HEAD COACH BOB TYLER



Bob Tyler

In Bob Tyler's first season as the new head coach, he will lead the Millsaps Majors into their centennial season. Tyler, a Mississippi native of Water Valley, became the 18th coach since the inception of Millsaps' football program in 1900.

Tyler brings to the football program his personal goal for the Majors - working toward a national championship. Another goal that Tyler has set is to utilize a coaching staff that teaches technique. He firmly believes that technique is the answer to successful football. According to Tyler, mastering technique allows players to know they're ready to compete in any situation. Beliefs like this have led him through a successful career as a coach.

Tyler's coaching career spans three decades in which time he amassed an impressive record. He coached teams that played in the Sugar Bowl, Liberty Bowl, Gator Bowl, Sun Bowl and Orange Bowl prior to his recent hiatus from coaching.

In 1972, Tyler joined the Mississippi State coaching staff after serving with the legendary Bear Bryant at Alabama, as an assistant coach. At a seasoned 38 years old Tyler accepted his first college head-coaching job with Mississippi State. There, in 1974, he led the Bulldogs to a 9-3 record, a No. 17 ranking and a victory in the Sun Bowl.

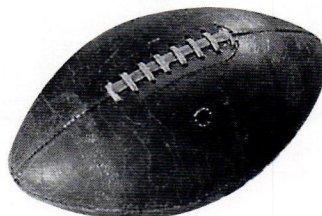
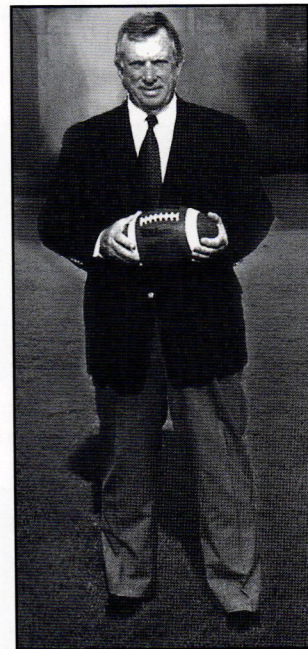
Tyler's career also includes three seasons under Johnny Vaught as an assistant coach for the Ole Miss Rebels. Tyler coached a year at North Texas State in 1981. Now decades later, he coaches for a Division III team with hopes of taking them to a national championship.

Gaining recognition early in his career, Tyler successfully coached high school teams for 11 seasons that included four championships and a 91-19-6 record. In the 1966-67 season, he became the Big-Eight

Conference coach of the year.

Tyler says, "What I am proudest of is helping young men learn how to win." His previous coaching assignments in a capsule include: 14 years as a coach of several high school teams, one year as assistant coach/recruiter for a community college; four years as college assistant at the University of Mississippi; seven years as head coach; and four years as director of athletics on the college level - all in Mississippi. He also served one year as a college assistant at the University of Alabama.

Tyler is married to Dale and they have three sons, Breck, Cam and Drew.

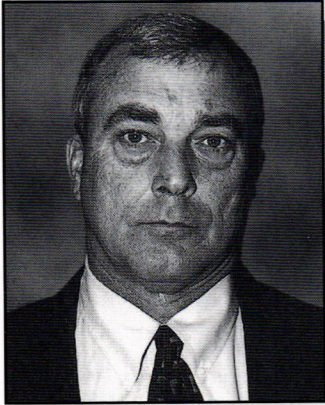

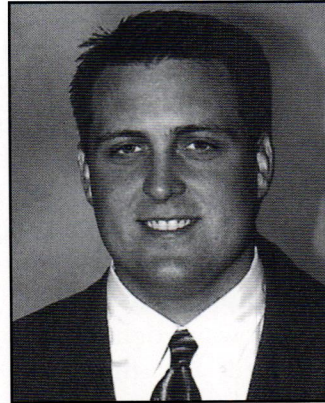

Ronnie Gray is going into his first year at Millsaps this fall as the new defensive coordinator. Gray is a graduate of Mississippi State University, where he played center for the Bulldogs and earned a degree in physical education. He then went on to coach at the high school level for two years before going back to his alma mater and managing the defensive line at Mississippi State until

1978. Between 1979 and 1987, Gray remained at the collegiate level, a coach for Memphis State University, North Texas State University, Ole Miss, Southern Mississippi, and again at Mississippi State. Since then, he has been both a head coach and a defensive coordinator at high schools throughout the southeast, and joins the Millsaps staff from Northwest Rankin High School. Ronnie Gray has one daughter, Amy Hancock, and two grandchildren.

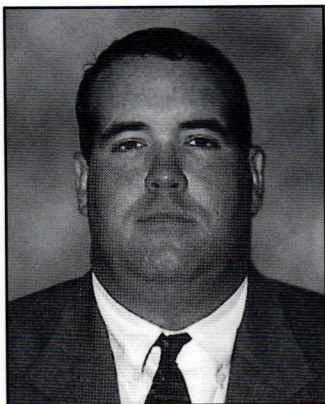

Joe Kinsella comes to Millsaps this season from Dakota Wesleyan University, also to head coach the newly formed Millsaps softball team. Kinsella graduated from Illinois Wesleyan University with a bachelor of arts in religion, and he earned four varsity letters for the nationally ranked Division III Titans football squad. He later

returned to IWU as a varsity defensive line coach for another national ranking football team, and he was the defensive coordinator and assistant head coach for the JV program. In addition to coaching on the collegiate level, Kinsella has coached football on the high school level and at the *Midwest Lineman's Camp*, the largest of its kind in the nation.

He and his wife, Kriten, have a new son, Aiden.

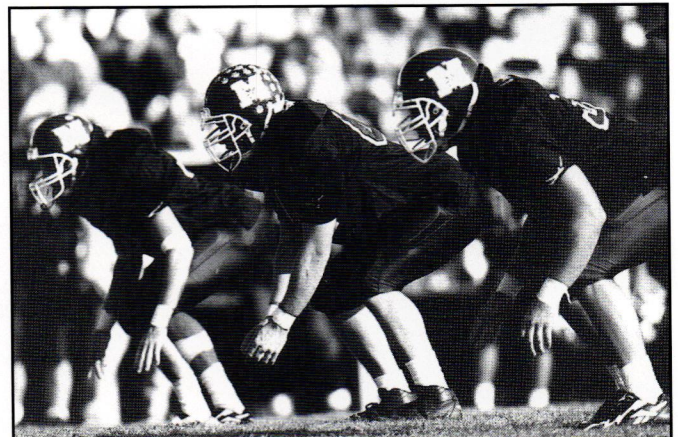
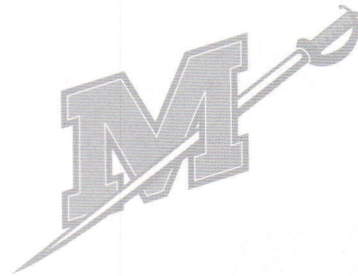

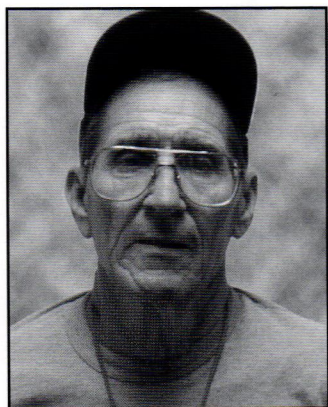

Taylor received his bachelor of science degree in biological sciences from the University of Southern Mississippi in 1996, and he earned a masters of science in educational administration this year from Mississippi State University. While at Mississippi State, Taylor

was the assistant strength and conditioning coach and a linemen coach for the MSU summer football camps. His time with the Bulldogs included the 1998 SEC Western Division Football Championship and the 1999 Peach Bowl Championship. Prior to his time in Starkville, Taylor served as the offensive line coach at West Point High School and head coach of the 8th grade team

Running backs leader Jack Carlisle has been in the coaching business for almost fifty years now as he begins his first year here at Millsaps. Beginning in 1952, while in school at Mississippi State University, he began coaching at various high schools for 23 years. From 1974 to

1978 he served as an assistant coach at Ole Miss, then took the reigns of head coach at East Tennessee State University for six years. While at Ole Miss in 1977, Carlisle helped lead the Rebels to an upset of number-one ranked Notre Dame, the only game that the Fighting Irish lost all year. On the high school level, Carlisle has compiled a winning career record of 261-70-17. His many accomplishments saw him inducted into the Mississippi Association of Coaches Hall of Fame in 1989.

While Carlisle has never coached alongside head coach Bob Tyler before, he has coached against him twice - once when Carlisle was at Murrah High School and Tyler at Meridian High School, and an Egg Bowl when Carlisle was at Ole Miss and Tyler was at Mississippi State. He also coached the first Mississippi Private School All-Star game in 1972 with Millsaps defensive coordinator Ronnie Gray as his assistant.

Carlisle received a Bachelor of Arts in History from Mississippi State in 1954 and a Masters in Administration from Mississippi College in 1972.



Alumni Field

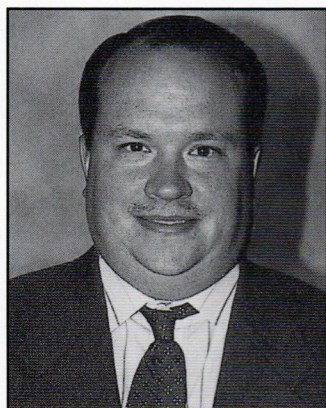
Since 1920, when Millsaps College reinstated intercollegiate football, Alumni Field has served as the home of the Majors. In the 80 year history of the football program, Alumni Field has played host to two SCAC Championship games, one undefeated season, one NCAA Division III playoff team, and 13 Millsaps All-Americans. During the 1997 season, Millsaps saw the largest increase in NCAA Division III attendance. The Majors averaged just around 3,000 fans per game last season, ranking among the top twenty percent in NCAA Division III for attendance. The field is natural grass and nestled between several hills that allow students and fans the opportunity to relax while watching a Majors game. In 1998, lights were added to Alumni Field to allow for the first home night game on the Millsaps Campus in over 50 years.

An important facet in every athletic department is the service of a competent athletic trainer. Since 1993 that need at Millsaps College has been met by one of the best in the state of Mississippi in Murray Burch. He is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association.

A native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Burch received his Bachelor of Science degree from Louisiana State University in 1984. Upon graduation from LSU, Burch worked the 1985 season as an athletic training intern with the Birmingham Stallions of the U.S.F.L.

After completing his internship with the U.S.F.L., Burch was hired as the Head Athletic Trainer at St. Martin's Episcopal High School. He worked at St. Martin's through the 1991 season before returning to college at Southeastern Louisiana University.

Burch worked as a graduate assistant while finishing his Master's degree at SLU, before moving on to LSU for six months. In 1993, Burch was hired by Mississippi Sports Medicine to be the head trainer at Millsaps College.

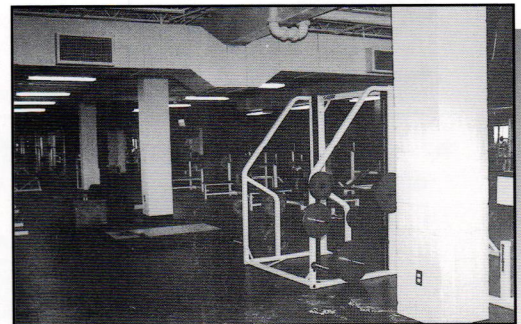
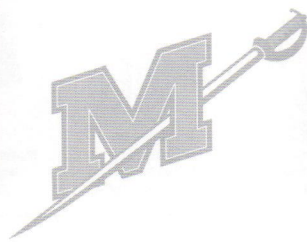


The HAC - Hall Activities Center

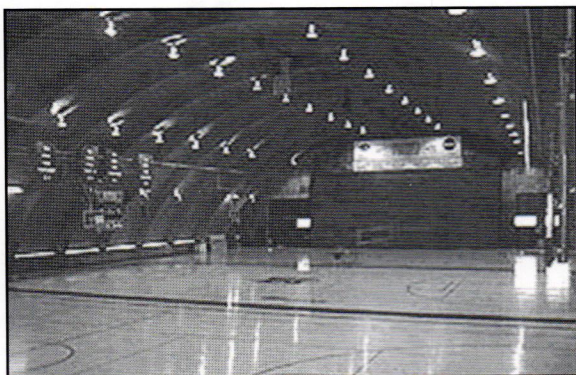

SOUTHERN COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) was founded and began operation on September 1, 1962, as the College Athletic Conference (CAC). Centre College in Danville, Ky.; Southwestern at Memphis (Tenn.) [now known as Rhodes College]; The University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn.; and Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Va., were the four charter members of the conference.



July 11, 1990, marked a turning point for the CAC under the leadership of the Board of Directors chair, Dr. Michael Adams, president at Centre. New membership requirements were adopted, a decision was made to hire a full-time commissioner for the first time, and championships were established for women.

On April 25, 1991, the Board of Directors voted to change the name of the conference to the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference. This was an effort to identify with the southern region of the United States and to present a new image. On July 1, 1991, Stephen P. Argo became the first full-time commissioner and began operation of the first established conference office in Atlanta, Ga.

Now recognized as one of the top NCAA Division III conferences in the nation, the SCAC boasts an expanded membership of 10 institutions from among the finest liberal arts colleges and universities. With the addition of DePauw University of Greencastle, Ind., and Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology of Terre Haute, Ind., the SCAC now spans across seven states.

In addition, the SCAC has also expanded its conference championships' lineup to 18 sports, nine for men and nine for women. Most recently added were women's softball and men's and women's swimming and diving. The league also sponsors championships in baseball (men), basketball (men and women), cross country (men and women), football (men), golf (men and women), soccer (men and women), tennis (men and women), outdoor track (men and women) and volleyball (women).

The SCAC remains committed to the NCAA Division III philosophy and always will be recognized

as a leader of that special blend of academics and athletics at the intercollegiate level. The conference continually places both teams and individuals into NCAA post-season play.

A railroad bell, donated by the Norfolk and Western Railway, was adopted as the conference's "President's Trophy" and it is displayed for one year on the campus of the school with the combined men's

and women's athletics program that accumulates the highest point total in the all-sports race.

Steve Argo, 39, is in his ninth year as commissioner after serving as the assistant commissioner of the Trans America Athletic Conference (TAAC) from 1984-1991. He previously served as a sportswriter for daily newspapers in Athens, Ga., and Gainesville, Ga. Argo, who holds a B.S.Ed. degree from the University of Georgia, lives in suburban Atlanta with his wife Jane and three sons, Chase, Collin and Cameron.

Dwayne Hanberry, 33, is in his fifth year as the conference sports information director. Hanberry, who holds a B.B.A. degree from Oglethorpe University, previously served in management for The Casual Male men's clothing company in Georgia and Alabama. He and his wife, Charis, reside in suburban Atlanta with their son, David.

NCAA DIVISION III - NATIONAL AWARDS

THE GAGLIARDI TROPHY



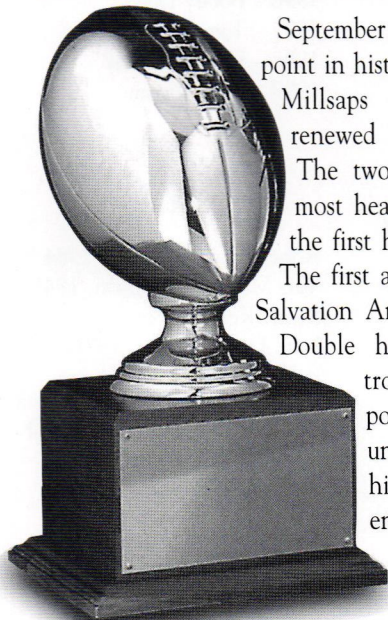
Presented annually by the J-Club of Saint John's University, Colledgeville, Minnesota; the Gagliardi Trophy is awarded to the most outstanding football player in NCAA Division III.

The award program seeks to recognize the best player while at the same time mirror the Division III philosophy of the well-rounded student/athlete. Recipients of the Gagliardi Trophy must exhibit excellence in football, academics and community service. Nominations will be submitted by the presidents of the 229 participating NCAA Division III colleges. The recipient is announced in conjunction with the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl, the Division III National Championship game, in December.

The trophy is named after John Gagliardi, legendary coach of Saint John's University. Gagliardi has over 325 wins in college football, more than any other Division III football coach.

Sponsored by Jostens, Minneapolis, Minnesota, the trophy design features a sculpture of John Gagliardi and a player in a classic one-on-one sideline consultation.

THE BACKYARD BRAWL TROPHY



September 2nd, 2000, marked a turning point in history for Millsaps. On this day, Millsaps and Mississippi College renewed their long-standing rivalry. The two teams endured one of the most heated rivalries in the south for the first half of the twentieth century. The first annual event was named The Salvation Army College Football Classic Double header. This beautiful gold trophy had been in the possession of Mississippi College until this day. It marked a 40 hiatus since 1959. The Majors ended the rivalry with a 20 to 19 win over the Choctaws. The trophy is now where it belongs.

THE MELBERGER AWARD

Presented annually by the Downtown Wilkes-Barre Touchdown Club, Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania; the Melberger Award is awarded to the Outstanding Division III football player in the country.

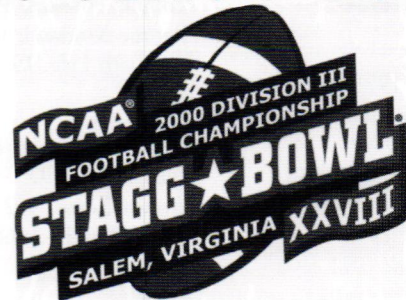
The award program seeks to recognize the dedication and determination of the athlete who plays for the love of the game. He is, in every sense, a true student-athlete. In addition to the trophy, a contribution is made to the General Scholarship Fund of the recipients school. The Melberger Award is selected by a national media panel of 63. Three finalists are selected to attend the Club's Annual Awards Banquet where the Melberger Award winner is announced.



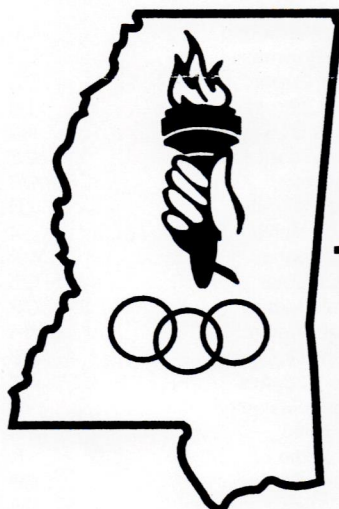
The trophy is named in honor of Clifford K. Melberger, President and CEO of Diversified Information Technologies, Inc. A star running back and outstanding performer on the gridiron for the Bucknell Bisons from 1957-1960, Melberger is an active community leader and volunteer.

The trophy is a replica of an old-style leather football helmet crafted of anthracite coal. In addition to the Melberger Award, the Wilkes-Barre Touchdown Club also presents the John J. Chwalek National Championship Trophy to the NCAA Division III National Football Champions.

MILLSAPS PLAYER PROFILE



MARTY FRASCOGNA

Though defensive back Marty Frascogna emits seemingly endless smiles and optimism this season, he remembers a time when it was difficult to be quite so upbeat. In his junior year, he injured his back and was placed on bed rest for two weeks. Upon returning to class he hobbled along cautiously and painfully. Just as recovery was around the corner, mononucleosis took hold and forced him back to bed. Frascogna missed six weeks of class and the entire football season—with the exception of one game.

Frascogna, coming from a long line of Millsaps supporters, credits his family with giving him the fortitude and motivation that he needed to consider getting back into the saddle again. "It was really hard to even conceive of practicing or playing while I was feeling so bad. Playing was the last thing on my mind." However, his older brother, sister and parents gave him inspiration and got him fired up about playing the next season. As usual, they helped him maintain focus in the face of adversity.

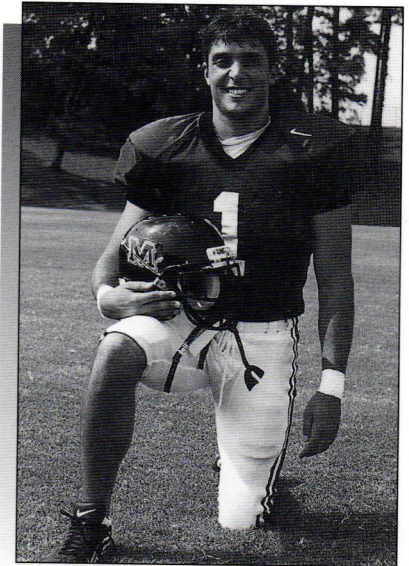
As the youngest sibling, Frascogna says, "the family really participated even more strongly this season because I'll be the last one in my immediate family to compete in college sporting events...until grandchildren come along, and that won't be for a long time," he said. "Each year I've been here, my family's stood behind me and stayed involved with me, the entire athletic program, and the school. It made me feel that if I didn't give 100 percent, I would let everyone down," he said.

The Frascogna family's tradition at Millsaps began with two uncles who attended the college and then his older brother, Mike III, who played football for Millsaps as a freshman in the early 90s before transferring to Notre Dame where he played four years for the Fighting Irish. His sister, Nan, now a second year medical student, was a SAPS cheerleader and ran cross-country during her four years. Though Frascogna's father and mother did not attend Millsaps, you wouldn't know it by the wholehearted support they have thrust onto the younger Frascogna and the college. He said of his family, "We have to dive into things full steam or we won't enjoy it."

Frascogna will leave Millsaps with many fond memories, one of which he says is the reunion game between Millsaps and Mississippi College at the start of the season. It was perhaps the single-most emotional game he ever played. When asked why, he said, "I understood everything that was behind it for the faculty, alumni, and especially for Coach Tyler who came out of a long coaching hiatus. It was an important milestone for us all." Competing after 40 years, the Majors won the game against Mississippi College 20 to 19.

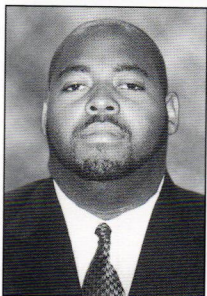
Another memory for Frascogna centers around the game the Majors played against the Russelheim Razorbacks in Frankfurt, Germany two summers ago. The Majors came from behind 21 points in the fourth quarter to win 31-30. He remembers the intense feeling of pride and citizenship as he looked in the stands and saw fans draped in American flags. With promotional posters mounted everywhere, the game appeared to be a big event for Frankfurt. Frascogna felt this kind of enthusiasm and support for an American team was especially good in a foreign land where family members were not in attendance.

Though Frascogna may return to Millsaps exercising a medical redshirt, he regrets that some seniors will graduate just ahead of a season that he feels will be the Majors' long-awaited comeback. He foresees the program growing even more in the upcoming year. "We'll be a tough team to beat next season," he said.

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS - The Trinity Tigers completed their third consecutive undefeated regular season as they scored 49 to the Majors seven on Saturday night. Damond Garza scored the first two Tiger touchdowns as No.2 Trinity (10-0, 6-4) stormed past Millsaps for the first three quarters leading 35-0.

The Tiger seniors never lost at home during their four-year career, winning 22 consecutive games. The seniors had a 41-3 overall record in three seasons. The Division III player of the year last season, senior quarterback Mike Burton, surpassed 9,000 yards (9,008) for his career by completing 10 of 12 for 143 yards against the Majors (2-8, 1-5).

NATIONAL COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The NCAA—Common Ground of College Athletics

It was the flying wedge, football's major offense in 1905, that spurred the formation of the NCAA in December 1905. Numerous sport-related injuries and deaths had prompted many institutions to discontinue the sport. Others were urging that football be reformed or abolished completely from intercollegiate athletics.

So in 1905, President Theodore Roosevelt summoned college athletics leaders to two White House conferences to encourage such reforms. The Intercollegiate Athletic Association of the United States was officially constituted on March 31, 1906. There were 62 charter members. In 1910, it took its present name of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and, for several years, served primarily as a discussion group and rules-making body.

Now, more than 1,200 colleges, universities, conferences and related organizations count on the NCAA to be the organization through which they speak. It is a voluntary association devoted to the sound administration of intercollegiate athletics.

Through the NCAA, member institutions consider an athletics problem that has crossed regional or conference lines and has become national in scope. The Association, through its members, strives to maintain intercollegiate athletics as an integral part of the educational program and the athletes as an integral part of the student body. The

NCAA also stands for good conduct in intercollegiate athletics and serves as the colleges' national athletics accreditation agency.

The organization and its members recognize that creating an equitable college environment for its student-athletes is among their highest priorities. Working together to enact rules, policies, procedures and organizational goals, its members strive for the common goal of academic integrity for their programs.

Just as integrity is key for the academic process, it is also a component in the competition among NCAA institutions. The NCAA and its staff is charged with enforcing the rules and regulations that the institutions vote and impose on themselves.

While enforcement proceedings involving member schools seem to grab most of the headlines, they represent only a small part of the NCAA's total program.

The NCAA administered its first national championship in 1921—the National Collegiate Track and Field Championships. Today, the NCAA administers 81 championships in 22 sports for its member institutions, involving more than 24,000 men and women student-athletes. There are 24 championships on the Division I level, 23 on the Division II level and 24 for Division III members, along with 10 sports that have National Collegiate Championships for which all divisions are eligible.

Beyond its annual championships, the

NCAA also places a high priority on honoring its members and student-athletes, evident in its honors program and postgraduate scholarships program. The honors program recognizes accomplishments of current and former outstanding student-athletes, while the postgraduate scholarship program annually honors 154 high-ranking college student-athletes who are in their last year of intercollegiate competition by providing them scholarships of \$5,000 each. The NCAA also recognizes the need to assist its members in career development in collegiate athletics and has addressed this area through its women's and ethnic minority enhancement programs.

The NCAA Hall of Champions opened in the fall of 1990. It presents a photographic and video salute to intercollegiate athletics both past and present in a 12,000-square foot facility at the Association's national office building. Visitors to the hall are treated to specially prepared multimedia presentations in a spacious and modern theater and can feel the excitement of center court at the Final Four and the kickoff of college football games in uniquely designed photo displays.

The NCAA's members form a diverse group ranging from large state institutions to small, privately funded colleges. Their common goal, however, is the same—working for the advancement and achievement of the student-athlete and for the common good of higher education. ■
