The D2 ADA Academic Achievement Award Program, in its 16th year, recognized a record-breaking 19,539 deserving student-athletes. With 196 institutions submitting nominations, we have room to grow and new records ahead of us knowing that strong academic performances by DII student-athletes exist throughout our entire division.

Our **Convention Programming** is receiving positive feedback, especially around the keynote and content experts we've been able to secure thanks to collaboration with our colleagues from NADIIIAA, NAIA-ADA and NATYCAA. We plan to continue and build on this partnership to best serve our membership's priorities and the hot topics of professional development.

The New AD Orientation program has evolved

to include three in-person opportunities to connect with D2 ADA Officers, NCAA staff and familiarize themselves with everything Division II. In addition to the NCAA and NACDA & Affiliates Conventions, we host a day and a half orientation at the national office in late September that includes NCAA staff presentations and a panel discussion with our Officers group. This past year, we awarded 25 New AD stipends to support their attendance at the NACDA Convention.

When John McCarthy set about developing a preseason men's college basketball tournament back in 2014, he had a singular focus. Whatever it ended up looking like, he told me, "It had to be for the good of the game."

Now entering its seventh edition this November, McCarthy's Small College Basketball Hall of Fame Classic – which annually brings together many of the top teams in Division II – has not only met his admirable and well-intentioned standard, but noticeably overachieved.

Shed the actual competition and there is still the one-of-a-kind Small College Basketball Hall of Fame induction ceremony recognizing stellar but oftentimes overlooked collegiate careers that occurred minus the bright lights and notoriety of Division I (think Jerry Sloan,

Dick Barnett, Earl Monroe, Willis Reed and Phil Jackson, who were among the inaugural 15-person class in 2016). That's a

standalone experience in itself. Keep the games but subtract the Hall of Fame induction and there's the uniqueness of a DII regular-season tournament that includes upper-level teams representing most of the division's eight regions in a single setting.

McCarthy, smartly, couples both elements in his dual-purpose extravaganza – and they are major reasons why D2 CCA continues to unanimously approve the Small College Basketball Hall of Fame Classic for an annual exemption, a rarely bestowed privilege that allows the tournament to occur the weekend before the official regular season start date (and the games to be exempted from a team's annual contest limit).

The Classic has thrived in each of its locales – it currently takes place in Lakeland, Fla. after previous stops in St. Joseph, Mo. and Evansville, Ind. – and become so popular that the field has expanded to 10 teams. And it's all due to the efforts of McCarthy, a former AD and assistant coach at Lynn University who coordinates the event's many logistics as a labor of love (his day job is running a non-profit in Kansas City). He's quick to point out he's not lacking assistance in

operating the event, with financial support coming from local sports commissions and game management responsibilities covered by the host institution.

The induction ceremony is the signature piece of the Hall of Fame weekend. With all the tourney participants present, McCarthy carves out time for a panel discussion in which today's players are provided the opportunity to engage with the past small college greats, who not only tell stories about their lives and careers but also come prepared to share meaningful messages with the student-athletes.

The 2023 Small College Basketball Hall of Fame Classic field includes nine programs playing in the event for the first time. In addition to the Classic, there are five other basketball tournaments with D2 CCA exemptions this November. Other hosts are Montana State Billings (10-team women's tournament), Lubbock Christian (six-team men's and women's tournaments) and Simon Fraser (six-team men's and women's tournaments).

In total, 44 DII teams representing all eight regions and 18 of the Division's 23 conferences will compete in this year's D2 CCA exempt tournaments. All events take place the weekend of November 3-5.
