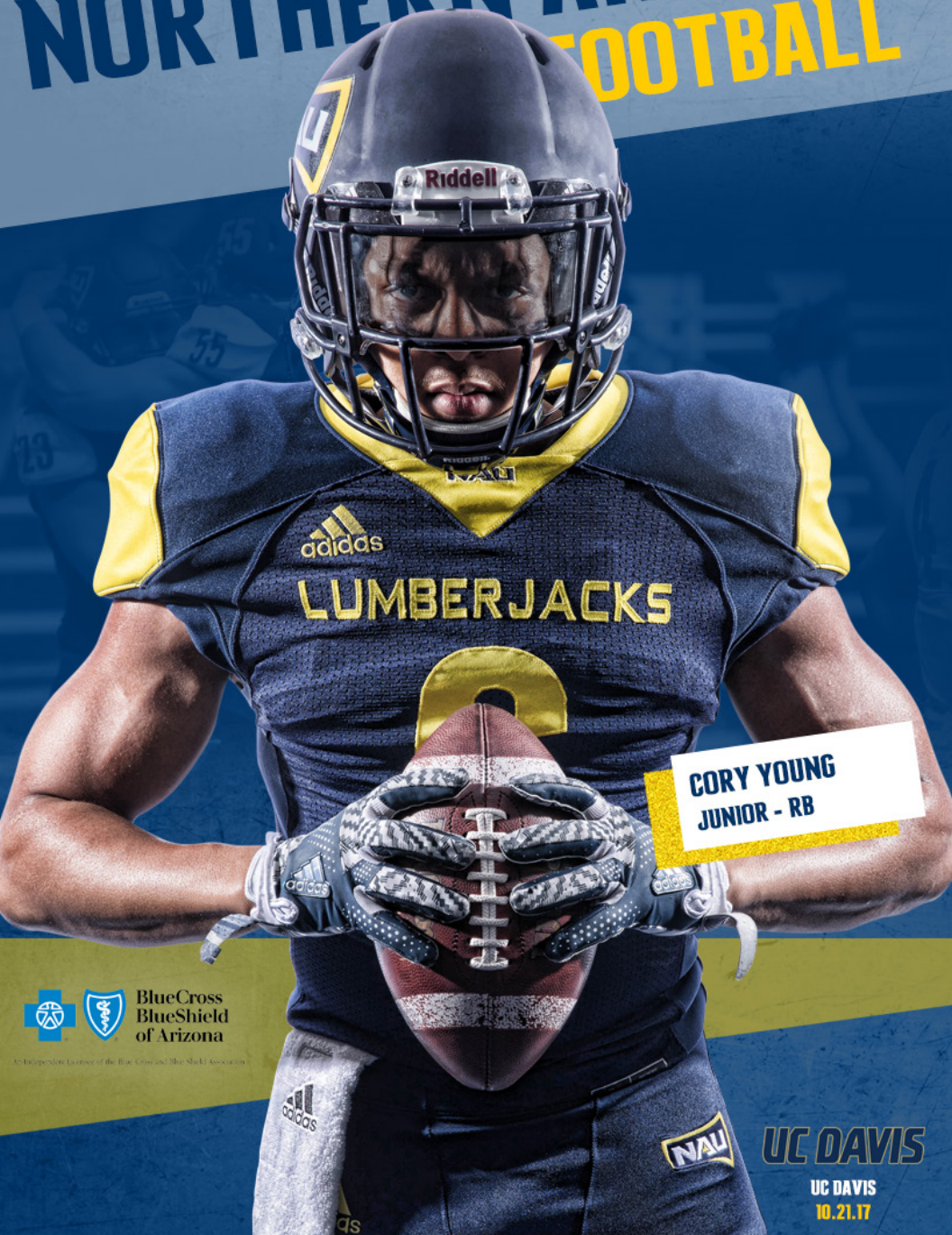

LUMBERJACKS VERSUS AGGIES


Storylines

- Northern Arizona leads the all-time series with UC Davis 3-1. The Lumberjacks dropped the most previous meeting to the Aggies 38-24 on Oct. 10, 2015. The last time the Aggies paid a visit to Flagstaff came on Nov. 8, 2014 and resulted in a 23-21 victory for the Lumberjacks.
- The Lumberjacks are currently ranked No. 22 in the most recent NCAA FCS Coaches Top 25 rankings with a total of 102 points. NAU is slotted as the first team outside of the STATS FCS Poll at No. 26 with 276 points.
- NAU quarterback Case Cookus was named as ROOT SPORTS Big Sky Offensive Player of the Week following last week's win at Portland State. The selection marks the fourth consecutive week that at least one Lumberjack has received a Big Sky Player of the Week award.
- Defensively, the Lumberjacks have been on a historic run over the past four games as they have limited their opponents to 20 points or less over that span – the longest streak for the program since 1995.

Did You Know?

- Current UC Davis offensive coordinator Tim Plough and defensive backs coach Cha'pelle Brown were members of the Lumberjacks' coaching staff last season.

LUMBERJACKS TO WATCH



CASE COOKUS SOPHOMORE • QUARTERBACK

Case Cookus is the quarterback of the nation's sixth-leading passing offense and is on quite a roll during NAU's current four-game winning streak. Over the last four games, Cookus has completed 63.7 percent of his passes and thrown for 1,404 yards with an astounding 14 touchdowns and zero interceptions. He has gone a 195 pass attempts without throwing a pick. Last week in the Lumberjacks' 42-20 win at Portland State, Cookus completed 23-of-39 passes for 347 yards and four touchdowns to earn ROOT SPORTS Big Sky Offensive Player of the Week for the second consecutive week. He eclipsed 6,000 career passing yards in the game and moved into seventh place on the NAU career passing yards list. Cookus ranks eighth nationally this season with 1,931 passing yards.



MAURICE DAVISON JUNIOR • CORNERBACK

Maurice Davison might have had the play of the game in NAU's victory at Portland State last Saturday, as it started a stretch of 28 unanswered points by the 'Jacks to break open a close contest. With NAU's lead trimmed to just 14-13, Davison picked off the Vikings' Josh Kraght and returned it 25 yards untouched to the endzone for his first pick-six of his career. It was the second consecutive week in which Davison recorded an interception and he is now tied for sixth in the conference in the category. This season, he has tallied 22 tackles and leads the Lumberjacks with five pass break-ups. Counting his two interceptions, Davison ranks 40th in the FCS with 1.2 passes defended per game.



ELIJAH MARKS SENIOR • WIDE RECEIVER

Elijah Marks leads all of FCS with 177.0 all-purpose yards per game, and is fifth in all of Division I when taking into account FBS players. Marks also ranks fifth in the FCS with 128.5 receiving yards per game and sixth with 771 receiving yards. He eclipsed his previous season-high total - in just the sixth game of the season - on the road at Portland State last Saturday with 173 yards on six receptions. It marked his fifth 100-yard receiving game this season and he scored a touchdown in the fourth consecutive contest. His five touchdown receptions leads the team and is tied for second-most in the Big Sky. With each passing game in his huge senior year, Marks continues to climb the all-time Lumberjack charts as he now ranks 10th in career receiving yards and tied for fifth in career touchdown catches.

Rita Hartung Cheng serves as the 16th president of Northern Arizona University. Under her leadership, NAU has engaged in a strategic planning

effort to position the university to thrive in the fast-changing environment of higher education. President Cheng's focus is to expand on the university's historical strengths, providing access to an affordable quality education for all students and pursuing the discovery, advancement and application of knowledge in research areas unique and important to the region.

Dr. Cheng has set a bold vision of excellence for Northern Arizona University through student-centered teaching, a robust research environment, an extensive global engagement program, and inclusive support services focused on student success and completion. President Cheng's vision and direction has resulted in a significant increase NAU's education abroad program, increases in the enrollment of international students and is moving NAU closer to becoming the leading university serving Native Americans. She is also guiding an expansion of community and statewide partnerships.

To ensure NAU maintains a vibrant and highly functional campus President Cheng is moving the campus forward with improvements that include an Honors College living and learning community, a new on-campus residential facility with parking, and a recital hall expansion.

President Cheng was previously Chancellor at Southern Illinois University Carbondale. She spent more than 20 years on the faculty the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, serving in various administrative roles including Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. She is internationally recognized for her research in government and nonprofit accounting.

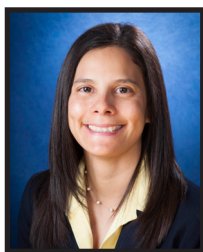

Dr. Lisa Campos was hired in April 2012 as Northern Arizona's Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics. A 2017, Sports-Business Journal Forty Under 40 honoree, Campos has

guided the Lumberjacks to Back-to-Back Big Sky Conference Presidents' Cup trophies; an award that recognizes the department's overall excellence in competition and in the classroom. In 2013, NAU became the fourth institution to win multiple Presidents' Cups, winning their second (first was 2005-06); and then followed it up during the 2013-14 school year.

NAU has captured 32 team conference championships during Campos' time in Flagstaff, while 10 teams have advanced to postseason competition. The Lumberjacks' stellar athletic achievements have led to the men's programs winning the Big Sky All-Sports Trophy four consecutive times from 2014-17. Meanwhile, the women's teams have captured the trophy twice in 2014 and 2017.

The 2016-17 academic year was highlighted with the men's cross country team's NCAA Division I National Championship – the first team national title in school history and the first non-football national title in Big Sky history. With eight conference championships out of the department's 15 NCAA teams, NAU swept the Big Sky All-Sports Trophies for the second time in Campos' tenure.

Academically, a total of 61 student-athletes earned their degrees during the 2016-17 academic year. Four student-athletes received CoSIDA Academic All-District honors, while Rene Coggins (women's basketball) and Tyler Day (cross country/track & field) were named CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in their respective sports. NAU had 123 total stu-

dent-athletes earn All-Academic honors from the Big Sky and Western Athletic Conference. Additionally, Campos and the Lumberjacks continued to give back to the community with the department eclipsing 5,000 service hours for the third straight year.

Campos currently sits on the prestigious NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committee, a subcommittee of the new governance model. She also sits on the Board of Directors for Women's Leaders and for the local United Way of Northern Arizona.

Campos took over the leadership of the NAU Athletics Department – when she became one of 26 females and the youngest in the country to lead a Division I program at the time of her hire – after serving as the Senior Associate Athletic Director at the University of Texas at El Paso from 2006-12.

Currently, Campos is a member of Women's Leaders in College Sports, National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, Football Championship Subdivision Athletics Directors Association and Flagstaff Leadership Program. While at UTEP, she served on a number of NCAA committees.

Campos holds a doctorate degree in Educational Leadership from UTEP. She graduated from Colorado State University with a bachelor's of science degree in Business Administration and a master's of science degree in Student Affairs in Higher Education.

A native of Las Animas, Colo., Campos is married to Darren D'Attilio. They live in Flagstaff with their son, Christopher.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH • JEROME SOUERS



• Head coach Jerome Souers is tied for seventh in the FCS in tenured coaches this upcoming season, as he begins his 20th year in 2017. He is the winningest coach in the Big Sky history, having received that title last season with 112 career victories.

• Last year, Souers and the Lumberjacks were picked to win the Big Sky in both preseason polls, but injuries hindered the Lumberjacks' chances of making that prediction come true. Despite a 5-6 season, NAU had 11 players honored with all-conference accolades, with three picking up first team nods.

• In 2015, NAU positioned itself for a run at the conference crown in the final game, but it came up just short finishing 7-4, 5-3 in Big Sky play and just narrowly missing a spot in the FCS Playoffs.

• With a new offensive scheme in place, Souers became the Big Sky's all-time leader in conference wins with 72. The Lumberjacks averaged 50.8 points per game at home, never scored less than

41 points, and went undefeated at the Walkup Skydome in regular season play for the second time in three years.

• NAU had four players earn All-American accolades, while 14 players earned a total of 15 All-Big Sky honors. The Lumberjacks had six first team selections, while Cookus went on to become the FCS STATS Freshman Player of the Year and the Jerry Rice Award winner. Cookus finished fifth in national offensive player of the year voting, as he was the only freshman on the final ballot.

• In Souers' 17th season with the Lumberjacks, he earned career win No. 100 on November 8, 2014 in a 23-21 defeat over UC Davis at home. Souers became the second coach in Big Sky history to amass 100 victories while coaching in the league.

• Souers, the longest tenured football coach in the history of NAU Football, became the 15th active FCS coach to win 100 games at his current institution.

• During his 19-year tenure, Souers has coached 177 student-athletes to all-conference honors a combined 282 times with 58 first-team selections and 84 All-American accolades.

• In the classroom, the football program has produced the Golden Eagle Scholar Athlete of the Year nine times (Blair Boynton, Eric Damko, Steve Gomez, Mark Gould, Paul Ernster, Jeff Wheeler, Jake Hess, Austin Hasquet, and Patrick Baldenegro). Overall, the program has earned 176 Big Sky All-Academic honors over the last 19 seasons with seven Academic All-Americans.

• In 2014, the 'Jacks finished with a 7-5 overall record, including a nine-game regular season home win streak dating back to the start of the 2013 season. NAU went 5-3 in league play. The Lumberjacks' four-game win streak saw NAU defeat No. 2 Eastern Washington in a thrilling last second 28-27 victory

in front of 9,699 fans. The win over the Eagles was the first in the Walkup Skydome over a team ranked higher than ninth. NAU's largest crowd of the season saw 11,545 fans pile in the Walkup Skydome as the 'Jacks took down Cal Poly 38-35 in another down to the wire win. Two players received All-American honors and 15 players earned a sum of 17 All-Big Sky accolades in 2015. Off the field, Austin Hasquet became NAU's first National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete, and the first football player to be a two-time First Team Academic All-American.

- The 2013 season saw NAU post a 7-1 league record to finish second in the Big Sky (the highest finish since 2003), and a 9-3 overall record. The Lumberjacks earned an at-large bid to the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) Playoffs for the first time since 2003. Four players earned a total of seven All-American honors, while 19 Lumberjacks earned Big Sky All-Conference accolades. NAU finished the regular season undefeated at home with a 5-0 record. The 'Jacks ranked as high as No. 8 during the season and finished ranked No. 15 in the final polls. NAU also led the FCS in defensive touchdowns. Souers was a recipient of the Johnnie L. Cochran, Jr., Salute to Excellence Award.

- Souers and his team posted an 8-3 overall record in 2012, the best performance since the 2003 season. The record includes tying a school record eight consecutive wins which was sparked by a 17-14 win at UNLV. Included in the win streak was a 28-24 defeat over No. 14 Montana. The win snapped a 14-game losing streak to the Grizzlies and propelled NAU into the top 25 poll. The Lumberjacks had 22 players earn All-Big Sky honors, and three receive All-American accolades. Senior Austin Shanks was named the College Football Performance Awards FCS Punt Returner of the Year.

- On October 4, 2008, Souers became NAU's all-time winningest coach with a 42-10 victory over Sacramento State for win No. 59.

- In 2006, Jason Murrietta had a stellar senior season highlighted by a runner-up finish for the Walter Payton Award, All-America honors and his second Big Sky Conference Offensive Player of the Year Award. He threw for 2,827 yards with a 65.0 completion percentage and a school-record 34 touchdowns, leading the Big Sky in passing efficiency (168.2) and total offense (243.1), while ranking fifth and 11th nationally.

- The 2003 season saw Souers become a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award, an award presented by The Sports Network to the top head coach in I-AA football. Souers led the Lumberjacks to a record-breaking NCAA I-AA Quarterfinal appearance in 2003, and its first Big Sky Conference title since 1978.

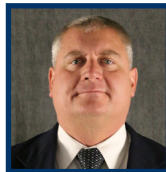
ANDY THOMPSON
Defensive
**Coordinator/
 Linebackers**

- Thompson begins his ninth season as the defensive coordinator and 11th overall as the linebackers coach at Northern Arizona University. He is entering his 13th season overall on the staff after spending his first-two seasons across the line of scrimmage directing the running backs.
- In 2016, Thompson coached linebacker Jake Thomas to All-Big Sky Third Team honors, as he led the NAU defense with 80 tackles.
- Thompson has coached 57 All-Big Sky selections during his time at NAU.
- In 2015, NAU's defense finish tied for third in sacks (27) and opponent fourth down conversions (47.1), and fourth in passes intercepted.
- Coached NAU's first National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete and William V. Campbell Trophy Semifinalist - Austin Hasquet - in 2014. Hasquet also went on to become the first NAU football player to be a two-time CoSIDA All-America First Team selection. Hasquet was named the Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year for NAU, and the Lumberjacks' representative for the same accolade with the Big Sky.



BRIAN SHEPPARD
Offensive
**Coordinator/
 Quarterbacks**

- Brian Sheppard joined Northern Arizona in January 2017 as the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.
- Sheppard arrived at NAU after coaching the previous four years at Indiana State football program. Sheppard served five years with the Sycamores as the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.
- Last season, Indiana State tallied 4,039 yards of total offense (2,698 rushing, 2,417 receiving). The Sycamores threw 20 touchdowns, averaging 245.3 passing yards per game. In 2014, Sheppard helped guide the Sycamores to the school's first FCS Playoff appearance since 1983.
- Prior to Indiana State, Sheppard coached at Willamette, where he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. In Sheppard's first year at Willamette in 2012, the Bearcats finished 8-2 while breaking numerous school records. Willamette ranked No. 10 nationally in total offense, amassing 4,981 yards and 55 touchdowns. Willamette finished the season with the No. 4-ranked passing offense in the nation.



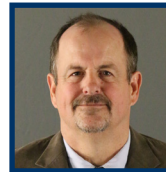
TRAVIS BAKER
Defensive Line

- Joined Northern Arizona University as the defensive line coach in the spring of 2011.
- During the 2016 season, the Lumberjacks recorded 79 tackles for a loss of 328 yards.
- Baker has had at least one player earn all-conference honors every year he has coached at NAU. Headlining the honors was defensive end Siuppeli Anau who earned All-Big Sky First Team accolades in 2016. In 2015, Zach McDonnell continued that line of honors, when he helped NAU's defense finish tied for third in sacks (27) and third in opponent fourth down conversions (47.1). The defensive line also recorded 59 tackles for a loss of 241 yards.



JIMMY BEAL
**Running Backs/
 Tight Ends**

- Begins his eighth season on the Northern Arizona University football staff as the running backs and tight ends coach after joining the Lumberjacks in the fall of 2010.
- Beal's guidance in 2016 led to rookie Joe Logan finishing 15th in the FCS STATS Freshman Player of the Year voting. The Lumberjacks rushed for 1,723 yards as a team and scored 11 rushing touchdowns.
- Keeping up with a strong tradition of running backs in the NAU system, Beal coached Casey Jahn to 1,035 rushing yards to become the 12th player in school history to rush for 1,000 or more yards in a season.



TIM DAVIS
Offensive Line

- Over 30 years of coaching experience at the collegiate and NFL levels. Davis has coached in 16 FBS bowl games, including three Rose Bowls, two Orange Bowls and one Sugar Bowl.
- In 2017, Davis led an offensive line that allowed a mere four sacks through 10 games. NAU ranked third in the Big Sky in total offense with 475.5 yards per game. Blake Porter and Tyler Shank both picked up Second Team All-Big Sky honors for a unit that produced 5,230

yards of offense.

- In his first year at NAU, three of his five linemen earned all-conference honors, while the unit helped produce a 3,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard rusher, and 1,000-yard receiver for only the third time in school history.



GARY HYMAN
Special Teams

- Gary Hyman joined the Northern Arizona football staff in May 2017 as the special teams coordinator.
- Hyman arrived in Flagstaff with over 15 years of coaching experience on his resume. He spent the 2016 season at Indiana State University with current NAU offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Brian Sheppard. While with the Sycamores, Hyman served as the special teams coordinator and tight ends coach.



CRAIG KNOTH
Director of Recruiting/
Player Development

- Begins his 12th season overall and second season as the director of recruiting and player development at Northern Arizona University. Prior to his current role, Knoth coached the tight ends and fullbacks, while coordinating the recruiting efforts for the football program.
- Coached RJ Rickert to his third All-Big Sky honor in 2015. NAU's offensive unit ranked 11th in the nation overall and seventh in scoring offense. The Lumberjacks averaged 39.3 points per game en route to a 5-0 undefeated season at home.



AARON PFLUGRAD
Wide Receivers

- Pflugrad enters his third season with Northern Arizona as the wide receivers coach.
- Pflugrad's coaching style continued to propel All-American wide receiver Emmanuel Butler up the record charts. Butler became the first NAU player to register two 1,000-yard receiving seasons, as he moved into second on the career receiving yards chart. Elijah Marks earned Third Team All-Big Sky honors, while newcomer William Morehand was an honorable mention return specialist.
- In 2016, the NAU receivers racked up 3,507 yards at an average of 318.8 per game. Thirty-four touchdown receptions were recorded for the second most in school history.



VERNON SMITH
Defensive Secondary

- Vernon Smith Jr. joined the Northern Arizona Football coaching staff in March 2017 as the defensive secondary coach.
- Smith arrived at NAU after spending the prior two seasons as the cornerbacks coach at fellow Big Sky member Portland State. While with the Vikings, Smith helped coach Portland State to a second round appearance in the 2015 NCAA FCS Playoffs. During his time in Portland, Smith guided both of his starting cornerbacks to All-Big Sky honors his first year, following it up the next season with Xavier Coleman receiving All-Big Sky and Associated Press All-American honors in 2016.



CODY VONAPPEN
Safeties

- Cody VonAppen enters his second season as the safeties coach for the Northern Arizona football program and fourth season overall.
- In his first year as the safeties coach, the secondary had 42 pass breakups and eight interceptions.
- As a graduate assistant, VonAppen worked primarily with the defensive coaching staff, assisting with the scouting and breakdown of opponents, as well as developing daily practice schedules.

The Big Sky Conference enters its 55th year and 29th year of women's competition during the 2017-18 season.

The Conference was established in 1963 by six charter members – Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga, Montana, Montana State and Weber State. The name originated in a novel written by A.B. Guthrie of Great Falls, MT, entitled "The Big Sky". Former Montana advertising director, Jack Hollowell, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. While on a track-and-field trip from Pocatello, ID to Missoula, MT, legendary Dubby Holt of Idaho State saw a "Welcome to Big Sky Country" sign as his team entered Montana. Holt and his athletes thought "Big Sky" would be a perfect name for the new conference, and Harry Missildine of the Spokane Spokesman-Review called for the newly formed league to be named the Big Sky Conference in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963. The name "Big Sky" was adopted by the six presidents of the charter members as the name of the new conference on February 25, 1963.

The Big Sky's full membership represents nine states, spanning from the Pacific Ocean to the Red River Valley of North Dakota. The league is represented along the entire west coast with institutions in Washington, Oregon and California. League schools also range up and down the Rocky Mountains with institutions in Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona and Colorado.

Four of the current league members - Idaho State, Montana, Montana State and Weber State - have been with the league since its birth. Northern Arizona enters its 47th season in the league, giving the league five members with at least 45 years of continuous membership. The Conference welcomed North Dakota and Southern Utah on

July 1, 2012 as full members and UC Davis and Cal Poly as football affiliate members. Hartford and Binghamton joined the Big Sky as affiliate members in men's golf in 2014, and Idaho returned most of its sports to the Conference that same year. Eastern Washington, Northern Colorado, Portland State and Sacramento State round out the current membership.

The Big Sky is one of three conferences in the western United States playing Division I football and is a national leader in the Football Championship Subdivision. Big Sky teams have won the Division I National Championship seven times, including Eastern Washington most recently in 2010. In 2017, Northern Arizona won the NCAA Division I Men's Cross Country National Championship, making them the first team to win a national championship in a sport other than football. Currently, the Conference sponsors championships in 16 sports (nine women's and seven men's sports), including softball, women's soccer, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track and field, basketball, golf, and tennis.

Andrea Williams serves as the Conference Commissioner. She is the first woman and first African-American to head the Conference. Williams took over the helm as Commissioner on July 1, 2016. She replaced Doug Fullerton who retired after 21 years of service to the Conference. Previous Commissioners include Ron Stephenson (1981-95), Steve Belko (1977-81), John Roning (1971-77), and Jack Friel (1963-71).

ABOUT THE WALKUP SKYDOME

The J. Lawrence Walkup Skydome is home to the Northern Arizona football, men's and women's basketball, and indoor track & field. It is one of the most unique venues in all of college athletics will open for its 41st year as the entertainment center for northern Arizona.

After a logo rebranding in April 2014, the Skydome turf was rebranded with NAU's newest logo in the center of the field and the wordmark in both end-zones.

The building underwent a major renovation from Dec. 2010 - Sept. 9, 2011, at a cost of \$26 million. The scope of the project included bringing the fire, life and safety up to code while remodeling the bathrooms, concourse, offices, suites, locker rooms and press box. The athletic training and equipment on the main floor were also remodeled and three elevators were added to the complex.

Fans enter the building to a panoramic view of the field on the east and west concourses. Capacity was reduced to 10,000 with 21-inch wide chair back seating being added.

The construction of the Skydome began in the fall of 1975, and the facility was completed in September 1977. Seating capacity for football originally was 15,000 and 7,000 for basketball.

What is the age limit for my child to get in free?

JEROME SOUERS RETROSPECTIVE: 2006-2009

The 2006 Northern Arizona football season put together the first of what would be three consecutive winning seasons for the program. The Lumberjacks finished 6-5 overall in 2006 despite a schedule that saw them open up with back-to-back games against FCS programs Arizona State and Utah.

In 2006, quarterback Jason Murrietta enjoyed a remarkable senior campaign highlighted by a runner-up finish for the Walter Payton Award, All-America honors and his second Big Sky Conference Offensive Player of the Year Award.

Murrietta threw for 2,827 yards with a 65.0 completion percentage and a school-record 34 touchdowns, leading the Big Sky in passing efficiency (168.2) and total offense (243.1), while ranking fifth and 11th nationally.

The 2007 season saw the Lumberjacks finish with a 6-5 overall mark and a 5-3 record in Big Sky Conference action - good for a third place finish in the conference, the program's best Big Sky finish since 2003.

The 'Jacks played tough on the road in 2007 as they matched a school-record with three wins away from home in Big Sky Conference action. In addition, NAU was the only team in the nation to have a trio of running backs rank among the top 100 rushers nationally.

The 2008 season featured one of the most special moments in Northern Arizona head coach Jerome Souers' career as he became the winningest coach in the program's history following a 42-10 victory

over Sacramento State. The win marked the 59th of Souers' career and moved him past Max Spilsbury (1956-64) for the most wins by a Lumberjack head coach.

In 2009, the Lumberjacks opened the season by ripping off wins in five of their first seven games. The only losses in that stretch were at Arizona and an overtime loss against Big Sky rival Montana by a 41-34 margin.

Defensive back K.J. Gerard signed a free agent NFL deal and spent the following season with the Baltimore Ravens before moving on to play with the Chicago Bears (2010) and Miami Dolphins (2011).

In addition, running back Gerald Commissiong signed a deal with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League (CFL) in 2007, while punter/kicker Robbie Dehaze inked with the Atlanta Falcons in 2008 before seeing time in the CFL with the Toronto Argonauts in 2010.

LUMBERJACK DEFENSE SHUTTING IT DOWN

Sure, the Northern Arizona football team has one of the most explosive offenses in the nation. With Case Cookus slinging it to Elijah Marks and company as part of NAU's sixth-ranked passing offense, the Lumberjacks are lighting up the scoreboard.

However, the old adage is defense wins championships – and NAU's defense is lights out right now. Riding a four-game overall winning streak in which the Lumberjacks have an average winning margin of 22 points, the Lumberjacks are showcasing a complete turnaround on the defensive side of the ball which could very well propel them to their first NCAA FCS Playoff appearance since 2013.

During their current four-game win streak heading into today's game versus UC Davis in the Skydome, NAU has limited its four opponents to 20 points or less – marking the first time the Lumberjacks have achieved the feat since before the turn of the century in 1995. If that is not impressive enough, in that span NAU has lined up against a variety of offensive schemes including Cal Poly's triple option, Northern Colorado's downfield aerial attack, Illinois State's ground and pound rushing game and Portland State's multi-dimensional look.

Defensive coordinator Andy Thompson – NAU's longest tenured assistant coach at 13 years – has remained unfazed through it all and has game planned the Lumberjack defense to wide amounts of success.

"There are a number of players playing at a high level when it comes to their effort and their technique," Thompson said. "They're executing with all 11 guys playing together as one. When you do that, you give yourself a great chance to have good results and I'm proud of the effort they're putting forth."

NAU's stout defense is a remade unit after the Lumberjacks lost nine of 11 starters from a year ago, including five of their top six tacklers. Six games into this season – with a 4-2 record that matches the 2013 playoff team's mark through six games – and NAU's top three tacklers Byron Evans, Wes Sutton and Kam'ron Johnson have already eclipsed their previous career-high totals for a season.

While the defense is flying high, the secondary has quite frankly been a no fly zone. The ball-hawking unit comprised of Sutton and Johnson at safety, Maurice Davison and Khalil Dorsey at cornerback and Joshua Clarke at nickelback has been the biggest reason for the Lumberjacks' defensive turnaround.

The 'Jacks are allowing a Big Sky low 188.0 passing yards per game, which ranks 30th in the country. In comparison, opponents threw for an average of just under 260 yards per game last season.

The secondary, which also includes key players like Andrew Gose and Cole Sterns, is getting the attention, but Thompson is quick to point out that it starts with the guys on the front line.

"It's a group effort starting with our defensive line and our linebackers creating havoc," Thompson said. "The quarterback is forced to throw the ball into some places and our secondary has been right on point. I don't want to take away from what the secondary is doing, but it's been a group effort."

Led by Johnson's team-high three interceptions, NAU paces the Big Sky Conference with 11 picks – nine of which have come during the Lumberjacks' current win streak. Furthermore, a number of those interceptions have come in big moments.

On Sept. 23 at Cal Poly, the Mustangs were on the move and in Lumberjack territory with their eyes on making it a two-possession game. However, Sutton intercepted Cal Poly's Khaleel Jenkins in the end zone with six minutes remaining in the game to seal a 28-10 win.

The next week, a 48-20 rout of Northern Colorado in the Skydome was sparked by the defense's turnovers. Ahead 7-0 in the second quarter, Johnson's interception of Jacob Knipp was converted into

a touchdown. On the following possession, Davison's devastating hit on the Bears' Hakeem Deggs resulted in a fumble that NAU again turned into a score which turned a touchdown game to a 20-0 score the 'Jacks never relinquished. Not to mention, Taylor Powell's 85-yard pick-six to cap the scoring and send the Blue & Gold fans into a frenzy in the fourth quarter.

Then there was last Saturday's win at Portland State in which the Vikings had trimmed the Lumberjacks' lead to 14-13 midway through the third quarter. With momentum working against them, NAU received a jolt from Davison's 25-yard interception return for a touchdown, which was followed by a Cole Sterns interception on the very next possession. Of

course, the Lumberjacks' offense converted that into a score and 28 unanswered points later – NAU was well on its way to a 42-20 victory.

So while the Cookus, Marks and the offense is doing their thing, do not forget about their defensive counterparts. The secondary is making plays and with UC Davis bringing the Big Sky's top offense into the Skydome on Saturday, believe that they will be up to the task again.

**ABBY AKIN SOPHOMORE • VOLLEYBALL**

Abby Akin, last season's Big Sky Outstanding Freshman, has avoided a sophomore slump and has been one of the Lumberjacks' most productive players on the court this season. In league play, she currently ranks second in hitting percentage (.415), total blocks (38) and blocks per set (1.27). Akin also is tied for seventh in aces per set (0.37). Against unbeaten Sacramento State on Saturday, Oct. 14, Akin knocked down a career-high 14 kills and matched her season-high with seven blocks. For the season, Akin leads the 'Jacks with 69 blocks and 26 service aces in addition to averaging a career-best 1.78 kills per set on .346 hitting.

**KYLIE GOO SENIOR • WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY**

Kylie Goo helped the Northern Arizona University cross country team to a 10th-place performance at the Pre-Nationals, hosted by the University of Louisville on Saturday, Oct. 14. Goo finished in 83rd with a time of 21:01.4 and helped NAU make a statement against one of the top fields in the sport this season. The team is looking for their first NCAA Championship berth in 10 seasons, with last Saturday's result helping them towards that goal. The Lumberjacks are getting ready to defend their title at the Big Sky Championships on Saturday, Oct. 28.

**ANDY TROUARD SENIOR • MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY**

Andy Trouard finished in third place as the Northern Arizona University cross country team won the prestigious University of Wisconsin's Nuttycombe Invitational in dominating fashion on Friday, Oct. 13. Trouard paced the men with a time of 23:40.9 for the 8K course as the Lumberjacks won the meet title in back-to-back seasons. The Lumberjacks placed three runners in the top five of the meet, and had all five scoring athletes in the top 21 of the race. NAU finished with 50 points, beating the next closest team by 73. It was a 28 point higher finish than the championship performance from a year ago. NAU is getting prepared for the Big Sky Championships on Saturday, Oct. 28.

**MADELINE WASZAK JUNIOR • SOCCER**

Madeline Waszak has been one of the leading upperclassman for the Lumberjacks this season. She currently is tied for second with eight points behind senior Adrian Nixt, with three goals and two assists. Waszak has played in every game, starting in 14, and recording 966 minutes played. Waszak's most recent goal was against Idaho State on Sunday, Oct. 15, when the 'Jacks dominated the Bengals in a 4-0 shutout - their highest scoring game so far. Waszak has already surpassed her freshman and sophomore year season stats, making this her most successful season for the Blue & Gold.
