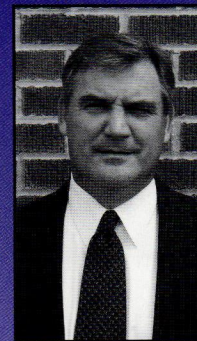

HEAD COACH DAVID SAUNDERS

On December 16, 2002, David E. Saunders was named the 19th head football coach at Millsaps College. Saunders now leads his Majors into his first head coaching season as the Majors continue their quest for their first SCAC football title since 1996.

Saunders comes to Millsaps after a four year stint at the University of Mississippi as the director of recruiting. While at Ole Miss, Saunders established an acclaimed recruiting program and was lauded as one of the top nine recruiters in the nation by ESPN. Saunders joined the Ole Miss athletic staff in February 1999 after working at the University of Tennessee, where he assisted administratively with the defense and on-campus recruiting. Tennessee won the Division I National Championship in 1998.

Prior to joining the Volunteers, Saunders served two years as assistant football coach and recruiting coordinator at Arkansas State University in Jonesboro (1996-97). He spent the 1995 season coaching safeties and special teams at Baylor University in Waco, Texas.

During the 1993 and 1994 seasons, Saunders was the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach at Nicholls State University in Louisiana. While at Nicholls State, Saunders coached defensive back Darryl Pounds, who played for the Washington Redskins of the NFL.

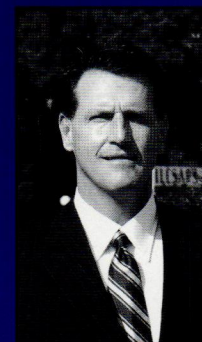
From 1990 to 1992, Saunders coached the defensive line at Georgia Southern University in Statesboro and helped lead the Eagles to the 1990 Division I-AA national championship.

From 1984 to 1989, Saunders coached defensive backs and receivers while serving as recruiting coordinator at Jacksonville State University in Alabama. While at Jacksonville State, Saunders coached defensive back Eric Davis, who earned All-Pro honors in the NFL and played for the 1995 Super Bowl Champion San Francisco 49ers. Saunders also coached receiver Keith McKeller, who played in three Super Bowls with the Buffalo Bills, and defensive back Darrel Malone, who played with the Kansas City Chiefs and Miami Dolphins. Jacksonville State played for the 1989 Division II National Championship.

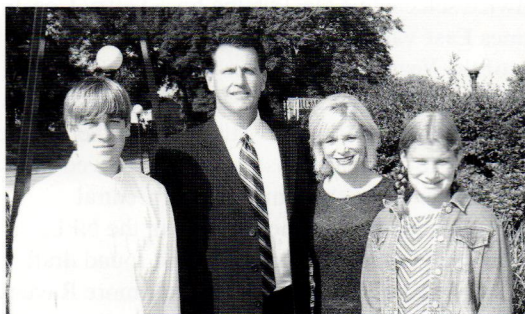
Prior to entering the collegiate coaching ranks, Saunders was an assistant football coach at Andalusia High School in Alabama from 1982 to 1983.

Saunders, a native of Douglasville, Georgia, graduated from Auburn University in 1982 with a bachelor of science degree and was a walk-on lineman for the Tigers. While at Auburn, Saunders also assisted with the junior varsity, working with the offensive and defensive lines.

Saunders is married to the former Jan Perry of Andalusia, Alabama. The couple has two children, Riley (12) and Kaylee (10).



David Saunders

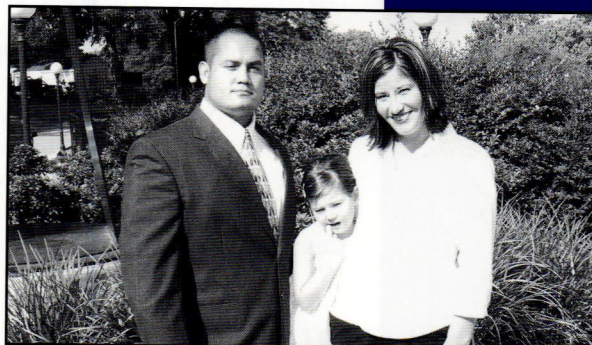


FOOTBALL ASSISTANT COACHES

Defensive Line

Jason Linders, formerly of Southern Utah University, joins Millsaps for the first time this season. Linders serves as the defensive line coach as well as the head strength and conditioning coach for all fourteen varsity sports at Millsaps. Linders has served as a defensive line coach at Southern Utah University and Humboldt State University, and he worked with tackles at the University of Nevada. He has worked with some talented athletes including a second team All-WAC tackle at Nevada, two all-conference defensive linemen at Humboldt State, and two all-independent tackles and one all-American at Southern Utah. While at Southern Utah, he also served as the head strength coach as well as the academic coordinator. Linders has a bachelor of arts degree in sociology and a master of science degree in kinesiology from Humboldt State University. He and his wife, Annette, have one daughter, Kayla.

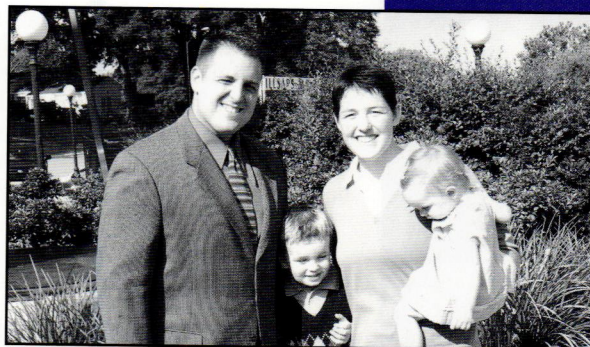


Jason, Kayla, & Annette Linders

JOE KINSELLA

Running Backs

Joe Kinsella enters his fourth season at Millsaps and his first season as coach of the running backs. Kinsella is also the head coach of the Millsaps fastpitch softball team, which won the school's first ever SCAC softball title last spring. Kinsella graduated from Illinois Wesleyan University with a bachelor of arts in religion, and he earned four varsity letters for the nationally-ranked Division III Titans football squad. He later returned to IWU as a varsity defensive line coach, and he was the defensive coordinator and assistant head coach for the JV program. In addition to coaching on the collegiate level, Kinsella has coached football on the high school level and at the Midwest Lineman's Camp, the largest of its kind in the nation. Kinsella and his wife Kristen have two children, Aiden and Caeli.

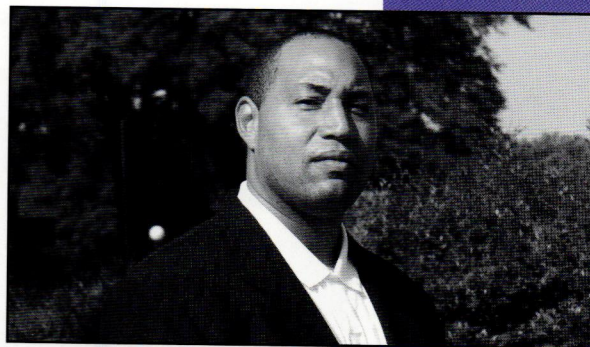

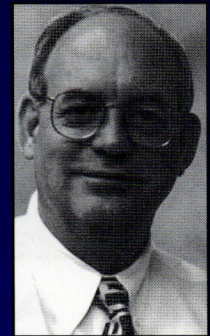

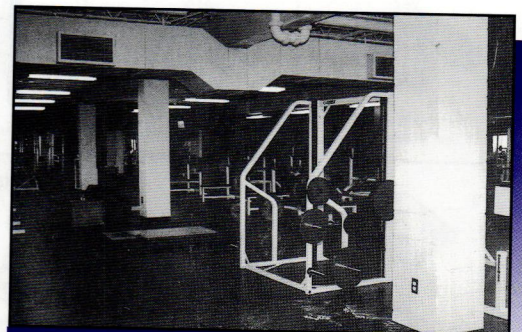


The HAC - Hall Activities Center

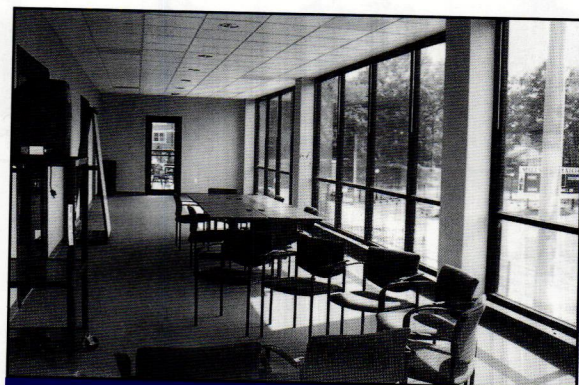

NCAA DIVISION III - NATIONAL AWARDS

THE GAGLIARDI TROPHY

Presented annually by the J-Club of Saint John's University, Collegetown, Minnesota; the Gagliardi Trophy is awarded to the most outstanding football player in NCAA Division III.



The award program seeks to recognize the best player while at the same time mirror the Division III philosophy of the well-rounded student/athlete. Recipients of the Gagliardi Trophy must exhibit excellence in football, academics and community service. Nominations will be submitted by the presidents of the 229 participating NCAA Division III colleges. The recipient is announced in conjunction with the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl, the Division III National Championship game, in December.

The trophy is named after John Gagliardi, legendary coach of Saint John's University. Gagliardi has over 325 wins in college football, more than any other Division III football coach.

Sponsored by Jostens, Minneapolis, Minnesota, the trophy design features a sculpture of John Gagliardi and a player in a classic one-on-one sideline consultation.

THE MELBERGER AWARD

Presented annually by the Downtown Wilkes-Barre Touchdown Club, Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania; the Melberger Award is awarded to the Outstanding Division III football player in the country.

The award program seeks to recognize the dedication and determination of the athlete who plays for the love of the game. He is, in every sense, a true student-athlete. In addition to the trophy, a contribution is made to the General Scholarship Fund of the recipients school. The Melberger Award is selected by a national media panel of 63. Three finalists are selected to attend the Club's Annual Awards Banquet where the Melberger Award winner is announced.

The trophy is named in honor of Clifford K. Melberger, President and CEO of Diversified Information Technologies, Inc. A star running back and outstanding performer on the gridiron for the Bucknell Bisons from 1957-1960, Melberger is an active community leader and volunteer.

The trophy is a replica of an old-style leather football helmet crafted of anthracite coal. In addition to the Melberger Award, the Wilkes-Barre Touchdown Club also presents the John J. Chwalek National

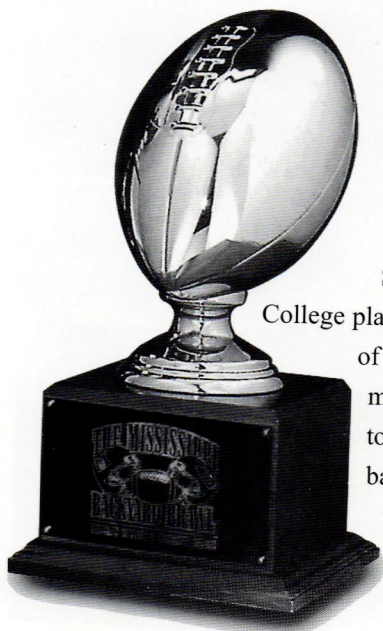


Chwalek National Championship Trophy to the NCAA Division III National Football Champions.

THE BACKYARD BRAWL TROPHY

September 2, 2000, marked the first time in 41 years that Millsaps College and Mississippi College played each other on the football field. The longstanding rivalry was ended in 1959 because of violent riots among patrons of both schools. Before the series was ended, the two schools maintained one of the most heated rivalries in the Deep South for forty years. Now, thanks to the Salvation Army and the Mississippi Sports Council, the Majors and the Choctaws battle each other again. This beautiful gold trophy is presented to the winning team.

Heading into the 2003 season, Millsaps leads the renewed series 2-1.

Blazers “Rumble” Past Majors, 34-19

The historic first meeting between cross-street rivals Millsaps College and Belhaven College lived up to its billing as an exciting, explosive football contest. The Majors hung tough through the first two quarters, but Belhaven kicked their offense into high gear during the second half. The inaugural "Riverside Rumble" went to the Blazers by a score of 34-19.

Belhaven jumped on the board first with a 40 yard field goal by Matthew Wilson less than five minutes into the game. It did not take long for the Majors to answer. On a third and seventeen on the Majors' own 33, Nick Fowler quick-kicked a punt 63 yards to the Belhaven 4 yard line. On the next play sophomore David Cutter sacked Greg Pogue for a loss of three yards and caused a fumble which he recovered in the end zone for a safety.

Belhaven scored again before the end of the first quarter on a 16 yard run by Tony Howard. The Matthew Wilson extra point brought the score to 10-2 Blazers. The Majors soon answered a minute and a half into the second quarter as Christian Johnson connected on a 53 yard pass to Josh Hanna. Johnson also rushed into the end zone for the two point conversion. Three minutes later, Tyler Alford scored on a 30 yard field goal to give the Majors the lead, 13-10 at the half.

The second half saw the Blazers completely dominate. Junior quarterback Brian Zbydniwski rejoined the Blazers after setting out during the first half due to an injured thumb on his throwing hand. Zybdniewski led a reenergized Belhaven offense to score 21 unanswered points. Zybdniewski threw for 190 yards with 17 completions on 25 attempts. He also threw for two touchdowns despite being sacked 3 times by the Millsaps defense.

On the bright side for the Majors, the defense continued to have a strong showing. Senior All-American Matt O'Bryant collected 13 total tackles on the game including 2 tackles for loss. O'Bryant also collected one of two interceptions for the Majors. Sophomore David Cutter was credited with the second interception. O'Bryant had strong support on the defensive line as senior Steven Campbell and sophomore Dustane Reed also collected 10 tackles each.

Millsaps also saw some bright flashes on the offensive side of the ball. Freshman Marshall Brown rushed 23 times for 104 yards on the evening. Sophomore quarterback Christian Johnson went 3 for 10 in passing for 59 yards.

NATIONAL COLLEGIATE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The NCAA—Common Ground of College Athletics

It was the flying wedge, football's major offense in 1905 that spurred the formation of the NCAA in December 1905. Numerous sport-related injuries and deaths had prompted many institutions to discontinue the sport. Others were urging that football be reformed or abolished completely from intercollegiate athletics.

So in 1905, President Theodore Roosevelt summoned college athletics leaders to two White House conferences to encourage such reforms. The Intercollegiate Athletic Association of the United States was officially constituted on March 31, 1906. There were 62 charter members.

In 1910, it took its present name of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and, for several years, served primarily as a discussion group and rules-making body.

Now, more than 1,200 colleges, universities, conferences and related organizations count on the NCAA to be the organization through which they speak. It is a voluntary association devoted to the sound administration of intercollegiate athletics.

Through the NCAA, member institutions consider an athletics problem that has crossed regional or conference lines and has become national in scope. The Association, through its members, strives to maintain intercollegiate athletics as an integral part of the educational program and the athletes as an integral part of the student body. The NCAA also stands for good conduct in intercollegiate athletics and serves as the colleges' national athletics accreditation agency.

The organization and its members recognize that creating an equitable college environment for its student-athletes is among their highest priorities. Working together to enact rules, policies, procedures and organizational goals, its members strive for the common goal of academic integrity for their programs.

Just as integrity is key for the academic process, it is also a component in the competition among NCAA institutions. The NCAA and its staff is charged with enforcing the rules and regulations that the institutions vote and impose on themselves.

While enforcement proceedings involving member schools seem to grab most of the headlines, they represent only a small part of the NCAA's total program.

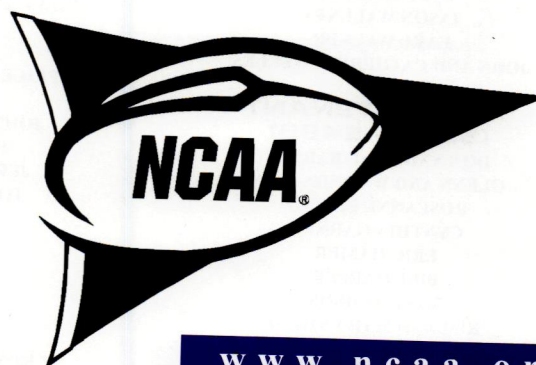
The NCAA administered its first national championship in 1921—the National Collegiate Track and Field Championships. Today, the NCAA administers 81 champi-

onships in 22 sports for its member institutions, involving more than 24,000 men and women student-athletes. There are 24 championships on the Division I level, 23 on the Division II level and 24 for Division III members, along with 10 sports that have National Collegiate Championships for which all divisions are eligible.

Beyond its annual championships, the NCAA also places a high priority on honoring its members and student-athletes, evident in its honors program and postgraduate scholarships program. The honors program recognizes accomplishments of current and former outstanding student-athletes, while the postgraduate scholarship program annually honors 154 high-ranking college student-athletes who are in their last year of intercollegiate competition by providing them scholarships of \$5,000 each. The NCAA also recognizes the need to assist its members in career development in collegiate athletics and has addressed this area through its women's and ethnic minority enhancement programs.

The NCAA Hall of Champions opened in the fall of 1990. It presents a photographic and video salute to intercollegiate athletics both past and present in a 12,000-square foot facility at the Association's national office building. Visitors to the hall are treated to specially prepared multimedia presentations in a spacious and modern theater and can feel the excitement of center court at the Final Four and the kickoff of college football games in uniquely designed photo displays.

The NCAA's members form a diverse group ranging from large state institutions to small, privately funded colleges. Their common goal, however, is the same—working for the advancement and achievement of the student-athlete and for the common good of higher education.
