THE GAME

Miami (5-3, 3-1 MAC) closes out a two-game MAC road trip this Saturday, Oct. 26 at 7 p.m. with its first game versus the University of Toledo (5-2, 3-0 MAC) since the 1998 season. The RedHawks are tied for second in the East Division with Ohio University, whom they take on next week at home. The Rockets own an unblemished conference mark heading into this week, posting wins vs. Eastern Michigan (65-13), Ball State (37-17) and Central Florida (27-24). Last week, Toledo used a pair of 100-yard rushing games from Astin Martin and Trinity Dawson and a 197-yard passing performance from Brian Jones to get past UCF, 27-24, in Orlando. Meanwhile, Miami rebounded from the previous week's loss with a dominating 49-0 blanking of Buffalo. The shutout was the RedHawks first since white-washing the Bulls, 43-0, in 1999.

This weekend will be head coach Terry Hoepfner's first trip into the Glass Bowl. As an assistant coach Hoepfner posted a record of 4-7-1 against the Rockets, including a 2-4-0 mark in the Glass Bowl. The RedHawks, who are averaging 42.3 points per game over their last four contests, could become the first team since the 1954 squad to post 40 points or more in three straight contests if they can score 40 this week.

Head Coach Terry Hooppner

Miami University's "Cradle of Coaches" reputation is well-documented. Throughout Miami history, an impressive group of coaches have strolled the sidelines as either assistant or head coaches.

In terms of coaching longevity, however, no individual can match the dedication and loyalty of current head coach Terry Hooppner (pronounced HEP-ner). Now in his fourth season as the RedHawk head mentor, Hooppner is in his 17th year with Miami. No other football coach has spent that amount of time in Oxford.

After spending 13 years as a Miami assistant coach, Hooppner was tabbed the RedHawks' 31st head football mentor on January 27, 1999. He succeeded Randy Walker, the school's winningest coach, who left for the similar position at Northwestern University.

A 1969 graduate of Franklin (Ind.) College, Hooppner made his debut as a collegiate head coach after working four years as an assistant (1986-89) under former Miami mentor Tim Rose and nine under Walker. Just prior to his appointment as head coach, Hooppner served as the RedHawks' assistant head coach and defensive coordinator.

Ironically, Hooppner began his head coaching career by facing his former boss in the 1999 opener at Northwestern. Hooppner and the RedHawks came out on top, defeating Walker and the Wildcats 28-3.

Prior to coming to Oxford, Hooppner spent six years as the defensive coordinator at his alma mater. Two of his three stints as a prep head coach were at East Noble High School in Kendallville, Ind. (1979) and at Mullins High School in Mullins, S.C. (1976-79). Hooppner also spent a pair of years as an assistant high school coach in Alabama (1974-75) after starting his career as the head coach at Eastbrook High School (1970-72) in Marion, Ind.

Since his arrival at Miami, Hooppner's responsibilities have grown, and not coincidentally, the RedHawks' football program has savored its most success in recent years. He began his Miami tenure coaching linebackers (1986) before starting an eight-year run as the defensive back coach. In 1993, Miami added the assistant head coach title to Hooppner's resume, and then in 1995, he was awarded the defensive coordinator position.

In his final four years (1995-98) as the RedHawks' defensive coordinator, Miami set the standard for defense in the Mid-American Conference. Three of those four years, the RedHawks ranked No. 1 in total defense. Miami also led the MAC in pass efficiency defense and scoring defense.

Nationally, Miami's 1998 club ranked fourth in scoring defense, fifth in pass efficiency defense and 16th in total defense. The RedHawks set a single-season school mark of 377 interception return yards and five interception returns for touchdowns. In 1995, Miami ranked first nationally in pass defense and second in total defense.

Individually, Hooppner has developed some of the Mid-American Conference's top defensive talent. Some of the all-America and all-MAC players to play for Miami during Hooppner's run as a defensive back and defensive coordinator include: all-America defensive back Ron Carpenter, two-time first-team all-MAC defensive back Sheldon White, three-time first-team all-MAC linebacker Dee Osborne, 1995 MAC Defensive Player of the Year Johnnie Williams, two-time first-team all-MAC defensive back Jamie Taylor, two-time MAC Defensive Player of the Year and 1998 all-America JoJuan Armour, 1998 first-team all-MAC defensive back Jay Baker and 1999 MAC Defensive Player of the Year and 1998 all-America linebacker Dustin Cohen.

Hooppner, who turned 55 in August, was invited to training camp with the NFL's St. Louis Cardinals and Green Bay Packers organizations but played his professional career for the WFL's Detroit Wheels and Charlotte Hornets.

A native of Woodburn, Ind., Hooppner earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Franklin. He minored in biology. In 1983, Hooppner received a master's degree in education from Butler.

This is Hooppner's first meeting versus Toledo.

SERIES HISTORY

MIAMI VS. MAC WEST

Miami is 10-3 versus MAC West Division opponents since the league split into two divisions in 1997. The RedHawks are 1-1 vs. Ball State, 1-0 vs. Central Michigan, 2-0 vs. Eastern Michigan, 2-1 vs. Northern Illinois, 1-1 vs. Toledo and 1-0 vs. Western Michigan in the last five seasons. Miami lost its first MAC West game two weeks ago at home to Northern Illinois, 48-41. Hoepfner is 5-2 vs. the West.

THE "ROADHAWKS"

This weekend, Miami will be going in search of its fifth road win of the year. The last time the RedHawks topped five wins on the road was during the 1998 season, when they posted a 6-1 mark away from Oxford. The four road wins already match the most by any Terry Hoepfner-led squad, equaling his 4-2 mark in 1999. The biggest difference has been the RedHawks' ability to run the football on the road. In five away games, Miami has averaged 146.4 yards on the ground and scored 12 touchdowns, in comparison to just 79.0 yards and three touchdowns in three home contests.

LIGHTING UP THE SCOREBOARD

After scoring 85 points in its first four games, the Miami offense has exploded for 169 points the last four weeks, averaging an eye-popping 42.3 points per game and outscoring its opponents 169-105. The last time the RedHawks scored that many points in a four-game stretch was in 1998 vs. Cincinnati (41-0), Ohio (35-21), Northern Illinois (41-10) and Kent State (56-0), posting 173 points.

During the stretch, the RedHawks have used an efficient attack, posting 1,844 yards of total offense on 307 plays from scrimmage, a 6.0 yards per play average. Sophomore quarterback Ben Roethlisberger has been the epitome of efficiency in the four games, completing 69.4 percent of his passes (100-of-144) for 1,233 yards and 10 touchdowns.

OFF AND RUNNING

The running game, which had sputtered through much of the first three games, gaining a total of 218 yards (72.7 yards per game), is back on track after posting 751 yards the last five weeks (150.2 yards per game). Junior running back Luke Clemens has spearheaded the resurgence by rushing for 591 yards on 110 carries and nine touchdowns. This season, the RedHawks are 4-0 when recording 150 yards rushing or more and 14-5 in three-plus years under head coach Terry Hooppner.

TURN ON THE SCOREBOARD

Last week, Miami scored on its opening drives of the first and second halves. It marked the third straight game, the RedHawks have taken the opening drive of a each half in for a score, picking up five touchdowns and field goal. Miami has been even more impressive after making halftime adjustments, taking their opening drive of the second half in for a touchdown in each of the last five games. This season, Miami is 4-2 when getting on the board first and 22-3 in the last four years. Below is a breakdown of the RedHawks' opening drives this year.

FINISHING IT OFF

Under head coach Terry Hooppner, Miami is 20-5 (.800) when tied or leading heading into the second half.

THIRD DOWN AND ... (PART I)

Part of the reason for Miami's offensive success the last two weeks has been its ability to convert on third down. In their first six games, the RedHawks were able to convert just 28-of-76 third downs (36.8 percent). Since Miami has almost doubled its third down conversion total for first downs, going 20-of-35 (57.1 percent), including a season best 14-for-23 (60.1 percent) versus Northern Illinois.

THIRD DOWN AND ... (PART II)

While the offense had its success on third down, so has the defense, allowing just four total first downs in the last two games (4-for-24, 16.7 percent). Only one of those first downs has come in the one-to-eight yard range.

RED ALERT: THE REDHAWKS ARE COMING

The Miami offense has found a great deal of success in the red-zone the past five weeks, scoring on 24-of-26 (.923) trips inside the 20-yard line, including 18 touchdowns. This is in contrast to the first two weeks when the RedHawks converted on just 5-of-9 (.556) chances.

After posting just three sacks through the first three weeks, the Miami defense has found a way to get pressure on opposing quarterbacks, racking up 22 sacks in the past five games. Senior defensive end Matt Edwards (West Chester, OH/Moeller) has made the biggest difference this season, recording a team-high seven sacks. Edwards sits tied for second in the Mid-American Conference, averaging 0.88 sacks per game.

NOT TAKING ADVANTAGE OF THEIR OPPORTUNITIES

Despite causing 20 turnovers this season, including three interceptions last week at Buffalo, Miami has not taken advantage of the miscues, scoring just 44 points off turnovers.

GUNNING FOR A NINTH STRAIGHT WINNING SEASON

Coming off a 7-5 record in 2001, Miami shoots for its ninth straight winning season this fall. The RedHawks are 63-33-2 during this current string. The school record for consecutive winning seasons is 17 (1943-1959), while the record for consecutive non-losing seasons is 33 (1943-1975).

MR. OCTOBER

Like "Mr. October," Reggie Jackson, sophomore quarterback Ben Roethlisberger likes the changing of the leaves and the chill in the air. In seven career games during the month of October, Roethlisberger has put together a 6-1 record and has thrown for 2,141 yards (305.9 yards per game) and 20 touchdowns.

TIME WARP

In the first 112 years of football, Miami's quarterbacks recorded a total of seven 300-yard passing games. Last season alone, freshman quarterback Ben Roethlisberger tossed four 300-yard plus games, highlighted by his then-school-record 452 yards at Hawai'i. Roethlisberger not only broke his school record for 300-yard passing games with his sixth game over 300 yards versus Northern Illinois, he became the first player in MAC history to throw for over 500 yards in a conference game (525 yards). Of the school's top five single-game passing performances, he now has the top three. Last week at Buffalo, he tied the record for the most 200-yard passing games, equalling Mike Bath's record of 15.

SPREADING IT AROUND

Freshman quarterback Ben Roethlisberger tried to keep all of his receivers happy last year, spreading the ball around to 12 different receivers. Of that group, seven caught an average of one pass per game, led by Roethlisberger's favorite target, Jason Branch, with 46 receptions. Roethlisberger spread his touchdown passes around as well, completing scoring strikes to nine different receivers, including five players with two or more. This season, Roethlisberger has picked up where he left off, getting the ball to eight different players vs. North Carolina, Kent State and Akron, nine against Iowa, LSU, Cincinnati and Buffalo and a season-high 11 vs. Northern Illinois. In total this season, Roethlisberger has at least nine passes to 11 different receivers, including six that are averaging two catches a game.

GETTING OFF ON THE RIGHT FOOT

Sophomore kicker Jared Parseghian (Sylvania, OH/St. John's Jesuit) has turned the fortunes around for the Miami kicking game this season, connecting on each of the RedHawks' first eight field goal attempts. Parseghian is one of just five kickers in college football who are perfect on the year.

Last year, Miami started off 0-for-3 until Parseghian hit a 34 yarder versus Buffalo on Oct. 6. in the fifth game of the season. His eight field goals this season already equal the RedHawks' total from last year. Parseghian's 12 career field goals have him tied for ninth on the school field goal list and his .750 accuracy is first all-time at Miami.

THE TREMENDOUS TRIO

For the first time in school history, Miami has the luxury of three 1,000-yard receivers on its roster at the same time. Sophomore Mike Larkin surpassed the 1,000-yard mark last week at Buffalo joining senior wide receiver Eddie Tillitz, who cleared the mark at

North Carolina and fellow senior Jason Branch, who passed the milestone last season. Branch currently has 108 receptions for 1,456 yards, while Tillitz has 102 receptions for 1,189 yards. The trio are the 17th, 18th and 19th Miami players to go over 1,000 yards receiving in their careers.

RACING UP THE LIST

Sophomore wide receiver Michael Larkin (Cincinnati, OH/St. Xavier) became the fastest RedHawk in school history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in a career. Larkin accomplished the feat in just 19 games, two less than Andy Schillinger who made it in 21 games from 1984-87. At his current pace, Larkin would end his career with 2,558 yards, 427 yards more than Trevor Gaylor's (1996-1999) school record of 2,131.

Larkin has caught a pass in each of his 19 career games. The second-longest active streak is Corey Kirkpatrick who has at least one reception in each of Miami's first eight games.

THE THREE AMIGOS

Since the start of the modern history of Miami football, which began in 1948, 15 receivers have gone over the 500-yard mark for a season. Only twice during the 53-year stretch have two players gone for over 500 yards in the same season (1987 – Andy Schillinger and John Stofa; 2000 – Ty Buxton and Sly Johnson). Last season, three RedHawks — Jason Branch, Michael Larkin and Eddie Tillitz — eclipsed the 500-yard plateau for the first time in program history. All three return for this season.

IT AIN'T OVER, TILLITZ OVER

Senior wide receiver Eddie Tillitz (Martinsville, Ind./Martinsville) has become one of the big play makers for Miami over his career, making key plays for the RedHawks vs. Buffalo, Akron and Ohio just last year. After returning his third career punt for a touchdown, an 80-yarder versus Buffalo, Tillitz capped one of the most memorable moments in Miami football history as he pulled in Ben Roethlisberger's game-winning touchdown pass as time expired vs. Akron on Oct. 13. One week later with Miami down 21-7 just before the end of the first half at Ohio, Tillitz pulled in an important 11-yard touchdown to pull the RedHawks within seven points heading to the break. He later grabbed the game-winning score with 8:36 left in the game. Last year, Tillitz touched the ball 68 times as a receiver (43 receptions) and punt returner (25 punt returns), moving the ball an average of 12.4 yards per touch, including a team-high 13 plays of over 20 yards. Of those 13 plays, four went for touchdowns.

In 2000, after not returning a punt for a touchdown in 283 consecutive games—the longest such streak in Division I-A football— Tillitz stopped Miami's drought on Sept. 9 at Eastern Michigan. Tillitz returned not one but two punts for TDs against the Eagles. The streak dated to Oct. 19, 1974 (John McVay, 66-yard punt vs. Bowling Green). Further research revealed that during the 26-year stretch, the RedHawks went 1,628 punt returns without a score.

BOWEN HOPES FOR MANY RETURNS

Senior kick returner Milt Bowen (Newfield, NJ/Delsea Regional), who broke the school record for career kickoff return yards earlier this year against LSU, looks to further solidify his place in the MAC record book this week at Toledo. Bowen needs just 45 kickoff return yards to move past the Rocket's own Eddie Harris (1982-85) into third place all-time in MAC career kickoff return yardage.

The combination of solid team defense and the running of Travis Prentice produced Miami's fifth straight win. Miami fell behind 7-0 when Toledo, the preseason MAC favorite, took the opening kickoff and marched 79 yards in 14 plays. UT quarterback Chris Wallace capped the drive with a five-yard scoring run. The RedHawks tied the game at 7-7 when Prentice tallied the first of three rushing TD's with a 1-yard run with 13:15 remaining in the second quarter. A seven-yard run by Mike Bath off a fake field goal attempt kept the drive alive. That touchdown represented the first first-half points for Miami this season. Later in the quarter, Prentice again capped a long drive with a one-yard plunge, which gave the RedHawks the lead for good. In the second half, Miami pushed the margin to 21-7 when Bath scored on a nine-yard run on the quarter's first series. After a Toledo interception TD return narrowed the gap to 21-14, Miami regained its 14-point cushion with a nine-yard scoring scamper from Prentice.

BIG BEN UP FOR O'BRIEN

When the Davey O'Brien Foundation announced the preseason watch list for the 2002 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award, given annually to the nation's top college quarterback, Miami sophomore quarterback **Ben Roethlisberger** (Findlay, OH/Findlay) was one of 32 named to the list.

Roethlisberger, the nation's top freshman quarterback in passing yards, touchdown passes and total offense from a year ago, put together the best season by a Miami quarterback in 2001, breaking school records for passing yards (3,105), completions (241), touchdowns (25), completion percentage (63.3 percent) and total offense (3,294). All of those totals rank among the top 10 in Mid-American Conference history, and his yardage and touchdown totals were both MAC freshmen records. Last season, Roethlisberger earned MAC Freshman of the Year and was Football Writer's Association of America first-team all-America and named second-team all-MAC honors.

The O'Brien Award is named in honor of the late Davey O'Brien, the all-American and Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback for Texas Christian University who led the Horned Frogs to the 1938 national championship.

WALK-ON SUCCESS

Sophomore safety Matt Pusateri has come a long way in just three short years after making the team as a walk-on in 2000. Last year the Dublin, Ohio native, ranked second on the team and 15th in the MAC, averaging 9.8 takedowns per game and earning Sporting News Third-team Freshman All-American.

This season, Pusateri leads the team in tackles with 93 stops, 30 more than Matt Robillard who sits in second. He has recorded at least one tackle in all 20 of Miami's games the last two years and posted in double digits 15 times. Pusateri got his career off to a bang last year posting a career high 18 tackles in his first career game at Michigan.

ROBILLARD NAMED TO BUTKUS AWARD WATCH LIST

Miami University senior linebacker Matt Robillard (Milford, Conn./Milford Academy) has been identified on the preliminary watch list of 67 Division I football players that meet the criteria for the 18th Butkus Award, presented annually to the nation's best collegiate linebacker.

Robillard, also a first-team all-Mid-American Conference honoree in 2001, is a converted defensive back that totaled 109 total tackles and a team-leading 74 solo stops a year ago. The senior also led the RedHawks with 13 tackles-for-loss, including five quarterback sacks. Robillard ranked 19th in the MAC with 9.0 tackles per game in

REDHAWK LINEBACKER NAMED TO NAGURSKI TROPHY WATCH LIST

Miami University linebacker Terrell Jones (St. Louis, Mo./Mehlville) has been identified on the preliminary watch list of 64 Division I football players selected by the Football Writers Association of America for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy presented by the Charlotte Touchdown Club. The award has been presented annually since 1993 to the nation's top defensive player.

Jones, a first-team all-MAC selection a year ago, ranked 12th in the MAC in tackles per game (10.0 tpg) during the 2001 season, amassing a Miami team-best 124 total tackles. A selection to The Sporting News Freshmen all-America team and runner-up for MAC Freshman of the Year in 2001, Jones recorded double-digits in tackles seven times in 12 games last season and six times as a freshman.

The winner of the Nagurski Trophy will receive the honor on Dec. 9 in Charlotte, N.C.

Now in its 10th year of honoring the defensive player in Division I football, the award is named after Hall of Famer and University of Minnesota and Chicago Bears star Bronko Nagurski.

of the Year in 2001, Jones recorded double-digits in tackles seven times in 12 games last season and six times as a freshman.

Robillard, also a first-team all-MAC honoree in 2001, led the RedHawks with 13 tackles-for-loss, including five quarterback sacks. Robillard ranked 19th in the MAC with 9.0 tackles per game in 2001.

Last season, Jones and Robillard were the first Miami linebacking tandem to each earn first-team all-MAC plaudits since current National Football League products JoJuan Armour and Dustin Cohen achieved the feat in 1998. Jones and Robillard are two of just five MAC players to earn spots on the preliminary list.

Eligibility for the Rotary Lombardi Award is limited to down linemen and those players who line up within five yards of the football.

WHAT A "HOOT"

The RedHawks used a bit of trickery called "the Hoot-n-anny" against the University of Cincinnati to down the

Bearcats, 31-26. Down 21-17 midway through the third quarter and facing a fourth down and six from the 13-yard line, Miami sent out its field goal unit to seemingly pull within one point. Instead, redshirt freshman backup quarterback Josh Betts (Vandalia, OH/Butler) arranged the players in a swinging gate formation, with six players lined up on the far left-hand side of the field while two tight ends, Matt Brandt and Tyler Vogel, place kicker Todd Soderquist and he lined up on the right-hand side of the field. Acting as center, Brandt hiked the ball to Betts, who scrambled and completed the touchdown pass to Vogel. The pass and reception were both firsts for Betts and Vogel. Betts now has a quarterback rating of 539.20, the highest rating possible. He was quoted after the game as saying, "His first catch, my first pass, I don't know how much better it gets. Maybe I should just retire. Maybe they'll retire my number. I mean, I think my quarterback rating's got to be up there."

WITH A SNAP OF THE FINGERS

In just one short month, freshman long snapper Dave McClain (Cincinnati, Ohio/Colerain) went from walk-on to playing against the likes of North Carolina, LSU and Iowa. When it was determined senior long snapper Scott Sagehorn wouldn't play this year due to a knee injury suffered last season at Hawai'i, the Miami coaching staff went in search of a replacement and found local Cincinnati-product and walk-on David McClain (Cincinnati, OH/Colerain) to help fill his shoes. Since joining the team, McClain worked his way up the depth chart and has taken over the long snapping duties full time. His first game experience was memorable, as the game was played in a constant downpour of rain at North Carolina. McClain finished the game a perfect seven-for-seven on his snaps.

GETTING OUT OF THE BLOCKS EARLY

When camp opened on August 8, 104 players took part in the annual fitness test, administered by head strength and conditioning coach Dan Dalrymple. According to Dalrymple, an impressive 69 players tallied perfect scores on the test, which consists of a series of sprints, weight lifts and agility tests.

"Nothing was mandatory this summer," Dalrymple said, "but the vast majority of the guys really answered the bell. A lot of our key guys are in the best condition of their lives."

Dalrymple noted that perhaps the biggest surprise of the day came from the freshman class, as 25 of the 27 newcom-

ers passed the conditioning test, where 50 percent typically fail.

FAMILIAR NAME - PART I

As people read down Miami's roster, one quick question comes to mind as they come to sophomore place-kicker Jared Parseghian (Sylvania, Ohio/St. John's): Any relation to Ara Parseghian? The answer: yes. Jared is the great nephew of college coaching legend and Miami alumnus Ara Parseghian.

FAMILIAR NAME - PART II

Freshman wide receiver Michael Larkin (Cincinnati, OH/St. Xavier) is another name on the Miami roster that garners a great deal of attention. Larkin is the second cousin to the Larkin family that includes Cincinnati Reds shortstop Barry Larkin, Xavier University's all-time leading basketball scorer Byron Larkin, minor-league baseball player Stephan Larkin and another Michael Larkin that played football at Notre Dame. Against Iowa, Miami's Michael Larkin made a grand debut, pulling in three catches for 121 yards, including his first career reception, which was a 56-yard touchdown pass. He emerged as the RedHawks' long-ball threat in 2001, averaging 18.2 yards per catch (37 receptions for 672 yards). His 81-yard touchdown reception at Bowling Green is the longest catch of his career and was the 12th longest pass play in college football last year.

OLD MIAMI ... NEW MIAMI, SAME TRADITION ... NEW LOOK!

Miami University head football coach Terry Hoepfner unveiled three new uniform designs this past summer. The RedHawks will be debuting the white away uniform at North Carolina this week before returning home the next week to host the University of Iowa in their new red uniforms. The third alternate uniform will be used in coordination with special home events. The uniforms are a break from the Miami uniforms of the last thirty years, going away from the traditional red jersey and white pants combinations that the team has sported the past several years.

"As you look around college football you see a lot of teams making a switch from the traditional uniforms they have worn for years to something new," said Hoepfner. "It was time to buy new uniforms and we put the idea out to our kids and they were excited about a change. This year's marketing theme is 'Old Miami ... New Miami, Same Tradition ... New Look' and the uniforms embody just that. We were able to combine elements of the traditional Miami Red and White with a progressive design. They make us look fast, even standing still."

North Carolina's nine turnovers tied the Atlantic Coast Conference record, set by Wake Forest against Duke on Nov. 17, 1956. Tar Heels quarterback Darian Durant committed six turnovers to fall to 0-3 as a starter. Miami junior defensive back Ryan Sprague spearheaded the RedHawks defense picking off two passes and making eight tackles. Junior running back Luke Clemens gave the RedHawks the deciding score with 8:13 left in the game and finished the day with 66 yards on the ground and a pair of scoring jaunts.

Gillman Rocked the Cradle

Although legendary coaches like Earl Blaik, Paul Brown and Weeb Ewbank had roots at Miami as players, Sid Gillman is widely recognized as the coach who got the Cradle of Coaches rocking.

Gillman, who was head coach from 1944-47, began a football dynasty in Oxford by directing his Miami teams to a 31-6-1 record, a winning percentage of .829. His 1947 Redskin squad rolled to a 9-0-1 record, including a Sun Bowl victory over Texas Tech in Miami's first-ever bowl game.

But Gillman's tenure was marked by more than just an impressive record. His passion for football and his enthusiasm for teaching the game led to an incredible coaching legacy at Miami. Among the players Gillman recruited to Oxford were Bill Arnsparger, Paul Dietzel, Ara Parseghian, John Pont and Bo Schembechler, all of whom were influenced by Gillman's passion for the game and went on to coaching greatness themselves. Parseghian, Pont and Schembechler began their head coaching careers at Miami, serving back-to-back-to-back coaching stints from 1951-68. All three went on to earn National Coach of the Year honors—Parseghian at Notre Dame, Pont at Indiana and Schembechler at Michigan. Dietzel was also a National Coach of the Year at LSU.

After spending one year as an assistant at West Point, Gillman returned to southwestern Ohio and was named head coach at Cincinnati where he led the Bearcats to a 50-13-1 record and three MAC championships in six seasons. He then enjoyed a distinguished 18-year career in the National Football League, posting a 122-99-7 record with the Los Angeles Rams (1955-60), San Diego Chargers (1961-71) and Houston Oilers (1973-74). His teams won five divisional titles and one AFL crown.

Gillman, who went on to work in the front office with the Dallas Cowboys, Oakland Raiders and Chicago Bears, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1983 and the Miami Athletic Hall of Fame in 1991.

Miami Depth Chart vs. Toledo

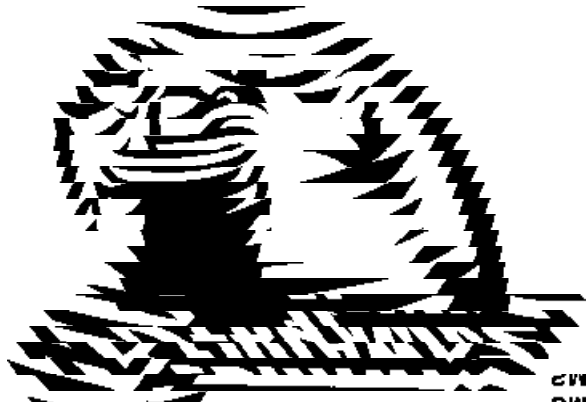
