Spartan Hockey History



spartan hockey timeline of tradition

Michigan State has long been at the forefront of collegiate hockey success. Spartan hockey ranks among the winningest programs in NCAA history, and both teams and players alike have reached the pinnacle of achievement. From its championship tradition to record-setting players and coaches, Spartan hockey truly embodies a Commitment to Excellence.



january 11, 1922

Michigan State plays its first intercollegiate hockey game, falling to Michigan, 5-1. The very first team picture is above.

february 11, 1923

MSU gets its first win, 6-1 over the Lansing Independents.

january 12, 1950

MSU plays its first game since 1930, losing to Michigan Tech, 6-2.

november 29, 1951

MSU plays its first game under legendary coach Amo Bessone, defeating Ontario Agricultural College, 8-2 at home.

march 1, 1952

MSU's first season post-WWII is completed with a game against Michigan. Dick Lord - believed to be the first black player in college hockey - played in all 20 games that season, compiling three goals, five points, and 59 penalty minutes.

february 6, 1954

Goaltender Ed Schiller makes a Spartan-record 73 saves in a 5-4 loss to Denver.

february 19, 1954

MSU skates to its second scoreless tie in history, 0-0 against Michigan. It snaps a 14-game losing streak to the Wolverines since hockey was reinstated in 1950.

december 7, 1957

MSU sets a school record for most goals in a game in an 18-0 win vs. Ohio State. The mark still stands.

march 1, 1958

MSU completes its first winning season (12-11), despite losing to Minnesota in the finale, 5-1.

march 13, 1959

MSU makes its first NCAA Tournament appearance, defeating Boston College in the semifinals, 4-3.

march 14, 1959

The Spartans fall to North Dakota, 4-3 in overtime, in their first national championship game. MSU finishes the season 17-6-1.

december 11, 1964

Mike Jacobson scores three goals in one minute of the first period against Wisconsin. The accomplishment lands him in Sports Illustrated and still stands as the fastest three goals by one player in MSU history.

march 5, 1966

MSU defeats defending national champion Michigan Tech, 4-3, to win the WCHA playoffs after finishing sixth in the regular season.

march 18, 1966

Doug Volmar's goal gives MSU a 2-1 win over Boston University in the NCAA semifinals.

march 19, 1966

MSU completes one of the most unlikely postseason runs with a 6-1 win over Clarkson to claim its first NCAA championship. Bob Brawley gives the Spartans a 2-1 lead in the second period, and they cruised from there. Goaltender Gaye Cooley is named the tournament MVP and Amo Bessone is named Coach of the Year.





March 16, 1967

MSU, fifth in the WCHA regular season, defeats champion Michigan Tech, 2-1 in overtime, to win the playoffs for the second straight season. Doug Volmar nets both goals, including the winner at 5:44 of overtime.

March 18, 1967

After falling to Boston University in the NCAA semifinals, MSU captures third place with a 6-1 win over North Dakota in the NCAA consolation game.

November 10, 1973

Tom Ross ties the school record with five goals in a 9-5 win over Notre Dame at MSU Ice Arena.

December 28, 1973

MSU wins its first Great Lakes Invitational, defeating Michigan Tech, 5-4, in the finals.

October 25, 1974

Munn Ice Arena hosts its first game, a 4-3 MSU loss to Laurentian. The arena is dedicated a week later, on November 1, 1974.

November 16, 1974

The first sellout crowd in Munn history sees the Spartans down North Dakota, 6-2. Goalie Ron Clark sets a record with 30 saves in the first period.

February 14, 1976


The Spartans establish a new single-season attendance record at Munn Ice Arena in a win vs. North Dakota, 7-1. A total of 157,567 fans attend games during the year, a record which still stands.

March 14, 1976

The longest game in MSU history is settled in the third overtime, as Minnesota defeats the Spartans, 7-6, after 86:33 of play in the WCHA playoffs. It is the final game for record-setting stars Tom Ross and Steve Colp, who finish their careers with 324 and 300 points, respectively.

March 3, 1979

Amo Bessone coaches his final game, a 5-3 win over Michigan. It is Bessone's 367th win in 28 years at Michigan State, a record which stands until 1992.

april 1, 1979

Ron Mason is named Spartan head coach.

october 19, 1979

Ron Mason gets his first win at MSU in his first game, 7-6 over Western Michigan.

october 23, 1981

MSU begins its first season of CCHA play, defeating Lake Superior, 4-3, in East Lansing. MSU had left the WCHA along with Michigan, Michigan Tech and Notre Dame.

march 13, 1982

MSU wins its first CCHA playoff championship by beating Notre Dame, 4-1, with All-America goaltender Ron Scott.

march 20, 1982

MSU's first NCAA Tournament appearance under Ron Mason ends with a 9-4, two-game, total-goals series loss to New Hampshire in the first round.

december 29, 1982

A North American collegiate hockey record crowd of 21,247 at Joe Louis Arena watches MSU win the Great Lakes Invitational, 5-3 over Michigan Tech.

march 12, 1983

MSU tops Bowling Green in the CCHA title game, 4-3 in overtime. Ron Scott stops a penalty shot by BGSU All-American Brian Hills during the extra stanza to set the stage for Mark Hamway's winning goal.

march 10, 1984

The Spartans win their third straight CCHA playoff championship, defeating Western Michigan, 5-0, with Norm Foster in goal.

march 23, 1984

After reaching the NCAA Frozen Four for the first time in 17 years, MSU falls to Bowling Green, 2-1, in the semifinals.

december 29, 1984

The Great Lakes Invitational championship game produces the third straight North American record crowd, as MSU defeats Michigan Tech again, 7-0, in front of 21,576 at Joe Louis Arena.

march 24, 1985

In possibly the most painful loss in MSU history, Providence knocks the "Super Team" out of the NCAA tournament, 4-2 (Providence wins the two-game, total-goals series, 6-5). Providence goalie Chris Terrerri stops 50 MSU shots and its season at an NCAA record 38 wins. MSU outscores its opponents by more than two-to-one on the season, and 18 members of the team go on to sign professional contracts.

november 15-16, 1985

The National Hockey League uses Michigan State's exhibition series with Team Canada at Munn as its first experiment with video replay. NHL Director of Officials John McCauley and Hockey Night in Canada Vice President of Production Don Wallace oversee the experiment. Both coaches challenge one goal in the series, which the two teams split, but neither is overturned.

december 14-15, 1985

Mike Donnelly scores eight goals in a two-game sweep of Ohio State. Five come in Saturday's 6-5 MSU win, including the OT winner.

march 29, 1986

MSU wins its second national championship, downing Harvard, 6-5, in Providence, R.I., on Mike Donnelly's NCAA-record 59th goal of the season.

march 7, 1987

Michigan State wins its fifth CCHA playoff title in six seasons when Kevin Miller beats Bowling Green All-America goaltender Gary Kruzich in overtime for a 4-3 win.

march 28, 1987

MSU is the runner-up in the NCAA Tournament, falling to North Dakota, 5-3, in the title game.

march 12, 1989

MSU captures its sixth CCHA playoff crown in eight years with a 4-1 win over Lake Superior State as goaltender Jason Muzzatti earns tournament MVP honors.

april 1, 1989

Making its third trip to the NCAA Frozen Four in a four-year span and fourth trip in the last six seasons, MSU finishes third with a 7-4 consolation win over Maine.

february 3, 1990


Ron Mason becomes only the second hockey coach in NCAA history to reach the 600-win plateau as MSU defeats Ohio State, 4-2.

february 17, 1990

MSU makes it back-to-back regular-season CCHA championships—and four in six years with a 5-2 win over Michigan at Yost Arena.

february 23, 1990

MSU extends its record CCHA unbeaten string to 27 games (24-0-3) with a 4-3 win at Lake Superior State. The win also established what was then a CCHA record for points in a season.

march 11, 1990

The Spartans win their seventh CCHA playoff championship in nine years, besting Lake Superior, 4-3. Peter White is the tournament MVP.

april 1, 1990

Kip Miller, just the second Spartan ever to record 100 points in a season, becomes MSU's first Hobey Baker Memorial Award Recipient, named by the Decathlon Athletic Club of Bloomington, Minn.

february 28, 1992

Backed by Mike Gilmore's 36-save performance, Michigan State edges Maine, 3-2, to advance to the NCAA Frozen Four for the second time in four years.

april 26, 1992

Ron Mason accepts the Spencer Penrose Award as 1991-92 American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year.

november 21, 1992

Ron Mason gets MSU win No. 368, a 6-2 victory over Illinois-Chicago, surpassing Amo Bessone (367, 1951-79) as the Spartans' winningest hockey coach.

february 12, 1993

Ron Mason gets career win No. 674, a 6-5 triumph over Kent State, to become the winningest U.S. college hockey coach in history, surpassing Len Ceglarski (Clarkson and Boston College).

january 21, 1994

The Spartans knock off Michigan, ranked No. 1 in the nation, by a 6-3 score in Ann Arbor, giving Ron Mason his 400th victory as the Spartan head coach.

march 18, 1994

Trailing by a 2-0 score with under 10 minutes remaining, the Spartans top Bowling Green in overtime, 3-2, in the quarterfinals of the CCHA playoffs at Joe Louis Arena. Junior Steve Guolla scores all three goals, giving Ron Mason career victory No. 698 and making him the winningest coach in college hockey history, passing former University of Alberta mentor Clare Drake.

february 20, 1998

Michigan State beats Michigan, 5-1, giving Ron Mason his 800th career win. MSU's win over Michigan the next night helps propel the Spartans to their first CCHA championship since 1989-90.

february 28, 1998

Senior goaltender Chad Alban caps a memorable Senior Night with an empty-net goal, becoming just the fourth college goalie to be credited with a goal and the first to shoot it himself into an empty net. Alban shot the puck from behind and to the right of his net and it went in with 13 seconds remaining in the 6-3 win over Ferris State.

march 21, 1998

Shawn Horcoff's goal 2:30 into the second overtime gives MSU a 3-2 victory over Ohio State and ends the longest CCHA championship game in league history. The win marks the Spartans' eighth playoff title.

february 20, 1999

MSU defeats Michigan, 3-1, at Joe Louis Arena; 40 minutes after the game ends, the Spartans learn that Alaska Fairbanks defeated Ohio State in overtime, giving the Spartans their second-straight CCHA regular-season title. The MSU-Michigan game at Joe Louis attracts a sellout crowd of 19,983 for the third year in a row.

march 28, 1999

Andrew Hutchinson and Adam Hall score 32 seconds apart with less than two minutes remaining in the third period, lifting MSU past Colorado College, 4-3, and into the NCAA Frozen Four for the first time since 1992.

january 7, 2000

A record crowd of 7,117 watches the Spartans fall to Michigan, 2-0, in a newly-refurbished Munn Ice Arena which includes the addition of luxury suites and club seating.

march 16, 2000

Senior centerman Shawn Horcoff wins an unprecedented five individual CCHA awards (Player of the Year, Best Defensive Forward, Scoring Champion, All-CCHA First-Team and CCHA All-Academic).

march 17-18, 2000

Freshman Ryan Miller becomes the first goaltender to record shutouts in the CCHA Tournament semifinals and championship game, leading MSU to its ninth playoff crown.

CCHA head coaches and athletics directors vote unanimously to rename the league's playoff championship trophy the Mason Cup in honor of then-Spartan head coach Ron Mason.

december 30, 2000

John Nail's goal with 56 seconds remaining in overtime propels the Spartans to a 3-2 win over Michigan Tech in the GLI championship, MSU's fourth-straight GLI crown.

january 12, 2001

Goaltender Ryan Miller makes 18 saves in a 2-0 shutout of Lake Superior State. The whitewash is the 13th of Miller's MSU career and propels him past Chad Alban for first place on the school's all-time shutout list. The shutout is also the 11th in Miller's career against a CCHA opponent, the most in league history. That record also was previously held by Alban.

january 23, 2001


Ryan Miller blanks Lake Superior State for the third time in four starts as the Spartans outlast the Lakers, 3-0, at Munn Ice Arena. The win extends the MSU unbeaten streak to 23 games (20-0-3), matching the school record set during the 1998-99 campaign.

january 27, 2001

Ryan Miller allows a goal 2:17 into the second period of the Spartans' 4-3 overtime loss to Michigan at Joe Louis Arena. The marker snaps the goaltender's scoreless streak at a school-record 229:29, which spanned five games and included three shutouts.

february 10, 2001

Ryan Miller backstops the Spartans to a 3-0 win over Alaska Fairbanks at Munn Ice Arena. The shutout is the 17th of his career, pushing him past Clarkson's Wally Easton and Greg Gardner of Niagara into sole possession of first place on the NCAA's all-time shutouts list.

february 17, 2001

Adam Hall scores a pair of goals and Brian Maloney adds a marker and two assists as MSU hands Michigan a 4-2 defeat in front of a sellout crowd of 19,995 at Joe Louis Arena. The win is coach Ron Mason's 600th behind the Spartan bench.

march 1, 2001

MSU needs just 14 months to set a new Munn Ice Arena attendance record as 7,121 pack the facility to see the Spartans drop Michigan, 3-1, in the regular-season finale for both teams. The Spartans are presented with the CCHA regular-season trophy following the game.

march 15, 2001

For the second straight year, a Spartan dominates the CCHA Awards Banquet. This time, it's Ryan Miller, who is named the league's Player of the Year and Best Goaltender along with All-CCHA First-Team distinction.

march 17, 2001


Ryan Miller's success continues as the MSU netminder blanks Michigan, 2-0, in the CCHA Tournament championship, his second title game shutout in as many seasons. He's named tourney MVP for his efforts, becoming the first player to earn the honor twice.

march 25, 2001

The Spartans, the nation's top-ranked team for 19 consecutive weeks, advance to the NCAA Frozen Four for the second time in three seasons by defeating Wisconsin, 5-1, in a West Regional quarterfinal match at Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids.

april 5, 2001

One day after MSU is ousted from the Frozen Four by North Dakota, Ryan Miller becomes the second goaltender and second Spartan to win the Hobey Baker Memorial Award.

october 6, 2001

A world-record crowd of 74,554 watch as Michigan State and Michigan skate to a 3-3 overtime tie in an outdoor hockey game played at Spartan Stadium (below). The record crowd braved chilly temperatures, hovering just above freezing with wind gusts reaching nearly 30 mph. MSU freshman forward Jim Slater scored the game-tying goal with 47 seconds left and neither team could find the net in the extra session. And as they say the rest is history.

october 20, 2001

Ron Mason picks up his 900th career victory, a 2-0 victory over Ferris State before 6,732 fans at Munn Arena. The shutout was the 20th of Ryan Miller's career and win No. 50 for the goaltender. Adam Hall and Ash Goldie post the goals for the Spartans.

march 22, 2002

Ron Mason coaches in his final game behind the Spartan bench as the Spartans fall to Colorado College 2-0 in the NCAA Tournament. Mason leaves the coaching ranks as the all-time winningest coach in NCAA hockey history with 924 victories.

april 25, 2002

Veteran head coach Rick Comley is introduced as MSU's fifth head hockey coach. Comley replaces the legendary Ron Mason, who stepped down at the conclusion of the season to become MSU's athletics director.

october 24, 2002

Rick Comley picks up his 600th career win as the Spartans blank Lake Superior State, 7-0, at Munn Ice Arena.

december 30, 2004

Colton Fretter's goal at the 9:24 mark of overtime gives MSU a 2-1 victory over arch-rival Michigan in the championship game of the Great Lakes Invitational. The win marked State's 10th GLI title and the team's first since the 2000 season.

march 18, 2006

Michigan State captured its unprecedeted 11th CCHA Tournament title with a 2-1 victory over regular-season champion Miami. Freshman Jeff Lerg, who earlier in the week had earned the league's Rookie of the Year honors, is named Tournament MVP, while Tim Crowder and Drew Miller are named to the All-Tournament Team.

march 25, 2006

Jeff Lerg makes MSU history with a 1-0 shutout of New Hampshire in the NCAA East Regional in Albany, N.Y. The Spartans make a Tim Crowder goal just 2:14 into the game hold up for the win, behind 36 saves from Lerg. It is the first shutout for MSU in 24 trips to the NCAA Tournament. The Spartans' run ends the next day in the regional final against Maine, 5-4.

january 6, 2007

Rick Comley's 700th career victory comes in Oxford, Ohio with a 4-1 victory over the Miami Red Hawks. Comley is just the fifth coach all-time to reach 700.

april 7, 2007

An underdog Spartan team shocks Boston College, 3-1, to secure Michigan State's third NCAA Hockey title in school history. Trailing 1-0 entering the final frame, Tim Kennedy tied the score midway through the period then set up Justin Abdelkader (above) for the game-winner with just 18.9 seconds remaining in regulation. Abdelkader secures MVP honors, while Kennedy, Jeff Lerg, and Tyler Howells are named to the Frozen Four All-Tournament Team. Head Coach Rick Comley becomes just the third coach to lead two different schools to NCAA hockey titles. Three days later, more than 4,500 people turned out for a parade through East Lansing and a rally for the National Champions at Munn Ice Arena. The team also traveled to the Champions Day Celebration at the White House in June.

may 2007

Jeff Lerg is named the USA Hockey College Player of the Year, joining Mike York (1999) as the two Spartan recipients. Lerg was also named the USA Hockey Junior Player of the Year in 2005.

march 29, 2008

Playing in a third straight NCAA Regional Final, the Spartans drop a heartbreaker to Notre Dame, 3-1, to deny MSU a shot at defending its national championship. The Irish scored twice - at 14:06 and 15:20 - of the third period to seal the victory. Sent to Colorado Springs to play host Colorado College in the first round, the Spartans dispatched the Tigers 3-1 on the strength of second-period goals by Corey Tropp, Tim Kennedy, and Jeff Dunne. The 2007-08 team went 26-11-5 and finished third in the CCHA.

february 28, 2009

With 12:52 showing on the clock in the second period, Jeff Lerg made a blocker save on Notre Dame's Christian Minella's shot from the top of the right circle, which gave the netminder his 3,934th career stop, and the CCHA all-time saves record.

march 7, 2009

Jeff Lerg's Spartan career comes to an end with 3,996 saves, topping the career chart at MSU and in the CCHA and second all-time in the NCAA Annals. He graduates with a robust resume of accolades, earning both All-America and Academic All-America honors, is the Academic All-American of the Year in 2009, in addition to being a finalist for the AAU James Sullivan Award, which is given to the top amateur athlete in the United States.

january 25, 2011

Head coach Rick Comley announces that he will retire from his position at Michigan State, effective at the end of the season. His coaching career ends on March 5, when the Spartans are eliminated from the CCHA Tournament by Alaska.

march 23, 2011

Tom Anastos is appointed to the position of head coach. Anastos, who previous to his hiring, served as the commissioner of the Central Collegiate Hockey Association for 13 seasons, becomes just the sixth Michigan State hockey coach in program history and the fourth in the modern era.

march 15, 2012

Torey Krug matches fellow Spartan Shawn Horcoff by taking home a CCHA-record five major awards at the CCHA Awards Show. Krug becomes just the second defenseman in CCHA history (and fifth all-time) to capture a league scoring title, as he was named Player of the Year, Outstanding Offensive Defenseman, First Team All-CCHA, and Perani Cup champion in addition to his scoring title. Two weeks later, Krug would be named a First Team All-America as well as a Hobey Baker Finalist.

november 10, 2012

The Spartans establish a new Munn Arena attendance record as 7,225 fans pack the legendary building to see MSU defeat Michigan, 7-2.

december 6, 2013

Michigan State hosts top-ranked Minnesota in the Spartans' inaugural Big Ten game. The two teams played to a 2-2 tie, but the Spartans picked up the extra point in the standings by downing the Gophers in the first-ever Big Ten shootout.

december 29, 2014

Michigan State and Michigan meet for the 300th time in series history. The MSU-UM series is the most-played rivalry in all of college hockey.

february 5, 2016

Matt DeBlouw's power-play goal 3:29 into overtime gives MSU a 3-2 win over Michigan at Joe Louis Arena in the first game between the teams for the new "Iron D" Trophy.

april 11, 2017

Danton Cole, a key member of some of the most successful teams in Michigan State hockey history, is named the seventh head coach in program history. In Cole's four years at Michigan State as a player, the Spartans went 131-44-8 (.738), won a NCAA National Championship (1986), made three NCAA Frozen Four appearances (1986, 1987, 1989), captured two CCHA regular-season titles (1986, 1989) and two CCHA Tournament championships (1987, 1989).

october 14, 2017

Danton Cole earns his first victory in his first home game as head coach as the Spartans rally for a 3-2 victory over Bowling Green, courtesy of a Taro Hirose game-winning goal with 40 seconds to play.

november 30, 2018

The Spartans snap a 2-2 tie with two goals in the third period and defeat Michigan, 4-3, for the 1300th win in program history.

march 19, 2019

Taro Hirose is named the Big Ten Player of the Year and was the only unanimous All-Big Ten First Team selection. Hirose went on to earn First-Team All-America honors and was also a Hobey Baker Award finalist. He tied for the national lead in points and was second in assists.

July 2019

Construction commences on the \$26.2 million Munn Arena expansion project. The project is the most significant in the building's history as it includes new a Spartan locker room, athletic training room, theater, weight room, offices and team lounge among other amenities. The project also includes a "hall of history" as part of the new, expanded entrance on the south side of the building.

march 2020

Michigan State had its best average home attendance since 2003-04 as the 5,939 season average ranked sixth in the nation.

may 3, 2022

Adam Nightingale, a Spartan alumnus with hockey experience at the international, professional, collegiate and youth levels, is named the eighth head coach in Michigan State hockey history.

September 23, 2022

The Munn Arena addition is dedicated a week prior to the start of the 2022-23 campaign. The state-of-the-art facility more than triples the space for player training, nutrition, video study, and health and wellness.

march 4-5, 2023

Michigan State earns its first-ever victory in the Big Ten Tournament, and a day later secures its first-ever series victory in the league's postseason affair. The Spartans dropped a 1-0 decision at Notre Dame before rallying for a pair of 4-2 wins to capture the best-of-three series. A week later, MSU plays in its first-ever semifinal, falling at No. 1 Minnesota, 5-1.

november 17-18, 2023

The ice surface at Munn Ice Arena is officially renamed Ron Mason Rink in honor of the legendary coach's contributions to the MSU program and college hockey overall,

november 17-18, 2023

Visiting Wisconsin, ranked No. 1 in both national polls, leaves Munn with a pair of losses, 4-2 and 3-2. MSU earned a weekend sweep of a No. 1 team for just the third time in program history and for the first time since 1974 - the first two times came Jan. 4-5, 1974 at home against Wisconsin (5-4, 7-6) and at Michigan Tech on Nov. 8-9, 1974 (4-2 and 5-4).

march 2, 2024

Behind a pair of goals from senior Jeremy Davidson, a goal and two assists from Reed Lebster, and a 44-save performance from Trey Augustine, MSU defeats Wisconsin to claim its first-ever Big Ten regular-season title.

march 23, 2024

Freshman Patrick Geary cemented his name in Spartan hockey history when his shot from the left point caromed off the post and into the back of the net at 13:47 of overtime to send Michigan State to a 5-4 victory over archrival Michigan in the Spartans' first-ever appearance in the Big Ten Tournament championship game in front of a raucous sellout crowd at Munn Ice Arena. Tournament MVP Trey Augustine made 33 saves. The Spartans capped a 13-3-1 season at Munn in front of sellout crowds in 16 of 17 home games, ranking sixth nationally in average attendance (6,482), their largest average attendance since 2000-01.

anson carter

A prolific scorer. An All-American. A Hobey finalist. A professional hockey player. A trailblazer and a role model, and now one of the faces of the National Hockey League. And now, Anson Carter can add "Michigan State Athletics Hall-of-Fame" to his list of accolades.

Carter excelled on the ice for more than 15 years in the collegiate and professional game, spending his entire four-year career in Green and White before spending more than a decade in the National Hockey League.

"I played 11 years in the National Hockey League and you think that would be the best time in your life. But I tell my kids - my four years at MSU were actually the best years of my life," admits Carter. "Wearing that jersey is everything; It's a sense of pride. It's something that is hard to put into words."

The Scarborough, Ontario, native came to MSU as a 10th-round pick (No. 220 overall) of the Quebec Nordiques in the 1992 NHL entry draft. He still ranks among MSU's all-time scoring leaders; currently standing sixth in goals (106), fourth in power-play goals (40), and third in shorthanded tallies (11); his 178 career points finds him 22nd all-time.

He was the team's Outstanding Rookie in 1993, won the team's Outstanding Offensive Player Award in both 1995 and 1996, and in his senior season, was the recipient of the Bill Burgess Outstanding Senior Award as well as the Amo Bessone Award, which recognizes a player for academic and athletic achievement in addition to involvement in the community. In terms of league recognition, he was the CCHA Rookie of the Year in 1993, and was an All-CCHA pick from 1994-96, including first-team honors as both a sophomore and junior. He helped guide the Spartans to the CCHA Championship weekend all four seasons and the NCAA Tournament in three.

As a junior in 1995, Carter had a team-best 34 goals and finished with 51 points, and was named an All-American in addition to being a Hobey Baker finalist. Carter went on to play 11 seasons in the NHL.

Carter has never been far from the game – he now serves as one of the studio analysts for the NHL on TNT, and is a charter member of the NHL's Player Inclusion Coalition, which takes action to accelerate the growing movement for inclusion across the hockey community to educate and engage at all levels of the game.

During consecutive March nights in the studio, while discussing the games of the day and how the NHL playoff picture was developing, Carter wore the iconic script Michigan State jersey to celebrate the 2024 Spartan squad winning the Big Ten Championship. Proudly, the #22 jersey featured the captain's "C".



great lakes invitational



1973 GLI Champions



The 58th Great Lakes Invitational will be played in December 2024, and continues to be the top holiday tournament in the country. Many have challenged the GLI's stature, but none have matched its continued success.

In 2013, the GLI was played at Comerica Park as part of the Hockeytown Winterfestival in conjunction with the NHL Winter Classic. In 2023, it moved to a new home at Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids.

The tournament was born out of a conversation between then-general manager of Olympia Stadium, Lincoln Cavalieri, legendary Michigan Tech head coach John MacInnes and Detroit Red Wings scout Jack Paterson. The three men were discussing the lack of American-born players in the National Hockey League and concluded that a prestigious collegiate hockey tournament could make a difference by promoting interest in hockey among young athletes as well as the general public. American Airlines vice president Jack Tompkins, a former University of Michigan goalie and a member of the Detroit Red Wings organization, championed the trio's vision as well and together in 1965, they founded the Great Lakes Invitational Hockey Tournament.

Michigan Tech has hosted the GLI since its inception with Michigan joining as co-host in 1976. The event moved from Olympia Stadium to Joe Louis Arena in 1979 and shifted to its third home - Little Caesars Arena - in 2017. The Covid-19 pandemic wiped out the 2020 GLI, and the 2021 edition was played on the campuses of Michigan State and Michigan as a "Showcase" event. The last two years, the team has enjoyed Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids as the newest home of the storied tournament.

Michigan State has made 47 GLI appearances prior to this season and has been a regular part of the tournament field since 1979. The Spartans have won 12 titles, including four in a row from 1982-85 and 1997-2000. In 2009, Michigan State took home its first tournament title since 2006, downing Michigan Tech (10-1) and Rensselaer (6-1) in offensive outbursts. MSU and Michigan Tech skated to a 3-3 overtime tie in the 2023 chapter of the tournament, with the Huskies taking home the trophy with a shootout victory.



spartan hockey in the ccha

2012-13 marked the 40th season of the original Central Collegiate Hockey Association, which then came back as a new iteration in 2021-22.

The CCHA sent at least four teams to the NCAA Tournament in four of its last five seasons, and regularly has several teams not only contending for the NCAA Championship, but also ranked among the nation's Top 10.

The CCHA began in the 1971-72 season with four teams (Ohio State, St. Louis, Bowling Green, and Ohio University). A period followed which saw both growth and attrition; In 1981-82, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, Michigan and Notre Dame jumped from the Western Collegiate Hockey Association to the CCHA. Also that year, the league welcomed Illinois-Chicago into the fold. The league expanded to 12 teams in 1999-2000 as Nebraska-Omaha was welcomed to the CCHA in the first expansion for the conference since Northern Michigan joined in 1997-98.

Michigan State led all schools with a total of 586 CCHA victories. MSU captured regular-season titles in 1985, 1986, 1989, 1990, 1998, 1999 and 2001 along with playoff championships in a league-record 11 of its 32 seasons as a CCHA member. Michigan State also holds the best winning percentage in league play of any CCHA member past or present.

Michigan State enjoyed unprecedented success in the CCHA's post-season event, capturing 11 titles, two more than any other team.

The Spartans won the tournament title in their first four seasons in the league, and its tradition of success extended into 2006, where the Green and White hung its 11th banner in the Joe Louis Arena rafters. The Spartans appeared in 15 of the league's 32 championship games after joining the league for the 1981-82 season, nearly 50 percent.



The CCHA's prestige was highlighted by its eight national champions from 1984-2013 — Bowling Green (1984), Michigan State (1986 and 2007), Lake Superior (1988, 1992 and 1994) and Michigan (1996 and 1998).

The return of the CCHA came in 2021-22, with former CCHA members Bowling Green, Ferris State, Lake Superior State, and Northern Michigan joined by Bemidji State, Michigan Tech, Minnesota State-Mankato, and Division I newcomer St. Thomas.

the mason cup

By a unanimous vote of head coaches and league athletic directors on Oct. 3, 2000, the CCHA Playoff Championship trophy was renamed the Mason Cup in honor of longtime coach Ron Mason.

Mason stepped down from behind the bench – and into the athletics director position – at Michigan State University at the conclusion of the 2001-02 season. He retired as college hockey's all-time winningest coach, (924 victories), won 13 CCHA titles (10 at MSU, and three during his time at Bowling Green) as well as a National Championship with his 1986 Spartan squad.

msu at joe louis arena

Joe Louis Arena, the home of the Detroit Red Wings, became a second home to Michigan State. Nicknamed "Munn East" by fans, the Spartans played at Joe Louis Arena over 160 times since 1979. MSU won 11 CCHA playoff titles and 11 Great Lakes Invitational crowns at "The Joe" and produced a stretch of 17 consecutive wins in the building from 1982-86. Since the first game at the Joe in December 1979, more than 2.5 million fans enjoyed watching the Spartans at the historic hockey facility, which closed following the 2016-17 season.

In all, Michigan State played 161 games at the iconic barn, winning 11 CCHA Championships and 12 Great Lakes Invitational crowns. In all, MSU played in front of 2,523,642 fans at the facility, dating back to the first-ever game at JLA for the Spartans on Dec. 28, 1979.

Michigan State joined the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) prior to the 1981-82 season. Before then, the Spartans were among the first members of the Midwest Intercollegiate Hockey League (MIHL) in 1951-52 – that group became the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) in 1953-54. Those schools then formed the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA), which began play in 1959-60. Michigan State remained in the WCHA until joining the CCHA. Meanwhile, Michigan State also competed in the Big Ten from 1958-59 until formal Big Ten play ceased in 1980-81.

A 4-3 victory over the Eagles put the Spartans into the finals against a strong North Dakota club where head coach Amo Bessone's icers bowed, 4-3 in overtime, in the championship game. Goalie Joe Selinger and wing Bill MacKenzie were first-team NCAA all-star choices, while Ed Pollesel and Tom Mustonen were second-team selections.

One of the most colorful of all MSU hockey units was the 1965-66 Spartan team. The club lost three weeks of preseason practice when its home facility, Demonstration Hall, was under repair. Midway through the campaign, the Spartans had a 4-9 record but rallied to win 12 of their last 16 games. During that stretch, the Spartans dumped arch rival Michigan four times and then topped defending champ Michigan Tech, 4-3, to reach the NCAA semifinals. MSU won its first national hockey crown by dropping Boston University, 2-1, in the semis and Clarkson, 6-1, in the finals at Minnesota's Williams Arena. Goaltender Gaye Cooley was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player and Don Heaphy, Mike Coppo and Brian McAndrew were first-team all-tournament selections. Bob Brawley and Tom Mikkola were second-team picks. Though the team finished in sixth place in the WCHA (9-11), MSU's Amo Bessone won the Spencer Penrose Award as national coach of the year.

First-year skater Tim Crowder scored the only goal MSU would need just 2:14 into the game, and the stalwart defense would hold on to send the Spartans into the second round against Maine. In the regional final, the Black Bears posted a 3-0 lead by the 16:38 mark of the first period, but the Spartans found their stride and fought back to twice come within a goal. Crowder scored twice while Jim McKenzie and Drew Miller also found the back of the net, but MSU fell just short and dropped a 5-4 decision. Crowder and defenseman Corey Potter were named to the All-Regional Team.

After a fourth-place finish in the CCHA regular season and a dramatic overtime victory in the CCHA consolation game, the Spartans were hardly a favorite to reach the Frozen Four in St. Louis. Behind a stellar performance from regional MVP Jeff Lerg - who allowed just two goals in 120 minutes - Michigan State easily dispatched Boston University (5-1) before squaring off for a defensive battle with CCHA champion and national-No. 1 Notre Dame. The Spartans held on for a 2-1 victory over the Irish, and were off to St. Louis for the program's first Frozen Four since 2001.

A slow start against Maine - allowing a pair of goals before the game was four minutes old - could have spelled disaster, but a resilient MSU team cut the lead in half before the period was over and tacked on three more unanswered goals to post a 4-2 victory and send MSU to its first National Championship game since 1987. Facing off against the high-flying Eagles of Boston College, few gave MSU a chance in the contest - but a scoreless tie after one and a 1-0 deficit after two periods kept MSU right in the thick of things. The outstanding defensive effort paid dividends - Tim Kennedy got the equalizer just before the halfway point of the third period, then the winger set up linemate Justin Abdelkader for the game-winner with just 18.9 seconds remaining in regulation. It was truly a team effort by Michigan State, which had no All-League selections, no All-Americans, and no Hobey Baker finalists - just 26 determined, resilient hockey players who played for a common goal.

The Spartans had a formidable team with considerable experience coming back off of a National Championship, and the squad finished third in the CCHA regular season. The Spartans were sent to Colorado Springs to go up against the host Tigers on the big sheet of Olympic ice at the World Arena. MSU posted a 3-1 victory over their hosts, with Jeff Lerg making 41 saves as the Spartans exploded for three second-period goals for a victory over the WCHA regular-season champions.

MSU then had a meeting with CCHA foe Notre Dame, a rematch of the previous season's regional final in Grand Rapids. A pair of Irish goals scored just over a minute apart in the late stages of the third period - at 14:06 and 15:20 - broke open a 1-1 game and propelled Notre Dame to a 3-1 victory. After a dozen years missing from the NCAA Tournament, the Spartans won both the regular-season and tournament titles in the Big Ten -their first ever since the league began in 2012-13 - and earned the No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament. The Spartans drew a bracket with two other Michigan squads, and faced Western Michigan for the first time in the postseason affair. The Broncos took a 4-2 lead with three straight goals in the second period, but the resilient and tested Spartans got a goal from captain Nash Nienhuis midway through the third, an exciting finish from Karsen Dorwart on Artysom Levshunov's outstanding individual effort in the final minute to send the game to overtime, and the game-winner from Kalamazoo native Jeremy Davidson at 8:47 of OT to rally for the 5-4 win. In the regional final, the Spartans had to play archrival Michigan for the sixth time in the season, which included a dramatic OT victory for the Spartans in the Big Ten Championship game just a week prior. cinderella spartans claim national crown

MINNEAPOLIS — The 1966 National Collegiate Athletic Association hockey championship rested in the West, and Michigan State had its first crown because it wouldn't give up.

"We had our troubles early in the season . . . a lot of injuries and some ice problems that hampered our practice," head coach Amo Bessone said after Michigan State beat Clarkson, 6-1, in the title game at the University of Minnesota.

"But I figured we had the potential all along, once we got straightened out," Bessone added. "I know one thing: our kids worked very hard for this, and they were deserving of the championship."

At mid-season, Michigan State was bogged down with a 4-9 record, including a 6-3 loss to Clarkson.

Then MSU began to find the combination. The Spartans still finished sixth in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, but the team had jelled. The Spartans whipped Michigan and WCHA champion Michigan Tech in the Western hockey playoffs to gain a berth in the NCAA championships.

Once the title game was decided, Michigan State had won 12 of its final 16 games to wind up with a 16-13 season record.

The championship was no contest after Bob Brawley fired home a 35-foot slapshot to break a tie and give Michigan State a 2-1 lead in the second period.

The Spartans rammed in four more goals in the third period to turn it into a rout, and wound up peppering the Clarkson goal with 46 shots.

Mike Coppo got two Spartan goals and Bob Fallat, Doug Volmar and Bill Faunt had one each. Spartan goaltender Gaye Cooley earned tournament MVP honors.

Four Michigan State players were named to the all-tournament team, including Cooley. Coppo, Heaphy and McAndrew also earned first-team honors, while Brawley and Tom Mikkola were on the second team.

1986 national champions

spartans claim second national championship

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — When Michigan State left wing Mike Donnelly played against Harvard in NCAA Regional action in 1983, he had a broken wrist.

At the Providence Civic Center at the 1986 national championship, all he could break after the game was a big smile.

Led by a pair of goals by the senior left wing — the final one at 17:09 of the third period — MSU claimed the 1986 NCAA championship by downing the Crimson 6-5 before a crowd of 9,214.

It was MSU's second national title in the school's history, the other coming in 1966.

Donnelly's goals were his 58th and 59th of the season, padding his NCAA record for most goals in a season.

Also scoring for head coach Ron Mason's Spartans, who closed the year with a 34-9-2 record, including a 23-2-1 mark since December, were Mitch Messier, Jeff Parker, Brad Hamilton and Brian McReynolds. Bob Essensa finished with 15 saves in the Spartan nets.

"Tonight, we won the game in a way that was characteristic of our

whole season — we came from behind and never gave up," Mason said.

Donnelly, Parker, Norm Foster and Don McSween were named to the all-tournament team. Donnelly was named the Most Valuable Player.

"I'm proud of our team — very proud," Mason added. "This team has a lot of character, and they gave it quite a gutsy effort tonight. They've made a believer out of me."

"Last year, it was doomsday around Michigan State after the loss to Providence," said Mason, referring to the disappointing NCAA quarterfinal loss that knocked perhaps the best MSU team of all time out of the tournament. "It takes more than a great team to win an NCAA championship. It takes the right chemistry."



resilient spartans defy the odds

ST. LOUIS - Beating the odds again, Michigan State won its first NCAA hockey championship in 21 years.

Justin Abdelkader snapped a tie with 18.9 seconds to go, seconds after ringing a shot off the post in the Spartans' 3-1 victory over Boston College.

Jeff Lerg made 29 saves, and Chris Mueller added an empty-net goal with 1.2 seconds left to clinch it for the Spartans (26-13-3), a lightly regarded No. 3 seed in the Midwest Regional when the tournament began.

Tim Kennedy tied it midway through the third period, and set up the go-ahead goal from behind the net when he spun off his man and passed the puck in front. Abdelkader, the MVP of the tournament, beat Cory Schneider for his 15th goal and first in nine games.

Comley captured his first title at MSU and the second of his career - he also won it all with Northern Michigan in 1991. He and Boston College's Jerry York are among three coaches to win championships at two schools.

Boston College's success on the power play was a key to its drive to the final, with a 35.6 success rate and three goals in the semifinals against North Dakota. Michigan State held the Eagles to 1-for-4 with the man advantage and was 17-for-18 on the penalty kill in the tournament.

The 5-foot-6 Lerg made his biggest save of the game when he stopped Brian Boyle on a 2-on-1 short-handed break early in the third period, keeping it a one-goal game. He pumped his glove after the stop.

Trailing 1-0 after a second-period Boyle goal for BC, Kennedy tied it at 1 midway through the third period on a power play, breaking in alone after a faceoff just outside the zone and beating Schneider to the stick side. Kennedy has 18 goals, five in the last seven games.

Michigan State was the second No. 3 seed to make it to the championship game since the bracket was expanded to 16 teams in 2003. Boston College made it in 2006 as a No. 3 seed.

the hobey baker memorial award




Since 1981, Hobey Baker Memorial Award has been presented annually to the outstanding college hockey player in the United States by the Decathlon Athletic Club of Bloomington, Minn. Michigan State boasts 17 Hobey Baker Finalists, while two Spartans have won this prestigious honor - Kip Miller (1990) and Ryan Miller (2001). Taro Hirose was the most recent finalist in 2019.

The award is named after college hockey great Hobey Baker of Princeton, a member of both the United States Hockey Hall of Fame in Eveleth, Minn., and the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto. Also a standout in football, he is enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, and the College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta.


Hobart Amory Hare Baker was born in Philadelphia in 1892 and began his hockey career at age 14 at St. Paul's Prep School in Concord, N.H. Hobey took his athletic prowess to Princeton, where his brilliant skating and stickhandling abilities allowed him to dominate the college game and lead Princeton to the Intercollegiate League Championship in each of his three years of varsity hockey (1911-14). He added to his physical prowess the exemplary qualities of being a completely unselfish sportsman and an opponent of publicity. Facts about Baker's career often sound more like myths, such as the story of his playing every second of a 73-minute game against Harvard, or the claim that he was penalized just twice during his career, and both times the mere suggestion that he had violated a rule of the game nearly drove him to tears.

Baker worked in the business world following his graduation from Princeton but, believing U.S. involvement in the first World War was near, took up flying and was commissioned as a lieutenant in the Army in 1917. He was with the first group of American pilots sent to France and was honored with the Croix de Guerre after bringing down three enemy planes during the Great War. Following the armistice, Hobey decided he would take one last flight in his fighter before heading back to the States. It would be his last flight – Hobart Amory Hare Baker died after his plane crashed just a quarter mile after taking off. He was 26.




spartan hobey winners

1990 recipient • kip miller

Kip Miller won the 1990 Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner after leading the nation in scoring for the second consecutive season (48-53-101). He was the CCHA Player of the Year after leading the conference in scoring (36-38-74) and also was the Hockey News/Bauer College Hockey Player of the Year.

A two-time Hobey finalist and First Team All-America selection, Miller finished his career with 116 goals and 145 assists. In addition to leading the country in scoring as a senior in 1989-90, he shared the national scoring lead in 1988-89 with teammate (and fellow Hobey finalist) Bobby Reynolds.

Over the course of his four collegiate seasons, Miller helped the Spartans to three CCHA regular-season and tournament titles and four straight NCAA Tournament bids, including Frozen Four appearances in both 1987 and 1989.




2001 recipient • ryan miller

Goaltender Ryan Miller won the 2001 Hobey Baker Memorial Award 11 seasons after his cousin, Kip, accomplished the feat. The Millers joined Harvard's Fusco brothers - Scott (1983) and Mark (1986) - as the only relatives to win the Hobey.

Miller put together arguably the most impressive single-season effort in college hockey history during his final season at MSU. The East Lansing native boasted a 1.32 GAA, .950 save percentage, 10 shutouts, and a 31-5-4 record. He led the nation in five statistical categories, and the Hobey capped off a season in which Miller also earned First Team All-America honors, CCHA Player of the Year kudos, and was the CCHA Tournament MVP.

In his career, he helped MSU to two Frozen Four appearances (1999, 2001), three NCAA Tournament bids, a pair of CCHA regular-season titles, and two CCHA Tournament titles. Miller left MSU as the all-time NCAA career leader in goals against average (1.54), save percentage (.941) and shutouts (26).

spartan olympians



Nineteen Spartans representing five different countries have had the honor of wearing their country's colors in the Olympic Games, and eight have combined to win 10 medals in Olympic competition.

The 2018 Games in Pyeongchang featured two Spartans playing in their first Olympics as Jim Slater represented the U.S. while Brock Radunske played for South Korea.

The Winter Games of 2010 were groundbreaking for MSU, as the Spartans boasted double medal-winners for the first time since Weldon Olson and Gene Grazia were teammates in 1960. Duncan Keith won gold with Team Canada in a dramatic overtime victory over the US in the gold-medal game. Ryan Miller (top) backstopped the US in the tournament, and was the Olympic MVP for his performance in Vancouver.

Keith became the first Spartan to win two gold medals, claiming his second at the 2014 Olympic Games in Sochi, Russia.

A total of 130 current and former Spartans have been selected in the NHL's entry and supplemental drafts. Among those selections are Joe Murphy, picked No. 1 overall by the Detroit Red Wings in 1986, and a pair of No. 2 selections - Artyom Levshunov in 2024 (Chicago Blackhawks) and Craig Simpson in 1985 (Pittsburgh Penguins.)

Since 2000, 47 Spartans have been chosen in the NHL Entry Draft, including 15 in the first or second round. The Spartans had two players chosen in the 2024 draft in Las Vegas (Artyom Levshunov and Patrick Geary), and have eight drafted players on the 2024-25 roster.
