



**Mike Adras**  
**Head Coach**

Mike Adras has led the Northern Arizona University men's basketball to success on and off the court in his 11 years since taking over the direction of the program.

Adras has coached some of the top performers in school and Big Sky Conference history. The accolades of his student-athletes includes four of the top five scorers and the top eight three-point shooters in school history, as well as the top two assist leaders in league history. In fact, the top two three-point shooters in NCAA history were both Adras products.

The individual successes have trans-

ferred into team success. The Lumberjacks have won 82 games over the last five seasons, while winning back-to-back Big Sky Conference regular season titles (2005-06, 2006-06) and making three Big Sky Tournament Championship game appearances (2006, 2007, 2008).

In 2005-06, Adras was selected the Big Sky Conference Men's Basketball Coach of the Year by his league peers. NAU went 12-2 in Big Sky Conference play, winning the regular-season title for the first time since 1998. The Lumberjacks were coming off an 11-17 campaign and were picked to finish fourth by the coaches and fifth by the media in the preseason polls.

The Lumberjacks earned a berth in the National Invitational Tournament, recording 21 victories to tie the most in school history and enjoyed a 10-game winning streak during the regular season. At the time, it was the longest winning streak in the nation among Division I institutions. The Lumberjacks went 7-0 at home in league play, and started conference play by winning seven straight. The Lumberjacks hosted the conference tournament, advancing to the title game. The Lumberjacks attracted three of the top six crowds and four of the top 11 overall in the last decade during the season. NAU capped the season by hosting a first round NIT game against Delaware State in the Walkup Skydome.

In 2006-07, the Lumberjacks repeated the league regular season title, tying with Weber State. NAU won back-to-back titles for the first time since winning in 1996-97 and 1997-98. Boykin, Jr., finished his record-breaking career as the only player in school history to record more than 1,350 points and 800 rebounds.

In 2007-08, NAU tied a school record with 21 overall wins, finishing second in the Big Sky Conference regular season standings with an 11-5 record and advancing to the championship game for the third consecutive season. NAU finished 14th in Division I in field goal percentage as a team at 48.3 percent.

During his tenure, Adras has led the program into the postseason in nine of his 11 seasons at the helm. The Lumberjacks have earned an NCAA Tournament and NIT berth, played in five Big Sky Conference Championship games and played a style of basketball that has led to record-breaking performances and historical upsets of teams like Arizona State, UCLA and UNLV. He has won over 160 games over that span, is the second-most winningest coach in school history, fifth-best in Big Sky history and is one of only 13 coaches in Big Sky history to amass 100 career wins. In the classroom, the Lumberjacks have garnered 31 Big Sky All-Academic honors, the second-best total over the last 11 years.

In 2005-06, Kelly Golob left the program not only as the school's all-time leading scorer but one of the most decorated student-athletes in the history of the school. He was named to the 2006 ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America® Men's Basketball Second Team, as selected by the

College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). He was also awarded an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship, becoming the first NAU student-athlete to earn the scholarship since former football player Jake Crissup was selected for the postgraduate award in 2000 and just the 11th recipient in school history. He was also a Golden Axe Award recipient for outstanding achievement and distinguished service to the university, as well as the Golden Eagle Male Scholar Athlete of the Year.

Adras has now graduated 31 of the 38 players who have finished their careers during his tenure. His teams have recorded the seven highest semester GPAs in the history of the program and posted a program-record 3.09 GPA for the spring semester in 2005.

He has tutored numerous Big Sky all-conference players, including Tyrone Bazy, Ruben Boykin, Jr., Matt Gebhart, Kelly Golob, Ross Land, Kyle Landry, Dan McClintock, Ryan McDade, Stephen Sir, Cory Schwab and Josh Wilson among others. McDade, a three-time honoree from the Big Sky, was named the conference's defensive player of the year in 2002-2003 while Land was the 2000 Big Sky Conference tournament MVP. Bazy was named the Big Sky Newcomer of the Year in 2005-06.

Several Lumberjacks have played professionally after leaving the Mountain campus. Dan McClintock and Ross Land, who were recruited by Adras and were seniors on his first squad, both went on to success playing professionally. Land played overseas for three seasons, while McClintock, who went from project to prospect during his five seasons on campus, became the first NAU player taken in the NBA draft in over 20 years with his second-round selection by the Denver Nuggets. He most recently

played overseas for the SLUC Nancy in the French Pro A League. Overall, 15 players have played professional basketball during his tenure with the program.

The list of achievements result from the standards installed since he joined the program 18 years ago. After seven seasons as an assistant he took over as head coach on April 5, 1999 and he has continued the success that has seen the program achieve new heights. Adras inherited the program from Ben Howland, the current head coach at UCLA.

In his first season as head coach, Adras led NAU into NCAA Tournament action for just the second time in school history. Playing in the West Regional in Tucson, Ariz., the Lumberjacks dropped a five-point decision 61-56 to second-seeded St. John's after leading the Red Storm with 10.9 seconds remaining in the contest. NAU earned the Big Sky automatic berth by claiming the conference tournament title with an 85-81 overtime victory over Cal State Northridge to cap a stretch in which the Lumberjacks won 14 of the final 15 games.

His first-year success made him the winningest first-year coach in program history. He was also one of three coaches in Division I to lead his team to the NCAA Tournament in his first year as a head coach and one of three to win 20 games in his first season.

Adras' "Recruit to Shoot" theme has continued as the reputation of his NAU teams. The Lumberjacks, which led the nation in three-point shooting in 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2007, have been among the national top 30 in eight of the 11 seasons under Adras highlighted by the top ranking in 2006-07 at 42.6 percent beyond the arc. Former standout Aaron Bond ranked among the national leaders in 2002-03 with 50 percent mark, leading the Big Sky

Conference, while Golob was the top shooting freshmen and sophomore in the country his first two seasons. In 2000-01, Cory Schwab set a NAU single season mark for three-pointers in a season (105). In 2005-06, Steve Sir led the nation in 3-pt field goal percentage, while the team accomplished a feat unequalled in Division I - NAU was the only team in the nation to rank among the NCAA Division Top 15 in field-goal percentage (8th), three-point field goal percentage (9th) and free throw percentage (14th). Sir again was a national leader in 2006-07, topping Division I in three-point field goals made per game and finishing third overall in three-point percentage.

NAU is one of three schools to rank among the top 35 in NCAA Division I in field goal percentage in each of the last five seasons (Kansas, Gonzaga). NAU was the only school to rank among the top 15 each season from 2006-09. During the last five seasons, the Lumberjacks ranked eighth in 2005-06, seventh in 2006-07, 14th in 2007-08 and 13th in 2008-09 in field goal percentage.

Adras produced one of his best coaching performances on the floor in 2003-04. Picked to finish seventh prior to the season by the coaches and media, the Lumberjacks tied for second overall in the league standings. They advanced to the conference title game and led the league in scoring at 75.9 points per game, ranking among the top-20 teams nationally in three-point field goals per game (8.4) and three-point goal percentage (.391). Individually, senior Aaron Bond had the best season of his career en route to All-Big Sky honors.

During the 2003-2004 campaign the Lumberjacks started hot, winning nine of the first 12 contests, including a 67-63 win at Pauley Pavilion against 10-time national champion UCLA. It marked the best non-conference record in 23 years en route to

qualifying for Big Sky postseason play again.

Adras' instant success at the helm of the NAU program as the 23rd coach in the history of the program was no surprise. He was instrumental in helping turn around the Lumberjack basketball program from a league also-ran to a conference and regional power. The Jacks earned national recognition during Adras' tenure as an assistant, becoming the first team to lead the nation in three-point field-goal percentage three seasons in a row. NAU also became only the second team in NCAA history to be tops in the nation from three-point land in three different seasons and was the first school in NCAA history to lead the nation in both field-goal percentage and three-point percentage (1998-99) in the same year. During the 1996-97 season, Adras helped coach the Lumberjacks to the 10th-largest turnaround in NCAA history when NAU followed up a 6-20 (1995-96) season with a 21-7 record.

As an assistant, Adras handled the responsibility of coaching the Lumberjack post players, producing two of the more notable NAU big men in school history. Former all-conference center Casey Frank and McClintock became two of the top shooters in the country, leaving a mark on the school record books in the process.

McClintock finished his standout career as the career leader in blocked shots (196) and all-time field-goal percentage (.632) leader. He also completed his career as the third-leading scorer (1,363). As a sophomore, McClintock was named Big Sky Conference tournament MVP for his 33 point, 10 rebound effort with four blocked shots in 31 minutes of play in the championship game that gave NAU its first NCAA Tournament appearance.

Adras received his bachelor's degree in history from UC Santa Barbara and holds a master's degree in educational administration from Nova University. After stints as a graduate assistant at UCSB and San Jose State, Adras moved into the high-school

ranks at his alma mater, Las Vegas Bishop Gorman, where he won two state titles as a player. After serving as the junior-varsity coach, he was promoted to head coach and promptly won two more state championships. His tenure in the prep ranks included a 144-54 overall record, four state titles and a pair of Nevada coach of the year awards. He also served as a head coach in the 1990 McDonald's Western Classic in Tucson.

At Gorman, Adras tutored a string of standouts, including future NBA players Brian Williams (Bison Dele) and Arizona standout Matt Othick.

Adras then left the prep ranks for Drake, where he spent one season before moving to Flagstaff. Adras speaks annually at clinics across the country and recently across borders, conducting a coaching clinic in Mexico. He recently participates in the first International Basketball Coaches Clinic hosted by ACS (American Community Schools) Athens in Halandri Athens, Greece in October of 2009.

He served seven seasons as one of the national voters on the CollegeInsider.com Mid-Major Top 25 poll and is a current member of the NCAA West Region selection committee. In 2006, USA Today chose him to represent the Big Sky Conference on its national coaches poll panel and he is entering his fifth season as a weekly voter in the national poll.

He is married to the former Maureen Linse. The couple has two daughters, Rachel who is 13, and Natalie, who will turn 10 in June.

## Jay Collins Assistant Coach

Jay Collins was named an assistant coach for the Northern Arizona men's basketball program in June 2010.

He joins the program after spending three seasons at Cochise College in Douglas, Ariz., serving as an assistant and recruiting coordinator under Head Coach Jerry Carrillo. He helped the team to the Region 1 runner-up finish in both 2008-09 and 2009-10, averaging 22 wins over his three seasons with the Apaches. Cochise led the league in scoring in 2009-10 at 91.5 points per game, finishing with a 26-4 overall record and a 20-2 mark in the ACCAC.

He coached seven student-athletes who signed with Division I programs during his tenure at Cochise, including current NAU senior DeAngelo Jones, who earned All-ACCAC first-team honors in 2009 and ranked 28th in the country in scoring in the NJCCA with 19.5 points per game scoring

average.

Prior to Cochise, Collins served as an assistant at Upper Iowa University for the 2006-07 season and began his coaching career on the staff at the University of Texas-Pan American in 2005-06.

Collins, who is a native of Farmington, New Mexico, was a NJCAA All-America third-team selection at Cochise, leading the team to its second consecutive trip to the National Tournament in 2000-01. He played his final two seasons at Southern Utah (2001-03). He was named to the All-Newcomer Team and Mid-Continent Conference. He set the school single-season assist mark (178) and ranks among the career top 10 despite playing only two seasons.

Collins, 29, attended the NAU basketball camp growing up and later coached at the camp. He played against the Lumberjacks twice during his senior season at Southern Utah. He played professionally with the Idaho Stampede of the NBDL in 2003.

He has a history degree with a minor in physical education from Southern Utah University in 2003 and worked towards his master of arts degree in history at Texas-Pan American.

Will Hensley begins his fifth season overall on the basketball staff and second year as a full-time assistant. He coached as a student assistant for three seasons and played two seasons for the Lumberjacks before his playing career was shortened by an injury.

In his first full-time season, the Lumberjacks qualified for the Big Sky Tournament while ranking 29th in NCAA Division I in field goal percentage at 47.1 percent. Hensley tutored junior Shane Johannsen, who ranked second in the Big Sky in field goal percentage at 62.9, the fourth-best single-season total in school history. Senior Nick Larson also had his most productive season of his career, scoring 7.0

points and grabbing 6.5 rebounds. He ranked fifth in the conference in rebounding overall.

As a student assistant, Hensley assisted the coaching staff in all aspects of the daily basketball operation. He was also responsible for all team travel for the program.

In his four seasons, NAU has won a combined 60 games, advancing to the Big Sky Championship game two times and winning a school-record tying 21 games in 2007-08.

During the 2008 summer, Hensley worked 10 summer camps across the country. In addition to the NAU team and day camps, he worked at the UCLA Elite Camp, as well as camps at Baylor, Texas A&M and for Five Star Basketball.

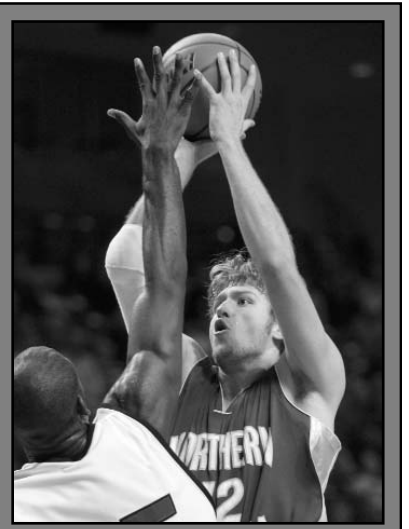
The Midlothian, Texas, native saw action in all 32 games with one start during the 2005-06 season. He played an integral part in the team's Big Sky Conference regular season title and NIT berth. He averaged 3.5 points per game on the season. He scored seven points in the Big Sky Tournament semi-final game against Sacramento State. He recorded his career-best game against Johnson & Wales with 14 points and eight rebounds. He was awarded a medical redshirt for his initial season that saw him see action in nine games before missing the final 18 games due to injury and illness (spiral meningitis).

A 2004 graduate of Midlothian High School, Hensley was a four-year starter, the first in school history, and letterwinner. He was selected first-team Texas Region II and second-team Texas all-state, while earning district all-academic team and Texas Association of Basketball Coaches All Academic State honors. He averaged 18.8 ppg., 9.1 rpg. and 3.3 blocks as a senior, setting school records for blocked shots in a season (99), career blocks (286), career rebounds (786) and career points (1790). He also set the single-game mark with 13 blocks versus nationally-ranked Cedar Hill.

He graduated with a degree in history/education in May 2009. He is engaged to Megan Wyatt, who played volleyball at NAU and is also a graduate of the school.

Quintin Grogan begins his second season as an assistant coach at Northern Arizona University. He assists with all aspects of the daily operations of the program and serves as the recruiting coordinator.

In his first full-time season, the Lumberjacks qualified for the Big Sky Tournament while ranking 29th in NCAA Division I in field goal percentage at 47.1 percent. Junior Cameron Jones was one of three unanimous selections to the All-Big Sky first team. He was the only player in the Big Sky Conference to rank among the top 15 in points, rebounds, assists and field goal percentage. He finished the season ranked among the Big Sky leaders in

points (19.3, 2nd), rebounds (4.6, 16th), assists (2.8, 11th), field-goal percentage (50.2, 9th), free throw percentage (74.3, 13th) and three-point percentage (42.3, 7th).

Grogan came to NAU after serving as an assistant coach at Division II Metropolitan State College of Denver. He helped Metro State to the MAC Eastern Division, RMAC regular season and RMAC Shootout championships. They finished the season with a NCAA Tournament Central Regional appearance in 2009, recording a 27-4 overall record with an 18-1 conference mark. The Roadrunners lost to defending champion Winona State in the NCAA Tournament.

Grogan tutored three players who earned RMAC all-conference honors including RMAC most valuable player Jesse Wagstaff, who earned second-team All-America honors and was named to the ESPN the Magazine/CoSIDA first team Academic All-America squad. He also assisted the players and coaches of the NBA Denver Nuggets with off season individual skill development in 2009.

Prior to Metro State, he was an assistant coach at Los Angeles Southwest College from 2006-07. He was elevated to the associate head coach in 2007-08, leading the team to the South Coast Conference South Division title. During his time at LA Southwest he worked under legendary

Head Coach Reggie Morris, who also served as Grogan's high school coach.

He began his coaching career at Marshall Fundamental High School in Pasadena, Calif., starting as the junior varsity head coach from 2001-02. He was promoted to head coach serving from 2002-06 in addition to athletic director duties from 2002-03. He guided the team to four consecutive California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) playoff berths.

Grogan coached in the Nike Summer Pro League in 2006 and the Drew League in the summers of 2006 and 2007. He also started the Pasadena Hoops AAU team in 2004, serving as the head coach for two seasons. Also, Grogan coached in the nationally-ranked Compton Magic AAU program. He played collegiately at Skagit Valley College from 1979-80 before transferring to CS-Long Beach, where he played for Los Angeles Lakers and Chicago Bulls assistant Tex Winters. During the summer of 1980, he played in the Adidas Olympic Development League.

Grogan served as an elementary, middle and high school social science teacher in Pasadena and Los Angeles school districts from 2000-08.

Grogan has a B.S. degree in business administration from CS-Dominguez Hills.
