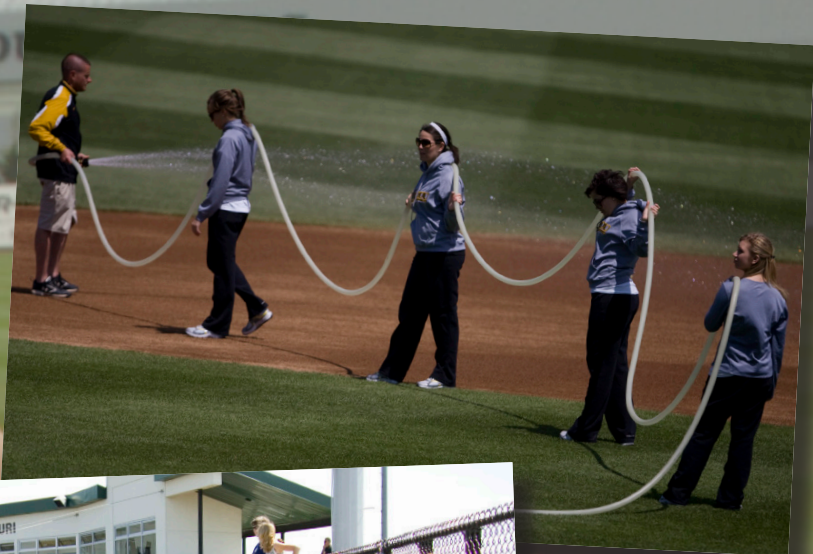

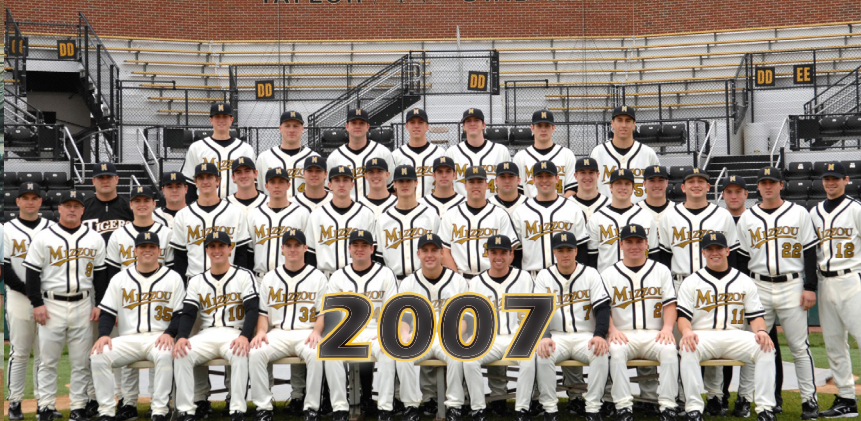
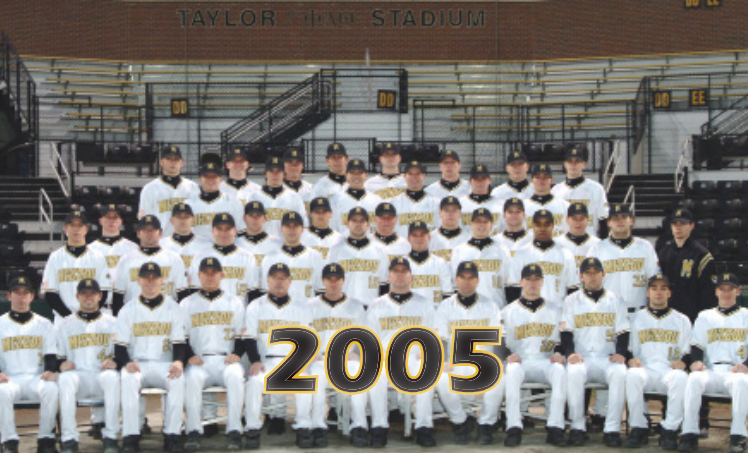

# POSTSEASON EXCELLENCE

Missouri was one of just 14 teams in the nation that advanced to the NCAA Tournament in each season between 2003-2009. In total, the Tigers have made 20 NCAA Regional appearances.





**Mizzou brought NCAA  
Tournament baseball to Columbia  
in 2007, as the Tigers hosted an  
NCAA Regional at Taylor Stadium  
for the first time in school history.**

2010 marks the 56th anniversary of Missouri's 1954 National Championship season.

That squad, under head coach John "Hi" Simmons was 22-4 on the year and claimed the Big Seven Conference Championship with a 11-1 conference record.

The Tigers were 5-1 at the College World Series. They had to come back through the losers' bracket and defeat Rollins in the championship game to claim the championship.





**In 1994, the 1954 team was inducted into the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame.**

**In February of 2004, the 1954 team earned another honor as it was inducted into the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame, located in Springfield, Mo.**



**In 2006, the Omaha World-Herald released a list of the top 25 College World Series programs of all-time. Missouri was No. 16 on the list. The World-Herald had this to say about Missouri:**

*"Under Simmons, Mizzou was a force in the early years of the CWS. The Tigers' .621 winning percentage still ranks fifth all-time. Missouri fell one win short of titles in 1952, 1958 and 1964, and also finished third in 1963."*

# TAYLOR STADIUM



**The University of Missouri Baseball team broke in the millennium with a new \$2.1 million home. The stadium was the final major project on the west grounds of the Sports Park at Mizzou.**

**The facility, officially named Ralph and Debbie Taylor/ Phi Delta Theta Stadium at Simmons Field (or Taylor Stadium at Simmons Field), was constructed to accomplish a variety of goals set by the baseball coaching staff and MU's Department of Athletics. The ultimate goal in the construction of the stadium was to create a fan-friendly facility and to encourage a family ballpark atmosphere.**

**The stadium boosted seating capacity and allowed fans to enjoy many features, including a better view of the playing field, an expanded concession area and improved restroom facilities. The stadium even cut down the amount of wind that reaches patrons and provided them with some of the most-relaxing and satisfying experiences in all of Big 12 Conference baseball.**

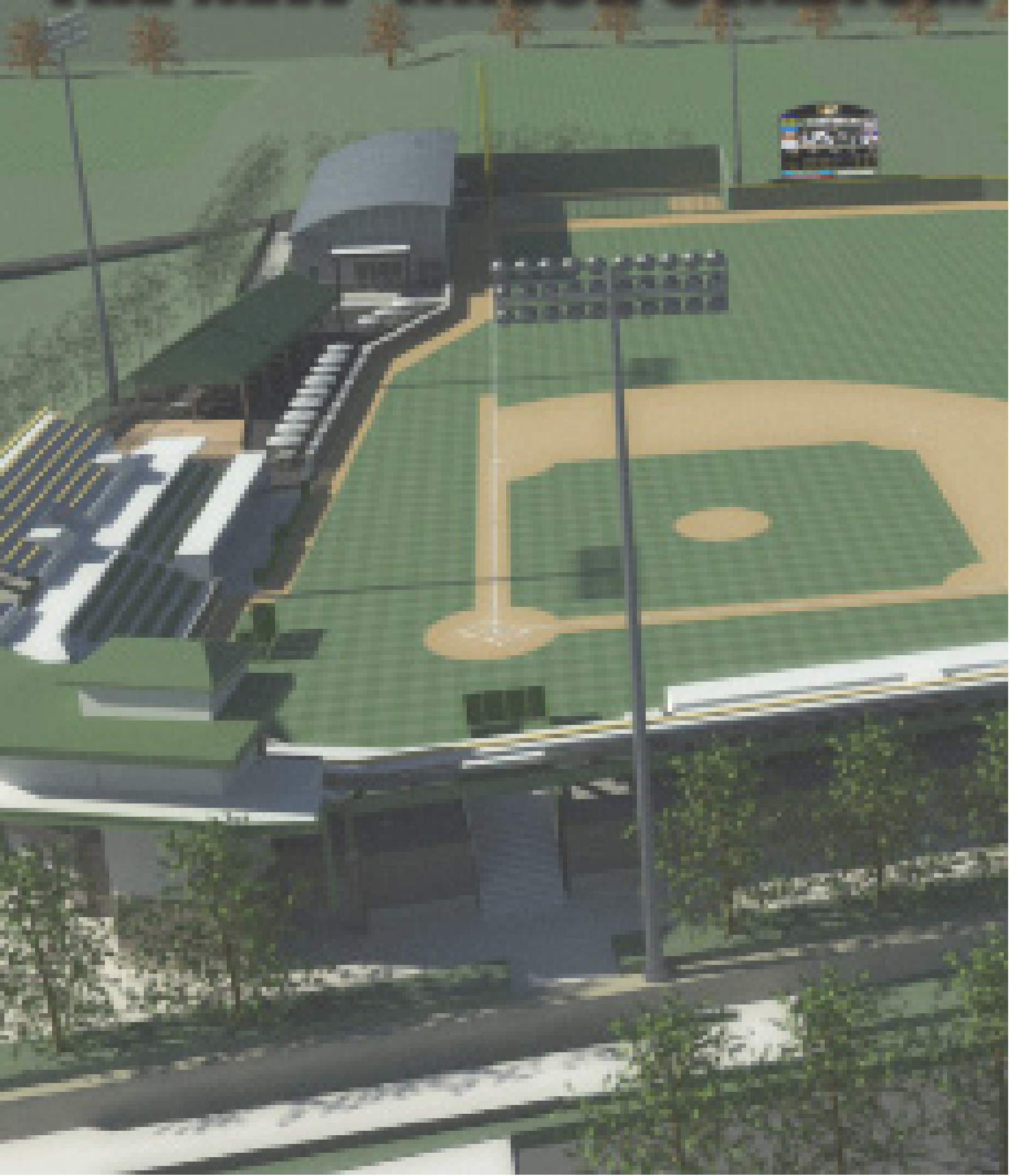
**Another goal was to create an aesthetically pleasing facility. The stadium is composed of red bricks, green metal roofs and black steel, along with block and drivit – the look of traditional American baseball stadium. The look also accompanies the look of other recently built MU athletic facilities.**

**Finally, Taylor Stadium was designed to be able to host an NCAA Regional, which the Tigers did in 2007 in the first NCAA postseason action at MU since 1965.**

**Taylor Stadium at Simmons Field, contracted by Crawford Construction Inc. and designed by Peckham & Wright Architects Inc., became a reality after Ralph and Debbie Taylor of Prairie Village, Kan., presented a gift of \$1 million to the University in 1998 to spark funding for the project, which broke ground in June, 1999. Ralph Taylor, an MU alumnus, has a long-standing relationship with the University and its athletic department.**



# ***THE NEW TAYLOR STADIUM***





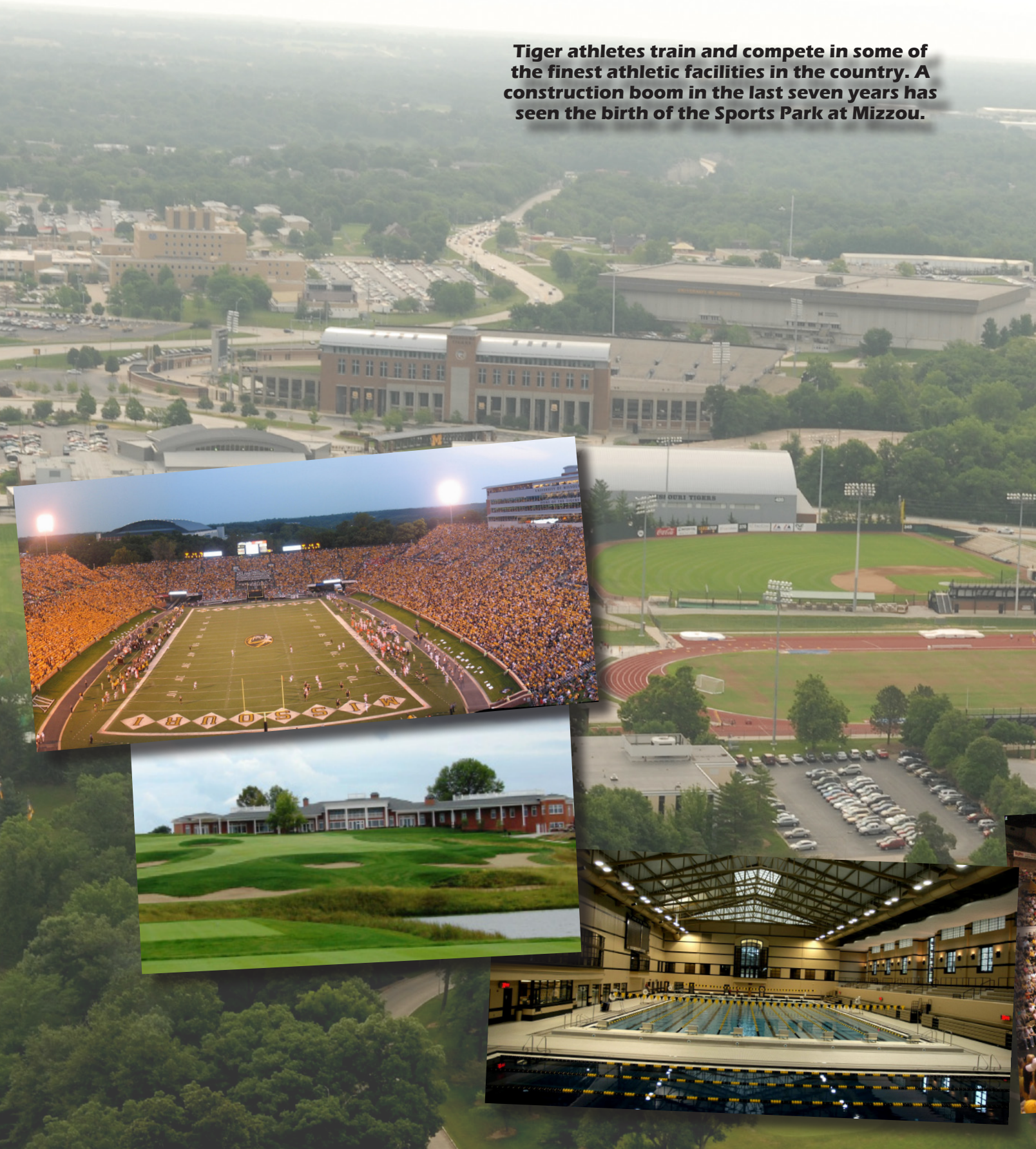
**Taylor Stadium took on a new look in 2010. The left field line received the majority of the work in phase one of the stadium's makeover as The McArtor Baseball Facility (pictured below) opened. The addition includes indoor/outdoor batting cages and pitching lanes.**

**In addition, a new brick wall was installed that spans foul territory. Also, a new scoreboard/video board has been added that will enhance the gameday experience. Future plans include a new clubhouse for the Tigers and new offices for the coaches. Those features will be added down the left field line. Plans are also in the place to extend seating down the right field line in the future.**

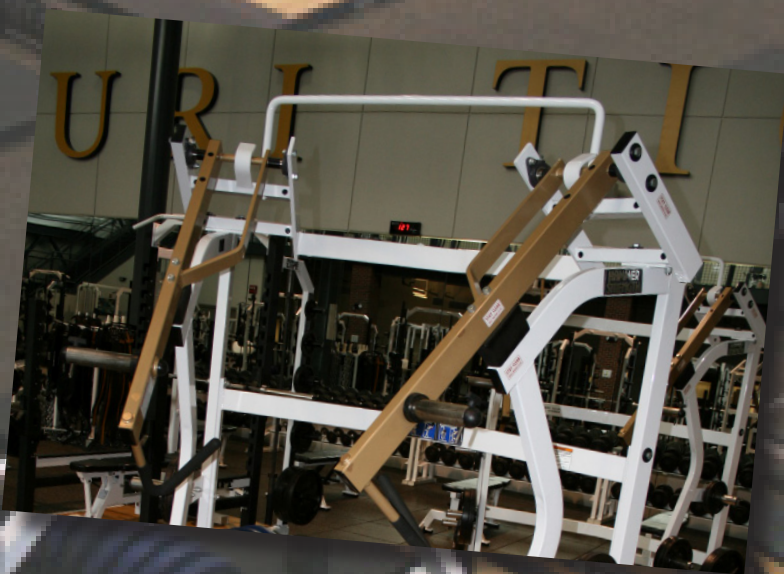

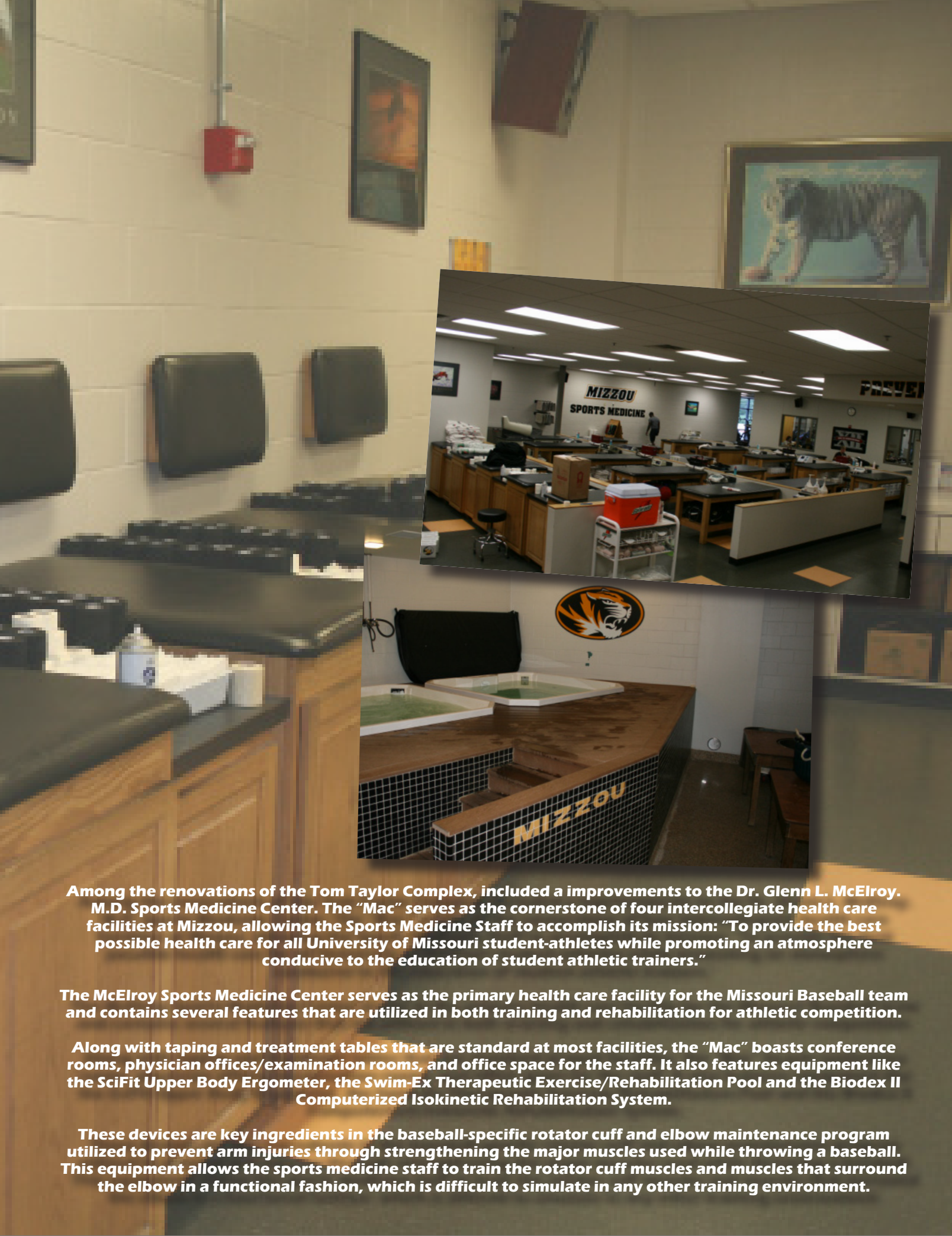

# SPORTS MEDICINE





**Among the renovations of the Tom Taylor Complex, included a improvements to the Dr. Glenn L. McElroy. M.D. Sports Medicine Center. The “Mac” serves as the cornerstone of four intercollegiate health care facilities at Mizzou, allowing the Sports Medicine Staff to accomplish its mission: “To provide the best possible health care for all University of Missouri student-athletes while promoting an atmosphere conducive to the education of student athletic trainers.”**

**The McElroy Sports Medicine Center serves as the primary health care facility for the Missouri Baseball team and contains several features that are utilized in both training and rehabilitation for athletic competition.**

**Along with taping and treatment tables that are standard at most facilities, the “Mac” boasts conference rooms, physician offices/examination rooms, and office space for the staff. It also features equipment like the SciFit Upper Body Ergometer, the Swim-Ex Therapeutic Exercise/Rehabilitation Pool and the Biodex II Computerized Isokinetic Rehabilitation System.**

**These devices are key ingredients in the baseball-specific rotator cuff and elbow maintenance program utilized to prevent arm injuries through strengthening the major muscles used while throwing a baseball. This equipment allows the sports medicine staff to train the rotator cuff muscles and muscles that surround the elbow in a functional fashion, which is difficult to simulate in any other training environment.**

# DAN DEVINE PAVILION



**The Daniel J. Devine Pavilion, located immediately south of the Mizzou Athletics Training Complex and behind the right field wall of Taylor Stadium/Simmons Field, provides Tiger Athletics with an indoor practice facility, featuring a 90-yard field, two permanent batting cages and two removable batting cages. The size and versatility of the facility allows more than one team to use it at a time as the football team can run drills at one end while the baseball team can hit in the batting cage at the other.**

**In 2007, FieldTurf was installed replacing the Astroturf that was in place.**

**The Devine Pavilion was completed in May, 1998. In addition to being the home of the Tigers' winter workouts for all sports, camps have been held in the building.**

**The Devine Pavilion includes an observation viewing area as well as men's and women's restrooms. It also provides the Tiger Equipment and Maintenance staff with storage space.**

**The Tiger Baseball team uses the facility when faced with inclement weather. Various drills and even practice games can be played in the Devine Pavilion. Missouri also uses it for various strength and conditioning workouts.**

**The University of Missouri Department of Athletics is committed to success of the student-athletes both on the field as well as off it. # UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI

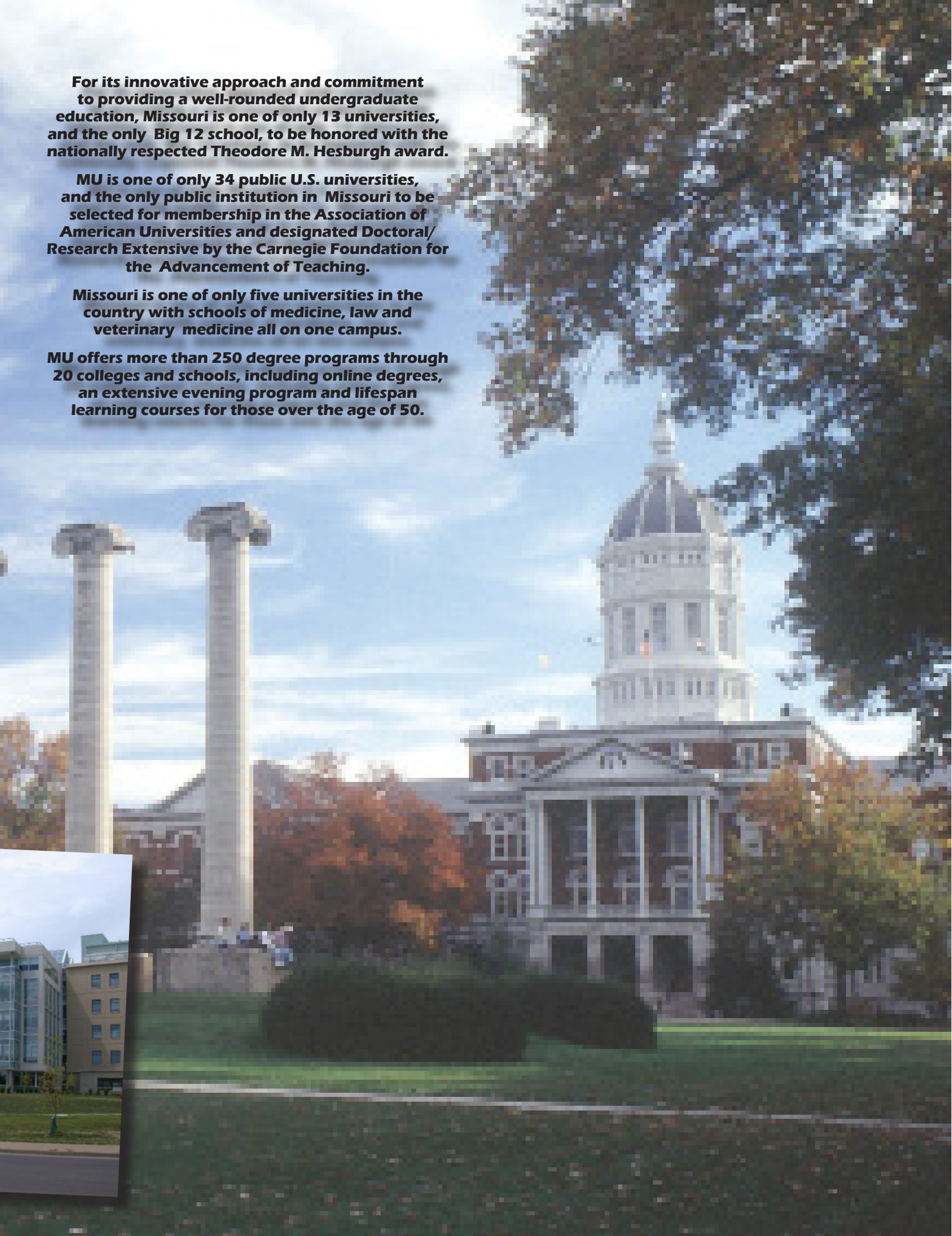

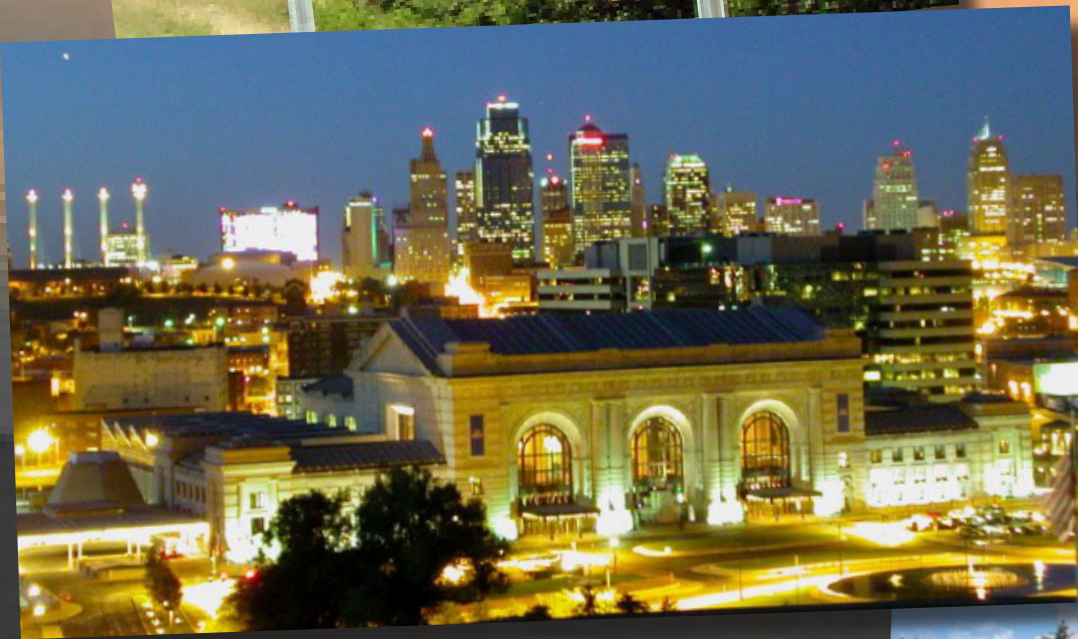
**In warm months, outdoor dining and entertainment is available at many locations. Columbia's nightlife offers all kinds of entertainment as well. .**

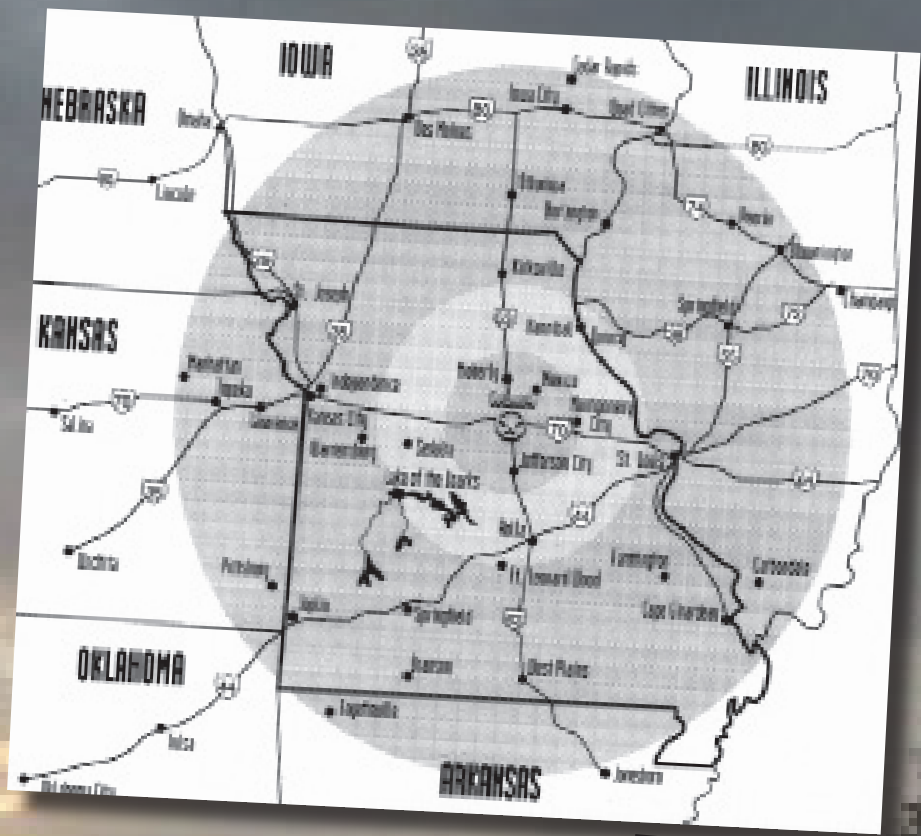




# MID-MISSOURI
