146th Season of Michigan Football

The 2025 season marks the 146th year of intercollegiate football for the University of Michigan football program. The Wolverines have an NCAA-leading 1,016 victories, claimed 45 Big Ten Championships and won 12 national titles since the inception of the program in 1879.

Series History: Wolverines and Huskies

This will be the 16th meeting between Michigan and Washington, and the 11th contest played during the regu-

lar season. U-M has a 9-6 advantage in the all-time series including wins in three of the last four games contested between the two programs. Washington won last season's matchup, 27-17 at Husky Stadium, in the inaugural meeting as Big Ten foes. Michigan defeated Washington, 34-13, in the 2024 College Football Playoff National Championship Game to win the 2023 national title.

U-M and UW at Michigan Stadium

This will be the sixth meeting between Michigan and Washington at the Big House. The Wolverines hold a 4-1 advantage in games played in Ann Arbor, winning games in 1953, 1969, 2002, and 2021 while suffering defeat in 1984. Overall, Michigan has a 6-4 mark against Washington in regular season matchups: 4-1 at home and 2-3 on the road.

THE 2025 SEASON

- Washington Series**
- This will be the 16th meeting between the Wolverines and the Huskies
 - U-M sports a 9-6 record against Washington and won three of the last four games contested between the two programs
 - Washington won last season's inaugural match-up as Big Ten foes, defeating the Wolverine by a 27-17 score at Husky Stadium
 - The last postseason meeting took place in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in Houston as the Wolverines defeated the Huskies, 34-13, on Jan. 8, 2024
 - The last regular season matchup at Michigan Stadium was a 31-10 victory for the Wolverines during the 2021 season
 - Michigan has compiled a 3-2 record against Washington in the bowl season, with four matchups coming in the Rose Bowl and the other in the CFP National Championship Game; won the 1981 and 1993 games while suffering setbacks in the 1978 and 1992 contests
 - U-M has a 4-1 mark against the Huskies at the Big House and has a 2-3 record at Washington

- U-M vs. UW in the Regular Season**
- This will be the 11th meeting between the two programs during the regular season
 - Michigan has won six of the 10 previous matchups, compiling a 4-1 record at Michigan Stadium and a 2-3 record at Husky Stadium
 - U-M won games at the Big House during the 1953, 1969, 2002 and 2021 season while suffering its only home defeat in 1984
 - Washington holds a 3-2 advantage at Husky Stadium, with the Huskies claiming wins in the last three meetings (1983, 2001 and 2024)
 - Michigan's victories in Seattle came during the 1954 and 1970 seasons

- 2025 Schedule Notes**
- Two of the Wolverines' 2025 foes were ranked in the preseason AP Top 25 poll: Ohio State (2nd) and Oklahoma (18th)
 - The Wolverines face one of college football's toughest schedules during the 2025 season, playing six home games and six road contests
 - U-M is one of 12 Power Conference teams facing six road tilts in 2025: BYU, California, Duke, Houston, North Carolina, SMU, Stanford, TCU, UCLA, Utah and West Virginia are the others
 - Michigan is playing six road games for just the second time in school history; posted a 6-0 road record in 1986 and is 1-2 this season
 - This is the first time in the modern era of Michigan football that the program will not play consecutive home games; the only other seasons that U-M did not play at least back-to-back home contests was 1924 and 1937
 - U-M played consecutive night games to open the season for the first time in school history; the Maize and Blue have a 53-29 all-time record in games starting after 5 pm local time
 - Five of the Wolverines' 12 opponents played in bowl games last season: Oklahoma (Armed Forces Bowl), Nebraska (Pinstripe Bowl), USC (Las Vegas Bowl), Washington (Sun Bowl) and Ohio State (CFP/Rose Bowl/NC Game)

- The Wolverines traveled to Norman, Okla., during the non-conference to face head coach Sherrone Moore's alma mater (L, 13-24)
- U-M is one of 10 FBS schools not playing an FCS opponent this season: the others are Colorado, Notre Dame, Sam Houston, Stanford, Texas, Tulane, UCLA, USC and Wisconsin
- Michigan will play three rivalry trophy games during the season: Paul Bunyan Trophy (Michigan State), George Jewett Trophy (Northwestern) and the Bussin' Bowl Trophy (Nebraska; W, 30-27)

- U-M Unranked in National Polls**
- Michigan enters the Washington game unranked in the top 25 of the national polls; received the most votes among teams not ranked in the AFCA Coaches poll and the second most votes among team outside of the top 25 in the AP media poll
 - The Wolverines have been ranked for 113 of their last 134 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season
 - Michigan has been ranked in the Associated Press national polls 934 times, the second-most of any program in college football
 - The Wolverines had been listed in the national rankings for 60 of the past 70 polls dating back to third game of the 2021 season; had a string of 54 straight rankings snapped in 2024
 - U-M ranked in the top 10 of the polls for 45 straight rankings which was its longest string in more than 20 years (2021-24); 34 of those rankings the Wolverines listed in the top 5
 - Michigan was listed in the top five of the national polls for a school record 32 straight rankings (2021-23); streak was snapped with the 2024 preseason rankings
 - U-M ranked in the top three of the final polls - No. 1 in 2023 and No. 3 in both 2021 and 2022; this was the first time in school history that the program finished the year ranked in the top 5 for three consecutive seasons

- Michigan in Big Ten Action**
- The Wolverines enter the Washington game riding a 29-5 record in league play over their last 34 regular season games
 - The program had its 24-game winning streak - 27 contests if you count three Big Ten Championship Games - end with a loss at Washington earlier last season (2024)
 - U-M has claimed wins in 35 of its last 41 games against conference schools
 - Michigan has a 70-22 mark in Big Ten action in its last 92 games; 35-9 at home, 32-13 on the road and 3-0 in neutral site contests
 - The 24-game winning streak surpassed the previous school record mark of 19 games spanning the 1990-92 seasons
 - The conference only counts the Michigan streak at 24 games as it doesn't count the Big Ten Championship Game as a league game; U-M won the 2021, 2022 and 2023 title games during the current streak

- Winning at the Big House**
- U-M has won 29 of its last 31 games at Michigan Stadium, dating back to the start of the 2021 season

- A 23-game winning streak ended with a setback to Texas early in 2024 season
- The team's only setbacks over the past 30 games came against top five teams: #3 Texas and #1 Oregon
- The 23-game winning streak at the Big House was the program's best since a 28-game streak from 1969-73 under Bo Schembechler
- Michigan claimed three straight undefeated seasons at home, posting a perfect 8-0 record in 2022 and 7-0 slates in 2021 and 2023
- U-M has finished the season unblemished at home on 26 occasions since 1940, including the 1973 and 1992 seasons where they recorded ties at home
- The Wolverines posted a perfect home record five times since 2016: 7-0 (2023), 8-0 (2022), 7-0 (2021), 7-0 (2018) and 8-0 (2016)

Michigan Football in Night Games

- The Wolverines have a 1-1 record in night games this year; defeated New Mexico (34-17) and lost at Oklahoma (13-24)
- The setback against the Sooners ended a 13-game winning streak in night games
- U-M has won 18 of its last 21 night games
- Michigan has compiled a 53-29 overall record in games starting after 5 p.m. local time, posting a 16-2 record at Michigan Stadium, a 29-17 mark on the road and an 8-10 record on a neutral site
- U-M went 2-0 in night games during the 2024 season after posting a 6-0 mark in 2023

2024 ReliaQuest Bowl Champions

- U-M won the 2024 ReliaQuest Bowl, defeating 11th-ranked Alabama by a 19-13 score
- RB Jordan Marshall was named the game's MVP after setting career highs with 23 carries for 100 yards in his first career start
- K Dominic Zvada scored 13 of the Wolverines' 19 points on four field goals - 45, 30, 21 and 37 yards - and one PAT
- Michigan's defense held the Crimson Tide to 260 yards of offense, including just 68 rushing yards as they registered five sacks and three turnovers (2 fumbles, 1 interception)
- Michigan made its seventh appearance in the ReliaQuest Bowl, which was previously known as the Outback Bowl and the Hall of Fame Bowl
- The Wolverines have compiled a 4-3 mark all-time in the Tampa area bowl, with appearances in the 1988, 1994, 1997, 2003, 2013, 2018 and now 2024 games
- The seven appearances are the most of any Big Ten school; Iowa and Wisconsin have played in the game six times and Penn State has appeared on five occasions

Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- Michigan has led the nation in attendance 47 of the past 50 seasons; only years that U-M did not lead the country in attendance was 1997, 2014 and 2020
- U-M has drawn 100,000-plus fans for 326 straight games at Michigan Stadium (since Nov. 8, 1975)
- The Maize and Blue led the nation in attendance during the 2024 season with 884,382 fans attending its eight home games
- The Wolverines averaged an NCAA best 110,548 fans at their eight games played at Michigan Stadium in 2024
- Michigan played in front of 291,889 patrons at its four Big Ten road tilts for an average of 72,972 fans per game
- The ReliaQuest Bowl against Alabama on New Year's Eve Day drew a crowd of 51,439 fans
- Michigan played in front of more than a million fans during the 13 games this season (1,227,710)

College Football's Top TV Draw

- U-M has played in a NCAA record 603 televised and streamed football games, compiling a 404-191-8 record
- "The Game" between Michigan and Ohio State in 2024 drew a television audience of 12.3 million fans, the second-highest rated game of the regular season behind Georgia-Texas
- Michigan was involved in two of the 10 highest rated games during the 2024 regular season: Ohio State (2nd) and Texas (10th, 9.19 million)
- The ReliaQuest Bowl against Alabama drew ESPN's biggest non-New Year's Six bowl audience in nine years (6.5 million)
- Every single football game since 1995 has been televised or streamed, a streak of 374 consecutive broadcasts
- The Wolverines have played 353 nationally televised football games over the year
- The very first televised U-M football game came on Sept. 27, 1947, a 55-0 shutout of rival Michigan State on WWJ TV in Detroit

Jordan Brand

- The Michigan Football program is in its eighth season wearing brand Jordan apparel
- U-M was the first college and/or professional football program to wear Jordan on its uniforms and sideline apparel, starting with the 2016 season
- The Wolverines were joined by North Carolina as Jordan football schools in 2017; Oklahoma and Florida were outfitted by Jordan starting with the 2018 season
- Jordan outfits Michigan from head-to-toe on all apparel needs for the football and basketball programs
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

THE TEAM

- Michigan (83.6%) has the second-highest winning percent of any program since 2021; trails only Georgia (91.4%)
- U-M has won 51 of its last 61 football games dating back to the start of the 2021 season
- The Wolverines have a 33-6 record in Big Ten play since 2021; does not include three victories in the conference championship game
- The Maize and Blue had its school record 24-game winning streak in conference play end with its 27-17 setback at Washington; surpassed the 19-game mark set from 1990-92 under coach Gary Moeller
- The Wolverines won a record 28 consecutive regular season games, equaling the 28-game streaks held by Michigan (1901-03) and Ohio State (2005-07) for the longest winning streaks in Big Ten history; snapped with its loss to Texas
- The Wolverines have won 13 of their last 17 road games in the Big Ten and have a 15-5 road record in conference play since the start of the 2021 season; had an 11-game winning streak snapped at Washington (which was tied for the fifth longest streak in Big Ten history)

Team Captains

- Six players were voted 2025 captains for the Wolverines: FB/TE Max Bredeson, OG Gio El-Hadi and TE Marlin Klein on offense and LB Ernest Hausmann, EDGE Derrick Moore and S Rod Moore on defense
- Bredeson and Moore are returning captains from the 2024 season
- WR Joe Taylor and EDGE TJ Guy were voted alternate captains for Team 146
- Max Bredeson joins his brother Ben Bredeson (2018-19) as two-time captains for the Wolverines; they are the first brother duo to become repeat captains in program history
- This is the first time in school history that two tight ends were elected captains in the same season

One of the Nation's Most Disciplined Teams

- Michigan has been one of the nation's most disciplined teams the past three seasons, finishing the year in the top five in 2024 after listing No. 1 nationally in 2023
- The Wolverines currently rank seventh nationally in fewest penalties (4.0 avg.) and are 18th in fewest penalty yards (38.0 avg.)
- In 2024, U-M was fifth in the NCAA in fewest penalties per game (4.0 avg.) and 14th in fewest penalty yards (39.54 avg.)
- The Wolverines committed only 52 penalties for 514 yards during the 2024 season; the 52 infractions were the fourth fewest in college football
- U-M did not commit an infraction against rival Michigan State and had only one penalty vs. Northwestern
- The Maize and Blue were penalized three or fewer times on five occasions in 2024 and were flagged for five or fewer infractions in 11 of the 13 contests

U-M Lists Eighth in Turnover Margin

- All three phases have teamed to rank the Wolverines among the top 10 nationally in turnover margin this fall
- Michigan lists eighth nationally in turnover margin (1.25 avg. per game)
- U-M has forced at least one turnover in every game, including a season-high three miscues by New Mexico and two against Oklahoma and Central Michigan
- The Wolverines have nine takeaways – seven interceptions and two fumble recoveries – while only turning the ball over three times

THE OFFENSE

A Look at the 2025 Offense

- Michigan's offense has 26 players with at least one starting assignment during their career
- U-M returned six starters from the 2024 season: FB/TE Max Bredeson, C Greg Crippen, OG Gio El-Hadi, TE Marlin Klein, OT Evan Link, WR Peyton O'Leary and QB Davis Warren
- Michigan is averaging 2.5 rushing TDs per game over its last 52 contests; 129 touchdowns during that stretch
- A total of 15 players have carried the ball in a collegiate game: RBs Justice Haynes, Jordan Marshall, Micah Ka'apana, Bryson Kuzdzal, Jasper Parker, Tomas O'Meara and John Volker, WRs Semaj Morgan, Donaven McCulley, Andrew Marsh and Anthony Simpson, and QBs Jake Garcia, Mikey Keene, Davis Warren and Bryce Underwood
- Six Wolverines have scored rushing touchdowns in their careers, combining for 49 scores; Volker (17), Haynes (15), McCulley (3), Underwood (3), Marshall (3), Morgan (2), Garcia (2), Parker (1), Kuzdzal (1), Marsh (1) and Simpson (1)
- Warren, Garcia, Keene and Underwood have seen action at quarterback during their career
- Keene leads the quarterbacks with 65 passing TDs during his career while Garcia (15), Warren (7) and Underwood (5) have chipped in a combined 24 scores
- U-M has 16 players with a reception in their careers: WRs Kendrick Bell, C.J. Charleston, Channing Goodwin, Andrew Marsh, Donaven McCulley, Semaj Morgan, Peyton O'Leary and Anthony Simpson; TEs Marlin Klein, Hogan Hansen and Zack Marshall; FB/TE Max Bredeson and RBs Justice Haynes, Jordan Marshall, Micah Ka'apana and John Volker
- Nine (9) Wolverines have scored receiving TDs in their career, combining for 28 trips into the end zone: McCulley (10; 2 at U-M), Morgan (4), Charleston (4), Simpson (3), O'Leary (2), Volker (2), Klein (1), Marsh (1) and Hansen (1)
- OG Gio El-Hadi leads the offense with 19 career starts in a Michigan uniform; QB Mikey Keene leads the entire offense with 36 career starts

Scoring Across All Quarters

- The offense has scored points in 19 of the 24 quarters played this season
- Entering the Washington game, the Wolverines have tallied points in 14 of the last 16 quarters; had a string of 12 straight quarters with a score end at USC
- Michigan scored 14-plus points in every quarter against Central Michigan
- U-M had a season-high 21 points in the second quarter against the Chippewas
- The second highest point total came as the Wolverines scored 17 points in the second quarter against the Cornhuskers
- U-M has registered double-digits in points scored during nine quarters

Grounding out Yards

- Michigan's rushing offense has been one of the best in the country this season, listing 19th in the NCAA at 216.3 yards per game

- The Wolverines have gained 1,298 yards on 217 rushing attempts this fall
- The ground game is averaging 6.0 yards per carry
- U-M has gained 200-plus rushing yards in three games: New Mexico (201), Central Michigan (381) and Nebraska (286)
- The offense gained 175 rushing yards vs. Wisconsin, the nation's top ranked rush defense
- The Maize and Blue have five runs over 50 yards, four of which resulted in touchdowns, and have a total of 17 rushing scores
- The offense has allowed just eight sacks and 25 total tackles for loss in 374 plays

Tallying Points Off Turnovers

- Michigan has scored points on six of the 12 opponent turnovers (4TDs, 2 FGs) in 2025
- The Wolverines have scored 34 points off opponent miscues
- The defense has held the opposition to 12 points off five Michigan turnovers (4 FGs)
- U-M scored a season-high 14 points off two Central Michigan turnovers (2 TDs)
- Michigan has forced at least one turnover in four of the six games, and gained a season-high three turnovers against Central Michigan and USC
- The defense has collected five turnovers in Big Ten action (four interceptions and one fumble)

Red Zone Efficiency

- U-M has scored points on all but three possession in the red zone this fall, scoring on 17 of the 20 trips inside the opposition's 20-yard line
- The Wolverines are currently ranked 67th nationally with a 85% efficiency rating
- U-M has scored touchdowns on 13 of those 20 possessions inside the 20, with 11 rushing touchdowns and two passing scores
- The only non-scoring plays came on a missed field goal at Oklahoma and a missed field goal and the final series against Wisconsin
- The Maize and Blue had a season-best seven rushing TDs to convert all seven possessions in the red zone against Central Michigan

QUARTERBACKS

- Michigan has five quarterbacks with playing experience: Mikey Keene (39), Jake Garcia (16), Davis Warren (11), Bryce Underwood (6) and Jady Davis (3)
- Four signal callers have started games in their career: Keene (35), Warren (9), Underwood (6) and Garcia (1)
- In 2025, the Wolverines have thrown for 1,210 yards and 5 TDs; completed 92-of-157 passes (58.6%) for 1,210 yards and 5 TDs with 3 interception
- Keene has passed for 8,245 career yards, which is second among active quarterbacks
- Keene (65), Garcia (15), Warren (7) and Underwood (5) have tossed touchdown passes in their careers

Bryce Underwood

- Started all six games; completed 92-of-154 passes (59.7%) for 1,210 yards and five touchdowns with two interceptions

- Rushed 32 times for 177 yards and scored three touchdowns
- Tossed a career-high two touchdown passes at USC, completing 15-of-24 passes for 207 yards
- Threw for a career-best 270 yards on 19-of-28 passing with one touchdown vs. Wisconsin
- Completed 12-of-22 passes for 105 yards and rushed eight times for 61 yards and one TD at Nebraska; scored on a 37-yard run
- Named Shaun Alexander National Freshman of the Week and Big Ten Freshman of the Week for his performance against Central Michigan
- Gained 349 yards of total offense vs. Central Michigan with three touchdowns; rushed nine times for 114 yards with two TDs and completed 16-of-25 passes for 235 yards and one score
- Made first career road start, completing 9-of-24 passes for 142 yards with a 44-yard long pass
- Became the fourth true freshman to start at quarterback in the opener for the Wolverines, joining Rick Leach (1975), Chad Henne (2004) and Tate Forcier (2009)

THE DEFENSE

A Look at the 2025 Defense

- The defense is led by second-year defensive coordinator Wink Martindale, who spent 20 years coaching in the NFL prior to joining Michigan's staff in 2024
 - The Wolverines have 18 defenders that started at least one career game, including eight players that have started at least 10 contests
 - 39 defensive players have recorded at least one tackle during their career
 - Ernest Hausmann leads the defense with 175 tackles in the winged helmet and 229 career stops
 - A total of 27 Wolverine defenders recorded stops in the opposition's backfield during their career, led by Jaishawn Barham (18.0) and Derrick Moore (17.0)
 - The 27 players have combined to post 146.0 TFLs over their careers; 78.5 of those stops in the backfield were made in a Michigan uniform
 - 19 Wolverines have combined to register 60.0 sacks during their collegiate careers: Derrick Moore (13.5), Jaishawn Barham (11.0; 7.0 at Maryland and 4.0 at U-M), T.J. Guy (7.5), Tre Williams (4.0; 4.0 at Clemson), Ernest Hausmann (4.0; 1.0 at Nebraska), Cameron Brandt (3.5), Rayshaun Benny (4.0), Cole Sullivan (2.0), Jyaire Hill (2.0), Dominic Nichols (1.5), Jimmy Rolder (1.0), Troy Bowles (1.0), Brandyn Hillman (1.0), Rocco Milia (1.0; 1.0 at Columbia), Enow Etta (1.0), Jaden Mangham (0.5), Damon Payne (0.5; 0.5 at Alabama), Nico Andrighetto (0.5) and Rod Moore (0.5)
 - 13 defenders have collected interceptions in their career, led by Rod Moore (7) and TJ Metcalf (4, 3 at Arkansas); Jaden Mangham had four picks at Michigan State
 - Rod Moore leads the team with 14 career passes defended: seven breakups and seven interceptions
 - 20 players collected at least one pass breakup in their career: Berry (12), J. Hill (12), TJ Metcalf (10), Milia (8), R. Moore (7), D. Moore (7), Anderson (6), Barham (5), Benny (4), Mangham (4), Brandt (2), Hillman (3), Williams (3), Hausmann (2), Sanders (1), Curtis (1), Hood (1), Rolder (1), Oden (1) and Etta (1)
 - 12 defenders have scooped up an opponent fumble: Derrick Moore leads the team with three recoveries in a Michigan uniform; Tre Williams had three recoveries at Clemson and Damon Payne registered two at Alabama
 - Derrick Moore has the lone defensive score among active players, scooping up a fumble and returning it four yards at Maryland (2023)
 - Three defenders have started 15-plus career games: Jaishawn Barham (41), R. Moore (29) and Ernest Hausmann (26); Barham made 23 starts at Maryland and Hausmann seven at Nebraska prior to joining the Michigan program
- Limiting Yards on the Ground**
- U-M has been one of the best against the run this season, allowing just 101.5 yards per contest
 - The defense ranks 20th in the NCAA and sixth in the conference this fall
 - The opposition is averaging just 3.1 yards per

carry; carried the ball 196 times for 609 yards

- The only rushing touchdowns have been scored by Oklahoma quarterback John Mateer (twice), Wisconsin's Dilin Jones and USC's King Miller and Bryan Jackson
- The Wolverines have held three teams to less than 80 rushing yards including two opponents to fewer than 50 rushing yards: New Mexico (50), Central Michigan (79), Nebraska (43) and Wisconsin (75)

Making Stops in the Backfield

- Michigan's defense has been playing in the opposition's backfield this fall, racking up 40 tackles for loss and 15 sacks
- U-M ranks 34th in the NCAA in sacks (3.0 avg.) and is 26th in TFLs (7.0 avg.)
- The Wolverines have registered 6-plus TFL in five games thus far including a season-high nine stop in the backfield against New Mexico and at Nebraska
- 19 different players have recorded at least a share of a tackle for loss
- The defense has tallied at least one sack in five of the six games and posted a season-best seven sacks at Nebraska
- 11 different Wolverines have registered a sack led by Jaishawn Barham (3.0), Derrick Moore (2.5) and Cole Sullivan (2.0)

Intercepting the Quarterback

- Michigan's defense has been one of the best in the country at collecting interceptions this season
- The Maize and Blue list 12th nationally and third in the Big Ten with eight interceptions
- LB Cole Sullivan leads the team with two picks
- Seven different players have contributed to the team's total: Sullivan (2), Rod Moore (1), Zeke Berry (1), Brandyn Hillman (1), TJ Metcalf (1), Elijah Dotson (1) and TJ Guy (1)
- The defense has collected an interception against each of its opponents this fall with a season-high three picks coming against New Mexico

Batting Down Passes

- The Wolverines have batted down 22 passes in six games this season
- 14 players have registered a pass breakup
- CB Jyaire Hill leads the team with four PBU's with Zeke Berry contributing three breakups
- 16 of the 22 breakups have come from the secondary with nine defensive backs contributing to the team's total

Forcing 3-and-Outs

- Michigan has been one of the best teams in the country at forcing three-and-outs in 2025
- The defense has forced 24 three-and-out situations in 65 possessions (37%) by the opposition
- 11 of those three-and-outs have come in the first half and the other 13 were during the second half
- The Wolverines have forced six turnovers in three or less offensive plays by the opposition, collecting five interceptions and one fumble recovery

EDGE

- Six edge defenders have seen game action in their careers: Derrick Moore (47), TJ Guy (41), Cameron Brandt (33), Dominic Nichols (11), Nate Marshall (5), Lugard Edokpayi (4) and Benny Patterson (4)
- Two edge defenders have started games at Michigan: Moore (18) and Guy (5)
- Moore is pacing the edge performers in career tackles (78), tackles for loss (17.0), sacks (13.5), three fumble recoveries and pass breakups (7)
- Four players have registered 34.0 tackles in the opposition's backfield during their Michigan careers: Moore (17.0), Guy (10.5), Brandt (5.5) and Nichols (2.5)
- 74 percent (26.0 of 35.0) of those stops have been sacks: Moore (13.5), Guy (7.5), Brandt (3.5) and Nichols (1.5)
- Moore (7) and Brandt (2) are the only players to record pass breakups during their career
- Guy has the units lone interception, corralling a tipped pass against New Mexico in 2025

- Graham was a finalist for two national awards -- Nagurski Trophy and Outland Trophy -- and was a semi-finalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy and Bednarik Award
- Michigan had four (4) defensive players earn first or second-team All-Big Ten honors: Graham (1st), Kenneth Grant (2nd), Johnson (2nd) and Josaiah Stewart (2nd)
- For the fourth straight season, every starter on Michigan's defensive line received some form of all-conference honors
- The Wolverines had three defenders start all 13 games -- Jaishawn Barham, Ernest Hausmann and Quinten Johnson -- while Zeke Berry, Graham, Grant, Derrick Moore and Makari Paige made 12 starting assignments
- The defense ranked in the top 25 of seven categories: rushing defense (5th), fourth downs allowed (8th), total defense (10th), sacks (18th), scoring defense (19th), first downs (19th) and red zone defense (24th)
- Michigan was adept at stopping the run, listing fifth nationally by allowing just 90.7 yards per contest
- The opposition rushed 385 times for 1,179 yards (3.1 avg.) and scored only 10 rushing TDs
- The defense held eight opponents to less than 100 yards including five teams to less than 60 yards: Fresno State (9 yards), Arkansas State (58), Minnesota (38), Indiana (40) and Northwestern (10)
- The Wolverines registered 79 tackles for loss and turned up the heat in Big Ten play, tallying 60 stops in the backfield over nine contests (6.7 avg.)
- U-M tallied a season-high nine TFLs against Minnesota and posted eight TFL efforts against USC, Illinois, Indiana and Northwestern
- The Maize and Blue has 6-plus tackles for loss in nine overall contests; recorded at least three TFLs in every game
- The defense posted 36 sacks to rank 18th nationally and third in the Big Ten in sacks; 27 of those 36 sacks came in Big Ten play
- Stewart was second in the Big Ten and 13th nationally in sacks (0.77 avg.); registered multi-sack efforts against Fresno State, USC and Northwestern
- The Wolverines collected 53 pass breakups including at least two in every contest
- U-M registered a season-high eight breakups in back-to-back games: Arkansas State and USC
- Berry led the team with 11 total passes defended (two interceptions and nine breakups)
- Grant was third on the team with five PBUs and posted 11 career breakups to set a Michigan record for a defensive lineman

2024 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- Michigan won the 2024 ReliaQuest Bowl, defeating 11th-ranked Alabama by a 19-13 score. Jordan Marshall was named the game's MVP after setting career highs with 23 carries for 100 yards in his first career start. Dominic Zvada scored 13 of the Wolverines' 19 points on four field goals - 45, 30, 21 and 37 yards - and one PAT. The defense held the Crimson Tide to 260 yards of offense, including just 68 rushing yards as they registered five sacks and three turnovers (2 fumbles, 1 interception).
- U-M faced the NCAA's second toughest schedule, with its opponents compiling a .677 winning percentage (109-52).
- The Wolverines hosted and won all three rivalry trophy games, retaining possession of the Little Brown Jug (Minnesota), Paul Bunyan Trophy (Michigan State) and George Jewett Trophy (Northwestern).
- In addition, Michigan won "The Game" against rival Ohio State, handing the second-ranked team in the country a 13-10 loss. It was U-M's fourth straight win in the series.
- The Maize and Blue were one of the nation's most disciplined teams, listing fifth in the NCAA in fewest penalties (4.0 avg.) and 14th in fewest penalty yards (39.54 avg.).
- The Wolverines finished third in the Big Ten and 20th nationally in time of possession (31:54 avg.); won the time of possession battle in nine of their 13 games.
- Michigan had 9 players (4 defense, 3 offense and 2 special teams) recognized with first, second or third team All-Big Ten accolades and seven Wolverines collected honorable mention honors.
- Dominic Zvada was selected as the Bakken-Andersen Kicker of the Year after leading the Big Ten and setting a U-M record by converting 95.5% of his field goals (21-22); hit 13 straight fields to end the season.
- Zvada connected on a school record 7 field goals over 50 yards (52, 53, 55, 53, 56, 56, 54).
- The program had three players receive recognition as finalists for national awards: DT Mason Graham (Nagurski Trophy and Outland Trophy), TE Colston Loveland (Mackey Award) and LS William Wagner (Mannelly Award).
- Graham and Zvada earned first-team All-America recognition in 2024, with Graham becoming the 89th player in school history to earn consensus All-American honors.
- The defense ranked in the top 25 of seven (7) NCAA categories: rushing defense (5th), fourth downs allowed (8th), total defense (10th), sacks (18th), scoring defense (19th), first downs (19th) and red zone defense (24th).
- U-M's special teams units ranked No. 3 in ESPN's College Football Power Index Efficiency Rankings this season (72.0); finished eighth in the NCAA in kick return defense and was 11th in blocked kicks (2 FGs, 1 punt).

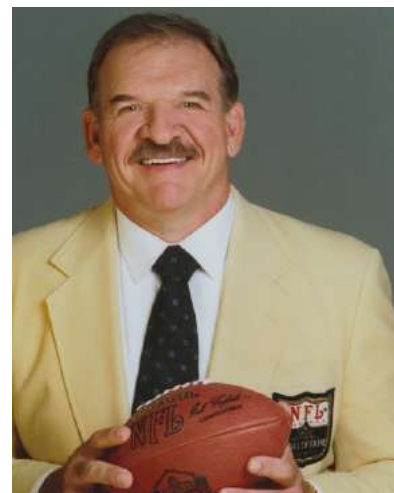

Sherrone Moore is in his second season as head coach of the University of Michigan Football program in 2025. Moore was named the 21st head coach in U-M Football history on January 26, 2024, following six years as a member of the offensive staff. Moore is the first African American head coach in the history of the program.

In his first year leading the Wolverines, U-M won eight games, including its bowl matchup against No. 11 Alabama. Michigan's campaign included wins in all four of its rivalry matchups, including The Game (Ohio State). U-M captured the Paul Bunyan Trophy (Michigan State), the Little Brown Jug (Minnesota), and the George Jewett Trophy (Northwestern). U-M finished with a top-10 defense against the NCAA's second-toughest schedule.

Five players earned All-American honors, including consensus honoree Mason Graham and first-teamer Dominic Zvada. Graham was a finalist for the Outland Trophy and Nagurski Award and Colston Loveland (Mackey Award) and William Wagner (Mannely Award) were also national award finalists. Nine players earned first, second, or third-team All-Big Ten status.

Before he was named head coach, Moore spent three years as the tight ends coach (2018-20), and three years as Donald Graham Offensive Line Coach (2021-23). He was also Sanford Robertson Offensive Coordinator in 2023 after two seasons as co-O.C. (2021-22), leading the Wolverines on the offensive side of the ball during an unprecedented run of success that included three consecutive Big Ten Championships (2021-22-23) and the 2023 National Title.

While Moore was coordinating the offense and coaching the line, U-M averaged 38.4 points, 207.5 rushing yards, 3.52 tackles for loss allowed, and 1.18 sacks allowed per game. The offense was a top-15 scoring unit in all three seasons and the rushing offense was top-15 twice while the unit ranked first or second in team rushing touchdowns in all three years. Under Moore, all five of the offensive line starters earned some form of All-Big Ten honors including six different first-team honorees. U-M also became the first program to win back-to-back Joe Moore Awards (2021-22) honoring the top offensive line in college football. U-M was top-five in TFLs allowed twice and top-30 in sacks allowed in all three seasons.

The line blocked for three straight 1,000-yard backs in Hassan Haskins (1,327 yards, 20 rushing touchdowns, 2021), Blake Corum (1,463, 18, 2022), and Corum again (1,245, 27, 2023). In 2021 and 2022, U-M nearly had a second 1,000-yard back in Corum (952 yards) and Donovan Edwards (991 yards). Moore oversaw the running production of the offensive line as Corum set single-season rushing touchdown (27), total touchdown (28) records in 2023 while he was the only player in FBS to score in every game of the season.

Moore produced four NFL draft picks at tight end (Zach Gentry, fifth round) and offensive line (Olusegun Oluwatimi, fifth; Andrew Stueber, seventh; Ryan Hayes, seventh) as a position coach and helped guide Stueber (second team), Oluwatimi, and Zak Zinter (consensus) to All-American honors, including the Rimington Award winner and Michigan's first Outland Trophy recipient, Oluwatimi (2022).

Moore joined the Wolverine staff after four seasons at Central Michigan (2014-17). He was selected for and participated in the inaugural 35 Under 35 Coaches Leadership Institute sponsored

by the American Football Coaches Association in January 2018. Working as an offensive coach throughout his career, Moore has worked with productive tight end groups at several stops, and his knowledge of the trenches helped him transition into one of the premier offensive line coaches in the nation.

Six tight ends combined for 119 receptions, 1,611 yards, and 13 touchdowns in Moore's three seasons leading the position group at U-M. Those players had one season with third-team All-Big Ten honors and three seasons with all-conference honorable mention recognition.

Moore mentored the Chippewas tight ends during his four-year stay at CMU (2014-17) and added the duties of assistant head coach and recruiting coordinator during the 2017 season. He produced second-team (Ben McCord) and third-team (Tyler Conklin) All-MAC honorees with Conklin earning an NFL Scouting Combine invitation.

Moore spent five seasons at Louisville before joining the Central Michigan staff. He worked as a graduate assistant coach for three seasons (2009-11) before spending the final two years as the Cardinals' tight end coach (2012-13). During Moore's two seasons as a full-time assistant coach, Louisville had a 23-3 record with a BCS bowl appearance and a Big East title in 2012. As a graduate assistant, Moore helped the Cardinals to a pair of bowl appearances and helped develop All-BIG EAST first-team offensive guard Mark Wetterer. Moore also earned his master's degree in sports administration from Louisville.

Moore played two seasons along the offensive line for the University of Oklahoma (2006-07). He played in 14 games at offensive guard and helped the Sooners win two Big 12 Championships and played in two BCS bowl games. Before joining the Sooners, Moore was a two-year starter at Butler County (Kansas) Community College. He was a member of two conference championship teams the posted a 20-3 record. Moore earned second-team all-conference accolades.

Moore earned his bachelor's degree in communications from Oklahoma in 2008. He and his wife, Kelli, were married in 2015. Together, they have two daughters, Shiloh, and Solei.
