2002 Outlook

The 2002 Michigan State men's track and field team returns a solid nucleus, including three All-Americans - junior Andy Lixey, sophomore Steve Manz, and senior Paul Terek.

In addition to the three returning All-Americans, four seniors have the experience and knowledge to guide the team through the 2002 season. With Big Ten Championship and NCAA Championships experience, the 2002 team has the drive and experience to succeed as a team this season.

"I think with those guys returning we have the makings of something special," said Gatson. "They can compete on the Big Ten and NCAA level."

With three individuals competing at the NCAA Indoor Championships last season, this year's team has the desire to revisit Fayetteville, Ark.

"Then we go back to the young kids," laments Gatson. "They have learned a lot and gained some valuable experience (last season)."

The returning "young kids" are sophomore distance runners - Steve Sherer, Ben Evans, Jason Mueller and Chris Toloff to name a few. Not only can they build on last season's experience, but also their success during the 2001 cross country season where they placed 18th in the NCAA Championship.

FIELD EVENTS

"One strength of our team is in the field event area," Gatson said. "We have to make that even better and stronger."

Two out of the three 2001 All-American

cans returning are strong field event contenders.

Terek returns as the top pole vaulter and multi-event athlete. A return trip to the NCAA Championship is an expectation held by many including Terek himself.

"When Paul competes," shared Gatson. "Everyone expects Paul to win."

Terek is not the only Spartan who is looking to make a return trip to Fayetteville, Ark. Manz has competed in multiple U.S. competitions and is looking to break more shot put records.

"One thing about Steve is that he is a very hard worker," Gatson said.

Also returning in the field events are seniors Jeff Kus, Matt Deering and Ben Logan. Kus has tremendous talent and the potential to qualify for NCAA's his senior year. Deering also brings talent and experience to the team. Gatson says if Deering believes he can qualify, he will. Logan has the potential to be a strong competitor in the decathlon as long as he can stay healthy and concentrate on one event at a time.

DISTANCE

The distance area, made up of returning junior All-American Lixey and athletes from the 2001 18-place NCAA cross country team, looks to see great improvement in the distance events.

Lixey has much to learn this season and Gatson is going to make sure he does.

"Talent is not Andy's problem," Gatson said. "I am trying to get him to run up with the winners and stay with the winners."

Sophomore Steve Sherer, who is also a returning talented runner, joins Lixey. Sherer has the experience of his eighth-place finish at the Big Ten Indoor Championships in the mile to build on this season. With the help of cross country runners such as junior Andrew Alley, sophomores Andy Marsh, Ben Evans, and Jason Mueller, as well as freshman Chris Toloff, the distance area has the makings for something great.

"I think they have matured over the past year and learned a lot," said coach. "I am looking at something very special next year, but the young kids have to compete right away at this level."

THE NEWCOMERS

This season's true freshmen come from all over and participate in very diverse events.

Julian Williams, a long jump state champion from Windermere, Fla., will be a new addition to the field area along with Chris Hohn, a pole vaulter out of Pinckney,

men Ben Wojik a state miler of Wyandotte, Mich., Jason Brown from Muskegon, Mich. who runs middle distance.

Along with new athletes, Gatson has added a new coach to the men's team. Angela Goodman, the head coach of the women's

team, will now coach the men's long and triple jumpers as well as helping with the decathletes.

"She is a great addition to our staff," said Gatson. "She is an outstanding coach and understands the technique and training of the jumps."

The most important factor for success in the 2002 season is experience. The 2002 Spartan schedule allows the team to

compete against some of the best teams and individuals, as well as in some of the best facilities in the country. What the Spartans learn from their experience and take into the Big Ten Championship will be a major factor in their success.

"We have talented runners," shared Gatson. "We just have to make the decisions, to make the sacrifices to compete at this level."

I think this season is going to be a season where we can make some improvements as far as our standing in the Big Ten. I think we have a realistic chance to finish in the top five."

What does the future hold?

Assistant Coach Jim Stintzi:

"I'm looking forward to this season. We have some veterans that are going to be big contributors and the distance team has another year under their belts. If we can just stay healthy and make the necessary jumps I think we can surprise some people."

Senior Paul Terek:

"We have one of the top multi-event teams in the nation with one of the best pole vault squads. "

Junior Andy Lixey:

"It seems that for the first time in several years we have quality performers in every area. Coach Gatson and Coach Stintzi are preparing us to bring it all together when it counts, and place at or near the top of the Big Ten."

Sophomore Steve Manz:

"This season looks to be a very promising one. I expect some crazy times and distances with a chance at about six All-Americans. The seniors are all ready for huge years and Lixey and I are ready for some breakout years as well."

Sophomore Steve Sherer:

"We're going to win Big Ten's."

Head Coach Darroll Gatson



Darroll Gatson enters his seventh season as the head coach for Michigan State track and field.

The 2001 season did not turn out exactly the way Gatson expected.

"As a team we didn't place the way I thought we would've placed," Gatson said. "But I found out our team is very competitive. We will compete this year."

Even though the Spartans as a team did not compete at a level Gatson hoped, individually, there were some great accomplishments. Gatson coached three All-Americans during the indoor season and one during the outdoor season.

The help of returning leaders as well as the learning experiences of the 2001 season are what Gatson believes will make the 2002 team stronger.

"We are going to be competitive," Gatson said.

In 1999, Michigan State won the Big Ten Indoor Championship, its first conference championship since 1972. For guiding his team to the conference crown, Gatson was honored as the 1999 Big Ten Indoor Coach of the Year.

"The name Michigan State is a well-known recognizable name," explained Gatson. "When you think of Michigan State, you think of a great institution. What I want to do is take this great institution that is already attractive for its academics and make it attractive as a track team. I think we woke up the giant a little bit with our success in the past couple of years, but we can go even further and accomplish more, we just need to stay healthy."

In his six years directing the Spartans, MSU athletes have earned All-America honors 13 times, including four-time track and field All-American Jim Jurcevich.

One of Gatson's keys to success was developing a squad that was solid in

all areas. He believes that much of the credit for the development of the program should go to his assistants, Jim Stintzi and Will Wabaunsee.

"I think we have a great staff," said Gatson. "We complement each other and I have complete confidence in them. Their guys show up at every meet ready to compete. Our team has shown great strides with the assembly of our current staff, and I give all the credit in the world to Jim and Will."

While on-the-track success is important to Gatson, he understands that his athletes are first and foremost students. He takes great pride in his team's success in the classroom. A goal for the team is always to earn a GPA of 3.0.

"When you do well in the classroom, you are going to do well on the track," explained Gatson. "We have to prepare our kids for life as much as we have to prepare them for track meets."

Gatson has also assisted in the development of the sprinters for the women's track and field program. He coached Sevetheda Fynes, who was the 1997 NCAA Champion in the 55-meter, 100-meter and 200-meter runs. Fynes also placed third at the 1997 World Championships.

During the 2002 season Gatson will assist women's head coach Angela Goodman in coaching the women's 400 and 800-meter runs. He is excited about the opportunity to work with the women's team once again.

A native of Detroit, Gatson assumed coaching responsibilities in 1996, replacing the legendary Jim Bibbs. His primary responsibilities include coaching the MSU jumpers, sprinters and hurdlers.

He came to Michigan State after spending a year-and-a-half as the head coach of the men's and women's track and field programs at Lincoln University in Missouri. While at Lincoln, he reinstated and developed the women's cross country program.

Not only was he instrumental in the track and field program, but he also

made a difference in the lives of the athletes. Gatson recruited and has continued to coach post collegiate athlete Lorriane (Graham) Fenton. Graham was a silver medalist in the 400-meter run (49.58) and as a member of the 4 x 400 team during the 2000 Olympic Games. She was also ranked second in the world in the 400 meter in both 2000 and 2001.

Prior to accepting that position, Gatson spent six successful years with the Tigers of Missouri where he coached five All-Americans, a former NCAA indoor record holder and 1992 Olympic silver medalist (4 x 400 relay) Natasha Kaiser-Brown.

Gatson's coaching experience also includes assistant coaching positions at Western Michigan (1986-88), Ferris State (1985) and Southwestern Michigan College (1980-82). He coached two All-Americans and an Olympic Trials competitor while at WMU.

After graduating from Detroit East Catholic High, Gatson spent two years at Southwestern Michigan College where he was runner-up and earned junior college All-America honors for his performance in the 400 meters at the 1976 NJCAA Championships before finishing his collegiate career at the University of Alabama. There he earned All-America honors as a senior, in 1978, when he placed third in the 400 meters (45.96) at the NCAA Championships. Gatson was also a part of the mile-relay team (3:15.11) that captured the NCAA indoor title. His time of 45.12 in the 400 meters is an Alabama record, and he previously held the 400-meter record at Southwestern (46.7).

Gatson was tabbed the "Bama Bullet" by Sports Illustrated in 1978 in recognition for his efforts at the Penn Relays.

Also during his time at Alabama Gatson earned a bachelor's degree in history (1980) and a master's degree in student personnel in higher education (1984).

He and his wife, Vicky, have three daughters, Darrielle, Dia and DeAnna, and reside in the Lansing area.

Assistant Coach Jim Stintzi

Jim Stintzi enters his 18th season as Michigan State's head coach cross country in addition to assisting with the track and field teams.

During his tenure, Stintzi has coached 24 All-Americans and 41 All-Big Ten performers in cross country and track. Included in that total are six All-American and 23 All-Big Ten cross country runners.

Stintzi coached the 1998 Spartans to a second-place Big Ten Championship finish and MSU's first ever Great Lakes Region Championship. Michigan State then advanced to the NCAA Championships for the third time in four years.

In 1997, Stintzi guided the Spartans to a seventh-place finish at the NCAA Championships, which was MSU's best showing since 1970.

A native of Menomonee Falls, Wis., Stintzi has worked to return the Spartan program to prominence at the national level. Stintzi earned NCAA District IV Coach of the Year honors when he coached his team to a third-place finish at the district championships in 1995.

Stintzi has earned Big Ten Coach of the Year honors twice during his career. His first honor came in 1987 when the Spartans



finished fourth in the conference, a jump of five places from 1986. Stintzi was again recognized for his efforts in 1988 when MSU finished second at the Big Ten Championships, its highest finish since 1971.

Before coming to MSU in 1984, Stintzi coached at Northwestern, where he spent the 1983-84 season as a cross country and track assistant coach. He also served as a track assistant at his alma mater, Wisconsin, in 1983.

A seven-time All-American at Wisconsin, Stintzi claimed six Big Ten Championships as a Badger. His win in the 10,000 meters (29:03) and runner-up performances in the 5,000 meters (14:08) and the 3,000-meter steeplechase (8:51) at the 1981 Big Ten Championships earned him Athlete of the Championships honors. Additionally, he was the captain of the Wisconsin cross country and track teams as a senior.

Following his collegiate career, Stintzi was a member of four U.S. national track and field/cross country teams. In 1981, he was ranked sixth in the United States at 10,000 meters.

Stintzi earned a bachelor's degree from Wisconsin in 1981. He and his wife, Gail, reside in Williamston and have three children: Katie, David and Daniel.

Assistant Coach Will Wabaunsee

Will Wabaunsee enters his fifth year at Michigan State, working with the field event athletes. In his first two years at MSU, eight school records were broken in field events (indoor pole vault, outdoor pole vault, discus, decathlon, heptathlon, javelin, hammer throw and 35-lb weight). His athletes have continued to improve on those marks, as six new school records were set in 2001.

He has coached eight Spartan athletes to the NCAA Championships and the 1998 Canadian Combined Events Championship in the decathlon. Additionally, Wabaunsee has coached three USATF Jr. All-Americans in the pole vault, decathlon and shot put.

Wabaunsee came to MSU after one year as the assistant men's and women's track and field coach at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. There he coached field events and was the strength coach and recruiting coordinator. In 1995-96, Wabaunsee not only coached track and field at Morningside College in Sioux City, Iowa, but also coordinated the strength and conditioning programs for the track and football team. One of his athletes John McEwen earned two national championships and set a national record in the weight throw.

From 1989 to 1995, Wabaunsee served as an assistant coach



at Emporia State University, responsible for throws, multi-events, pole vault, cross country and the strength programs while directing five national champion athletes.

Wabaunsee holds a TAC Level 1 certification and he has been a field event official at the district level and the NAIA National Championships. He is also certified by USATF for the throws.

Wabaunsee received a bachelor of science in home economics and business in 1987 from Southwestern College (Winfield, KS) and a master of science in education from Emporia State (1993). He

has also received a bachelor of arts in physical education and a bachelor of arts in education from Missouri-Kansas City. He and his wife, Amy, reside in the Holt area.

Assistant Coach Angela Goodman

Now in her fourth year as Michigan State's Director of Women's Track & Field and Cross Country, Angela Goodman has guided the Spartan program in the right direction.

"A lot of changes have been made in the past few years," Goodman said. "The program is moving up and continues to get better. With the facilities being upgraded, this will help us to attract more quality student-athletes.

"MSU offers several great academic programs, now we are going to have the facilities to match. The university has shown a solid commitment to our program."

While working to turn the program around, Goodman coached Sherita Williams to the 2001 Big Ten Championships (indoor) in the triple jump.

The Fort Wayne, Ind., native has a wealth of international coaching experience. Goodman served as an assistant coach for the 2001 World University Games in Beijing, China, and assisted with the U.S. National Team at the 1997 World Outdoor Championship in Athens, Greece. In 1995, she was the Deputy Commissioner of Competition for Athletics at the Special Olympic World Games. She was also the manager of the 1994 U.S. Olympic Festival Track and Field Championships. Goodman holds USATF Level II Certification in sprints, hurdles and jumps.

Goodman, who is in her 10th year of coaching overall, earned USTCA Region I Outdoor Coach of the Year award in 1997 and the Indoor Coach of the Year award in 1998 while at the University of Connecticut.



Goodman began her coaching career in 1992 as men's and women's track and field assistant coach at Yale. After three years with the Bulldogs, she served as a graduate assistant coach at Syracuse in August of 1995 before leaving to take the head position at UConn in February of 1996.

Goodman, who was a star member of the Purdue track team, earned All-America honors in the triple jump (indoor) as a senior in 1988. She also ran a leg on the 4x400 relay team that captured the 1988 Big Ten Indoor Championship and was a member of the 1987 Big Ten Outdoor Championship team. In 1994,

Goodman was inducted into the Purdue Women's Track and Field Hall of Fame.

Having competed at the Big Ten level, Goodman brings a different perspective of the conference to her student-athletes.

"The Big Ten Conference is one of the most competitive conferences in the country," Goodman said. "Our team has made progress in the Big Ten. I was happy with scoring 42.5 points, but that is still only ninth place. We're getting more scoring-able bodies that will help increase the team score and move us up in the Big Ten standings."

Goodman competed at the national level after graduating from Purdue in 1988 with a bachelor's degree in child development and family studies. She placed second in the triple jump at the 1988 U.S. Olympic Trials. That same year she earned TAC All-America honors with a third-place finish at the TAC National Championships.

Kyle Baker is in his second year as an administrative assistant to the Michigan State track and field program. The former Spartan graduated in 1999 with a degree in business administration and interpersonal communication. Baker was a four-time NCAA All-American in cross country and a four-time Big Ten Track Champion.

Volunteer Coach Dawn Lewis



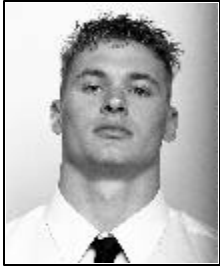
Dawn Lewis is in her fourth year as a volunteer assistant coach working with the sprinters and hurdlers at MSU.

The 2001 season saw several strong individual performances. During the indoor season, three athletes- Andy Lixey, Steve Manz and Paul Terek- made appearances at the NCAA Championships and earned All-American honors for their top performances. Terek was the lone Spartan to make a return trip to the NCAA Championships during the outdoor season, earning All-America honors in the decathlon.

"I think last year was an exciting year, but yet it was up and down," Gatson said. "We had some great individual things happen, but as an overall team we didn't place the way I thought we should have."

Competing at big meets such as the Alabama Relays, Mt. Sac Relays, and the Big Ten and NCAA Championships provided valuable learning experiences for the team.

Not only did the Spartans compete at challenging meets across the country, but a number of the athletes challenged past Spartan performances by breaking a combined five records during the 2001 season.

"Those guys had an outstanding year. The records have been there for a long time and they came in and broke them," commented Gatson. "I think it shows the level of talent and the great thing is that they are just beginning."

- *MSU research has led to such important advancements as homogenized milk and cisplatin, one of the most widely used and effective cancer drugs in the world.*

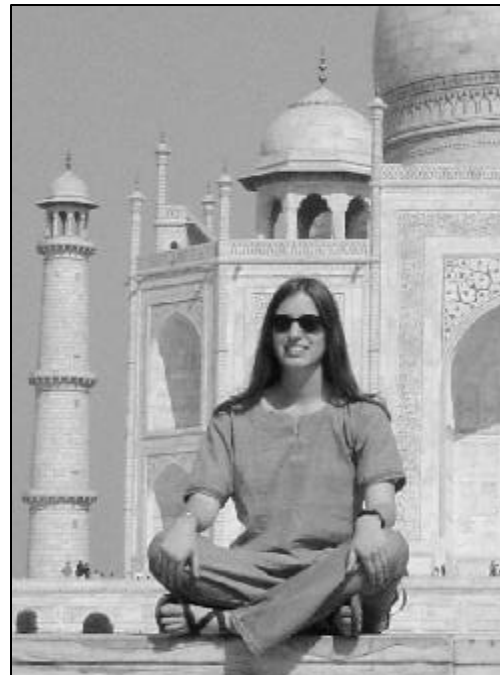

The Campus

The campus of Michigan State University is a unique blend of tradition and innovation. - *More than 21 miles of two-lane roadways and 3.7 million square feet of walkways connect some 600 buildings on the MSU campus.*

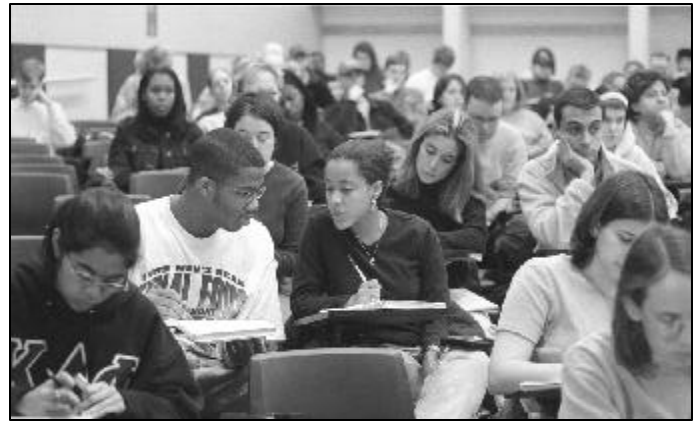


Access to any campus site is made easy by bicycle paths and walkways. Twenty-minute periods between classes ensure that students have plenty of time to reach their destinations.

- *More than half of MSU's freshmen rank in the top 25 percent of their high school graduating classes each year.*

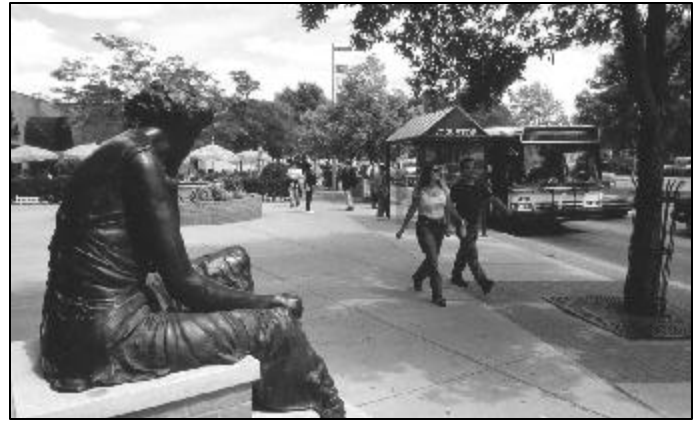

Student Life

Clara Bell Smith Academic Center



Michigan State's proud tradition of fielding well-prepared teams extends from the playing field to the classroom.

Today's student-athletes face a rigorous balancing act. In what can seem to be a very short day, the student-athlete must fit in classes, studying, practices, conditioning sessions, and maybe even a little social life. Each student-athlete commits up to 20 hours a week to his or her sport while carrying a full academic load.

To make this balancing act a bit easier, MSU is proud to be the home of the Clara Bell Smith Student-Athlete Academic Center, a facility that will help student-athletes receive the support and encouragement they need to accomplish their academic goals.

Located in the heart of campus, the center was built as an addition to the Duffy Daugherty Football Building in 1998. It houses classrooms,

tutorial rooms, study halls, a conference room, auditorium, and a state-of-the-art computer lab.

The computer lab has as many as 60 computers, a number of printers, and several laptop computers that the student-athlete can check out. The computers are equipped to handle word processing, spreadsheet applications, test-prep software, Internet access and links to all other University labs and libraries. The computer lab is staffed by qualified students with extensive backgrounds in computer science and word processing.

In general, the center allows MSU to offer stronger programs in individualized tutorial support, math enrichment, specialized math and reading assistance, mentoring and computer literacy training.

The facility is named after the mother of Steve Smith, a former MSU basketball All-American and current member of the San Antonio Spurs of the National Basketball Association. Smith donated \$2.5 million to the \$7.5 million facility, the largest gift ever by a professional athlete to any college or university.

Just as instrumental to the campaign was the volunteer leadership of two distinguished alumni: Ambassador Peter Secchia and former Spartan football and baseball All-American Kirk Gibson.

Student-Athlete Support Services

Through a comprehensive program of academic and personal support, the Student-Athlete Support Services (SASS) office strives to assist all MSU student-athletes in their development as students and athletes, as well as in their preparation for life and careers after college. With a nationally-recognized facility, the Clara Bell Smith Student-Athlete Academic Center, SASS offers a wide range of support, including academic counseling, computer labs with instruction, tutoring in all subject areas, career planning, community service opportunities and personal development workshops.

The SASS program is integrated with the total University to assist student-athletes in all phases of college life. Six academic counselors, who are knowledgeable about NCAA and Big Ten regulations, work with student-athletes from 25 varsity sports throughout their college careers. These staff members work proactively to help student-athletes keep on track with their rigorous academic and athletic schedules. They do this by gathering daily information on student-athlete academic progress, assessing individual needs, and providing academic assistance through a broad tutorial program. Two learning specialists are on staff to assist those with special needs and to help develop learning strategies.

The City of East Lansing

East Lansing's first houses, known as Faculty Row, were built on the college campus in the 1850s, and thereafter the city's history and growth paralleled that of Michigan State University. In those early days the village primarily served the needs of teacher and student. An early village planner was the college's world famous botanist, William James Beal, who, together with mathematician Rolla C. Carpenter, laid out an area just north of campus as a residential tract.

In the new century the rush to expansion boomed, and in 1907 "Collegeville" and adjacent neighborhoods were chartered as East Lansing. Many of the historic homes in the city retain the college gothic flavor of MSU architecture from the first quarter of the century.

The East Lansing Businessman's Association, many of whose members were faculty at the college, was instrumental in the expansion of the town and business district along one edge of the campus. Today this association, after a handful of evolutions, is recognized as the East Lansing Merchants Group, a group that demonstrates its commitment to the city through the many community activities it supports.

The East Lansing School District dates from 1901. Growth of MSU and its faculty resulted in a community with high educational expectations, and East Lansing soon became known for the quality of its public education. As word of the system's excellence spread, the city became increasingly attractive as a place for family life.

East Lansing is now more than eight times larger than at its founding and has a public school system of ten schools. Its population of more than 50,000 has evolved to include business and professional women and men, families of all configurations and ethnic backgrounds, educators, international residents, politicians, and artists, as well as MSU faculty and students.
