Our Moment. That is motto for the 2016 Mizzou Baseball program and it has a simple meaning: it is Mizzou's moment to prove to the rest of the nation that they are for real. One year removed from being one of the biggest turn-around stories in baseball, the question that begs to be asked is 'Why not Mizzou?' 2015's success was based largely on an influx of talented newcomers who bolstered a pitching staff and added depth to a veteran lineup. Five position starters return as do Mizzou's Friday and Saturday starting pitchers as **Tim Jamieson's** team looks to build upon a 2015 season that saw them rank as high as No. 14 nationally while finishing third in a loaded SEC East, behind only Florida and Vanderbilt. With another talented crop of newcomers and a core of returning veterans it appears the Tigers are ready to make 2016 their moment.

THE PITCHERS

Mizzou's incredible turn-around in 2015 was largely based on a pitching staff that was both deep and talented. The bulk of that staff returns for Jamieson, who will again serve as the team's pitching coach in 2016. As a team, Mizzou posted a 3.68 staff ERA in 2015, the best by a Tiger team since 2006 with Jamieson in command of the staff. Mizzou walked just 148 batters in 58 games last season, the fewest walks ever allowed by a Mizzou team with more than 500 innings pitched and the best mark in the SEC. Mizzou also allowed an SEC-low 68 doubles.

With how good the pitching was a season ago, Mizzou has reason to be excited as its Friday and Saturday starters return for 2016, highlighted by phenom **Tanner Houck**, who was a consensus Freshman All-American in 2015 and a Golden Spikes Watch List honoree. Mizzou has certainly had buzz around some of its pitchers over the years – Max Scherzer, Aaron Crow, Kyle Gibson come to mind – but none of those All-American pitchers had the type of year that Houck had in 2015. At the end of the regular season, his 100.2 innings pitched were the most of any freshman in the nation and he posted an 8-5 record with a 3.49 ERA. His eight wins were the most by any Tiger since Phil McCormick had eight in 2011 and the eight wins are also the most by a Mizzou freshman since 2007 when Gibson tallied eight as well. What is even more impressive is how Houck raised his game against top competition, tallying three wins over top-10 teams with the highlight being a start against No. 4 Florida that earned him SEC Pitcher of the Week honors. Florida head coach Kevin O'Sullivan was quoted after the game saying that Houck had 'the best stuff they'd seen all year.'

After serving as the team's Saturday starter in 2015, Houck seems to be slotted for the Friday spot in 2016. He proved he is up to the task over the summer while pitching with USA Baseball's Collegiate National Team. He led Team USA starters with a 2.16 ERA and tossed a team-high 16.2 innings. He also led the team in strikeouts (14) and walks allowed (one) and threw four perfect innings in a combined no-hitter against Cuba on July 1. His performance with Team USA over the summer put him on even more draft radars for 2017 as PerfectGame has Houck slotted as the top prospect in the 2017 draft while Baseball America tabbed Houck as the top prospect from USA Baseball for the 2017 draft.

With Houck at the top of the rotation, the biggest piece of the puzzle is in place for Jamieson and his staff. What makes his life easier are the pieces he has to go around Houck. One of the biggest pieces for Jamieson is senior righty **Reggie McClain**, who was Mizzou's Friday night starter throughout 2015. He is a two-time SEC Pitcher of the Week and was downright dominant at times in 2015, opening the season with a 22.1-inning shutout streak, the longest by a Tiger since Crow in 2007. He dominated in SEC starts at Georgia, at home vs. South Carolina and Ole Miss and in the SEC Tournament vs. South Carolina again. Like Houck, McClain was an innings-eater in 2015

amassing 101.0 innings. He and Houck are the first Tiger duo since 2007 to each toss more than 100 innings in a single season. McClain and Houck combine to give Mizzou one of the top 1-2 punches in the SEC heading into 2016.

With the Friday and Saturday spots on lock, there should be plenty of competition for the Sunday spot, but the front-runner appears to be senior lefty **Austin Tribby**, who has been a work-horse for the Tigers over the last three seasons. He has appeared in 31 games in each of the last two seasons out of the bullpen and honed his craft over the summer in the Cape, pitching for Falmouth. Tribby started seven games in the Cape and compiled a 3.46 ERA in 39.0 innings. That came after making 31 appearances out of the bullpen in 2015 for Jamieson's Tigers. Going into his senior season, Tribby has plenty of motivation to grab a hold of that job.

Sophomore **Lake Dabney**, who was impressive in his freshman season a year ago (1.17 ERA in 23.0 innings) will also figure into the mix as a starter in 2016. Redshirt sophomore **Cole Bartlett** and RS junior **Griffin Goodrich** are back for 2016 and fully healthy after spending last season recovering from arm injuries. Both figure to battle for the Sunday job as well.

The bullpen has the biggest question marks for the Mizzou staff heading into 2016. Gone are All-SEC closer **Breckin Williams**, who reset the school's single season saves record in 2015 before being drafted in the fourth round by the Diamondbacks, and senior righty Andrew Schwaab, who is now in the Yankees organization. With Tribby also likely headed for a starting role in 2016, Mizzou's top three relievers from a year ago will not be in the bullpen in 2016. An influx of newcomers and some familiar names will likely round out the Tiger bullpen.

The wild card for the Mizzou pitching staff this season will be righty **Bryce Montes De Oca**. Whether he finds his way into a starting role, or in the back end of the bullpen, there is arguably not a more imposing pitcher in college baseball than the Lawrence native. Standing at 6-7, 271 pounds with an electric fastball that reaches triple digits, he is the type of arm that could have a huge impact on the entire staff. Whether in the bullpen or in the rotation, he has game-changing stuff and Mizzou is looking for him to take the next step as a sophomore. Like Tribby, he pitched in the Cape over the summer and was ninth in the league in ERA (2.00) in 36 innings. He struck out 30 but also walked 28, but allowed just eight earned runs all season.

Mizzou has a talented crop of newcomers and returners like **Nolan Gromacki** and **Ryan Lee** who will add great bullpen depth in 2016.

THE INFIELD

Similar to the pitching staff with Houck, the Mizzou infield has a bona-fide superstar in the making to build around in 2016 with SS **Ryan Howard** returning for his junior season. A draft eligible sophomore a year ago, Howard was selected by the San Francisco Giants but chose to come back to school and he is arguably the top returning SS in the SEC, which lost a great crop to the draft a season ago, including three first-round picks.

Howard, like Houck, spent his summer with USA Baseball's Collegiate National Team where he earned a spot as the team's starting shortstop. He hit .310 and ranked second on the team in extra-base hits and doubles. He hit a homer on July 4

as well. Howard led Mizzou with a .308 average in 2015 and led the team in hits as well. Howard was a gamer who came through in the clutch all season, driving in 16 runs with two outs while hitting a team-best .303 when facing the end of an inning. He also tallied 18 extra-base hits, which were second-most on the team.

Howard also brings tremendous defense to the shortstop position and his leadership qualities have been revered by the Mizzou coaches. He will undoubtedly be looked at to have an All-America caliber season in 2016 and he certainly appears to be up to the task after a very successful summer and fall.

Also back for 2016 is senior **Zach Lavy**, who played a tremendous first base for the Tigers last season while providing thump in the middle of Mizzou's order in 2015. He tallied 27 runs and drove in 30 more while compiling 16 extra-base hits (nine doubles, three triples and four homers). He also finished second on the team with 11 stolen bases as he is a surprisingly good athlete with a good feel for the game. He was also one of the Tigers' top fielders a year ago making tremendous picks at first base while posting a .981 fielding percentage. He also hit .351 with runners in scoring position a season ago, the second-best clip on the season. He should figure into the mix again at first base or see time at the hot corner where Mizzou is tasked with replacing two-year starter Josh Lester, who was drafted in the 13th round by the Detroit Tigers last season.

Mizzou will also need to replace Brett Peel at second base. Peel was a spark at the top of the order last season and Jamieson will look to whoever occupies that spot to build great chemistry with Howard as a double-play duo while playing solid defense and serving as a spark at the top of the order. Junior college transfer **Kaelan Crisosto** and freshman **Ian Nelson** will be in the mix at that spot while All-SEC Freshman performer **Trey Harris** took reps there throughout the fall as well.

As mentioned earlier, Lester departed for professional baseball leaving a void at the hot corner. Lavy could be slotted for that spot and **Shane Benes**, the son of former No. 1 overall draft pick Andy Benes, will also figure into the mix at one of the corner infield spots. He has a huge bat and posted seven extra-base hits including two homers over his first 20 games of college baseball. He missed the first part of last season with an injured knee. Freshman **Brian Sharp** could also be a candidate for the third-base job.

THE OUTFIELD

Mizzou's outfield is crowded with talented athletes heading into the 2016 season and few players are more primed for a breakout season than center fielder **Jake Ring**. After tallying just three extra-base hits as an every day starter in 2014, Ring exploded for a team-best 22 extra-base hits (15 doubles, three triples, four homers) while hitting .282, scoring 39 runs and driving in 30. A tremendous athlete with plus speed and surprising strength, Ring will arguably be the most dynamic hitter in Mizzou's lineup in 2016. He turns singles into doubles and doubles into triples and wreaks havoc on the base paths.

Along with being a dynamic offensive players, Ring may be one of the best defensive outfielders in the nation retuning for 2016. It is nearly impossible to get a ball over his head and the junior will be looked at as the leader of what should be a very good Mizzou outfield.

Returning alongside Ring to one of the corner spots is **Trey Harris**, who won the starting RF job a season ago. He was an All-SEC Freshman Team honoree and was an All-SEC Tournament selection and put together a very impressive season in 2015. He drove in 22 runs and 11 of those came with two outs and 10 of his 16 RBI in SEC play either tied the game or gave Mizzou the lead. He led the team in batting, hits, RBI and runs in the SEC Tournament and his bat speed alone has him primed for a breakout sophomore season. He hit .263 with 12 extra-base hits and 27 runs with 22 RBI last season.

The final outfield spot will be one of the most competitive battles during winter camp as several Tigers will be in the mix for that job. The majority of that competition will be between newcomers as junior college product **Johnny Balsamo** and freshmen **Marquise Doherty** and **Connor Brumfield** will be among the top candidates to fill that spot. Balsamo was impressive in the fall and was a spark for Dodge City Community College a season ago, hitting .394 with four homers, 36 RBIs, 66 runs and 32 stolen bases. He is exactly the type of spark that Mizzou could use at the top of its order.

Doherty, a 15th-round draft selection by the Royals last summer, brings a similar skill set to Balsamo. He was the top-rated prospect in the state of Missouri coming out of high school according to PerfectGame. He was also the No. 112 prospect in the nation according to PerfectGame. He spent the fall playing football for Mizzou, taking a redshirt season, so he will have to earn a spot during winter camp, but he has a tremendously high ceiling and could be an impact player for Jamieson.

Brumfield was a walking record book during his time at Rock Bridge High School in Columbia and brings a great pedigree to Mizzou. He should challenge for a starting position as well. Look for freshman **Kirby McGuire** and junior **Matt Feldt** to also see time in the outfield.

CATCHER

Mizzou returns its top three catchers from a season ago, including All-SEC Freshman Team honoree **Brett Bond**, who finished second on the team in batting a season ago. He also tallied five homers and scored 25 runs while driving in 25 more. He provided a great stick all season and earned SEC Freshman of the Week honors following Mizzou's series win over Ole Miss. He played in 51 of 58 games a season ago, missing several games with a sprained ankle at Tennessee. He will need to do a better job of controlling the running game, but his bat alone should earn him plenty of playing time this season.

Serving as Bond's backup last season, junior **Jack Klages** figures to be in the mix again this year. He hit .231 with six doubles and a homer in 65 at-bats. Seven of his 15 hits on the year went for extra bases and he plays tremendous defense behind the dish.

Sophomore **Alex Del Rio**, who had a big go-ahead hit in Mizzou's series-clinching win over Florida in the Sunday game of that series in 2015, will also be in the mix at the catching position.

TIM JAMIESON

22nd Season at Mizzou - Head Coach/Pitching Coach

New Orleans, 1984

Career Record: 672-535-2

No head coach has been at Mizzou longer than Mizzou baseball's Tim Jamieson, who will enter his 22nd season at the helm of the program in 2016. Jamieson was tasked with transitioning a team that had rose to be one of the most consistent programs in the Big 12 to a program that can compete in the premier baseball conference in America - the SEC. In 2015, Jamieson led one of the nation's top turn-around stories as Mizzou finished third in a loaded SEC East while ranking as high as No. 14 nationally. He garnered plenty of SEC Coach of the Year consideration and Mizzou Director of Athletics Mack Rhoades rewarded Jamieson with a three-year contract as the Mizzou skipper once again has his Tigers poised for another successful run through the nation's best baseball conference.

In his 21 seasons at the helm of the program, Jamieson has compiled a 672-535-2 overall record as he is the second-winningest coach in program history, trailing only Gene McArtor's 733 career wins.

2015 may have been one of the top coaching jobs in Jamieson's career, and that came as he took over as pitching coach while also serving as the head coach. Picked to finish dead last in the SEC in the preseason by virtually every preseason publication, Jamieson's team used great pitching and defense to win six of 10 SEC series, including series wins over two top-10 programs, en-route to a third-place finish in the SEC East. A talented freshman class with key upperclassmen were paramount to the success. He coached RHP Tanner Houck to Unanimous Freshman All-America honors and closer Breckin Williams was a second-team All-SEC honoree under Jamieson's tutelage. Three of his pitchers from 2015 were drafted over the summer as well.

Winning with class and high-character have been trademarks of Jamieson's tenure at Mizzou and he has done a phenomenal job of upholding the school's and the athletic department's core values during his 21 years. And he has done it while producing some of the top talent that has ever come through Mizzou - in any sport. Coaching the likes of 2013 American League Cy Young winner Max Scherzer and four-time MLB All-Star Ian Kinsler, it can be argued that Jamieson has seen more of his athletes excel at the next level than any other coach in history at Mizzou, in any sport.

That is why Jamieson is the perfect coach to lead Mizzou into its fourth year in the Southeastern Conference. His body of work speaks for itself as does his ability to groom players for the next level. He took Max Scherzer, an unpolished power arm out of St. Louis, from a high school player that was drafted in the 43rd round to a first-round draft pick. Aaron Crow, now an All-Star pitcher for the Miami Marlins went undrafted out of high school and was twice a first-round pick by the time he was done at Mizzou. Most recently, Rob Zastryzny - undrafted out of high school - was selected with the second pick of the second round by the Chicago Cubs. At the helm of one of the last decade's most consistent programs, paired with the resources that are available in the SEC, look for Jamieson to get Mizzou rolling while playing aside the best competition in the country week-in and week-out.

2012 was a memorable season for the Tiger skipper as he won his 600th career game - a 5-0 decision over Texas in the first round of the Big 12 Tournament - all while winning his first ever Big 12 Championship and guiding Mizzou to its eighth NCAA Tournament in 10 seasons.

A native of Columbia, Jamieson grew up attending several Tigers' games. After his playing days at the University of New Orleans, he spent six seasons on the UNO coaching staff before returning to Columbia in 1988 where he was an assistant coach under McArtor for six seasons before becoming head coach following the 1994 season. Since taking over at MU, the Tigers were a force to reckon with in the Big 12 Conference as well as nationally; recording at least 30 wins in 15 of the last 20 seasons. Mizzou won at least 35 games in seven-consecutive years between 2003-2009, advancing to the NCAA Tournament in each of those seven years. MU was one of just 14 teams in the nation that advance to the NCAA Tournament in each of those years. The Tigers have played in eight NCAA Regionals under Jamieson.

In 2011, Jamieson's team finished just one strike from claiming its first ever Big 12 Tournament title as it became the first-ever No. 8 seed to advance to the Big 12 Championship Game. His team finished the second half as hot as any team in the nation, winning its four final Big 12 series - including series against NCAA Regional participants Baylor, Texas A&M and Kansas State. Mizzou also defeated top-five foe Texas twice in

the Big 12 Tournament and boasted four wins over teams that advanced to the College World Series that year. Not only did he see success at the collegiate level in 2011, but he also coached the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team over the summer. He led the team to an 11-2-1 record over the summer, the eighth-best winning percentage in the 29-year history of the team.

In 2010, Aaron Senne became the eighth Tiger to earn All-America accolades during Jamieson's tenure at MU. Senne hit .400 that year, becoming the first player to hit at least .400 at Mizzou since 1986. Senne was also named the Big 12 Co-Player of the Year.

Mizzou made its seventh-straight trip to the postseason in 2009 after finishing third in the Big 12 Conference and advancing to the championship game of the Big 12 Tournament. The Tigers finished 2009 with a 35-27 record and were 16-11 in the conference. Kyle Gibson was an All-America selection in 2009.

In 2008, Jamieson and the Tigers were 39-21 and finished fourth in the Big 12 Conference. Mizzou once again made a trip into the postseason, as it was selected for the Miami Regional. Aaron Crow earned All-America honors and he was the second Tiger to be named Big 12 Pitcher of the Year. Crow also took home the Clemens Award, honoring the nation's top collegiate pitcher. Mizzou opened the 2008 season ranked No. 5 and ascended to No. 2 during the year, marking its best ever ranking. The success of 2008 followed a 2007 season which saw Missouri host an NCAA Regional for the first time in school history, finishing with a 42-18 record. That was just one of the many milestones that came out of 2007. The 42 wins was a career-best for Jamieson and it marked the fifth-winningest season in MU history. The Tigers' 19 conference victories in 2008 set a new school record. Missouri finished second in the Big 12 Conference, its best ever showing in the Big 12 and best league finish since winning the Big Eight Conference crown in 1996, which was Jamieson's second year at the helm.

Jamieson was named the Big 12 Co-Coach of the Year following the 2007 season, his second Conference Coach of the Year award, as he also claimed the Big Eight Coach of the Year honor in 1996.

In 2006, Missouri claimed the school's first-ever NCAA Regional Championship, as MU rallied to win four-straight games in Malibu to advance to the Super Regional round of 16. The Tigers finished the season ranked No. 16.

In addition to the eight All-Americans under Jamieson, 10 players have earned Freshman All-American accolades. Jamieson has seen 75 of his players selected in the Major League Baseball Draft, including Missouri's first three first round picks. Max Scherzer was selected by Arizona with the 11th overall pick in 2006 and Aaron Crow was drafted ninth by the Washington Nationals in the 2008 MLB Draft. Jamieson's teams have also succeeded in the classroom, as eight Academic All-Americans have played under Jamieson and 90 Tigers have earned Academic All-Conference recognition since 1995.

In just his second season at the helm, Jamieson led the Tigers to 1996 Big Eight Conference crown, as Missouri went 39-19 and 20-8 in the Big Eight after being projected to finish seventh in the conference by most publications, earning Jamieson Big Eight Coach of the Year.

That season the Tigers climbed as high as 17th in the national polls, marking the first time they had been ranked since 1991 and advanced to the NCAA Midwest Regional. In winning the regular season race, Mizzou became the first school other than Oklahoma State and Oklahoma to claim the conference title in 16 years. Jamieson would lead the Tigers to 30-win seasons in each of the next five seasons as they would make a pair of trips to the Big 12 Tournament semifinals during that stretch. In 2003, the Tigers finished in fourth place in the Big 12 Conference and received a bid to the NCAA Regionals. The 2003 Tigers compiled a record of 36-22 on the year and at one point were ranked as high as No. 19 in the nation by Collegiate Baseball.

Another 30-win season and a second-straight trip to the NCAA Regionals highlighted the 2004 campaign, as the Tigers finished with 38 wins, the most since the 1996 season. Missouri claimed series victories over Texas, Nebraska and Oklahoma State in 2004 and reached the championships game of the Big 12 Tournament in Arlington, Texas.

Missouri surpassed that win total in 2005, by reaching the 40-win mark for the first time under Jamieson and for the first time since 1991. MU finished fourth in the Big 12 regular season for the second time in three years and advanced to the semifinals of the conference tournament before advancing to their third-consecutive NCAA Tournament.

Success was also part of Jamieson's time away from MU. He was a member of three NCAA Tournament clubs and was selected to the 1980 All-NCAA South Regional Team as a standout catcher at New Orleans from 1978-81. He was named the team's most valuable player after his senior season, as he hit .300 with eight home runs and 68 RBI, in leading the Privateers to the NCAA Midwest Regional. As an assistant coach at UNO, he was instrumental in guiding the Privateers to four NCAA Regional appearances (1984, 1985, 1987, 1988) and a spot in the 1984 College World Series in Omaha, Neb.

His Mizzou roots run throughout his family as his father, Dick Jamieson, was a former offensive coordinator under football coach Al Onofrio. The elder Jamieson also spent several years in the National Football League. His brother, Jeff, is a graduate of Missouri's School of Law and his sister, Judi, also attended MU. Not only has he seen success at the collegiate level, but he has also coached the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team twice, with his most recent stint coming in 2011. He led the team to a 11-2-1 record over the summer, the eighth-best winning percentage in the 29-year history of the team. Jamieson was also chosen to serve as an assistant coach for Team USA in 2005, helping the National team to a 16-4 record traveling to Japan and Taiwan, along with playing games in the states. He was accompanied by Missouri players Max Scherzer and Hunter Mense on Team USA, the first National team representatives for MU since 1991.

Jamieson received his bachelor's and master's degrees in business administration from New Orleans. A graduate of Rock Bridge High (Columbia), Jamieson is married to the former Cindy Thornton, a graduate of Mizzou and Rock Bridge High School in Columbia. They are the parents of two sons, Mickey (18) and Ty (17).

Mizzou head baseball coach Tim Jamieson has announced that Jerry Zulli, one of college baseball's rising coaching stars, will join Mizzou as the program's new assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. Zulli (pronounced ZOO-lee) will join Mizzou after an incredibly successful stint as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at South Alabama, where he was the key architect to three top-50 recruiting classes, one 40-win season and two Sun Belt Conference Championships.

"Jerry is a tireless worker and is someone that I think embodies what we take pride in here at Mizzou," Jamieson said of Zulli. "When I began to look to fill this position, I leaned on people in the business that I trust and Jerry's name kept coming up as someone who had a tremendous work ethic and had established so many relationships throughout the southeast. He has helped improve programs everywhere he's been and that is a true testament to his character. He brings great energy and enthusiasm every day. We place a great emphasis on player development here at Mizzou, and on top of being a great recruiter, he is a great coach and some I feel confident will be able to mentor our student-athletes."

"I'm extremely excited to join the Mizzou baseball program," Zulli said. "Having an opportunity to join Coach Jamieson's staff is the opportunity of a lifetime for me. I can't wait to do my part of helping our student athletes achieve success in the classroom and on the field. The University of Missouri and the entire Mizzou family is one of the most respected nationally and there is not a better time to be at Mizzou than right now. I also want to express my gratitude to South Alabama head coach Mark Calvi for giving me the chance to work at South Alabama and enhance my career."

Zulli brings to Mizzou the reputation of being a tireless recruiter. In three of his four seasons at South Alabama, he put together top-50 recruiting classes, including a 2013 recruiting class that ranked 29th overall by Collegiate Baseball Newspaper. That class was a key contributor to last season's South Alabama team that won 37 games and the Sun Belt Conference Championship, the program's second in three years. He has forged recruiting ties all across the SEC footprint after assistant coaching stints at South Alabama, Memphis and Middle Georgia College and routinely turned in top-rated recruiting classes despite battling SEC schools for the same prospects. His reputation as a diligent recruiter will undoubtedly help Mizzou continue to compete in the SEC as he will serve in the same role.

A hitting coach by nature, Zulli's track record for producing incredible offensive teams speaks for itself. In his first season at South Alabama, Zulli's offense led the Sun Belt Conference in batting, slugging, on-base percentage, runs scored, RBI, total bases and hits during league games. He coached the 2013 Sun Belt Player of the Year in utility man Jordan Patterson and saw five of his hitters earn all-conference that season, as well. In 2013, the Jaguars finished as Co-Champions of the Sun Belt Conference at 43-20 overall (20-10 in league play) while advancing to NCAA Regional play for the first time since 2006. During his four years at South Alabama, Zulli saw nine of his hitters earn All-Sun Belt Conference honors and he coached one conference player of the year, one All-American and one Freshman All-American.

Prior to his stint at South Alabama, Zulli spent seven seasons at Memphis in the same position, coaching the program's hitters while serving as the recruiting coordinator. At Memphis, Zulli helped the Tigers lead Conference USA in hitting and on-base percentage, while ranking in the league's top five in virtually every hitting category. He coached eight student-athletes to a combined 10 all-conference honors, including SS Chad Zurcher, who was the 2011 Conference USA Player of the Year and a Third Team All-American after leading the nation in average and on-base percentage. He helped lead the Tigers to 36 wins and an NCAA Regional appearance in 2007. In 2011, five Memphis student-athletes were taken in the MLB draft and in his seven seasons at Memphis, Zulli coached 12 student-athletes who were selected in the MLB Draft.

His time at both South Alabama and Memphis give him deep ties to the SEC's recruiting footprint as does his experience at Middle Georgia College from 2002-04, where we helped the Warriors to a 130-51 record in three seasons, including a 2004 JUCO World Series appearance.

Similar to head coach Tim Jamieson, Zulli is a graduate of the University of New Orleans ('02) where he lettered for two seasons. He earned his bachelor's degree in sport management from UNO in 2002. Before wrapping up his playing career at UNO, he lettered two years at Middle Georgia College, winning the Terry Daniels Award while leading the Warriors to a Region XVII Championship in 1999.

Zulli is married to the former Kristen Bell and the couple has a daughter, Zoe Madelyn.

Former Tiger All-American Hunter Mense was hired by head coach Tim Jamieson in the fall of 2014 and will enter his second season as the program's full time hitting coach. Mense, one of the brightest young minds in college baseball, had a very successful playing career both collegiately and at the next level.

In his first year as an assistant coach, his contributions to the team were almost immeasurable. Not only did he transform a Mizzou offense into one that thrived in high-pressure situations, he instilled a confidence in the team that carried over to the field every day. With Mense as the hitting coach in 2015, Mizzou's offense spiked, improving in nearly every category exponentially. Below is the percentage increase for Mizzou's offense in the first year under Mense:

- ▼ Triples: 100-percent
- ▼ Homers: 310-percent
- ▼ RBI: 38-percent
- ▼ Runs: 32-percent
- ▼ Batting: 16 points higher
- ▼ Total Bases/Game: 23-percent

Mense had served as an undergraduate and graduate assistant from 2011-14 while completing his undergraduate degree and working towards his Master's degree in Counseling Psychology with an emphasis in sport psychology at Mizzou. During those four years with Mizzou baseball, Mense established a great rapport with the Tiger hitters and also used his schooling in the field of sport psychology to work as a positive coach, assisting in the mental side of the Tigers' approach. With a pair of degrees and an All-America honor, Mense is a truly Mizzou Made addition to the Tiger coaching staff.

"We are really excited to add Hunter as a full time hitting coach. He is a dynamic, young coach who has done a terrific job for us in his time with the program," head coach Tim Jamieson said. "We have a long history together. In addition to playing for three Regional teams while at Mizzou, he played for me on Team USA with Max Scherzer. Hunter also went away to play pro ball and came back to finish his degree at Mizzou and I think that goes to show you how special of a place Mizzou is to him."

A decorated player, Mense was an All-American outfielder for Mizzou in 2006 and was a 2005 All-Big 12 honoree as well. He played for three NCAA Regional teams and the 2006 team that reached NCAA Super Regionals.

He played with the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team in 2005 and was a 17th-round draft selection by the Florida Marlins in 2006. He made it as high as AAA in 2010 and was a career .254 in 349 minor league games and tallied 19 homers and 124 RBIs. His best season came in 2008 with the Greensboro Grasshoppers when he hit .289 with 13 homers, 25 doubles, 31 walks and 56 RBI in 111 games. He was a short-season All-Star in 2006 as well.

Mense hung up his spikes after the 2010 season and rejoined the Tiger staff to pursue a career in coaching while finishing his undergraduate and Master's degrees at Mizzou.

"I'm extremely excited for this opportunity," Mense said. "To be able to work with hitters at the school that I attended is a dream come true. My goal is to help our guys become the best players and people that they can become in the three- to four-year period that I have them." A tireless worker with a unique approach to the game, Mense also served as the team's color analysis alongside broadcast partner Tex Little while serving as a mentor and mental strength coach to the Tiger team..

Mense hails from Liberty, Mo., where we was a two-time All-State outfielder for Liberty High School.

EVAN PRATTE

19th Season at Mizzou

Southwest Missouri State, 1991

Director of Operations

Evan Pratte enters his 19th season as part of the Mizzou staff. He enters his sixth year as the Tigers' Director of Baseball Operations after spending the previous 13 years as an assistant coach, working with the hitters and infielders.

Serving as the Director of Baseball Operations, Pratte is still heavily involved in the success of the program. He handles a variety of responsibilities that ensure that the student-athletes at Mizzou get one of the best experiences possible while playing collegiate baseball. From arranging travel to handling a wide variety of daily activities, Pratte's contributions help the entire team and coaching staff succeed. He also brings with him a wealth of baseball experience after spending years as a player and coach.

One of the best hitters while at Southwest Missouri State (now Missouri State), Pratte helped 34 Mizzou hitters to All-Conference recognition as the Tigers' hitting coach from 1998-2010, including Aaron Senne and Brett Nicholas in 2010.

Senne hit .400 in 2010, becoming the first Tiger to finish the year with a batting average of at least .400 since 1986. He ended his career at Mizzou as the school's all-time leader in career hits with 291 and earned All-America honors, along with being named the Big 12 Conference Co-Player of the Year.

Senne, Nicholas and Michael Liberto were all selected in last June's Major League Baseball Draft.

Several of Pratte's lineups at Missouri posted solid offensive numbers. In 1998, the Tigers hit a school-record 110 home runs - a figure that ranked sixth nationally- and also posted a school record .572 slugging percentage. The 2001 squad tied a Mizzou record with 83 stolen bases, matching the mark set in 1979. In 2006, Mizzou scored 10 or more runs in 13 games and in 2005, the Tigers ranked 12th in the nation in scoring, averaging 8.1 runs per game.

Missouri again had several offensive weapons in 2007. Evan Frey's .348 batting average was 10th best in the Big 12, while Jacob Priday closed the year by hitting .375 over the final 24 games and finished the year with 13 home runs and 59 RBI. Meanwhile, Coleman tallied nine homers and earned Big 12 Freshman of the Year and Freshman All-America honors.

Missouri ranked fifth in the Big 12 with a .301 batting average in 2008, the best team average since posting a .307 mark in 2003. Six Tigers hit over .300 for the year, led by Senne (.347), Lollis (.339) and Priday (.332). Priday finished his four-year career at Mizzou as one of the best hitters in MU history, leaving as the school's record holder for career home runs (55) and RBI (240).

Pratte joined the Missouri coaching staff in 1998 via his alma mater, where he served as a volunteer assistant coach for two seasons. Pratte graduated from SMS (now Missouri State) following a four-year career with the Bears, in which he led the team to three conference crowns as a standout infielder from 1988-91. He was a first-team all-conference pick in 1990 and 1991 and added all-region honors in 1991.

Still a record holder in many categories in SMS history, he finished his career with 18 home runs, 152 runs batted in and a .335 batting average in 220 games. He held the records in games played, at-bats, hits, singles, total bases, sacrifice hits, assists and double plays when his college career ended.

He also ranks among the Bears' all-time leaders in nearly a dozen other categories. Between his collegiate playing days and his coaching career, Pratte played five seasons in the Detroit Tigers' organization, including stops in Niagara Falls, Fayetteville, London, Lakeland and Trenton. He led in several offensive categories during his time in Niagara Falls and Fayetteville.

Pratte's first coaching position came as the head coach of the National Baseball Congress' Nevada (Mo.) Griffons in 1997, where he led the team to a 46-15 record. The Griffons won the League by six games and placed second in the 32-team NBC World Series in his only season as the team's skipper.

Pratte's wife, Jill, works as a certified athletic trainer at Central Methodist University in Fayette, Mo. They have one son, Paul Evan (10).

Trevor Coleman will return to Mizzou as a graduate assistant coach this season, his second in that role. Coleman is one of the most recognizable names and faces from some of the most winningest teams in program history as he was a standout for Tim Jamieson and the Tigers from 2007-09. Coleman was the team's catcher and one of the top hitters during his time with Mizzou, amassing a 116-66 overall record over his three seasons. He helped the 2007 team win 42 games and host the NCAA Regional round at Taylor Stadium. He again helped the Tigers to 39 wins and a Regional the following year in 2008.

Coleman was the 2007 Big 12 Freshman of the Year and a Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American after hitting .282 in 49 games, tallying nine homers, 11 doubles and 42 RBI. He then hit .295 in 2008 and .260 in 2009 before being drafted by the Seattle Mariners in the ninth round of the 2009 First Year Player Draft.

During his career with the Tigers, he caught Major Leaguers Aaron Crow, Rick Zagone, Kyle Gibson and Nick Tepesch. He will assist the Tiger batters in his current role as graduate manager and will also work with the Tiger catchers.

J.C. Field, a standout catcher for Tim Jamieson, returns to Mizzou as a volunteer assistant in 2015. Field is an up-and-coming coach with a résumé that includes coaching stints at North Dakota and Southeast Missouri. He joins Mizzou after spending the last seven seasons at North Dakota, including the last two as the program's associate head coach. At UND, Field oversaw the team's hitters, catchers and outfielders while leading the team's west coast recruiting efforts.

Field began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant at SEMO in 2008, where he also coached with Dodson, who was the program's pitching coach and recruiting coordinator.

Field, a 2006 graduate of the University of Missouri with an emphasis in sport management, communications and sociology, had a successful stint as UND's assistant coach from 2009-13 and associate head coach from 2013-15. As the team's hitting coach in 2013, UND led the Great West Conference in hitting and runs. He guided catcher Taylor Peterson to a pair of all-conference honors and the backstop led the team in nearly every category as a senior in 2014.

Field helped guide UND to a 16-win season in Western Athletic Conference (WAC) play and a fourth-place finish in 2015. He had three players notch a .300 average or better, highlighted by Tyler Follis' .405 clip, which ranked seventh nationally. Follis also set the school record for hits (74) in 2012 under Field's guidance.

Also under his tutelage, senior Jeff Campbell hit .365 with 11 homers and 48 RBI, last season. Campbell won the 2015 College Baseball Home Run Derby at TD Ameritrade Park on July 2 and was a first team All-WAC pick. Campbell, who was coached by Field all four years at UND, finished in the program's top five all-time in homers, doubles, RBIs and total bases. Campbell was a Freshman All-American in 2012.

In his two seasons at Mizzou, Field helped guide the Tigers to an NCAA Regional in 2005 and a Super Regional in 2006, catching the likes of major leaguers Max Scherzer and Doug Mathis. He started 96 games in his two years as a Tiger and earned All-Malibu Regional honors in the 2006 NCAA Tournament, helping Mizzou become the first ever No. 4 seed to win an NCAA Regional.

A native of Tucson, Arizona, Field also played two years at Pima Community College, earning all-conference honors as a catcher while receiving an associate's degree in liberal arts in 2004. He also caught Major Leaguers Jamie Vermilyea and Tim Wood while playing there. Following his collegiate days, he played with the Evansville Otters in the Frontier League.

BRETT PEEL

Former Mizzou standout Brett Peel, who played at Mizzou for the 2014 and 2015 seasons, joins the coaching staff in 2016 as a graduate manager. Peel was Mizzou's starting second baseman a year ago and was one of the emotional leaders of the team, serving as captain. He brought a grinder and winning mentality to Mizzou's roster, traits that revered him to Tim Jamieson and the rest of Mizzou's coaches.

Peel started 57 games in 2015, leading off in 46 of those contests while hitting .257 with a team-high 40 runs, which were the most by a Tiger since 2012. He also stole 22 bases on the season, which ranked fifth in the SEC and tops on the team. His 22 steals rank as the third-most in a single season at Mizzou and were the most by a Tiger since Torre Tyson stole 37 in 1998. He is just the seventh Tiger ever to steal more than 20 bags in a season.

Peel also just missed etching his name atop the school record list as he reached base in 30 consecutive games in 2015, falling just two short of the school record.

2015 SEASON IN REVIEW



As far as turnarounds are concerned, it could be argued that the biggest in the country in college baseball during the 2015 season happened in Columbia. With a talented core of returning players and a spark created by an influx of talented youngsters, Tim Jamieson's Tigers exceeded virtually every expectation for the team, ascending as high as No. 14 in the national rankings while finishing third in a loaded SEC East behind only College World Series participants Vanderbilt and Florida.

The foundation for the successful season was laid in the fall when some coaching changes prompted Jamieson to move to pitching coach while hiring former Mizzou All-American Hunter Mense to take over the hitting duties. The moves paid dividends as Mizzou's pitching staff developed into one of the best in recent memory at Mizzou, while the batting order – with a new

sense of confidence under Mense's Tutelage – turned in one of the biggest turnarounds in the nation at the plate. A year removed from owning the SEC's worst offense, Mense transformed an offense that hit just 10 home runs to one that hit 41 with a 53 percent increase in extra-base hits and a 40-percent increase in runs from 2014 to 2015. Coupled with a dominant weekend rotation and a shutdown bullpen, Mizzou was primed for a breakout season in 2015.

It all started on a cold day in Cary, N.C., as Mizzou earned a 4-3, walk-off win in game one of a doubleheader against Iona on a walk-off walk by junior Josh Lester. The Tigers then earned a 1-0 win in game two of that doubleheader behind a gem spun behind first-year starter Reggie McClain. One-run wins and McClain's dominance would be the trend over the next several weeks as Mizzou

won 10 of its first 11 games for its best start to a season since 1985. McClain earned SEC Pitcher of the Week twice in that span – for his efforts against Iona and a complete game shutout over Sam Houston State as Brett Bond's walk-off, two-run homer in the ninth inning sealed the win for McClain. Not to be forgotten is that Mizzou also turned the first triple play on record in school history in a 1-0 win over Purdue on Feb. 22.

In those first 11 games, Mizzou allowed just 16 runs with three shutouts and three more one-run efforts. The Tigers suffered a slight setback with a sweep at the hands of Milwaukee to open the home schedule but rebounded with six consecutive wins, including a series sweep at Georgia. McClain dazzled in the opener, tossing another complete game in a 5-1 win over the school that he started his career. Trey Harris hit a go-ahead three-run homer in the sixth inning of that game as he and McClain, both Georgia natives, got it done in their home state. That was game one of a doubleheader and the Tigers also took game two in extra innings, thanks to a four-run 10th inning, sparked by a huge RBI double from Zach Lavy. Mizzou then used a dominant start from Peter Fairbanks to complete the sweep on Sunday.

After a midweek split with the United States Air Force Academy, Mizzou welcomed sixth-ranked South Carolina to Taylor Stadium having won six of its last seven with first place in the SEC East on the line. McClain tossed another gem in the opener of that series, guiding Mizzou to a 3-2 win as Lavy's two-run single in the seventh inning proved to be the difference. It was Mizzou's first win over a top-10 team since 2013. Another one-run win was capped in thrilling fashion that Saturday as Harris roped a single back through the box in the 10th



inning, completing the two-run frame and the comeback as the Tigers clinched the series, 4-3. It was Mizzou's fourth walk-off win of the year and clinched Mizzou's first series win over a top-10 team since 2008. The Tigers dropped the finale, 7-5, despite the Tigers jumping out to a 3-0 lead in the first.

At 18-6 overall and 5-1 in SEC play, another mammoth series awaited the Tigers in College Station against top-ranked Texas A&M which entered the weekend with the nation's best record at 25-1. The Tigers dropped game one, but Saturday's 3-2 win was sparked by tremendous pitching by rising start Tanner Houck, a freshman righty who was beginning to turn heads nationally. He held the hottest lineup in the country to just two runs on eight hits, earning his fourth win of the season and handing the Aggies their first home loss of the season. The Tigers lost game three of the series, but found themselves atop the SEC East standings with another SEC East showdown on the horizon the following week.

With pundits all across the country still questioning if Mizzou was for real at 20-10 and 6-3 in SEC play, the fourth-ranked Florida Gators were scheduled for a visit to Columbia. After a 5-1 setback on Friday night, the Tigers mangled the Gators, 10-1, behind another brilliant start from Houck and a two-homer performance from Lavy, the first by a Tiger since 2012. Florida head coach Kevin O'Sullivan was quoted after the game saying that Houck had 'the best stuff they had seen all year.' With the series on the line on Sunday, Mizzou's pitching staff shut down the Gators for a 5-3 win behind a three-run shot in the fifth inning from sophomore SS Ryan Howard. Mizzou scored all five of its runs in the fifth inning of that game.

Mizzou then went on the road to take two of three from SEC East rival Tennessee and came back home to take two of three from Alabama, improving the Tigers to 26-14 and 12-6 in SEC play through 40 games. Ranked as



high as No. 14 in major national polls and tied atop the SEC East with defending national champion Vanderbilt, a showdown in Nashville loomed with first place on the line. Unfortunately, Vanderbilt swept the Tigers in Nashville. Mizzou rebounded to take a series from Ole Miss, fueled by an 18-1 Saturday win, its most runs in a game since 2012 and the most ever in an SEC game. That was more than enough for Houck, who allowed just four hits with eight strikeouts over 6.0 shutout innings.

After it appeared Mizzou had exorcised some of the demons from the Vanderbilt series, the Tigers then faced another No. 1 team on the road in LSU and were swept by the Bayou Bengals. Mizzou then closed the regular season with a series loss to Kentucky before heading to the SEC Tournament where it again defeated South Carolina in the opener, 5-1, behind another gem by McClain. But the Tigers squandered a 6-2 lead against Vanderbilt and were then ousted from the tournament by Alabama. That left the Tigers out of the NCAA Tournament despite being one of the best turnaround stories in the country. Mizzou finished the season 30-28 and 15-15 in the SEC, placing third in the East Division.











Following the season, junior closer Breckin Williams was named Second Team All-SEC after resetting the school's single season saves record with 13 to along with four wins and a 1.98 ERA in 36.1 innings pitched. He had a win or save in all nine of Mizzou's one-run wins in 2015. Houck and Harris each earned All-SEC Freshman Team honors as well. Williams (fourth round), Fairbanks (ninth round), Josh Lester (13th round), Alec Rash (23rd round) and Howard (31st round) were all drafted to close the season. Houck was also named a freshman All-American to round out the season honors.

Jamieson earned a three-year contract extension for his efforts in 2015 as well and looking ahead to 2016, Mizzou brings back plenty of offense and its top two weekend starters from 2015 in Houck and McClain. Harris, freshman catcher Brett Bond and phenom Shane Benes also return to the Tiger order as the Tigers bring back a loaded roster that should receive some love in the preseason top-25 polls heading in 2016.



2015 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

-  Mizzou finished the season with 30 wins for the 15th time under Tim Jamieson and finished third in the SEC East at 15-15 behind only eventual College World Series participants Vanderbilt and Florida. The 15 conference wins were nine more than the Tigers had in 2014 as the Tigers exceeded almost every expectation after being picked to finish last in the SEC by virtually everyone.
-  Righty Tanner Houck earned Louisville Slugger Freshman All-America honors in 2015, becoming the 11th Tiger to earn the distinction. He is the first Tiger pitcher to be named Freshman All-America since 2002. His eight wins on the year were the most by a Tiger freshman since Kyle Gibson (a future first round pick) in 2007 and he finished the regular season having tossed more innings than any other freshman in the country.
-  Junior closer Breckin Williams reset the school's single season saves record with his 13 in 2015. He passed Ryan Stegall, who had 12 back in 2000. He led the SEC in saves and earned Second Team All-SEC honors at reliever. He had a win or save in all nine of Mizzou's one-run wins in 2015.
-  Houck and classmate Trey Harris each earned a spot on the All-SEC Freshman Team in 2015, the second and third Tigers to do so since the team joined the league in 2013. Harris also earned a spot on the All-SEC Tournament Team after hitting .462 over the three games for the Tigers.
-  Junior righty Reggie McClain earned SEC Pitcher of the Week three times in 2015, becoming the first pitcher to do so since 2014 when both Aaron Nola and Ross Mitchell took home the award three times.
-  Mizzou hit 41 homers on the season, the most by a Tiger team since the change of the bats prior to the 2011 season. The 41 homers are even more impressive when considering Mizzou had just 25 in the last two seasons combined before 2015. Mizzou hit 28 homers in SEC games, the third-most in the league.
-  Mizzou's staff ERA of 3.68 in 2015 was the program's best since 2006 when the team finished with a 3.36 mark.
-  Senior Brett Peel stole 22 bags in 2015, the third-most in program history in a single season. He became just the seventh Tiger to record more than 20 steals in a single season and he if the first Tiger with more than 20 steals since 1998.
-  Houck and McClain became the first Tiger pitchers to each toss more than 100 innings since 2007. Mizzou was the only SEC school to use the same weekend rotation in all 10 SEC series this season.
-  Five Tigers heard their names called in the MLB First Year Player Draft. Williams (4th round, Diamondbacks), Peter Fairbanks (9th round, Rangers), Josh Lester (13th round, Tigers), Alec Rash (23rd round, Nationals) and Ryan Howard (31st round, Giants) all were drafted this year.

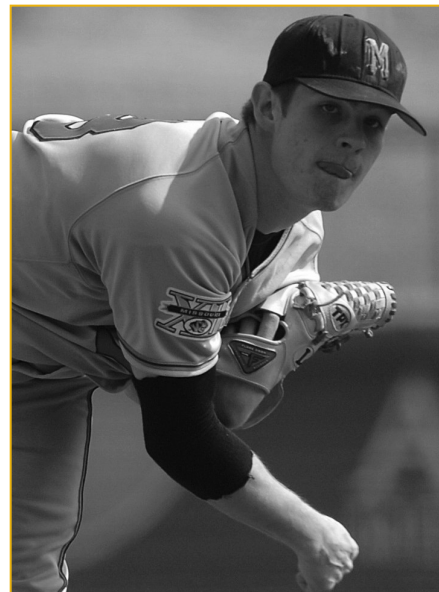

TIGERS IN THE PROS

The presence of former Missouri Tiger Baseball players in professional baseball continues to grow each year. In 2010, five more players signed contracts. That brings the number of former MU players signing pro contracts to 159. Mizzou Head Coach Tim Jamieson has seen 69 players in his 20 years as head coach sign pro contracts.

As many as 20 former Mizzou greats have made it through the ranks and onto Major League rosters. Tim Laudner played for the 1987 World Champion Minnesota Twins. Phil Bradley played for several big league teams in 1980s and early '90s. Last year, three former Tigers spent times in the Major Leagues, including two-time All-Star selection Ian Kinsler, who played in the 2012 World Series with the Texas Rangers.

Max Scherzer, became the highest ever draft pick in MU history when he was selected by Arizona with the 11th overall pick in 2006. In 2008, Aaron Crow replaced Scherzer as the highest ever Tiger draft pick, when the Washington Nationals drafted Crow with the ninth pick. Crow did not sign with Washington and re-entered the draft in 2009, where he was taken by the Kansas City Royals with the 12th pick. Ten picks later Kyle Gibson was drafted by the Minnesota Twins, marking the first time in school history that two Tigers were selected in the first round of the draft.



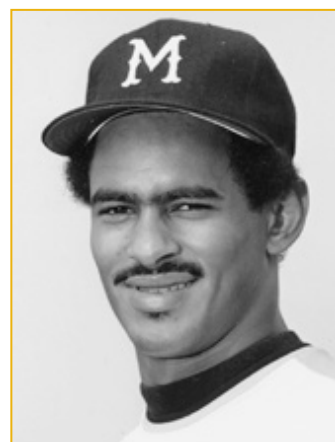

MISSOURI INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

Herb Bunker • 1923 **Class of 1990**

A native of Nevada, Mo., Herb Bunker is one of only two four-sport letterwinners in Missouri athletic history. He lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track and field between 1920-23. In basketball, Bunker earned All-Missouri Valley Conference honors as a guard in 1921 and 1922, and was an All-American in 1921 and 1923. A tackle/center in football, he captained the Tigers in 1922. He was a catcher/outfielder in baseball, and threw the shot put on the track team. A Phi Beta Kappa student who earned a Ph.D. in sociology, Bunker headed Mizzou's department of physical education for many years before retiring in 1965. He spent nine years as football coach and athletics director at Culver-Stockton College in Canton, Mo., and also coached at Missouri, Auburn and Florida and at Paseo High School in Kansas City, Mo.

Hubert Pruett • 1921 **Class of 1990**

A pitcher from Malden, Mo., Hubert Pruett lettered just one year at Missouri, in 1921, but made his mark on the Major League Baseball world with his ability to strike out the great Babe Ruth. Pruett compiled a 29-48 record, pitching for the St. Louis Browns, New York Giants, Boston Braves and Philadelphia Phillies. Pruett perfected a "screwball" and used it to strike out Ruth 10 of the first 13 times he faced him. In all, he faced Ruth 30 times. The "Babe" got only four hits in those at bats (including one home run off a curveball), struck out 15 times, walked eight times, sacrificed once, and grounded out twice. He retired from baseball in 1932 and Pruett was a doctor in St. Louis for 40 years.

Norm Stewart • 1954-56 **Class of 1990**

A native of Shelbyville, Mo., Norm Stewart lettered at Missouri in basketball and baseball for three years. He was inducted as an athlete since his induction came during his tenure as Missouri's head basketball coach. He threw a no-hitter and won one game in the 1954 College World Series as the Tigers won the national title. Stewart led the 1955 and 1956 Tigers in victories, innings pitched, strikeouts, appearances, games started and complete games. He also led the 1955 team in earned-run average. Stewart's accomplishments on the basketball floor both as a player and coach at Missouri are legendary. He scored 1,112 points in three seasons and recorded 634 wins at Mizzou as head coach. When he retired after the 1998-99 season, Stewart ranked seventh all-time in the NCAA with 731 career wins.

Don Faurot • 1922-24 **Class of 1990**

While this name is more recognizable for Faurot's accomplishments on the football field, Faurot was an infielder for the Tigers for three seasons. Faurot left his legacy on the University as football coach and director of athletics. Aside from leading the Tigers out of debt and into football's elite, his tenure as football coach and director of athletics — a job he relinquished in 1967 — left MU athletics with its greatest legacy, the imprint of his integrity. His prime contribution to football was his innovation of the Split-T formation at Mizzou in 1941.

Paul Christman • 1938-39, 41 **Class of 1990**

The legendary "Pitchin' Paul" Christman lettered three times each in football and baseball. A three-time all-conference quarterback, Christman finished third in the 1939 Heisman Trophy voting.

Chester Brewer • Coach **Class of 1991**

In addition to serving as athletic director from 1911-17 and 1924-34, Chester Brewer served as the school's football, basketball, baseball and track and field coach. In seven seasons, he led the Tiger Nine to a mark of 61-32-3.

Norm Wagner • 1931-33 **Class of 1991**

Norm Wagner lettered at Missouri in basketball and baseball from 1931-33 and led the Tigers to conference titles in 1931 and 1932. He won 27 games in his career — a record that stood until 1980. He was a member of the St. Louis Cardinals organization after graduation. He also led the 1932-33 Tiger Basketball squad in scoring on his way to earning all-conference honors.

Bob Schoonmaker • 1952-54 **Class of 1991**

A three-sport athlete, Bob Schoonmaker earned eight letters during his time at Missouri. An infielder from Lebanon, Mo., Schoonmaker was an all-conference performer in 1954 as the Tigers won the College World Series. He hit .307 that season with a team-high two triples and committed only one error in 171 chances. He also was on the 1952 national runner-up team, hitting a home run in the championship game. In football, he was a two-time captain and earned three letters on the gridiron. Schoonmaker also lettered on the basketball team for two years.

Don Boenker • 1951-53 **Class of 1993**

Missouri's first All-American pitcher in 1952, Don Boenke led the Tigers to the Big Seven Conference championship, the NCAA District V championship, and a second-place finish at the College World Series. A Tiger co-captain for Coach John "Hi" Simmons in 1953, he later signed with the Cleveland Indians and during his professional career, was coached by Whitey Kurowski, George Steinbrenner and Hub Kittle among others. He twice led MU in victories in addition to tossing a pair of one-hitters against Washington University in 1951 and Kansas State in 1952. He also authored a two-hitter against Iowa State in 1952. A native of St. Louis, Boenker was inducted into the Mizzou QEBH Honorary Society as an undergraduate and holds three degrees from the University of Missouri.

1954 National Champions **Class of 1994**

The 1954 squad captured MU's first national title at the College World Series. The Tigers posted a 22-4 record, won the Big Seven Conference title and came back through the losers bracket to capture the national championship. MU had a 12-game win streak during the season.

Lowe 'Junior' Wren • 1951-52 **Class of 1994**

One of several standout two-sport athletes, 'Junior' Wren was an All-American outfielder in 1952. He hit a team-high .408 to go with seven stolen bases in 1951 before hitting .359 in the 1952 regular season. Wren also pitched one game in the 1952 College World Series, striking out 11 batters while throwing a two-hitter against Penn State. A member of Missouri's 1952 national runner-up team, Wren also was an all-conference football player in 1951 after leading the team in rushing, total offense and punting.

Thornton Jenkins • 1946 **Class of 1995**

Thornton Jenkins, who also played basketball at Mizzou, lettered one year on the Missouri diamond. The leading scorer for the 1942-43 Tiger hoopers, Jenkins lettered four times in basketball.

Dave Silvestri • 1986-88 **Class of 1997**

In a span of four months in 1988, Dave Silvestri was named an All-American shortstop, chosen in the second round by the Houston Astros in the Major League Baseball First-Year Draft and was a member of the 1988 Summer Olympics gold medal winning United States baseball team. Silvestri hit .406 in 1988 to go with 21 home runs and a school-record 89 runs scored. His marks that season for total bases, slugging percentage and extra-base hits are Missouri records. Called by many to be the greatest Missouri baseball player of the modern era, Silvestri could hit for average and power as well as field his position and run the bases. He was a two-time all-conference, all-district and All-America player. He played in the majors with the 1994 New York Yankees. He is still involved with baseball as he was featured in a Sports Illustrated article in 2001 managing the Great Falls Dodgers.

Keith Weber • 1963-64 **Class of 1998**

Keith Weber might well be the greatest pitcher in Missouri's long and glorious baseball history. In 1964, he set the MU record for earned run average (0.56), won 11 games and struck out 90 batters as the Tigers went 26-5-1 and advanced to the College World Series. Those 11 wins are still tied for the school single-season record, and the strikeout total stood as the record for 26 years. His ERA contributed to a team figure of 0.65 that still stands as the NCAA record, and in this era of the aluminum bat, will probably never be broken. Weber, from Jefferson City, was All-Big Eight, All-District V and All-America in 1964, and signed with the New York Mets. He also was a quarterback in football, but injuries ended his career before he competed on the varsity level.

Greg Cypret • 1975-78 **Class of 1998**

One of the most prolific players of the Gene McArtor era in baseball at Ol' Mizzou, Greg Cypret earned All-America honors three times at shortstop. He was a third-team selection in 1975, received honorable mention in 1976 and was a first-team selection in 1978. He was the All-Big Eight shortstop in 1976-78. Cypret hit .356 for his career and held the school career marks for hits (253) and runs batted in (181). He signed with the Houston Astros in 1978. After his professional career, Cypret joined former MU assistant coach Bob Todd on the Kent State coaching staff. He is now on the staff at Ohio State.

Clair 'Butch' Houston • 1931-35 **Class of 1999**

Butch Houston earned nine letters at Ol' Mizzou — three each in football, baseball and track. He also played two years of basketball but did not letter. A native of Maywood, Ill., he was the captain of Coach Don Faurot's first team at MU in 1935, and earned honorable mention honors as a fullback. He was also the Tigers' starting fullback in 1932 and '33.

Gene McArtor • 1961-93 **Class of 1999**

Ray Uriarte • 1953, 1957-58 **Class of 2000**

A first-team all-American third baseman in 1958 who came to Mizzou from nearby Mexico, Mo., Ray Uriarte walked on at MU in 1952, but was cut by legendary Coach John "Hi" Simmons. He later returned to ask "Why?" and Simmons told him he could try again when the team began outdoor workouts. He did, made the team, and went on to play four games as a freshman. He lettered in 1953, but his career was interrupted by military service, and made 18 jumps as a paratrooper in two years. He returned to Mizzou and was elected team captain in 1957. Uriarte led the Tigers to the 1958 Big Seven championship, the District V title and to second place in the College World Series. He led the team with 17 stolen bases, 39 runs scored, 36 walks and an on-base percentage of .662, which still stands as the MU single-season record. In addition to his all-American recognition in 1958, Uriarte also received all-Big Eight and all-District V honors that season. Called by Coach Simmons "the best leadoff man I ever had at the University," Uriarte later served as an assistant coach for Simmons in 1959 and 1960.

Dave Otto • 1983-85 **Class of 2000**

A native of Elk Grove, Ill., Dave Otto was a standout pitcher and designated hitter from 1983-85. An All-American DH in 1985, Otto earned all-Big Eight and All-District V honors as he hit 16 home runs. He stood fifth on the MU career batting average chart (.366). An imposing figure on the mound, Otto stood third with 195 strikeouts. He shares the school record for games started in a season (14). A freshman All-American at Mizzou in 1983, Otto earned Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors in 1984 and 1985. He signed with the Oakland Athletics in 1985, and spent time in the major leagues with the As in 1988-90. Otto was traded to the Cleveland Indians in 1990 and was in their starting rotation in 1991 and 1992. He pitched with the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1993.

**Sonny Siebert • 1956-58
Class of 2004**

An impact player in two sports for Mizzou, the St. Louis, Mo. native Sonny Siebert, lettered in basketball three years (1956-58) and one year in baseball (1958). He earned third-team All-American honors in baseball, as a first baseman in 1958 and was also an All-District V and All-Big Eight selection that season, as he helped lead MU to the championship game of the College World Series, where MU lost in 12 innings to Southern Cal, 8-7. Siebert was named to the all-time College World Series team for the decade of the 1950s. He tied for the team lead in home runs, with eight in 1958 and later signed with the Cleveland Indians in 1958, and played at the major league level with several teams as a pitcher.

**Ray Thorpe • 1965-67
Class of 2004**

Ray Thorpe was a two-sport standout who was recruited to play football at Mizzou, but also later excelled in baseball, while also running indoor track for one season. The St. Louis, Mo. native was also the first African-American to play baseball for Mizzou and earned All-American honors in 1967 in baseball, after leading the Tigers in hits, triples, home runs, stolen bases and walks. He was named to the Missouri College Baseball Hall of Fame in 1967 and played on the USAs Pan-American baseball squad in 1966. Harvey was a game-breaker on the gridiron for Coach Dan Devine, playing a big role on the 1965 MU squad that eventually won the 1966 Sugar Bowl. He proved instrumental to the team during the year, as he provided numerous big plays, scoring touchdowns that won a game against Oklahoma State and forced a tie against UCLA. His TD against Oklahoma State was a 42-yard run on a lateral from Gary Kombrink, and accounted for the only score in a 7-0 MU win. Harvey's touchdown against UCLA was a scintillating 79-yard kick return that got MU back into the game after the Bruins had taken a 14-0 lead - the game ended in a 14-14 tie. After graduating from Mizzou in 1967, Thorpe coached high school football in the St. Louis area, and during his teaching and coaching tenure, he was influential in the decision of many students and athletes to attend Mizzou.

**Ron Cox • 1960-61
Class of 2005**

Ron Cox was the first superstar shortstop in Mizzou Baseball history, who earned first-team All-American honors as a sophomore in 1960 after hitting .407 that season (the highest ever at the time by an All-American shortstop) and driving in a then-school record 36 runs. He became the first-ever sophomore in school history to earn first-team All-American honors and was featured on the cover of the 1961 Official NCAA Baseball Guide. Cox earned First-Team All-Big Eight honors in 1960, as well as First-Team All-District V honors that same year. An outstanding all-around athlete who also lettered on MU's basketball team in 1960, Cox was a part-time starter who was regarded as one of the better defensive players in the conference. He was instrumental in holding Nebraska star Hershel Turner below his scoring average in one game which helped lead to a Tiger victory. He was also offered a scholarship to play quarterback at Mizzou by coaches Frank Broyles and Dan Devine, but declined the offer to focus on baseball. Cox went on to sign with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1962 and played for nine years in the Cardinals and Pittsburgh Pirates organizations.

**Dave Harvey • 1962-64
Class of 2008**

Dave Harvey was a highly-decorated and accomplished third basemen during one of the most successful stretches ever put together by Mizzou baseball. He was a first-team All-American as a third baseman in 1964, after being named a second-team All-American at third in 1963. Harvey was a driving force behind Tiger teams which advanced to three consecutive College World Series and won three straight Big Eight Conference championships in 1962, 1963 and 1964. He hit .312 as a senior in 1964 and tied for the team lead in home runs (3), while he led the team in hitting in 1963, at a .359 clip. Mizzou went 26-5-1 in 1964, winning the Big Eight and finishing as national runners-up at the College World Series, a year after going 25-8 in 1963 when they finished fourth at the CWS. The Tigers had a 22-7 record in 1962 and advanced to the CWS. Harvey was an All-Big Eight performer in both 1963 and 1964 while earning All-District honors in both 1962 and 1964.

**Ryan Fry • 1995-98
Class of 2009**

Among the top offensive players in school history who holds numerous school career and season records ... Named a 2nd-team All-American after his senior season of 1998 ... A prolific offensive weapon who in near the top of MU career records list for hits (265), doubles (56), RBI (222), runs (223), extra base hits (106) and total bases (463), home runs (42) and slugging percentage (.589) ... His career batting average of .337 falls just shy of the MU career top-10 list. Hit .377 as a senior in 1998, with an MU-record 27 home runs, and drove in a career-high 78 runs ... Holds MU single-season records in hits (92 in 1996) and home runs (27 in 1998) ... Hit .387 as a sophomore, when he set the MU single-season record with 92 hits in 1996. Was named 1st-team All-Big Eight for his efforts, and was one of three outfielders ... A standout in the classroom who twice earned GTE/Co-SIDA Academic All-American honors (1997 & 1998). Was also a three-time Academic All-Big 12 selection, as well (1996, 1997 & 1998) ... Is younger brother to former MU All-American wrestler, Shaon Fry, who was a 1999 inductee into the MU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame.

**1964 Team
Class of 2009**

One of the most dominant teams in Mizzou athletics in any sport, finished the year as national runners-up, falling in the national title game to Minnesota ... Finished the year with a 27-5-1 overall record, including a perfect 19-0 record to claim Mizzou's 4th-straight Big Eight Title ... Led the nation in pitching, with a team earned run average of a miniscule 0.65 runs per game. This mark set the NCAA record at the time, and it still stands today as a record that might never be broken ... The Tiger pitching staff was so dominant, it allowed one or zero runs in 21-of-33 games, including nine shutouts. In two games against Minnesota in the College World Series, Minnesota scored a total of two earned runs (MU won the first meeting, 4-1, but lost the championship game, 5-1) ... In the College World Series, beat Arizona State (7-0), lost a one-run game to USC (3-2), then beat Seton Hall (3-1), Minnesota (4-1) and Maine (2-1) before falling to Minnesota in the title game (5-1) ... Two members of the team - Dave Harvey and Keith Weber, were 1st-team All-Americans - both are individual inductees into the MU Hall of Fame ... Nine members of the team were All-Big Eight selections, including four on the first team ... Eleven members of the team went on to sign professional baseball contracts.

**Tom Heckman
Class of 2011**

A dominant starter for some very good Mizzou baseball teams ... Was an honorable-mention All-American pitcher (1981) for the Tigers who set numerous records during his time on the mound ... Won 10 games in three consecutive seasons (1979-80-81) and helped lead Mizzou to a Big Eight Conference championship in 1980 ... Completed his playing days holding Mizzou and Big Eight Conference records for career victories (36), and his 11 complete games in 1981 is also an MU single-season record ... Led Mizzou in ERA in 1978 (1.94) and 1979 (2.33) ... Was an All-Big Eight selection his last two seasons (1980-81), and his 323.2 career innings pitched stood as the school record when he completed play ... Was also an outstanding student who was twice selected as an Academic All-American.

**Max Scherzer
Class of 2011**

A St. Louis native who became one of the nation's most dominant pitchers in a stellar three-year career, helping elevate the Tiger program to elite status before moving onto the professional ranks where he is now among the best young pitchers in the American League ... Broke out as a sophomore in 2005 when he led the Big 12 Conference in ERA (1.86) and strikeouts (131) while breaking a 14-year old school record with his strikeouts ... Won nine games that season, and was part of a combined no-hitter against Texas Tech on April 1, 2005 ... Was named the Big 12 Pitcher of the Year in 2005, and also claimed 2nd-Team All-American honors while being named 1st-Team All-Big 12 as well ... Was a semifinalist in 2005 for the Clemens Award, which honors the top pitcher in the nation ... The 2005 Tiger team won 40 games for the first time since 1991, and finished 4th in the Big 12 Conference, the team's highest league finish since 1996.

**Ian Kinsler
Class of 2012**

Although he played only one season at Mizzou, Tiger Head Coach Tim Jamieson credits him with being a key figure in helping turn the program around, as he was instrumental in leading Mizzou back to the NCAA Tournament in 2003, after a six-year drought. That 2003 NCAA appearance started a string of seven-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances for the Tiger program. After transferring to Mizzou from Arizona State and junior college, Kinsler batted .335 for Mizzou in 2003, and was third on the team with six home runs and 45 RBI. He also went 16-of-17 in stolen bases during the season, and was named 2nd-Team All-Big 12 for his efforts.

**Aaron Crow
Class of 2013**

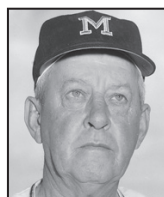
Established himself as one of the most feared pitchers in the nation during the late 2000s in a time of great success for Tiger baseball under Head Coach Tim Jamieson. During his junior season of 2008, Crow was arguably the most dominant pitcher in the game, as he won the Roger Clemens Award, given annually to the top pitcher in college baseball, in addition to being named a consensus 1st-Team All-American. His stats in 2008 were stellar - a perfect 13-0 record, an earned run average of 2.35, four complete-game shutouts and 127 strikeouts (10.65 per nine innings). Had a 43-inning scoreless streak during the 2008 season. After sitting out a year, later was again drafted in the first round (#12 overall) in 2009 by the Kansas City Royals. Made the Royals' opening day roster in 2011, and has been with the club ever since, logging 186 appearances. Crow won seven games in 2013 for the Royals, and was the club's lone All-Star during his rookie season of 2011.

**John Dettmer
Class of 2014**

Mizzou's all-time career strikeout leader who was durable in addition to his flame-throwing achievements for hall of fame Coach Gene McArthur... Won honorable mention All-American honors in 1991 when he turned in one of the top individual pitching seasons in MU history... Won nine games that year, and struck out 127 batters in 120.0 innings while leading the team with a 2.63 earned run average in an time where bats were very lively... Finished his Tiger career with 374 strikeouts, which stands still as the most in program history, while his 332.0 career innings pitched ranks second to this day, and his 23 career wins are also eighth-most... Won All-Big Eight first-team honors in 1990, 1991 and 1992, as he led the Tigers in strikeouts each year, with 99, 127 and 123, respectively... Turned in 15 complete games during his career as he was a durable and dependable presence on the mound... Went on to become an 11th-round draft pick in the 1992 Major League Baseball Draft by the Texas Rangers, and eventually pitched in 12 games in the Majors.

John 'Hi' Simmons
1937-73

A native of Lancaster in the northeast part of Missouri, Simmons had a long decorated career at Missouri, as head baseball coach and a trusty football assistant to Don Faurot. In baseball, he coached from 1937 to 1973, posting a record of 481-294-3. His teams won 11 conference championships and the first NCAA title in school history in 1954. In all, he led Missouri to six appearances in the NCAA College World Series in Omaha, Neb. He coached 19 All-Americans, including nine first-team choices, 25 all-district and 37 all-conference players. A former president of the American Baseball Coaches Association, Simmons was inducted into the State of Missouri Sports Hall of Fame in 1977, and is also a member of the ABCA Hall of Fame.



A bust honoring Simmons sits near the entrance of Taylor Stadium.

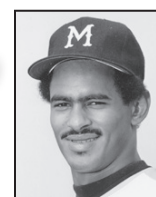

Gene McArtor
1961-93

As a player at Missouri, McArtor won all-conference and all-district honors as a first baseman from 1961-63. He played on two Big Eight Conference championship teams and two squads which advanced to the College World Series. He served as team captain as a senior. He returned to MU as assistant baseball coach in 1969 after coaching and teaching at the high school level in his hometown, St. Louis. McArtor served in that role until 1974 when he succeeded John "Hi" Simmons as the Tigers' head coach. During his 21 years at the helm, McArtor compiled a 733-430-3 record and won Big Eight championships in 1976 and 1980. He guided six teams to the NCAA Tournament, coached 13 All-Americans and 41 all-conference players. McArtor served on the NCAA Baseball Committee from 1987-92, including two years as chairman, during a period of unprecedented growth for the CWS. Former president of the American Baseball Coaches Association, McArtor is a member of the ABCA Hall of Fame, the Webster Groves High School Hall of Fame and the St. Louis Amateur Baseball Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the MU Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame in 1999 and will go into the Missouri State Sports Hall of Fame this winter. Since retiring as baseball coach, he continued to serve MU first at the Senior Associate Director of Athletics and then as director of project management. He also served as the interim director of athletics for several months in 1998. He currently is the NCAA National Coordinator for Baseball Umpires.

Phil Bradley
1979-81

One of the most decorated athletes in Missouri annals, Bradley lettered in football at Missouri from 1977-81, and in baseball from 1979-81. A native of Macomb, Ill., Bradley quarterbacked the Tigers to three bowl games (1978 and 1980 Liberties and the 1979 Hall of Fame). He was a three-time Big Eight Conference "Offensive Player of the Year" and set the conference total offense record with 6,459 yards. He holds Missouri records for passing and total offense, and played in two all-star games, the Hula and Japan Bowls, after his senior season. In baseball, he starred as an outfielder on Missouri teams which won the 1980 Big Eight championship and advanced to the 1980 and 1981 NCAA Tournaments. Bradley was All-Big Eight, All-District and All-America in 1981, when he hit .457. Bradley was also the 1980 Big Eight Tournament MVP when Mizzou won the championship. He held school records for career walks and on-base percentage and held five school records when he graduated. Bradley was drafted by the Seattle Mariners and played with them through 1987. He was named to the 1985 American League All-Star Team and hit a career-high 26 home runs that season. He also played with the Philadelphia Phillies, Baltimore Orioles and Chicago White Sox. He also played briefly in Japan.

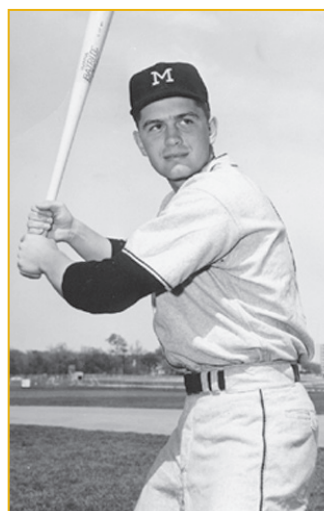

Hank C. Foley
Interim Chancellor
University of Missouri

Dr. Henry C. "Hank" Foley, interim chancellor of the University of Missouri, has served as the MU senior vice chancellor for research and graduate studies and the UM System executive vice president for academic affairs, research and economic development.

Since his appointment with the UM System in July 2013, Foley has worked with a variety of campus leaders, including the campus chancellors, provosts and chief research and economic development officers. He has led the system's strategic planning efforts, provided systemwide leadership in academic programs, promoted economic development and advanced research collaborations and enhanced funding. He also has led institutional research, student access and success, academic program review and eLearning functions of the system.

At University of Missouri (MU), Foley has served as the senior vice chancellor for research and graduate studies. He has had overall responsibility for research, graduate studies and entrepreneurship. In his role, he has overseen the operations of compliance activities, internal grants and programs, sponsored programs, technology management and industry relations, as well as various campus centers (i.e. MU Research Reactor (MURR), Christopher S. Bond Life Sciences Center, Dalton Cardiovascular Research Center, International Institute of Nano and Molecular Medicine, and the Interdisciplinary Center on Aging, as well as the Research Core Facilities).

Foley is a tenured professor of chemistry at MU and is a adjunct professor of chemical and biochemical engineering at the Missouri University of Science and Technology.

Foley is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a fellow of the Industrial and Engineering Division of the American Chemical Society and a fellow of the National Academy of Inventors. He is a member of the Cosmos Club in Washington, D.C., and of several honorary societies, including Sigma Xi, Phi Lambda Upsilon and Sigma Pi Sigma. For his scholarly work he has been recognized with the New York Metropolitan Catalysis Society's Excellence in Catalysis Award, the Philadelphia Catalysis Club's Annual Award, the Leo C. Friend Award from the I&EC Division of the American Chemical Society, the Research Innovation Recognition Award from Union Carbide Corporation, the Presidential Young Investigator Award from the National Science Foundation, the Thiele Lecture in Chemical Engineering at the University of Notre Dame, the Distinguished Departmental Lecture in Chemical Engineering at the University of Utah and the Henry E. Bent Lecture in Chemical Engineering at the University of Missouri. He has authored more than 120 refereed archival journal articles. He is an inventor with 16 patents and is the author of the textbook *Introduction to Chemical Engineering Analysis Using Mathematica*, published in 2003. Graduate and undergraduate students he has mentored have prospered in industry and in academia.

MIZZOU ADMINISTRATION



Mack Rhoades
Director of
Athletics

University of Missouri officials announced March 9, 2015, that Mack B. Rhoades IV had been appointed director of Intercollegiate Athletics at Mizzou, a post he assumed on April 27, 2015.

Rhoades came to Columbia, Mo., after serving as vice president for Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Houston, where he oversaw 17 varsity sports and led a revival in academics and facilities since his arrival in August 2009. Prior to joining the University of Houston, Rhoades was director of athletics at the University of Akron.

At the University of Houston, Rhoades rejuvenated the athletics program across the board, including enhancements in the student athlete experience, academics, facilities, fundraising and competitiveness. During the 2013-14 academic year, 10 of the 17 sports programs competed in NCAA postseason competition. The football team participated in bowl games four times in a six-year span, including the 2011 season when the Cougars were ranked as high as No. 6 in the BCS standings and competed in two consecutive bowl games in 2013 and 2014. In almost every academic measurement, including GPA and APR, Houston reached record levels; Rhoades created the Cougar Pride Leadership Academy to provide life-long leadership skills for student-athletes.

During his tenure, Houston raised nearly \$100 million and built \$160 million worth of new facilities, including a new on-campus football stadium and a men's and women's basketball development center. Rhoades also negotiated a new multi-media rights deal for the athletics program as well as one of the top five facility naming rights deals at the collegiate level.

Additionally, Rhoades and Dr. Renu Khator successfully steered Houston into a new era as the university was invited in December 2011 to join The American Athletic Conference beginning with the 2013-14 academic year. The first year in The American saw one of the most successful years in Houston Athletics history as Houston's programs combined for 157 victories, 17 American individual championships, 10 NCAA postseason berths and two American team titles. The surge in success led to Houston's highest national finish in the Learfield Directors' Cup since 2000-01.

Under Rhoades' leadership, Cougar Pride, Houston Athletics' fundraising arm, set an annual donations record for the fifth consecutive year in 2013-14 as more than 3,100 Cougar Pride members contributed \$4.5 million, topping the previous record of \$3.5 million the year before.

Prior to his arrival at Houston, Rhoades helped Akron reach unprecedented success on and off the field. During his tenure, Akron student-athletes earned: 765 total Dean's List honors, 213 All-Conference honors, 83 Academic All-Conference awards, 20 team championships, 14 Conference Player of the Year awards and 12 All-America honors.

His drive for perfection and expectation of excellence quickly put his name on the map nationally. Rhoades served as a member of the NCAA Division I Championships/Sports Management Cabinet -- also serving on the Administrative Committee of that cabinet, as well as leading the communications committee for the MAC.

Rhoades came to Akron after a seven-year stint at UTEP, where he most recently served as the executive senior associate athletics director. He worked his way up the ranks with the Miners after joining the staff as assistant AD for development. In his final role with UTEP, Rhoades oversaw all fundraising, the marketing and media relations offices as well as football external operations, men's basketball, men's golf, licensing, Miner Athletic Club and the athletics ticket office.

Rhoades holds a bachelor's degree in health sciences from the University of Arizona and a master's degree in athletics administration/sports management from Indiana University.

He and his wife, Amy, have three daughters - Nicolette, Natalie and Noelle.

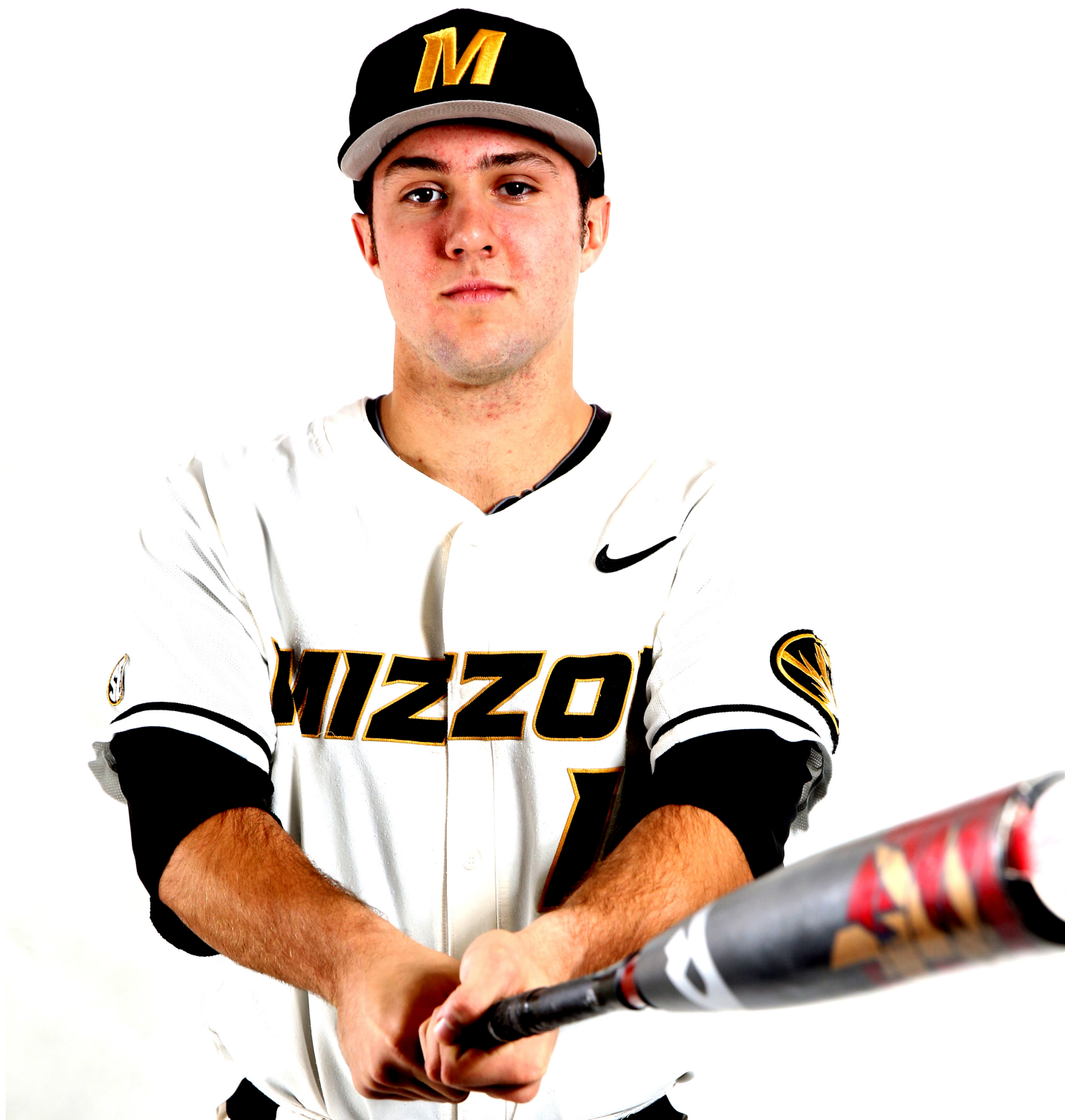

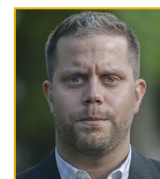

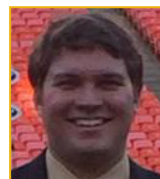
