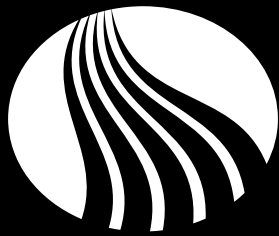

Dr. Townsley was inaugurated as the sixth president – and the first woman president – of Nichols College in 1998. Previously, she served as the College's dean of academic affairs.

As president, Dr. Townsley oversees a student body of more than 1,400 full-time and part-time students who are enrolled in Nichols' undergraduate, graduate and certificate programs, and an alumni body of more than 8,400. More than 96 percent of its students achieve gainful

employment in their field of study within six months of graduation. Under Townsley's leadership, Nichols is preparing for the new millennium through a master plan for the campus, building initiatives, and practically oriented programs. From 1987 until her appointment as academic dean at Nichols in 1997, Townsley was director of undergraduate and graduate management studies at St. Michael's College in Vermont.

Dr. Townsley earned an associate's degree from Northern Virginia Community College and a Bachelor of Science degree in marketing and management at American University in Washington, D.C.

Following graduation, she served as a marketing support representative at IBM, where she was named Marketing Support Representative of the Year. While completing a Master of Business Administration at George Washington University, she joined Booz, Allen & Hamilton as a senior consultant and project manager. In 1988, she was appointed visiting scholar in occupational safety and public health at the Harvard University School of Public Health. Townsley earned a Master of Arts degree in psychology, and a Ph.D. in organizational psychology from University of Vermont, where she focused her dissertation on "An Interdependent and Reciprocal Model for the Followership-Leadership Exchange."



Director of Athletics Charlyn Robert

Charlyn Robert was named Director of Athletics at Nichols College on November 9, 1998. A graduate of the State University of New York at Cortland with a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education and also a graduate of the University of Massachusetts - Amherst with a Master of Science Degree in Sport Management Administration, she was a four-year player and captain in field hockey and lacrosse in college.

Robert coached field hockey at Union College (NY) from 1983-96. She was named the New York Collegiate Female Coach of the Year in 1989.

Robert was named the 2008 ECAC Jostens Female Administrator of the Year. The ECAC Jostens Administrators of the Year awards are presented annually to administrators from ECAC member schools or conferences in recognition of outstanding or meritorious service to the ECAC.

Nichols earned the 2007-08 Worcester Cup, which is awarded annually to the most successful varsity athletics program in Worcester County by the *Worcester Telegram & Gazette*. The Bison had the highest combined varsity winning percentage (.473) among the eight other participating colleges with a combined overall record of 137-153-1 among 13 sports, not including the men's golf team's head-to-head record.

Robert has served as the NCAA Division III Field Hockey Chair. She currently is a member of the NCAA Division III Women's Lacrosse Championship Committee, the ECAC Field Hockey Committee, Chairperson for the Colleges of Worcester Consortium Directors of Athletics Committee as well as for The Commonwealth Coast Conference Women's Basketball Committee.



Head Coach Bill Carven

10th Season
Nichols '94



Carven is the sixth head coach in Nichols College football history since the school became a four-year institution in 1959. A 1994 alumnus of Nichols, Carven returns for his 10th season at the helm.

10th most improved team in the nation as it finished the year 5-4 overall. Carven's younger brother, quarterback Michael Carven, was named the Boyd Division Offensive Player of the Year. In eight years, Carven has coached 49 Conference All-Stars and two Golden Helmet Award Winners.

A four-year football and lacrosse player at Nichols, Carven was the quarterback for the Bison from 1990-93. He owns the school records for both the highest pass completion percentage in a season (56.6% in 1992) and a career (53.6%). He was an All-New England Honorable Mention and a Second-Team All-ECFC player in 1992. Carven captained the football team as well as the lacrosse team his senior year.

After receiving his degree in Psychology in 1994, Carven spent the next football season as an assistant coach at Xaverian Brothers High School in Westwood, MA. The Hawks proceeded to win the Massachusetts Division I Super Bowl Championship. In 1995, Carven moved on to Plymouth State College. He was the receivers coach on a team that posted a 9-1 record en route to winning the Freedom Football Conference and earning a NCAA playoff bid.

Carven returned to the Bison program in 1996, serving for two seasons as the quarterbacks and receivers coach. In 1998 he moved up to offensive coordinator and served as the team's recruiting coordinator before being named the head coach in 1999. In 2001, Carven was named Assistant Athletic Director in addition to his coaching duties at Nichols.



A 2002 inductee into the Nichols College Athletic Hall of Fame, Carven has compiled a career record of 44-41. After his arrival in 1999 in which he was the youngest head football coach in the NCAA, Carven had five straight winning seasons from 1999-2003. Carven's win streak was second only to the Bison teams of the 1970's which captured winning records for nine straight seasons.

In Carven's first season at the helm, the Bison went 6-3 and finished 5-3 in New England Football Conference play. The team ended the year as the 10th seed in the ECAC Division III New England Football Poll. Carven was named the Worcester Area Football Coach of the Year as he led Nichols to its first winning season since 1992, when Carven himself was the Bisons' starting quarterback.

Nichols saw increased success in Carven's second year as the Bison finished third in the Boyd Division of the NEFC with a 4-2 record and an overall record of 7-3, the programs most wins since 1992. The team received a bid to play in the ECAC Northeast Championship for the first time in school history as well that year.

In 2001, Carven led Nichols to unprecedented success as it went 5-0, won the Boyd Division and received an automatic bid in the NEFC Championship. It was the first time in two decades the football team advanced to post-season play. Nichols maintained winning records in both 2002 and 2003, giving Carven five straight winning seasons. 2004 marked the first year Carven

did not maintain a winning record as the Bison went 4-6 overall in a year of highs and lows. In 2005, several key injuries plagued Nichols throughout the year as it finished with a 0-9 record. In 2006, Nichols was named the

Assistant Head Coach Stephen Tirrell **Defensive Coordinator • Second Season • Plymouth State '89**

Steve Tirrell enters his second season as an assistant coach for the Bison after spending three seasons at UMass as defensive line and special teams coach from 2004-06, helping guide the Minutemen to the 2006 NCAA Division I-AA National Championship game. Prior to UMass, Tirrell spent four seasons under Don Brown at Northeastern University.

Tirrell also served as an assistant at Brown University for four seasons: he spent two years as the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator (1998-1999) on Phil Estes' staff, after serving under Mark Whipple for two seasons as assistant defensive line coach and special teams coordinator (1996-1997). He previously served as an assistant at his alma mater, Plymouth State College from 1989-1995. Tirrell is a 1989 graduate of Plymouth State.



Andrew Croteau **Defensive Backs** **Third Season** **UMass '05**

Croteau begins his third year with the Bison football program and his second year working with the defensive backs. In his first season at Nichols, he primarily worked with the running backs.

Prior to joining the Bison, Croteau served as the linebackers and strength and conditioning coach at Mass Maritime Academy in 2005. While a player at UMass, Croteau was a member of the 2003 Atlantic 10 Championship football team. In the spring of 2005, he worked an independent study at UMass as a personal trainer in Genetics and Muscle Hypertrophy Research.



Tony Case **Offensive Line** **First Season** **Adams State '03**

Case joins the Bison for his first year after spending two seasons as a graduate assistant at Chadron State College in Chadron, Nebraska, where he coached the offensive line and long snappers. Case was a three-year starter on the offensive line at Adams State College, earning second-team all-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference honors at offensive guard as a senior in 2003.

Case was signed by the New England Patriots in April of 2007 as a long snapper, and prior to his coaching stint at Chadron State, Case signed with the Buffalo Bills in the spring of 2004. He also spent time in the National Indoor Football League.



Jaron Fairman **Receivers** **First Season** **Fresno State '06**

Fairman joins the Bison for his first season as the receivers coach after his collegiate playing career at Fresno State. Fairman was a four-year letter-winner at wide receiver for the Bulldogs and served as a senior captain. He was a two-time Academic All-Western Athletic Conference honoree. After graduating in 2007 with a degree in health science, Fairman attended training camp with the Arena Football League's San Jose Sabercats.



Galen Holmes **Defensive Line** **First Season** **Bridgewater St. '97**

Holmes begins his first year with the Bison program after spending the last two years as defensive coordinator at Algonquin Regional High School in Northborough, Mass. Prior to his work at Algonquin, Holmes had stints at Weston High School and served as a volunteer assistant at Algonquin.

No stranger to the New England Football Conference, Holmes played his college ball at Bridgewater State College where he graduated with a degree in exercise science in 1997. Holmes lives in Webster, Mass., with his wife and son.



Charles Walker **Running Backs** **First Season** **UMass '07**

Walker was an All-Conference middle linebacker at UMass, helping the Minutemen to the NCAA Division I-AA national title game in 2006 and to a share of the Atlantic 10 title in 2003 and 2006. A 2007 CAA First-Team linebacker, Walker captained the Minutemen to the CAA North title and back to the NCAA's last season as a senior, and also tied a UMass record for tackles in a game with 23, including 14 solo hits, against Delaware.

Walker graduated from UMass in 2007 with a degree in sociology.

2008 NICHOLS COLLEGE FOOTBALL

Nichols closed out the season 5-4 overall and 4-3 in the Boyd Division, matching its record from last season under the direction of Head Coach Bill Carven. The Bison started off the year 4-1 for the first time since 2000 but lost three of their final four games with offensive leader Robert Morris out of the lineup.

Senior linebacker Matthew Parkinson, junior free safety David McLean and sophomore defensive tackle Bill Hassett all earned First Team All-Boyd Division honors while junior first-year running back Morris was named the Offensive Rookie of the Year and freshman linebacker Curtis Smith was named Defensive Rookie of the Year for the Nichols football team. In addition, sophomore Bob Bickerstaffe, Smith and Morris collected Second Team All-Division accolades.

The Bison defeated Framingham State, 14-0, on the road to begin the season. The Bison defense was led by Smith who had eight tackles including three for losses. Nichols offense was lead by freshman quarterback Justin Nelson as he went nine for eighteen for 101 yards while running for a touchdown and throwing a 24 yard touchdown pass to sophomore Anthony Pillari.

Following the victory over the Rams, Nichols had its Homecoming Weekend spoiled by Worcester State as the Lancers came away with a 17-10 win. A touchdown run by the Lancers with 10:47 left in the game ended up being the game-winner as Worcester State's defense held Nichols out of the end zone three out of four series inside the red zone. Morris rushed for 150 yards on 23 carries while quarterback Justin Nelson threw for 120 yards.

Parkinson led the defense with 13 total tackles, including 4.5 for loss.

Morris continued to carry the offense as he ran for 193 yards with two touchdowns as Nichols beat MIT at home, 31-28, to move to 2-1 on the season. Pillari scored the game winning touchdown with 12:41 to play on a 20 yard run. Once again Parkinson led the defense with 14 tackles, two sacks and an interception. Senior co-captain Brendan Bonn contributed nine tackles in the win as well.



Robert Morris

After a quiet first half with only 22 yards, Morris exploded for 172 yards and three touchdowns in the second half as the Bison came from behind to beat Endicott, 28-14. Morris had touchdowns from 62, 12 and five yards out. The win pushed Nichols to 2-0 in the NEFC Boyd Division. Morris was named the NEFC and ECAC Northeast Player of the Week for his performance.

The Nichols defense stepped up big against Salve Regina as it allowed the Seahawks just 77 yards of total offense in a 33-8 win. Freshman Jonathan Merjuste recovered a fumble and ran it in for a touchdown while Smith led the way with ten tackles, one sack and one pass break up. Freshman Kevin Oberg made his debut as Nichols starting quarterback in the win as Nelson moved over to wide receiver.

In a key Boyd Division match up versus Plymouth State in which both teams were undefeated in conference play, Nichols dropped a 30-0 decision. Nichols couldn't generate much offense against Plymouth State as it went just 2-19 on third down conversions.

After the tough loss, Nichols regrouped and beat UMass-Dartmouth, 21-10, to improve to 5-2 overall and 4-1 in the Boyd Division. In the last 2:12 of the game, the Bison scored two touchdowns to get the victory over the Corsairs. Smith recovered his own forced fumble and went 87 yards for the touchdown to seal the victory and earn NEFC Defensive Player of the Week honors.

Nichols gave undefeated Curry all it could handle in the first half of play but the five-time Boyd Division Champs pulled through in the second half to hand the Bison a 30-12 loss. Once known as the Bison Bowl, Nichols College now plays all of its home football, field hockey, men's lacrosse, and women's lacrosse games as well as some of its soccer matches on the newly resurfaced Michael J. Vendetti Field. This multi-purpose athletic stadium includes an eight-lane rubberized quarter-mile track surrounding a turf field surface. Vendetti Field also features a premium sound system, Musco lighting and a Fair-Play scoreboard and message board. A press box complete with internet access and a rooftop video deck affords the media ample space and amenities for complete coverage of Bison athletics.

The field is named in honor of Nichols College Hall of Fame member, Michael J. Vendetti. Vendetti led the football team to five New England Football Conference Championships in the 1970's as head coach. He coached football and track from 1962 to 1985. Vendetti also served as Director of Athletics from 1980-1985 and was instrumental in the addition of women's athletics at Nichols.

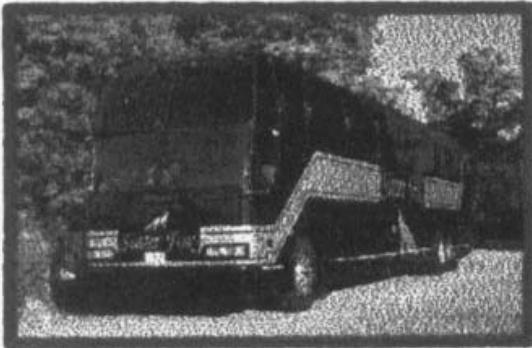

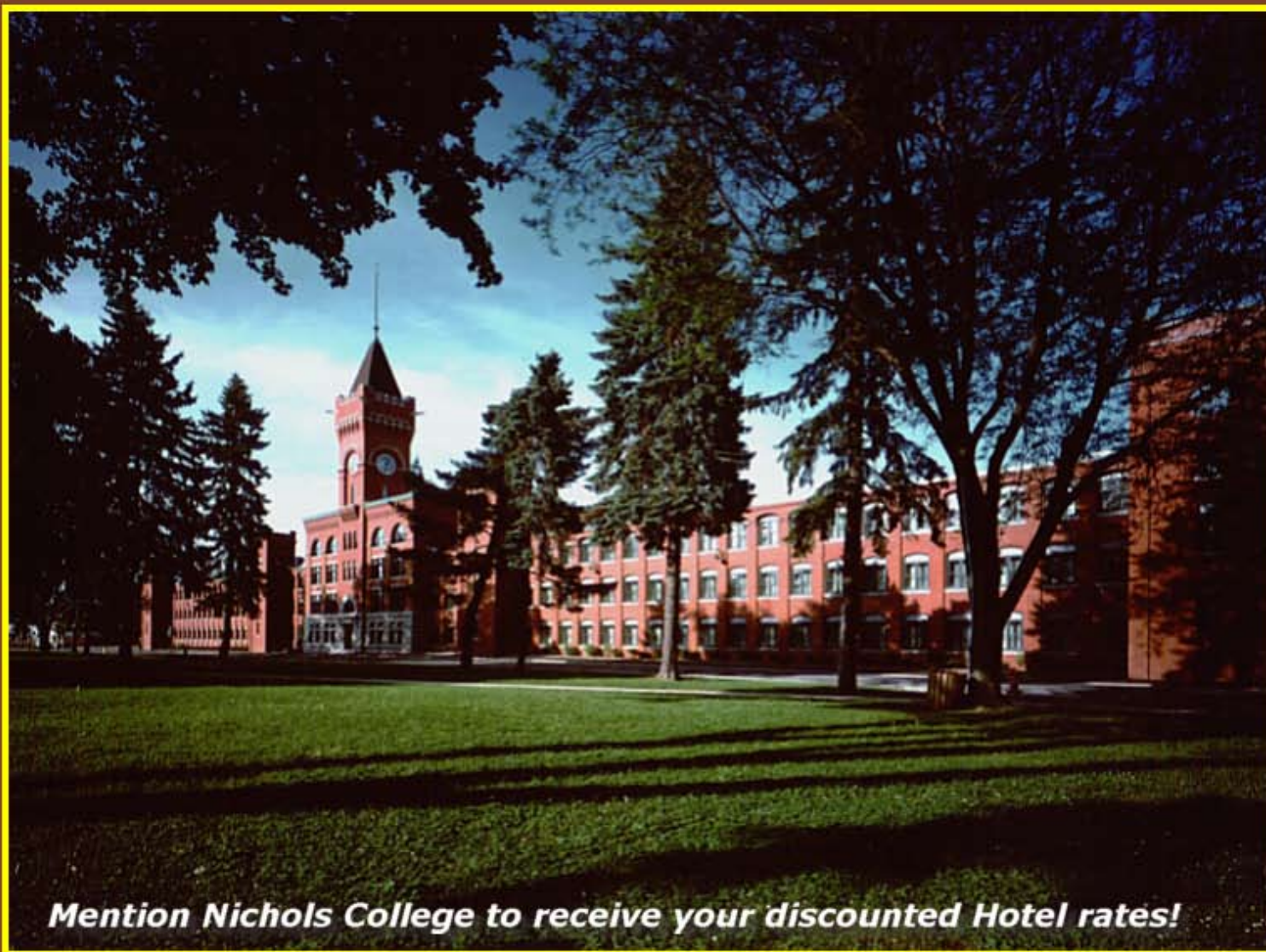
