147th Season of Michigan Football

The 2026 season marks the 147th year of intercollegiate football for the University of Michigan football program. The Wolverines have an NCAA-leading 1,022 victories, claimed 45 Big Ten Championships and won 12 national titles since the inception of the program in 1879.

Wolverines and Sooners

This will be the third meeting between the two programs and the first game played at Michigan Stadium. Oklahoma won the two previous match-ups, a 14-6 victory

in the 1976 Orange Bowl and a 24-13 affair last season at Oklahoma Memorial Stadium in Norman.

Playing at Home in September

The Wolverines will play all four games in the month of September at Michigan Stadium. It will be the first time since 2024 that U-M has played its first four games at home. Michigan played its initial five contests at the Big House in 2011, 2016 and 2024. The most consecutive home contests to start a season is eight, a mark achieved during the 1905 and 1917 seasons.

THIS WEEK'S MATCHUP

Michigan vs. Oklahoma

- This will be the third meeting between the Wolverines and Sooners
- Both teams have entered each of the three games ranked in the AP poll: #3 Oklahoma 14, #5 Michigan 6 (1976 Orange Bowl), #18 Oklahoma 24, #15 Michigan 13 last year in Norman, Okla., and this year
- Michigan traveled to Oklahoma for the first time last year, falling 24-13 in a top 20 matchup
- The only previous matchup between the two programs came in the 1976 Orange Bowl, a 14-6 victory for Oklahoma

Last Year in Norman

On the road for the first time in 2025, the Wolverines had a chance to tie the game in the final frame against the Sooners but came up short. U-M struggled to sustain momentum on offense before scoring 13 points in the third quarter, led by a 75-yard Justice Haynes touchdown, to create an opportunity for a late comeback. A special teams turnover gave Dominic Zvada a shot at a 42-yard field goal, which helped keep things close. In the game's final minutes, Michigan battled the clock, and ran out of time to turn its momentum into a threat. Oklahoma gained 408 offensive yards and successfully chewed time late in the final quarter with a drive of 8:27, leading to a field goal to put the margin out of reach.

Revisiting the 1976 Orange Bowl

Under pressure from the conference coaches, led by Michigan's Bo Schembechler, the Big Ten finally lifted its long-standing policy of limiting post-season games to only the Rose Bowl. As a consequence, once the Wolverines lost their only regular-season game to top-ranked Ohio State, Michigan accepted an invitation to meet the Oklahoma Sooners in Miami's Orange Bowl.

The fifth-ranked Wolverines left for Miami armed with Gordie Bell, who led the nation's second-leading rushing team with 121.4 yards per game, and under the guidance of freshman field general Rick Leach. Oklahoma came in as defending Associated Press National Champions despite making its first postseason appearance since 1972, due to two years of NCAA and Big Eight probation. The Sooners' 10-1 record placed them second in both wire service polls, and they marked Michigan's first experience against a wishbone offense since meeting UCLA three years earlier.

The first quarter was a defensive battle, with the Wolverines putting together the only substantial drive, starting at the Michigan five-yard line and stalling at the Oklahoma 38. Following Bob Wood's attempted 51-yard field goal, the Sooners opened the scoring with successive passes of 40 yards from Steve Davis to Tinker Owens and a 39-yard reverse by Billy Brooks for the score.

The Wolverines drove as far as the Oklahoma nine-yard line in the third quarter, before being

thwarted by a pass interception in the end zone. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Davis ran 10 yards around the left end to increase the Sooners lead to 14-0. Michigan finally got on the scoreboard following an Oklahoma fumble on its own two. Bell carried it over on the next play, but Leach's two-point conversion attempt was stopped. The Wolverines were only able to make it as far as midfield for the duration of the game, and the Sooners went on to a 14-6 victory.

Oklahoma was led by the defensive efforts of Leroy and Dewey Selmon (10 and 13 tackles, respectively) and, following Ohio State's 23-10 loss in the Rose Bowl to UCLA, was named national champion in both polls.

Michigan vs. SEC

- Michigan is no stranger to the Southeastern Conference and will face an SEC school for the 44th time in school history
- The Wolverines have a 27-15-1 all-time record against schools from the SEC
- The Wolverines have yet to face Louisiana State in a cross-conference match-up; U-M has played both Missouri (2-2) and Texas A&M (2-1) in the past but those games were prior to their inclusion in the SEC
- Michigan has faced a Southeastern Conference school on 20 occasions in a bowl game
- The Wolverines have a 10-10 mark against the SEC in bowl games
- The most recent bowl match-up with the SEC came in the 2025 Cheez-it Citrus Bowl, a 41-27 loss to Texas last year

Wolverines in September

- Michigan has won 20 of its last 22 games in the ninth month of the year
- The Maize and Blue's only setback during that stretch came in top 20 matchups, losing to No. 3 Texas at Michigan Stadium (2024) and No. 18 Oklahoma at Memorial Stadium (2025)
- U-M has a 37-5 record in the ninth month since 2015, which included a 14-game winning streak from 2021-24

THE 2026 SEASON

2026 Schedule Notes

- The Wolverines play one of college football's toughest schedules in 2026, with their opposition compiling a .620 winning percentage
- Six of the Wolverines' foes are ranked in the preseason top 25: Ohio State (1st), Oregon (2nd), Indiana (6th), Oklahoma (9th), Penn State (17th) and Iowa (22nd)
- U-M will play eight home games for the eighth time this century, joining the 2024, 2022, 2016, 2011, 2009, 2007 and 2005 campaigns
- Five opponents won 10-plus games in 2025, led by national champion Indiana (15-0); Oregon (13-2), Ohio State (12-2), Oklahoma (10-3) and Western Michigan (10-4)
- Michigan's 12 foes in 2026 compiled a 98-60 overall record (.620) and a 60-45 mark (.571) in conference games
- The Wolverines are one of 13 FBS schools not playing an FCS opponent this season; the others are Fresno State, Hawaii, Michigan State, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Penn State, Texas, Tulane, UCLA, UNLV and USC
- Michigan will play two rivalry trophy games during the season, not including its annual battle with Ohio State in "The Game" to end the regular season: Little Brown Jug (Minnesota) and Paul Bunyan Trophy (Michigan State)
- Eight of the Wolverines' 12 opponents played in bowl games during the 2026 season
- Four of those teams played in the CFP 12-team playoff: Indiana, Oregon, Ohio State and Oklahoma
- Six of the nine Big Ten opponents played in the postseason -- Indiana (CFP National Champions), Oregon (CFP), Ohio State (CFP), Iowa (ReliaQuest), Minnesota (Rate) and Penn State (Pinstripe) -- while non-conference foes Oklahoma (CFP/home game) and Western Michigan (Myrtle Beach) also participated in bowl action

U-M Ranked in the Top 25 of National Polls

- Michigan heads into the Oklahoma game ranked in the top 25 of the national polls; lists 16th in both the Associated Press media poll and the AFCA Coaches poll
- The Wolverines will face six teams ranked in the preseason top 25 rankings this fall
- The Maize and Blue finished 18th in the 2025 College Football Playoff rankings; listed No. 21 (AP) and No. 22 (AFCA) in the other final polls
- The Wolverines have been ranked for 120 of their last 141 games dating back to the start of the 2015 season
- Michigan has been ranked in the Associated Press national polls 943 times, the second-most of any program in college football
- The Wolverines had been listed in the national rankings for 68 of the past 78 polls dating back to third game of the 2021 season; had a string of 54 straight rankings snapped in 2024
- U-M listed in the top 10 of the polls for 45 straight rankings which was its longest string in more than 20 years (2021-24); 34 of those rankings the Wolverines listed in the top 5
- Michigan was ranked in the top five of the national polls for a school record 32 straight

polls (2021-23); streak was snapped with the 2024 preseason rankings

- U-M ranked in the top three of the final polls - No. 1 in 2023 and No. 3 in both 2021 and 2022; this was the first time in school history that the program finished the year ranked in the top 5 for three consecutive seasons

Michigan in Big Ten Action

- The Wolverines finished the 2025 Big Ten season in fourth place with a 7-2 record
- The Maize and Blue is riding a 34-6 record in league play over their last 40 regular season games
- U-M has claimed wins in 41 of its last 47 games against conference schools
- Michigan has a 75-23 mark in Big Ten action in its last 98 games; 37-10 at home, 35-13 on the road and 3-0 in neutral site contests
- The Maize and Blue had its school record 24-game winning streak in conference play end with its 27-17 setback at Washington; surpassed the 19-game mark set from 1990-92 under coach Gary Moeller
- The program ran its unbeaten mark to 27 straight conference games, which included three straight Big Ten Championship Game victories, but the league doesn't count those title game wins as league contests; U-M won the 2021, 2022 and 2023 championship games

Winning at the Big House

- U-M has won 32 of its last 35 games at Michigan Stadium, dating back to the start of the 2021 season
- A 23-game winning streak ended with a setback to Texas early in the 2024 season
- The only setbacks over the past 35 games came against top three teams: #3 Texas and #1 Oregon (2024) and #1 Ohio State (2025)
- The 23-game winning streak at the Big House was the program's best since a 28-game streak from 1969-73 under Bo Schembechler
- Michigan claimed three straight undefeated seasons at home, posting a perfect 8-0 record in 2022 and 7-0 slates in 2021 and 2023
- U-M has finished the season unblemished at home on 26 occasions since 1940, including the 1973 and 1992 seasons where they recorded ties at home
- The Wolverines posted a perfect home record five times since 2016: 7-0 (2023), 8-0 (2022), 7-0 (2021), 7-0 (2018) and 8-0 (2016)

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES

Michigan Tops NCAA in Attendance

- Michigan has led the nation in attendance 48 of the past 51 seasons; only years that U-M did not lead the country in attendance was 1997, 2014 and 2020
- U-M has drawn 100,000-plus fans for 330 straight games at Michigan Stadium (since Nov. 8, 1975)
- The Maize and Blue hosted six of the seven top attended games in 2025
- The Wolverines averaged an NCAA best 110,842 fans at their six games played at Michigan Stadium in 2025
- U-M played in front of 406,378 patrons at its six road tilts for an average of 67,730 fans per game
- Michigan played in front of more than a million fans during its 12 regular season games this fall (1,071,427)

College Football's Top TV Draw

- U-M has played in a NCAA record 611 televised and streamed football games, compiling a 410-193-8 record
- "The Game" between Michigan and Ohio State in 2025 drew a television audience of 18.4 million viewers, the highest rated game of the regular season
- Every single football game since 1995 has been televised or streamed, a streak of 382 consecutive broadcasts
- The Wolverines have played 361 nationally televised football games over the years
- The very first televised U-M football game came on Sept. 27, 1947, a 55-0 shutout of rival Michigan State on WWJ TV in Detroit

Michigan Football in Night Games

- U-M has a 1-0 record in night games this season
- The Wolverines had a 3-1 record in night games in 2025; defeated New Mexico (34-17), Michigan State (31-20) and Purdue (21-16) while losing at Oklahoma (13-24)
- The setback against the Sooners ended a 13-game winning streak in night games
- U-M has won 21 of its last 24 night games, and is 12-1 over the past four seasons at night (2023-26)
- Michigan has compiled a 56-29 overall record in games starting after 5 p.m. local time, posting a 18-2 record at Michigan Stadium, a 30-17 mark on the road and an 8-10 record on a neutral site

Jordan Brand

- The Michigan Football program is in its ninth season wearing brand Jordan apparel
- U-M was the first college and/or professional football program to wear Jordan on its uniforms and sideline apparel, starting with the 2016 season
- The Wolverines were joined by North Carolina as Jordan football schools in 2017; Oklahoma and Florida were outfitted by Jordan starting with the 2018 season
- Jordan outfits Michigan from head-to-toe on all apparel needs for the football and basketball programs
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year agreement on Aug. 1, 2016

- Michigan (82.6%) has the third-highest winning percent of any program since 2021
- U-M has won 57 of its last 69 football games dating back to the start of the 2021 season
- The Wolverines have a 38-7 record in Big Ten play since 2021; does not include three victories in the conference championship game
- The Wolverines have won 17 of their last 21 road games (81%) in the Big Ten and have a 19-5 road record in conference play since the start of the 2021 season; had an 11-game winning streak snapped at Washington (which was tied for the fifth longest streak in Big Ten history)
- The Wolverines won a record 28 consecutive regular season games, equaling the 28-game streaks held by Michigan (1901-03) and Ohio State (2005-07) for the longest winning streaks in Big Ten history; snapped with its loss to Texas during the 2024 season

Team Captains and Leadership Council

- P Hudson Hollenbeck was the team's starting punter in every contest during the year

THE OFFENSE

A Look at the 2026 Offense

- Michigan's offense had 17 players with at least one starting assignment during their career
- U-M returns five starters from the 2025 season: LT Blake Frazier/Evan Link, RG Jake Guarnera, WR Andrew Marsh, RT Andrew Sprague and QB Bryce Underwood
- Michigan is averaging 2.43 rushing TDs per game over its last 60 contests; 146 touchdowns during that stretch
- A total of 16 players have carried the ball in a collegiate game: RBs Jordan Marshall, Savion Hiter, Micah Ka'apana, Bryson Kuzdzal, and Tomas O'Meara, WR Andrew Marsh, and QBs Bryce Underwood and Brayden Fowler-Nicolosi
- Four Wolverines have scored rushing TDs in their careers, combining for 22 scores: Marshall (10), Underwood (7), Kuzdzal (4) and Marsh (1)
- Underwood and Fowler-Nicolosi have seen action at quarterback during their career
- Fowler-Nicolosi leads the quarterbacks with 38 passing TDs during his career while Underwood has chipped in 11 passing scores

- Underwood has started 14 straight games at quarterback, the most consecutive starts for any offensive player
- Link leads the offense with 19 career starts in a Michigan uniform; Fowler-Nicolosi leads the entire offense with 28 career starts

Tommy Carr

- Named team's backup quarterback
 - Over two years as a starter, completed 357-of-514 passes (69.5%) for 5,247 yards with 64 touchdowns and nine interceptions
 - Father, Jason, was a quarterback at Michigan
 - Brother, CJ, is the starting QB at Notre Dame
 - He and his brother are the only players in college football history to have both of their grandfathers in the College Football Hall of Fame: Lloyd Carr (U-M Coach) and Tom Curtis (U-M safety)

Brayden Fowler-Nicolosi

- #16 | QB | 6-3, 212 | Colorado State**
- Spent four seasons (2022-25) at Colorado State
 - Appeared in 31 games with 28 starts at quarterback; earned four varsity letters
 - All-Mountain West honorable mention (2023); led all Mountain West players in total offense (3,433 yards)
 - Completed 583-of-969 pass attempts for 6,938 yards with 38 touchdowns and 29 interceptions during his career
 - Rushed for six touchdowns during his career and caught a touchdown pass; also punted seven times with each punt landing inside the 20-yard line

TIGHT ENDS

- The tight ends had seven players with experience: Zack Marshall (29), Jalen Hoffman (27), Deakon Tonielli (14), Hogan Hansen (13), Eli Owens (3), Mason Bonner (1) and Crandall Quinn (1)

- Three tight ends have starting experience: Marshall (4), Tonielli (2) and Hoffman (1)
- The TEs have accounted for 38 receptions totaling 440 yards and two TDs in their careers

2025 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- The Wolverines posted a 9-4 overall record and finished in the top 25 of the national polls: No. 21 in the Associated Press media poll and No. 22 in the US LBM Coaches poll.
- All four of Michigan's setbacks came against teams that finished the year ranked among the top 20 in the polls: Ohio State (No. 5), Texas (No. 12), Oklahoma (No. 13) and USC (No. 20).
- U-M won three rivalry trophy games, retaining possession of the Paul Bunyan (Michigan State), George Jewett (Northwestern) and Bussini Bowl (Nebraska) trophies.
- Michigan had 10 players (5 defense, 4 offense and 1 special teams) recognized with first, second or third team All-Big Ten accolades and 11 Wolverines collected honorable mention honors.
- The Maize and Blue finished 16th nationally in rushing offense (210.2 ypg), with 12 separate 100-yard efforts: Justice Haynes (6), Jordan Marshall (4), Bryson Kuzdzal (1) and Bryce Underwood (1).
- The offense had 33 rushing touchdowns including six from more than 50 yards. Haynes and Marshall led the team with 10 rushing scores apiece.
- Michigan finished 20th nationally in rushing defense (111.9 ypg) and 24th in total defense (323.3 ypg).
- EDGE Derrick Moore earned first-team All-Big Ten honors after leading the conference in sacks during conference play (1.11 apg). Moore finished with 10 sacks in 2025.

A semifinalist for the Butkus Award, Jimmy Rolder led the defense with a career-best 73 tackles, including 7.0 TFLs, 2.0 sacks, one fumble recovery and one interception.

- Zeke Berry led the Big Ten in passes defended during conference play (10; 9 PBUs and 1 interception).
- Cole Sullivan paced the Wolverines with four secured turnovers: three interceptions and one fumble recovery.
- Andrew Marsh set the Michigan freshman record for receiving yards (651) while listing second in receptions (45) and third in receiving touchdowns (4).
- Marsh added 423 return yards on the season, returning 16 kickoffs for 378 yards (23.6 avg.) and four punts for 45 yards (11.3 avg.).
- Bryce Underwood trails only Chad Henne (2,743) in passing by a Wolverine freshman quarterback, throwing for 2,428 yards. He completed 202-of-335 passes with 11 touchdowns.
- Dominic Zvada set U-M records for the most 40-plus-yard field goals (18) and 50-yard-plus field goals (9) in a career.
- Michigan had 44 players earn Academic All-Big Ten this fall including guard Jake Guarnera who earned CSC Academic All-District honors.
- The Wolverines had seven players start all 13 games: C Greg Crippen, WR Donaven McCulley, QB Bryce Underwood, DT Rayshaun Benny, CB Jyaire Hill, CB/S TJ Metcalf and DT Trey Pierce.

THE DEFENSE

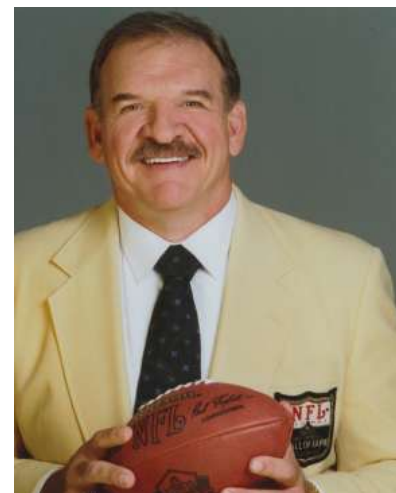

Kyle Whittingham was named the 22nd head football coach in the 146-year history of the University of Michigan football program on Dec. 26, 2025. Whittingham signed a five-year contract with the Wolverines that runs through the 2030 season.

Whittingham comes to Ann Arbor after finishing his 21st season as Utah's head coach in 2025 and his 32nd overall season with the Utes. He was the program's head coach since December 2004 and was a member of the coaching staff since 1994.

Whittingham is Utah's all-time wins leader (177); ranks third among all active FBS head coaches and third among head coaches who remained at the same school. He finished with a 177-88 (.668) record at Utah. The Utes had a winning record in 18 of his 21 seasons as head coach and won 10-plus games in a season on eight occasions (2008, 2009, 2010, 2015, 2019, 2021, 2022 and 2025).

His teams performed at a high level in the postseason, winning 11 bowl games (11-6), which ranks among the top four active coaches. He has led Utah to 11 different bowl destinations during his tenure, including two Rose Bowls, one Fiesta Bowl, one Sugar Bowl and the 15th-ranked Utes will face the Nebraska Cornhuskers in the Las Vegas Bowl for the fifth time in his career (Dec. 31, 3:30 pm).

He is the second-longest tenured active head football coach at the NCAA's Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS), trailing only Iowa's Kirk Ferentz.

Whittingham led Utah to three conference championships including an undefeated 2008 season capped by a Sugar Bowl win over Alabama. He earned three national Coach of the Year awards, including the AFCA and Bear Bryant Awards in 2008 and the Bobby Dodd Trophy in 2019.

Whittingham is credited with recruiting top players and developing their fullest potential. His players achieved great

success on and off the field during their time in Salt Lake City. He had 35 players earn All-America selection, including 17 of those who earned selection from the major award associations, and 10 of whom were either consensus or unanimous honorees. Players also earned 105 first-team all-conference awards, including 60 in the Utes' 15 seasons at the Power conference level. In addition, eight of those individuals were named conference player of the year. In the classroom, six Utes earned Academic All-America honors and 400 academic all-conference accolades were received by Whittingham's players.

Utah's success on the field carried over to the NFL as Whittingham developed NFL talent on a yearly basis. The Utes had 31 selections from 2017-25, which ranks as the most among current Big 12 schools.

Whittingham coached 391 games during his 32 seasons at Utah, contributing to a record 262 wins. He spent 11 seasons as an assistant coach with the program before being elevated to head coach in 2004. Whittingham joined the staff as defensive line coach in 1994 and was promoted to defensive coordinator starting with the 1995 season. He spent the next 10 years running the defense while either mentoring the linebackers or safeties during that time.

Whittingham was a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, Brigham Young, during the 1985-86 seasons. He spent the 1987 season as the defensive coordinator at the College of Eastern Utah. He joined the Idaho State program for six seasons (1988-93), mentoring the linebackers and serving as the special teams coordinator for four seasons before assuming the role of defensive coordinator for his final two seasons.

Whittingham is a 1984 graduate of BYU and earned a master's degree from the school in 1987. He played linebacker for the Cougars from 1978-81, earning first-team All-WAC and WAC Defensive Player of the Year accolades in 1981.

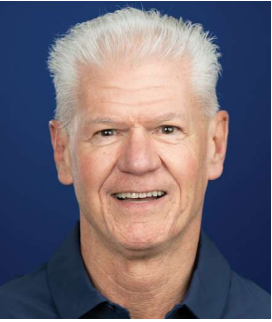

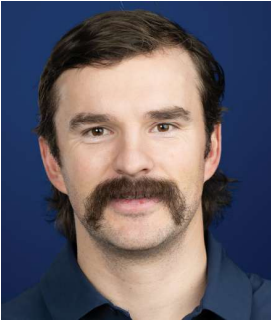
