• Kalel Mullings is pacing the rushing game with 710 yards on 131 carries and has scored seven TDs.
• Dominic Zvada leads the team in scoring with 49 points; 10-11 on FGs and 19-20 on PATs.
• Ernest Hausmann leads the team in tackles (66) and has 10-plus stops in three of the last four games.

145th Season of Michigan Football

The 2024 season marks the 145th year of intercollegiate football for the University of Michigan football program. The Wolverines have an NCAA-leading 1,009 victories, claimed 45 Big Ten Championships and won 12 national titles since the inception of the program in 1879.

Wolverines and Hoosiers

This will be the 73rd meeting between Michigan and Indiana. The Wolverines have a 62-10 advantage (86%) in

the all-time series. U-M has won 27 of the past 29 games against IU and has claimed victories in 42 of the last 44 contests. The only setbacks came in 1987 and 2020.

Michigan vs. Indiana at Memorial Stadium

The Wolverines have dominated the series with the Hoosiers at Memorial Stadium, posting a 20-2 all-time mark. Michigan has won 12 of the past 13 games at the facility. Its only losses in the 22 previous games at Memorial Stadium were a 14-10 setback to the 15th-ranked Hoosiers in 1987 and a 38-21 loss to 13th-ranked IU during the 2020 COVID season.

Wolverines from the Hoosier State

Michigan has two players that hail from the state of Indiana, freshman DB Jo'Ziah Edmond (Indianapolis) and junior DL Kenneth Grant (Merrillville).

THE 2024 SEASON

Michigan-Indiana Series History

- This will be the 73rd meeting in the all-time series with Indiana
- Michigan's .861 winning percentage against Indiana is the program's highest versus any conference school
- The Wolverines lead the series, 62-10, and have won 27 of the past 28 games against the Hoosiers
- Michigan has won 42 of the previous 44 games played between the two schools
- The last U-M loss was a 38-21 setback in Bloomington during the 2020 COVID season, ending a 24-game winning streak in the series for the Wolverines

Michigan vs. Indiana at Memorial Stadium

- The Wolverines have dominated the series with a 20-2 mark all-time at Memorial Stadium
- U-M won the last meeting between the two programs in Bloomington, a 31-10 victory during the 2022 season
- Michigan has won 12 of the past 13 games at the facility; only loss during the stretch was a 38-21 setback during the 2020 COVID season
- Its only losses in the 22 previous games at Memorial Stadium were a 14-10 setback to the 15th-ranked Hoosiers in 1987 and a 38-21 loss to 13th-ranked IU during the 2020 season

U-M Unranked in National Polls

- For the third straight week, Michigan is unranked in the national polls
- The Wolverines had been listed in the national rankings for 54 straight polls dating back to the second poll of 2021
- Michigan ranked eighth in the coaches poll and ninth in the media poll at the start of the 2024 season
- The Maize and Blue finished atop the polls in 2023 after defeating No. 2 Washington in the CFP National Championship Game; started the season ranked No. 2 and never listed outside the top three all year
- U-M ranked in the top 10 of the polls for 45 straight rankings which was its longest string in more than 20 years: 2 (2024), 16 (2023), 16 (2022) and the final 11 in 2021
- Michigan was listed in the top five of the national polls for a school record 32 straight rankings (2021-23); streak was snapped with the 2024 preseason rankings
- The Wolverines have been ranked for 107 of their last 124 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season
- U-M ranked in the top three of the final polls each of the past three seasons - No. 1 in 2023 and No. 3 in both 2021 and 2022; this is the first time in school history that the program finished the year ranked in the top 5 for three consecutive seasons

2024 Schedule Notes

- The Wolverines face one of college football's toughest schedules during the 2024 season
- U-M has faced four ranked opponents so far this season, posting a 1-3 record: #1 Oregon (L, 17-38), #22 Illinois (L, 7-21), #11 USC (W, 27-24)

and #3 Texas (L, 12-31)

- Four of the Wolverines' foes were ranked in the preseason AP Top 25 poll including three teams listing in the Top 5: No. 2 Ohio State, No. 3 Oregon, No. 4 Texas and No. 23 USC
- The Maize and Blue's 12 regular season opponents combined to post a 98-59 overall record (.624) in 2023; four of those opponents finished in the top 10 of the AP poll: No. 2 Washington, No. 4 Texas, No. 7 Oregon and No. 10 Ohio State
- Nine of the Wolverines' 12 opponents played in bowl games last season
- Michigan will face three of the four new teams in the Big Ten: USC, Washington and Oregon
- U-M is one of 15 FBS schools not playing an FCS opponent this season
- Michigan will host three rivalry trophy games during the 2024 season: Little Brown Jug (Minnesota), Paul Bunyan Trophy (Michigan State) and George Jewett Trophy (Northwestern)
- The Wolverines retained the first of their three rivalry trophies with a 27-24 victory over Minnesota (Sept. 28)
- U-M kept the Paul Bunyan Trophy in Ann Arbor for the third consecutive year, defeating in-state rival Michigan State by a 24-17 score (Oct. 26)

U-M Wins 2023 National Championship

- Michigan made its first appearance in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game, defeating Washington by a 34-13 score to claim its 12th national title in program history
- Michigan became the second Big Ten team to win a national championship in the College Football Playoff era (Ohio State, 2014)
- Since the inception of the CFP in 2015, Michigan and Ohio State (2015 and 2021) are the only Big Ten schools to reach the National Championship Game
- Michigan's #2s were named the players of the game, with RB Blake Corum collecting the offensive honors and DB Will Johnson receiving the defensive accolades
- RB Donovan Edwards became the first player in CFP title game history to score two rushing touchdowns of 40-plus yards with his 41- and 46-yard scampers in the first half; the scores were the second and third longest in championship game history
- Corum (134 yards, 2 TDs) and Edwards (104 yards, 2 TDs) became the first duo to gain 100 yards in a championship game, and it was the second time a team featured two players with multiple rushing TDs (2022 Georgia)
- The offense finished with a season-high and CFP title game record 303 rushing yards
- DB Mike Sainristil sealed the victory with his team-leading sixth interception of the season and returned it 81 yards to setup a Corum touchdown in the fourth quarter

U-M All-Time in the College Football Playoff

- U-M has a 2-2 record all-time in the College Football Playoff: 1-0 in the championship game and 1-2 in the semifinals
- The Wolverines are the only Big Ten school to advance to the College Football Playoff three straight years (2021-22-23)
- Michigan joined Alabama (2015-19), Clemson (2016-20) and Oklahoma (2018-20) as the only

programs to reach the playoff at least three consecutive seasons

- U-M reached No. 1 in the final 2023 CFP rankings for the first time in school history following its 26-0 victory over No. 18 Iowa
- Prior to 2023, the Wolverines played in the CFP semifinal the previous two seasons: lost to No. 3 Georgia in the 2021 Orange Bowl (31-16) and to No. 3 TCU in the 2022 Fiesta Bowl (51-45)
- Michigan is one of only three Big Ten schools to qualify for the CFP: Ohio State and Michigan State are the others

Rose Bowl Champions

- Michigan won its ninth Rose Bowl with a come-from-behind 27-20 victory in overtime against Alabama to advance to the CFP National Championship Game
- RB Blake Corum scored the eventual game-winning touchdown on a 17-yard run on the second play of U-M's first overtime possession
- The defense held Alabama out of the end zone on four tries inside the nine-yard line to earn a spot in the national championship game
- QB J.J. McCarthy was named the Rose Bowl Offensive Player of the Game and DT Mason Graham was selected as the Rose Bowl Defensive Player of the Game
- The Rose Bowl was U-M's third bowl game to go to overtime in school history; the Wolverines are a perfect 3-0, defeating the Crimson Tide in the 2000 Orange Bowl and 2023 Rose Bowl and beating Virginia Tech in the 2012 Sugar Bowl
- The defense held Alabama to a season low 288 total offensive yards (previous was 306)

Big Ten Champions

- Michigan enters the 2024 season as the three-time defending Big Ten Champions
- The Wolverines captured their league-leading 45th conference title with a 26-0 win over No. 18 Iowa in the 2023 Big Ten Championship Game
- With the win over Iowa, the Maize and Blue won three straight outright Big Ten titles for the first time in school history
- The Wolverines have won the third most conference titles in college football history, trailing only Oklahoma (50) and Nebraska (46)
- U-M has posted 9-0 conference marks in consecutive seasons (2022-23), accomplishing the feat for the first time in school history

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- Michigan has led the nation in attendance 46 of the past 49 seasons; only years that U-M did not lead the country in attendance was 1997, 2014 and 2020
- U-M has drawn 100,000-plus fans for 322 straight games at Michigan Stadium (since Nov. 8, 1975)
- The Wolverines averaged 109,971 fans at their seven games played at Michigan Stadium in 2023; had 769,797 fans attend the seven home contests
- In 2023, Michigan had 373,921 patrons in attendance at its five Big Ten road tilts for an average of 74,784 fans per game
- The 110,856 fans at Penn State was the largest crowd that U-M had ever played in front of on the road
- The 2023 Big Ten Championship Game at Lucas Oil Stadium broke the all-time attendance record as 67,842 fans witnessed the Wolverines' 26-0 victory over Iowa
- The CFP Semifinal in the Rose Bowl Game against Alabama drew a sellout crowd of 96,371 fans
- The CFP National Championship Game against Washington at NRG Stadium in Houston had a sellout crowd of 72,808 fans
- Michigan played in front of more than a million fans during the 15-game schedule in 2023 (1,380,739)

College Football's Top TV Draw

- U-M has played in a NCAA record 593 televised and streamed football games, compiling a 397-188-8 record
- "The Game" between Michigan and Ohio State in 2023 drew a television audience of 19.07 million fans, the top rated game of the 2023 football regular season
- Michigan was involved in three of the 10 highest rated games during the 2023 season
- Every single football game since 1995 has been televised or streamed, a streak of 366 consecutive broadcasts
- The Wolverines have played 345 nationally televised football games over the year
- The very first televised U-M football game came on Sept. 27, 1947, a 55-0 shutout of rival Michigan State on WWJ TV in Detroit

Jordan Brand

- The Michigan Football program is in its eighth season wearing brand Jordan apparel
- U-M was the first college and/or professional football program to wear Jordan on its uniforms and sideline apparel, starting with the 2016 season
- The Wolverines were joined by North Carolina as Jordan football schools in 2017; Oklahoma and Florida were outfitted by Jordan starting with the 2018 season
- Jordan outfits Michigan from head-to-toe on all apparel needs for the football and basketball programs
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

THE TEAM

- U-M has won 45 of its last 52 football games dating back to the start of the 2021 season
- The Wolverines have a 29-4 record in Big Ten play since 2021; does not include three victories in the conference championship game
- The Maize and Blue had its school record 24-game winning streak in conference play end with its 27-17 setback at Washington; surpassed the 19-game mark set from 1990-92 under coach Gary Moeller
- The Wolverines won a record 28 consecutive regular season games, equaling the 28-game streaks held by Michigan (1901-03) and Ohio State (2005-07) for the longest winning streaks in Big Ten history; snapped with its loss to Texas
- Michigan had the nation's longest winning streak at 16 games; won a school record 15 contests in 2023 en route to the national championship and posted a 30-10 win over Fresno State in the 2024 season opener before suffering a loss to Texas
- The Wolverines have won 11 of their last 13 road games in the Big Ten; had an 11-game winning streak snapped at Washington (was tied for the fifth longest streak in Big Ten history)
- U-M has won 17 of its last 19 night games and had an 11-game winning streak during that time

Michigan in Big Ten Action

- The Wolverines' enter the Indiana game riding a 25-3 record in league play over their last 28 regular season games
- The program had its 24-game winning streak - 27 contests if you count three Big Ten Championship Games - end with a loss at Washington earlier this year
- U-M has claimed wins in 31 of its last 35 games against conference schools
- Michigan has a 66-20 mark in Big Ten action in its last 86 games; 33-9 at home, 30-11 on the road and 3-0 in neutral site contests
- The 24-game winning streak surpassed the previous mark of 19 games spanning the 1990-92 seasons
- The conference only counts the Michigan streak at 24 games as it doesn't count the Big Ten Championship Game as a league game; U-M won the 2021, 2022 and 2023 title games during the current streak

Winning at the Big House

- Michigan has won 25 of its last 27 games at Michigan Stadium, dating back to the start of the 2021 season
- A 23-game winning streak ended with a setback to Texas earlier this season
- The 23-game winning streak at the Big House was the program's best since a 28-game streak from 1969-73 under Bo Schembechler
- Michigan claimed three straight undefeated seasons at home, posting a perfect 8-0 record in 2022 and 7-0 slates in 2021 and 2023
- U-M has finished the season unblemished at home on 26 occasions since 1940, including the 1973 and 1992 seasons where they recorded ties at home
- The Wolverines posted a perfect home record five times under Jim Harbaugh: 7-0 (2023), 8-0

(2022), 7-0 (2021), 7-0 (2018) and 8-0 (2016)

Team Captains

- Four players were voted 2024 captains for the Wolverines: Max Bredeson and Donovan Edwards on offense and Makari Paige and Rod Moore on defense
- Josiah Stewart was added as a season captain by head coach Sherrone Moore during the bye week as the team needed more on-field leadership with Rod Moore being unable to play
- Kaleb Mullings and Stewart were voted alternate captains for Team 145
- Max Bredeson joins his brother Ben Bredeson (2018-19) as captains for the Wolverines
- Edwards and Paige are the first set of high school teammates to be voted captains in the same season

2024 Roster Nuggets

- U-M has 67 returning lettermen from 2023: 31 on offense, 31 on defense and five specialists
- The 2024 roster features 99 players who have seen collegiate game action; 98 of those individual have stepped onto the field in the winged helmet

- Michigan had 46 players earn Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2023 after setting a school record with 60 student-athletes achieving the honor during the 2021 and 2022 seasons
- Zak Zinter was a 2023 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award recipient and was a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy
- Zinter also earned Academic first-team All-American honors from College Sports Communicators (CSC); Zinter, Tommy Doman and Jake Thaw all earned Academic All-District from CSC

THE OFFENSE

A Look at the 2024 Offense

- The offense is led by first-year offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Kirk Campbell; this is Campbell's second season coaching the quarterbacks after working as an analyst in 2022
- Michigan's offense has 22 players with at least one starting assignment during their career
- U-M returned one starter from the 2023 season: TE Colston Loveland
- Michigan is averaging 2.5 rushing TDs per game over its last 42 contests (105 total; 11 in 2024, 40 in 2023, 41 in 2022, and 13 in the final four games of 2021)
- Loveland is the nation's top returning tight end; earned first-team All-Big Ten in 2023
- A total of 13 players have carried the ball in a collegiate game: RBs Donovan Edwards, Tavierre Dunlap, Kalel Mullings, Cole Cabana, Henry Donohue and Benjamin Hall, WRs Semaj Morgan and Fred Moore, TE Colston Loveland and QBs Jack Tuttle, Davis Warren, Jayden Denegal and Alex Orji
- Four Wolverines have scored rushing touchdowns in their careers, combining for 35 scores; Edwards leads the group with 18 rushing TDs and is followed by Mullings (11), Orji (4) and Morgan (2)
- Orji, Tuttle, Warren and Denegal have seen action at quarterback during their career
- U-M has 13 players with a reception in their careers: WRs Kendrick Bell, CJ Charleston, Tyler Morris, Fred Moore, Semaj Morgan and Peyton O'Leary; TEs Colston Loveland, Marlin Klein and Hogan Hansen; FB/TE Max Bredeson and RBs Edwards, Hall Mullings
- Six Wolverines have scored receiving TDs in their career, combining for 23 end zone trips: Loveland (10), Edwards (4), Morgan (3), Morris (3), O'Leary (2) and Hansen (1)
- Loveland leads the offense with 22 career starts at tight end

Rushing Offense Kicking into Gear

- Michigan's has established the ground game over the course of the season
- The offense has gained 1,486 yards on 324 carries (4.6 avg.) and has scored 11 rushing TDs
- The Wolverines are 62nd nationally in rushing offense at 165.1 yards per contest
- U-M has rushed for more than 150 yards in four games including three Big Ten contests
- The team gained a season-high 301 yards against Arkansas State and rushed for 290 yards vs. USC
- All 11 rushing scores have come in the last seven games with its season-high three TDs on the ground coming vs. Arkansas State and USC
- The offense has 11 rushing plays over 20 yards including five for scores

QUARTERBACKS

- Michigan has four quarterbacks with playing experience: Jack Tuttle, Davis Warren, Alex Orji and Jayden Denegal
- The Wolverines have thrown for 1,209 yards and 10 touchdowns in 2024; averaging 134.3 yards per contest

THE DEFENSE

A Look at the 2024 Defense

- The defense is led by first-year defensive coordinator Wink Martindale, who spent the past 20 years coaching in the NFL
- The Wolverines have 17 defenders that started at least one game in their career, including eight (8) players that have started at least 15 contests
- 44 defensive players have recorded at least one tackle during their career
- Rod Moore leads the defense with 141 career tackles (90 solos, 51 assists) while Makari Paige is second with 122 stops (58, 64); Wesley Walker (201 tackles) and Aamir Hall (190) have recorded triple digits in stops at their previous schools and Michigan
- A total of 27 Wolverine defenders recorded stops in the opposition's backfield during their career, led by Josaiah Stewart (43.5; 18.0 at Michigan), Mason Graham (16.0) and Wesley Walker (11.0; 9.0 at Tennessee and 2.0 at Georgia Tech)
- The 27 players have combined to post 168.0 TFLs over their careers; 109.0 of those stops in the backfield were made in a Michigan uniform
- 14 players have combined to register 74.5 sacks during their collegiate careers: Stewart (28.0; 12.0 at U-M), Mason Graham (9.0), Derrick Moore (9.0), Jaishawn Barham (7.0; 7.0 at Maryland), Kenneth Grant (5.5), T.J. Guy (4.5), Rayshaun Benny (2.5), Wesley Walker (2.0; 2.0 at Tennessee), Aamir Hall (1.5; 1.5 at Richmond), Ernest Hausmann (2.0; 1.0 at Nebraska), Cameron Brandt (1.0), Jyaire Hill (1.0), Makari Paige (1.0) and Rod Moore (0.5)
- 13 Wolverines have collected interceptions in their career, led by Will Johnson (9) and Rod Moore (6); Aamir Hall (7), Ricky Johnson (4) and Jaden Mangham (4) all collected multiple interceptions at their previous schools
- Will Johnson leads the team with 19 career passes defended: 10 breakups and nine interceptions
- 25 players collected at least one pass breakup in their career: W. Johnson (10), Grant (10), R. Moore (7), Paige (7), Q. Johnson (8), J. Hill (7), D. Moore (4), Berry (3), Graham (3), A. - 10 defenders have scooped up an opponent fumble: Grant leads the team with three recoveries while Berry, D. Moore, Graham, Grant and Paige have one each; Barham, R. Johnson, Mangham and Walker had fumble recoveries at their previous schools
- Two Wolverines have scored defensive touchdowns: Will Johnson (3 Ints.) and Derrick Moore on a 4-yard fumble recovery at Maryland (2023)
- Johnson holds the Michigan record for most interception returns for a touchdown in a career: 36-yard interception at Minnesota (2023), 86-yard return vs. Fresno State (2024) and 42-yard score vs. USC (2024)
- Eight (8) defenders have started double-digit

career games: R. Moore (28), Paige (28), W. Johnson (22) and Graham (23); Jaishawn Barham (31), Wesley Walker (26), Josaiah Stewart (24) and Ernest Hausmann (14) have also achieved the double-digit starts mark between starts at Michigan and their previous institutions

Stingy Against the Run

- Michigan's front has been adept at stopping the run this season, listing 23rd nationally by allowing just 109.3 yards per contest
- The opposition has rushed 277 times for 984 yards
- U-M registered 198 negative yards on 53 tackles for loss, allowing just 3.6 yards per carry
- The defense has held four opponents to less than 100 yards including three teams to less than 60 yards: Fresno State (9 yards), Arkansas State (58 yards) and Minnesota (38 yards)
- The Wolverines have allowed 10 rushing touchdowns: Texas (1), Minnesota (2), Washington (1), Illinois (1), Michigan State (1) and Oregon (4)
- Illinois gained a season-high 187 yards on the ground against the defense

Making Stops in the Backfield

- The Wolverines have registered 53 tackles for loss this season for a total of 218 yards lost by the opposition
- The defense has turned up the heat in Big Ten play, tallying 40 stops in the backfield over six contests
- U-M tallied a season-high nine TFLs against Minnesota after posting eight against USC and Illinois
- The Maize and Blue has 6-plus tackles for loss in six overall contests; recorded at least three TFLs in every game
- 18 different players have contributed a stop in the backfield with all three levels getting into the act this fall: defensive line (33.5), linebackers (7.5) and defensive backs (12.0)
- Josaiah Stewart leads the Big Ten and is third nationally in tackles for loss (1.6 avg.)
- Stewart (11.0), Mason Graham (6.5), Jyaire Hill (5.5) and Kenneth Grant (5.0) are pacing the defense

Sacking the Quarterback

- The defense has posted 21 sacks on the year and is 40th nationally in sacks (2.33 per game)
- 17 of those 21 sacks have come in Big Ten games
- The Wolverines registered a season-high five sacks against Minnesota and contributed four-sack efforts against USC and Washington
- U-M has posted 3+ sacks in five games

Batting Down Passes

- The Wolverines have collected 38 pass break-ups including at least two in every contest

- 16 different players have broken up passes this year including six different defensive linemen/edge rushers
- U-M registered a season-high eight breakups in back-to-back games: Arkansas State and USC
- Jyaire Hill leads the team with eight total passes defended (7 PBUs and one interception) and Kenneth Grant is second with four PBUs
- Grant has posted 10 breakups during his career which is a Michigan record for a defensive lineman

EDGE

- Nine edge defenders have seen game action during their careers
- Three edge defenders have started games at Michigan: Derrick Moore (8), Josaiah Stewart (8) and TJ Guy (2); Stewart made 17 starts at Coastal Carolina
- Stewart leads the group in games played (48) including 23 contests in a Michigan uniform

A LOOK BACK AT THE 2023 DEFENSE

- Michigan had two defensive backs earn first-team All-American honors: Mike Sainristil and Will Johnson
- Defensive tackles Kris Jenkins and Mason Graham earned second-team All-American honors
- U-M had eight (8) defensive players recognized with first, second or third team All-Big Ten honors: 3 first team, 3 second team and 2 third team
- LB Junior Colson won the 2023 Lott IMPACT Trophy, becoming the third Wolverine to receive the honor in the past eight seasons: Jabrill Peppers (2016) and Aidan Hutchinson (2021) were the others to win the award
- The Wolverines led the nation in scoring defense (10.4 avg., 156 total points); yielded less than 10 points in nine games, including seven of those contests allowing less than seven points
- Opponents averaged 0.173 points per play, the lowest rate in the nation
- Michigan yielded less than 10 points in each of its first eight games of 2023; this was the longest such streak by any U-M team since 1972
- U-M allowed 30 scores (17 TDs, 13 FGs) in 168 possessions by the opposition; five of those drives started in Michigan territory with four gaining points: one touchdown by Alabama, two field goals by Purdue and another field goal by Bowling Green
- The Wolverines yielded just 0.929 points per possession by the opposition
- Michigan led nation in total defense, allowing just 247.0 yards per contest; yielded just 3,705 yards on 865 offensive plays
- U-M allowed an average of 4.3 yards per play, including a stingy 3.0 yards per rush and 5.7 yards per pass play
- Michigan's run defense was one of the nation's best, ranking fifth nationally and second in the Big Ten (allowed just 90.0 yards per game)
- U-M limited the opposition to 1,350 yards on 450 carries, allowing just 3.0 yards per carry
- The pass defense was one of the best in college football, listing second nationally in pass defense (157.0 avg.) while listing third in pass efficiency (100.53 rating)
- The opposition threw for just 2,355 yards on 229-of-415 passing with eight touchdowns and 18 interceptions (allowed just 5.7 yards per attempt)
- U-M held eight teams to less than 150 passing yards
- The defense intercepted 18 passes and accumulated 51 pass breakups
- Michigan registered 420 negative yards on 83 tackles for loss including 39 sacks
- The defense recorded a season-high 10 tackles for loss in three games -- UNLV, BGSU and Alabama -- and had a conference-best nine TFLs at Michigan State
- Michigan yielded just 24 points in the third quarter and didn't allow any points in the first 10 games during the third stanza
- The opposition possessed the ball 44 times during the third quarter against the Wolverines and only tallied three TDs and one FG while the defense set up Michigan's offense with scoring opportunities to the tune of 146 points (forced 21 three-and-outs)
- The Wolverines were a dominant second-half defense, allowing just 71 points on 77 possessions (0.92 points per possession)
- U-M yielded only 24 points in the third quarter and allowed only 47 points in the fourth quarter
- Michigan limited its opponents to three plays or less on 45 percent of their possessions, forcing 56 three-and-outs by the opposition in 168 possessions

A Look at the 2024 Special Teams

- JB Brown is in his first season as the program's Special Teams Coordinator after serving as an analyst the prior two seasons on staff
- The Wolverines return punter Tommy Doman and long snappers William Wagner and Greg Tarr from the 2023 corps of specialists
- Doman was the team's starting punter and kickoff specialist in 2023 after serving as the team's backup during the 2021-22 seasons
- U-M added transfer kicker Dominic Zvada from Arkansas State; was a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award in 2022
- Zvada has converted a school-record-tying four field goals over 50 yards so far this season (52, 53, 55 and 53)
- Zvada and SMU's Collin Rogers are the FBS kickers with four-plus successful conversions at 50-plus yards
- It is the third year in a row where a U-M kicker converted three 50-plus-yard field goals in a season (Moody 2022, Turner 2023 and Zvada 2024)
- Zvada leads the team in scoring with 49 points; 10-11 on field goals and 19-20 on PATs
- 26 of Doman's 41 kickoffs have been touchbacks
- Doman is averaging 41.6 yards on his 40 punts this season with 13 inside the opponent's 20-yard line and seven punts of 50-plus yards
- The Wolverines have allowed only five kickoff returns for 83 yards (16.6 avg.)
- U-M blocked a punt against Minnesota that led to a touchdown (Kechaun Bennett)

2023 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- Michigan won the 2023 National Championship, claiming the 12th national title in program history.
- U-M received the College Football Playoff National Championship Trophy, American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Trophy, Associated Press (AP) Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl as the 2023 national champions.
- The Wolverines ended the season with a perfect 15-0 record, a single-season program record.
- The 2023 season was the winningest in Michigan history. U-M's 28 wins over the past two seasons (2022-23) and 40 wins over the past three seasons (2021-23) are program records over two- and three-year stretches.
- Michigan is the first national championship team to lead at halftime in every one of its games since the 2001 University of Miami squad.
- U-M captured its league-leading 45th Big Ten Championship with a 26-0 shutout of Iowa; it marked the first time in program history with three consecutive outright conference titles.
- RG Zak Zinter earned consensus All-American honors. In addition to Zinter, Michigan had three additional players earn first-team All-American honors: RB Blake Corum and DBs Mike Sainristil and Will Johnson. DTs Kris Jenkins and Mason Graham collected second-team honors.
- Michigan was the only school with two players finishing in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy balloting: Blake Corum (9th) and J.J. McCarthy (10th).
- LB Junior Colson won the Lott IMPACT Trophy while Corum was voted captain of the AFCA Good Works Team and was one of three winners of the Comeback Player of the Year award.
- Michigan had 19 players (9 offense, 8 defense, 2 specialists) recognized with first, second or third team All-Big Ten honors this fall.
- The defense led the NCAA in scoring defense (10.4 avg.), total defense (247.0 avg.) and defensive touchdowns (5), while listing second in pass defense (157.0 avg.) and third in pass efficiency defense (100.53 rating) and interceptions (18). Overall, U-M was top 10 in 12 defensive categories.
- The Wolverines also led the nation in fewest penalties per game (3.0 avg.) and turnover margin (1.27 avg.).
- Corum led the nation in scoring with 168 points after finishing first with 27 rushing TDs and 28 total scores.
- QB J.J. McCarthy finished sixth nationally in completion percentage (72.3%) and ninth in pass efficiency (167.4 rating); both are single-season Michigan records.
- DB Mike Sainristil set a school record with 232 return yards on six interceptions, with two of those picks being returned for a touchdown.
- Zinter earned first-team Academic All-American honors from the College Sports Communicators (CSC) and was a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete.

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2024 (97 Years)

The football program is in its 97th season in the "Big House" in 2022, with a 464-135-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 44 times of the past 47 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 322 consecutive games; the current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 -- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927, 54,501,850 fans have watched the Wolverines play at Michigan Stadium. Stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 322 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000; current streak was paused when health officials and government agencies limited fans at sporting events during the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

- The Wolverines had a record 13 players chosen in the 2024 NFL Draft, topping the previous mark of 11 players drafted in the 2017 draft
- A total of 66 Wolverines were drafted during Coach Jim Harbaugh's tenure (2016-24), including 10 first-round picks and 32 players chosen in the first three rounds

Sherrone Moore was named the 21st head coach in Michigan football history on January 26, 2024, following six years as a member of the offensive staff. Moore is the first African American head coach in the history of the program.

Before he was named head coach, Moore spent three years as the tight ends coach (2018-20), and three years as Donald Graham Offensive Line Coach (2021-23). He was also Sanford Robertson Offensive Coordinator in 2023 after two seasons as co-O.C. (2021-22), leading the Wolverines on the offensive side of the ball during an unprecedented run of success that included three consecutive Big Ten Championships (2021-22-23) and the 2023 National Title.

While Moore was coordinating the offense and coaching the line, U-M averaged 38.4 points, 207.5 rushing yards, 3.52 tackles for loss allowed, and 1.18 sacks allowed per game. The offense was a top-15 scoring unit in all three seasons and the rushing offense was top-15 twice while the unit ranked first or second in team rushing touchdowns in all three years. Under Moore, all five of the offensive line starters earned some form of All-Big Ten honors including six different first-team honorees. U-M also became the first program to win back-to-back Joe Moore Awards (2021-22) honoring the top offensive line in college football. U-M was top-five in TFLs allowed twice and top-30 in sacks allowed in all three seasons.

The line blocked for three straight 1,000-yard backs in Hassan Haskins (1,327 yards, 20 rushing touchdowns, 2021), Blake Corum (1,463, 18, 2022), and Corum again (1,245, 27, 2023). In 2021 and 2022, U-M nearly had a second 1,000-yard back in Corum (952 yards) and Donovan Edwards (991 yards). Moore oversaw the running production of the offensive line as Corum set single-season rushing touchdown (27), total touchdown (28) records in 2023 while he was the only player in FBS to score in every game of the season.

Moore produced four NFL draft picks at tight end (Zach Gentry, fifth round) and offensive line (Oluasegun Oluwatimi, fifth; Andrew Stueber, seventh; Ryan Hayes, seventh) as a position coach and helped guide Stueber (second team), Oluwatimi, and Zak Zinter (consensus) to All-American honors, including the Rimington Award winner and Michigan's first Outland Trophy recipient, Oluwatimi (2022).

Moore joined the Wolverine staff after four seasons at Central Michigan (2014-17). He was selected for and participated in the inaugural 35 Under 35 Coaches Leadership Institute sponsored by the American Football Coaches Association at their January 2018 convention. Working as an offensive coach throughout his career, Moore has worked with productive tight end groups at several stops, and his knowledge of the trenches has helped him transition into one of the premier offensive line coaches in the nation.

Six tight ends combined for 119 receptions, 1,611 yards, and 13 touchdowns in Moore's three seasons leading the position group at U-M. Those players had one season with third-team All-Big Ten honors and three seasons with all-conference honorable mention recognition.

Moore mentored the Chippewas tight ends during his four-year stay at CMU (2014-17) and added the duties of assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator during the 2017 season. He produced second-team (Ben McCord) and third-team (Tyler Conklin) All-MAC honorees with Conklin earning an NFL Scouting Combine invitation.

Moore spent five seasons at Louisville before joining the Central Michigan staff. He worked as a graduate assistant coach for three seasons (2009-11) before spending the final two years as the Cardinals' tight end coach (2012-13). During Moore's two seasons as a full-time assistant coach, Louisville had a 23-3 record with a BCS bowl appearance and a Big East title in 2012. As a graduate assistant, Moore helped the Cardinals to a pair of bowl appearances and helped develop All-BIG EAST first-team offensive guard Mark Wetterer. Moore also earned his master's degree in sports administration from Louisville.

Moore played two seasons along the offensive line for the University of Oklahoma (2006-07). He played in 14 games at offensive guard and helped the Sooners win two Big 12 Championships and played in two BCS bowl games. Before joining the Sooners, Moore was a two-year starter at Butler County (Kansas) Community College. He was a member of two conference championship teams the posted a 20-3 record. Moore earned second-team all-conference accolades.

Moore earned his bachelor's degree in communications from Oklahoma in 2008. He and his wife, Kelli, were married in 2015. Together, they have two daughters, Shiloh, and Solei.
