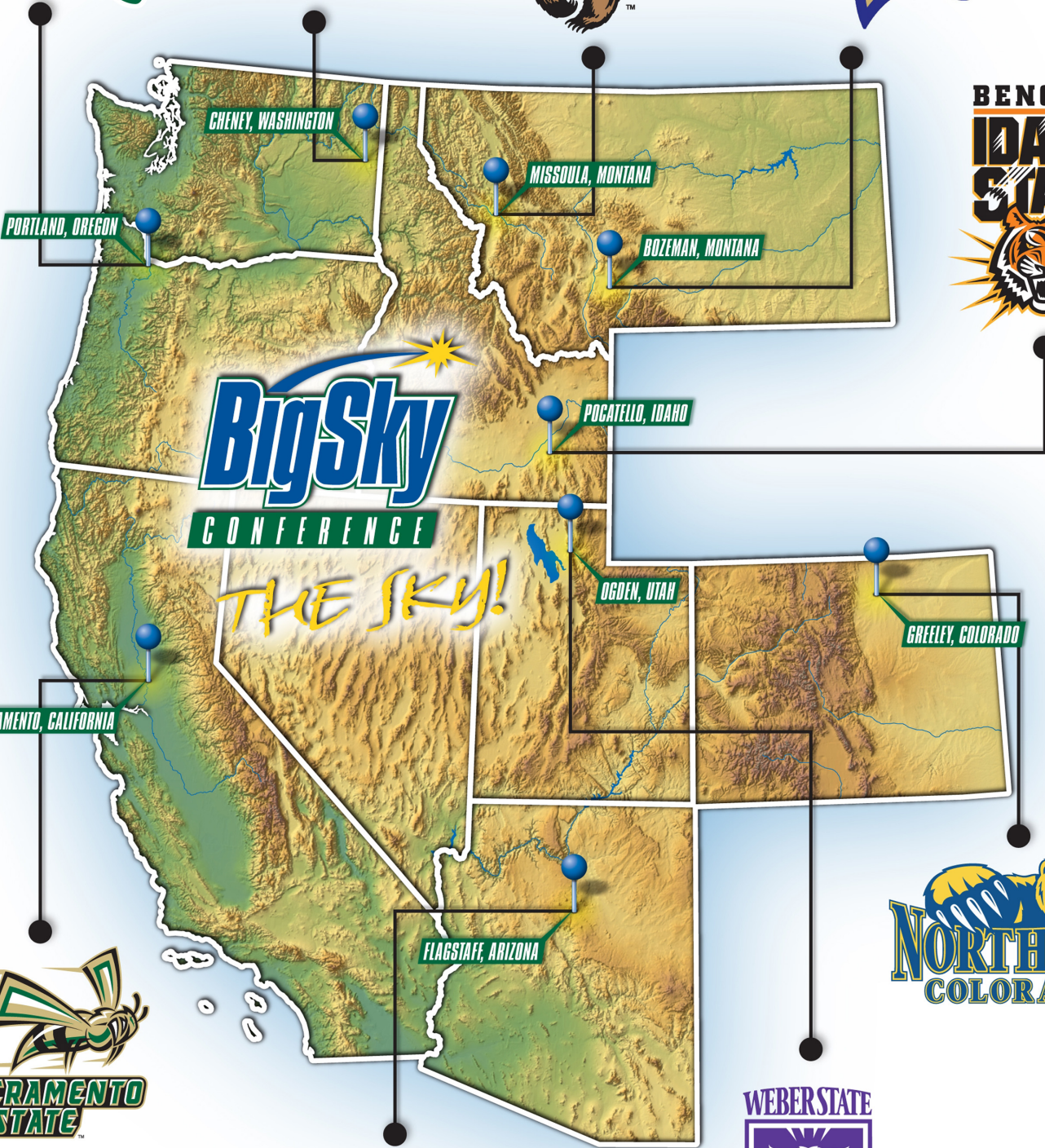

## DR. JOHN HAEGER



John D. Haeger leads Northern Arizona University in its commitment to undergraduate education—a commitment enhanced by the university's ongoing efforts in research, graduate education and distance learning.

Dr. Haeger has been NAU president since November 2001 after joining the university to serve as NAU provost in June 2000.

During his term as president, Dr. Haeger has guided the university to new heights in student enrollment.

He also has ushered the university into its largest building boom since the 22-year term of former NAU President J. Lawrence Walkup.

Further, he has fully endorsed a national effort to increase institutional accountability, explaining that NAU must perform on a level that demonstrates its significance to students and to society.

Among university achievements under his leadership:

\* **Tuition guarantee.** Dr. Haeger instituted a "block tuition"

## JIM FALLIS



Jim Fallis was named the Director of Athletics at Northern Arizona University in May, 2004, and the department has had success across the board under his leadership.

Under his direction, the 300-plus Lumberjack student-athletes have maintained 3.00 or better cumulative mark in nine of the 10 semesters under his direction. Eleven of the 15 squads posted a 3.0 or higher cumulative GPA last year led by the soccer team which posted a department-best 3.45 in 2008-09. A school-record one hundred seventy-eight student-athletes were recognized in 2008 at the Golden Eagle Awards for significant contributions to the Lumberjack athletics program while maintaining a minimum of a 3.0 GPA. He also established the Athletic Director's Honor Roll to recognize student-athletes with a 3.5 or better GPA, recognizing more than 70 recipients last spring. Outside the classroom, the department staff and student-athletes contributed 4,000-plus community service hours in Flagstaff and around the state of Arizona each of the last three years.

NAU has ranked among the top 100 athletic departments in the United States Sports Academy Directors Cup standings three times under Fallis, while winning 20 Big Sky Conference titles and recording 15 Top-40 national finishes and six individual national titles. NAU has won the Big Sky Conference Men's All-Sports title two times.

The Lumberjacks had a stellar season in 2008-09, winning six Big Sky Conference team title and finishing among the Top 100 in the Directors Cup for the second consecutive season. The men's cross country team led the charge by finishing sixth nationally with the women ranking 23rd overall. The soccer and golf teams both earned NCAA Championships berths after claiming postseason conference tournament titles.

In 2007-08, the Lumberjacks ranked 98th overall in the United States Sports Academy Directors Cup standings aided by two top-10 national finishes in cross country and a 42nd-place national finish at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

The Lumberjacks posted two top-40 national finishes in 2006-07 behind a pair of national championships by sophomore standout Lopez Lomong. NAU won the Big Sky title in men's track and field, the regular season title in men's basketball and produced four All-Americans who earned a combined 10 All-America honors. The Lumberjacks won the Big Sky Conference Men's All-Sports title for the first time since 2003-04.

plan that guarantees first-time, full-time freshmen and transfer students the same tuition rate for eight semesters.

\* **'Finish in Four' guarantee.** NAU promises to provide students the advisement help and courses necessary to obtain their degree within four years.

\* **Expansion of nursing and the health professions.** The university has placed emphasis on graduating more students in nursing and developing or expanding programs in occupational therapy, athletic training and physicians assistant.

\* **Commitment to research.** President Haeger has instituted NAU's first office of Vice President for Research. In Yuma, ground has been broken on a 12,225-square-foot building that will provide research four-year degree opportunities.

\* **High Country Conference Center.** Dr. Haeger initiated a joint partnership to build a 42,000-square-foot conference center and an adjoining hotel and parking structure. Consultants have estimated the economic benefit to northern Arizona to be about \$7 million annually.

\* **Largest gift in university history.** The College of Business Administration was able to acquire the largest gift in university history, a \$25 million donation from prominent business leader William Franke. The college was renamed The W.A. Franke College of Business.

\* **Arizona Cardinals partnership.** The Cardinals agreed to continue their training camp in Flagstaff. About \$2 million will be added to

In 2005-06, the Lumberjacks had one of the most successful seasons in recent history, finishing 90th in the United States Sports Academy Directors Cup standings aided by a 10th-place national finish by the women's indoor track and field team and a 12th-place showing at the NCAA Women's Cross Country championships. The NAU women's sports programs captured the 2005-06 Big Sky Conference Women's All-Sports Trophy for the first time since 2000. The campaign was highlighted by six Big Sky Championships including titles in cross country, as well as indoor and outdoor women's track and field. The men's basketball team won the conference regular season title, while the women captured the Big Sky Conference tournament title to advance to its first NCAA Tournament in school history. NAU finished second in golf and third in regular-season women's basketball, soccer and tennis. NAU highlighted the campaign by winning the 2005-06 Sterling Savings Bank Presidents Cup, which is unique to collegiate athletics in that it reinforces the Big Sky Conference's dedication to the academic side of being student-athletes.

NAU coaches garnered five Big Sky Conference Coach of the Year awards, eight student-athletes were honored as 2006 ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America District 8 selections and senior men's basketball player Kelly Golob became the first Lumberjack to earn NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship honors since 2000.

The Lumberjacks posted four top-40 national finishes in 2004-05, including a 24th-place finish in men's cross country and 21st-place in women's outdoor track and field. NAU won three Big Sky Conference championships, winning titles in men's and women's cross country and women's outdoor track and field.

The accomplishments did not go unnoticed as the Lumberjacks tied for the Big Sky Conference President's Cup title that recognizes the combined academic and athletic success.

Fallis has also overseen the installation of state-of-the-art scoreboard and message-center in the Walkup Skydome since his arrival. The Skydome also welcomed the installation of a removable REALGRASS™ Matrix system during the Spring of 2008, the first removable REALGRASS™ system to be installed in the United States. It marked the first accomplishment by the President's Task Force on Athletics Facilities.

NAU signed a three-year apparel agreement with Adidas in 2008 to outfit all 15 intercollegiate teams with practice and game gear. The deal replaced NIKE as the official team outfitter, a three-year contract originally developed by Fallis.

Prior to NAU, Fallis served as athletics director at the University of Northern Colorado since 1993. Academic and athletic successes as well as fiscal responsibility were hallmarks of Fallis' tenure at Northern Colorado. Northern Colorado teams won 31 conference championships in his 10 years.

\* **Yuma branch campus.** NAU received approval from the Arizona Board of Regents to designate NAU-Yuma as a branch campus. The designation allows NAU to build programming and resources at its Arizona Western College site.

\* **'Going green.'** The university is home to one of the three greenest buildings in the world after receiving a "Platinum" rating for its Applied Research and Development building. It also earned "Gold" ratings for buildings that house Engineering and Business.

Dr. Haeger is a member Arizona Board of Education, the Governor's P-20 Council and the board of directors of the Translational Genomics Research Institute. He is former chair of the United Way of Northern Arizona board, serves as commissioner for the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education, and is past chair of the Council of Presidents of the Big Sky Conference.

## ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Academically, UNC produced 13 NCAA postgraduate scholarship recipients in his 11-year tenure.

Fallis continued to develop UNC Athletics into one of the most successful Division II programs in the nation. He also coordinated the successful completion of the largest fundraising project in UNC athletic history, the \$3.5 million Nottingham Field. He also assisted in the construction management of the 6,500-seat stadium. Fallis also oversaw the \$400,000 addition of an eight-lane all-weather track, a \$400,000 renovation to Jackson Baseball Field, the addition of a million dollar wrestling room to Butler-Hancock as well as new women's basketball and volleyball locker rooms and a conversion from tartan to wood flooring. In addition, the department built a computer technology room for use by student-athletes.

In 1994, Fallis created the UNC Athletic Hall of Fame to pay tribute to the outstanding student-athletes, coaches and contributors that have been a big part of the Bears' history for the past century. Fallis was committed to developing a UNC Athletic program that adhered to the principals of gender equity and stressed the academic performance of its student-athletes. During his tenure, Fallis added women's golf and women's softball to the UNC varsity sport lineup, and had consistently worked to enhance the scholarship opportunities available in the Bears' nine women's sports. Fallis created an environment in which academic performance was valued and rewarded, as witnessed by the fact that nearly 33 percent of UNC student-athletes had a cumulative grade-point average of 3.25 or better in 2001-02. UNC also won two Division II National Championships in football (1996, 1997) under his direction.

Fallis, 56, has been actively involved in the administration of intercollegiate athletics at the national level. Presently, he serves on the U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup Committee and represents the Big Sky on the Division I Championship cabinet. He was also selected by Arizona Gov. Janet Napolitano to serve on the Governor's Council on Health, Physical Fitness and Sport for the state of Arizona and is a member of the Route 66 Rotary club in Flagstaff. A 1974 graduate of LSSU, Fallis served as the Lakers' wrestling coach from 1974 until his appointment as interim athletic director in 1986. Fallis had an outstanding wrestling career of his own. A four-time NAIA All-America grappler for the Lakers, he won both the NCAA Division III and NAIA national championships in 1974. A member of three Hall of Fames, he was recently named to the Lake Superior State University Athletic Hall of Fame in fall of 2005. A native of Durand, Mich., Fallis earned his masters degree from Northern Michigan in 1977. He and his wife, Anna, are the parents of two grown children and two grandchildren.

# Season Outlook

## Men

With six new players and nine of 10 players with either freshman or sophomore standing, the young Northern Arizona men's tennis team is in the process of building a winning tradition on the mountain campus. Powered by sophomore **Andrew Reiff**, who earned All-Big Sky first team honors as a freshman in 2009, the young NAU squad is looking to build on a third-place Big Sky finish a season ago and win their first Big Sky title since 1997.

Reiff posted a 15-10 overall singles record and a 7-1 dual mark in 2009, quickly ascending to the No. 1 singles spot. He went 10-5 playing at No. 1, while also going 5-3 at No. 2 doubles in his first season at NAU. He ended the season on a five-match winning streak and was the only Lumberjack to appear in all 25 singles matches and 24 doubles tilts.

Junior **David Flodberg** looks to build on an 11-13 singles record in 2009 and 5-3 mark in Big Sky play. Along with a 7-11 doubles mark playing predominately at No. 1 doubles, the native of Sweden earned Big Sky honorable mention a year ago. Sophomore **Robin Pezzutto** also returns after a 5-3 Big Sky singles record as a freshman playing predominately at No. 4.

The remainder of the starting six for NAU will likely be comprised of new faces. Slotted in the No. 2 singles position, freshman **Patrick Schimmelbauer** looks to build on a 7-8 fall singles record and a 4-5 doubles mark teaming with Flodberg. Likely to play at No. 3 singles, French freshman **Hugo Ramadier** posted an 8-5 record in the fall including a streak of

eight wins in nine matches through the initial-two tournaments of the fall season. Rounding out the starting six will likely be freshman **Kevin Taylor** after the native of Canada posted a team-best 8-4 record during the fall season. Sophomores **Ben Lantz** and **Josh Brown** as well as freshmen **Andres Perez** and **Tyler Roos** will add depth to the new-look Lumberjacks

2009 posts a challenging schedule for the Lumberjacks, including five of eight Big Sky matches on the road. NAU opens with a pair of home conference matches against Sacramento State and Montana State on Jan. 21 and 23, respectively. The Lumberjacks will also host Grand Canyon and Scottsdale Community College before closing their home schedule against Big Sky foe Montana on March 1, hoping to repeat 2009's perfect 5-0 home season.

Of the Lumberjack's 17 matches away from Flagstaff, the toughest tests should be a March 30 match at No. 49 New Mexico and a Jan. 29 meeting at UNLV, ranked No. 73 in the preseason ITA Team rankings. Pac-10 power Oregon battles NAU in Phoenix on April 2, while WCC foe Gonzaga and Air Force out of the Mountain West Conference will also pose challenging road matches.

In the preseason Big Sky coaches' poll, NAU was picked to finish in sixth place, ahead of Portland State, Northern Colorado and Idaho State. The Lumberjacks will look to fend off defending champion Sacramento State in a bid to ride a slew of young talent to a conference title in Director of Tennis Kim Bruno's second season as head of the NAU men's team.

## Women

For the last four seasons, the Northern Arizona women's tennis team has had its season end in the same place to the same team, falling to Sacramento State in the Big Sky championship final every year since 2006. Fifth-year head coach Kim Bruno will lean on a pair of seasoned juniors to lead the team back to the final, hoping to overcome the Hornets and claim a Big Sky title for the first time since 1999.

Four juniors and four freshmen will comprise the roster, led by a duo of two-time All Big-Sky first team selections from Hungary. **Orsi Golovics** brings a No. 19 singles ranking in the Mountain region into the 2010 season after posting a 7-7 singles record against premier opposition in the fall and a 13-6 singles record a year ago. Fellow junior **Edit Suhajda** was limited in the fall after undergoing offseason surgery, but appears ready to build off a 5-2 fall record in limited action.

Other returning juniors include **Yumi Hasegawa**, who posted a dominate 15-6 singles record in 2009 at No. 5 and 6 singles, and **Aimee Oki**, who will likely enter the starting lineup this season after a 2-1 singles mark in conference play a year ago. With no seniors on the roster, the four returning NAU juniors will be asked to lead the way in 2010.

Amongst the newcomers to the NAU squad, freshman **Malia Wahinepio** has made the biggest splash thus far on the mountain campus. The native of Anthem, Ariz. teamed with Golovics for a 10-2 doubles record in the fall, earning a No. 35

national doubles ranking entering the spring season. She also went 7-7 in singles play and will be slotted into the No. 3 singles position and No. 1 doubles spot to open the season. Joining Wahinepio as a freshman starter will be Fountain Hills native **Nicole Perez** after the newcomer posted an impressive 9-4 singles record in fall play. Adding depth to the NAU roster will be freshmen **Ana Mendes** from Brazil and **Alice Walker** from Australia.

Like the NAU men, the women will also play five of eight Big Sky matches on the road. Home play for the Lumberjacks opens on Feb. 19 against Montana State followed by a Feb. 21 match with Grand Canyon. The Lumberjacks also host Big Sky matches against Montana and preseason No. 58 Sacramento State and a non-conference tilt with Rhode Island. The women went 6-0 at home in 2009, looking to keep the home-court advantage alive in the friendly confines of Flagstaff Athletic Club in the new decade.

A difficult road schedule includes matches against a pair of Pac-10 foes in Arizona and Washington State. The Lumberjacks open the season with a match against a talented UC Santa Barbara squad in Tempe on Jan. 24, and the women will also play tough non-conference road matches at New Mexico State and Utah State out of the WAC, Colorado State of the Mountain West and Gonzaga of the WCC.

NAU was picked to finish second in the Big Sky preseason poll, trailing only Sacramento State in the balloting. The position is a familiar one for a talented Lumberjack squad looking to get by the pesky Hornets to nab a Big Sky crown.

# Director of Tennis Kim Bruno



Kim Bruno enters her second season as director of tennis and fifth overall at NAU as the head women's tennis coach. As director of tennis, Bruno now oversees both the men's and women's programs.

Last season, the women's team returned to the Big Sky Championship match but fell one win short of the NCAA Tournament for the fourth-consecutive year. The women finished the season 13-10 overall and 6-2 in conference play, placing third in the Big Sky regular season standings. The NAU men went 7-18 in 2009 but were 5-3 in the Big Sky, advancing to the conference tournament quarterfinals in Bruno's first season as head of the men's squad.

In the past four years, Bruno has amassed an overall record of 50-38 with a 23-6 mark in conference play with the women's team. In 2008, she led the women to their best finish since the 2002 season, compiling 15 wins with eight losses and a second-place finish in conference.

After four standout years as a student-athlete for the Lumberjacks, Bruno returned to her alma mater in 2005 and has since led NAU to a third-place finish in the regular-season standings in 2006 and runner-up finishes in the conference in 2007 and 2008. Prior to Bruno arriving in Flagstaff, the Lumberjacks had finished below .500 three years in a row.

In her first season, Bruno guided NAU to a 10-10 overall record and a 4-2 mark in league play. In her second year, Bruno coached the Lumberjack women to a 12-10 overall record finishing 6-1 in conference play and the women advanced to the conference tournament championship final for the first time since 2004. The 12-win season was another improvement with Bruno increasing the Lumberjack win total in each of her first three seasons. She totaled 10 overall wins in 2006, 12 in 2007 and 15 in 2008.

Under Bruno's tutelage, a number of Lumberjacks have received individual accolades to go along with the team's accomplishments. In 2009, Bruno tutored four Lumberjacks to all-conference honors, equaling the 2008 total when she landed four all-conference performers. In all, Bruno has 18 All-Big Sky selections, with three coming in her inaugural year of 2006. In that first season, Bruno was named the Big Sky Conference Women's Tennis Coach of the Year.

Bruno has also directed the tennis teams to success on and off the court. In the last four years, 33 women's players have earned the Golden Eagle Scholar-Athlete Award for academic excellence, while four men's players earned the honor last year in her first season directing both teams. Nine women's players have also been selected Big Sky All-Academic.

Bruno is no stranger to NAU having been a standout tennis player for the Lumberjacks from 1996-2000. She helped lead the Lumberjacks to their first Big Sky Conference tournament title as a freshman, and then twice more as a sophomore and junior, marking the only three consecutive conference titles for the team in the history of the program.

Bruno also led the team to the program's only NCAA Tournament appearance in 1999. This past fall, the 1999 women's tennis team was inducted into the NAU Hall of Fame.

In her senior year, the Lumberjacks were defeated in the Big Sky Championship finals, making Bruno and her fellow seniors the only class to reach the finals four years in a row. She posted an overall record that year of 18-15.

Bruno was a three-time All-Big Sky second team selection, and was named to the All-Big Sky first-team and All-Academic team as a senior year. While at NAU, Bruno was also awarded the SkyJacks Scholarship given to one athlete a year for outstanding academic and athletic performance. After graduation from Northern Arizona, Bruno traveled and held jobs as a ski instructor and whitewater rafting guide at Sunlight Mountain in Glenwood Springs, Colo., and later as a tennis pro for Club Med in the Bahamas.

In 2002 she was hired as the assistant women's tennis coach at Dartmouth College, where her responsibilities included individual lessons, recruiting, travel scheduling, and setting up tournaments. Bruno then spent two years at the University of Connecticut as the men's and women's graduate assistant tennis coach. At Connecticut she served as the only assistant to head coach Glenn Marshall.

Bruno's other coaching experience includes teaching tennis at country clubs during the summers for nine years, including one summer spent in Flagstaff teaching tennis at Forest Highlands Country Club.

The Chicago, Ill., native earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education from Northern Arizona in 2000 and a master's degree in sports management from Connecticut in 2005.

# Coaching Staff



Rich Paulosky enters his sixth season at Northern Arizona as the assistant coach for the men's tennis team after starting at NAU following an invitation from former head coach Albin Polonyi to serve as a volunteer assistant. Paulosky has a long history of involvement in tennis at many levels and in many different roles. He considers himself more a life-long student of the game than anything else.

"It is a great privilege to work with Coach Bruno. We are having a positive experience making progress," said Paulosky. "I never stop learning something new every time I look deeply into any aspect of the game. The way the game is growing there is a lot to keep up on and grow with. I have learned and experienced so much I can't keep track of it all."

Paulosky played his college tennis at Henry Ford Community College in Dearborn Mich., where he graduated with an associates degree in liberal arts, and also received a journeyman's card in the tool & die trade. "Sherman Collins was a great inspirational tennis coach to me whom I learned much from and I am able to employ now." Paulosky trained with Rudy Hernando shortly after he came of the world tour who was ranked as high as 18th in the world during the 1970's.

Paulosky has maintained an active role in Flagstaff's youth tennis scene. He has served as captain and coach of numerous USTA teams. Paulosky set up youth tennis programs in conjunction with the High Altitude Sports Training Complex on the NAU campus and the City of Flagstaff department of recreation. He has served as president of the Northern Arizona Tennis Association and was honored as a past president. Paulosky is a 15-year member of the United States Professional Tennis Association. Paulosky also served on staff with former Arizona State player Rick Bontrager of the Arizona Tennis Association in Scottsdale, Ariz. and officiated for one year for the USTA, "which was well worth the experience." Paulosky was instrumental in the development of several high school players who ultimately received Division I scholarships.

"The saying is that tennis is the game of a lifetime," Paulosky said. "I guess somewhere I fit right in that picture enjoying every day of it. It is always very rewarding being involved, helping the game and those in it grow. I can't stay off the court. I figure it's going to be a good place to die when my time comes. They can just take my ashes and fill some cracks on the court and patch over me, then I can feel right at home after I am gone."



Stephanie Vallejos begins her second season on the NAU women's tennis coaching staff and her first season as assistant coach after finishing her play-

ing career in 2008. She graduated with a degree in parks and recreation management with an emphasis in planning and tourism.

The native of Benicia, Calif. helped NAU total 15 wins overall and seven in the Big Sky in 2008, the most since 2002, garnering All-Big Sky first team honors in the process.

Vallejos amassed a 15-6 singles record with a 7-1 mark in conference play. She ended the season on a nine-match win streak. In doubles play, she teamed with freshman Aimee Oki and went 16-5 with a 7-1 record in the conference.

A 2003 graduate of Benicia High School located in northern Calif., she led Benicia to an undefeated record in 2001 and the MEL Conference Championship. Vallejos was ranked #1 in Northern California Section in 18 and under division in 2002 and was nationally-ranked in the top 40 in the 14, 16, and 18 and under from 1999-2002.

She was a two-time Pacific Coast national champion in singles and doubles, as well as a Junior Fed Cup player for Northern California in 2002.



Chris Arena begins his first season as a student assistant coach with the men's tennis team after completing his playing career in 2009. He is current-

ly completing a degree in business administration with an emphasis in accountancy.

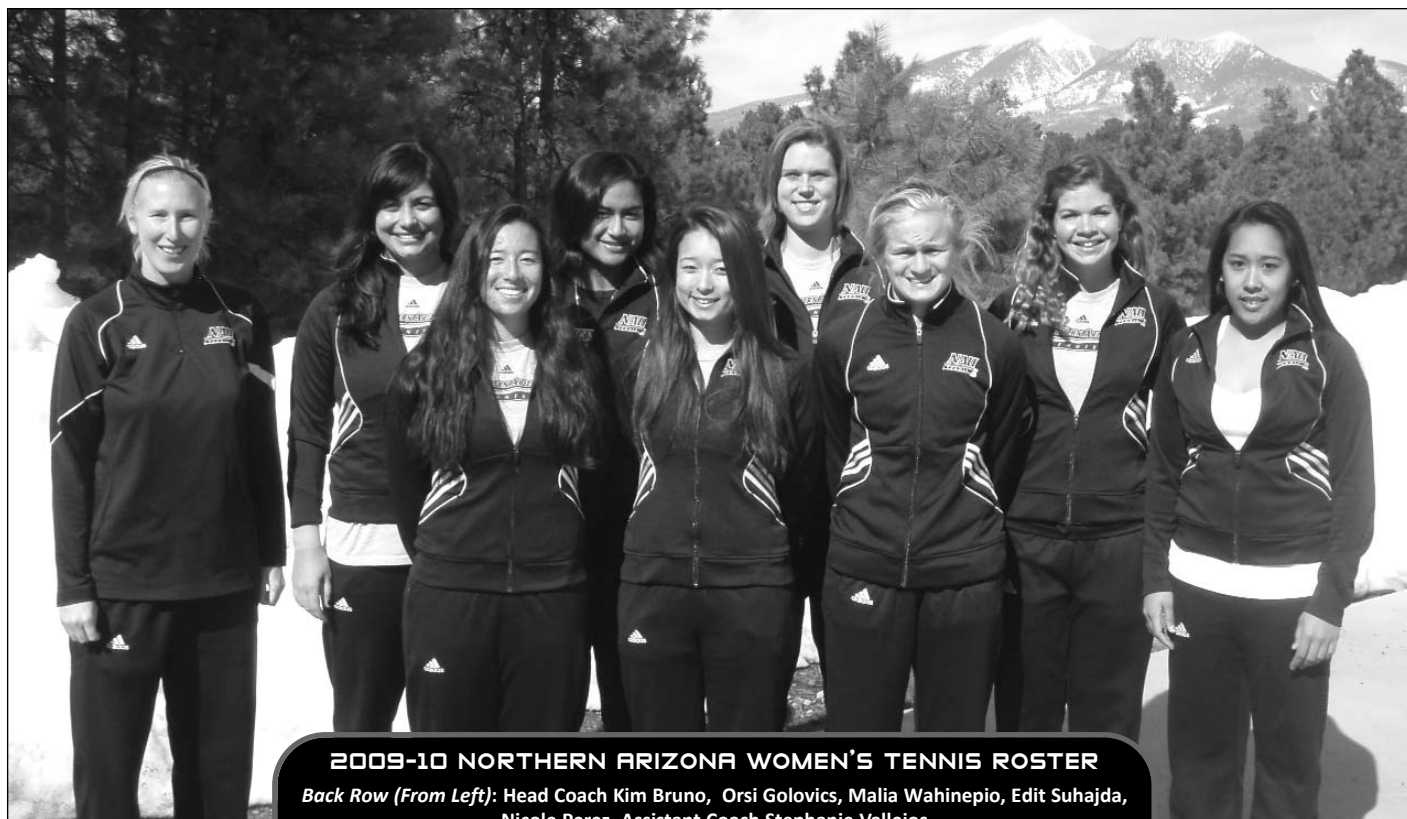
A native of Salt Lake City, Arena was a four-year player for Northern Arizona, playing at the top-three singles positions during his junior and senior years. As a senior in 2009, Arena amassed an 8-14 singles record, combining for eight victories at the No. 2 and 3 singles positions.

Arena's best year was 2007, when he earned All-Big Sky honorable mention after posting a 14-8 singles record and 15-6 doubles mark. His 12 singles victories in dual play were a team-high, while he teamed with Gareth Ducrey for a team-best 13-3 dual mark at No. 2 and 3 doubles.

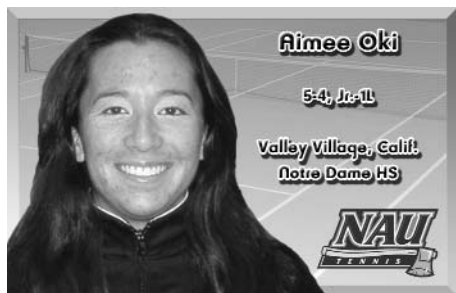

## Season Recap

The 2008-09 women's tennis team recorded its third-straight winning season under head coach Kim Bruno, reaching the Big Sky Championship final for the fourth consecutive season. The Lumberjacks posted a 13-10 overall record and a 6-2 mark in conference play, going a perfect 6-0 in home matches. NAU won six of its final seven matches to reach the Big Sky Championship match before falling to Sacramento State.

After an 0-4 start, the Lumberjacks would win six of their next eight matches, highlighted by a 4-3 upset of No. 50 New Mexico in Albuquerque on March 1. In all, NAU would play six matches against ranked opponents during the year, ending the regular season with wins in four of five duals. The Lumberjacks would defeat Montana and Montana State to reach the Big Sky final before falling to the Hornets for the fourth-consecutive year.

Leading the way for NAU at No. 1 and 2 singles were sophomores Edit Suhajda and Kim Van Ginkel, combining to go 10-5 in Big Sky play. Sophomore Orsi Golovics went 13-6 for the season, playing predominately at No. 3 singles, while seniors Leslie Vial and Stacey Pinchbeck and sophomore Yumi Hasegawa rounded out an NAU starting roster that went a combined 35-13 (.729) in Big Sky singles competition. The Lumberjacks would be just as dominate in doubles, combining for an 18-6 (.750) conference doubles record headlined by Golovics and Suhajda at No. 1.

For the second-consecutive year, both Golovics and Suhajda were named All-Big Sky first team. Vial earned second team honors while Van Ginkel was named honorable mention, marking the third-consecutive year that Northern Arizona had at least four All-Big Sky Conference selections.

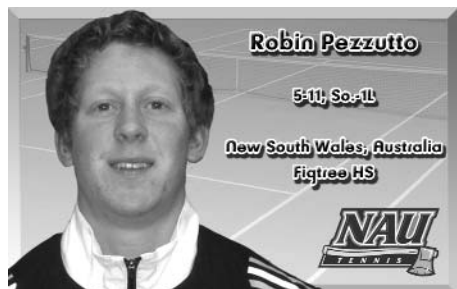

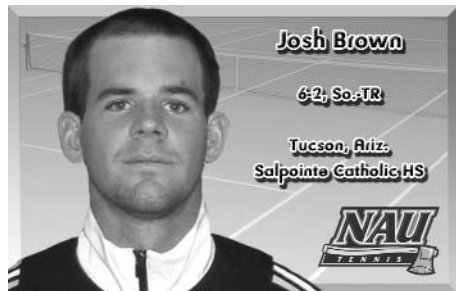

## Season Recap

With a first-year head coach and just one senior, 2009 was the beginning of a new era in Northern Arizona men's tennis. In her first season as head coach of the NAU men, Director of Tennis Kim Bruno led the Lumberjacks to a 5-3 Big Sky record despite a 7-18 overall mark. Despite a difficult schedule and just five home matches, the Lumberjack men finished third in the Big Sky regular-season standings and advanced to the Big Sky Championship.

A lengthy road schedule led to a rough beginning in 2009, as NAU lost its first six matches and 10 of its first 11 duals. The Lumberjacks would catch fire when conference play began, however, winning six of 11 matches following their difficult start and recording a perfect 5-0 home record. NAU would face six ranked opponents during the year but was able to claim five Big Sky-victories during the regular season. The Lumberjacks had their hopes of a championship run cut short in the opening round of the Big Sky Championship after a 4-2 loss to Montana.

Freshman Andrew Reiff shined in his first season on the mountain campus, recording a 10-5 record at No. 1 singles, including a 7-1 dual record in conference play. Reiff also played some at No. 2 along with senior Chris Arena, while sophomore David Flodberg posted a 5-3 conference singles record playing primarily at No. 3. Freshman Robin Pezzutto went 6-6 as the primary No. 4 singles player, while freshman Jacob Visagie and junior Jacob Tracy rounded out a Lumberjack squad that went 30-18 (.625) overall in conference singles matches. All three primary NAU doubles teams posted winning Big Sky records, combining for a 15-9 (.625) conference doubles mark.

Reiff became the first NAU men's tennis player since 2006 to be named All-Big Sky first team after completing a 15-10 dual season in his rookie year. Flodberg would earn honorable mention to give NAU multiple All-Big Sky honorees for the first time since 2007.

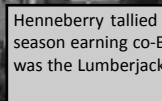
Garcia was named the 1995 Big Sky Conference Most Valuable Player. The native of Sevilla, Spain was a four-year starter for the Lumberjacks.

# The Big Sky

The Big Sky Conference enters its 47th year of athletic competition in 2009-10. The Big Sky is an NCAA Division I member in all sports, with member institutions classified in the Football Championship Subdivision (formally I-AA). The Big Sky returned to a nine-team format in 2006 with the addition of Northern Colorado.

The current lineup includes Eastern Washington, Idaho State, Montana, Montana State, Northern Arizona, Northern Colorado, Portland State, Sacramento State and Weber State. The league has become one of the strongest Division I conferences in the West and is a national leader in the Football Championship Subdivision.

The Big Sky Conference was established in 1963 by six charter members – Idaho, Idaho State, Gonzaga, Montana, Montana State and Weber State. Those six schools formed the foundation of the Big Sky before the league expanded in 1970 by adding Boise State and Northern Arizona. Gonzaga left the Sky in 1979 and was replaced by Nevada, which gave the league eight members. The conference grew to nine schools in 1987 with the addition of Eastern Washington.

The 1990s saw change in the makeup of the league, beginning in 1992 when Nevada departed and put the Big Sky back at eight teams. In 1996 Boise State and Idaho left and at the same time the conference added Portland State, Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge. The Big Sky maintained nine teams for five years before Cal State Northridge departed in the spring of 2001.

With the addition of Northern Colorado, the Big Sky spreads across eight states spanning from the Pacific Ocean to the Rocky Mountain Front. The Big Sky is represented along the entire west coast with schools in Washington, Oregon and California. League schools also range up and down the Rocky Mountains with institutions in Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona and now Colorado.

Of the eight western-most states in the contiguous

United States only one, Nevada, is not represented in the Big Sky.

On Feb 25, 1963, the name Big Sky was adopted by the six presidents of the charter members as the name of the new conference. The name Big Sky originated in a novel written by the late A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Mont., in 1947 entitled "The Big Sky." Jack Hollowell, a former Montana advertising director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. While on a track and field trip from Pocatello, Idaho, to Missoula, Mont., the legendary Dubby Holt of Idaho State saw a "Welcome to Big Sky Country" sign as his team entered Montana. Holt, and his athletes thought "Big Sky" would be a perfect name for the

new conference. Harry Missildine of the Spokane Spokesman-Review called for the newly formed league to be named the Big Sky Conference in his column dated Feb. 20, 1963.

The Big Sky sponsors championships in 14 sports, including men's and women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, basketball and tennis. In addition, there are also championships in football, and women's volleyball, golf and soccer.

The 2009-10 season marks the 22nd year that the Big Sky Conference will sponsor championships in women's sports. The former Mountain West Conference existed from 1982-88, sponsoring championships for women's sports at the same institutions the Big Sky had men's programs. The Big Sky merged with the Mountain West in 1988, forming one league for both men and women.

Doug Fullerton, the fifth commissioner of the Big Sky Conference, will enter his 15th year at the helm. Fullerton took over the Big Sky on July 1, 1995, replacing longtime commissioner Ron Stephenson. Stephenson served the league for 14 years. Steve Belko was the commissioner from 1977-81 while John Roning held the post from 1971-77. The first league commissioner was Jack Friel, who served from 1963-71.

Academics in the athletics department have taken on a new meaning at Northern Arizona University. The academic services are under the direction of academic services coordinators Pam Lowie and Diana Ulrey and offer numerous programs to help the student-athletes throughout their academic careers.

The results have been impressive. During the fall of 2009, NAU student-athletes recorded their highest cumulative grade point average since 1997, totaling a 3.16 GPA among more than 300 student-athletes.

Since 1998, NAU student-athletes have earned a 3.0 cumulative GPA or higher in 21 of the 23 semesters.

Lumberjack Academics has the following programs in place for student-athletes:

### PROACTIVE MENTORING

Each year approximately 30-50 first year student-athletes will be selected to participate in NAU's ProActive Mentor program which targets students who Lumberjack Academics believes may benefit from academic mentoring. Student-athletes are selected based on incoming GPA's/ test scores and coaches recommendations. Student-athletes are expected to attend a weekly meeting with their assigned academic graduate assistant as well as with their respective coach, and to report on their progress in each class.

### STUDY HALL

First year student-athletes (including transfer student-athletes) are required to complete 6-8 hours of study time beginning with the second week of classes through Reading Week. The 6-8 hours consist of scheduled times a monitor will be available and may also include tutoring by the Learning Assistance Centers, organized study groups facilitated by tutors, graduate assistants or faculty from the academic colleges and other academic-related activities that are approved by the Athletics Academic Department Staff.

### ACADEMIC ADVISEMENT

All first year freshman student-athletes are assigned to an academic advisor at the Gateway Student Success Center (GSSC). After the student-athletes' first year, they will be assigned to a college advisor if they have declared a major while those who are undecided will remain assigned to a GSSC advisor. Student-athletes must declare a major before entering their 5th semester. Academic Coordinators are available for pre-advisement to make sure all NCAA/NAU policies and procedures are being followed.

### TUTORING SERVICES

Tutoring services for all student-athletes are provided through the North and South Learning Assistance Centers. Student-athletes are given the option to utilize the master schedule which allows them to schedule set tutoring appointments for twice a week per subject throughout the academic semester. Student-athletes may also take advantage of the drop in services and make appointments on an as-needed basis.

### EARLY ENROLLMENT

Student-athletes are afforded the opportunity to participate in priority registration which enables the student-athletes to accommodate practice schedules while continuing to make progress towards graduation. The student-athletes are grouped with seniors and honor students for registration. In order to utilize priority registration, student-athletes must have all holds cleared from their account and meet with their academic advisor for advisement and activation.

### PROGRESS REPORTS

All student-athletes will have progress reports completed once a semester. Student-athletes who receive a "D" or "F" on a progress report will be required to complete an Action Plan with the faculty for the course in which the "D" or "F" was received.

### ACADEMIC AWARDS & RECOGNITION ATHLETIC DIRECTOR'S HONOR ROLL

Student-athletes on a current roster who achieve a 3.5 cumulative GPA qualify for the Athletic Director's Honor Roll. The student-athletes will be recognized at the designated spring Men's Basketball game.

### GOLDEN EAGLE SCHOLAR ATHLETES

Student-athletes who have achieved a 3.0 cumulative GPA are honored at the Golden Eagle Scholar Athlete Banquet in the spring. Student-athletes are presented a plaque to recognize their achievement.

### BIG SKY CONFERENCE SCHOLAR ATHLETES

Student-athletes who have completed at least one term at the University, achieved a 3.2 cumulative GPA and competed in 50% of the team's athletic competitions are eligible for the Big Sky Conference Scholar Athlete Award.

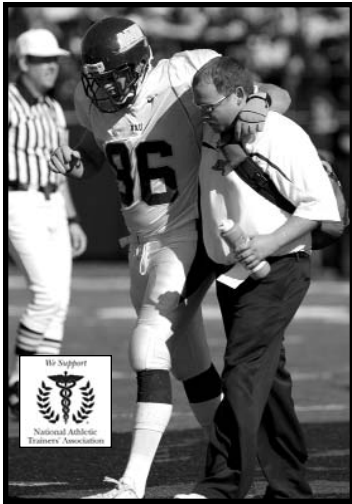

## STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING



The NAU weight room is located in the Walkup Skydome. It features 30 tons of free weights, 10 Olympic training platforms with modernized sport-specific training and high-tech motion analysis cameras. In the summer of 2005, the weight room received a facelift with new platforms and interior paint, as well as a complete enclosure of the complex. The student-athletes work to improve themselves under a philosophy based on performance enhancement and safe participation.

Andy Williams joined the Northern Arizona athletics staff as the head strength and conditioning coach in July of 2009. Williams came to NAU with 13 years of experience in the profession, most recently spending a year as the assistant strength and conditioning coach at Eastern Michigan University. Williams has experience at many levels in the sporting world, having spent time as the director of strength and conditioning in the New York Yankees minor league system and



the Frankfurt Galaxy league of NFL Europe, as well as four other collegiate stints.

The strength and conditioning facilities at NAU are among the best in the West. The 6,500-square-foot facility has been utilized by the likes of Olympians Pablo Morales, Summer Sanders, Jenny Thompson and Wes Barnett, as well as a host of foreign athletes and teams preparing for a variety of international competitions. The German bobsled team trained in the facility prior to winning a gold medal at the 2002 Salt Lake Olympics.

The home of NAU men's and women's tennis since 2006, the Flagstaff Athletic Club (FAC) provides the premier athletic facilities in Northern Arizona. The FAC opened its first facility on Route 66 in West Flagstaff in 1979, followed by a second facility in East Flagstaff in 1984. The east location, located on North Country Club drive, housed a tennis "bubble" until 2004, when it was replaced by the current tennis facility. In 2006, Northern Arizona began playing its matches in the new tennis center, marking the first time that NAU had a home tennis facility and was able to host NCAA matches in Flagstaff.

Driven by the FAC's desire to bring tennis back to the Flagstaff community and Northern Arizona's need for a suitable indoor facility, a partnership was born that has been mutually beneficial for both institutions. By housing Division-I tennis on its premises, the Flagstaff Athletic Club was able to show its commitment to tennis in Flagstaff and the community, and has since dramatically increased its number of youth and high school tennis players learning the game. Since the Lumberjacks have made Flagstaff Athletic Club their home, an elevated viewing area and pro shop have been completed to provide fans with a superb vantage point to view all four competition courts. FAC members and tennis enthusiasts throughout northern Arizona are invited to attend NAU practices and home events free of



charge, bringing the tennis community in Flagstaff and the high-quality athletes at NAU closer than ever before.

When paired with Flagstaff's unique elevation, the Flagstaff Athletic Club provides a home-court advantage that is unmatched in the Big Sky Conference. The playing surface is Mondo SportFlex, a prefabricated rubber athletic flooring. According to the Mondo corporation, the surface is calendared and vulcanized with a particular closed cell structure, based on special isoprenic rubbers, mineral fillers, stabilizing agents and pigmentation. It is highly resistant to UV rays and atmospheric agents, with a system of differential elasticity between top surface and base to create a long lasting, easily maintained playing surface. In 2009, both the NAU men's and women's tennis teams went undefeated (combined 11-0) in home matches in Flagstaff Athletic Club, and since 2007 the squads have a combined 21-8 (.724) home record.

"Flagstaff Athletic Club wanted to bring tennis back to the community, and this partnership was a great way to show our commitment to tennis in Flagstaff," said Flagstaff Athletic Club Senior Sports Manager Beth Overton. "We love being the home of NAU tennis and we hope to remain their home for years to come."
