowed only 34 trips inside the red zone, yielding just 28 scores (82.4%, 15 TDs and 13 FGs)
- The defense forced the opposition to move long distance to score, with 17 of the 25 touchdown drives requiring 75-plus yards
- U-M was dominant in second half, allowing just 104 points on 85 possessions (1.22 points per possession)

- Jay Harbaugh is in his fourth season as the program's Special Teams Coordinator after serving as an assistant the prior five seasons on staff
- The Wolverines return long snappers William Wagner and Greg Tarr from the 2022 corps of specialists; Wagner started 25 consecutive games prior to a season-ending injury at Iowa in 2022 and Tarr made nine starts to end the 2022 season
- Tommy Doman has been the team's backup punter, placekicker and kickoff specialist the past two seasons
- Doman is the only returning Michigan player that has punted, attempted a PAT or kicked off in a game for Michigan
- U-M added a pair of transfer specialists in kickers James Turner (Louisville) and Hudson Hollenbeck (Mississippi State)

Special Teams Play under Harbaugh

- Michigan had two specialists win individual national awards: Jake Moody (2021 Lou Groza Award) and Jabrill Peppers (2016 Paul Hornung Award)
- Three U-M specialists have been named the top performer in the Big Ten at their position: Jake Moody (2021 and 2021 Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year), Will Hart (2018 Eddleman-Field Punter of the Year) and Jabrill Peppers (2016 Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year)
- Moody finished his career as Michigan's all-time leading scorer with 355 points; tallied a school record 147 points in 2022
- Moody holds 13 schools records for kicking -- game, season or career marks
- The Wolverines have converted 150-184 field goals (81.5%) and 391-397 point-after-attempts
- U-M has 364 touchbacks on 664 kickoffs
- Michigan has punted the ball three or less times in 46 games, including four contests where the team did not attempt a punt: Hawaii (2016), Maryland (2016), Northern Illinois (2021) and Penn State (2022)
- The Wolverines have downed 144 punts inside the opposition's 20-yard line
- U-M has 20 blocks in the nine seasons that Coach Harbaugh has led the program
- Michigan led the Big Ten and finished second nationally with seven blocked kicks in 2016: one PAT, two FGs and four punts; an additional three punts were deflected and rolled for positive yards while another opponent punt hit into the back of its own player
- Led the NCAA with four blocked punts in 2016
- Michigan has scored 10 touchdowns on returns during Harbaugh's tenure, scoring five times on kickoffs and five times on punt returns

- Moody won the 2021 Bakken-Andersen Big Ten Kicker of the Year award for the second straight season and earned All-Big Ten first team honors
- Moody collected second-team All-American honors from the Walter Camp Football Foundation, American Football Coaches Association and Associated Press
- Brad Robbins was a semifinalist for the 2021 Ray Guy Award and was a candidate for this year's award
- Moody was second in the NCAA in total points scored with a school record 147 and was also second in scoring at 10.5 points per game
- Moody set U-M records in field goals scored (29), field goals attempted (35), PATs scored and attempted (60) and 40-yard-plus field goals (10)

2022 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- The Wolverines listed No. 3 in the final rankings for the second straight season; the only other times that Michigan ranked in the top 5 of the polls in consecutive seasons was 1947 and 1948, when it captured back-to-back national championships, and 1940 (No. 3) and 1941 (No. 5).
- U-M won its league-leading 44th conference title and played in the College Football Playoff for the second time.
- Michigan won 13 games for the first time in school history, surpassing the previous mark of 12 wins attained during the 1905, 1997 and 2021 seasons.
- Center Olu Oluwatimi and running back Blake Corum earned consensus All-America honors. Edge Mike Morris and kicker Jake Moody earned second-team All-America.
- Oluwatimi won the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman and the Rimington Trophy as the top center in college football.
- Corum finished seventh in the Heisman Trophy balloting and won the Chicago Tribune Silver Football as the Big Ten's MVP as voted by the conference coaches. He was also a finalist for the Doak Walker Award as the nation's top running back.
- The offensive line won the Joe Moore Award as the nation's top unit for the second straight season.
- Corum was named the Big Ten's Running Back of the Year, Mike Morris was voted the Big Ten's Defensive Lineman of the Year and Moody was selected as the Big Ten's Kicker of the Year for the second straight season.
- U-M had 15 players (8 offense, 5 defense, 2 special teams) recognized with first, second or team all-conference accolades this season and seven Wolverines collected honorable mention honors.
- Michigan was led by seven players earning first-team All-Big Ten honors: Blake Corum, Trevor Keegan, Jake Moody, Olu Oluwatimi, Mike Morris, Mazi Smith and Zak Zinter.
- The Wolverines outscored the opposition 566 to 225 margin, finishing sixth in the NCAA in scoring offense (40.4 ppg.) and seventh in scoring defense (16.1 ppg.).
- Moody was second in the nation and set the Michigan season record with 147 points on the year. A finalist for the Lou Groza Award, Moody set program season records in 2022 for field goals scored (29), field goals attempted (35), PATs scored and attempted (60) and 40-yard-plus field goals (10).
- Moody became the U-M's all-time leading scorer with 355 points, hitting 69-84 field goals and all 148 PATs.
- Right guard Zak Zinter earned Academic All-America second team honors.
- Michigan matched its program record with 60 Academic All-Big performers this fall.
- Jim Harbaugh was named the Big Ten's Coach of the Year and defensive coordinator Jesse Minter was a finalist for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach.

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2023 (96 Years)

The football program is in its 96th season in the "Big House" in 2022, with a 454-133-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 44 times of the past 47 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 310 consecutive games; the current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 53,286,418 fans have watched the Wolverines play at Michigan Stadium. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 310 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000; current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

MICHIGAN'S NFL FACTS AND INFORMATION

- Michigan had 59 players participating in 2023 NFL training camps
- A total of 53 Wolverines have been drafted during Coach Jim Harbaugh's tenure, including nine (9) first-round picks and 25 players chosen in the first three rounds
- During Harbaugh's tenure, Michigan has had 61 participants in the NFL Combine, including a record 14 players in 2017 and 11 in 2020
- Michigan is the only school to have a player selected in every NFL Draft; 85 consecutive selection meetings with a Wolverine chosen
- Since the inaugural draft in 1938, a total of 401 Michigan players have been selected; ranks fifth-best all-time among college programs
- A total of 60 players have been chosen in the first round of the professional draft: 52 NFL, 5 AAFC and 3 AFL
- Tom Harmon (1941) and Jake Long (2008) were the first overall picks in the NFL Draft
- U-M has had a first round pick six of the past seven drafts, including multiple first round selection in three of those drafts
- 10 Wolverines selected in the first round of the NFL Draft are still active
- Michigan leads the Big Ten with 11 individuals having been inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame: Elroy Hirsch (1968), Bill Hewitt (1971), Len Ford (1976), Dan Dierdorf (1996), Tom Mack (1999), George Allen (2002), Benny Friedman (2005), Ralph Wilson (2012), Ty Law (2019), Steve Hutchinson (2020) and Charles Woodson (2021)

Now in his ninth year as head coach, Jim Harbaugh has led Michigan to back-to-back Big Ten Championships and College Football Playoff appearances (2021-22).

U-M won a school record 13 games in 2022, surpassing the 12-win seasons attained by the 1905, 1997 and 2021 teams. The Wolverines listed No. 3 in the final national polls for the second straight season which was only the third time in school history where the program finished in the top 5 in consecutive years.

Overall, Harbaugh has guided the Wolverines to a 74-25 record and is 53-17 in Big Ten games. He has led U-M to five 10-win seasons and seven bowl games, including consecutive College Football Playoff Semifinal appearances (2021-22), two New Year's Six bowls and three additional New Year's Day bowl games. His teams have finished the season ranked in the national polls on six occasions, including three finishes in the top 10.

Thirteen Wolverines have secured 17 All-America honors under Harbaugh, including nine consensus honorees: Devin Bush, Jake Butt, Maurice Hurst, Jourdan Lewis, Jabrill Peppers, Aidan Hutchinson, Jake Moody, Blake Corum and Olu Oluwatimi. Hutchinson (second place, 2021) and Peppers (fifth place, 2016) were also Heisman Trophy finalists while Corum finished seventh in the 2022 balloting.

Five players have won major awards during Harbaugh's tenure: Butt (2016 Mackey Award, Senior CLASS Award), Peppers (2016 Lott IMPACT Trophy and Paul Hornung Award), Hutchinson (2021 Rotary Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Award, Lott IMPACT Trophy), Moody (2021 Lou Groza Award) and Oluwatimi (2022 Outland Trophy and Rimington Trophy). Overall, eight have been finalists for 12 different honors.

A total of 95 Wolverines have earned All-Big Ten honors, with 30 players earning first-team all-conference honors. A record 16 players collected All-Big Ten honors in 2016 and 15 Wolverines received the honor during the 2018, 2019, 2021 and 2022 seasons. In the classroom, Michigan has totaled 344 Academic All-Big Ten honors, including a program-record 60 in 2021 and 2022.

During Harbaugh's tenure, Michigan has produced three of the five most-productive offensive seasons in school history. U-M has had a top-12 national defense in six seasons and a top-three unit on three occasions.

Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in Michigan football history on Dec. 30, 2014. He became the sixth Michigan football player selected to lead college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh came to Ann Arbor after a four-year run in the NFL with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the NFC title in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record, including 5-3 in the postseason.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular-season record and the NFC Championship Game in 2011, his first season, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular-season mark in 2012, culminating

with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only matchup of brothers as head coaches in NFL history.

At the collegiate level, Harbaugh spent three years at the University of San Diego (2004-06) and four years at Stanford (2007-10). He turned around a Cardinal program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory in 2010. In his debut as a head coach, Harbaugh led San Diego to a 29-6 record in three seasons.

He spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the Oakland Raiders' quarterbacks coach, assisting the team to Super Bowl XXXVII.

Harbaugh began preparing for a coaching career during his professional playing days, spending eight years as an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001).

As an NFL quarterback, Harbaugh played for five organizations in his 15-year career (1987-2001). He threw for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games and made 140 career starts. He was the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. In 2005, he was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor.

As a Wolverine, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished runner-up the following year. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for more than 12 years.

In 1986, Harbaugh won the "Chicago Tribune" Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, was a first-team All-American and finished third in Heisman Trophy voting.

The first Michigan quarterback to throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin), Harbaugh also eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against Michigan State and Ohio State. During his college career, he completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns; all four statistical categories still list among the top 12 in school history.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison

and Katherine, and two sons, Jack and John. He also has three adult children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.
