

NAVY TENNIS INFORMATION — 1953

PROSPECTUS: The success of the Navy team depends on five lettermen backed by a group of five "potentially good" youngsters up from last year's plebe team which had a 5-and-2 record. "Our fortunes will be based on how well these inexperienced newcomers progress," say Coach Art Hendrix. The team lacks outstanding individuals but is strong in overall experience. Navy compiled 13-3 and 10-3 records during the last two seasons and was ranked No. 3 in Eastern Intercollegiate competition in '52. Hendrix believes this year's team will be better despite a tougher schedule.
