The University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff (UAPB) has continued to serve as the flagship of the Arkansas Delta region for more than 145 years. Its mission is to promote and sustain excellent academic programs that integrate quality instruction, research, and student learning experiences responsive to the needs of a racially, culturally and economically diverse student population.

UAPB is currently considered an NCAA limited-resource institution. As director of athletics at UAPB, our goal is to provide the best

services available within our resources. We strive to ensure our student-athletes are provided the tools

necessary to successfully navigate the pressures of being a collegiate student-athlete while preparing to be productive after graduation. With this in mind, it is vital that we make efficient and effective decisions. The university continues to implement new technological tools to facilitate academic and professional success for our student-athletes.

The athletics department invested in a state-of-the-art Academic Center Student-Athletes which includes offices for academic staff, a meeting room with a smart board, private study cubicles, 27 desktop and Apple computers laptops student-athletes during travel. Over the last few years, we have seen a significant increase in individual and team GPAs, as well as increases in our graduation success rates. We have set a goal to have a minimum Academic Progress Rate of 950 across all sports, although limited-resource institutions must meet a minimum of 930.

A large part of this success is due to Student-Athlete Academic Services staff members and the usage of GradesFirst. We utilize GradesFirst as a one-stop shop to log and monitor study hall attendance, send and receive progress reports, communicate with professors about at-risk student-athletes, send travel excuses and student-athlete attendance to our coaching staff. This has also provided us with a user-friendly source that students, faculty and staff can utilize. We also use GradesFirst to facilitate our Academic Tutoring Program.

Obtaining championships is a driving force in FCS Division I athletics. Winning a championship is unpredictable, ensuring every UAPB student-athlete will be a champion in life is our main goal.
