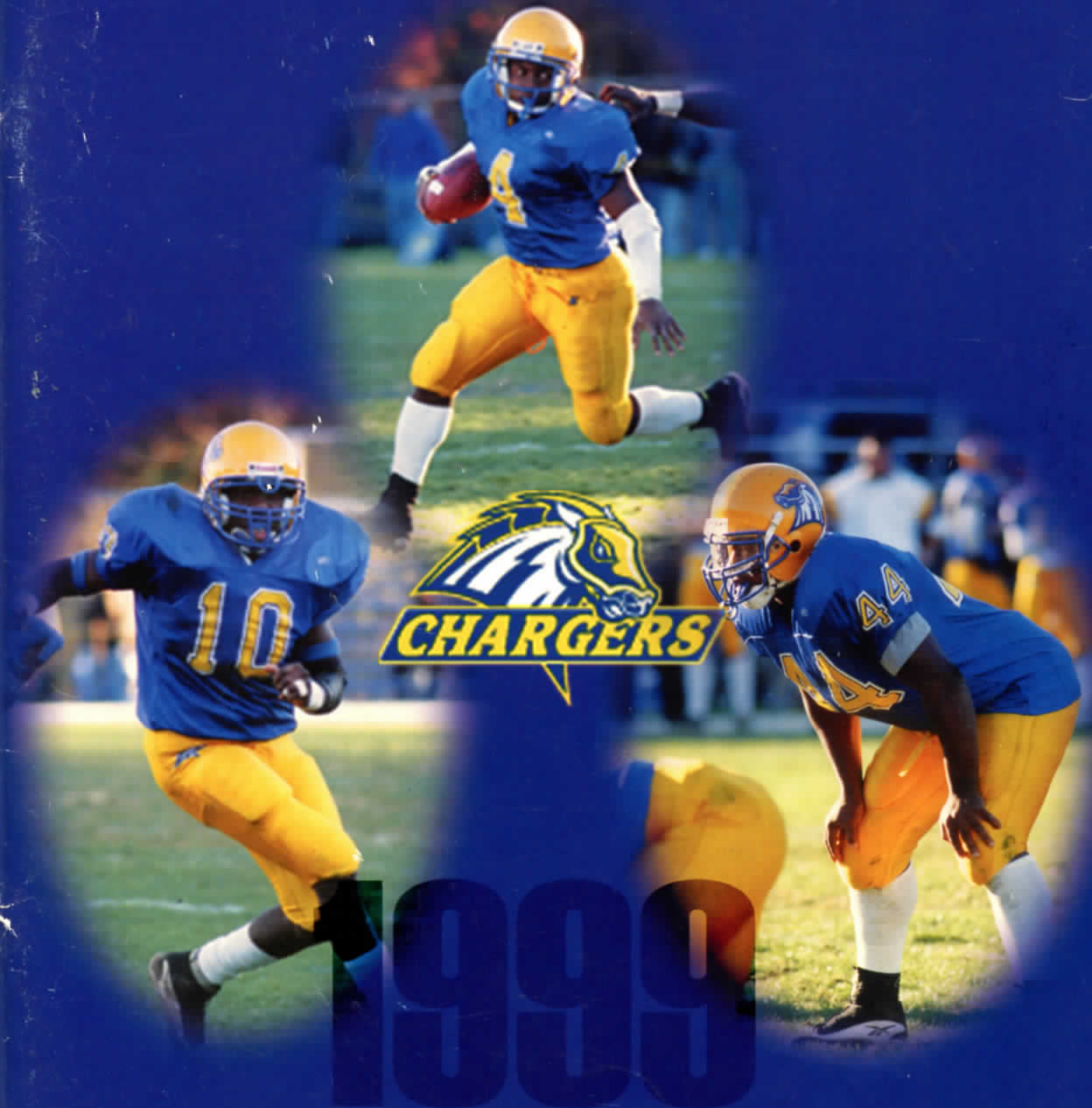

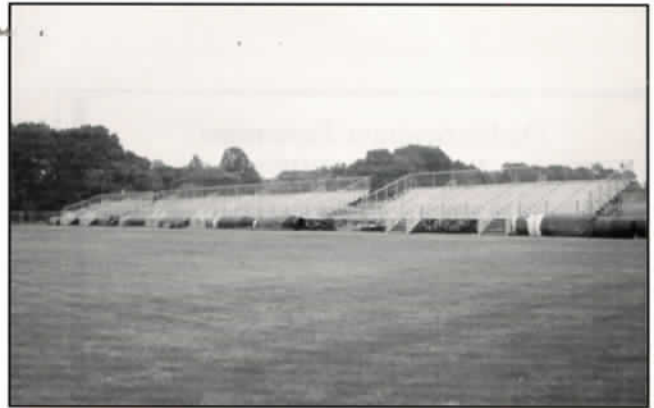
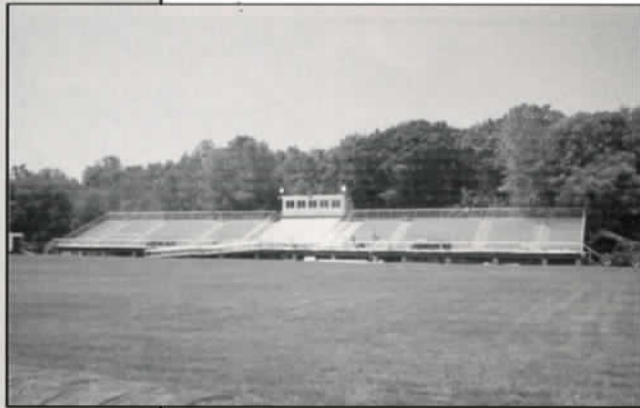
Dodds Stadium Expansion PHASE THREE:

CHARGER STADIUM EXPANSION CAMPAIGN

The new Robert B. Dodds Stadium reached another phase of completion this summer when 1,500 more seats were added and gave the University the capacity to host home playoff games. This is the second phase of the stadium expansion campaign. The final phase, a 100-foot working press area, will be completed prior to the 2000 season and will more than double the current available space in the Dodds Stadium Press Box.

Dodds Stadium Records

Robert B. Dodds Stadium begins its 19th full season as "The Home of the Chargers" when the Blue and Gold host Millersville on September 18. The Stadium is named after the former prominent supporter and board member of the University of New Haven.

Mr. Dodds, who passed away in 1990, served on the executive committee of the University of New Haven's Board of Governors for many years and was very active in numerous civic activities in and around the City of New Haven. Dodds held degrees from Georgia Tech and Yale University and later received an honorary degree from the University of New Haven. It was through his generous contribution towards the project that allowed the Chargers home to be built. Prior to this, the Blue and Gold played its home games at other fields such as Quigley Stadium in West Haven.

New Haven has enjoyed a great deal of success at Dodds Stadium, including a record 18-game home winning streak which came to an end in the 1996 home opener. Overall, the Chargers have won 70 percent of their games at Dodds Stadium, a 62-26 record since opening the Stadium in 1980. The Blue and Gold opened the Stadium with a 20-7 win over Massachusetts Maritime in 1980. The team has experienced only four losing records (1981, 1982, 1983, 1985) at home since moving to the Stadium. The Blue and Gold have posted five undefeated records at home including five of the last seven seasons (1989, 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997).

Dodds Stadium acts as the home field for UNH's football, men's and women's soccer and lacrosse teams, hosting matches both in the fall and spring. The Chargers men's soccer team hosted several NCAA Tournament games at Dodds Stadium in the early and mid-1980s. The Stadium has enough seating for 5,000 fans after being newly renovated this summer to give UNH the ability to host NCAA Division II Playoff games.

The press box houses media from around the region including print, television and radio. WNHU-Radio, home of Chargers Sports, broadcasts every game from Dodds Stadium on 88.7 FM.

The University of New Haven is a private, coeducational university founded as a branch of Northeastern University in 1920. In 1926 it became an independent school and in 1958 expanded its programs to become a four-year college. The acquisition of the present campus in West Haven in 1960 promoted rapid expansion of facilities, faculty, and student body (the current enrollment includes 1,500 full-time undergraduates). The University offers excellent instruction in a great variety of academic disciplines, yet is small enough to accommodate individual programs and needs. Programs are constantly evolving to meet changing academic and career needs and the requirements of business, industry, and professional fields. The University's small class size fosters close student-faculty relationships. The University operates a branch in New London. Off-campus graduate courses are offered in Waterbury, Trumbull, and Stamford. The main campus is located in West Haven on a hillside overlooking Long Island Sound, with a view of downtown New Haven. On the main campus are



the main administration and classroom building; the business school; the engineering school; the hotel, restaurant, and tourism school; the Graduate School; four residence halls; the library; the bookstore; the student center; the Computer Center; the psychology building; the School of Arts and Sciences; the School of Public Safety and Professional Studies; and the Admissions Building. The Charger Gymnasium and playing fields are on the North Campus, two blocks away.

Intercollegiate varsity programs are offered in baseball, basketball, cross-country, football, lacrosse, soccer, softball, tennis, track, and volleyball. An extensive intramural program is also available for both men and women. Of the undergraduate day students, approximately 45 percent live on campus in the four residence halls. A coed residence hall houses up to 200 freshmen, while three coed apartment complexes house primarily upperclass students. Apartments range from one to three bedrooms and hold two to six students. Over 40 University clubs and organizations are open to interested students. Included are student chapters of professional societies, religious organizations, social groups, special interest clubs, student councils, cultural groups, and fraternities and sororities.

The Graduate School offers master's degrees in accounting; business administration; cellular and molecular biology; community psychology; computer and information science; criminal justice; education; electrical engineering; environmental engineering; environmental science; executive business administration; finance and financial services; fire science; forensic science; health-care administration; hospitality and tourism; human nutrition; industrial engineering; industrial hygiene; industrial/organizational psychology; industrial relations; mechanical engineering; occupational safety and health management; operations research; public administration; and taxation. Dual degrees are offered in business administration and industrial engineering and in business administration and public administration. The Doctor of Science degree is offered in management systems.

Did you Know?

The University of New Haven was the smallest school according to enrollment (1,500) ever to play for a National Championship when it traveled to Florence, Alabama in 1997 and finished the year as the second ranked team in the country.

Working Credentials: In order to eliminate any misunderstanding, all media credential requests must be made 72 hours in advance of a home football game. Because of limited space, priority will be given to those outlets covering the participating teams on a regular basis. Credentials can be secured at the "Will Call" window on game day or picked up one day before the contest. **To secure credentials, please write to: Tom Pincince, Sports Information Director, University of New Haven, 300 Orange Avenue, West Haven, CT 06516 or call (203) 932-7025.**

Media Services: Complete team and individual statistics and running play-by-play will be provided approximately 20 minutes after the game. Packets can be picked up in the Gymnasium's general office, located to the right of the media parking lot. Post-game press conferences will be conducted in the Gymnasium lower level. After a 10 minute cooling off period, the visiting head coach and selected players will be brought to the interview room. The home head coach and selected players will immediately follow. After both teams are finished, reporters may request other players through each team's sports information representative.

Telephones & FAX: A telephone is available in the football press box on a first-come-first served basis. After the game, reporters may use one of three phones and a FAX machine in the Gymnasium's general office.

Coach & Player Interviews: All interview requests must be made through the Sports Information Office. The preferred interview time is 30 minutes before practice. Player phone numbers will not be released at any time. If you wish to conduct a phone interview, please call the Sports Information Office so a return call from the athlete can be scheduled.

Media Parking: A limited number of media parking spaces are available and will be distributed in advance. If you have not called in advance, A SPACE WILL NOT BE PROVIDED. Television stations may drive to the field and park behind the visitor's grandstand. However, only television stations doing actual filming for broadcast will be permitted to park on the field. Radio stations may drive to the field and drop off equipment, but must drive the car back to the media parking lot once unloaded.

Photographers: A photo sideline pass is required to take any photos at Dodds Stadium. Photographers may secure photo passes by contacting the Sports Information Office at (203) 932-7025 at least 48 hours before game time. **Photographers are NOT PERMITTED in the team bench area (between the 35-yard lines).**

Visiting Radio: All visiting radio stations must make arrangements for a phone line by calling Southern New England Telephone at (203) 789-6711 during normal business hours. No phone line arrangements will be made by the University of New Haven Sports Information Office. If you have questions or need assistance, please call Sports Information Director Tom Pincince at (203) 932-7025.

Directions To Robert B. Dodds Stadium

From Interstate 95 North: Take Exit 43 (Downtown West Haven) and make left at end of ramp onto Campbell Avenue. Follow Campbell Avenue to fourth traffic light and make hard left onto Route 1 (also called Orange Avenue). At first traffic light, make right onto Pruden Street and follow to end. Athletic Complex driveway is directly in front of you.

From Interstate 95 South: Take Exit 43 (First Avenue) and make right at end of ramp onto First Avenue. Follow to second traffic light and bear right onto Campbell Avenue. Follow Campbell Avenue to second traffic light and make hard left onto Route 1 (also called Orange Avenue). At first traffic light, make right onto Pruden Street and follow to end. Athletic Complex driveway is directly in front of you.

After one season away from the New Haven football family, Darren Rizzi returns as the seventh head coach in Charger history. Rizzi was named head coach on February 24, 1999, nearly one year after he left the program to become the linebacker coach at Northeastern University. After one season with the Huskies in the Atlantic-10, Rizzi came home.

Rizzi was an assistant under former head coach and mentor Tony Sparano for four seasons including one as defensive coordinator. During his stay he also coached the defensive line, linebackers and special teams as well as serving as the team's recruiting coordinator.

Rizzi was the team's defensive coordinator in 1997 when the Chargers made an appearance in the National Championship game in Florence, Alabama. His defense played an integral role in the success of the Chargers in 1997, and helped the team finish with a 12-2 record, matching the school mark for most victories in a single season (1992). Rizzi's defense ranked second in the nation in points allowed per game (9.8 points per game) including three shutouts and three games of allowing seven or fewer points. The Chargers allowed over 20 points only five times in 14 games during the regular season and national playoffs combined. The defense also scored 11 times in 1997, four times on interception returns, five times on fumble returns and twice on punt returns. New Haven allowed only 4.4 yards per play and opponents converted only 38 percent of their third downs against Rizzi's defense. The team intercepted 27 passes on the season and allowed only 192 yards per game.

Prior to arriving at New Haven in 1994, Rizzi was a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University

of Rhode Island for one season prior to spending a season as an assistant at Colgate University.

In addition to his head coaching responsibilities with the Chargers, Rizzi will serve as the defensive coordinator and coach the linebackers.

Rizzi graduated from the University of Rhode Island in 1992 with a degree in speech communications. While at URI he was a consensus All America selection at tight end during his senior season. He was also chosen as a member of the All-East, All-Yankee Conference and All-New England first-teams as well as serving as a captain for the Rams. He capped his senior season by receiving the Rhode Island College Player of the Year and the New Jersey Sports Writers Tight End of the Year Awards. He earned a spot in the All-American Bowl and later signed a free agent contract with the Philadelphia Eagles.

"I'm very happy and excited to accept the head coaching position at the University of New Haven," Rizzi said in February. "We had tremendous success when I was here as an assistant coach and I'm confident that we can continue that success. New Haven has a long tradition of winning especially with its last three coaches, (Chris) Palmer, (Mark) Whipple and Tony Sparano, that's the kind of success we will strive to achieve and maintain at New Haven. I'm looking forward to the challenge and the opportunity in front of me."

Rizzi's first season will be against some of the strongest competition in the country. The Chargers will play four Division I-AA opponents in Elon College (N.C.), Jackson State, Morehead State (KY) and South Florida. And for the second straight season, the Chargers will hit the road for the majority of their contests, six of 10 games will be played on the road in 1999.

Rizzi and his wife Tracey reside in Orange with their daughter Mackenzie Ann.

HEAD COACH

Head Coach Darren Rizzi became the seventh head coach in the history of the New Haven football program when he was officially hired on February 24, 1999. He returned to the school where he was an assistant for five seasons before spending one season at Northeastern University in 1998. Prior to his first season beginning in 1999, he sat down to discuss his philosophies, his first season and what it's like to return to the Chargers in 1999.

What are your goals as you return to the University of New Haven, this time as the head of the football family?

I believe my goals are simple. This football program has established itself as one of the elite in Division II. We are going to strive to continue to be successful and be as competitive as possible. Our long term goal of getting into post-season play will only be achieved if we make our short term goals our priority. We must take our opponents on a game to game basis and not look ahead to anyone or anything.

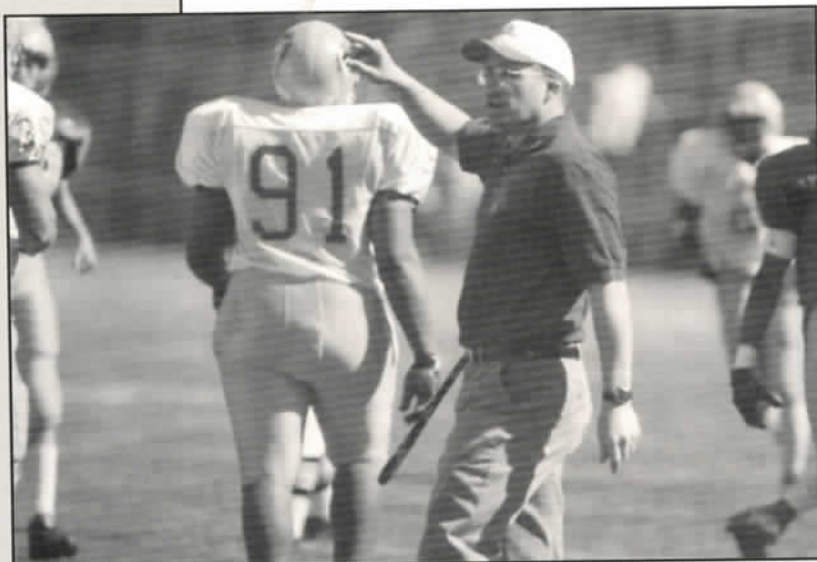
My other goal is for our student-athletes to continue their success in the classroom. I will make it a priority to ensure that all of our players realize what a wonderful opportunity they have and to take advantage of the University of New Haven as a great learning institution.

What have you done specifically to reach out to your players since beginning in late February?

It was very comforting to come back to so many familiar faces, so getting to know most of the players wasn't an issue. However, I felt it was important to meet with them, both collectively and individually, and let them know what I thought we could improve on for the upcoming year. To have an open, healthy relationship with each individual student is also very important to me.

How have the players responded to you and your new staff?

The response couldn't have been better. Our attitudes have been excellent and our work ethic has been even better. The team is extremely hungry and anxious and I have been pleased with the response to all of the changes. The team has handled this situation very maturely and we all know that sometimes with change that is not easy to do.



Did spring practice help you prepare for the 1999 season?

With a new coaching staff comes new systems, ideas, terms, lingo, etc. This is why spring practice was so critical in helping us to prepare for the upcoming season. It obviously also gave our coaching staff an idea of what we really need to focus on as we begin our pre-season camp. I was surprised at how easy of a transition our players made and that was a big part of the reason our spring practice went so smoothly.



Why should a prospective student-athlete choose the University of New Haven?

There are so many reasons, but the ones that I feel are most important are the following. First and foremost is the educational opportunity that you will have at New Haven. There are few schools in the country that will give you the individualized attention that New Haven will give you and the ability to interact with your professors is priceless.

The second reason is the support you will receive from the entire New Haven community. Any endeavor in which you get into you will have help from every angle. Whether it deals with schoolwork, financial aid, residential life, athletics or student life, you will always find a helping hand.

The final reason is the athletic department, whose success speaks for itself. New Haven's athletic tradition is strong in all of our men's and women's athletic teams. The most impressive attribute of the department is its commitment by everyone involved to continue to keep the Chargers at the highest level possible.



Describe what it means to you to be a member, and the leader, of the New Haven football family?

That's a great question because I consider myself a member of the family in every sense of the word. We've spent the first few months getting reacquainted with the members of the team but also reintroducing ourselves to the extended members of the football family. It's important to remember that this program isn't just the coaches and players you see for 10 Saturdays during the fall. It's important to know and to realize that this family includes everyone who works behind the scenes, everyone who had played or worked here in the past, all the parents and friends of the players and staff and everyone who fills Dodds Stadium each Saturday. One of the best feelings I've had since returning in February is the overwhelming support from the entire football family. It's important to recognize everyone who makes this program what it is and everyone who makes this program successful. It's a lot of work done by a lot of people and sometimes that goes unnoticed. That's why I'm proud to return to this program, the strong sense of family from everyone involved makes this a wonderful place to coach football.

Despite being a school with only 1,500 full-time students, why is football so successful at the University of New Haven?

Football at New Haven is successful because of the time and effort put in by everyone involved with the program. It's a small school, but the size helps everyone around it become involved in one way or another, whether they're a member of the team or cheering in the stands. It relates back to the family concept we had in the last question. The small size allows everyone to make a difference, and allows everyone to take great pride in what has been built here at the University of New Haven.



ASSISTANT COACHES



Chris Pincince

Offensive Coordinator • Quarterbacks • Boston University '94
First Season

Coaching Experience: Pincince returns to the University of New Haven as the offensive coordinator after two seasons at nearby Fairfield University where he was also the offensive coordinator. While at Fairfield, Pincince helped the Stags make one of the best turn-arounds in I-AA history. The season before he arrived, Fairfield finished with a 1-8 overall record. During his first season the Stags finished 7-3 overall and 4-3 in the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference leading the league in total offense. In his second season the Stags won the MAAC Championship and again led the league in total offense. Pincince coached 1998 MAAC Player of the Year, quarterback Jim Lopusznick and the 1998 Offensive Rookie of the Year, running back Dan Fitzpatrick. The Stags

averaged 364 yards per game in Pincince's 21 games as coordinator while posting a 16-5 record. The Stags gained over 4,000 yards in total offense last season. In 21 games, his offense failed to score double figures only twice and they were never shutout. Prior to Fairfield, Pincince spent two seasons as the wide receivers coach at New Haven under then head coach Tony Sparano.



Playing Experience: Pincince played four seasons at Boston University graduating in 1994 with a degree in mathematics. He was a member of Terrier team that advanced to the National quarterfinals

of the NCAA Playoffs.

Personal: Pincince and his wife Jennifer live in Hamden, CT.



Ed Walsh

Defensive Line • Recruiting Coordinator • Norwich University '93
First Season

Coaching Experience: Walsh begins his first season as the defensive line coach for the University of New Haven after spending two years as an assistant at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. In 1998, Walsh served as the offensive graduate assistant where he was responsible for assisting the offensive coordinator in all aspects of weekly game preparation and coaching the offensive line. In 1997 he served as the defensive video assistant where he also assisted with the special teams and played a large role in the breakdown of weekly film and in recruiting throughout the United States and Canada. Prior to his stay at North Carolina, Walsh served as an assistant at Dartmouth from 1995-97 where he helped the

team win the 1997 Ivy League Championship. He coached the defensive ends and was directly responsible for the preparation and daily practice plan for the defensive ends. At Dartmouth he also assisted with the special teams and handled recruiting and the video editing for weekly game film.

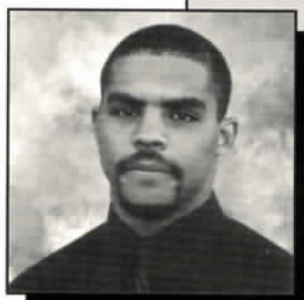
Billy Arline

seasons at Boston University. Last year he finished fourth on the team in tackles with 68 tackles including 47 solos. He had 10 tackles for a loss and one sack. He added one interception and seven pass break-ups while recovering two fumbles as a senior. He was one of six Chargers to be named an ECAC All-Star following the 1998 season.



Josh Havelka

Offensive Line • University of New Haven '99
Second Season

Coaching Experience: Havelka begins his second season as an assistant coach and will concentrate on the offensive line. He joined the coaching staff last season after four years as an offensive lineman with the Chargers.

Playing experience: Havelka played four seasons at the University of New Haven before joining the

coaching staff. He was a member of the 1997 team which played for the National Championship and finished the season ranked #2 in the country. Havelka was a starting offensive lineman on the team that produced just the second 1,000 yard rusher in school history in 1997 (Don Highsmith). New Haven led the nation in scoring average racking up over 40 points per game that season.



Adam Roman

Wide Receivers • University of New Haven '99
First Season

Coaching Experience: Roman begins his first season as an assistant coach.

Playing experience: Roman joined the Chargers in 1997 and made an immediate impact. He led New Haven in receiving each of the last two seasons catching 42 balls for 540 yards and eight touchdowns in 1998. He also returned 35 punts for 439

yards and two touchdowns, returned 14 kickoffs for 180 yards and threw a 71-yard touchdown against Youngstown State. Roman was chosen an ECAC All-Star after the 1997 season in which he helped the Chargers challenge for the National Championship and finish the season as the #2 team in the country. Roman is ninth all-time in receiving yards with 1,266 yards in just two seasons.





1999 Preview

Eight of 11 returning players on offense. Including the leading passer, leading rusher and second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth leading receivers from 1998. Add to that the team's leading tackler, who finished his sophomore season just 23 tackles short of setting a school record for tackles in a season with 111, the team's second leading tackler and 42 total lettermen from last season.

New head coach Darren Rizzi also returns in 1999, after a one-year absence. Rizzi returns to the Chargers as the team's seventh head coach since the program began in 1973. Rizzi was announced as the new head coach on February 24 after former head coach Tony Sparano resigned after five seasons to accept an assistant coaching position with the Cleveland Browns.

Rizzi inherits a team that finished last year 5-5 after making an appearance in the Division II National Championship Game in 1997. The Chargers won their final three games of 1998 defeating Saint Joseph's (IN) at home 39-24, then traveling to Western New Mexico and Robert Morris winning both 37-24 and 26-24 respectively. The three game winning streak was the longest during the 1998 season and helped the team rebound from a 2-5 start.

The Chargers return eight of 11 players on offense including junior offensive lineman Craig Capone, an All-New England and All-ECAC selection in 1998 and an honorable mention All-American selected by Don Hansen's Weekly Football Gazette. Capone will lead the way for senior running back Corey Jones. Jones returns following a stellar junior campaign which saw him rush for 857 yards, the sixth best single season performance in school history.

Also returning is quarterback Jason Barnett, the team's leading passer from 1998. Barnett transferred from I-AA Boston University before last season and completed 51 percent of his passes for 1,874 yards and 18 touchdowns. The Chargers lose leading receiver Adam Roman to graduation but return five of top six receivers led by junior Elvert Eden (30 catches, 411 yards, three touchdowns), senior Michael Clark (29 catches, 315 yards, three touchdowns), senior Diallo Freeman (17 catches, 131 yards), senior Jamie Allen (15 catches, 259 yards, two touchdowns) and junior Ketric Barnes (11 catches, 108 yards).

The Chargers biggest loss will be on the defensive side of the ball, New Haven loses seven of 11 starters from a year ago including six of the top 10 leading tacklers from 1998.

All-New England and All-ECAC selection Steve Cedor returns healthy for his junior season after missing much of the final two games of 1998. He led the team in tackles with 111 on the season including 66 solos. Junior Mike Summers was second on the team in tackles with 78 including 12 for a loss and five sacks. Seniors Antwan Dance and Troy Appling round out the returning starters on defense. Dance was fifth on the team in tackles with 59 and added three interceptions. Appling added 40 tackles and is a three-year starter in the defensive backfield for the Chargers.

The 1999 Chargers face one of the toughest schedules that the school has ever seen. When it was announced on July 6 after

1:00 p.m. It is the first meeting between the two teams since 1993, the Chargers are 4-0 against Clarion in four previous meetings. New Haven will play their second consecutive home game on September 25 against the University of California-Davis, the third straight season that the Chargers and Aggies will meet. September 25 also marks homecoming weekend at the University, New Haven is 2-0 against Cal-Davis in two previous meetings. The first of four I-AA opponents will host the Chargers when they travel to North Carolina to face Elon College on October 2. Elon posted a 5-6 record in 1998, this is the first meeting between the two schools. The second I-AA opponent on the schedule will make the trip from Kentucky to West Haven when Morehead State comes to town on October 9. This is the first meeting between the two schools, Morehead had a 9-2 record in 1998. This date also marks the last time the Chargers will be home until the final regular season game of the season on November 13. October 16 is the Chargers' off week in 1999, then New Haven hits the road for three straight away games beginning with the University of Indianapolis on October 23. Indianapolis was 8-2 last season, this is the first meeting between the two schools. The Chargers will travel to Indiana for a second straight week on October 30 and face Saint Joseph's, the Chargers are 2-0 in the last two seasons against Saint Joseph's. New Haven will end the season against two consecutive I-AA opponents when they travel to the University of South Florida on November 6 and then host Jackson State University in the regular season finale on November 13. South Florida was 8-3 last season while Jackson State posted a 7-3 mark in 1998.

The Chargers' 10 opponents posted a combined 70-37 (.654 winning percentage) record last season. New Haven also posted a 3-1 record last season against opponents they will face in 1999. The Chargers defeated Bloomsburg (25-7), UC-Davis (12-11) and Saint Joseph's (39-24) while dropping a 19-18 decision to Millersville in 1998. New Haven will face five schools for the first time this season including Elon, Morehead State, South Florida, Jackson State and the University of Indianapolis.

securing their 10th and final game of the season, the Chargers had four I-AA scholarship schools and six Division II schools on their schedule.

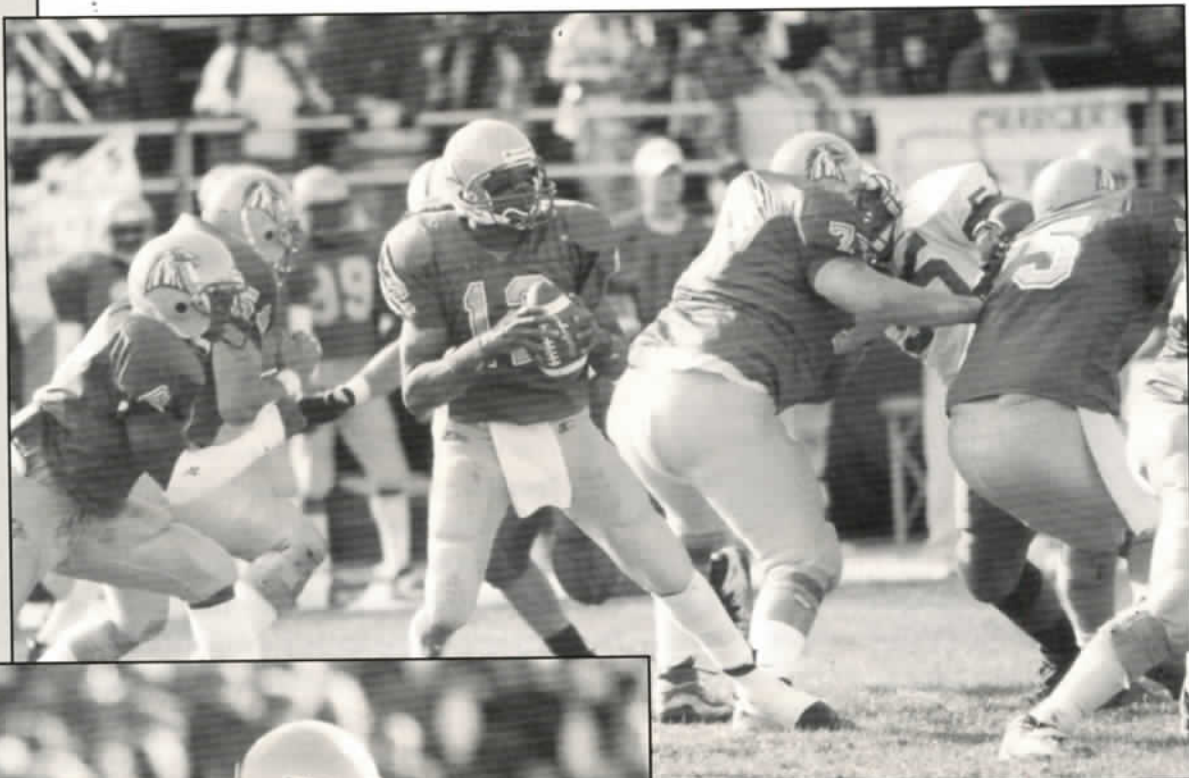

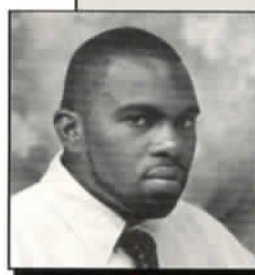

1998: Dance finished 1998 fifth on the team in total tackles with 59. He posted 36 unassisted and 23 assisted tackles as a junior. Dance also recorded two tackles for a loss, he was second on the team with three interceptions and he broke up five passes during the season. Dance started his junior season strong recording six unassisted tackles, including one for a loss, and an interception in the season opener against Bloomsburg on September 5. In the second game of the season he posted six total tackles and his second interception of the season in an overtime loss to West Chester. Dance intercepted a pass for the third straight game when the Chargers faced Millersville in Week 3 of the 1998 season. Despite a one-point loss, Dance recorded five total tackles against Millersville. On September 26, the Chargers traveled to UC-Davis and Dance recorded a season-high eight tackles against the Aggies. He also matched his season-high with six unassisted tackles. In a loss to Western Kentucky had seven total tackles including one for a loss. He then posted outings of five, seven, five, six and four tackles against Southern Connecticut, Youngstown State, Saint Joseph's, Western New Mexico and Robert Morris respectively. Dance's 59 tackles were a career high and put him over the 100 career tackle mark.

1997: Dance started the first seven games of 1997, before an injured ankle forced him to miss the final three regular season games. He still finished sixth on the team with 42 tackles (25 solos). He also had two interceptions and four break-ups.

1996: In 1996, he had a blocked punt against West Chester and finished the season with 15 tackles (11 solos) and one fumble recovery.

1998: Jones put together one of the finest individual rushing seasons in University of New Haven football history. Jones rushed 187 times for 857 yards during his junior season. He entered the final game of last season needing just over 150 yards to become just the third rusher in school history to reach 1,000 yards in a season. Jones suffered a broken leg in that game and was forced to leave in the first half. But that didn't stop him from putting together the sixth best season total in school history. His 857 yards make him only the fourth player at New Haven to surpass the 850 yard mark in a single season (Roger Graham did it four times between 1991 and 1994, Don Highsmith did it twice in 1996 and 1997 and Ron Jenkins did it in 1995). Jones reached the 100-yard mark twice in 1998 rushing for 145 yards and a touchdown in a win over Saint Joseph and 147 yards in a win over Western New Mexico. During his junior season Jones failed to reach the 70-yard mark only twice, once because of injury, and recorded at least 72 yards rushing in eight of the 10 games last season.

1997: Jones was the secret weapon of the 1997 team. He finished the regular season with 431 yards on 65 carries for an average of 6.6 yards per carry. He had five rushing touchdowns to go with one touchdown reception. Three of his rushing touchdowns came against Division IAA opponents. He scored a 75-yard TD at Lafayette, a 2-yard TD at Monmouth and a 21-yard TD at Western Kentucky. A quick and powerful runner, Jones returned eight punts for a 19.3 average and caught seven passes for 113 yards and a touchdown in 1997.

1996: As a freshman, Jones had 29 carries for 155 yards (5.3 yards per carry) and a touchdown as a running back, to go with three receptions for 29 yards. Jones returned four punts for 66 yards and three kickoffs for 65 yards.

Academic: Jones is a Communication major at UNH.

1998: Cedor put together one of the best individual defensive seasons in New Haven football history, he was recognized not only by post-season honors but by his teammates as well. Cedor was selected one of three tri-captains for the 1999 despite only being a junior this season. His performance in 1999 earned him All-New England and All-ECAC postseason honors at linebacker. He was also voted to the ECAC Honor Roll for the weeks of October 4 and October 24 during his sophomore campaign. Cedor recorded 111 total tackles in 1998, the fourth best total in school history and the most since Erik Lesinski set a school record with 134 tackles in 1987. Cedor set a school record of his own when he recorded 19 solo tackles in a loss to Western Kentucky in 1998. He had 20 total tackles in the game, a career high. He proved that his performance against I-AA talent was not a fluke when two games later he recorded 19 total tackles against defending I-AA National Champion Youngstown State including 10 solos and nine assisted tackles. He earned ECAC honors for each game. Even more impressive for the sophomore was that he missed the final game of the season with a knee injury and still managed to put together his impressive season. Through the first seven games of the season Cedor recorded 100 tackles, 14.3 per game, including eight for a loss and two sacks.

1997: Cedor had a stellar freshman season as both a linebacker and special teams member. He used a combination of power and speed to collect 38 tackles in 1997, ninth best on the team. Cedor, who shined on special teams, blocked two punts and forced a fumble in 1997. He also recorded a safety against Indiana, Pa.

Academic: Cedor is a Criminology major at UNH.

Personal: Son of Donald Cedor...Born 4-24-78.

1998 Season in Review



New Haven's five losses in 1998 were by a combined 17 points.

New Haven avoided its first losing season since 1991 (3-7) by winning its final three games of the season.

The Chargers faced three I-AA opponents during the 1998 season, second most only to the 1999 schedule when they will face four I-AA teams.

When former head coach Tony Sparano looked at the 1998 schedule for his University of New Haven football team, he knew he had his work cut out for him. What he didn't know, was that his team would play that schedule just a few plays away from returning to the NCAA Division II Playoffs. What he didn't realize was that the Chargers would lose their five games by a combined 17 points, including two in overtime, and it's largest margin of defeat all season long would be six points, in overtime.

But the season started off on a high note for the Chargers, New Haven hosted Bloomsburg and despite falling behind 7-3 at halftime the Chargers scored 22 points in the second half to win

25-7. But the Chargers were unable to put together back-to-back victories to open the 1998 season, they dropped their next two games by a combined seven points. Game two was an overtime loss to West Chester, 33-27 and Game three was a one-point loss to Millersville, 19-18.

The Chargers snapped their two-game slide with a 12-11 victory over UC-Davis in California. Troy Appling blocked a punt in the fourth quarter and recovered it in the end zone to give the Chargers the win. But the celebration would not last long as the Chargers dropped a 24-21 decision to Division I-AA Western Kentucky to fall to 2-4 and the next week lost to intra-city rival Southern Connecticut 14-10.

Despite a slow start in 1998, the Chargers will ride a three-game winning streak heading into the 1999 season. New head coach Darren Rizzi and his staff will attempt to build on the momentum gained by the Chargers at the end of the 1998 season.

After an overtime loss to defending Division I-AA champion Youngstown State on October 24, the third consecutive loss for New Haven, the Chargers won three straight games to end the season defeating Saint Joseph's (IN) (39-24), Western New Mexico (37-24) and Robert Morris (26-24). The Chargers finished the season with a 5-5 overall record.

The Chargers lose only one starter on offense next season, two-time ECAC North All-Star selection Adam Roman (Laguna Hills, CA) had 113 catches for 1,494 yards and 17 touchdowns in two seasons. He was also one of the top punt returners in the region the last two seasons returning 65 punts for 881 yards and three touchdowns.

On the defensive side of the ball the Chargers will have to replace several impact players from the last two seasons. Senior captains Lidz Eugene (North Rockland, NY) and Marshall Maxwell (Adams, MA) led a defense that allowed under 20 points per game and caused 24 turnovers in just 10 games. Seniors Billy Arline (Waterbury, CT), Dennis Burney (Rahway, NJ), Matt Machalik (Summit Hill, PA), Dave Menard (Attleboro, MA) and Christian Czwalinna (Berlin, Germany) also played important roles for the defense this season combining for 243 tackles and 13 sacks in 1998.

Playoff History

1992

November 21, 1992 - New Haven 38, West Chester 26

In its first ever NCAA playoff game, New Haven defeated host West Chester to advance to the national quarterfinals. The Chargers opened the scoring with two first quarter touchdown passes from Ken Suhl. New Haven took control of the game with two TDs in the third quarter, raising its lead to 32-14, before West Chester came right back with two TDs of its own to make the score 32-26. New Haven ended any comeback thoughts when Roger Graham broke through for a 45-yard TD run. Graham finished with 222 yards and one TD while Suhl completed 19 of 27 passes for 350 yards and three TDs. Tony Willis caught eight passes for 130 yards while Max Joyner-Brown had four catches for 95 yards and two TDs.

November 28, 1992 - New Haven 35, Ferris State 13

New Haven used a 21-point third quarter to take control en route to a 35-13 victory over Ferris State. New Haven opened the scoring when Roger Graham galloped 52 yards on his first carry of the game. Two Ferris State field goals cut the lead to 7-6 at halftime. AJ Livingston and John Raba each rushed for a score while Tony Willis tossed a 53-yard scoring strike to Joe Davis off a reverse option play for the third TD. Willis grabbed a TD of his own when quarterback Ken Suhl tossed a NCAA playoff record 99-yard TD pass in the fourth quarter. Suhl finished with 14-25 for 256 yards. Willis caught four of those passes for 127 yards and a TD. Graham rushed for 118 yards and a TD.

December 5, 1992 - Jacksonville St. 46, New Haven 35

New Haven lost in the semifinals to eventual national champion Jacksonville State. Jacksonville State grabbed a 21-0 lead in the second quarter highlighted by an 82-yard punt return and a 90-yard TD reception by Danny Lee. UNH battled back to make the score 21-14 at halftime as Max Joyner-Brown caught a 13-yard scoring strike and Roger Graham ran 11 yards for a TD. New Haven tied the game early in the fourth quarter on Joyner-Brown's second TD catch. Lee regained the lead for Jacksonville State but the extra point failed. Graham ran nine yards for his second TD and the extra point split the uprights, giving UNH its first lead of the game, 35-34. Lee ran 39 yards for his fourth TD of the game, putting Jax State ahead 41-35. New Haven reached inside the JSU 35-yard line before being stopped on a fourth and one. Suhl was 23 of 36 for 248 yards and three TDs while Graham gained 191 yards and scored two TDs. Willis secured his third straight 100-yard game, catching 11 passes for 110 yards and a TD.

1993

November 20, 1993 - New Haven 48, Edinboro 28

The Chargers took control of the game early and never led by less than seven points. New Haven held a 14-0 lead after the first period as Joe Davis caught a 15-yard TD pass from Jim Weir while Roger Graham added a three-yard run. Edinboro sandwiched two TDs around Weir's four-yard TD run in the second quarter, making the score 21-14 at halftime. The Chargers controlled the third quarter by scoring two more TDs, a two-yard dive by Graham and a 32-yard TD reception by Tony Willis, raising the advantage to 34-14. Graham finished with 215 yards and two TDs while AJ Livingston gained 116 yards on 18 carries, the first time UNH had two 100-yard rushers in a playoff game. Weir was 15-30, 184 yards, 3TDs.

November 27, 1993 - Indiana, Pa. 38, New Haven 35

New Haven fell behind when Indiana scored a touchdown with 8:00 remaining in the first quarter. The Chargers answered with two first quarter scores of its own as Roger Graham scored from five yards and 14 yards, giving UNH a 14-7 lead. Graham raised the lead to 21-7 when he scored from 14 yards again, before IUP cut the lead to 21-14 at halftime. UNH's AJ Livingston tallied the fourth rushing TD against the Indians, raising the advantage to 28-14. However, Indiana scored 24 unanswered points. New Haven pulled to within three points, 38-35, when Livingston scored on a 19-yard run at the 3:59 mark. But, the Indians kept the ball for the rest of the game to seal the win. Graham gained 173 yards and scored three TDs in the game while Livingston added 105 yards and two TDs. Jim Weir completed 16 of 35 passes for 230 yards, but no touchdowns.

1995

November 18, 1995 - New Haven 27, Edinboro 12

Edinboro scored on its first possession of the game, taking a 6-0 lead on a one-yard dive by Gerald Thompson. New Haven cut the lead in half on Gene Adair's 37-yard field goal near the end of the first quarter. Edinboro doubled its scoring total when Keith Cushenberry grabbed the ball away from receiver Bobby Barnette and raced 31 yards for a touchdown with 2:34 left in the half, giving the Scots a 12-3 lead at halftime. New Haven answered with a 47-yard FG on its first possession of the second half. With under a minute left in the third quarter, Ron Jenkins dashed seven yards for a touchdown giving the Chargers the lead 13-12. Jenkins and Dave Menard each added a touchdown in the fourth quarter to complete the scoring, giving UNH its third NCAA first round victory in three tries. Jenkins finished with 150 yards on 30 carries with two TDs while Jesse Showerda completed 19 of 32 passes for 229 yards.

November 25, 1995 - Ferris State 17, New Haven 9

The only stats that would indicate that New Haven lost this game would be the five turnovers, three fumbles and two interceptions. All the other statistics favored New Haven including time of possession (36:02), total yards (420 yards) and total plays (90). However, the most important stat favored the home team, a 17-9 final score.

Ferris State opened the scoring with a 22-yard field goal by Jason Lipke. The Bulldogs boosted their lead on Chris Pulliams three-yard run, only the fourth rushing touchdown surrendered by the UNH defense in 12 games. Benny Roe's 23-yard TD run in the third quarter gave the home team a 17-0 lead before New Haven finally lit its side of the scoreboard on Ron Jenkins five-yard run with 9:00 remaining. Gene Adair brought the team to within one score with a 25-yard field goal, making the score 17-9. New Haven had the ball inside the Ferris 20-yard line in the final 2:00 but failed on a fourth-down attempt, securing the win for Ferris State.



Playoff History



1997

November 22, 1997 - New Haven 47, Glenville State 7

The Chargers dominated play in their first playoff appearance since 1995. New Haven led 27-0 at the half on touchdown receptions from Adam Roman and Ketric Barnes and a pair of touchdown runs from quarterback Cazzie Kosciulek. The lead went to 34-0 after Bill Woods caught a 29-yard touchdown pass from Kosciulek off a fake field goal.

Glenville State finally got on the board at 34-7 after a 68-yard touchdown pass to running back Byron Stevenson. Glenville State quarterback Wilkie Perez entered the game as the leading passer in Division II. The Chargers limited Perez to one touchdown, while intercepting two passes. Don Highsmith ran for a career-high 212 yards on 32 carries as the Chargers racked up 271 yards rushing. UNH's defense recovered two fumbles and intercepted two passes.

November 29, 1997 - New Haven 49, Slippery Rock 21

The second-ranked Chargers defeated No. 7 Slippery Rock 49-21 to advance to the semifinals for only the second time in school history. UNH amassed 523 yards of total offense as wide receiver Elvert Eden caught seven passes for 205 yards and three touchdowns. Cazzie Kosciulek completed 16 of 30 passes for 333 yards and four touchdowns, while Don Highsmith ran for 134 yards on 29 carries. Highsmith was the first running back this season to rush for over 100 yards against Slippery Rock.

December 6, 1997 - New Haven 27, UC Davis 25

The No.2 ranked University of New Haven football team defeated UC Davis 27-25 in the NCAA Division II national semifinals in front of 4,712 at the Yale Bowl. It was the first semifinal win for New Haven. "This is the greatest win in UNH history," head coach Tony Sparano said.

Davis took a 3-0 lead on a Ray Hill 31-yard field goal just 3:48 into the game. New Haven's Adam Roman, a junior wide receiver from Laguna Hills, Calif., scored the next three touchdowns to give the Chargers a 21-3 lead. Roman, who finished the day with six catches for 96 yards, scored on two receptions of eight and 65 yards, then returned a punt 82 yards for his third touchdown. Davis (9-5) dominated the statistics, led by junior quarterback Kevin Daft who completed 43 of 64 passes for 468 yards (all school and DII playoff records) and three touchdowns. The Aggies totaled 575 yards of total offense, but committed four turnovers.

With :23 left in the game, Daft completed a 1-yard pass to Wes Terrell on a 4th and two. Terrell was stopped just short of the first down by Dennis Burney and Jason Pacourek (Sr., Yorba Linda, Calif.).

New Haven quarterback Cazzie Kosciulek completed 11 of 26 passes for 161 yards and two touchdowns. Running back Don Highsmith rushed for 105 yards on 20 carries and a touchdown. It was the fifth straight game Highsmith rushed for 100 yards or more. UNH advanced to the semifinals in 1992, but lost to eventual champion Jacksonville St.

December 13, 1997 - Northern Colorado 51, New Haven 0

UNH was the first school from Connecticut to play in a college football title game and was the smallest school enrollment wise to ever play for the DII football title.

New Haven won the coin toss and elected to kick off. The Chargers stopped Northern Colorado on their first three plays, setting up a 4th and 2 from the UNC 36. Dirk Johnson faked a punt and ran 39 yards. Two plays later, Corte McGuffey connected with Dillon Micus on a 20-yard touchdown pass.

It was only the second time all season that an opponent had scored first against New Haven. Northern Colorado sacked Cazzie Kosciulek seven times, the most sacks UNH had allowed all season. New Haven also lost three fumbles, the most it had lost all season.

Dr. Lawrence J. DeNardis

University President

Dr. Lawrence J. DeNardis has served as President of the University of New Haven since 1991.

He is a former U.S. Congressman and professor of political science who has had a distinguished career in education and government.

Dr. DeNardis holds a Ph.D. degree in political science from New York University and a bachelor's degree in economics from the College of the Holy Cross. His academic experience includes nearly two decades of teaching at Albertus Magnus College, Connecticut College, Yale University and the University of New Haven. He was also a guest scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

In the field of government, Dr. DeNardis has had the rare distinction of serving as both a federal and state

legislator. He was elected to the United States House of Representatives from Connecticut's Third District in 1980 and was chosen as one of the outstanding freshmen in the 97th Congress. He served on the Education and Labor and Government Affairs Committees, as well as the Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control. He had previously served five terms as a State Senator in Connecticut from 1971-79, where he was Chairman of the Finance Committee, Program Review Committee and Deputy Minority Leader. He also served as Assistant Secretary for Legislation at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (one of the largest departments of the Federal government) during 1985-86. In addition, Dr. DeNardis has been President and CEO of the Connecticut Conference of Independent Colleges (1979-80) and President and CEO of the Connecticut



Policy and Economic Council (1989-91). He has also been Chairman of the Connecticut Board of Governors of Higher Education (1991) appointed by former Governor Lowell P. Weicker, and served as a member of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine (1990-94) appointed by former President George Bush.

He and his wife Mary Lou live in Hamden, CT, and have four grown children.

William M. Leete, Jr.

Vice President for Student Affairs and Athletics

William M. Leete Jr. begins his seventh year as Vice President for Student Affairs and Athletics after serving 12 years as Director of Athletics. As vice president he oversees athletics, admissions, financial aid, campus police and student affairs.

During his tenure as director of athletics the program's greatest achievement was the 1987 women's basketball national championship. Among his proudest achievements, was the baseball team's appearance in the 1989 College World Series championship game and the elevation of the football program to Division II and eventual national prominence.

Under Leete's direction, student-athlete participation increased and the academic counselling and tracking system for student-athletes was devel-

oped. He also started the UNH Golf Tournament and the Athletic Hall of Fame banquet, a annual dinner honoring former star athletes.

Leete served on several committees as director of athletics. He spent six years as the Commissioner of the New England Collegiate Conference, a conference which produced seven national championships during his time. He served on the NCAA DII Football Committee and is still a chair of the ECAC Officiating/Negotiating Committee.

Before coming to the University of New Haven, Leete was the head football coach, head baseball coach and assistant athletics director at Hofstra University. He graduated from the University of Vermont in 1967, where he also earned his master's degree. As a Catamount, Leete started for both the baseball and

football teams. He also coached both sports at Vermont.

Leete was inducted into the University of Vermont Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992.

Leete resides in Cheshire with his wife, Cathie. He has two grown children, Bill III and Amy.





Deborah Chin

Director of Athletics

A member of the University of New Haven staff since 1975, Deborah Chin became the school's fourth director of athletics when she took over the program in 1993. Chin oversees a department that sponsors 16 NCAA Division II varsity sports (eight for men, eight for women),

including women's track and field which began competition in the Winter of 1997. As Coordinator of Women's Athletics she was responsible for starting the women's intercollegiate athletic program, coaching volleyball, tennis, basketball, and softball for three seasons. Chin eventually surrendered all head coaching responsibilities except volleyball when she was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics in 1979.

As an administrator Chin has served on over 25 national and regional committees. Her resume includes terms as chairperson for the NCAA Division II Volleyball Committee (1988-92), the NCAA Division II Volleyball Regional Advisory Committee (1986-89), the AVCA Division II All-America Committee (1985-88) and the NCAA Women's Committee on Committees (1995-97). She has been the chairperson for the National Association for Girls and Women in Sport Volleyball Rules Committee since 1993 and just completed her second year of a three-year commitment to the ECAC Division II baseball tournament committee. Chin has also served on the New England Collegiate Conference Executive Committee since 1994. She was on the National Association of Collegiate Athletics Administrators Board of Directors from 1993-96 and was a member of

the AVCA Education & Publication Committee from 1995-97. Chin also was the Volleyball Commissioner for the 1995 Special Olympics World Games held in New Haven.

As head volleyball coach Chin posted a 576-178 record (.764) in 19 seasons (1975-93) and was only the fifth Division II coach to win 500 career matches. The Chargers made 10 trips to the NCAA tournament under Chin's reign, reaching the top five four times. Her awards include six American Volleyball Coaches Association Northeast Region Coach of the Year distinctions as well as eight New England Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year honors. Chin coached the Chargers to 12 30-win seasons, including six straight. Chin, who is President and Director of No. 1 Total Volleyball Camp, Inc., is recognized internationally as a top volleyball clinician.

Chin also had a successful career officiating competition as well. She was an official at the AIAW Women's National Volleyball Championships from 1974-1981 and a U.S. Volleyball Association Regional Official from 1973-79. She served as a basketball official at the AIAW women's championships from 1969-71 and has officiated games at the junior college and high school level.

Among her numerous honors, Chin was awarded the National Association for Girls and Women in Sports Presidential Award in March 1997 and was the *Connecticut Post* Women of the Year in 1993.

She has also earned the U.S. Volleyball Association Meritorious Service Award and the YMCA Women in Leadership Award.

A 1968 graduate of SUNY-Cortland, Chin earned her masters from the University of North Carolina-Greensboro in 1972.



Kyle Diamond

Head Athletic Trainer/Director of Sports Medicine

Diamond joined the University of New Haven staff in 1997 and is starting his third year. He received his bachelor's degree in athletic training/exercise science from Ithaca College in 1995 before working as a graduate assistant at Sacred Heart University in nearby Fairfield, CT. While at Sacred Heart, Diamond worked with the football, men's basketball and lacrosse teams, and earned his master's from the University in teaching in 1997. Diamond also

has experience working with the Connecticut Skyhawks semipro basketball team.

Diamond is directly responsible for all of the University's student-athletes but works specifically with the football and baseball teams as well as the men's and women's basketball teams in the winter.

The Sports Medicine Department and its staff are responsible for the prevention, care and rehabilitation of athletic injuries for 275 student-athletes on 16 intercollegiate teams. The fitness center, newly remodeled with the latest strength and conditioning equipment, helps accelerate athletes' return to competition from injury.

University of New Haven Hall of Fame



Anthony Mortali
Linebacker (1973-1976)

Tony Mortali was the type of player that every coach would want on his squad. He was hard working willing and able to give the team his all. An integral part of the football team's first ever varsity win, 13-7 in 1975 vs. Curry College, the linebacker/offensive guard was one of the unsung heroes of the sports first few years of varsity status. His efforts on the gridiron were rewarded though, as he captained the team for two seasons, including the year the UNH team notched its first victory. That same season, Tony was named to the All New England Football Conference team.

Inducted 1987

Rick Racioppi
Linebacker (1981-84)

Rick Racioppi is considered to be one of the finest linebackers to wear a Charger uniform. The linebacker averaged 12.3 tackles per game during his sophomore season and 9.5 tackles per contest over his career. He surpassed 100 tackles in three different seasons, highlighted by a career-high 123 stops in 1982. Racioppi never missed a game during his four-year stay, playing in all 40 UNH contests. When he graduated, Racioppi held the single season and career records for both recovered fumbles and total tackles. He was named to the All-New England team in 1983, one of only three Chargers to earn those honors that season. He ended his career with 379 total tackles, including 210 solo stops, and four sacks.

Inducted 1992

Stephen DiMugno
Defensive Back (1971-74)

Stephen Di Mugno was a true pioneer for the University of New Haven football program. He joined the team before football was a varsity sport and earned All-Eastern Collegiate Club Football Conference honors as a defensive back. The 1973 roster listed DiMugno as a defensive back but he also spent time as a running back and as a punt returner. He gained 75 yards on 24 carries in his first start as a running back, the school's best single game performance at the time. He finished second in scoring, third in rushing and was considered to be one of the best defensive players for the 1973 season. In 1974, DiMugno received a second term as captain and led the team in both interceptions and punt returns.

Inducted 1993

Harry Boatswain
Offensive Line (1987-90)

Harry Boatswain helped his team post a 30-10 overall record and accumulate more than 13,000 total yards and more than 1,200 points during his career. He earned All-New England first team honors in 1989 and 1990 as well as receiving All-ECAC honors as a senior. Boatswain capped his collegiate career with a spot on the Associated Press Small College All-America team. Boatswain became the highest draft pick from the University of New Haven when the San Francisco 49ers selected him in the fifth round of the 1991 NFL Draft. Boatswain was a member of the 1994 Super Bowl Championship team before signing with the Carolina Panthers.

Inducted 1995

Chris Palmer
Head Coach (1986-87)

Currently the head coach of the expansion Cleveland Browns, Palmer spent two seasons at the University of New Haven. He helped the program gain its first ever national ranking finishing the 1986 campaign with an 8-2 record and a No. 18 placement in the national poll. Palmer watched the Blue and Gold improve on that ranking by concluding the 1987 season with an 8-2 slate and a No. 16 national placement. Palmer left the University of New Haven following the 1987 campaign to accept the head coaching position at Boston University. Palmer returned to the professional ranks as a coach with the Houston Oilers and New England Patriots. He was a member of the 1997 New England Patriots which captured the American Football Conference title and advanced to the Super Bowl.

Inducted 1997

Miles McPherson
Defensive Back (1978-81)

One of the finest defensive backs to play at New Haven, Miles McPherson recorded impressive numbers during his four year career. At one time he held 15 school records and still holds all the interception records - in a game (4), in a season (7), which he accomplished twice, and in a career (22). He was named to the All New England Conference First Team, New England Football Writers' Association Division II-III team, Boston Herald III team. McPherson became the first Charger to be drafted into the National Football League. He was taken as a 10th round pick by the Los Angeles Rams. He signed with the San Diego Chargers where he played from 1982 to 1985.

Inducted 1989

Erik Lesinski
Linebacker (1984-87)

Erik Lesinski can be rated as one of the best all-around players in New Haven football history. His career totals are among the best in school history, including 422 total tackles, 242 solo tackles and seven sacks. He was named to the All-New England and All-Eastern College Athletic Conference teams in 1986 and 1987. The linebacker became the third UNH football player to receive a Kodak All-America berth, earning the honor in his senior season, and was also a All-America honorable mention as a junior. In 1987, Lesinski registered 10 or more tackles in every contest with his best game coming against Springfield in which he made 21 tackles.

Inducted 1992

Paul Bowman
Offensive Lineman (1975-78)

Paul Bowman played an instrumental part in the Chargers early success. He was elected a tri-captain of the 1978 team which posted a 6-3 record, the first winning record in the school's young history. Bowman's playing style and skills grabbed the attention of both players and coaches despite playing a position which rarely received recognition. His play on the offensive line helped the offense score 188 points, the highest production in school history to that point which allowed the squad to post a 5-0 start. During his career, Bowman played a major role in the Charger's success as the team won 12 games, scored 362 points and gained over 7,800 total yards, statistics no other class could claim.

Inducted 1993

Brian Nugent
Linebacker (1976-79)

Brian Nugent was a four-year starter for the Chargers, spending all four seasons as a linebacker. Nugent played both on offense and defense as a rookie before settling in as a full-time linebacker during his final three years. Nugent earned All-New England Football Conference honors three times and received a spot on the United Press International's College Division All-New England Football team as a senior. In his senior season, Nugent was one of the football team's tri-captains. Nugent's teammates realized his contribution to the team by giving the linebacker back-to-back most valuable player honors. The Charger Bulletin, the student newspaper, selected Nugent as the school's Male Athlete of the Year for the 1979-80 season.

Inducted 1996

Lionel Drew Maul

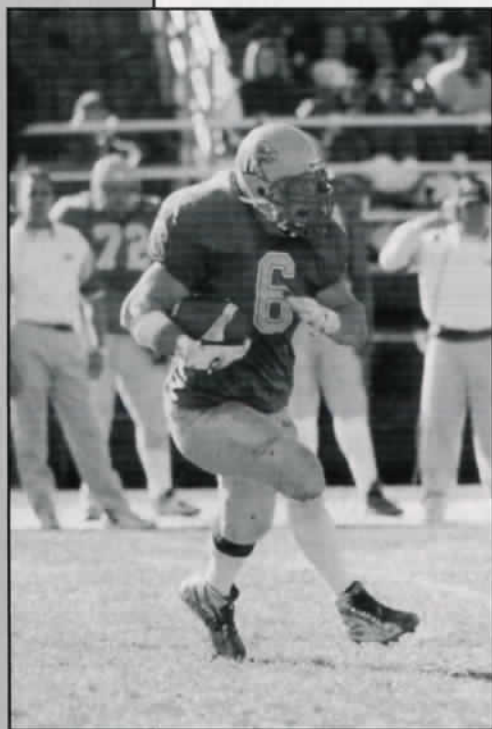
Track and Field/Football, Sprinter/Defensive Back (1983-86)
Maul received All-New England honors in each of his final three years with the Chargers program. The sprinter was a member of the 1600 meter relay team which participated in the 1985 NCAA indoor track and field championships. He was also a finalist in the 55 meters during the 1986 IC4A championships. Maul earned the University's Track and Field most valuable athlete award in 1985 and 1986 in addition to his selection as the University's athlete of the year in his senior season. Maul also played football during his four-year stay, earning the New Haven Gridiron Club's most outstanding player award in 1983. Maul was later drafted by the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL.

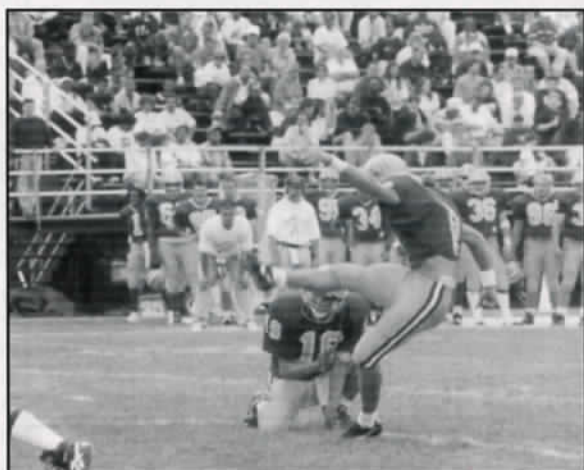

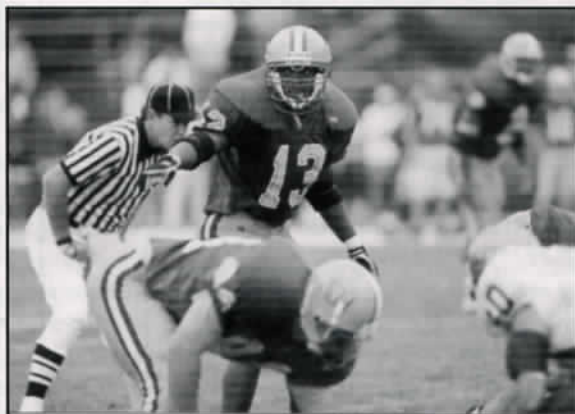

HARLON HILL TROPHY

The top player in college football each season has long been honored with the presentation of the Heisman Trophy. An award symbolic of the best. But while that award may have recognized the top player in NCAA football, no one playing at a school below the Division I level has ever received recognition for their accomplishments with that award.

Players like Walter Payton, Neil Lomax, Ken O'Brien, John Stallworth and others played in the NCAA Division II, and would have never achieved recognition, had they not gone onto outstanding careers in pro football. That began to change in 1986, however, when a group of Shoals area residents, with sponsorship of Coca-Cola, worked to establish the Harlon Hill Trophy, to be presented every year to the top player in NCAA Division II.

The originators of the award didn't feel that accomplishments in pro football should have to be measuring stick for talent in Division II. So the award was created to honor players whose achievements have placed them among the top players to ever play the game.

The Harlon Hill Trophy is an award that is given annually to the player selected as the best in Division II by the sports information directors at the 120-plus Division II schools which play football, and is presented during the week of the Division II championship game.

Nominations for the Harlon Hill Trophy are accepted from the sports information directors at NCAA Division II football-playing institutions. The criteria states that the player must have distinguished himself nationally as being among the top players in the game.

The players nominated are first voted on by the SID's within their respective NCAA region. The top two vote getters from each of the four regions then advance to the national ballot where they are voted on by all 120-plus Division II SID's. On both the regional and national ballots, the SID's vote for a first, second and third basis. The top three finishers from the national voting are then invited to the Shoals for the championship week activities.

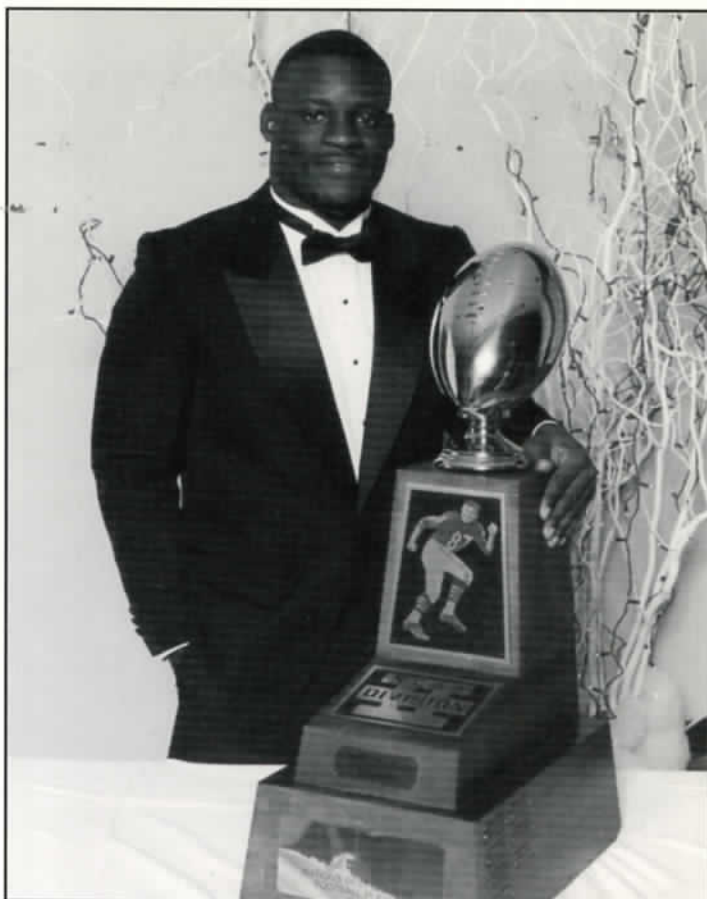
The Harlon Hill Trophy, created by Herff Jones, Inc., is 30 inches tall and weighs 63 pounds. The football is a lifesize replica of a real football and sits on a solid walnut base.
