HEAD COACH CHRIS BERGERON



Chris Bergeron begins his fourth season as the head coach of Miami Hockey. Bergeron's RedHawks went 7-27-2 in 2021-22 and add 10 new faces, nine of them freshmen, to a talented returning nucleus. Seven of Miami's top 10 scorers from a year ago are back with the Red and White, including the first line of PJ Fletcher, Red Savage, and Matthew Barbolini. Goaltender Ludvig Persson returns for his third season in Oxford after setting the program's single-season saves record a year ago.

Bergeron's 2021-22 team played half of its 36 games against opponents ranked among top 10 nationally and was tied or ahead at some point in the third period in a total of 20 games. Freshman forward Red Savage was named NCHC Rookie of the week a league-high four times, while team captain Derek Daschke was a finalist for the NCHC's Senior Scholar-Athlete Award.

In all, 23 student-athletes on the 2021-22 Miami Hockey roster were named to the NCHC's Academic All-Conference team,

with nine of those players earning Distinguished Scholar-Athlete status. Bergeron's program also produced three AHCA All-American Scholars in 2021-22.

In 2020-21, Miami went 5-18-2 with the entire season being played against conference opponents. Persson had an impressive debut season that year, leading all NCHC goalies with a .930 regular-season save percentage. The Miami freshman goaltender earned conference All-Rookie honors, was named to the All-NCHC second team, and picked up Miami's first Three Stars Award from the NCHC.

In his first season trying to restore Miami Hockey to the perch he helped it reach in his prior stint as an assistant, Bergeron and his staff upped the RedHawks' competitiveness down the stretch of an 8-21-5 season. Miami's power play emerged as a weapon under Bergeron's system, finishing the 2019-20 campaign 10th nationally with a 23.9 percent conversion rate. Senior Gordie Green enjoyed his finest campaign, logging 36 points and earning

Director of Athletics David Saylor chose Bergeron to be the sixth head coach in Miami hockey history on April 5, 2019. Bergeron, a 1993 Miami graduate who played on the school's first conference championship team and NCAA Tournament qualifier that same year, had been the head coach at former Central Collegiate Hockey Association rival Bowling Green for the previous nine seasons. Under his guidance, the Falcons went 171-154-44.

Bergeron took Bowling Green to two Western Collegiate Hockey Association Tournament finals in his last three years, taking the eventual champion to overtime in both occurrences. In 2018-19, the Falcons secured an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament thanks to a 25-11-5 season, a record that represented the program's most victories since 1994-95 and its first postseason berth since 1989-90.

Bowling Green won a mere five games the year before he arrived on the bench and had not enjoyed a winning record since the 1996-97 campaign, but that changed in 2013-14 when the Falcons went 18-15-6 in

Bergeron's fourth season. The Falcons then took a jump from there, posting 20 or more victories in five-straight seasons, going a collective 114-66-24 in that span.

Prior to taking the Bowling Green job, Bergeron played a crucial part in Miami's rise to prominence. His recruiting chops and influence on the bench helped the RedHawks go 226-139-37 (.608 winning percentage) in his 10 seasons as an assistant coach. MU went to the NCAA Tournament six times, advanced to the first two Frozen Fours in school history in 2009 and 2010, appearing in the 2009 national championship game. During that stretch, MU won two conference titles (2005-06 and 2009-10), set a school record with 33 victories in 2007-08, earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament twice (2008 and 2010) and was the top overall seed in the 2010 NCAA Tournament.

Individually, Bergeron helped coach nine players who went on to earn All-American honors, including 2011 Hobey Baker winner Andy Miele, who became the first-ever Miami player to win the award. Additionally, Bergeron coached 17 RedHawks who went on to play in the NHL during his tenure.

Bergeron played at Miami from 1989-93 and was a two-year team captain. As a senior, Bergeron scored a team-high 61 points on 21 goals and 40 assists. Along with his offensive achievements that year, the four-year letterwinner was named the CCHA's Best Defensive Forward as well as Miami's Most Outstanding Senior.

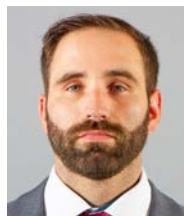
He then spent seven years playing professionally before returning to Miami as an assistant coach. During that time, he played with the Adirondack Red Wings (AHL), the Birmingham Bulls (ECHL), the Toledo Storm (ECHL), the Cincinnati Cyclones (IHL) and the Columbus Cottonmouths (CHL), being named a league all-star four times. He also has coaching experience at the professional level, having served as a player/assistant coach with the Port Huron Bordercats of the United Hockey League for two seasons.

Bergeron earned a bachelor's degree in education from Miami. He and his wife, Janis, have two sons – Logan and Connor.

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October 20, 1978: The age of Miami varsity ice hockey begins at Goggin Ice Arena with the Red and White thrashing the arch-rival Cincinnati Bearcats 15-2. Paul Kinney led Miami with four goals while Dave McClintock also tallied a hat trick.

November 10, 1978: Miami hockey notches its first victory against an NCAA foe, defeating the University of Illinois-Chicago by a 7-4 tally in Goggin Arena. Bill Bok led the way for Miami, tallying two goals and two assists.

February 24, 1979: Gary DeLonge tallies a Miami record eight points in the Red and White's 16-1 thrashing of Cincinnati. DeLonge finishes Miami's inaugural varsity season with 74 points, a single-season record that still stands today.

December 4, 1979: In its second season as a varsity program, Miami earns its first victory over an NCAA Division I opponent, defeating U.S. International 4-3. Rick Kuraly recorded the game-winning goal with less than two minutes to play.

January 19, 1980: In its first victory over an established CCHA foe, Miami defeats Bowling Green 4-3. The win provides a good measure of revenge for the Red and White, which had lost two games to the Falcons by a combined score of 23-1 the previous year.

October 23, 1981: The CCHA era begins for Miami hockey with the Red and White defeating Western Michigan 2-0 in Kalamazoo, Mich. Vern Sketchley and Steve Morris each tallied goals while Dan Kodatsky earned the shutout in goal. Miami went on to collect nine league wins in its inaugural season of CCHA play.

February 20, 1981: Rick Kuraly tallies a Miami record five goals in the Red and White's 15-3 trouncing of Lake Forest College. Kuraly finishes his career two years later as the only Miami

player to record more than 100 goals.

March 4, 1983: Miami competes in its first CCHA Quarterfinal game, losing 6-2 to Ohio State. The Red and White bounced back with a 6-4 win the next night behind two goals from Kevin Beaton, but OSU advanced due to its advantage in total goals.

October 21, 1988: In front of a Goggin Arena crowd of 3,248, Miami falls 3-2 to defending national champion Lake Superior State. The Red and White rebounded the following night, knocking off the Lakers 4-3 in front of 3,144, the third-largest crowd in Goggin history. It was the most well attended hockey weekend in Miami history.

March 10-11, 1992: Miami advances to the CCHA Semifinals for the first time in the program's history by sweeping Western Michigan 3-1 and 4-3 on the Broncos' home ice. In the 4-3 overtime win, Brian Savage tallied the game winner. The Red and White falls to top-seeded Michigan in its first semifinal appearance two days later.

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MEMORABLE MOMENTS



February 6, 1993: In front of 3,050 Goggin faithful, Miami, ranked No. 3 in the nation, rocks No. 2 rated Michigan 4-3 in overtime. After Michigan ties the game at the 15:05 mark of the third period, Jason Mallon strikes early in overtime to send the Red and White on its way to its first CCHA regular-season title.

March 6, 1993: Needing just one point to clinch its first CCHA regular-season title, Miami rallies from two goals down and ties Lake Superior State 6-6 to capture the CCHA crown. Brian Savage nets the game-tying goal at 17:47 in the third period.

March 11-12, 1993: Led by Brian Savage, who tallies two goals in each contest, the Red and White pounds the rival Ohio State Buckeyes 8-2 and 7-2 to advance to the CCHA semifinals for the second-consecutive season.

March 20, 1993: Miami advances to its first CCHA final by knocking off Ferris State 4-3 in overtime. Kevyn Adams tallies the game-winning goal in overtime, his second of the game, while Enrico Blasi and Chris Bergeron also record goals.

March 26, 1993: Five days after falling to Lake Superior State in its first CCHA Championship appearance, Miami returns to Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, Mich., to face Wisconsin in its first NCAA Tournament appearance. The Red and White cannot overcome two early Badger goals in a 3-1 loss. Stephen Rohr tallies Miami's first NCAA Tournament goal.

February 5, 1994: Miami holds off a late Notre Dame rally to defeat the Fighting Irish 6-5 and extend its winning streak to a record 10-games. The streak began Jan. 7 and ended on Feb. 11 with a 4-3 loss to the Illinois-Chicago.

March 1, 1997: Miami, ranked sixth nationally, knocks off defending national champion and No. 1-ranked Michigan 4-2 in Goggin Arena. The Red and White uses third period goals from Dan Boyle and Adam Copeland to clinch the win and lock up the No. 2 seed for the CCHA Tournament.

March 22, 1997: After falling in overtime to Michigan State in the CCHA semifinals, the Red and White earns its second at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, where it faces Cornell. Despite seizing the early lead, Miami is unable to hold off the Big Red, falling 4-2.

November 19-20, 1999: Miami ambushes No. 3 Michigan State in Goggin Arena, shutting down the Spartans 3-2 and 3-0. Freshman goalkeeper David Burleigh holds the Spartans scoreless for over four consecutive periods in the two games.

March 2, 2001: Paced by David Burleigh's career-record tying fifth shutout, Miami defeats Ohio State 3-0 to finish the regular season in a second-place CCHA tie with Michigan.

January 18, 2002: With his third shutout of the season at Lake Superior State, David Burleigh took over as Miami's all-time leader in shutouts with eight. Burleigh stopped 32 Laker shots en route to his third whitewash of the season.

October 4, 2002: With a 12-1 victory and 13-save performance against Air Force at the inaugural Lefty McFadden Invitational, goalie David Burleigh moved past Richard Shulmistra '94 for the all-time record at Miami with 41 wins.

October 10, 2003: Miami runs off five goals in the third period as it dominates No. 2 Michigan, 8-3, for its largest margin of victory in school history against the Wolverines. Derek Edwardson records his second career hat trick in the contest.

March 20, 2004: One night after dropping a 4-3 decision in overtime to Ohio State, Miami shuts out Northern Michigan, 4-0, to win the consolation game at the CCHA Super Six. It is Miami's first appearance in Joe Louis Arena since 1997-98.

March 26, 2004: Facing his former coach, Enrico Blasi leads the RedHawks to the program's third NCAA Tourney appearance against George Gwozdecky and the Denver Pioneers. Goals by Marty Guerin and Matt Davis pulled Miami to within one, but the Pioneers held off against the extra attacker to win, 3-2.

January 29, 2005: With a 5-3 win over Ferris State in Big Rapids, Mich., Enrico Blasi earned his 100th coaching victory and became just the second bench boss in Miami hockey history to reach the 100-win plateau. He joined Steve Cady, who led the Red and White for seven seasons and compiled 121 victories.

January 27, 2006: Enrico Blasi became Miami's all-time winningest hockey coach as he surpassed Steve Cady with the 122nd win of his career. Blasi's RedHawks skated to a 3-1 win over Ferris State in Big Rapids, Mich.

January 30, 2006: Following a series sweep of Ferris State, the RedHawks achieved the first No. 1 national ranking in school history in any sport, appearing at the top of all three major national polls.

February 14, 2006: A 6-3 win over Ohio State in front of a soldout Goggin Ice Arena clinched the second CCHA regular-season title in school history for the RedHawks.

March 11, 2006: Miami plays its final game in Goggin Ice Arena as the RedHawks down Western Michigan, 5-4, in overtime in the first round of the CCHA Playoffs. Freshman Alec Martinez scores the game-winner at the 17:00 mark of the extra frame.

March 24, 2006: The RedHawks earn a No. 2 seed at the NCAA East Regional in Worcester,

Mass., but fall 5-0 to Boston College in the opening round. Boston College advanced to the final game of the tournament before falling to Wisconsin.

October 6, 2006: Miami beats Denver, 5-2, in the first game ever played at Steve Cady Arena.

March 24, 2007: The RedHawks notch their first-ever victory in NCAA Tournament play, defeating host New Hampshire, 2-1.

March 30, 2009: Miami defeats Minnesota-Duluth 2-1 in Minneapolis for the West Regional Championship. It marks the first time the RedHawks have won multiple games in the NCAA Tournament and gives them their first Frozen Four appearance.

April 11, 2009: Miami takes the ice at the Verizon Center in Washington, D.C. in the national championship game. The RedHawks take a 3-1 lead into the final minute of regulation, but Boston University gets a pair of goals, plus the overtime winner to clinch the title.



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October 24, 2009: Former Miami Hockey head coach Steve Cady, who was the first hockey coach at Miami when the program became a varsity sport in 1978, is inducted into the Miami Athletic Hall of Fame. He compiled a 121-126-11 record in seven varsity years of ice hockey, while taking his 1983 and 1985 teams to the Central Collegiate Hockey Association playoffs.

February 12, 2010: Behind a 3-2 victory at Bowling Green, the RedHawks clinched the program's third ever CCHA regular-season title. Miami finished 21-2-5-2 in league play and ultimately won the title by an unprecedented 20 points over runner-up Michigan State.

March 28-29, 2010: Alden Hirschfeld scores 1:54 into the second overtime to give Miami a 3-2 double-overtime victory over Michigan in the NCAA Midwest Regional final, sending Miami on to its second straight and second ever NCAA Frozen Four, where the RedHawks were the overall No. 1 seed.

March 19, 2011: Miami defeats Western Michigan, 5-2, in the CCHA Championship game at Joe Louis Arena to capture the school's first ever Mason Cup.

April 8, 2011: Andy Miele becomes the first player in Miami history to capture the Hobey Baker Memorial Award, presented annually to the best player in college hockey.

March 23, 2012: Miami fell behind 3-0 early in the second period to UMass Lowell in the first round of the 2012 NCAA Tournament before mounting a furious rally in the third period. The RedHawks scored two goals within 14 seconds and with just over 10 minutes left in the third period, Miami completed the comeback, tying the game at 3-3. The RedHawks ultimately fell 2:13 into the extra session, however.

October 12, 2012: For the first time in program history, Miami opened the season with a shutout as freshman goaltender Ryan McKay stopped all 24 shots from Colgate for a 3-0 RedHawks victory.

February 17, 2013: Miami plays in its first outdoor game in program history, taking the ice at Chicago's Soldier Field in front of 52,051 fans, the largest crowd to ever watch a Miami hockey game. The RedHawks fell to Notre Dame, 2-1, in the OfficeMax Hockey City Classic, which also included Minnesota taking on Wisconsin as part of the doubleheader.

March 2, 2013: Needing a win on the last night of the regular season to clinch the final CCHA regular-season title outright, Miami struck early and jumped out to a 4-0 lead over rival Ohio State en route to a 4-2 win to clinch the program's fourth and final CCHA regular-season championship. It was also the final CCHA regular-season game ever for Miami, as the league shut its doors at season's end.

MEMORABLE MOMENTS



March 30, 2013: Second-seeded Miami faced Minnesota State in the Midwest Regional semifinal and pitched a shutout, Miami's first shutout in NCAA Tournament history, as the RedHawks topped the Mavericks, 4-0, to advance to the Midwest Regional final. The win was Miami's first in an NCAA Tournament since 2010.

October 18, 2013: Miami, ranked No. 1 nationally, hosted No. 6 North Dakota at Steve 'Coach' Cady Arena in the first ever National Collegiate Hockey Conference game. While North Dakota upset Miami by a 4-2 score, the RedHawks turned around the next day to post a 6-2 victory.

February 7, 2015: Miami returned to the Windy City triumphantly for its second Hockey City Classic contest. The Red and White endured a weather delay at Soldier Field and raced out to a 4-0 lead before holding off Western Michigan by a 4-3 count.

March 21, 2015: After coming up just short of a Cinderella run a year ago, the RedHawks returned to Minneapolis for the Frozen Faceoff and topped St. Cloud State, 3-2, in the NCHC Championship behind a Blake Coleman hat trick. Miami made its ninth NCAA Tournament appearance in 10 years, entering the East Regionals as a No. 1 seed.

The Legacy Project at Hayden Park

JAY HAYDEN BASEBALL CENTER

Opened in September 2015, this addition created a new home for Miami baseball that includes a new team locker room, team room/recruiting room, coaches offices and athletic training and equipment facilities. It is located down the left field line of McKie Field at Hayden Park with direct access into the park.

RANDY GUNLOCK FAMILY ATHLETIC PERFORMANCE CENTER

The home of Miami football, which was opened in 2017, overlooks Yager Stadium. The signature facility includes a team locker room, weight room, coaches offices, a large team meeting room and a state-of-the-art athletic training room serving all of Miami's student-athletes.

DAVID AND ANITA DAUCH INDOOR SPORTS CENTER (DISC)

Opened in February 2015, the DISC provides a year-round, all-weather training environment for nearly all Miami's varsity athletics programs. It features a full 120-yard FieldTurf field. Ben Roethlisberger Field also is utilized by Miami's club and intramural athletics programs.

GRADUATING CHAMPIONS



Named for former long-time head coach Bobby Kramig, the fully renovated soccer complex includes this distinct stadium entrance and plaza, and 700 bleacher structure.

SOCCER COMPLEX/BOBBY KRAMIG FIELD RENOVATIONS

Soccer unveiled a newly-renovated complex during the 2019 season. Named to honor former long-time head coach Bobby Kramig, the project provides a new, distinct stadium entrance and plaza for fans that connects back to the surrounding athletic campus from the east side of Yager Stadium. The complex is an additional unifying element in this part of campus through its new architecture and materials. In addition, the complex features a new 700-seat bleacher structure and a complete re-skin and renovation of the existing press box.

FIELD HOCKEY LOCKER ROOM AND FACILITY UPGRADE

In 2018, the Miami University field hockey team received a new locker room and stadium upgrades, privately funded through an anonymous donor. In 2021, the facility had a new turf installed.

LEAHY PERFORMANCE CENTER

Opened in fall 2014, this important addition rounds out one of the finest ice rink facilities in the nation with a cutting-edge weight and conditioning room, hockey shooting room, legacy hallway and champions room.





DAVID SAYLER

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



David Sayler has been Miami's athletic director since Jan. 2, 2013.

Since his arrival, Sayler has preached the mission of "Graduating Champions," an approach that provides guidance and support (fundraising) to Miami student athletes in the pursuit of excellence both in the classroom (graduate) and on the field (win championships).

To that end, Miami was named the winner of the Cartwright Award and unprecedented three-straight years, earning the honor in 2017-2018, 2018-19 and 2020-21 (*it was not awarded in 2019-20*). The awards is voted on by all Mid-American Conference institutions and recognizes the best Athletic Department in the conference in the areas of academics, community service and competitive results.

In 2018-19 Sayler guided a department that captured both the Reese and Jacoby Trophies for the top men's and women's program in the MAC in addition to its second straight Cartwright Award. Miami added school records in Coaches of the Year (7) and Players of the Year (10), cementing

2018-19 as one of the greatest single years in Miami Athletics history.

Miami's historic success continued in Fall 2019 as the RedHawks won five MAC Championships, including football's first regular season and MAC Championship title since 2010, while volleyball won its fourth straight regular season title.

Despite the chaos of COVID-19 in 2020-21, Miami won its 25th Reese Trophy, finished third in the Jacoby Trophy standings, a fraction of a point out of first, and again seized the Cartwright Award.

The 2021-22 season had more banner achievements with football capturing the Frisco Football Classic championship, field hockey winning its fifth-straight MAC regular-season and fourth-consecutive tournament title, softball notching its third straight MAC regular-season title and a tournament title, men's swimming and diving winning a second straight MAC championship and synchronized skating winning a collegiate national title and the senior team finishing sixth in the world.

DAVID SAYLER

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Much of that support comes directly from Miami's Graduating Champions Campaign, which recently surpassed its \$80 million goal since beginning in 2015 and successfully concluded with over \$82 million raised. That fundraising has come in many forms, highlighted by the Athletic Performance Center (opened Feb, 2017) that overlooks Yager Stadium and the David and Anita Dauch Indoor Sports Center, which opened in February, 2014. Saylor has also added an addition to Hayden Park for baseball, new lights, seating and flooring for Millett Hall, a weight room for the Goggin Ice Center and new outdoor courts for the tennis program.

While the fundraising aspect during Saylor's tenure has been impressive, Miami has also been dominant on the playing surface. Miami has won 51 conference championships since Saylor stepped foot on campus and has seen several squads accomplish post season success. Miami football is 30-12 in its last 42 MAC contests, best in the league. Hockey made the NCAA Tournament as a No. 1 seed in 2014-15. Field hockey has made seven straight MAC Championship games and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2017 and 2018. Softball upset Notre Dame in the NCAA Tournament in 2015-16 and volleyball advanced to two straight NCAA Tournaments in 2016 and 2017.

Next on that list is to not just graduate, but graduate in an impressive way. In the last eight years, Miami has recorded at least a 3.20 grade-point average each semester. In 2013-14 the RedHawks captured the MAC Academic Achievement Award and Miami has continued to excel with each program posting a 3.0 GPA or better for the 2020-21 academic year.

Prior to joining Miami, Saylor served as the Director of Athletics at South Dakota for two years. As South Dakota's Athletic Director, Saylor emphasized the improvement of the student-athlete's overall experience and instilling a renewed sense of pride in Coyote athletics.

Among his accomplishments were securing USD's 2012 membership in the Missouri Valley Football Conference and leading the way for USD's aggressive Master Facilities Plan, which included new facilities for basketball, outdoor track and field, and soccer. Saylor secured a \$20 million private gift, the largest single contribution in South Dakota athletics history. He also raised funds for a new basketball floor, which was introduced in 2011-12, and football turf, which made its debut in the fall of 2012.

Saylor has also spent time at Rice, Oregon State, Bowling Green, Houston, Hartford, Georgia and UConn.

After graduation from Ohio Wesleyan University (1991) with a Bachelor of Arts in Accounting, Saylor worked three years in the private sector, spending time with Ernst & Young in Cleveland and Peterson Consulting in Chicago. Saylor was inducted into the Miami Valley High School (class of 1987) Athletic Hall of Fame in 2016.

Saylor, born Sept. 6, 1969 in Greenwich, Conn., is married to the former Katie Fitzgerald of Bowling Green, Ohio. The couple has two sons, Connor Jameson and Liam Patrick.



GRADUATING CHAMPIONS

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THIS IS MIAMI ATHLETICS



Miami University Athletics supports 19 Division I athletic programs. Known as the Cradle of Coaches, Miami has been the training ground for more than 20 National Coaches of the Year recipients at the professional and collegiate levels. The Red-Hawks compete in the Mid-American Conference for all sports, except hockey, which competes in the National Collegiate Hockey Conference, and synchronized skating, which competes as part of U.S. Figure Skating.

Miami continues to rank among the top of the Mid-American Conference competitively. Several programs won or were in contention for championships and boasted marquee wins in 2021-22, individuals won titles and ranked among national leaders, and the Red-Hawk women were among the top two MAC programs in the final Jacoby standings, while the Miami men's teams were among the top third of the MAC in the Reese standings.

GREGORY CRAWFORD

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT



Gregory P. Crawford is the 22nd president of Miami University. A native of Elyria, Ohio, he and his wife, Dr. Renate Crawford, came to Miami in July 2016. Since his arrival at Miami, President Crawford has emphasized diversity and inclusion, engagement with students, and collaboration and interdisciplinary study across all of Miami's campuses and colleges.

President Crawford is a member of the Board of Directors at Cintrifuse, the incubator and accelerator dedicated to creating a stronger technology presence in Greater Cincinnati. He is active in the Inter-University Council of Ohio (IUC), the association representing Ohio's 14 public universities. He has actively engaged federal, state and local policymakers and stakeholders to advance higher education in Ohio and beyond.

Before joining the Miami community, President Crawford was vice president and associate provost at the University of Notre Dame. He joined Notre Dame's faculty in 2008, serving as the William K. Warren Foundation Dean of the College of Science. He previously served as the dean

of engineering at Brown University, where he had joined the physics and engineering faculty in 1996.

President Crawford earned bachelor's (mathematics and physics), master's (physics), and doctorate (chemical physics) degrees from Kent State University. He completed two postdoctoral fellowships and was a researcher at the Xerox Palo Alto Research Center before

joining the faculty at Brown. His work includes more than 400 research and education publications, review articles and book chapters, and 21 U.S. patents and patent applications.

President Crawford met his wife Renate while both were in the Ph.D. program in Physics at Kent State University. Renate Crawford, Miami's university ambassador and an adjunct professor of physics, is the author of numerous scholarly publications about Confined Liquid Crystals – and her sister is a “Miami Merger.” Greg and Renate are the proud parents of two daughters. Both girls have been actively involved in the Crawfords' fundraising efforts for Niemann-Pick Type C disease and breast cancer, and are excited to be part of the Miami family.



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REDHAWK FANS

Part of following RedHawk athletics is understanding the rules that shape your participation as a fan and supporter of the programs. The following is a brief outline of two important concepts you should be aware of as you support Miami Athletics.

A representative of an institution's athletics interests is an individual who is known (or should be known) by members of the institution's executive or athletics administration. You are a representative of the institution's interest if you:

- Have participated in or have been a member of an agency or organization promoting the institution's intercollegiate athletics interests
- Have made financial contributions to the athletics department or to an athletics booster organization of the institution
- Have provided or have helped provide summer employment for student-athletes
- Have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families
- Are the parents or legal guardian of an enrolled student-athlete
- Participated as a member of a Miami varsity sport. Once an individual has been identified as such a representative, that person retains that identity. Once a booster ... always a booster!

EXTRA BENEFITS

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or representative of the institution's athletics interests, to provide a student-athlete, his/her family or his/her friends a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Receipt of a benefit by any of these individuals is a violation of NCAA legislation. Receipt of a benefit by any of these individuals is not a violation of NCAA legislation if it is demonstrated that the same benefit is generally available to the institution's students, relatives, friends or to a particular segment of the student body, determined on a basis unrelated to athletic ability. *Extra benefits include, but are not limited to:*

- Credit on purchase (e.g. airline tickets, clothing) or services (e.g. dry cleaning, tailoring, etc.);
- A loan of money in any amount
- Providing of a loan to a prospect's relative or friend
- The use of personal properties (e.g. boats, summer homes, cars, stereos)
- Providing holiday or birthday gifts.

Receipt of an extra benefit by a student-athlete can result in the individual being declared ineligible to compete. You are an important part of Miami Athletics, and we encourage your participation.
