



Founded in 1948 as Francis T. Nicholls Junior College, Nicholls State University brings together the diverse cultures and heritage found in South Central Louisiana.

In 1970, Nicholls State was designated a university by an act of the Louisiana Legislature. The university was established to meet the higher education needs of Louisianians and has evolved during the past five decades into a center for learning.

The quality of the university's academic programs is assured through numerous national-accrediting organizations. Nicholls State University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Today, the campus occupies 210 acres of land formerly part of historic Acadia Plantation on the eastern limits of the city of Thibodaux. The campus, which fronts Bayou Lafourche, is about 50 miles southwest of New Orleans. Nicholls State University offers more than 85 two-year, four-year and graduate level programs through five academic colleges - Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, the Chef John Folse Culinary Institute, Education and Life Sciences and Technology.

Nicholls State University was the first university in the state to offer seven-on, seven-off programs for those employed in the offshore oil industry.

Nicholls is also the first public university in the state of Louisiana to undertake a strategic planning project. The project, which was funded entirely by private donations, helped prepare Nicholls for the 21st century.

The University's Mission

Nicholls State University provides a unique blend of excellent academic programs to meet the needs of Louisiana and beyond. The university cultivates productive, responsible, engaged citizens in a personalized, culturally rich and dynamic learning environment through quality teaching, research, and service.

Other facts about Nicholls

- The Chef John Folse Culinary Institute offers both a Bachelor of Science Degree and an Associate of Science Degree in Culinary Arts. The Institute was the first of its kind in the United States to offer a Bachelor of Science Degree in Culinary Arts. These degree programs provide an opportunity for students to develop in-depth knowledge of the culinary field of study that is strengthened and supported by a foundation of general learning.
- The Louisiana Center for Women and Government at Nicholls State University was established in 1990 to encourage the future leadership of women by preparing them for public service through nonpartisan education,



research and training programs. Other centers of excellence at Nicholls State University include the Center for the Study of Dyslexia, the Small Business Development Center and the Center for Traditional Louisiana Boatbuilding.

- The Ellender Memorial Library at Nicholls State University houses more than 220,000 volumes, more than 3,000 journal titles and catalogues about 255,000 federal and state documents. It provides study areas for 1,500 patrons.
- The Student Programming Association at Nicholls State University has played host to various entertainers including Travis Tritt, Third Eye Blind and Everclear. In addition to presenting performers each semester, the SPA sponsors Crawfish Day, an annual event that draws more than 2,500 students into John L. Guidry Stadium.

Thibodaux

Retaining its Southern charm and Cajun hospitality, Thibodaux has developed into a modern, progressive community where yesterday welcomes tomorrow.

Founded in 1820 on Bayou Lafourche, Thibodaux is graced by moss-laden oaks, plantation homes and lush fields of sugar cane. The word "lafourche" means fork as the bayou originally forked off the Mississippi River some 30 miles upstream from Thibodaux.

The Lafourche Parish Courthouse in downtown Thibodaux, the Edward Douglas White Home and Laurel Valley Plantation are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Elkins Hall on the

Nicholls State University campus was recently added to the Register. Renovated 19th century homes front Canal Boulevard and New Orleans-style wrought iron traces downtown balconies.

The Wetlands Acadian Cultural Center located in Thibodaux is one of three Acadian Cultural Centers of the Jean Lafitte National Historical Park and Preserve in Louisiana that features many colorful aspects of Cajun life.

Known as the "Gateway to Bayou Country," Thibodaux is minutes away from the best in outdoor recreation.

Francis Tillou Nicholls

Francis Redding Tillou Nicholls was an esteemed figure in the Confederate Army, a Donaldsonville native, and the namesake of Nicholls State University.

Nicholls was born in Donaldsonville on Aug. 30, 1834. He graduated from West Point in 1855 and practiced law for a while. While serving in the Civil War he rose to the rank of brigadier general. After losing his left arm and leg and living as a prisoner of war, he returned home. He practiced law in Napoleonville for a while and was then nominated for governor in 1876 by the Louisiana State Democratic Party. He was elected during Reconstruction.

Nicholls went on to serve a second term as governor, from 1888 to 1892 and greatly opposed the corrupt Louisiana Lottery.

Following his time spent in as governor, he was named chief justice of the Louisiana Supreme Court. Nicholls retired to his home in Thibodaux in 1911 and died in 1912. He is buried in the St. John's Episcopal Church Cemetery in Thibodaux.



STEPHEN T. HULBERT

President

Dr. Stephen T. Hulbert, who assumed the Presidency of Nicholls State University on July 1, 2003, is entering his ninth year as the president of Nicholls State University. Dr. Hulbert came to Louisiana from Montana where he had served as the Chancellor of The University of Montana – Western from 1999 to June 2003. Before assuming the Western chancellorship, Dr. Hulbert served as the Commissioner of Higher Education for the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations as well as the Chief Executive Officer of the Rhode Island Board of Governors for Higher Education.

President Hulbert has over 30 years of senior administrative experience in higher education in Pennsylvania, Colorado, Rhode Island, Montana and Louisiana. He has served on several athletic governing boards including the Council of Presidents of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and the Council of Presidents of the Frontier Athletic Conference. In the latter instance he was the Council Chair from 2000 through 2003.

Dr. Hulbert is married to Rebecca Kay Hulbert and they are the parents of one son, Scott Wesley, an attorney in Phoenix, Arizona.

ROB BERNARDI

Athletic Director



Rob Bernardi enters his twelfth season as director of athletics at Nicholls State University, making him the second-longest tenured athletics director in the school's history behind the legendary Ray Didier. Stability, creativity, integrity and progress are the words that best describe Bernardi's tenure at Nicholls.

Improved facilities and added pride are not the only areas where Bernardi has brought about changes to the athletic program. Improving graduation rates and upgrading the academic services provided to Colonel athletes has been a goal of the department since Bernardi took over. The commitment to academics has begun to show positive results in the form of higher graduation rates and improved APR (Academic Progress Rates) scores. Colonel athletes are graduating at increasingly higher rates than ever before.

Bernardi is credited with bringing the Manning Passing Academy to Nicholls State University. The football camp, which features Archie, Peyton and Eli Manning, has brought national attention to the Thibodaux community. The nationally recognized football camp finished its sixth year on the Nicholls campus, MPA attracts nearly 1000 young athletes to Nicholls and has become a summer attraction for the community, and economic success for the local community.

Bernardi has been active within the NCAA governance process having served on numerous NCAA committees. Currently Rob Bernardi is a member of the NCAA Division I Leadership Council. In the past he has served on the NCAA Interpretations Committee and the Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet.

Prior to coming to Nicholls, Bernardi spent ten years in varying capacities at the New Orleans-based Sun Belt Conference. During the last three years of his stay, he was the league's associate commissioner, coordinating and implementing marketing and promotional efforts related to the conference. He also worked hand-in-hand with other conferences, covering such topics as development and corporate relations. His responsibilities also included coordinating the Sun Belt's voting position on all NCAA legislation.

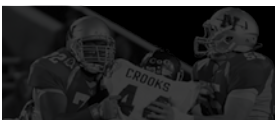
Prior to joining the Sun Belt Conference, Bernardi spent four years at the University of Arizona involved in athletics administration. While at Arizona, Bernardi worked under former NCAA president Cedric Dempsey, Dempsey was the athletics director at Arizona during the time.

Born and raised in Los Angeles, California, Bernardi was a graduate assistant football coach at both the University of Arizona and Oregon State. While at Oregon State, he earned a master's degree in higher education. He earned an undergraduate degree in public health from California State University, Northridge in 1983.

Rob and Linda Bernardi have two daughters Nadine (27), Jenna (16), and is the grandfather of Emma (6). Bernardi's brother, Gary, is also involved in collegiate athletics serving as an assistant football coach at San Jose State.

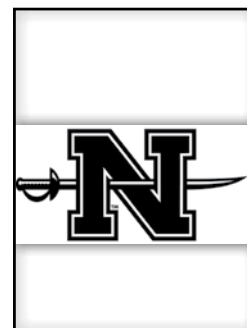

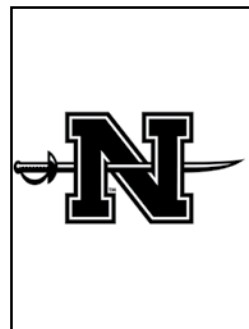

The Nicholls State University's Athletic Training Department provides comprehensive, state-of-the-art health care and wellness services as it pertains to the well-being of the student-athlete. The Staff is composed of five full-time and three graduate assistant athletic trainers who are nationally certified athletic trainers through the Board of Certification of the National Athletic Trainers' Association. Each member of the NSU Athletic Training Department will do his or her part to provide professional, first-class leadership and counseling necessary to prevent, manage,

and rehabilitate the student-athlete. NSU Athletic Training serves as a major intellectual and creative resource for NSU Athletics, develops interactive partnerships with allied health professionals, and participates in the exploration and development of the student-athlete's health and well-being.

Nicholls State University's Athletic Training Department also serves as a dynamic clinical learning experience for the institution's accredited Athletic Training curriculum. Currently there are approximately 25 athletic training students within the program. The NSU Athletic Training

Department strives to provide leadership and education for athletic training students through quality educational and clinical experiences.

The Vision of the Nicholls State University's Athletic Training Department is to become a nationally recognized athletic training program focusing on first-class, state-of-the-art health care services to the NSU Athletic Department, and a respected and prominent leader with the reputation of providing quality educational experiences to athletic training students.

John L. Guidry Stadium



John L. Guidry Stadium has been home to the Colonels football team since the school began playing the sport on the intercollegiate level in 1972. The facility is named in honor of former Galliano state representative John L. Guidry who was instrumental in the establishment of Francis T. Nicholls Junior College.

The stadium features a three-level press box on the west side. The second level houses an area for game management staff, radio and coaches' booths and a working press area that was established following a renovation project that was completed prior to the 1999 season. The president's suite and a 30-seat club level, which was also part of the 1999 press box renovation, is located on the third level. A photo deck is located on the roof. Just prior to the start of the 2010 season, a new scoreboard, complete with graphic animation features as well as a new sound system was installed. In 2012, the west entrance of the stadium was given a facelift which included a new elevator shaft and working elevator, entrance into the Colonel Club area and an ever-present illuminated Nicholls "N".

Adjacent to the elevator landing at ground level is the Colonels Club Room. Members use the building as a hospitality area before home games as well as for various university functions throughout the year.

Guidry Stadium is located adjacent to the Frank Barker Athletic Building, which houses the Nicholls football coaches' offices, locker rooms, the athletic training department and athletic staff. The Nicholls strength and conditioning facility and a 50-yard artificial turf field are located directly behind Barker Hall.

The stadium was officially dedicated on September 16, 1972 as Nicholls defeated Ouachita Baptist 12-7.

Hermon Grissom drilled a 37-yard field goal in the opening period for the first score in the stadium. Chris "Gator" Gardner caught a 27-yard pass from Lonnie Rogers for the first Colonel touchdown in the stadium as Nicholls came from behind to win.

The facility was originally referred to as Colonel Stadium but was renamed in Guidry's honor Sept. 15, 1973.

In 39 seasons, the Colonels have posted a 108-94-3 record in Guidry Stadium.

In 1975, Nicholls captured the Gulf South Conference championship with an 8-2 record, including a 6-0 mark at home. It is the only time Nicholls has gone undefeated at home. The 1996 Colonels capped the program's 25th anniversary season by going 5-1 in Guidry Stadium.

The five largest crowds to see the Colonels play in the stadium have come against intra-state rival Southern University, including a record 14,125 in the first Jaguar-Colonel game played in the stadium in 1981.

The stadium underwent an unexpected facelift during the 1992 season after suffering \$150,000 worth of damage during Hurricane Andrew.

The concrete facade between the third-floor glass and the roof was ripped away by strong winds during the storm and falling debris destroyed 52 chair back seats. Glass on the south side of the press box on both the second and third levels was also blown out.

Members of the media had a rare opportunity to enjoy the first three home games in an open-air press box while the stadium was in repair.

Guidry Stadium was originally constructed at a cost of nearly \$2 million.
