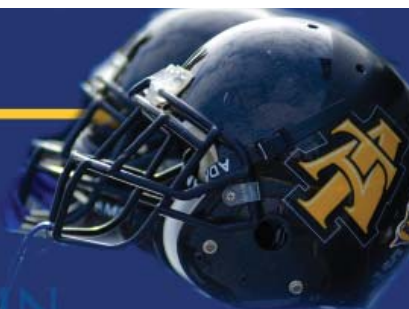

Records: Today marks the first game of the season for North Carolina A&T. The Aggies have won three out of the last four openers. Coastal Carolina will also play its first game of the season today. The Chanticleers will host the Aggies for the second time in four years.

Rankings: The Aggies received votes in both the Sheridan Broadcasting Network and Boxtorow HBCU polls. The Aggies are not ranked in the Sports Network Top 25. The Chanticleers come into this week's game unranked.

North Carolina A&T Coach Rod Broadway: Broadway is in his second season with the Aggies and his 10th overall. His record is 73-29 (.716). During his first season with A&T he went 5-6 overall and 4-4 in the MEAC. Broadway spent four seasons apiece at N.C. Central and Grambling.

Coastal Carolina Coach Joe Moglia: Moglia enters his first season at Coastal Carolina and his first collegiate season overall. Moglia enters his 20th season of coaching, and is the former head coach of the United Football League's Omaha Night Hawks. Moglia has been the Chairman of the Board for TD Ameritrade for four years.

Aggies Looking For Non-HBCU Win

North Carolina A&T is looking for its first win over a non-HBCU since beating Elon 19-17 on Sept. 25, 2004. The Aggies have lost their last seven games against non-HBCU's, including three straight losses to Coastal Carolina. The Aggies will try to earn the win over the Chanticleers starting at 6 p.m., from Brooks Stadium. The action can be heard live on WNAA 90.1 FM. The Aggies will also be looking for just their second road win in nine tries. Their last road win came against Morgan State on Oct. 1, 2011. A&T is making its second trip to Conway, S.C., in four years. Their last trip occurred on Sept. 26, 2009 during Mike Mayhew's freshman season. The rookie rushed for 84 yards on 11 carries. In 2009, Coastal Carolina jumped out to a 14-0 lead until freshman Larry Raper scored on a 9-yard end-and-around to pull the Aggies to within seven going into the half.

Two big plays put the Aggies away as the Chanticleers scored on a 55-yard touchdown pass and a 39-yard touchdown run to defeat the Aggies 28-7. Five players who played in the 2009 game – D'Vonte Graham, Brandon Hover, Lewis Kindle, Mayhew and Raper – will play tonight.

Coastal Carolina is coming off of a 7-4 season overall and a 3-3 season in the Big South.

The Chanticleers return quarterback Aramis Hillary. Hillary was 18-for-24 for 255 yards and three touchdowns in the Chanticleers 31-14 win over A&T in 2011. The gentleman who caught most of those passes also returns. Matt Hazel caught six passes for 92 yards and two touchdowns. Receiver Andrew Sullivan had 68 yards on two receptions.

Who's Next...

North Carolina A&T comes home for its season opener to play Division II West Virginia State. It will be WVSU's first trip to Aggie Stadium, and it will be the first meeting between the two teams since a 1943 contest. The Aggies' game against WVSU will be the first of back-to-back games against Division II opponents.

A&T will try to end its three-game losing streak against Coastal Carolina. A similarity in all three games is that the Aggies have remained competitive until a few big plays by CCU turned the game in their favor. The last time the Aggies played in Conway, S.C., Larry Raper, Mike Mayhew, Brandon Hover, Lewis Kindle and D'Vonte Graham were freshmen.



The Aggies and West Virginia State will meet for the first time since 1943. The two teams have actually played each other five times with the Aggies leading the series 3-2. The Aggies have been dominant against Division II foes. They have xx straight against DII opponents with their last loss to a DII coming on xx.



Virginia University of Lynchburg and the Aggies will play for the second straight season. The Dragons were competitive against the Aggies in the first half of last season's game as they went into the locker down 10-0. But A&T took to the air to pull away as Lewis Kindle threw second half TD passes to Ricky Lewis and Larry Raper to give the Aggies a 38-7 win.



A&T ended a six-game losing streak to Morgan State last season with a 24-3 road win over the Bears. It was the Aggies only road win of the season. The two teams will face each other live on ESPNu on a Thursday night. It will be the Aggies first televised game since a humbling 67-17 loss to Bethune-Cookman on Oct. 28, 2010.



The contest against Bethune-Cookman will be a tough challenge for the Aggies. They shocked the Wildcats last season with a dominant 22-3 win over the Wildcats at Aggie Stadium. The Aggies held the run-happy Wildcats to just five yards rushing. This time the Aggies will have to travel to Daytona Beach to face the Wildcats on their homecoming.



Howard and A&T are probably two of the most improved teams in the MEAC. Both teams finished 5-6 in 2011 after coming off of 1-10 seasons the previous year. The contests will feature two of the best quarterbacks in the conference in preseason All-MEAC selection Greg McGhee of Howard and A&T's Lewis Kindle.



Success hasn't been the norm for A&T in Dover, Del. The Aggies have not defeated the Hornets up north since 2002. The Aggies looked solid offensively against the Hornets last season as they earned a 42-24 win over the Hornets at Aggie Stadium in 2011. The series between the two teams is tied at 20-20-1.



A&T faces the defending MEAC champions for homecoming. The Aggies ended a seven-game homecoming losing streak last season. The Aggies had a chance to beat the Spartans last season, but dropped two passes in the end zone in the final seconds to come away with a 14-10 loss. The Aggies lead the all-time series 27-11.



Florida A&M has had A&T's number since the two teams started playing another in 1938. The Rattlers lead the all-time series 44-13-3. Nothing has changed recently. The Rattlers have won the last seven meetings even though the last three games have been decided by an average of 4.3 points. The Aggies last win over FAMU at Aggie Stadium came in 2003.



The Aggies would love to end their nasty losing streak against the Bulldogs. A&T is 0-11 in last 11 meetings against the Bulldogs, and their head coach Buddy Pough is 10-0 when facing A&T. S.C. State's 11-game win streak over the Aggies is the longest in the series. A&T's last win over the Bulldogs came in 2000.



One of the best rivalries in the FCS occurs on Nov. 17 as A&T travels to Durham. The two teams have made the rivalry even better with close games that come down to the final seconds. The series tied at five games apiece over the last 10 meetings. A&T's 10-point win over the Eagles last season was its largest margin of victory over NCCU since a 25-0 win in 2003.

A&T's LAST TIME OUT

North Carolina A&T closed out the 2011 season with a 31-21 win over archrival N.C. Central. It was the end to an improved but somewhat frustrating season.

The Aggies did make a four-game improvement by going 5-6, but the coaching staff believes the team had a chance to win more. A&T had to deal with four straight road games, which included an overtime loss to Howard, a last second loss to Norfolk State and down-to-wire defeat to Florida A&M.

A&T's 10-point win over N.C. Central was its largest margin of victory over the Eagles since 2003 when the A&T scored a 25-0 win. Running back Mike Mayhew rushed for 163 yards on 32 carries as he exceeded the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the second straight season.

Quarterback Lewis Kindie threw for 201 yards and two touchdowns on 14-for-23 passing as he climbed over the 2,000-yard passing mark. Not to be out done, receiver Wallace Miles made eight catches for 123 yards and a touchdown as he eclipsed the 1,000-yard receiving mark.

The milestones marked the first time A&T has had a 2,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver. A lot has changed since the Aggies defeated the Eagles on Nov. 19, 2011. The Aggies put together an outstanding recruiting class that includes three freshman quarterbacks and fully stocked offensive line.

Notes on the Coastal Game

- There are seven players who were on the A&T roster when the Aggies last played at Coastal Carolina. Five of those players played, including Mike Mayhew who rushed for 84 yards on 11 carries.
- In two games against Coastal Carolina, Mayhew has carried the ball 31 times for 152 yards. Mayhew has never scored against the Chanticleers.
- The Aggies surrendered 255 yards passing to the Chanticleers last season. It was the most yards passing an opponent had against the Aggies during the 2011 season.
- Lewis Kindie had 100 yards passing against CCU last season. It was lowest output of the season.

Broadway Openers

North Carolina A&T head coach Rod Broadway is entering his 10th season as a head coach. He spent four seasons apiece at N.C. Central and Grambling. He is 5-4 in season openers as a head coach. He was 1-3 at Grambling when playing a season opener with two of those losses coming to Division I FBS teams. At N.C. Central, he was 3-1 in games that opened the season with his only loss coming to North Carolina A&T in 2003. Last season the Aggies opened with a 38-7 win over Virginia University of Lynchburg.

Kindle Fire

North Carolina A&T quarterback Lewis Kindie missed the entire 2010 season with a torn ACL. He returned in 2011 and had one of the best quarterbacking seasons in school history. Kindie threw for 2,020 yards, becoming just the fourth Aggie in school history to throw for more than 2,000 yards in a season. This season, Kindie has a chance to do something not even the great Alan Hooker accomplished. He could become the first quarterback in school history to have consecutive 2,000-yard passing seasons.

More Fire

Lewis Kindie has two more years to take aim at Alan Hooker's 25-year old school passing record. Kindie is entering his junior season with 2,374 career passing yards, placing him seventh on the all-time list. Kindie would likely two more 2,000-yard passing seasons to surpass Hooker on the all-time list. He needs just 328 yards to move into sixth place on the all-time list, ahead of Stan Jacobs.

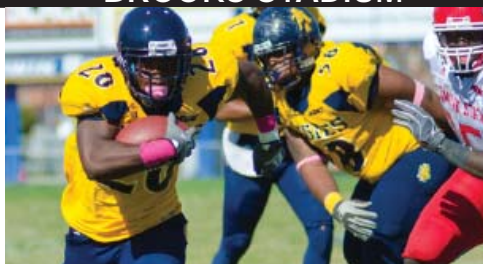

A March Toward History

A two-time All-MEAC selection and the 2011 Co-MEAC Offensive Player of the Year, Mike Mayhew enters the 2012 season 139 yards shy of becoming North Carolina A&T's all-time leading rusher. For his career, Mayhew is averaging 83.5 yards per game and has 11 100-yard rushing games, so it is conceivable he could have the record, which currently belongs to Maurice Hicks at 2,812 yards, by Game 1 or 2.

Mayhew, the 2009 MEAC Rookie of the Year, is only the second running back in A&T history to put together consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons, joining Hicks. If he rushes for 1,000 yards in 2012, he will be the first Aggie to accomplish the feat and only one of three players in MEAC history to ever to do so.

Mayhew Carries The Load

Mike Mayhew native is just 10 carries shy of becoming the school's all-time leader in rush attempts as well. He was only one of 25 backs with at least 150 carries in the Football Championship Subdivision to rush for more than 100 yards per game.

In 2010, Mayhew carried the ball a school record 221 times. The following year, he outdid himself by breaking his own record with 231 rushing attempts. Mayhew has recorded 25 or rushing attempts eight times in his career. He is averaging 131.8 yards in those games.

Other Milestones

In addition to likely being the Aggies all-time leader in rushing and rush attempts, Mayhew will also finish in the top in all-purpose yards and touchdowns.

He is one of only four players in school history to have more than 3,000 yards in all-purpose yards. Some of Mayhew's all-purpose yards stems from him being a kick returner when he first came to Greensboro. Mayhew is one of only six running backs in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season.

He Has Help

Mayhew will have plenty of help in the backfield this season. The Aggies have three strong running backs playing behind him, including his backup from 2011, Dominique Drake. Drake rushed for 312 yards and a touchdown on 76 carries.

The Aggies will also look to use Ricky Lewis, a player who has played quarterback, wide receiver, kickoff return and punt return during his time as an Aggie. Lewis carried the ball 31 times in 2011 and averaged 5.0 yards per carry.

The Aggies also brought in East Carolina transfer Desmond Lawrence. Lawrence has tremendous speed and big-play ability. With the additional help, it should help Mayhew avoid injury during his senior season.

MEAC Preseason Accolades

Proof that the North Carolina A&T football program is starting grow can be shown through the numerous preseason accolades they have received. As expected, senior running back Mike Mayhew has gained the most attention. Mayhew was named the preseason MEAC Offensive Player of the Year in July at the MEAC Preseason Luncheon.

Mayhew's preseason recognition came on the heels of him being named the conference's Co-Offensive Player of the Year at the end of the 2011 season. Mayhew, who is going after his third first-team all-conference recognition, was also named to the preseason All-MEAC team.

Joining Mayhew on the first team were three defensive player in junior linebacker D'Vonte Grant, senior defensive end Tony Mashburn and junior safety Travis Crosby. On the second team, there was one offensive and one defensive player. Right guard Nathan Isles and defensive tackle Brandon Young also earned recognition.

Other Preseason Honors

Mike Mayhew earned two additional preseason honors. Phil Steele's Magazine named him to its preseason All-MEAC team along with Tony Mashburn. Mashburn led all A&T defensive linemen in tackles and he ranked 11th in the conference in sacks with 5.5.

Mayhew also earned Boxtorow preseason All-American honors. The Boxtorow radio show is aired throughout the country, and the Boxtorow brand provides relentless coverage to HBCU football.

He's Back

Junior defensive back D'Vonte Graham had a superb 2010 season. He led the MEAC in interceptions before having to sit out for personal reasons. Graham defended 15 passes and intercepted seven two seasons ago. His return his vital because the Aggies loss 2011 All-MEAC cornerback Justin Ferrell to graduation.

Graham will start opposite senior cornerback Terence Webb as they try to form one of the most formidable corner duos in the MEAC.

Loving Larry

Even with all his talent, A&T senior receiver Larry Raper has always been the second receiver with Wallace Miles on the team. This season, the Aggies are expecting leadership from Raper, who had a breakout season in 2011.

Raper made 22 catches and compiled 410 yards receiving, while catching a team-leading seven touchdown passes. During his career, Raper has returned punts, kickoffs and played running back and receiver. Coming into the 2012 season, he has 1,587 all-purpose yards.

The Monster Mash

North Carolina A&T had one of the best run defenses in the country last season. The Aggies ranked seventh in rush defense and eighth in overall defense. A big part of the Aggies success came behind the leadership of senior defensive end Tony Mashburn.

Mashburn made 12.5 tackles behind the line of scrimmage in 2011. As a team, the Aggies held five of their opponents to under 50 yards rushing last season. In three of those games, the Aggies held their opponents to under 10 yards rushing.

Hearn Comes Back

Before the start of the 2011 season, offensive lineman Thomas Hearn (6-0, 290, Durham, N.C.) had high expectations for his senior season. But he broke his left ankle in preseason practice and was forced to miss the entire 2011 season. Hearn's injury marked the second time in his career he had to sit out more than nine games in a season.

It was his third serious injury since coming to A&T in 2007. Hearn injured his left knee by tearing his MCL in 2008 and missed one game. He injured the same MCL in 2010 and missed 10 games. After his injury in 2011, Hearn had to request and was granted a sixth season. Hearn is battling R.J. Canty for the starting center position.

"Grant"-ed

North Carolina A&T junior linebacker D'Vonte Grant had a superb first season with A&T. Two games into the season he earned a spot on the Jerry Rice Watch List for best FCS freshman in the nation. Grant, who led the Aggies in tackles in 2011, eventually became a finalist.

The biggest game of the year every year on the Aggies' schedule is homecoming. Norfolk State, the defending MEAC champion, will be the homecoming guest on Oct. 27.

In November...

The North Carolina A&T football team had four players earn a spot on the MEAC's All-Academic team. Defensive back Travis Crosby, a criminal justice major, currently has a 3.4 grade point average. Tackle William Ray Robinson is a journalism and mass communications major. He is a sophomore on the field and has a GPA better than 3.0. Fullback Devin Moore, who is also a criminal justice major, also made the list. Wide receiver Julian Alford, who graduated in 2011, rounded out the foursome. Crosby, Robinson and Moore are starters.

Who Is The Future At Quarterback?

Head coach Rod Broadway and his staff added three new quarterbacks during the offseason to help Lewis Kindle, whose only backup last season was Ricky Lewis.

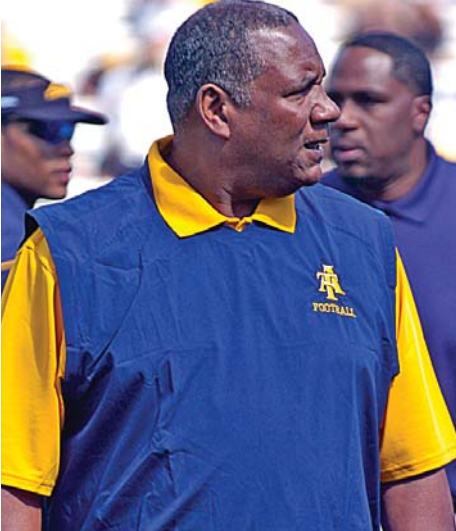

Rod Broadway enters his second season as the head football coach at North Carolina A&T. His first season at the helm produced a lot of excitement about the future of Aggie football.

The Aggies not only had a four-win improvement from their 1-10 season in 2010, but they were also in the thick of the MEAC race midway through the season before a four-game road trip derailed their chances. Also in his first year, Broadway became the first Aggie head coach in school history to produce a 2,000-yard passer, a 1,000-yard rusher and a 1,000-yard receiver.

Mike Mayhew, the Aggies' 1,000-yard back in 2011, was named MEAC Co-Offensive Player of the Year. Wallace Miles, the 1,000-yard receiver, signed an NFL free agent contract with the Detroit Lions. Defensively, linebacker D'Vonte Grant became a Jerry Rice Finalist for best freshman in the Division I Football Championship Subdivision after he led the Aggies in tackles. As a team, the Aggies showed their most significant improvement on the defensive end. They were ranked 114th in FCS rushing defense in 2010. In 2011 under Broadway, they finished seventh nationally and were tops in the MEAC. In 2010, A&T was 89th in FCS total defense. A year later under Broadway, they were eighth.

Broadway came to A&T with an impressive his-



story of winning championships with a brand of football that is exciting offensively and punishing defensively. In his last two head coaching positions - N.C. Central and Grambling State - each school came away with a Black College National Championship.

Broadway has compiled a 73-29 (.716) record over nine years as a head coach. Before taking over the difficult task of rebuilding an Aggies program with just 14 wins in the previous seven seasons before his arrival, Broadway spent four seasons (2007-10) at Grambling State. The Tigers went 35-12 under his stewardship.

The year before he arrived at GSU, the Tigers went 3-8. During his first season there in 2008, the Tigers finished second in the Southwestern Athletic Conference and made an appearance in the SWAC Championship Game. Five players received either All-American or All-SWAC honors, and Broadway was a finalist for the nationally-recognized Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

The impact of Broadway's arrival was seen on both sides of the football. Grambling went from an average defense to one of the fiercest in the country. The Tigers ranked 12th nationally in total defense, eighth in rushing defense and 11th in scoring defense.

Grambling held three of their opponents to fewer than 30 yards, and 10 of their opponents committed three or more turnovers. Offensively, wide receiver Clyde Edwards earned FCS Fabulous 50 All-American honors and running back Frank Warren was named SWAC Freshman of the Year.

Year two led to even more improvements for the GSU program. The Tigers ascended to

the top of the SWAC with a 9-0 record and a 41-9 win over Jackson State in the SWAC Championship Game. GSU's 2008 season also produced an 11-2 overall mark, a No. 24 national ranking in the Sports Network Division I-FCS poll and a Black College National Championship.

Defense was the catalyst for the Tigers' success as they finished the season ranked No. 1 nationally in turnover margin, pass efficiency defense and had a No. 7 ranking in rush defense. In addition, three players earned All-American honors, nine were named All-SWAC and five players earned Louisiana Sports Writers Association recognition. Accolades for Broadway included being named SWAC Coach of the Year and The Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C., Coach of the Year.

In 2009, GSU continued to play well. The Tigers finished 7-4 overall and 5-2 in the SWAC. The Tigers led the nation in punt return yardage and they had the ninth-best scoring offense. The next season resulted in a 9-2 mark that was complemented by an 8-1 SWAC record. The Tigers' rushing attack produced more than 200 yards per game, which ranked 15th nationally.

During his career at GSU, Broadway also

During his career at GSU, Broadway also showed he had a hankering for winning rivalry games. He went 3-1 against archrival Southern.

He also owns the best winning percentage in program history, even better than legendary GSU head coach Eddie Robinson. Before his stint at GSU, Broadway turned N.C. Central into a Division II national power.

His four-year stint (2003-06) at N.C. Central produced a 33-11 record, back-to-back CIAA titles for the first time in 50 years and the Eagles made two consecutive appearances in the NCAA Division II Playoffs. The 2006 season was the highlight of Broadway's tenure at NCCU.

Broadway led the Eagles to an 11-1 season and the top seed in the NCAA Division II Southeast Region. After fielding the No. 1 rated offense in the CIAA and the 15th ranked defense nationally, individual honors included two players being named Associated Press Little All-Americans.

There were also 12 players named All-CIAA, 10 Eagles earned Daktronics All-Southeast Region recognition and four members from the 2006 team were named SBN All-Americans, including freshman quarterback Stadford Brown, who was also named SBN Player of the Year. During his stint at NCCU, Broadway also put together a 16-game regular-season winning streak and led the Eagles to their first-ever victory over a SWAC opponent with a win over Southern in 2006.

Broadway began his collegiate coaching career at East Carolina University in 1979. His other coaching positions included stays at Duke University (1981-94), the University

At Florida, he served as a member of the Steve Spurrier's staff. In 1996, he helped the Gators win an NCAA National Championship.

Broadway's stay also included four SEC Championships and six bowl appearances. The Gators defense led the SEC in sacks four straight seasons (1996-99), and the team set a school record for fewest rushing yards allowed, as offenses produced just 70.7 yards per game.

A 1977 graduate of UNC, Broadway played on the Tar Heels defensive line from 1974-77. He earned the team's Outstanding Freshman award in 1974 as helped the Tar Heels earn a Sun Bowl berth. In 1977, he earned All-ACC honors along with the team's Most Outstanding Senior honor.
