

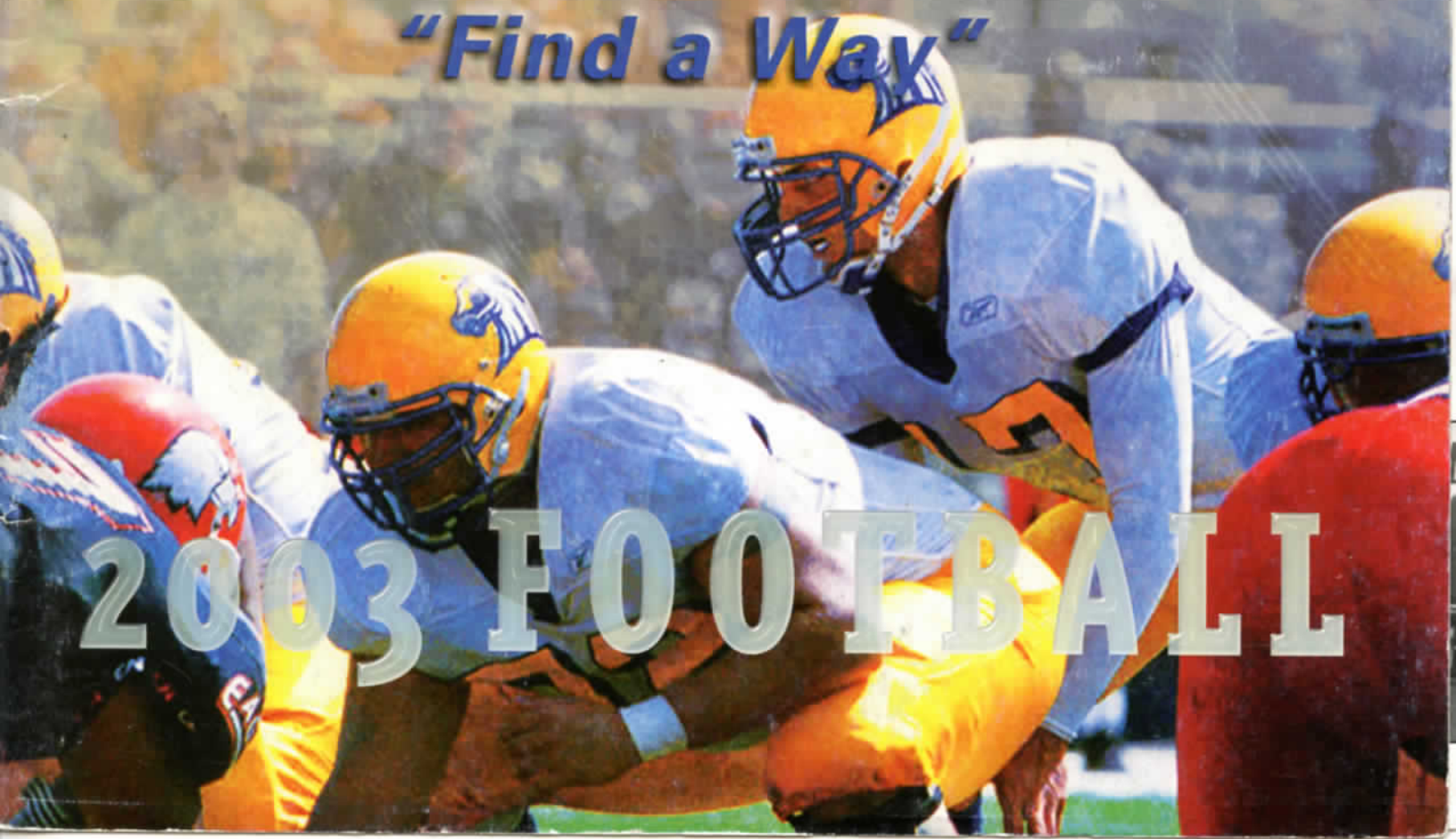

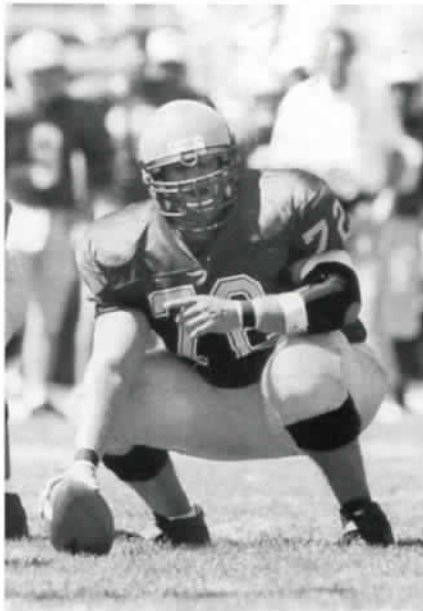

The University of New Haven

The University of New Haven is a private, coeducational university founded as a branch of Northeastern University in 1920. In 1926 UNH became an independent college and in 1970 added the graduate school and expanded its programs to become a University. The acquisition of the present campus in West Haven in 1960 promoted rapid expansion of facilities, faculty, and student body (the current enrollment includes 1,900 full-time undergraduates). The University offers excellent instruction in a great variety of academic disciplines, yet is small enough to accommodate individual programs and needs. Programs are constantly evolving to meet changing academic and career needs and the requirements of business, industry, and professional fields.



We Make Tomorrow



The University's small class size fosters close student-faculty relationships. The University operates a branch in New London. Off-campus graduate courses are offered in New London, Newington, Waterbury, and Stamford. The main campus is located in West Haven on a hillside overlooking Long Island Sound, with a view of downtown New Haven. On the main campus are the

main administration and classroom buildings; the School of Business; the School of Engineering; the School of Hospitality and Tourism; the Graduate School; five residence halls; the library; the bookstore; the student center; the Computer Center; the psychology building; the School of Arts and Sciences; the School of Public Safety and Professional Studies; and the Bayer Hall Admissions Building. The Charger Gymnasium and playing fields are on the North Campus, two blocks away.

Intercollegiate varsity programs are offered in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross-country, football, men's and women's golf, women's lacrosse, men's and women's soccer, softball, women's tennis, men's and women's track, and men's and women's volleyball. An extensive intramural program is also available for both men and women. Of the undergraduate day students, approximately 65 percent live on campus in the five residence halls. Over 30 University clubs and organizations are open to interested students. Included are student chapters of professional societies, religious organizations, social groups, special interest clubs, student councils, cultural groups, and fraternities and sororities.

The Graduate School offers master's degrees in; business administration; cellular and molecular biology; community psychology; computer science; criminal justice; education; electrical engineering; environmental engineering; environmental science; executive business administration; executive engineering management; fire science; forensic science; health-care administration; hospitality and tourism; human nutrition; industrial engineering; industrial hygiene; industrial/organizational psychology; labor relations; management of sports industries, mechanical engineering; occupational safety and health management; operations research; and public administration. Dual degrees are offered in business administration and industrial engineering and in business administration and public administration.

University of New Haven Administration

University President

Dr. Lawrence J. DeNardis



Dr. Lawrence J. DeNardis has served as President of the University of New Haven since 1991. In June, DeNardis announced that this academic year will be his last as President and will serve as President Emeritus.

A former U.S. Congressman and professor of political science DeNardis has a distinguished career in education and government.

He holds a Ph.D. degree in political science from New York University and a bachelor's degree in economics from the College of the Holy Cross. His academic experience includes nearly two decades of teaching at Albertus Magnus College, Connecticut College, Yale University and the University of New Haven. He was also a guest scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

In the field of government, Dr. DeNardis has had the rare distinction of serving as both a federal and state legislator. He was elected to the United States House of Representatives from Connecticut's Third District

in 1980 and was chosen as one of the outstanding freshmen in the 97th Congress. He served on the Education and Labor and Government Affairs Committees, as well as the Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control. He had previously served five terms as a State Senator in Connecticut from 1971-79, where he was Chairman of the Finance Committee, Program Review Committee and Deputy Minority Leader. He also served as Assistant Secretary for Legislation at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (one of the largest departments of the Federal government) during 1985-86. In addition, Dr. DeNardis has been President and CEO of the Connecticut Conference of Independent Colleges (1979-80) and President and CEO of the Connecticut Policy and Economic Council (1989-91). He has also been Chairman of the Connecticut Board of Governors of Higher Education (1991) appointed by former Governor Lowell P. Weicker, and served as a member of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine (1990-94) appointed by former President George Bush.

He and his wife Mary Lou live in Hamden, CT, and have four grown children.

University Vice President

Student Affairs & Athletics

William M. Leete, Jr.



William M. Leete Jr. begins his eleventh year as Vice President for Student Affairs and Athletics after serving 12 years as Director of Athletics.

During his tenure as director of athletics, the program's greatest achievement was the 1987 women's basketball national championship. Among his proudest achievements was the baseball team's appearance in the 1989 College World Series championship game and the elevation of the football program to Division II and eventual national prominence.

Under Leete's direction, student-athlete participation increased and the academic counselling and tracking system for student-athletes was developed. He also started the UNH Golf Tournament and the Athletic Hall of Fame banquet, an annual dinner honoring former star athletes.

Leete served on several committees as director of athletics. He spent six years as the Commissioner of the New England Collegiate Conference, a conference which produced seven national champion-

ships during his time. He served on the NCAA Division II Football Committee and is still a chair of the ECAC Officiating/Negotiating Committee.

Before coming to the University of New Haven, Leete was the head football coach, head baseball coach and assistant athletics director at Hofstra University. He graduated from the University of Vermont in 1967, where he also earned his master's degree. As a Catamount, Leete started for both the baseball and football teams. He also coached both sports at Vermont.

Leete was inducted into the University of Vermont Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992.

Leete resides in Cheshire with his wife, Cathie. He has two grown children, Bill III and Amy.

University of New Haven Athletics

**Director of Athletics
Deborah Chin**



A member of the University of New Haven staff since 1975, Deborah Chin became the school's fourth director of athletics when she took over the program in 1993. Chin oversees a department that sponsors 19 NCAA Division II varsity sports (10 for men, 10 for women), including the recent addition of women's lacrosse, men's volleyball and men's and women's golf in 2001-2002.

As Coordinator of Women's Athletics she was responsible for starting the

women's intercollegiate athletic program, coaching volleyball, tennis, basketball and softball for three seasons. Chin eventually surrendered all head coaching responsibilities except volleyball when she was promoted to Associate Director of Athletics in 1979.

As an administrator Chin has served on over 30 national and regional committees. Her resume includes terms as chairperson for the NCAA Division II Volleyball Committee (1988-92), the NCAA Division II Baseball Committee (1997-2001), the NCAA Northeast Regional Football Committee (1999-present), the NACDA John McLendon Minority Scholarship Committee (1999-present) and the NACWA Nominating Committee (1999-2001). Chin has also served on the New England Collegiate Conference Executive Committee since 1994. She was on the National Association of Collegiate Athletics Administrators Board of Directors from 1993-96 and was a member of the AVCA Education & Publication Committee from 1995-97. Chin also was the Volleyball Commissioner for the 1995 Special Olympics World Games held in New Haven.

As head volleyball coach Chin posted a 576-178 record (.764) in 19 seasons (1975-93) and was only the fifth Division II coach to win 500 career matches. The Chargers made 10 trips to the NCAA tournament under Chin's reign, reaching the top five four times. Her awards include six American Volleyball Coaches Association Northeast Region Coach of the Year distinctions as well as eight New England Collegiate Conference Coach of the Year honors. Chin coached the Chargers to twelve 30-win seasons, including six straight. Chin, who is President and Director of No. 1 Total Volleyball Camp, Inc., is recognized internationally as a top volleyball clinician.

Among her numerous honors, Chin was awarded the NACDA/Continental Airlines Athletic Director of the Year for the Northeast Region in 1998-99. She was inducted into the Connecticut Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in April of 1999 and the Connecticut Volleyball Hall of Fame in October of 1998. She was also awarded the NACWAA Jousten's District I Administrator of the Year Award in 1997. Chin was also awarded the National Association for Girls and Women in Sports Presidential Award in March 1997 and was the Connecticut Post Woman of the Year in 1993. She has also earned the U.S. Volleyball Association Meritorious Service Award and the YMCA Women in Leadership Award. A 1968 graduate of SUNY-Cortland, Chin earned her masters from UNC-Greensboro.

Robert B. Dodds Stadium - 23rd Season

Robert B. Dodds Stadium begins its 23rd full season as "The Home of the Chargers" when the Blue and Gold host West Chester University on September 6. The stadium is named after former prominent supporter and board member of the University of New Haven, Robert B. Dodds.

Dodds, who passed away in 1990, served on the executive committee of the University of New Haven's Board of Governors for many years and was very active in numerous civic activities in and around the City of New Haven. He held degrees from Georgia Tech and Yale University and later received an honorary degree from the University of New Haven.

It was through his generous contribution towards the project that allowed the Chargers home to be built. Prior to this, UNH played its home games at other fields such as Quigley Stadium in West Haven.

New Haven has enjoyed a great deal of success at Dodds Stadium, including a record 18-game home winning streak which came to an end in the 1996 home opener.

Overall, the UNH football team has won 70 percent of their games at Dodds Stadium, a 64-28 record since opening the Stadium in 1980. UNH opened the Stadium with a 20-7 win over Massachusetts Maritime in 1980. The team has experienced only four losing records (1981, 1982, 1983, 1985) at home since moving to the Stadium. The Chargers have posted five undefeated records at home including five of the last nine seasons (1989, 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997).

Dodds Stadium acts as the home field for UNH's football, men's and women's soccer and women's lacrosse teams, hosting matches both in the fall and spring. The Chargers men's soccer team hosted several NCAA tournament games at Dodds Stadium in the early and mid-1980s. The Stadium has enough seating for 5,000 fans, giving UNH the ability to host NCAA Division II playoff games.

The press box houses media from around the region including print, television and radio. WNHU-Radio, home of Chargers Sports, broadcasts every game from Dodds Stadium on 88.7 FM.



Directions To Robert B. Dodds Stadium

From Interstate 95 North: Take Exit 43 (Downtown West Haven) and make left at end of ramp onto Campbell Avenue. Follow Campbell Avenue to fourth traffic light and make hard left onto Route 1 (also called Orange Avenue). At first traffic light, make right onto Pruden Street and follow to end. Athletic Complex driveway is directly in front of you.

From Interstate 95 South: Take Exit 43 (First Avenue) and make right at end of ramp onto First Avenue. Follow to second traffic light and bear right onto Campbell Avenue. Follow Campbell Avenue to second traffic light and make hard left onto Route 1 (also called Orange Avenue). At first traffic light, make right onto Pruden Street and follow to end. Athletic Complex driveway is directly in front of you.

Working Credentials: In order to eliminate any misunderstanding, all media credential requests must be made 72 hours in advance of a home football game. Because of limited space, priority will be given to those outlets covering the participating teams on a regular basis. Credentials can be secured at the "Will Call" window on game day or picked up one day before the contest. **To secure credentials, please contact: Jason Sullivan, Sports Information Director at (203) 932-7025.**

Media Services: Complete team and individual statistics and running play-by-play will be provided approximately 20 minutes after the game. Packets can be picked up in the Gymnasium's general office, located to the right of the media parking lot. Post-game press conferences will be conducted in the Gymnasium lower level. After a 10 minute cooling off period, the visiting head coach and selected players will be brought to the interview room. The home head coach and selected players will immediately follow.

Telephones & FAX: A telephone is available in the football press box on a first-come-first served basis. After the game, reporters may use one of three phones and a FAX machine in the Gymnasium's general office.

Coach & Player Interviews: All interview requests must be made through the Sports Information Office. The preferred interview time is 30 minutes before practice. Player phone numbers will not be released at any time. If you wish to conduct a phone interview, please call the Sports Information Office so a return call from the athlete can be scheduled.

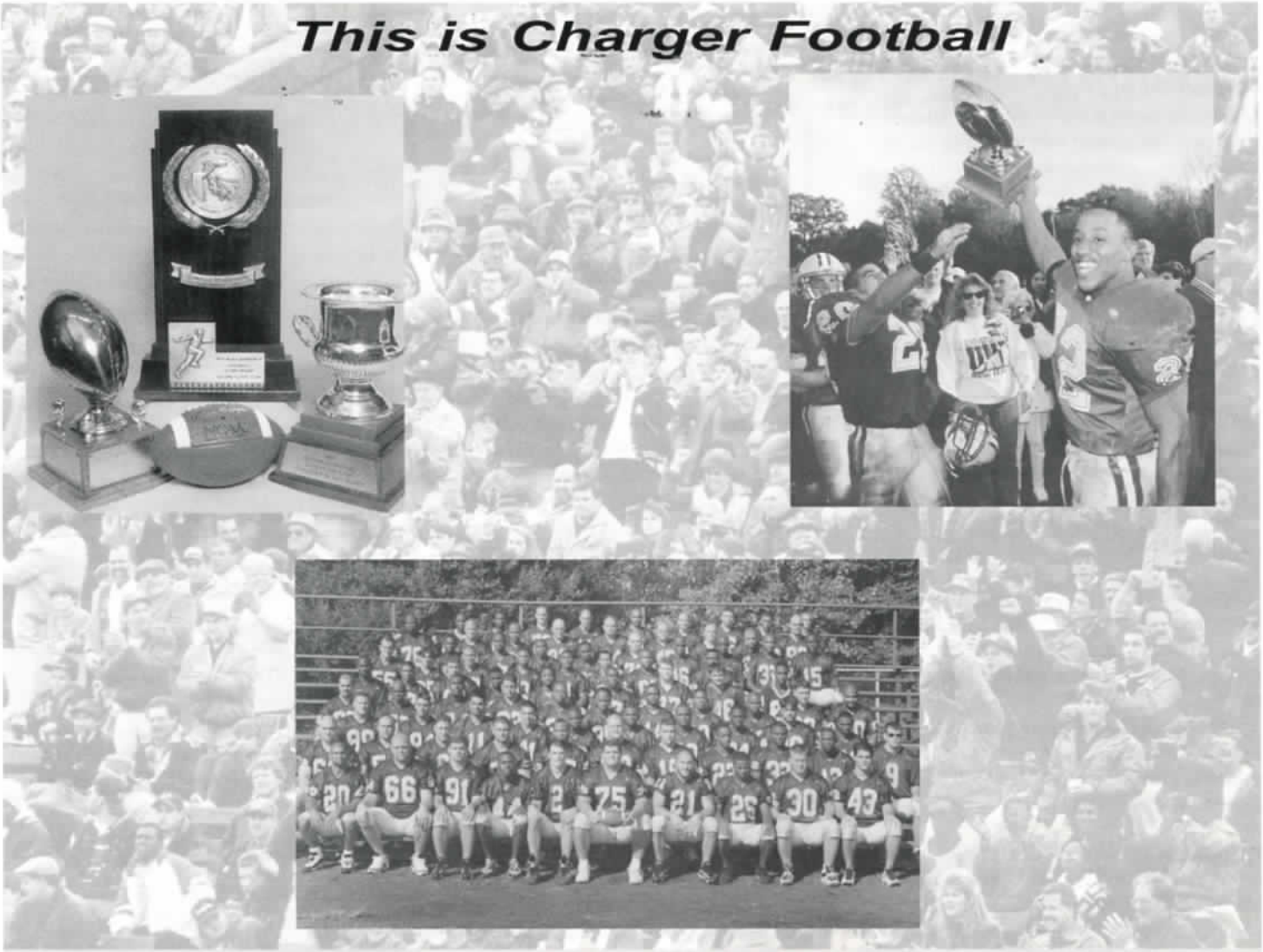
Media Parking: A limited number of media parking spaces are available and will be distributed in advance. If you have not called in advance, A SPACE WILL NOT BE PROVIDED. Television stations may drive to the field and park behind the visitor's grandstand. However, only television stations doing actual filming for broadcast will be permitted to park on the field. Radio stations may drive to the field and drop off equipment, but must drive the car back to the media parking lot once unloaded.

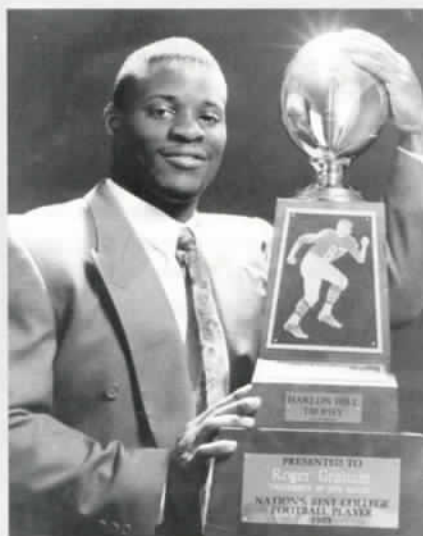

2003 News and Notes

PLAYING THE BEST -

UNH faced perhaps the toughest schedule in the nation last season with six games last year against teams ranked in the top-25 and four qualifying for the Division II playoffs. In fact, opponents went a combined 82-35 in 2002 for a winning percentage of .700. This year, UNH faces a schedule that featured five teams that finished the season ranked in the top-25 in **Carson-Newman** (5th), **Indiana - PA** (8th), **Central Washington** (9th), **C.W. Post** (17th), and **Bloomsburg** (22nd).

THE INDEPENDENTS UNITE:

The Chargers competes as an NCAA Division II Independent associated with the Independent Football Alliance.

11 NCAA Division II Independent Institutions make up the alliance, including: UC Davis, Gannon University, Lincoln University, Kentucky Wesleyan College, **University of New Haven**, North Greenville College, Oklahoma Panhandle State University, Quincy University, St. Joseph's College, Tiffin University, and Western New Mexico University.

PATENAUDE BEGINS SECOND YEAR: Named as the eighth coach in UNH football history on March 26, 2002, **Dave Patenaude** begins his second year at the helm of the University of New Haven football team. Patenaude arrived



at UNH from Columbia University where he spent the past four years as the wide receivers coach for two years and quarterbacks coach for two years before being promoted to offensive coordinator.

CAPTAINS NAMED:

Four senior captains were selected at the conclusion of the spring practice. The 2003 captains are: linebacker **Sarth Benoit (New York, NY)**, linebacker **Tom Stanley (Spring Valley, NY)**, quarterback **Rob D'Innocenzio (West Caldwell, NJ)**, and offensive lineman **Kurt Stametz (Bethlehem, PA)**.

AGAINST THE I-AA'S:

On October 18, 2003, UNH will square up with a Division I-AA opponent for the tenth time in seven years (since 1997) when the team visits Fordham University in the Bronx, NY. The Chargers were 4-5 against I-AA teams from 1997 including a 17-14 win over Villanova in 2001 in Philadelphia. Last year, UNH did not play a Division I-AA team.

MOVING UP THE CHARTS:

Senior quarterback Rob D'Innocenzio enters his final season listed in the top ten in several career statistical categories. D'Innocenzio is currently ranked eighth all-time for career passing yards with 3,605 and eighth for career passing touchdowns with 27. He is also eighth for completions in a career with 289.

31st SEASON OF UNH FOOTBALL

UNH begins its 31st season of football this fall. The Chargers have an all-time record of 171-126-5 (.575) since the first season of football in 1973.

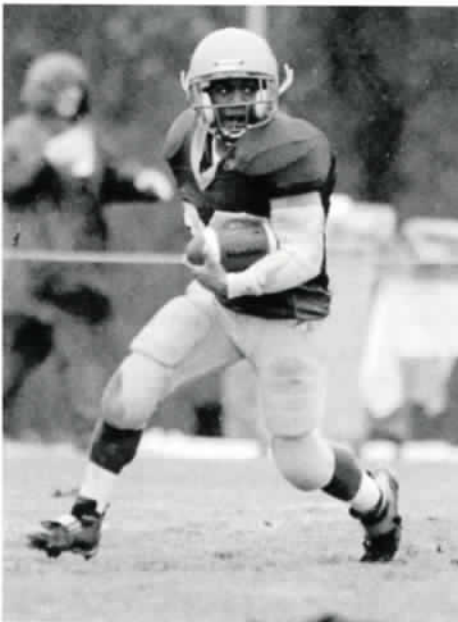
Experienced Offense - Explosive Defense Promises Good Things From The Chargers This Fall

With six starters back on offense and five starters returning to the defense, the 2003 University of New Haven Chargers football team looks to rebound from last year's disappointing season. Despite playing the second-toughest schedule in the country, UNH posted a 4-6 record with all six losses coming against teams ranked in the Top-25.

Though the Chargers have yet another challenging schedule ahead this fall, the UNH coaching staff will look to an explosive offensive unit and strong veteran defense to help return the team to the glory days of old.

Second-year coach **Dave Patenaude** and the Chargers will look to thrive under the leadership of a senior quarterback and a cast of returners looking to step in and contribute immediately.

"We came out of practice this past spring with a tremendous attitude and belief in the system," said Patenaude. "The team showed a great understanding of the system with a much higher confidence and comfort level in what we are trying to accomplish."

As with any football program, learning a new style of play under a first-year coach takes some time. Signs of this cohesion began to take shape towards the end of the 2002

season and continued into the recent spring practice season.

"On both sides of the ball, we have a lot of guys returning with a year under their belts and who truly believe in their ability to compete at this level," added Patenaude.

OFFENSE PREVIEW

QUARTERBACKS

Carrying the Chargers this season will be senior quarterback **Rob D'Innocenzio (West Caldwell, NJ)**. The three-year starter is coming off an excellent season that saw him throw for 2,180 yards and 17 touchdowns and looks even better heading into fall camp after an excellent spring practice. He enters this season eighth with 3,605 career passing yards.

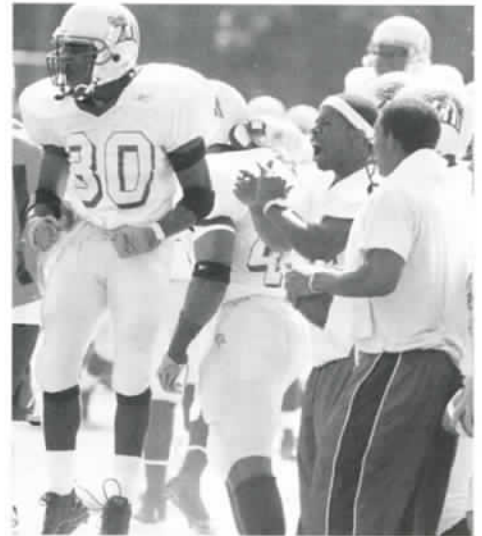
"Rob's a three-year starter with a wealth of experience," said Patenaude. "There aren't many things that he hasn't seen. He's worked hard this spring and knows our fast-break style. With our offense, everything runs through the quarterback. He knows our system inside and out."

Second-year quarterback **Joe DiMeglio (Bethel, CT)** has the ability to challenge D'Innocenzio right away for the position and gives the team a healthy backup. DiMeglio has excellent size (6-3, 215) and throwing arm as well as the ability to run the ball effectively.

"Joe has all of the tools necessary to become an outstanding quarterback," said Patenaude. He's a big guy with confidence in having the ability to get the job done."

WIDE RECEIVER

While UNH will have to replace leading receiver Matt Marcks (66 receptions for 919 yards in '02), the Chargers will welcome back senior **Osric Bittle (Meriden, CT)** and sophomore **Devin Robinson (Cambridge, MA)** who played a significant role last season. Bittle was second on the team with 32 receptions for 424 yards and three touch-



downs while the 6-foot-3 Robinson came on strong at the end of the '02 season, finishing with 178 yards receiving including four touchdowns.

Aaron (AC) Thomas (Chicago, IL), **Shawn Frye (Uniondale, NY)**, and **Joe Tarasiewicz (Scarsdale, NY)** should also play a big role this season at the wide-out spot. Thomas was a backup last fall while Tarasiewicz missed last year due to an injury. Frye, a member of the UNH men's track & field team, was a starter in 2001 and should compete for the job again this season.

"The loss of Matt Marcks will be a big hole to fill, but we have much more depth than in the past at the wide receiver spot," said Patenaude. "Osric stepped up behind Matt as the No. 2 receiver last year while Devin really came into his own last year and gives us great size and ability to catch the ball in traffic."

"A.C.'s a legitimate deep threat while Tarasiewicz has excellent quickness and will be counted on this year."

TIGHT ENDS

One of the positions that looks to get more involved with the offense this year will be the tight end. Sophomore **Jonathan Lee-Hugh (Nanuet, NY)** had a touchdown reception in his first year with the Chargers while newcomer **Michael Costello (Yardville, NJ)** is a transfer from Temple University who could make an immediate impact on the Charger offense.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The offensive line will have to replace the hole left by graduated all-American Phil Bogle, but depth-wise should be much improved with the healthy return of several veteran players from last year as well as the addition of transfer **Keith Ford (New Haven, CT)** who was with the team as a redshirt last season after transferring from the University of Maine.

Travis Hand (Kunkletown, PA) and **Justin Coquel (Westwood, NJ)** join

returning starters **Kurt Stametz (Bethlehem, PA)** and **Mike Vito (Nesquehoning, PA)** this year up front paving the way for what should be a high-flying and exciting Charger offense.

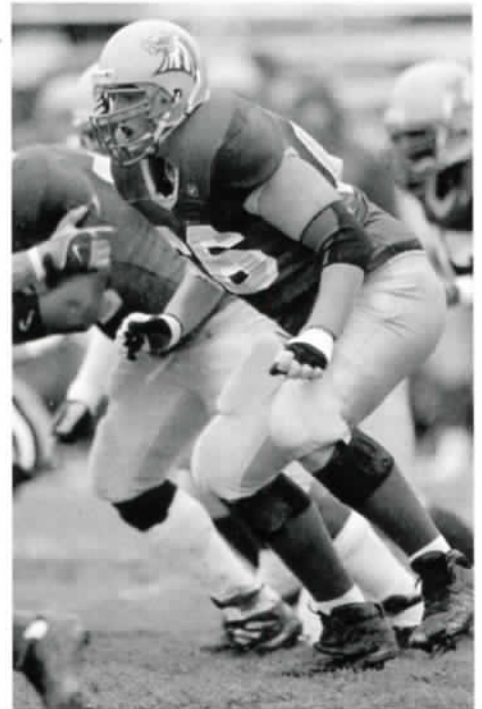
RUNNINGBACKS

They'll be looking to open holes for a strong cast of tailbacks this year that look to get the running game back in gear after just averaging 106 yards rushing per game in 2002. The Chargers lose senior Dawud Hanif (404 yards rushing) and Maikel Mehu (474 yards rushing), but will be very deep in the backfield.

Senior **Martel Threadgill (Annapolis, MD)** is a key returner who had an excellent spring and averaged 4.8 yards per carry last season as a backup. Speedster **Corey Lane (Westwood, NJ)** returns after missing last season looking to crack the starting lineup. Lane has explosive speed and experience to help provide the Chargers with a strong rushing game while junior **Darren Haynes (Woodbridge, CT)** also saw action as a reserve last season, his first since transferring from the University of Rhode Island.

Junior **Milton Johnson (Somerdale, NJ)** is a hard-nosed type of runner who was a member of the special team's coverage for the past two seasons while the electrifying **Kevin Nelson (Wilmington, DE)** is back after a sensational freshman year handling both the kickoff and punt returns in 2002.

"Hanif and Mehu accounted for a major part of our running game a year ago, but we return a strong number of backs who all bring a different style to the offense," said Patenaude. "Corey is a very good running back. I was pleased with his spring workouts and he is very strong for his size. Martel really came on in the spring and has developed into a well-rounded player."

DEFENSIVE PREVIEW

On the defensive side, the Chargers look to be a little more athletic and a little quicker than they did a year ago as the team will try to improve on its pass defense. While the Chargers lose a pair of standout linebackers in Alston Sajery and Donta Jenkins, the opportunity is there for a cast of returning veterans to step it up this season.

"We'll be much smaller, but quicker by design when we hit the field next year," said Patenaude. There is a great deal of speed back, especially in the secondary and linebacker position."

Sophomore **Brett Keough (Wakefield, MA)**, senior **Alex Townes (Brooklyn, NY)** and senior **Omar Segura (New Britain, CT)** are also veteran returns that give the team strong depth on the defensive line.

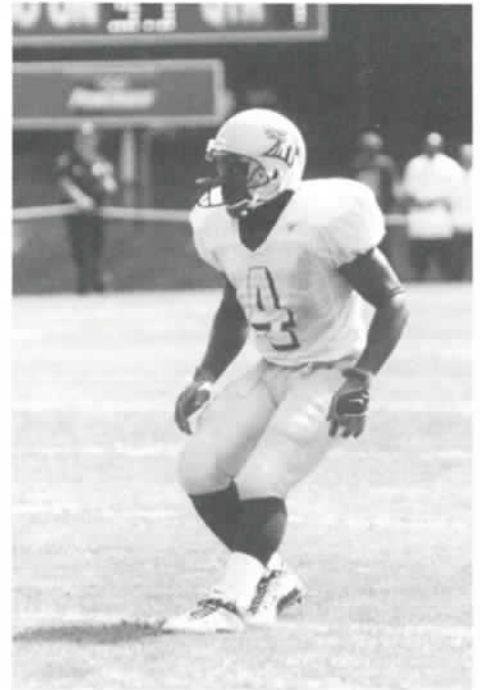
LINEBACKERS

Benoit saw action in all ten games for the Chargers last season as a backup behind a strong group of linebackers, while Stanley made a great impression in his first year with the team, moving up from the free safety position. He's a hard-hitter with good speed and mobility to cover the middle.

The Chargers will take advantage of an abundance of speed on the depth chart this season as the team will move senior **Jamar Williams (Minneapolis, MN)** up from defensive back and former wide out **Jonathan Joseph (Boston, MA)** to the rover position.

Williams was the team's top cover man for the past two seasons on the corners. He's a heads-up player with a nose for the ball and should help the team continue to pressure opposing quarterbacks.

"We want to get Jamar closer to the line of scrimmage," said Patenaude. "He is experienced with our defensive set and will be counted on to help stop the run and apply pressure through various blitzes. Joseph might be one of the fastest players on the team."

Head Coach Dave Patenaude

Second Year • 4-6

Central Connecticut State University '90

University of New Haven head football coach Dave Patenaude begins his second year as coach of the Chargers. Named as the eighth coach in the program's history,

Patenaude guided the Chargers to a 4-6 record in 2002 against a schedule that proved to be one of the toughest in the country (four opponents reached the NCAA playoffs). But with a year under his belt, the Chargers are determined to return to the national scene in football and have the right man on the sidelines to lead UNH back.

Arriving at UNH from Columbia University where he served as the school's Offensive Coordinator, Patenaude was named coach on March 26, 2002, replacing Darren Rizzi who left for a position at Rutgers.

Patenaude was an assistant at Columbia for four seasons, serving as the quarterbacks coach for three years before promoted to offensive coordinator in 2001. The Lions registered 256 points in 10 games in the fall of 2000, the most points by a Columbia team in 75 years. In his first full season as the offensive coordinator, he led the Lions to 344 total yards of offense per game, including an average of 219 yards passing per game.

In his first season as coach of the Chargers, UNH averaged 338.9 yards of total offense per game including a record-setting 501 yards of passing offense in the team's 47-21 win over Western Washington.

A 1990 graduate of Central Connecticut State University, Patenaude brings a wealth of offensive background to UNH. Arriving at Columbia in 1998, he coached the Lions' wide receivers before taking on the responsibility of the quarterbacks and eventually offensive coordinator duties. Patenaude coached CU's Jeff McCall, who concluded his career as the holder of every passing category in school history.

Prior to his arrival at Columbia, Patenaude spent four seasons as an assistant at Fordham University. While with the

Rams, he coached the tight ends for one season before later coaching the quarterbacks and receivers along with coordinating Fordham's special teams.

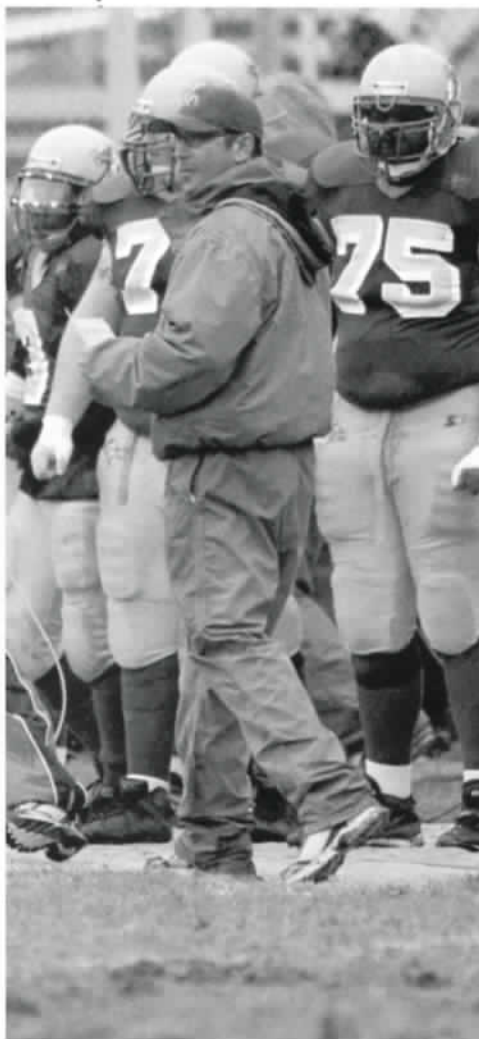
A four-year letterwinner at Central Connecticut State University, Patenaude was a three-year starting quarterback and free safety for the Blue Devils. In addition, Patenaude was a three-time ECAC Academic Honor selection and received Central Connecticut's Scholar-Athlete Award.

Patenaude began his coaching career in 1991 as an assistant coach at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in New London, CT where he coached the running backs for one season.

He would later coach the wide receivers and running backs at Springfield College (Mass.) where he would also earn his masters degree in physical education and sports management in 1994 before heading to Fordham University.

A standout two-way player at Saint Bernard's High School, Patenaude was an honorable mention all-American defensive back and two-time all-state selection.

Patenaude and his wife, Christine reside in Guilford with their daughter Eva born in April.

Second Season

Defensive Coordinator • Bloomsburg '94

Bob James begins his second season with the Chargers and his second as the defensive coordinator. Under his direction in 2002, UNH held opponents to just 146 yards of rushing offense per game average including a season-best defensive performance by holding West Chester to just 63 yards rushing in the first of three games the Charger defense kept opponents under 100 yards rushing. Regionally-ranked Western Washington was held to just 95 yards rushing while NCAA Division II finalist Northern Colorado mustered just 89 yards on the ground in the season-finale at Dodds Stadium. The defensive backs also

picked off nine opposing passes.

Coaching Experience: James arrived at UNH from Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa where he was the Bulldogs' Defensive Coordinator in 2001. While at Drake, James coordinated the team's defensive schedule and personnel as well as coordinating the Special Team's units.

During the 1999 and 2000 season, James was the Defensive Coordinator and Head Strength & Conditioning coach at Wilkes University in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. While at Wilkes, his defensive unit was ranked No. 1 in rushing defense in the MAC including a No. 12 national ranking with just 80.5 yards per game allowed in 1999 and 13th nationally in 2000 with just 70.4 ypg. Also in 2000, Wilkes was ranked 10th nationally in total defense with just 221.8 yards of total offense allowed.

James was an assistant coach at Lenoir-Rhyne College in Hickory, NC from 1997-1998 as well as Bloomsburg University in Bloomsburg, PA from 1995-96.

Playing Experience: A 1994 graduate of the Bloomsburg University, James was a two-year team captain and two-time all-conference and ECAC selection.

Offensive Coordinator • Southern Connecticut '93

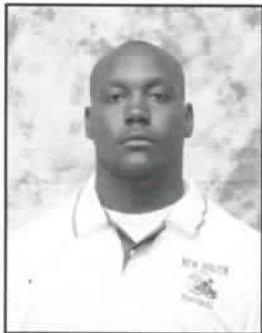
Iannone begins his second season with the Chargers and the second year serving as the team's offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. During his first season, the Chargers averaged 338.9 yards of total offensive including 232 yards of passing offensive per game. Offensively lineman Phil Bogle was named All-American by the AFCA and was named the Offensive MVP of the 2003 Cactus Bowl All-Star game. He would sign a contract with the San Diego Chargers.

After graduation from college, he broke into the coaching ranks as the offensive and defensive line coach at Cary High School in Franklin Square, NY from 1993 to 1994.

Playing Experience: A 1993 graduate of Southern Connecticut State University, Iannone was a three-year starting center from 1988-92. In 1991, he was named Second Team All-New England and in 1992 was selected as First Team All-New England All-Star by the New England Football Writers.

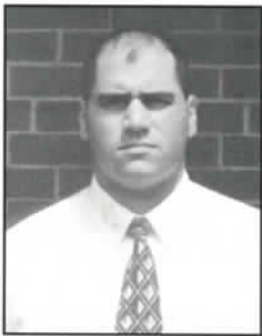


Wayne Blair

Shawn Farmer

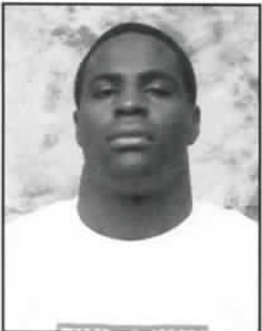
First Season

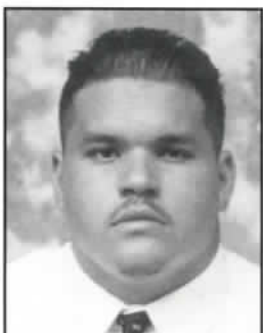


Drew Livingston

2002 Season Review & Notes

BOGLE AN ALL-AMERICAN

University of New Haven senior offensive lineman **Phil Bogle** was named a First Team All-American by the American Football Coaches' Association (AFCA) for all of Division II. The teams were selected by coaches from NCAA Division II and NAIA institutions. Bogle, a 6-4, 325-pound offensive tackle, started in every game since his freshman season at UNH and was named the MVP of the 2003 Division II All-Star game in Kingsville, TX. In April, Bogle signed a contract with the NFL's San Diego Chargers.

SEVEN CHARGERS NAMED TO INDEPENDENT SQUAD

Seven University of New Haven football players were selected to the 2002 Division II Independent Football Alliance (IFA) All-Alliance team, announced today. Senior wide receiver **Matt Marcks** and offensive lineman **Phil Bogle** were named to the IFA All-Alliance First Team Offense while freshman kickoff and punt returner **Kevin Nelson** earned First Team Return Specialist honors. Marcks led the Chargers with 919 yards receiving and seven touchdowns and finished the regular season ranked tenth in Division II with 6.6 receptions per game (66 total).

He finished his career ranked fifth all-time in school history with 2,182 yards receiving. Marcks set a school record with 286 yards receiving against Western Washington, the second-most by a player in the nation. Nelson led the Chargers with a 24.3 kickoff return average including a long of 58 yards and also led UNH with 12.4 yards per punt return. He returned two punts for touchdowns including a 66-yarder against UMass-Lowell and a 76 yard touchdown return against Western Washington.

Defensively, senior defensive lineman **Matt Milone** was named to the All-Alliance Second Team along with senior linebacker **Alston Sajery** and junior cornerback **Jamar Williams**. Milone missed four games with an injury and finished the season with 31 tackles including nine for a loss and two sacks. Sajery led the Chargers with 55 tackles and a pair of blocked kicks. Williams finished the year with 31 tackles and a team-high eight pass deflections to go with his two interceptions.

Earning All-Alliance Honorable Mention was junior quarterback **Rob D'Innocenzio**. D'Innocenzio started in all ten games for the Chargers, finishing with 2,180 yards passing and 17 touchdowns. He averaged 218 yards passing per game and set a school record with 501 yards passing against Western Washington.

Quincy University's running back **Levar Ammons** was named IFA Offensive Player of the Year with Tiffin University's **Bobby Petras** named IFA Defensive Player of the Year. UC Davis Head Coach **Bob Biggs** was voted on by the IFA coaches as the 2002 Coach of the Year.

D'INNOCENZIO EARNS WEEKLY NEW ENGLAND HONOR -

Quarterback **Rob D'Innocenzio** was selected as the New England Sports Writers Division II Player of the Week (Gold Helmet Award) for his performance against Carson-Newman on Sept. 14. D'Innocenzio completed 29-of-47 passes for a then-career-high 349 yards in a 36-31 loss to the fifth-ranked Eagles in West Haven, CT.

RECORDS FALL IN UNH WIN VS. WESTERN WASHINGTON -

UNH quarterback **Rob D'Innocenzio** set a school record with 501 yards passing in the Chargers' win over Western Washington on Nov. 2. Teammate **Matt Marcks** caught 10 passes for a school-record 286 yards as the Chargers racked up a total of 690 yards of total offense.

CHARGERS SAW SECOND TOUGHEST SCHEDULE IN NATION IN 2002 -

The 2002 UNH football team faced six ranked opponents during the season, including four that qualified for the NCAA Division II playoffs. The combined record for 2002 opponents was 82-35 (.700).

WEST CHESTER, PA - The Dave Patenaude era kicked off in fine fashion as the University of New Haven football team won its season opener 28-19 at West Chester University before 4,128 at John A. Farrell Stadium in a special Thursday night game. Thanks to a strong first half start offensively, the Chargers jumped out to an early lead and never looked back.

After forcing West Chester to punt on its first drive of the game, New Haven took a 6-0 lead on a 26-yard touchdown pass from Rob D'Innocenzio to Jeremy Armendariz at the 12:43 mark of the first quarter.

The Golden Rams came right back on their next drive with a 68-yard touchdown run by Mike Eckmeyer to tie the game at 6-6. But UNH's Lars Anderson drilled a 37-yard field goal with 8:54 to go in the first quarter to give UNH a 9-6 lead. UNH would continue to control the tempo of the game offensively as Dawud Hanif scored on a one-year run with 2:04 to go in the first quarter to make it 15-6.

After a Hanif 42-yard run up the middle to the West Chester one-yard line at the end of the first quarter, New Haven would score on the first play of the second quarter as D'Innocenzio bulled his way into the end zone to give the Chargers a 21-6 lead. West Chester then answered with a 5-yard touchdown pass from Bob Findora to Cory DeForest to cut the lead to 21-13. UNH would add another score just before the half as D'Innocenzio would find receiver Matt Marcks in the back of the end zone with 35 seconds left in the half to take a 28-13 lead into the lockerroom.

In the second half, UNH would let the defense take over, allowing West Chester just one score in holding the Golden Rams to just 63 yards rushing and 246 yards of total offense in the game. The Charger defense was all over WCU quarterback Bob Findora all night, sacking the sophomore signal caller five times and holding him to minus 35 yards rushing.

Hanif led the Chargers with 108 yards on 18 carries and a touchdown for UNH while D'Innocenzio completed 10-of-20 passes for 91 yards and two touchdowns.

WEST HAVEN, CT - Carson-Newman senior tailback Reggie Alexis rushed for 149 yards on 15 carries to lead lead the fifth-ranked visiting Eagles to a 36-31 win over the University of New Haven before 1,026 at Dodds Stadium. With the win, Carson-Newman improved to 3-0 on the season while UNH dropped to 1-1. New Haven led 3-0 following a 27- yard field goal by Lars Anderson with 11:55 left in the first quarter but the Eagles would score 29 unanswered points to take a 29-3 lead into the locker room.

Just when it looked like Carson-Newman would roll to an easy victory, the Chargers came out of the locker room a different team as UNH. After just 67 yards passing in the first half, amassed 282 yards through the air in the second half. Behind the passing of quarterback Rob D'Innocenzio, UNH closed to within 29-17 on a pair of touchdown passes from D'Innocenzio to Matt Marcks for 26 yards and Osric Bittle for 21 yards midway through the third quarter.

Dawud Hanif would bring UNH to within 29-24 on a six-yard touchdown run with 20 seconds left in the third quarter. INDIANA, PA - Special teams play can be the difference in a game, even in the early stages of a contest. Indiana University (PA) would use a blocked UNH field goal attempt and extra point attempt and numerous Charger turnovers to roll to a 42-6 win over UNH.

The Chargers had no problem driving down the field against the IUP defense on its opening drive. But Lars Anderson's 37-yard field goal attempt was blocked by IUP's Kairi Cooper, keeping the game scoreless early.

Forcing IUP to punt once again, the Chargers would eventually get on the board as quarterback Rob D'Innocenzio hit freshman Devin Robinson for a 19-yard touchdown pass in the back of the end zone to give the Chargers a 6-0 lead with 6:51 left in the first. But it was Cooper again who managed to once again get in the backfield and block Anderson's extra-point attempt.

IUP would finally answer in the second quarter, despite starting their first scoring drive from their own one-yard line. During the drive, the Chargers almost caught a break as UNH defensive lineman Donta Jenkins forced a fumble at midfield, but UNH couldn't come away with the ball as IUP would recover.

On the Chargers' next possession, IUP defensive end Adam Kucenic hit D'Innocenzio from behind forcing a fumble and giving IUP the ball back on the UNH 16-yard line. One play later, the Indians were in the end zone again as Eyerman hit Carmelo Ocasio across the middle to make it 14-6. Trailing 28-6 at the half, things didn't get much better in the second half as UNH's best scoring opportunity was thwarted as D'Innocenzio was intercepted at the IUP one yard line by Kris Griffin midway through the third.

BELLINGHAM, WA - It may have taken a trip from one coast to the other, but the University of New Haven football team put together a solid effort on both sides of the ball as the Chargers dominated regionally-ranked Western Washington 47-21, thanks in part to a school-record 501 yards passing performance from junior quarterback Rob D'Innocenzio.

Western Washington entered the game with a seven-game win streak at Civic Stadium and it looked like the Vikings would make it eight in-a-row early by jumping out to a quick 14-3 lead after scoring on their first two possessions. But the Chargers responded with a seven yard touchdown pass from Rob D'Innocenzio to Devin Robinson to cut the lead to 14-10.

On the ensuing kickoff, Western Washington's Martez Johnson returned the ball to midfield but UNH kicker Lars Anderson forced Johnson to fumble and UNH would recover on its own 45. A 22-yard field goal by Anderson made the score 14-13. After a Steve Nichols touchdown, the Chargers would add two quick scores to take a 27-21 and would not look back as the UNH defense put the clamp down on the Vikings vaunted offense, holding WWU to just 85 yards rushing on the day.

Senior receiver Matt Marcks, who burned the Vikings for 213 yards in 2001, finished with 10 catches for 286 yards including a 64-yard touchdown to put the game away in the fourth quarter. On the day, Marcks moved into third all-time in career receiving yards at UNH with 2,382 yards.

Tailback Maikel Mehu had his second consecutive 100-yard rushing game with 132 yards on 27 carries including one touchdown. St. Cloud, MN — UNH had its hands full against No. 21 St. Cloud State as the host Huskies avenged a loss to the Chargers in 2001 with a convincing 51-7 win before 3,163 at Sekle Field. With the loss, UNH fell to 4-5 on the season while St. Cloud State improved to 8-2.

St. Cloud jumped out to a quick 13-0 first quarter lead but UNH would cut the lead to 13-7 after Rob D'Innocenzio's 1 yard touchdown run up the middle with just 21 seconds left in the first quarter. The score capped a 10-play, 65-yard drive that was keyed by a 38 yard pass play to wide receiver Osric Bittle on the team's first possession of the drive.

After a holding penalty on the first play of the ensuing possession, SCSU quarterback Keith Heckendor connected with Matt Birkel for an 88-yard touchdown pass to make it 20-7 and the Huskies never looked back.

The Chargers were held to minus 29 yards rushing but D'Innocenzio did complete 19 of 29 passes for 187 yards before he was replaced by freshman Joe DiMeglio in the fourth quarter. WEST HAVEN, CT - Quarterback Mark Passard completed 18 of 38 passes for 233 yards to lead the seventh-ranked University of Northern Colorado to an 18-7 win over the University of New Haven at a rain-soaked Dodds Stadium. UNH ended the season with a 4-6 record. UNH was held to minus 16 yards rushing on the afternoon while the Bears generated 322 yards of total offense as they improved to 3-0 all-time against UNH.

After a scoreless first quarter, UNC got on the board early in the second Passard connected with Justin White for a five-yard touchdown pass at 12:14 of the second quarter. The extra point attempt was blocked by the Chargers. Running back Adam Matthews would score on a five yard touchdown run at 1:56 while kicker Mike Swim hit a 24-yard field goal as the first half time expired to give the visitors a 15-0 halftime lead.

After a Swim 23-yard field goal midway through the third, the Chargers finally got on the board as Rob D'Innocenzio found senior receiver Matt Marcks in the back of the end zone for a 14-yard touchdown to make it 18-7.

Senior free safety Ronaldo Attimy helped set up the score by intercepting Passard at the UNH 31-yard line and returning it 54 yards to the Northern Colorado 15.

Maikel Mehu led the Chargers with eight receptions for 31 yards while Marcks had four catches for 22 yards. UNH senior Dawud Hanif finished his career ranked fourth all-time with 2,129 career yards while Matt Marcks concluded his career fifth all-time in school history with 2,182 yards.

Harlon Hill Trophy

Honoring the Nation's Best Player

The Harlon Hill Trophy is an award that is given annually to the player selected as the best in Division II by the sports information directors at the 120-plus Division II schools which play football, and is presented during the week of the Division II championship game. The award is named for former Florence State (now Univ. of North Alabama) receiving great Harlon Hill.

In 1993, UNH's Roger Graham was named the winner of the Harlon Hill Trophy after guiding the team after winning the Division II scoring title with 13.6 points per game and second nationally with 168.7 yards rushing per game that season. He was second nationally in all-purpose yards with 231.9 per game and seventh in kickoff return average with 30.4 yards per kickoff return. He was a two-time New England Gold Helmet winner and earned two ECAC Player of the Week honors. He rushed for over 100 yards in all 10 games including two, 200-yard games.

Chargers In the NCAA Championships

1992

November 21, 1992 - New Haven 38, West Chester 26

In its first ever NCAA playoff game, New Haven defeated host West Chester to advance to the national quarterfinals. The Chargers opened the scoring with two first quarter touchdown passes from Ken Suhl. New Haven took control of the game with two TDs in the third quarter, raising its lead to 32-14, before West Chester came right back with two TDs of its own to make the score 32-26. New Haven ended any comeback thoughts when Roger Graham broke through for a 45-yard TD run. Graham finished with 222 yards and one TD while Suhl completed 19 of 27 passes for 350 yards and three TDs. Tony Willis caught eight passes for 130 yards while Max Joyner-Brown had four catches for 95 yards and two TDs.

November 28, 1992 - New Haven 35, Ferris State 13

New Haven used a 21-point third quarter to take control en route to a 35-13 victory over Ferris State. New Haven opened the scoring when Roger Graham galloped 52 yards on his first carry of the game. Two Ferris State field goals cut the lead to 7-6 at halftime. A.J. Livingston and John Raba each rushed for a score while Tony Willis tossed a 53-yard scoring strike to Joe Davis off a reverse option play for the third TD. Willis grabbed a TD of his own when quarterback Ken Suhl tossed a NCAA playoff record 99-yard TD pass in the fourth quarter. Suhl finished with 14-25 for 256 yards. Willis caught four of those passes for 127 yards and a TD. Graham rushed for 118 yards and a TD.

December 5, 1992 - Jacksonville St. 46, New Haven 35

New Haven lost in the semifinals to eventual national champion Jacksonville State. Jacksonville State grabbed a 21-0 lead in the second quarter highlighted by an 82-yard punt return and a 90-yard TD reception by Danny Lee. UNH battled back to make the score 21-14 at halftime as Max Joyner-Brown caught a 13-yard scoring strike and Roger Graham ran 11 yards for a TD. New Haven tied the game early in the fourth quarter on Joyner-Brown's second TD catch. Lee regained the lead for Jacksonville State but the extra point failed. Graham ran nine yards for his second TD and the extra point split the uprights, giving UNH its first lead of the game, 35-34. Lee ran 39 yards for his fourth TD of the game, putting Jax State ahead 41-35. New Haven reached inside the JSU 35-yard line before being stopped on a fourth and one. Suhl was 23 of 36 for 248 yards and three TDs while Graham gained 191 yards and scored two TDs. Willis secured his third straight 100-yard game, catching 11 passes for 110 yards and a TD.

1993

November 20, 1993 - New Haven 48, Edinboro 28

The Chargers took control of the game early and never led by less than seven points. New Haven held a 14-0 lead after the first period as Joe Davis caught a 15-yard TD pass from Jim Weir while Roger Graham added a three-yard run. Edinboro sandwiched two TDs around Weir's four-yard TD run in the second quarter, making the score 21-14 at halftime. The Chargers controlled the third quarter by scoring two more TDs, a two-yard dive by Graham and a 32-yard TD reception by Tony Willis, raising the advantage to 34-14. Graham finished with 215 yards and two TDs while A.J. Livingston gained 116 yards on 18 carries, the first time UNH had two 100-yard rushers in a playoff game. Weir was 15-30, 184 yards, 3TDs.

November 27, 1993 - Indiana, Pa. 38, New Haven 35

New Haven fell behind when Indiana scored a touchdown with 8:00 remaining in the first quarter. The Chargers answered with two first quarter scores of its own as Roger Graham scored from five yards and 14 yards, giving UNH a 14-7 lead. Graham raised the lead to 21-7 when he scored from 14 yards again, before IUP cut the lead to 21-14 at

halftime. UNH's A.J. Livingston tallied the fourth rushing TD against the Indians, raising the advantage to 28-14. However, Indiana scored 24 unanswered points.

New Haven pulled to within three points, 38-35, when Livingston scored on a 19-yard run at the 3:59 mark. But, the Indians kept the ball for the rest of the game to seal the win. Graham gained 173 yards and scored three TDs in the game while Livingston added 105 yards and two TDs. Jim Weir completed 16 of 35 passes for 230 yards, but no touchdowns.



1995

November 18, 1995 - New Haven 27, Edinboro 12

Edinboro scored on its first possession of the game, taking a 6-0 lead on a one-yard dive by Gerald Thompson. New Haven cut the lead in half on Gene Adair's 37-yard field goal near the end of the first quarter. Edinboro doubled its scoring total when Keith Cushenberry grabbed the ball away from receiver Bobby Barnette and raced 31 yards for a touchdown with 2:34 left in the half, giving the Scots a 12-3 lead at halftime. New Haven answered with a 47-yard FG on its first possession of the second half. With under a minute left in the third quarter, Ron Jenkins dashed seven yards for a touchdown giving the Chargers the lead 13-12. Jenkins and Dave Menard each added a touchdown in the fourth quarter to complete the scoring, giving UNH its third NCAA first round victory in three tries. Jenkins finished with 150 yards on 30 carries with two TDs while Jesse Showerda completed 19 of 32 passes for 229 yards.

November 25, 1995 - Ferris State 17, New Haven 9

The only stats that would indicate that New Haven lost this game would be the five turnovers, three fumbles and two interceptions. All the other statistics favored New Haven including time of possession (36:02), total yards (420 yards) and total plays (90). However, the most important stat favored the home team, a 17-9 final score.

Ferris State opened the scoring with a 22-yard field goal by Jason Lipke. The Bulldogs boosted their lead on Chris Pulliams three-yard run, only the fourth rushing touchdown surrendered by the UNH defense in 12 games. Benny Roe's 23-yard TD run in the third quarter gave the home team a 17-0 lead before New Haven finally lit its side of the scoreboard on Ron Jenkins five-yard run with 9:00 remaining. Gene Adair brought the team to within one score with a 25-yard field goal, making the score 17-9. New Haven had the ball inside the Ferris 20-yard line in the final 2:00 but failed on a fourth-down attempt, securing the win for Ferris State.

1997

November 22, 1997 - New Haven 47, Glensville State 7

The Chargers dominated play in their first playoff appearance since 1995. New Haven led 27-0 at the half on touchdown receptions from Adam Roman and Ketric Barnes and a pair of touchdown runs from quarterback Cazzie Kosciulek. The lead went to 34-0 after Bill Woods caught a 29-yard touchdown pass from Kosciulek off a fake field goal.

Glensville State finally got on the board at 34-7 after a 68-yard touchdown pass to running back Byron Stevenson. Glensville State quarterback Wilkie Perez entered the game as the leading passer in Division II. The Chargers limited Perez to one touchdown, while intercepting two passes. Don Highsmith ran for a career-high 212 yards on 32 carries as the Chargers racked up 271 yards rushing. UNH's defense recovered two fumbles and intercepted two passes.

Chargers In the NCAA Championship

November 29, 1997 - New Haven 49, Slippery Rock 21

The second-ranked Chargers defeated No. 7 Slippery Rock 49-21 to advance to the semifinals for only the second time in school history. UNH amassed 523 yards of total offense as wide receiver Elvert Eden caught seven passes for 205 yards and three touchdowns. Cazzie Kosciolk completed 16 of 30 passes for 333 yards and four touchdowns, while Don Highsmith ran for 134 yards on 29 carries. Highsmith was the first running back this season to rush for over 100 yards against Slippery Rock.

December 6, 1997 - New Haven 27, UC Davis 25

The No.2 ranked University of New Haven football team defeated UC Davis 27-25 in the NCAA Division II national semifinals in front of 4,712 at the Yale Bowl. It was the first semifinal win for New Haven. "This is the greatest win in UNH history," head coach Tony Sparano said.

Davis took a 3-0 lead on a Ray Hill 31-yard field goal just 3:48 into the game. New Haven's Adam Roman, a junior wide receiver from Laguna Hills, Calif., scored the next three touchdowns to give the Chargers a 21-3 lead. Roman, who finished the day with six catches for 96 yards, scored on a reception of eight and 65 yards, then returned a punt 82 yards for his third touchdown. Davis (9-5) dominated the statistics, led by junior quarterback Kevin Daft who completed 43 of 64 passes for 468 yards (all school and DII playoff records) and three touchdowns. The Aggies totaled 575 yards of total offense, but committed four turnovers.

With :23 left in the game, Daft completed a 1-yard pass to Wes Terrell on a 4th and two. Terrell was stopped just short of the first down by Dennis Burney and Jason Pacourek (Sr., Yorba Linda, Calif.).

New Haven quarterback Cazzie Kosciolk completed 11 of 26 passes for 161 yards and two touchdowns. Running back Don Highsmith rushed

for 105 yards on 20 carries and a touchdown. It was the fifth straight game Highsmith rushed for 100 yards or more.



December 13, 1997 - Northern Colorado 51, New Haven 0

UNH was the first school from Connecticut to play in a college football title game and was the smallest school enrollment wise to ever play for the DII football title.

New Haven won the coin toss and elected to kick off. The Chargers stopped Northern Colorado on their first three plays, setting up a 4th and 2 from the UNC 36. Dirk Johnson faked a punt and ran 39 yards. Two plays later, Corte McGuffey connected with Dillon Micus on a 20-yard touchdown pass.

It was only the second time all season that an opponent had scored first against New Haven. Northern Colorado sacked Cazzie Kosciolk seven times, the most sacks UNH had allowed all season. New Haven also lost three fumbles, the most it had lost all season.

University of New Haven Football Hall of Fame

Anthony Mortali • Linebacker (1973-1976)

Tony Mortali was the type of player that every coach would want on his squad. He was hard working willing and able to give the team his all. An integral part of the football team's first ever varsity win, 13-7 in 1975 vs. Curry College, the linebacker/offensive guard was one of the unsung heroes of the sports first few years of varsity status. His efforts on the gridiron were rewarded though, as he captained the team for two seasons, including the year the UNH team notched its first victory. That same season, Tony was named All New England Football Conference team.

Inducted 1987

Rick Racioppi • Linebacker (1981-84)

Rick Racioppi is considered to be one of the finest linebackers to wear a Charger uniform. The linebacker averaged 12.3 tackles per game during his sophomore season and 9.5 tackles per contest over his career. He surpassed 100 tackles in three different seasons, highlighted by a career-high 123 stops in 1982. Racioppi never missed a game during his four-year stay, playing in all 40 UNH contests. When he graduated, Racioppi held the single season and career records for both recovered fumbles and total tackles. He was named to the All-New England team in 1983, one of only three Chargers to earn those honors that season. He ended his career with 379 total tackles, including 210 solo stops, and four sacks.

Inducted 1992

Stephen DiMugno • Defensive Back (1971-74)

Stephen DiMugno was a true pioneer for the University of New Haven football program. He joined the team before football was a varsity sport and earned All-Eastern Collegiate Club Football Conference honors as a defensive back. The 1973 roster listed DiMugno as a defensive back but he also spent time as a running back and as a punt returner. He gained 75 yards on 24 carries in his first start as a running back, the school's best single game performance at the time. He finished second in scoring, third in rushing and was considered to be one of the best defensive players for the 1973 season. In 1974, DiMugno received a second term as captain and led the team in both interceptions and punt returns.

Inducted 1993

Harry Boatwain • Offensive Line (1987-90)

Harry Boatwain, of the former XFL, helped his team post a 30-10 overall record and accumulate more than 13,000 total yards and more than 1,200 points during his career. He earned All-New England first team honors in 1989 and 1990 as well as receiving All-ECAC honors as a senior. Boatwain capped his collegiate career with a spot on the Associated Press Small College All-America team. Boatwain became the highest draft pick from the University of New Haven when the San Francisco 49ers selected him in the fifth round of the 1991 NFL Draft. Boatwain was a member of the 1994 Super Bowl Championship team before signing with the Carolina Panthers.

Inducted 1995

Chris Palmer • Head Coach (1986-87)

Currently the offensive coordinator of the Houston Texans, Palmer was the former head coach of the Cleveland Browns. Palmer spent two seasons at the University of New Haven. He helped the program gain its first ever national ranking finishing the 1986 campaign with an 8-2 record and a No. 18 placement in the national poll. Palmer watched the Blue and Gold improve on that ranking by concluding the 1987 season with an 8-2 slate and a No. 16 national placement. Palmer left the University of New Haven following the 1987 campaign to accept the head coaching position at Boston University. Palmer returned to the professional ranks as a coach with the Houston Oilers and New England Patriots. He was a member of the 1997 New England Patriots which captured the American Football Conference title and advanced to the Super Bowl.

Inducted 1997

Tony Sparano • Center/Head Coach (1978-81/1994-98)

Tony Sparano enters the Hall of Fame both as a player and as one of the most successful head coaches in school history. He was a member of the 1979 team that posted the first undefeated record in school history (8-0-1). As a head coach, Sparano posted a 41-14-1 record in five seasons at the helm of the Chargers. The highlight of Sparano's five seasons was a 12-2 record in 1997 and a trip to the 1997 National Championship game in Florence, Alabama. Sparano posted a 4-2 record in NCAA Playoff competition. Sparano's .732 winning percentage is third all-time among New Haven head coaches.

Inducted 1999

Miles McPherson • Defensive Back (1978-81)

One of the finest defensive backs to play at New Haven, Miles McPherson recorded impressive numbers during his four year career. At one time he held 15 school records and still holds all the interception records - in a game (4), in a season (7), which he accomplished twice, and in a career (22). He was named to the All New England Conference First Team, New England Football Writers' Association Division II-III team, Boston Herald III team. McPherson became the first Charger to be drafted into the National Football League. He was taken as a 10th round pick by the Los Angeles Rams. He signed with the San Diego Chargers where he played from 1982 to 1985.

Inducted 1989

Erik Lesinski • Linebacker (1984-87)

Erik Lesinski can be rated as one of the best all-around players in New Haven football history. His career totals are among the best in school history, including 422 total tackles, 242 solo tackles and seven sacks. He was named to the All-New England and All-Eastern College Athletic Conference teams in 1986 and 1987. The linebacker became the third UNH football player to receive a Kodak All-America berth, earning the honor in his senior season, and was also a All-America honorable mention as a junior. In 1987, Lesinski registered 10 or more tackles in every contest with his best game of 21 tackles coming against Springfield.

Inducted 1992

Paul Bowman • Offensive Lineman (1975-78)

Paul Bowman played an instrumental part in the Chargers early success. He was elected a tri-captain of the 1978 team which posted a 6-3 record, the first winning record in the school's young history. Bowman's playing style and skills grabbed the attention of both players and coaches despite playing a position which rarely received recognition. His play on the offensive line helped the offense score 188 points, the highest production in school history to that point which allowed the squad to post a 5-0 start. During his career, Bowman played a major role in the Charger's success as the team won 12 games, scored 362 points and gained over 7,800 total yards, statistics no other class could claim.

Inducted 1993

Brian Nugent • Linebacker (1976-79)

Brian Nugent was a four-year starter for the Chargers, spending all four seasons as a linebacker. Nugent played both on offense and defense as a rookie before settling in as a full-time linebacker during his final three years. Nugent earned All-New England Football Conference honors three times and received a spot on the United Press International's College Division All-New England Football team as a senior. In his senior season, Nugent was one of the football team's tri-captains. Nugent's teammates realized his contribution to the team by giving the linebacker back-to-back most valuable player honors. The Charger Bulletin, the student newspaper, selected Nugent as the school's Male Athlete of the Year.

Inducted 1996

Lionel Drew Maul • Defensive Back (1983-86)

Maul received All-New England honors in each of his final three years with the Chargers program. The sprinter was a member of the 1600 meter relay team which participated in the 1985 NCAA indoor track and field championships. He was also a finalist in the 55 meters during the 1986 IC4A championships. Maul earned the University's Track and Field most valuable athlete award in 1985 and 1986 in addition to his selection as the University's athlete of the year in his senior season. Maul also played football during his four-year stay, earning the New Haven Gridiron Club's most outstanding player award in 1983. Maul was later drafted by the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL.

Inducted 1997

Roger Graham • Running Back (1991-1994)

Graham captured the 1993 Harlon Hill Trophy. He was a three-time All-American and a two-time Eastern College Athletic Conference Player of the Year. Named the *Sports Illustrated* College Player of the Week seven times during his career. He was a three-team First-Team All-New England, capturing the All-New England Rookie of the Year honor in 1991. Graham holds New Haven's game, season and career record for most points and offensive touchdowns. The NCAA individual statistical champion in scoring (13.8 pts/game) and rushing (171.1 yds/game).

Inducted 2000

Dave Haubner • Offensive Lineman (1982-1985)

Dave Haubner starred as a four-year offensive guard at UNH, helping the team post its first winning season as a Division II program in 1985. He became the first New Haven football player to earn Kodak All-America honors and was also the first to garner a spot on two All-America teams in the same season. He received Kodak and Associated Press Small College All-America honors as a senior. Haubner opened the door for other football players as 21 have been named All-Americans since 1985. In addition to those honors, Haubner was also an All-ECAC and All-New England lineman in both 1984 and 1985. Behind his play, the New Haven offense gained better than 10,000 yards and scored more than 625 points. Haubner protected a quarterback, Paul Kelly, who threw for 4,732 career yards, placing fifth in school history. During the 1985 season Haubner helped his team to two of the greatest wins in New Haven history. The Chargers defeated nationally ranked Towson State and secured their first win over cross city rival Southern Connecticut.

Inducted 2002

Intercollegiate athletics plays an important role in the overall mission of the University of New Haven. It provides the University with a valuable and extensive outreach program. Through intercollegiate athletics, UNH is able to publicize and promote its ideals and academic programs to the outside world. By competing successfully, and doing so with character and integrity, UNH's athletics teams serve to enhance the University's visibility and public image.

ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS

- In 1997, the UNH football team played for the Division II National Championship, becoming the only football team in the state of Connecticut to ever compete for a national title and the smallest school in terms of enrollment to compete for an NCAA championship.
- The UNH women's volleyball has reached the NCAA Sweet 16, sixteen times since 1983. Women's volleyball has also reached the NCAA Elite 8, ten times.
- UNH tailback Roger Graham won the 1993 Harlon Hill Trophy as the top Division II football player in the country.
- Baseball has consistently been ranked as one of the winningest Division II programs in NCAA history with coach Frank Vieira listed as one of the all-time winningest coaches with over 1,000 career victories. Baseball has appeared in 17 baseball College World Series' and 30 baseball Regional Tournaments.
- Baseball has produced nine major leaguers, and has an all-time record 1054-283
- Women's basketball won the NCAA Division II National Championship in 1987.
- Football has appeared in four NCAA championship playoffs
- Men's soccer reached the NCAA finals in 1976 and finished third in 1977.
