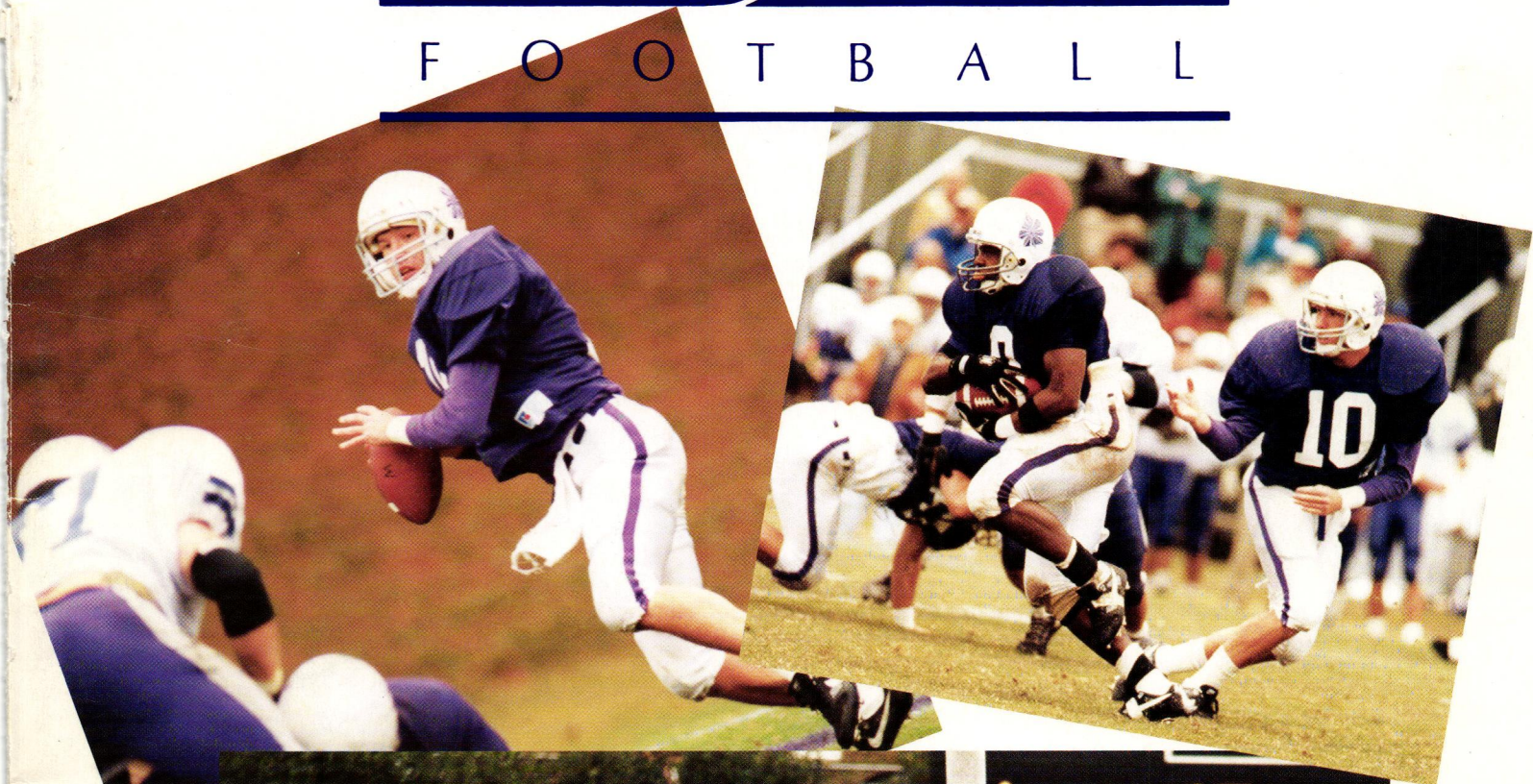

## ***A Profile of Millsaps College***

Millsaps, a selective four-year undergraduate liberal arts college, has long enjoyed a reputation for academic leadership. Located in Jackson, Mississippi, the College was founded in 1890 by Major Reuben Webster Millsaps.

Under the leadership of Dr. George M. Harmon, Millsaps' ninth president, the College has been elevated from regional to national status by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. Millsaps was awarded Mississippi's first chapter of Phi Beta Kappa in 1988 and the Else School of Management was accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business in 1990. Millsaps is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and approved by the American Association of University Women and the University Senate of the United Methodist Church.

Millsaps' 1,400-member student body represents 30 states and eight foreign countries. The middle 50 percent for ACT scores are 24-28, and 40 percent of the students come from the top 10 percent of their high school classes. In addition to a unique interdisciplinary program in the humanities and sciences, Millsaps offers opportunities for study abroad, Ford Foundation Teaching Fellows, an Honors Program, and research opportunities provided by the Howard Hughes Medical Institute.

The college's 100-acre campus is located in the center of Jackson. Students are urged to take advantage of the educational and cultural offerings of Mississippi's capital city. Situated on one of the highest points in the city, the tree-shaded pedestrian campus features a traditional Southern landscape which provides a variety of blooming colors throughout the year.

The College's athletes are called the Millsaps Majors in honor of Major Millsaps; and the oak leaf, representing the rank of major, is the official team insignia. Millsaps student athletes compete in NCAA Division III sports, and the College abides by the Division III requirement of not awarding athletic scholarships. The athletic policy of the College is based on the premise that athletics exist for the benefit of the students and not primarily to enhance the prestige and publicity of the College. Millsaps encourages students to participate in sports, whether in the varsity arena or its extensive intramural program

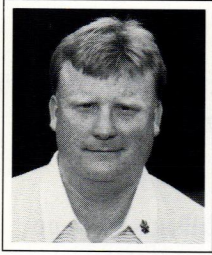

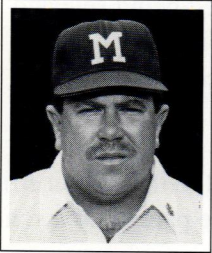

## Assistant Coaching Staff



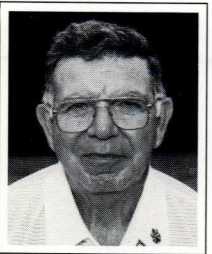
### Assistant Coach Joe Don Samples

Joe Don Samples begins his fourth year as the offensive coordinator at Millsaps. He graduated from the University of Arkansas at Monticello in 1987 and received a master's degree from Delta State University in 1988. While at Monticello, Samples was selected as a two-time NAIA All-America quarterback, having his jersey retired after his senior season. He was a graduate assistant at Monticello in 1986 and a graduate assistant and part-time assistant at Delta State from 1987-89. He is married to the former Diane Dunne, who serves as the supervisor for the Millsaps College Post Office. They are the parents of a son, Tyler Dunne.



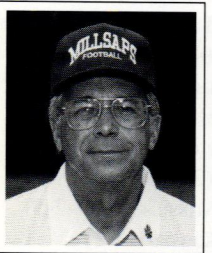
### Assistant Coach Jim Page

Jim Page is in his fourth year as an assistant football coach for the Majors. Page has also completed six seasons as the head coach of the Millsaps baseball team. He was an assistant baseball coach for three years prior to taking over the head coaching job. He is a 1985 graduate of Millsaps, where he was a four-year starter in baseball. He was twice selected as the team MVP. Under Page, the baseball Majors have won five consecutive Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference titles. 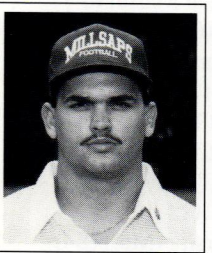
### Assistant Coach Bill Raphael

Bill Raphael is in his fourth year as an assistant coach at Millsaps. He is a 1950 graduate of the University of Southwestern Louisiana and received his master's degree from Mississippi College in 1966. Before coming to Millsaps, he was the head coach at St. Joseph High School in Jackson for 41 years. He is also a member of the Mississippi Association of Coaches Hall of Fame. His main area of work is with the offensive line. He is married to the former Claire Louise Nassar. They are the parents of a daughter, Kathy, and sons Bill Jr., Matthew and Mark.



### Assistant Coach Glenn Cain

Glen Cain begins his first year as a Millsaps assistant. He is a 1954 graduate of Millsaps, and won 11 letters in four different sports during his career at the college. He was inducted into the Millsaps Sports Hall of Fame in 1977. After finishing at Millsaps, he coached at West High School, Kosciusko High School, Chastain Jr. High School, McAdams High School, Delta State College (now Delta State University), Indianola Academy and Jackson Academy. At JA, he made the transition from coaching to administration. He retired this spring after serving four years at Tri-County Academy. His main area of work is with receivers and scout teams. He is married to the former Wyonda McMillan. They have two sons, Ray and Allen.



### Assistant Coach Corey Diaz

Corey Diaz is beginning his first season as an assistant coach for the Majors. He completed his football career in 1993, becoming one of the finest Millsaps defensive players in recent history. He was a two-time All-SCAC selection and led the team and conference in interceptions and blocked kicks in 1993. He will work primarily with outside linebackers and the scout teams. He is originally from Iberville, Miss., and is completing his degree at Millsaps.

# The Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference

The Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference was founded as the College Athletic Conference (CAC) in January, 1962. Centre College, Southwestern College at Memphis (now known as Rhodes College), the University of the South (Sewanee) and Washington and Lee University were the founding members of the CAC. Former member schools included Washington University in St. Louis, Principia College, Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, Illinois College, Earlham College and Fisk University.

**Millsaps College** and Trinity University began competing as members of the conference in 1989. At that point the membership included six of the finest liberal arts colleges in the nation. Suddenly, the conference was establishing stability and growth.

At its spring meeting in 1991, however, the conference made several more significant changes in its organization and operation. The name change gave the conference a new image as well as adding a geographic identity. The conference office was created and commissioner Stephen P. Argo was hired to give the SCAC centralized administrative and organizational control. Women's athletics were added to provide opportunities for women to compete at the conference and national level. Oglethorpe University and Hendrix College were brought on board to bring membership to an all-time high of eight. The SCAC now sponsors 15 total championships, eight for men and seven for women.

On November 13, 1993, Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, was admitted into the conference with participation beginning this fall. They replaced Fisk University, who had been a member since 1983, thus the total membership remains at eight institutions.

The 1993-94 sports champions were: football -- Trinity; women's soccer -- Trinity; men's soccer -- Rhodes/Trinity; women's cross-country -- Centre; men's cross-country -- Rhodes; volleyball -- Trinity; women's basketball -- Centre; men's basketball -- Oglethorpe; baseball -- **Millsaps**; golf -- Trinity; women's tennis - Trinity; men's tennis -- Trinity; women's track -- Sewanee; and men's track -- Rhodes. Trinity was the winner of the 1993-94 SCAC All-Sports Trophy.

Enthusiasm, potential, and anticipation has enveloped the conference. In 1994-95, the SCAC boasts a membership of eight institutions from among the finest liberal arts colleges and universities in the nation. The SCAC remains committed to the NCAA Division III philosophy and will always be recognized as a leader and motivator of that special blend of academics and athletics at the intercollegiate level.

A bell, donated by the Norfolk and Western Railroad, was adopted as the conference's "President's Trophy" and serves as the symbol for the conference. This bell is displayed for one year on the campus of the school with the combined men's and women's athletics program that accumulates the highest number of points towards the all-sports trophy. The bell is awarded annually at the conclusion of the Spring Sports Festival.

## NCAA Division III Philosophy Statement

Colleges and universities in Division III place highest priority on the overall quality of the educational experience. In so doing, they seek to strengthen the integration of objectives and programs in athletics with academic and developmental objectives and to assure the integration of athletes with other students.

The following statement is not binding on member institutions but shall serve as a guide for the preparation of legislation by the division and for planning and implementation of programs by institutions and conferences.

Division III member institutions place special importance on the impact of athletics on the participants rather than on spectators and place greater emphasis on the internal constituency (students, alumni and special friends) than on the general public and its entertainment needs.

To achieve this end, the athletics program in Division III:

- (a) Encourages participation by maximizing the number and variety of athletic opportunities in varsity, club and intramural sports;
- (b) Ensures that participants receive the same treatment as other students. They have no unique privileges in admissions, academic advising, course selection, grading, living accommodations or financial aid. Similarly, athletes are not denied rights and opportunities that would be available to them as non-athletes;
- (c) Is controlled, financed and staffed through the same general procedures as other departments of the college;
- (d) Gives equal emphasis to men's and women's sports, and the desired quality of competition

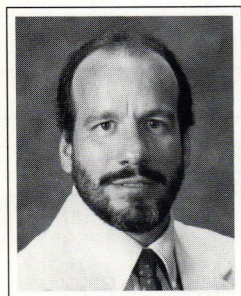
is similar in all sports. Participant interests will be one factor considered in the determination of the level of support provided by the college to each sport;

- (e) Supports students in their efforts to reach high levels of performance by providing them with adequate facilities, competent coaching and appropriate competitive opportunities with students from similar institutions, and
- (f) Gives primary emphasis to in-season competition, but exceptional teams and individuals may be encouraged through post-season championships.

The purpose of the NCAA is to assist its members to develop this approach as the basis for consistent equitable competition and to do so in ways that minimize infringement on the freedom of individual institutions to determine their own special objectives and programs.

Ward is responsible for certifying that student athletes at Millsaps are academically eligible to play intercollegiate sports. He also serves as a liaison with the NCAA and the College in assisting coaches who have questions about the eligibility of student athletes.

In addition to his NCAA responsibilities, Ward is chairman of Millsaps' athletic committee, which reviews the College's athletic policies. Other members of the athletic committee are faculty representatives Ms. Martha Goss and Dr. Jim Purser, Director of Athletics Ron Journey, an alumni representative and two members of the student body.
