NCAA Division I

More than 325 student-athletes compete on 19 varsity intercollegiate



On Campus Facilities

- Indoor gym and pool: Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center (basketball, volleyball, swimming), to be replaced by new Wellness and Events Center
 - Naimoli Family Athletic and Recreational Facility (tennis)

- NJIT held a formal ground-breaking on Thursday, November 12, for the new 100 million Wellness and Events Center. The WEC will be built in the space now covered by the school's soccer/lacrosse field and will hold 3,500 people, with opening planned for the 2017-18 season. It will replace the Estelle and Zoom Fleisher Athletic Center, which opened in the 1960s. The soccer field, which will replace the current Fleisher Athletic Center will open in Fall 2018



- Effective July 1, 2015 NJIT became the eighth full member of the ASUN Conference, one of 32 multi-sport Division I conferences whose champions receive automatic qualifying berths in NCAA Division I championships in their respective sports.
- Fourteen NJIT teams will participate in ASUN play. They are: baseball; basketball (men's and women's); cross country (men's and women's); soccer (men's and women's); tennis (men's and women's); track and field (indoor and outdoor; men's and women's); and, women's volleyball.
- Four of the remaining five NJIT varsity sports are in one-sport leagues and men's lacrosse, introduced as NJIT's latest Division I sport in the spring of 2015, competes as an Independent.

- The NJIT men's basketball team recorded its first back-to-back 20-win season as a Division I program and first time since the Division III Highlanders accomplished the feat in 1993-94 and 1994-95.
- Record setting NJIT Damon Lynn (then-junior) was named to the *CollegeInsider.com's* Lou Henson All-America team, first-team all-ASUN, second-team all-District 3 team by the National Association of Basketball Coaches and Division I All-Met second-team.
- Sophomore Simon Rizell, a two-time MACFA foil individual champion, became NJIT's newest all-American fencer, qualifying for the National Championships for the second-straight season, placing 13th overall.
- Fencer Julia Garcia won a silver medal in the 2015 NCAA Championships and received the NCAA Elite 90 award in 2016 for the top GPA among all competitors at NCAA Fencing Championships.
- All NJIT teams became full championship-eligible members of NCAA Division I as of September 1, 2009
- The first recorded intercollegiate games for Newark College of Engineering (NCE; NJIT's name prior to 1975) were men's basketball games played in 1922-23.
- NCE aligned with the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, a small-college organization, during the 1950s. In 1960, the undefeated men's soccer team was NAIA national champion.
- In 1974-75, NCE aligned with the NCAA as part of Division III. NCE became NJIT in 1975.
- In 1997-98, NJIT reclassified to NCAA Division II, a division that allowed athletics-based financial aid.
- As part of the reclassification process to NCAA Division I, men's soccer played its first DI schedule in 2004 and the other sports played their first Division I schedules in 2006-07.

The NJIT women's basketball team will open the 2016-17 campaign on Saturday at 2pm when the Highlanders host Wagner in the Fleisher Athletic Center.

The game will be shown live on ESPN3 (all remaining NJIT home basketball games will be live on ESPN3).

Outlook on NJIT

Fifth-year head coach Steve Lanpher and his staff welcomes six newcomers to the roster, including eight letter winners.

NJIT welcomes back three key starters from last season, including point guard and ASUN Preseason All-Conference selection Alana Dudley. Dudley led the team in assists (90) last year and looks to run the offense again in 2016-17.

Three-point specialist Kelly Guarino is back for the Highlanders after finishing seventh in the ASUN with 62 made three pointers. Her 62 three-point baskets made in a single season, ranks third all-time in the Division I era at NJIT.

Leah Horton will anchor the paint again after scoring a team-high 10.7 ppg last season. The senior set a program-record 20 rebounds in the Highlanders first all-time win in ASUN Conference play, defeating Lipscomb, 61-51 on February 4.

Look at the Newcomers

Taj Lewis, a Massachusetts native and transfer from Roxbury Community College, is a two-time first-team All-American (2014-15; 2015-16). Lewis guided the Lady Tigers to the 2015-16 National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Division III National title, the first-ever national championship win for the Roxbury women's basketball program.

Lewis, a 1000-point scorer in two seasons at Roxbury Community College (1,166 career points), ranked fourth in the NJCAA Division III in scoring (23.4ppg) as a sophomore. During her freshman campaign, Lewis averaged 22.3 points per game, 8.9 rebounds, and shot 58 percent from the floor, helping the Lady Tigers to a Division III title game appearance in 2014-15, where Lewis was named NJCAA Division III Women's Basketball Player of the Year.

A 5-foot-10 wing, Lewis played at the power forward as a senior for Longmeadow High School, where she won the Vi Goodnow Award in 2014 as the top player in Western Massachusetts.

Amber Morgan, who graduated from North Lawrence High School in Indianapolis which has been a highly successful program, is a very accomplished point guard. Morgan was selected to the second-team All-Marion County and honorable mention All-State. She guided Lawrence North High School to a championship title defeating Roncalli, 62-59, at the 2014 Marion County Girls Basketball Tournament in 2014.

Ammari Trueheart, is a 2015 graduate of Cheltenham High School in Pennsylvania, about 10 miles north of Philadelphia, where she was both an accomplished student and an outstanding basketball player.

A two-time All-League Suburban One and first-team honoree as a senior, the 5-foot-3 Trueheart averaged 14.0 ppg in her final season at Cheltenham.

She spent a semester at UAlbany and wasn't eligible to compete for NJIT under NCAA rules governing transfers within Division I in 2015-16. Instead, she practiced with the Highlanders throughout the Spring 2016 and Fall 2016 semesters before becoming eligible for intercollegiate competition.

Danielle Tunstall from Willingboro, NJ, is an athletic player who will help the Highlanders in the open floor/transition game.

Hakilah Hudson, a forward from Virginia, was selected first-team All-Conference 11 for her play on the court as a senior at Henrico High School.

Tracey Brereton, a walk-on player and New Jersey native, was a four-year letter winner from Matawan Regional High School. She was selected Class B North first-team All-Division (2015), second-team All-Division (2016), third-team All-Group 2 and third-team All-Monmouth County (2015).

New Faces on the Sideline

Lifelong New Jersey resident Bob Dubina, comes to NJIT immediately after a successful run as the head coach of Brookdale Community College in Lincroft, NJ. His record as head coach at Brookdale from 2011-16 was 115 wins and 37 losses, including 20-11 in 2015-16. Dubina, who was honored as Region XIX Coach of the Year in 2013-14, coached one All-America and nine all-region players in his tenure at Brookdale.

Alumna Rayven Johnson, who led NJIT to the Women's Basketball Championship of the Great West Conference in her final college game in 2013, played professionally for three seasons (2013-2016) in Hannover, Germany with TK Hannover, returns back to NJIT, this time on the sidelines, as an assistant coach.

Johnson was named 2013 Great West Conference Tournament Most Valuable Player following NJIT's title win, completing her college career with 1,248 points (second all-time in NJIT's Division I era and fourth overall for a program that competed in Division II and Division III before moving to the NCAA's top level in 2006-07).

Next Time Out

NJIT will host non- Division I foe, St. Joseph's College – Brooklyn on November 15 at 7pm.

Wellness & Events Center

Next season, the Highlanders will open a state-of-the-art \$102 million facility – nicknamed the “WEC” – which will feature a 3,500-seat basketball arena and compare favorably with many Division I mid-major facilities throughout the country, allowing NJIT to continue to grow their men’s and women’s basketball programs.

ASUN Conference

The Highlanders, who became the eighth full member of the A-Sun effective July 1, 2015, will begin its second season in the ASUN Conference, will have 14 games, home-and-away, against the other seven conference teams, four of which played in the 2016 post-season.

Fans can get ready for over 120 broadcasts involving league teams during the 2016-17 season. A total of 125 ASUN Women's Basketball games will be broadcasted live on ESPN3, including every conference regular season and ASUN Championship game. It marks the third consecutive season that all league games will be produced on-campus live on ESPN3.

Outlook on Wagner

Wagner, under the direction of first-year head coach Heather Jacobs, was introduced as the ninth head coach in Wagner College in April 2016.

Widely regarded as a rising star in the coaching profession, Jacobs has served the last six seasons as head coach at Adelphi University in Garden City, NY, where she led the Panthers to unprecedented success during her tenure.

The high water mark for Jacobs at Adelphi came in 2014-15 when she led her team to a 28-4 record and an 18-2 mark in the NE-10 Conference, claiming the program's first-ever league championship and hosting the NCAA Division II East Regional. Adelphi was ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation and tied a program record for most wins in a season, and Jacobs earned ECAC Division II and All-Met Coach of the Year honors by the Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association (MBWA).

The Seahawks return five letter winners and will add eight newcomers, six of whom will be freshmen in 2016-17.

Senior forward Jackie Dluhi, a starter in 28 games, top game in 2015-16, came against the Highlanders, where she set a career-high 17 points with six field-goals made.

In the front court, Taylor Butigan, standing at 6-foot-1, saw action in 22 games, with one start, recording a season-best 12 points against Delaware State.

Junior guard Tanasia Russell, who came off the bench last season for Wagner, averaged 5.6 ppg and 2.0 rpg in 15.6 minutes of action.

Sophomore guard Julia McClure saw action in 20 games, combined for a career-best 15 points at St. Francis Brooklyn. Junior forward Samantha Sullivan has seen action in 50 games, during her two-year stint as a Seahawk.

NEC Preseason Poll

Wagner, which finished 2015-16 with a 5-24 overall mark, 3-15 in the NEC, was selected to finish 10th out of 10 teams in the preseason coaches poll.

All-Time Series vs. the Seahawks

NJIT leads the series, 5-4, with Wagner topping the Highlanders, 76-53, in the last meeting on December 2, 2015 in Staten Island. NJIT won the meeting in 2014 in Newark, 60-54, paced by Leah Horton’s 15 points, 12 in the first half, and eight rebounds.

NJIT ATHLETICS FINDS ITS HOME IN THE SUN

NEWARK, NJ (JUNE, 12, 2015)

The Atlantic Sun Conference and New Jersey Institute of Technology held a news conference Friday on the NJIT campus to announce that the Highlanders will become the eighth full member institution of the Atlantic Sun, effective July 1, 2015.

"It has been an almost 10-year journey to find the right conference home for our athletic teams and I am excited that the Atlantic Sun is that home," said NJIT Director of Athletics Lenny Kaplan.

NJIT will compete for Atlantic Sun championships in six men's sports and seven women's sports in the 2015-16 seasons. The number will grow to seven men's sports and 14 total in 2016-17, when men's soccer, which has been in the Sun Belt Conference since 2014, transitions to the A-Sun in the fall of 2016.

As one of 32 multisport conferences in NCAA Division I, the Atlantic Sun's champions receive automatic qualifying berths into NCAA Division I postseason championship play.

In addition to championship and postseason opportunities for teams, individual student-athletes from NJIT will be eligible for conference honors on a weekly and seasonal basis.

NJIT's journey officially began in February 2003, when the Board of Trustees unanimously approved a plan to re-classify men's soccer to Division I from Division II. Within two years, the NCAA approved NJIT's request to begin the reclassification process for its entire athletics program.

Men's soccer began Division I competition in 2004 and the remaining programs began Division I competition in 2006-07. Men's soccer became Division I championship-eligible in 2005 and women's soccer followed in 2007.

The remaining programs, operating under a longer NCAA-mandated reclassification process, became championship-eligible as of September 1, 2009.

This new affiliation with the Atlantic Sun Conference marks the first time that NJIT has been a full member of an automatic qualifying NCAA Division I multisport conference.

The other members of the Atlantic Sun are (listed alpha-betically): Florida Gulf Coast University (Fort Myers); Jacksonville (FL) University; Kennesaw (GA) State University; Lipscomb University (Nashville, TN); University of North Florida (Jacksonville); University of South Carolina Upstate (Spartanburg); and, Stetson University (DeLand, FL).



NJIT is located in Newark, NJ and fields 14 Division I sports sponsored by the A-Sun. The Highlanders are immediately eligible to compete for A-Sun Championships with the exception of men's soccer until 2016-17.

With an enrollment of 10,646, NJIT's has been recognized by U.S. News and World Report, Forbes, and the Brookings Institute, to name a few, for its success academically. The U.S. News Best Colleges edition ranked NJIT 149th among national universities overall for its range of undergraduate, master's and doctoral degree programs and for its commitment to groundbreaking research. NJIT also ranked 14th among national universities on the Campus Ethnic Diversity list. Called an "America's Top College" by Forbes, NJIT also checked in as one of the top 10 colleges and universities in the nation for high value-added in terms of occupational earning power. Additionally, CBS Money Watch called the institution a "hidden gem" in its 2015 "new ranking of college superstars."

Over 120 ASUN Conference Women's Basketball Games Set For Broadcast During 2016-17 Season

Fans can get ready for over 120 broadcasts involving league teams during the 2016-17 season. The opening day of the season on November 11th will feature four broadcasts live on ESPN3.

A total of 125 ASUN Women's Basketball games will be broadcasted live on ESPN3, including every conference regular season and ASUN Championship game. It marks the third consecutive season that all league games will be produced on-campus live for ESPN3.

In addition to the ESPN broadcasts, several ASUN squads will be featured on other networks in the non-conference slate. USC Upstate takes on Big Ten opponents Purdue and Illinois live on BTN+, while FGCU will also visit the Illini and be featured on BTN+ this season. Other road matchups can be seen on the WatchESPN app, including defending ASUN Champions, Jacksonville making the road trip to ACC powerhouse Florida State on November 17th.

November also sees Stetson travel to Arkansas and Lipscomb headed to Tuscaloosa, Ala. to take on the Crimson Tide with both contests scheduled for SEC Network+/ESPN3 coverage. ASUN Women's Basketball fans can enjoy 71 broadcasts in the first two months of the season this year.

January and February bring with them every game of the 2016-17 ASUN Conference Women's Basketball regular season as teams battle for the title and home court advantage in the postseason. All seven ASUN Championship games will be broadcasted live on ESPN3 from on-campus sites as the higher seeds host each round, including the ASUN Championship Final on March 12, 2017.

The ASUN Conference's ESPN3 On-Campus Initiative began in the fall of 2012 and has grown exponentially since its inception as ESPN collaborated with the ASUN to adopt the conference-wide on-campus production model. Last year, nearly 350 regular season and championship events featuring ASUN Conference teams were available on ESPN networks.

How to watch NJIT sports programming on ESPN3

ESPN3 is the live platform for all NJIT women's basketball home games and ASUN conference home and away, throughout the regular season and into the A-Sun postseason tournament will be covered on ESPN3.

ESPN3 is ESPN's live multi-screen sports network. It is accessible online at WatchESPN.com, on smartphones and tablets via the WatchESPN app and streamed on televisions through Amazon Fire TV and Fire TV Stick, Apple TV, Chromecast, Roku, Xbox 360 and Xbox One.

The network is currently available to more than 99 million homes at no additional cost to fans who receive their high-speed Internet connection or video subscription from an affiliated service provider.

ESPN3 is also available at no cost to approximately 21 million U.S. college students and U.S.-based military personnel via computers, smartphones and tablets connected to on-campus educational and on-base military broadband and Wi-Fi networks. That means devices served by NJIT's on-campus computer network can link directly to ESPN3.

Others can access ESPN3 through WatchESPN if they receive ESPN programming from an affiliated service provider. Those users need to provide the username and password they use in online communication with their regular service provider (can usually be found on regular billing material from the service provider).

WHO WE PLAY?

NJIT women's basketball coach Steve Lanpher released the 2016-17 schedule, which features a 15-game out of conference slate and seven teams that reached postseason a year ago.

The Highlanders, who will begin its second season in the Atlantic Sun Conference, will have 14 games, home-and-away, against the other seven conference teams, four of which played in the 2016 postseason.

"The women's basketball staff is excited about the upcoming 2016-2017 non-conference schedule as we compete against seven different conferences (America East, Northeast Conference, Patriot, Ivy, Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, Western Athletic Conference and Atlantic 10)," fifth-year head coach Lanpher commented. "The variance in opponents will allow us to compete against an array of different styles and tempos of play which will help prepare us for our highly competitive Atlantic Sun conference play!"

Defending ASUN champion Jacksonville, capped off the 2016 season with the programs first-ever trip to the NCAA Tournament after upsetting FGCU in the ASUN Championship game. The Dolphins won 22 games.

Stetson and USC Upstate each qualified for the Women's Basketball Invitational. Stetson reached the quarterfinals, completing their sixth straight 20-win season while USC Upstate advanced to the semifinals, finishing with 22 wins, the most in the programs Division I era and third-most in program history.

NJIT will square off against four opponents who made the 2016 WNIT.

Bucknell from the Patriot League advanced to the second round of the WNIT and finished with a 25-8 record. The Highlanders will visit Bucknell on November 17 at 7pm.

Harvard of the Patriot League and Milwaukee Wisconsin from the Horizon League, who the Highlanders could face in the four-team Vermont Tournament over Thanksgiving, reached the opening round of the WNIT.

Florida Gulf Coast, which won a program-best 33 games, reached the championship game of the postseason WNIT. The Eagles, which finished 5-1 in the WNIT, fell short at University of South Dakota, 71-65.

NJIT will open the 2016 season with a two-game homestand, hosting Wagner on November 12 at 2pm and non- Division I foe, St. Joseph's Brooklyn on November 15 at 7pm.

After visiting the Bison of Bucknell on November 17, NJIT will host Fairleigh Dickinson on November 21 at 7pm.

The Highlanders will make its first long road trip of the season, to Burlington, Vermont, for a two-day tournament over the Thanksgiving weekend. NJIT will face host Vermont on November 25 at 7pm and take on either Wisconsin Milwaukee or LIU Brooklyn a day later, as part of the TD Bank Classic. The game vs. Vermont will add meaning for head coach Lanpher, who was formerly assistant coach and then associate head coach for Vermont. In his four years on the staff, the Catamounts were a combined 91-40 with one WNIT berth and two NCAA berths, including 2010, when they finished with 27 wins and advanced to the second round of the NCAAs.

NJIT will look for the programs first-ever win over Lehigh on November 30 in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania at 7pm. The Mountain Hawks won 18 games and reached the championship game of the Patriot League postseason tournament.

The month of December will begin in Cambridge, Massachusetts, when the Highlanders visit Harvard on December 4, with tip set for 12Noon. The Crimson finished with an even 14-14 record and advanced to the first round of the WNIT.

The Highlanders will return home on December 6, after four straight road contests, hosting America East opponent Binghamton on 'Pack the House' night at 7pm.

NJIT will play its next two on the road, first visiting MEAC opponent Delaware State on December 11 at 1pm and Saint Joseph's in Philadelphia from the Atlantic 10 on December 13 at 7pm. The Highlanders hold a 3-2 all-time series record vs. Delaware State while December 13 will mark the second all-time meeting between the Highlanders and the Hawks.

Before the Highlanders break for finals, NJIT will welcome Howard from the MEAC on December 16 at 7pm.

The Highlanders will host neighboring Rutgers-Newark, a non-Division I opponent, on December 28 at 7pm and will close out the year in Chicago, visiting Chicago State from the WAC on December 30 at 2pm (CT).

The Cougars, like NJIT, were part of the old Great West Conference. Both teams were in the Great West for the conference's existence from 2008-09 season through the 2012-13 season. After 2012-13, the GWC ceased operations, with most of its members, including Chicago State, departing to the Western Athletic Conference. NJIT won the last women's basketball game ever played in the Great West, the 2013 GWC championship game.

NJIT will open the New Year, hosting Ivy League opponent, Columbia on 'Education Day' on January 4 at 11:30am, wrapping up the non-conference slate.

The ASUN schedule begins for NJIT on Saturday, January 7, in Spartanburg, South Carolina against USC Upstate. The Highlanders will play their final 14 games in the ASUN.

ASUN home games for the Highlanders after opening conference play at USC Upstate are: Saturday, January 14, 1 pm vs. North Florida; Monday, January 16, 7pm vs. Jacksonville; January 28 vs. Lipscomb, 1pm; Wednesday, February 8 vs. Kennesaw State, 7pm; Saturday, February 18 vs. Stetson, 1pm; Monday, February 20 vs. Florida Gulf Coast, 7pm; Saturday, February 25 vs. USC Upstate (Senior Day), 1pm.

The eight-team, three-round ASUN Women's Basketball Tournament spans from March 3-12 and will be held on campus sites. The quarterfinals begin on March 3 and the semifinals on March 8. The 2017 Tournament Champion will be crowned on March 12.

HEAD COACH STEVE LANPHER | College of St. Joseph (VT), 1987

5th season at NJIT (40-85) | 9th overall (193-175) | (0-0) in 2016-17



Named to lead the NJIT women's basketball program in July of 2012, Steve Lanpher led the team to its first conference championship when the Highlanders captured the Great West Conference Tournament title on March 16, 2013 in Chicago.

In guiding his first Highlander team in 2012-13, Lanpher got NJIT to peak at precisely the right time, as the squad won its last 5 games and 8 of the last 9. Included in the closing burst were wins in the GWC Tournament over Texas-Pan American in the semifinals and then over regular season champ Utah Valley in the title game.

A common thread in the two tournament wins—defense, as the Highlanders scored exactly 52 points in each contest, but held UTPA and UVU to 42 points apiece.

With senior Rayven Johnson, the tournament MVP, scoring 20 points and pulling down an NJIT DI-record 18 rebounds, the Highlanders held Utah Valley, an explosive team, to 10-for-50 shooting from the field. GWC Player of the Year Sammie Jensen of UVU managed just 2 points on 2-for-13 shooting.

Winning with defense was a goal of Lanpher's and in his team's 16 wins just one opponent topped 64 points (Texas-Pan American scored 75 in an overtime loss to NJIT).

The GWC title was the first at any level for NJIT women's basketball, which began Division III competition in 1986-87 and experienced a measure of success, but no championships, in the latter years of its Division II era, which ended in 2005-06.

In Lanpher's second season, with the go-to player Rayven Johnson having taken her game to pro ball in Germany, the Highlanders faced a rebuilding season and sustained eight losses by 7 points or less. Still, they won three in a row beginning February 17 before falling in the finale at Hofstra.

The 2014-15 Highlanders won last four of six contests and sustained four losses by 5 or less points, including two overtime contests, combining for a 12-17 overall mark, four wins up from the 2013-14 season. NJIT defeated Conference USA host Florida Atlantic in the opening game of the Florida Atlantic Thanksgiving Tournament.

When he took over at NJIT, the personable Lanpher already was a veteran of nearly 20 years coaching girls and women's basketball, having most recently been the women's basketball associate head coach at the University of Massachusetts when he got the call to lead the Highlander program.

Lanpher (pronounced Lan-FEER), who has been a head coach at the high school, junior college and at the four-year college level in NCAA Division III, has seven years experience as either an assistant coach or associate head coach at the NCAA Division I level.

In 2006, he became an assistant coach at the University of Vermont, beginning a six-year association with head coach Sharon Dawley, who promoted him to associate head coach for his last two years at Vermont and hired him as associate head coach at UMass, when she was named head coach there in 2010.

Vermont's combined record in Lanpher's four years on the staff there was 91-40. In his second year with the Catamounts, they finished 24-9 and advanced to the second round of the Women's National Invitation Tournament in postseason. The next two years, they were America East Conference champions, reaching the NCAA Division I Tournament in both 2009 and 2010. The 2009 team finished 21-12 and the 2010 team was 27-7, including a win in the first round of the NCAAs.

At UMass, Lanpher assisted Coach Dawley in the first two years of work toward building a championship-quality program in the rugged Atlantic 10 Conference.

A 1987 graduate of College of St. Joseph in Rutland, VT, with a bachelor's degree and a master's degree three years later, Lanpher began his coaching career with a three-year stint as head girls basketball coach at West Rutland High School. He returned to the College of St. Joseph as women's basketball coach in 1993-94, before serving in the United States Army as a Ranger in the First Ranger Battalion in Savannah, GA.

Returning to civilian life, he was the head coach of a startup women's junior college program at Dean College in Massachusetts, where he was Region XXI Coach of the Year in 1998. From Dean, he moved to Pratt Community College in Kansas, where he led the team to 18 wins in his second year, a 10-win improvement over the first year.

Entering the Division I college ranks for the first time in 2001 as an assistant coach at Lamar University in Texas, he spent a year there before returning to Vermont as head coach at Division III Norwich University, where his four-year mark was 93-28. The records in the last two of his four years at Norwich were 25-4 in 2004-05 and 25-5 in 2005-06. At Norwich, he was a finalist for New England Coach of the Year and was conference co-Coach of the Year, with his team leading the nation in scoring defense one year and advancing to the second round of the Division III national tournament.

Said Lanpher, the new coach of the Highlanders: "I am both humbled and honored to be selected as the next women's basketball coach at NJIT. I would like to thank President (Dr. Joel) Bloom, (Vice President) Dr. (Jack) Gentul, the entire search committee, and especially Lenny Kaplan for the faith and trust they have shown me. I am extremely excited about leading the women's basketball program to greater heights, both on and off the floor. I will work tirelessly to make our program one of honor, pride and respect and a source of pride for the entire NJIT community."

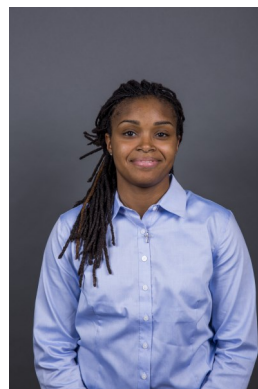
