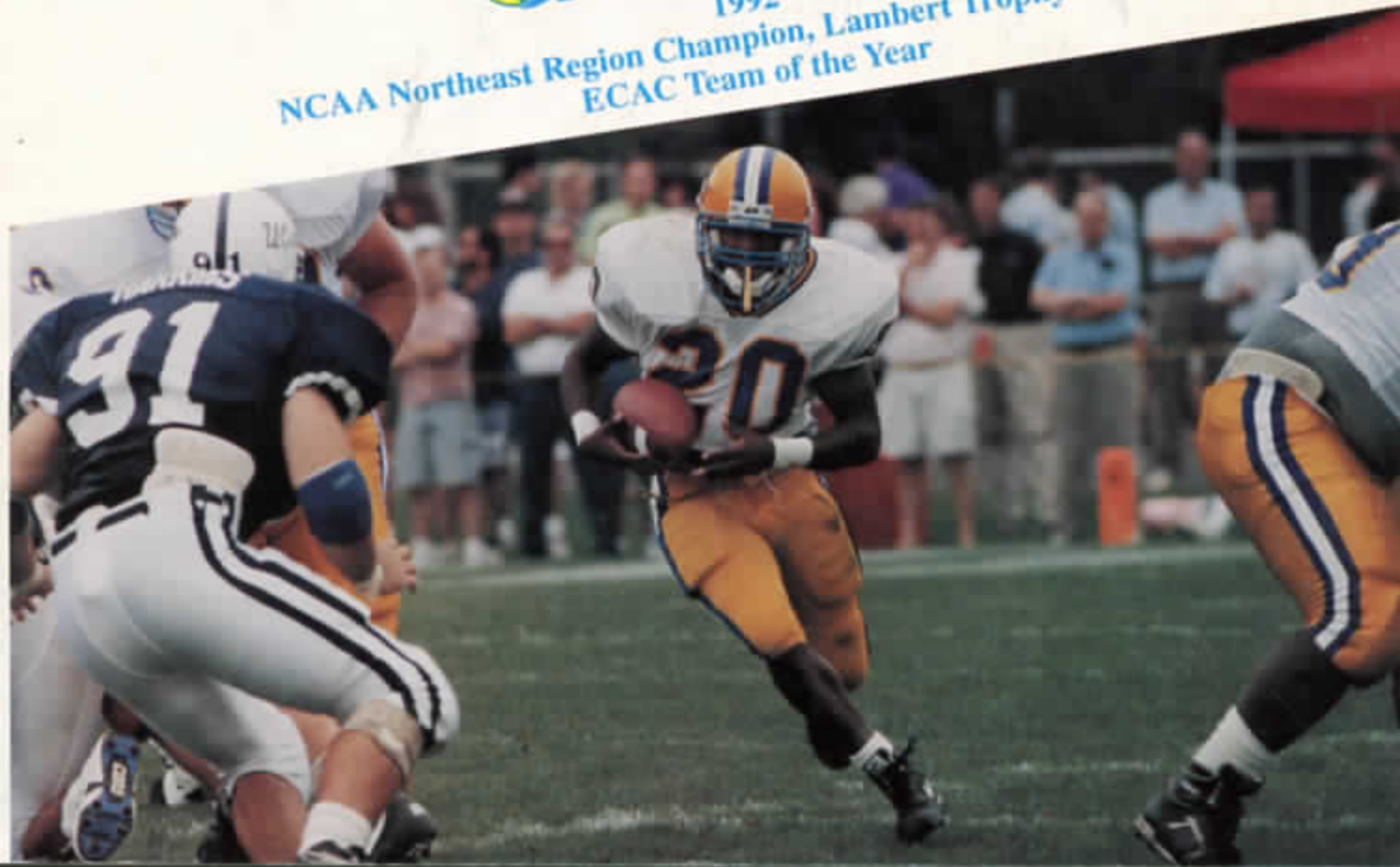

Memo To The Media

Robert B. Dodds Stadium features a modern press box which accommodates the media, visiting SIDs and radio stations. Credentials are required for the press box and can be obtained by calling the University of New Haven Sports Information Office at (203) 932-7025 or writing Sports Information Office, 300 Orange Avenue, West Haven, CT 06516.

Because of limited space, visiting radio stations are requested to call the SID office as soon as possible to make arrangements for broadcast. Each radio station should call Southern New England Telephone to install a phone line for broadcast at least two weeks prior to the contest. You may call SNET at (203) 789-6711 during normal business hours.

The press box will be open two hours prior to game time unless otherwise requested. Game information will include media notes, depth charts and game programs. This information will be available on Friday before each home game. Final statistics can be picked up at the Gymnasium, directly across from the football field, approximately 20 minutes after the game.

Pre-game interviews should be made through the sports information office. Post-game interviews will take place in the interview room, located adjacent to the locker rooms, approximately 15 minutes after the contest.

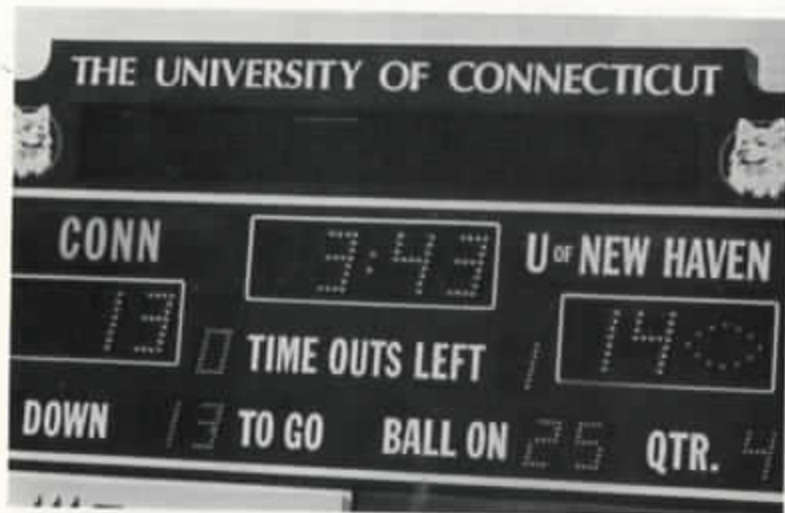

Head Coach Mark Whipple

Mark Whipple begins his sixth season as head coach of the New Haven Chargers. In his first five seasons at the helm, Whipple led New Haven to a 37-16 record, including last year's 12-1 slate.

In addition to his head coaching responsibilities, Whipple also serves as the team's offensive coordinator. New Haven's offense was tops in all Divisions for scoring offense (50.5 points per game) and total offense (587.7 yards per game) in 1992. His 1990 passing attack was the best in Division II, averaging 335.4 yards per game.

He has led the Chargers to a top 20 ranking in four of his five years, including last year's number five ranking. Whipple is the first UNH coach to lead the Chargers to the NCAA playoffs, coaching the team to an undefeated regular season, a Northeast Regional title and a semi-final berth.

During his tenure, six players have earned All-America honors, including three from the 1990 squad and two from last year's team. He has also coached 71 All-New England players and 11 All-ECAC players during his five-year stay.

Whipple has served on several regional All-America committees and is active in various New Haven football groups.

A 1979 graduate of Brown University, Whipple came to UNH following a highly

successful stint as the University of New Hampshire's offensive coordinator. The Wildcats finished second in the Yankee Conference in passing and fourth in total offense during Whipple's first year.

One season later, Whipple coached three players who finished in the top 10 in NCAA offensive categories. With his pro-style passing game, New Hampshire won 14 of 21 games during his years at the school.

Before coaching at New Hampshire, Whipple was a member of the USFL's Arizona Wranglers coaching staff. He worked with Roman Gabriel on offensive quality control, mainly assisting with the Arizona quarterbacks. His resume also includes stops at Brown University as an offensive receivers coach, Union College as an offensive coordinator and a one-year stint as an assistant coach at St. Lawrence University.

During his college years, Whipple won three letters as a football player with his best statistical years coming in 1977 and 1978. In his junior campaign, he completed 77 of 143 passes (53.8 percent) for 989 yards and four touchdowns.

He improved on those figures in 1978, completing 98 of 197 aerials for 1,376 yards and nine touchdowns. The Bruins finished with a 6-3 record in 1977 and a 7-2 slate in 1978. He currently ranks sixth in career passing percent-



age, eighth in career pass completions (175) and fifth in career passing yardage (2,365).

Whipple was a member of the 1976 Ivy League Championship team which finished the year with an 8-1 overall record and a 6-1 Ivy slate. He also earned four varsity letters on the Brown baseball diamond as a starting shortstop. A native of Phoenix, Ariz., Whipple resides in Cheshire with his wife Brenda and their son Spencer.

Football Focus With Head Coach Mark Whipple

Since taking over the New Haven football program, Mark Whipple has led the Chargers to 37 wins in 53 games, a .698 winning percentage. In order to gain an insight to New Haven football, Coach Whipple answered several questions about his program.

How has the program progressed since you've taken over the Chargers?

"New Haven has progressed into one of the top teams in Division II. I believe we have one of the toughest schedules in the nation. We have completely cut out Division III opponents and will only play Division II or I-AA teams. We have held our own against everyone. Our program has gained more national recognition in the last five years. The wins over Central Florida (a top Division II team which has since become a Division I-AA program) and UConn put us on the map. We have become a traditional top 20 program which means we've earned respect across the nation. It's no longer news if New Haven wins seven or eight games. Winning is expected of us and that says a lot about our program."

New Haven is nationally known in baseball, volleyball and basketball. Do you think football has joined those sports in terms of national recognition?

"The eyes of the nation turned toward us last year. We earned respect across the nation after a perfect season and two wins in the playoffs. The team has been nationally ranked in six of the last seven years which means we have a tradition of winning. For three years, we were 8-2 and didn't make it. Today, we would make the playoffs with an 8-2 record. That's the type of respect we have earned over the last seven seasons. We are no longer looked upon as a program playing over its head. In fact, schools now point to us on their schedule to illustrate their strength of schedule."

Do you think New Haven has developed a football tradition?

"A tradition has developed since I've been here. We have had seven winning seasons in the last eight years and have one of the best records in the Nation over the past six years (53 wins, 20 losses). Our kids now believe they're going to win when they step on that field which is different from previous years. Plus, our fans and alumni are starting to come out to games and support us more and more each year. That means a lot to our players and to the University."

What do you look for in a football player?

"First and most important is a player's character. We don't want to take anyone who could be a potential problem on or off the field. He has to be dedicated and ready to make sacrifices during the season. It's difficult to be a good student-athlete today, but it can be done. The players and coaches need to work together to insure success both in the classroom and on the field. After character, I would say athletic ability is important. We want a player that can perform on the field."



What would you consider to be your personal highlight over the past five seasons?

"That's a tough choice but I would have to say the win over Central Florida in 1988 and the wins over UConn, West Chester and Ferris State last year. The Central Florida game was a great win because we played in front of 23,000 of the loudest fans I've ever heard. The players did not allow that to bother them and they faced up to the challenge. The UConn win proved we can play with anyone, including Division I opponents. The West Chester victory allayed any doubts that New Haven belonged in the playoffs. The Ferris State win was a tremendous boost to New England football because it created a tremendous amount of excitement in the Region. We played Ferris State in front of 8,500 fans in the Yale Bowl. It doesn't get any better than that."

What goals have you set for the team in 1993?

"You've heard this before but we are going to play one game at a time. Our goal is to win every time we set foot on the football field and the only way to do that is to take it one week at a time. We followed it last year and won 12 games so the formula does work. This year, we want to win every game. If we do that, then we will win the national title."

What is the future of New Haven football?

"We reached number five in the nation last year and have been a consistent top 20 team over the last seven seasons. That's a tremendous accomplishment. Now, it is time for the Chargers to become a consistent Top 10 and playoff team. I think New Haven has the ability to build a national championship caliber program. There are a lot of factors that go into building that type of program, such as support from the University, support from the student body, faculty and staff and support from the community. I believe New Haven has that support. Now, we just need to do it on the field."



The Assistant Coaches



Paul Gorham
Offensive Line Coach
Recruiting Coordinator

Gorham returns for his sixth season as offensive line coach at New Haven. In addition to his coaching duties, Gorham also coordinates all recruiting at UNH. He coached Harry Boatwain for three seasons, molding him into an All-American and NFL draft pick. Last season, his offensive line helped New Haven establish school records for points (505) and total offense (5,877 yards). Offensive tackle Scott Emmert was named to the Kodak and Associated Press All-America squads, the third lineman to earn All-America honors under Gorham's supervision. A native of South Portland, Maine, Gorham enjoyed a successful football career at the University of New Hampshire where he was graduated with a B.A. in History. On the field, the tight end earned All-Yankee Conference, All-New England and All-America honorable mention. Upon graduation, Gorham stayed at New Hampshire as an assistant.



Tony Mortali
Linebacker Coach

Mortali has been with the Chargers football program since the beginning, playing for New Haven from 1973 through 1976. Mortali has assisted with almost every position since joining the coaching staff in 1977 with his main charge being the linebackers over the past few seasons. Prior to joining the coaching staff, he played on both sides of the ball as an offensive guard and as a linebacker. In 1975, Mortali was named to the All-New England Conference team. The Branford native also played lacrosse and was the first football player inducted into the UNH Athletic Hall of Fame. He was graduated from UNH with a B.S. in Electrical Engineering.



Joe Wirth
Defensive Coordinator
Linebacker Coach

Wirth begins his second season as the defensive coordinator for the Chargers. He has a well-rounded background which includes head coaching experience on the Division I, III and high school levels. Wirth began his football career at West Virginia University where he played both linebacker and center. He joined the coaching ranks by accepting the defensive coordinator position at Holy Cross. He moved to Colgate University for four years before taking an assistant coaching position at Brown University. His defense was nationally ranked four out of seven seasons and he helped the Bruins win its only Ivy League Championship in 1976. Wirth then accepted a head coaching position at Union College where he turned the Dutchmen into a perennial Division III powerhouse. With his work done there, Wirth returned to Providence as an Associate Head Coach at Brown.



Dale Joyner
Receivers Coach

Joyner enters his fifth year with the Chargers, coaching the receivers the last three seasons and the tight ends in 1989. A native of New Haven, Joyner played on three Yankee Conference championship teams while at Boston University. He played both sides of the ball as a wide receiver and a defensive back. After graduating in 1983, Joyner joined the University of Houston as a graduate assistant. He then coached at Milford Academy before a three-year stint at Bloomsburg University as a receivers coach.



John Nelson
Running Back Coach

Nelson begins his eighth year as the offensive backfield coach. His main charge will be the running attack, which gained a school record 3,397 yards last season. The Milford native came to New Haven following a stint with Southern Connecticut State where he coached while he worked on his Master's degree. Nelson earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Bridgeport where he played football for the Purple Knights. Nelson served four years in the U.S. Marine Corps before attending the University of Bridgeport.



John Svatik
Secondary Coach

Svatik begins his second season since returning to UNH after spending a season with Sacred Heart University in 1991. He coached for three years at UNH before accepting the post with the Pioneers in their inaugural year. His resume also includes stints as head football coach at Notre Dame High School in Fairfield. He spent one season as an offensive receivers coach at Western Connecticut State University and also spent time as an assistant coach at Central Connecticut State where he supervised the defensive backs. Svatik began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Western Michigan University where he worked with the receivers.



The Assistant Coaches



Keith Dudzinski
Linebacker Coach

A former New Haven standout, Dudzinski begins his third season on the UNH sideline as a linebacker coach. Although this is his first coaching assignment, Dudzinski offers a solid background in football. He ranked as one of New Haven's best pass rushers during his career, registering 9.5 sacks in his senior year. He was a first team All-New England pick in 1988 as a linebacker and a second teamer as a defensive lineman in 1989. Dudzinski made 116 tackles in his final two seasons, including 82 in 1988. He was co-captain of the 1989 team.



Bill Smith
Defensive Line Coach

Smith begins his third season as an assistant coach at New Haven, supervising the defensive line. A three-year starter at Union College, Smith played middle guard for the Dutchmen. In his senior season, he was elected team captain and named to the All-ECAC squad. In that year, Union won the Lambert Trophy and advanced to the Stagg Bowl, the Division III national championship game, before losing to the University of Dayton. He intercepted two passes that year, returning one for a touchdown in the NCAA semi-final contest. He was graduated from Union with a degree in English.



Jud Smith
Quarterback Coach

Smith returns to the Chargers' coaching staff for his fourth season after coaching high school and youth football before joining the New Haven staff. He coached at those levels in New Hampshire, California and Connecticut. Smith attended the University of Richmond where he played lacrosse, golf and helped out the Spiders football coaching staff. A native of New Haven, Smith serves as vice president of the New Haven Gridiron Club.



Bob Grammer
Quality Control Coach

Grammer begins his third season with the New Haven coaching staff, helping out with the offense in addition to coaching the punt return team. Although this is his first coaching job, Grammer brings insight to

the coaching staff. He was a free safety and a punt returner for the Chargers before an injury forced him out of the lineup. He assists with all phases of coaching.



Kayo Rodriguez
Volunteer Assistant

The father of New Haven football, Rodriguez started the program as a club team in 1965. He was the team's head coach for eight years until the University awarded the football program with varsity status in 1973. He has coached practically every position during his 25 years with the football team.



Eric Barbarito
Offensive Line Coach

Barbarito begins his second season as an assistant coach for the Chargers, overseeing the offensive line and the tight ends. He brings a well-rounded background to UNH, playing two seasons as an offensive lineman at the University of Rochester. An injury forced Barbarito out of the lineup, but he stayed with the team as an assistant coach for the next two seasons.



John Raba
Running Back Coach

Raba, 1992 team captain, will help supervise the running backs and kickoff returners this year after excelling in both positions over the last four seasons. The former fullback ranks in several career categories including rushing yards (sixth, 1,279), receptions (eighth, 105) and receiving yards (ninth, 1,099). Raba is the only UNH player to record over 1,000 rushing, receiving and kickoff return yards in a career.



Ken Suhl
Quarterback Coach

Suhl, the Chargers record holder for passing TDs in a season (26) and a career (48), will assist with the quarterbacks this year. He set an NCAA Division II record by throwing 211 consecutive passes without an interception in 1992. He was the ECAC and New England Player of the Year, placed fourth in the Harlon Hill balloting, and played football in England last summer.

1993 Outlook



After posting a 12-1 record and advancing to the NCAA Semi-finals last season, Head Coach Mark Whipple has little room for improvement in 1993. The little room that he has to improve would involve a national championship and the five-year veteran is ready to commit to that particular cause.

The Chargers earned their first NCAA playoff bid in 1992, making the most of the berth by capturing the Northeast Region title and advancing to the semi-finals before losing to eventual national champion Jacksonville State. New Haven's potent offense caught the attention of both the local and national media as the team was named the nation's top offense by *Sports Illustrated*. The team

finished the '92 campaign as the All-Divisions leader in total offense (587.7 yards per game) and in scoring offense (50.5 points per game).

New Haven returns most of the 1992 starting team, losing just 10 lettermen from last year. Ten defensive starters will return in uniform while six offensive starters will come back for another year. The team loses only lineman James Bailey on defense while the offense must replace quarterback Ken Suhl, fullback John Raba, offensive lineman Scott Emmert and Brian Houston and tight end Dave Carlon. However, Whipple believes this team to be as strong as last year and expects his Chargers to challenge just as earnestly as the '92 team. The following is a positional breakdown of the 1993 New Haven Chargers.

Quarterbacks: Junior James Weir will take over the starting job from Ken Suhl. Weir did not see action last year, sitting out as a red-shirt, but appeared sharp during workouts last Spring. He throws the ball accurately as well as for distance but is also a threat to run. Although he does not have the running instinct of Suhl, Weir will keep the opposition guessing with roll outs and quarterback draws. Sophomore Brian Garrison and freshman Jesse Showerda will provide the Chargers with dependable reserves behind Weir. Showerda enjoyed an outstanding Spring, but will need to learn the collegiate game this year. Garrison handled the back-up duties last year and gained valuable insight into the New Haven offense.

Receivers: Tony Willis has already set several school records and is looking to put those records out of reach with another spectacular season. He already holds the career receiving yardage mark and needs just 11 more to become the leader in total receptions. He became only the second Charger to gain 1,000 receiving yards in a season, grabbing 51 passes for 1,030 yards last year.

Max Joyner-Brown excelled toward the end of 1993, making 11 catches for 181 yards and a team-best four touchdowns in the three NCAA playoff games. Joyner-Brown finished the regular season with eight receptions for 109 yards and three touchdowns. Seniors Tom O'Connor and Tony Ranoldo as well as junior Joe Davis will also contribute after making nine, six and six catches, respectively, in 1992.

Tom McCormack will take over the tight end duties for the graduated Dave Carlon last year. He made 10 catches for 108 yards and two touchdowns. He will receive help from newcomer Michael Johnstone, a 6-2, 230 player from Islip, N.Y. Johnstone will see plenty of action and will be counted upon to make many catches this season.

Running Backs: It would be difficult to refute New Haven's claim of possessing the best tailback tandem in the country. Junior Roger Graham and senior A.J. Livingston accounted for 2,615 yards and 39 touchdowns last year and both finished among Division II's top ten

scorers. Graham led Division II in rushing with 1,717 yards and was third in scoring with 13.2 points per game. Livingston gained 898 yards with 17 rushing and two receiving touchdowns which helped him set the school record for scoring (240 pts). Kyle Swist will also support from this position.

The tailbacks will be joined by three new fullbacks, namely senior Steve Lopes as well as juniors Charles Perry and Colin Spooner. Lopes, who spent the last three seasons as a linebacker, may have earned the starting nod following his performance in spring workouts despite making the transition. Perry is close enough to challenge for the starting berth with a strong pre-season camp. Perry saw action in eight games last year but carried the ball just three times for 23 yards.

Offensive Line: Replacing Scott Emmert and Brian Houston, both 300-plus pounders, will not be easy. The good news is that three of last year's offensive line returns in the persons of senior tackle Peter Indresano, senior guard Tom Dempsey and junior center Frank Sheehan. The addition of Tyrone Smith will help New Haven fans forget about the loss of Emmert and Houston as the 6-4, 290 lineman will fill one of the starting vacancies. Senior Ken Colon and juniors Anthony Querin, Malcolm Barrow and Peter Schumann saw action last year and will battle for the remaining starting position.

Defensive Line: Senior Walter Apperwhite and Mike Barbara held starting roles last year and will reclaim those spots in 1993. Apperwhite made 27 tackles with 2.5 sacks while Barbara recorded 33 tackles and seven for loss last year. Senior Derrick Costa and junior Toby Byrd will fight for the third starting position. Junior Jim May (five tackles) also adds depth to the position. You can look for Bruce Johnson to challenge for significant time at the position. Johnson has strength and agility, both of which could place him the starting lineup by season's end.

Linebackers: This position is well-stocked with talent, especially when you look at players like Bill Covert (66 tackles), Joe Newsome (66 tackles, nine for loss and five sacks), Chris Lunz (45 tackles, 8.5 sacks). All three players were starters a year ago and the trio will return in the same roles in '93. Mike Forte will return to the team after missing last season with a broken leg. Forte spent his first two years as a running back before making the transition to this position last August. Sophomores Pat Bannon and Wayne Robertson, Scott Riggs and Rich Connors will also get the call often next season, giving defensive coordinator Joe Wirth plenty of options at the position. Clifton Smith and Keith Lavigne will also add depth to the linebacker position.

Defensive Backs: This is probably the deepest position on the New Haven defense. Senior captain George Byrd will return after leading the team in total tackles last year with 83. He tied George Porcha for the team lead in interceptions with three. Porcha made 46 tackles and four sacks last year to go along with five tackles for loss. Tony White returns for his fourth year as a starter. White made 58 tackles last season with five tackles for loss. Senior Steve Wolfe will also frequent the lineup after making 30 tackles in 1992. Sophomores Michael Brown and James Triplett each made an impression last year which could help one of them earn the fourth starting position. Brown made 20 tackles with one interception while Triplett garnered 17 tackles. Jerrell Bishop, Marquis Jackson, Ryan Kelsey and Lamont Sutton will also return in a supporting role this year.





The 1993 Season

Bill Covert Placed Second In Total Tackles Last Year With 66

Apperwhite became one of the Chargers' defensive leaders last season and is expected to play a similar role this season. His mobility makes him one of the team's best pass rushers. The senior finished the 1993 season with 35 total tackles, three tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks. His best game came in the season opener, making six tackles against UConn. The lineman later added four-tackle performances against Clarion and Carson-Newman. Apperwhite recorded his career-high in his sophomore season with an eight-tackle performance against Wofford. The Boston native made five or more tackles in four games during his sophomore season. He spent most of his freshman season with the junior varsity squad but did see action on the varsity level. Apperwhite came to New Haven following a highly successful career at Boston Latin High School. Off the field, Apperwhite served a term as the president of the Black Student Union. His major is communications.

Graham was named to the *NCAA Preview Magazine* Pre-Season All-America first team for 1993. He did not become a regular in the lineup until the sixth game of his freshmen year. Graham gained over 100-yards in 14 of the last 15 regular season games, four of which were for over 200 yards. Wofford College is the only team to hold him under the century mark, allowing him 50 yards on November 9, 1991. He holds the school record for career rushing yards (2,659 yards) and needs just 360 yards to become the New England College Division leader. **Sophomore Year:** Graham led Division II in rushing with 1,717 yards on 200 carries, both of which are school records, despite not starting one game in 1992. The tailback capped off his season with Associated Press All-America first team honors, the *Football Gazette* All-America second team laurels as well as All-ECAC and All-New England berths. He gained 100 or more yards in all 10 regular season games as well as the three NCAA playoff games. The Spring Valley native began the season by rushing for 127 yards against Division I-AA UConn but was turned away from endzone for the only time of the year. One week later, Graham earned the *Sports Illustrated* Small College Player of the Week after collecting a school-record 298 yards on 18 carries with five touchdowns versus Buffalo. He added two 190-yard plus games following Buffalo before running for 236 yards against American International College. He ran for 140 yards against Carson-Newman and 163 yards versus Shepherd College, both of which boasted nationally-ranked rushing defenses. The sophomore's success continued in the playoffs as he ran for 222 yards against West Chester, 118 versus Ferris State and 191 in the Jacksonville State contest. Graham's photo appeared in both *USA Today* and *Sports Illustrated* as both publications ran feature stories on the 1992 Chargers. **Freshman Year:** Graham spent most of his time on the bench during the first five games of 1991, carrying the ball 28 times for 129 yards during that time frame. He moved into the starting lineup in week six following A.J. Livingston's season-ending injury in the West Chester game. Graham almost reached his season-total in his first start, carrying the ball 25 times

for 103 yards versus American International. He became the first New Haven player to gain over 200 yards in a game the following week when he collected 251 yards on 29 carries in the Chargers' infamous 64-60 loss to Southern Connecticut. After gaining 147 yards against Springfield and 50 yards versus Wofford, Graham shattered his own record with a 262-yard outing in the Shippensburg game. He received the New England Sports Writers Gold Helmet award and his third ECAC Rookie of the Week honor for his performance against Shippensburg. Graham capped the year with a second team All-New England berth and was the New England Rookie of the Year. Graham tallied 833 yards in his five starts which in itself broke the school record for rushing yards in a season set by Bill Gambardella (832 yards) in 1985. He finished the year with 942 yards on 161 carries and eight touchdowns, all of which were team-highs.

High School: Graham played both sides of the ball at Spring Valley High School, lining up as a linebacker and as a fullback. He spent most of his offensive play as a blocking back for Michael Joseph who gained 1,003 yards in 1990. Graham carried the ball for 389 yards on 63 carries that same year. Graham, Tony Willis and George Porcha all played together at Spring Valley High School. **Major:** Graham lists Business Administration as his major.

He set the school record for both categories last year, raising his career total to 40 touchdowns (37 rushing, three receiving) and 240 career points, the only Charger to score more than 200 points in a career. Livingston has scored at least one touchdown in 20 of his 25 regular season appearances, including nine of 10 a year ago. He recorded 10 multiple touchdown games rushing for a career-best four touchdowns against Towson State in 1990 and versus Virginia Union in 1992. He currently ranks second in career rushing yardage with 2,097 yards, surpassing the 2,000-yard mark against Shepherd. **Junior Year:** Livingston gained a career-best 898 yards which is also the third best single season total. He scored the first touchdown against UConn, a 14-yarder in third quarter. He added two touchdowns to his total the following week, rushing for 79 yards against Buffalo. Livingston became only the second UNH player to gain 200-yards in a game when he amassed 249 yards on 16 carries against Virginia Union. He also tied his career-high with four touchdowns in that game. The tailback galloped 69 yards for a touchdown against VUU, his longest run of the season. He collected 101 yards against Central Connecticut one week later, the first time he put together back-to-back 100-yard games since a three-peat in his freshmen season. He scored three touchdowns for the second time against Central Connecticut, accomplishing the task in 1990. He just missed the 100-yard mark against Springfield in week eight, rushing for 98 yards and two touchdowns against the Chiefs. Livingston also enjoyed another outstanding year as a kickoff returner, running back six kicks for 221 yards. **Sophomore Year:** Livingston's second year was cut in half when he tore an ankle ligament in the fourth quarter of the West Chester game, causing him to miss the final five contests. He appeared ready to enjoy another solid season, rushing for 346 yards and four touchdowns in four-plus games. Livingston was shutout and held to 41 yards in the season opener against Cal, Pa. but rebounded with a 150-yard, two touchdown performance versus Clarion in week two. He returned six kickoffs for 142 yards. **Freshmen Year:** Livingston gained 792 yards in his first season, the most ever by a Charger rookie and the second highest season total in UNH history at the time. His 16 TDs established a school record but was later broken by Roger Graham. He opened his career with a 98-yard, two TD game against Cal, Pa. and added two more touchdowns the next week against Clarion. He tallied his third multiple TD game in four weeks with three TDs against Central Connecticut. CHARGERS FOOTBALL '92: A SEASON IN REVIEW

Who knew?

No one knew what to expect from the University of New Haven football team when it returned to campus for pre-season camp. The Chargers were coming off a six-game losing streak and its first losing season in several years, but a solid core of starters were returning to the lineup. Head Coach Mark Whipple questioned how the team would regroup and perform in 1992. He received his answer quickly.

New Haven opened the 1992 campaign just down the road in Storrs against the University of Connecticut. The season had an ominous beginning when quarterback Ken Suhl threw an interception on the first play from scrimmage which UConn quickly turned into seven points, a lead which the Huskies carried into the locker room at halftime. UConn increased their lead with a touchdown drive on its first possession of the second half and held a commanding 13-0 advantage.

The momentum began to swing immediately after UConn's second touchdown when captain John Raba returned the ensuing kickoff inside UConn territory. Three plays later, AJ Livingston scampered 14 yards for a touchdown, cutting the lead to 13-7 with 10:05 remaining in the third quarter. The score remained that way until the first minute of the fourth period when Raba caught a screen pass from Ken Suhl and ran 25 yards for a touchdown, giving UNH its first lead of 1992, 14-13. That was all the New Haven defense needed as it kept UConn stymied the rest of the way, giving UNH a 14-13 victory.

The next contest was a tough match-up against the University of Buffalo, a team which would be moving up to Division I-AA in 1993. The New Haven offense wasted little time in this game, scoring 28 first-quarter points en route to building a 49-27 halftime lead. When the final gun sounded, the Chargers posted 69 points and 766 yards. Tailback Roger Graham grabbed national attention with his 298-yard, five TD performance which earned him Sports Illustrated Small College Player of the Week.

The effects of the road showed up early in week three as a tough Clarion team quickly built a 13-0 lead, which would be the last time UNH trailed in a game until Shepherd College held a 7-6 advantage in week 10. New Haven lit up the scoreboard midway through the first period when Suhl dumped a screen pass to Raba, who turned it into a 60-yard touchdown play. New Haven tied the game less than a minute into the second quarter when Graham galloped 10 yards for a touchdown and the extra point sailed wide of the uprights. The Chargers went on to take a one-point halftime lead, 27-26, but Clarion came back to tie the score after three quarters, 34-34.

The teams traded two touchdowns each in the fourth quarter, the last of which was scored by Clarion with 39 seconds left in the game. The Golden Eagles decided to play for the win and opted for a two-point conversion. The first attempt failed but UNH was whistled for pass interference, giving the home team another chance. The second attempt failed when quarterback Chris Zak overthrew his intended receiver, securing UNH's 48-47 lead.

Coach Whipple had concerns about Virginia Union, the next game on the schedule, despite the fact UNH had scored 117 points to date. The Panthers made the NCAA playoffs the year before and defeated UNH in the last two meetings. The game started out similar to the previous three games in the series, close and mistake free. Then, New Haven exploded for 28 unanswered points in the second quarter to take a 45-13 halftime lead. The Chargers went on to shatter several school records including most points in a game as they defeated Virginia Union, 80-26, collecting 880 total yards, 578 of which came on the ground.

New Haven surpassed the 50-point mark for the fourth straight week as it rolled past Central Connecticut State University by a 55-21 margin. The Blue Devils trailed only 14-7 with 13 minutes left in the first half but New Haven tallied 34 points in a row to build a 41-7 lead after three quarters. Graham just missed another 200-yard day, gaining 192 yards and two touchdowns, while Livingston recorded 101 yards and three touchdowns.

The schedule gave the team a week off following Central Connecticut and UNH used it to prepare for four straight home games. The first opponent during the homestand was American International College. The Chargers wasted little time in taking the lead as linebacker Joe Newsome intercepted a pass on the first play from scrimmage and ran it back 17 yards for a touchdown. AIC trailed 14-0 before cutting the lead in half with three minutes left in the first period. New Haven's defense did not allow another point while the offense posted 52 straight points for a 66-7 victory. Graham

gained 236 yards and scored three touchdowns in the contest, his second 200-yard day in six games. The team racked up over 500 yards for the third straight week with 670.

The offense continued to roll in week seven while the defense became more stingy as the season progressed. After giving up 48 points against Buffalo, the defense allowed fewer points each week it played. Southern Connecticut broke that spell with 13 points but Wirth's starting 11 got back on track by allowing only six points against Springfield and posting a shutout against Carson-Newman.

Meanwhile, the offense kept scoring points as it posted a 56-13 win against Southern Connecticut and a 54-6 victory over Springfield. The Eagles of Carson-Newman brought the nation's best rushing defense to Dodds Stadium in week nine, a defense which allowed just 63.9 yards per game. The Chargers gained 204 yards against Carson-Newman, causing the Eagles to drop from number one to number eight in rushing defense.

The offense faced the fourth best rushing defense when it travelled to Shepherd College in the regular season finale. UNH registered over 300 yards against the Rams, including 163 by Graham, as the Chargers survived an early scare to post a 49-23 win. New Haven trailed 7-6 in the game and owned a narrow 20-16 halftime lead before Suhl threw two third quarter touchdown passes to Tony Willis which put the game out of reach.

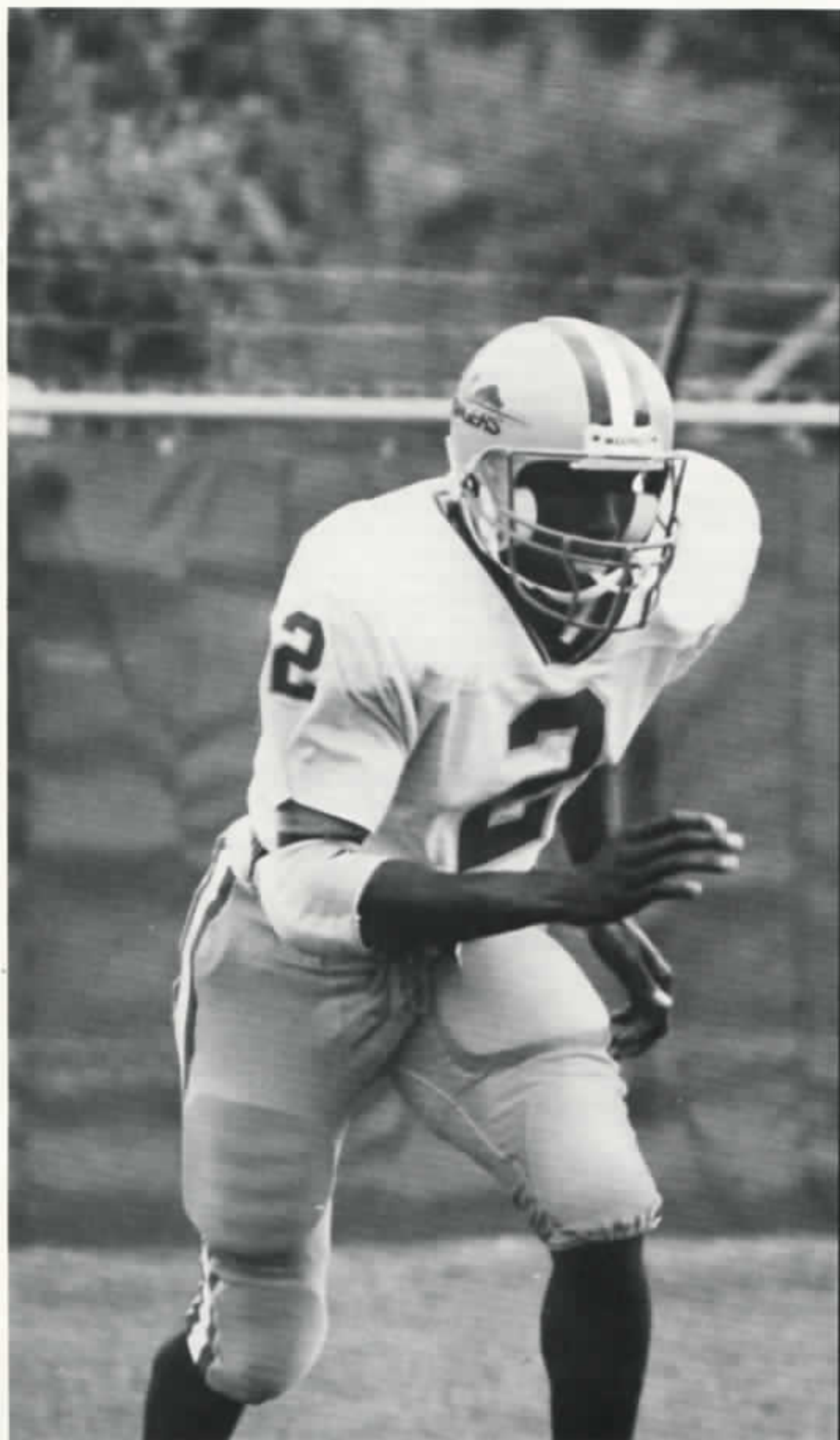
With the Shepherd win, two goals had been realized - a perfect 10-0 season and a trip to the NCAA playoffs. The Chargers opened the playoffs at West Chester and it began in the usual way. The defense held the opposition in check and the offense scored on its first possession. New Haven led for most of the game but the victory was not sealed until John Raba turned a short pass into a 40 yard gain late in the game. Two plays later, Roger Graham rambled the remaining 40-plus yards for a touchdown, giving UNH a two touchdown lead with under two minutes to go. As time wound down, the announcement was made that the Chargers would play Ferris State at the Yale Bowl.

Once again, New Haven scored early, this time on a 40-plus yard run by Graham on his first carry of the game. The Charger defense kept Ferris State at bay throughout the first half, holding the visitors to just two field goals in the first half. New Haven won the game in the third quarter as the Blue and Gold posted three touchdowns in that period, turning a close game into an apparent rout. Ferris State managed its only touchdown in the fourth quarter but a NCAA record 99-yard scoring strike from Ken Suhl to Tony Willis ended any comeback hopes as UNH won the game, 35-13.

The Ferris State win propelled the Chargers into the NCAA semi-finals, one win away from the NCAA championship game. New Haven traveled to Alabama for a match-up against 1991 finalist Jacksonville State. Early mistakes enabled Jacksonville State to take a 21-0 lead but the Chargers fought back to close the gap to 21-14 at halftime. Coach Whipple unleashed his weapons in the second half which allowed UNH to take its only lead of the game, 35-34 with five minutes remaining. Unfortunately, Jacksonville State answered with a quick touchdown to regain the lead for good, enroute to a 46-35 victory.

Despite the setback, the University of New Haven celebrated the most successful season in the program's 20-year history. With more than 15 starters returning for 1993, fans are already wondering how far UNH will go. Who knows?

University of New Haven Football History

Twenty years may seem like a long time to some people, but to a football program, such a time period is merely the beginning. The University of New Haven celebrated its 20th season of competition last year, and celebrated it in grand style as the Chargers received an NCAA playoff bid and advanced to the National semi-finals. Twenty years is not a great deal of experience when you consider opponents American International College (56 seasons), Southern Connecticut (45 seasons) and Springfield College (100 seasons) have all reached middle age if not their golden years.

The idea of New Haven football was first conceived by Kayo Rodriguez in 1965. Rodriguez, who is affectionately known as the father of New Haven football, started the program with little equipment and few players. But the players he had were loyal and always gave their best effort, which was often needed with the tough competition the Chargers had to face. Despite the beatings it sometimes took, the Chargers football club continued to build itself. Players like Stephen DiMugno, a UNH Hall of Famer, led the Chargers' fight to earn varsity status.

After eight years of playing as a club, the New Haven football team was rewarded for its perseverance when it was annointed a varsity sport in 1973. The Chargers football program was officially born, much to the delight of its proud father Kayo Rodriguez. Rodriguez has never left his child's side, still active as a volunteer coach today.

But the exuberance was soon eclipsed

by the reality of playing a varsity schedule. Head Coach Joe McHugh had the difficult task of leading the often overmatched Chargers against well-established programs. Despite losing their first 18 games, McHugh's men never gave up. Finally in 1974, New Haven first tasted victory by defeating Curry College, 13-7. The Chargers would win just two more games in their next 16 outings. But as the adage proclaims "It does not matter whether you win or lose but how you play the game" and the New Haven football team played each game with the same intensity.

Players like DiMugno, John Befus, John Cicarella, Bill Dwyer and Tony Mortali led the Chargers through those rough years. Things took a turn when Tom Bell took over the program in 1976 and posted the school's first winning season in his third year at the helm, a 6-3 record in 1978. The 1979 season is probably the year that will stand out in the memories of most Charger fans. In that season, New Haven posted an unblemished 8-0-1 record and won the New England Football Conference championship, the only unbeaten season until last year's 10-0 regular season. Captains Brian O'Keefe, John Kovach, Paul Kostopoulos and Joe Kubik were the force behind the Chargers perfect season.

The Chargers would experience only three more losing seasons from 1980 to 1991. In fact, the Blue and Gold posted the best record among Division II New England teams during the 1980s. New Haven posted a 58-39-3 record during the decade, eight more wins

than Southern Connecticut which owned the next best record during that time period.

Tom Bell, who coached the Chargers to their first winning season, gave way to Larry McElreavy. McElreavy accepted the task of building New Haven into a Division II caliber program. After a 2-8 season, McElreavy coached the Blue and Gold to 5-5 and 6-4 record, New Haven's first winning season at the Division II level. McElreavy left New Haven to take the head coaching job at Columbia University and was replaced by USFL coach Chris Palmer. Palmer rejuvenated the program, leading the Chargers to consecutive 8-2 records.

Palmer's winning records helped the Blue and Gold garner its first Top Ten ranking in 1986. That was the only Top Ten ranking until Head Coach Mark Whipple posted two wins to start the 1990 campaign which vaulted his team to the number 10 spot. He improved that ranking last season when he coached New Haven to a program-best fifth spot on the NCAA poll.

Each UNH coach has led his team to a respective first. McHugh coached the Chargers to their first win while Bell posted the team's first winning season. McElreavy was the man behind the Chargers first winning season in Division II while Palmer led his 1986 team to the program's first top ten ranking. Last season, Whipple joined the club by coaching the Chargers to their first NCAA playoff berth. As you can see, the New Haven program has accomplished a great deal since beginning in 1973. Not bad for a 20-year old youngster.

Chargers In The Pros

University of New Haven football players and coaches have achieved success in the professional ranks following their careers in West Haven. Quarterback **Ken Suhl** became the latest professional player when he signed a contract with the Nottingham Hoods, a pro team in England. Suhl, who earned the nickname King Ken during his stay, was the team's starting quarterback and was also responsible for calling all offensive plays. He helped lead the team to victory in his first start. The English league began in May and ran through the summer. Suhl will return to New Haven following the season to complete his degree and volunteer as an assistant coach.

Offensive lineman **Harry Boatwain** became the highest draft pick in UNH history when the San Francisco 49ers grabbed him in the fifth round of the 1992 NFL Draft. Boatwain spent his first season on the injured reserved list after he suffered a back injury in the final pre-season game of 1992. He came back in 1993 and performed admirably, earning a spot in the starting lineup. Boatwain started most of the season, charged with protecting the blind side of quarterback Steve Young. He also played along side one of the NFL's greatest quarterbacks in Joe Montana.

Quarterback **Mike Horton** received a chance at the NFL, signing a contract with the Phoenix Cardinals as a free agent. Horton performed well with the Cardinals, earning an invitation to pre-season camp following an outstanding rookie mini-camp. However, Phoenix drafted quarterback in the supplementary draft and caught Horton in a the numbers game. The Cardinals loss was Finland's gain as Horton joined the Finnish League. He played for Helsinki and led the team to the League Championship in his first campaign. Horton continued to play football in Finland for several seasons before deciding to return to the States. Former UNH assistant coach **Mark Michaels** was the head coach of the Helsinki team.

Miles McPherson became the first UNH player to be selected in the NFL draft when the Los Angeles Rams snatched him up in the 10th round. Although he did not earn a spot on the Rams roster, McPherson signed with San Diego where he would spend the next four years with the professional Chargers. He contributed as a cornerback/safety, a punt returner and as a special teams player. McPherson had a definite nose for the football, blocking punts and intercepting pass regularly during his four-year stay.

Former head coach **Chris Palmer** has kept his ties with the professional ranks since leaving the University of New Haven. Palmer, who came to New Haven after a successful stint with the New Jersey Generals in the USFL, spent two years on the Chargers' sideline before leaving for Boston University. Following a brief stay in Beantown, Palmer became an assistant coach with the Houston Oilers. He stayed in Houston for several seasons before returning to New England this past Spring as a receivers coach for Bill Parcells and the Patriots.

The University of New Haven has earned a reputation for quality football over the past ten years, a reputation which has helped several Charger players earn roster spots in professional football. Although it is difficult to predict the next UNH pro, one cannot help but think it is only a matter of time before an addition or two is forthcoming.

Chargers & The Walter Camp Football Foundation

The Walter Camp Football Foundation was founded in 1967 to continue the work started by area native Walter Camp of selecting and honoring the outstanding college football talent playing the game across America. Mr. Camp selected his first All-America team in 1889. Today, the WCFE is an all-volunteer 125-member organization that operates year-round working towards the following purposes: 1) oversee the selection of the current year's entries into the oldest college All-America Football Team and to honor those selections; 2) select and honor others who have distinguished themselves; 3) raise money for charitable purposes. The WCFE meets its primary purpose by managing and overseeing the selection of the Walter Camp All-America Team. Ballots are prepared by WCFE and mailed to the experts, the Head Coach and Sports Information Director of each Division I-A school. The Foundation monitors their fulfillment and verifies the integrity of the results. The Player of the Year and Coach of the Year are selected by Foundation members.

May Day, held each Spring, is a highlight of the student activities year. Clubs offer students an opportunity to meet fellow students in a social setting. Clubs include the Accounting Club, the American Society of Civil, Industrial or Mechanical Engineers, Fine & Performing Arts Society, Fire Science Club, International Student Association and several fraternities and sororities.

When you feel the need for a change from the campus setting, you can head for the city of New Haven, just 10 minutes from UNH. Dubbed the "Gateway to New England", New Haven is a deep harbor seaport, a major art center and a manufacturing center. It's also a college town - UNH is one of seven colleges in the immediate vicinity.

One of New Haven's biggest assets is its active cultural community with live performances at the Shubert and Palace Theaters and at the Long Wharf and Yale Repertory Theaters. Music in New Haven ranges from internationally known jazz personalities to the New Haven Symphony. You'll find concerts at the Coliseum featuring rock and soul groups, and performances by local bands at area clubs. For professional sports enthusiasts, the professional teams of Hartford, New York and Boston are just a few hours away.

Leisure activities abound. Choose from outdoor concerts or indoor tennis, whitewater canoeing, windsurfing or stock car racing. It's all near UNH. Our campus is minutes away from miles of Connecticut beaches. Cape Cod is only a two-hour drive. There's easy access to downhill and cross country skiing at upstate ski areas.

The University of New Haven athletic program has established itself as one of the finest Division II programs in the nation. In 1992-93

alone, the football, volleyball and baseball teams advanced to their respective NCAA tournament while five teams were nationally ranked throughout the season.

The athletic department fields teams in baseball, men's and women's basketball, cross country, football, men's lacrosse, men's soccer, softball, women's tennis, track and field as well as women's volleyball. Women's soccer begins its first season of competition this year after spending 1992 as a club. Almost every team has earned a Division II Top 20 ranking over the past three years.

The athletic department offers students much more than quality intercollegiate sports. The North Campus athletic complex includes a racquetball court, a gymnasium for basketball and volleyball as well as a fully-renovated weight room. Outside the gymnasium, students can practice their tennis on one of six outdoor courts. All these facilities are open for both faculty and students throughout the school year.

If you don't enjoy playing alone, you can join one of the many intramural programs. Throughout the year, the athletic department offers league and individual programs for various sports. The calendar includes flag football, softball, basketball, tennis and racquetball. Teams sports include a full schedule with playoffs while the individual sports are played in a tournament format.

The North Campus is also the site for all New Haven varsity home games. Robert B. Dodds Stadium is the home of the Charger football, soccer and lacrosse teams while Frank Vieira Field is the place for baseball action. The basketball teams play their home games in the North Campus Gymnasium as does the volleyball team. The softball squad also has its own field within the complex.

Dr. Lawrence DeNardis
President

Dr. Lawrence J. DeNardis begins his third year as President of the University of New Haven.

Prior to accepting his position at UNH, Dr. DeNardis was president of the Connecticut Public Expenditure Council and was Chairman of the state Board of Governors for Higher Education.

A professor of political science and a former U.S. Congressman and state senator, Dr. DeNardis holds a Ph.D. and a master's degree from New York University and a bachelor of science degree from the College of the Holy Cross.

His academic experience includes 16 years as associate professor and chairman of political science at Albertus Magnus College, where he developed a successful continuing education program, and 11 years as an adjunct professor at UNH. He has also been a visiting professor of government at Connecticut College, a guest scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars of the Smithsonian Institution, and a seminar instructor at Yale University.

In the government realm, Dr. DeNardis served as assistant secretary for legislation (acting) in the U.S. Department of Health and

Human Services during 1985-86; as a member of Congress from Connecticut's Third District in 1981-82; and as a state senator representing the 34th District from 1971-79. In Congress, he served on the Education and Labor Committee, where he supported federal student financial aid programs and helped write job training legislation. In Hartford, he served as chairman of several committees of the General Assembly and authored legislation in the areas of education, health, finance, transportation, and environmental policy.

In addition, Dr. DeNardis has been president of the Connecticut Conference of Independent Colleges (1979-80) and, at various times, has served as a consultant on strategic planning and government relations to businesses, nonprofit organizations, and governmental entities in Connecticut and other states. In 1991, he was named by former President George Bush to the board of regents of the National Library of Medicine. His publications include a book on the U.S. Senate and a number of papers and short articles.

Dr. DeNardis resides in Hamden with his wife Mary Lou and their four children, ranging in age from 18 to 29.



William M. Leete, Jr.
Vice President
Student Affairs and Athletics

William M. Leete, Jr. begins his first year as Vice President of Student Affairs and Athletics after serving 12 years as the University's Director of Athletics.

As vice president, he will oversee residential life, international student services, health services, minority affairs, career development, student activities, counseling, drug and alcohol prevention and athletics.

During his tenure, the soccer team made the national playoffs three times, including a final four appearance in 1984. The volleyball team was selected to nine NCAA tournaments and captured eight straight conference titles.

The men's and women's basketball teams were successful in post-season play with the ladies winning the national title in 1987. The baseball team participated in seven World Series, including a second place finish in 1989. The football program, which was upgraded from Division III to Division II under Leete, has been among the nation's Top Twenty in seven of the past eight seasons.

Success followed Leete off the field as well. He increased student athlete participation during his tenure and initiated an academic counselling and tracking system for student-athletes. He also started the Athletic Hall of Fame, honoring former star athletes at an annual banquet.

Leete served on several committees as athletics director. He spent six years as the Commissioner of the New England Collegiate Conference, a conference which has produced eight national champions in its 12 years of existence. He also served on the NCAA Division II Football committee and is still a member of the ECAC Officiating Committee.

Leete was a major force in improving the facilities at UNH. He increased the seating capacity at Robert B. Dodds Stadium to 3,500 and added a modern press box as well as a new scoreboard to the field. He also planned and implemented the locker and training facilities expansion inside the North Campus Gymnasium in 1989 and raised funds for a press box at the Frank Viera Baseball Field.

Before coming to UNH, Leete coached football and baseball at Hofstra University and also served as an assistant athletic director. He was graduated from the University of Vermont in 1967, where he also earned his Master's Degree. As a Catamount, Leete started for both the baseball and football teams. He also coached both sports at Vermont before making the move to Hofstra. He was inducted into the University of Vermont Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992.

Leete resides in Cheshire with his wife Cathie and also is the father of two grown children, Bill and Amy.

Deborah Chin**

Deborah Chin became the fourth athletic director at the University of New Haven when she took over the program on July 15, 1993. Chin succeeded William M. Leete, Jr. who was elevated to Vice President of Student Affairs and Athletics in June.

Chin will oversee the athletic department which sponsors 13 varsity sports (eight men's and five women's programs) including women's soccer which begins play this Fall.

Although this will be her first year as director of athletics, Chin has been a member of the University of New Haven staff since 1975. As coordinator of women's athletics, she was responsible for starting the women's program, coaching volleyball, tennis, basketball and softball for three seasons. Chin eventually surrendered all head coaching responsibilities except volleyball when she was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics in 1979.

Under her tutelage, Chin has helped the women's athletics program become one of the strongest in Division II as illustrated by the 1987 women's basketball national championship and nine NCAA volleyball tournament appearances. Her career volleyball record is 538-175 in 17 seasons, a .755 winning percentage. She became the fifth Division II head coach to win 500 career matches when her team swept

past Franklin Pierce in 1991.

Her awards include several American Volleyball Coaches Association Northeast Region Coach of the Year laurels as well as eight New England Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year honors.

Under her guidance, the Chargers owned a perfect 92-0 record against NECC opponents and posted a 45-0 slate in NECC championship tournament play. Chin coached the Chargers to five straight 30-win seasons and 11 overall including a 47-8 record in 1981 and a 44-6 record in 1988.

As an administrator, Chin's resume includes terms as chairperson for the NCAA Division II Volleyball Committee (1988-91), AVCA Division II All-America Committee chairperson and the National Association of Girls and Women in Sport Volleyball Rules Committee chairperson (1993-97).

Chin is recognized both nationally and internationally as clinician. She has shared her knowledge of volleyball across the United States as well as in Poland, Costa Rica, Guatemala and China.

Chin received her bachelor's degree from SUNY-Cortland in 1968 and earned her master's degree from the University of North Carolina-Greensboro in 1972.

The Harlon Hill Trophy

Every college football fan is familiar with the Heisman Trophy, an award given annually to the top collegiate football player. Traditionally, most players who are considered for the award hail from Division I programs. But what about players who play the game at the Division II level?

Players like Walter Payton, Neil Lomax, Ken O'Brien and John Stallworth played Division II football and would have never achieved recognition had they not gone on to outstanding careers in the National Football League.

But thanks to a group of Shoals area residents (in Alabama) with the sponsorship of Coca-Cola and Herff Jones, Inc., Division II football players now can battle for the Harlon Hill Trophy, an award given to the top Division II football player.

The originators of the award did not feel that accomplishments in professional football should be the measuring stick for talent in Division II. With that in mind, an award was created to honor players whose achievements have placed them among the top players to ever play the game.

The Harlon Hill trophy is an award that is given annually to the players selected as the "best" in Division II by the sports information directors at the 100-plus Division II schools which play football. The top three vote-getters receive an invitation to attend the Division II Football Championship banquet in the Shoals area where the winner is announced.

The process begins in October when nominations for the Hill Trophy are accepted from sports information directors at Division II institutions. The only requirement is that the nominee must have distinguished himself nationally as being among the top players in the game. A total of 33 players were nominated in 1992, an increase from the 20 nominated in 1991.

Following the nomination process, the sports information directors vote for the top two candidates in their region (East, South, Midwest, West) with each region having approximately the same number of schools. The top two candidates from each region are placed on a second ballot from which the sports information directors select the top three candidates.

The award is named after Harlon Hill, a native of Alabama. He is a prime example of the unknown small college player with tremendous

talents who went on to prove his greatness in the National Football League - competing with the top players in the game.

A small college All-America receiver at Florence State Teachers College (now the University of Alabama), Hill was drafted in the 15th round by the Chicago Bears - a team willing to take a chance on a player that scout Clark Shaughnessy only heard about from a man in the press box at the annual Blue-Gray Classic in Montgomery.

The Bears did not have to wait long for the skinny boy from Florence State to make their gamble pay off, however. In 1954, Hill caught 45 passes for 1,124 yards and 12 touchdowns and was named the NFL Rookie of the Year. The following year, he caught 42 passes for 789 yards and nine touchdowns and was the recipient of the Jim Thorpe Trophy as the NFL Most Valuable Player.

In nine years in the NFL, Hill caught 286 passes for 4,717 yards and 40 touchdowns and is still regarded as one of the greatest receivers to ever play the game. He played in the Pro Bowl in 1955, 1956, 1957 and was an All-Pro selection in 1954, 1955 and 1956.

Last season, New Haven quarterback Ken Suhl placed fourth in the Harlon Hill Trophy balloting, the highest finish by any Charger. Suhl was placed on the national ballot after winning the regional election. Suhl's credentials included an NCAA record for consecutive passes without an interception as well as ranking among the nation's best in total offense and passing efficiency.

Junior Roger Graham enters the 1993 season as a candidate for the award after leading Division II in rushing last season. Graham has already earned pre-season All-America honors after being placed on the Associated Press Small College All-America first team last year. The tailback gained over 100 yards in all 13 games last season, including three 200-yard games.

In two seasons, Graham has collected more than 2,600 yards and 30 touchdowns. He has gained over 100 yards in 17 of 18 games as a regular and scored a TD in 15 of those 18 contests. His many awards include Sports Illustrated Small College Player of the Week, New England Sportswriters Gold Helmet Award, New England Rookie of the Year and two All-New England berths. His credentials place him the hunt for Division II's most coveted award - the Harlon Hill Trophy.
