The Women's Beanpot Tournament began in 1979, with Northeastern bringing home victories in the first two years of the tournament's existence. After Boston College won the title for the first time in 2006 – the first year that all four Boston schools participated as varsity clubs – all four teams have brought home at least one victory in the tournament. The four Boston area teams have taken part in 27 of the 29 Beanpots. In 1993, Brown University replaced Boston University, while 1994 featured a three-team round-robin in the first round. With a distinct local flavor, the Women's Beanpot continues to excite as one of the longest-running women's tournaments in all of college sports.

Northeastern has a rich and successful history in the Women's Beanpot Tournament, as the Huskies kicked off the tourney by winning the inaugural event on March 17, 1979, defeating Boston College by a score of 3-1 in the final. The Huskies won 10 of the first 13 tournaments, and lead all teams with 14 first-place finishes. Head coach Don MacLeod (1980-92) was behind the bench for nine NU Beanpot victories, including eight in a row from 1984-91. Harvard has won the tournament 11 times, while BC (2006-07) has three titles and both BU (1981) and Brown (1993) have one win.

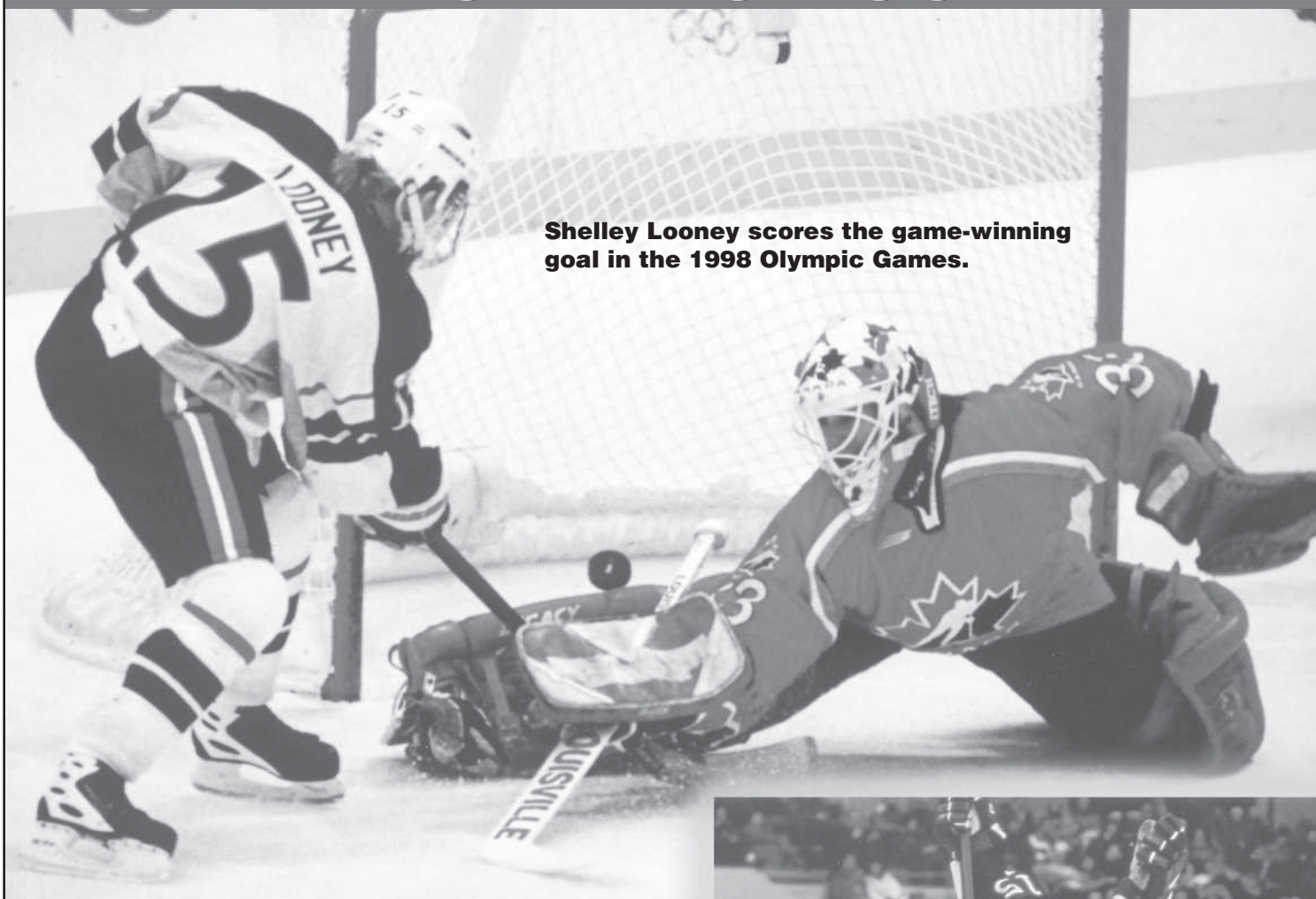

Shelley Looney, who played for Northeastern from 1990-94, scored the game-winning goal for the United States in the gold-medal game of the 1998 Olympics in Nagano, Japan. It was the first time women's hockey was contested in the Olympics. Looney was a member of the U.S. National Team from 1992-2005.

Looney and 12 other Huskies have represented their respective countries on national teams, including six in the Olympic Games.

Huskies on National Teams

Northeastern women's hockey has a long-standing tradition of placing players on the U.S. and Canadian National teams. In all, 10 Huskies have suited up for Team USA, including Olympic gold medalist Shelley Looney, who was named to the U.S. National team 12 times (1992, 1994-98, 2000-05). Two-time Olympic gold medalist Vicky Sunohara is one of two NU players to take the ice for Team Canada, having been named to the Canadian National squad 16 times, including each of the last 15 years (1993-2007).

In April 2005, Looney and Chanda Gunn, a former Northeastern goaltender and Husky assistant coach, were instrumental in helping the United States win its first IIHF Women's World Championship in the 15 years of the competition. Gunn also represented the

United States at the 2006 Winter Olympics in Torino, Italy, winning a bronze medal as the USA's primary start-

ing netminder. Sunohara and former NU head coach Laura Schuler both played on the 1990 Canadian National team, helping the team to a gold medal in the first Women's World Championship. Sunohara has been a part of seven World Championship-winning teams, while Schuler was a part of Canada's first three World Championship-winning teams in 1990, '92 and '97.

Tina Cardinale, Kelly Dyer and Jeanine Sobek were the first three Northeastern players ever selected to the U.S. National team, as they were chosen to compete with the team in 1990. The three Huskies were coached on that team by then-NU head coach Don MacLeod, who was tabbed to lead the U.S. squad at the first World Championship.

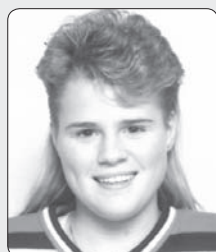
Other former Huskies to have earned a spot on the Team USA roster are Kim Haman (1992), Brooke White (2001, '04), Erika Silva (2004), Brooke Whitney (2004) and Hilary Witt (2001). Witt also has spent time as an assistant coach for Team USA at the 2006 Four Nations Cup and at the 2007 IIHF World Championships.

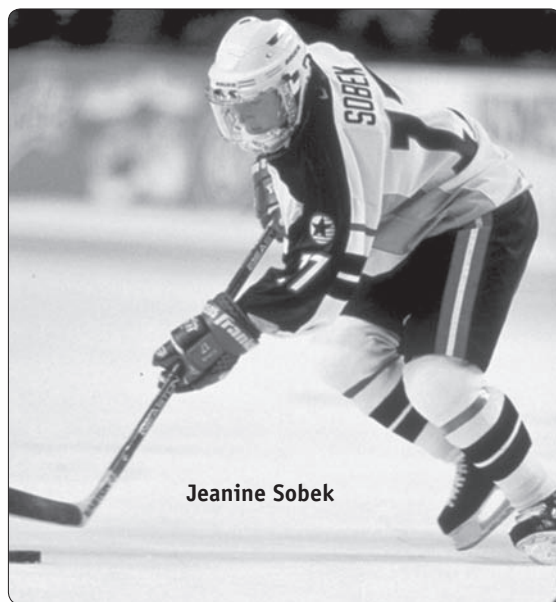

Huskies in the Olympics

Four former Northeastern players and two current Huskies have played for their respective national teams in the Olympic games. Most recently in 2006, forward Vicky Sunohara, a three-time Olympian, won a gold medal with Canada while goalie Chanda Gunn won a bronze medal as the backstop for Team USA in Torino, Italy. Also in Torino was sophomore Florence Schelling and junior Julia Marty, who were playing for Switzerland as it posted its highest finish ever (fourth) at the Olympic Games.

Shelley Looney played for Team USA in the Olympics in 1998, winning a gold medal, and played for Team USA again in 2002, winning silver. Former Northeastern head coach and player Laura Schuler played for the Canadian National team from 1990-2001, winning a silver medal in the Olympics in 1998 alongside Sunohara.

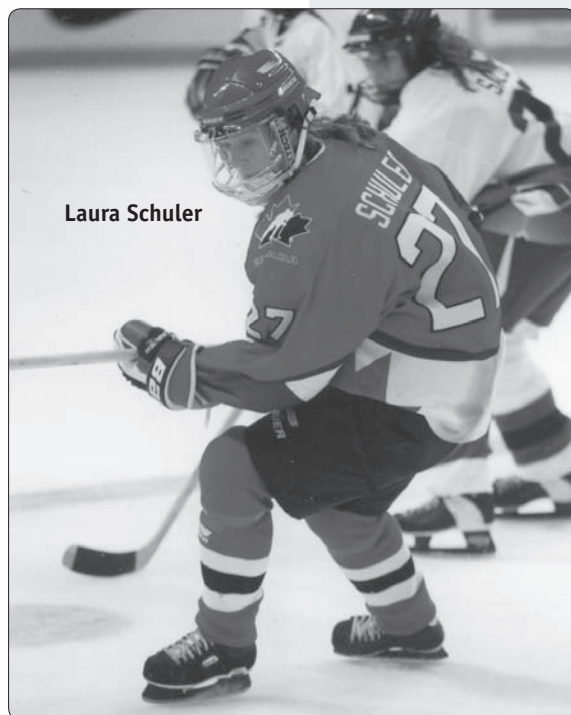

In 1898, graduates of Harvard and Boston Universities founded what was to become Northeastern as the "Evening Institute for Young Men" at the Boston YMCA. Cooperative education was introduced in 1909.

the private sector in this wonderful community of yours to build people, which is, after all, the only real product America has ever been able to depend on."

Husky athletes spend their time in the classroom, on the job and in top-of-the-line sports facilities. The men's and women's hockey and basketball teams play at historic Matthews Arena; the football, soccer and baseball teams perform at Parsons Field/Friedman Diamond; the women's basketball, swimming and volleyball programs call the Cabot Center home; the national power field hockey program plays at Sweeney Field adjacent to NU's West Village; the men's and women's crews row out of Henderson Boathouse on the famous Charles River; and the track teams live at the Solomon Track in serene Dedham, known to two decades of Huskies as "the track in the trees."

The varsity athletics programs participate through top-flight affiliations; the Huskies compete against Division I teams as members of the Colonial Athletic Association, Hockey East Association and ECAC.

Academic Excellence

Northeastern takes higher learning to a richer level. Its outstanding professors, an academically challenging curriculum and high-profile research projects infuse the classroom with intellectual curiosity and the spirit of discovery. Northeastern students work alongside faculty who are pioneers in their fields while sharing opinions with classmates, exploring new areas of interest and pursuing independent or faculty-sponsored research. Cooperative Education

Northeastern's graduating seniors routinely respond to employment advertisements that read "previous experience required." Thanks to co-op, when they go out into the working world as graduates, they already have completed up to a year and a half — or more — of paid, professional work. Northeastern's co-op program, founded nearly a century ago, is the largest and most innovative in the world. The benefits to students are easy to see: typically, over 70 percent of recent graduates who are employed full-time receive job offers from former co-op employers.

The Faculty Partnership

Northeastern's 1,257 full- and part-time faculty members form an experienced network of mentors and advisers who extend their teaching beyond the lecture hall and faculty office. In fact, the *Kaplan/Newsweek College Catalog* includes Northeastern among a group of colleges and universities that offer the most individual academic attention.

The partnership between faculty and students takes form in the classroom; in the laboratory, where they collaborate on research; and in the mentoring relationships that develop out of these shared endeavors. Whether arranging their office hours to accommodate student schedules or guiding them through complex research projects, the faculty are committed to success.

A Campus Like No Other

The *Chronicle of Higher Education* recently named Northeastern's one of the most attractive urban campuses in the world because it has all the elements of a traditional college campus amid a thriving city. But the benefits of this urban oasis extend beyond appearances. Housed in the buildings around campus are some of the finest laboratories in this city known for advanced research facilities; the largest academic library in Boston;

While with the Patriots, St. Cyr worked as the team's assistant strength and conditioning coach, supervising professional athletes and their weight lifting routines while also assisting in the area of testing in both mini-camp and training camp workouts.

In 1989, the Patriots and Super Bowl champion New York Giants pooled their resources and St. Cyr got a chance to work with noted Giants strength coach John Parker.

Since coming to Northeastern, St. Cyr has developed comprehensive workouts for all 19 varsity squads and has become a ubiquitous presence in NU's first-class varsity weight room.

St. Cyr carries an infectious philosophy on weight training and conditioning that professes the maximization of physical capacities. Also, he has devised individual training manuals on a team-by-team basis to allow athletes to train independently. His enthusiastic approach in the weight room has convinced many athletes to accelerate their conditioning efforts.



St. Cyr and his staff now work in state-of-the-art surroundings as the NU weight room recently underwent a major renovation that included a total overhaul of the equipment and expansion of over 1000 square feet.

A 1989 graduate of Springfield College, he played one season of football before suffering a back injury that sidelined him permanently. He received his bachelor of science degree from Springfield in 1989. St. Cyr and his wife, Jennifer, reside in Millis.

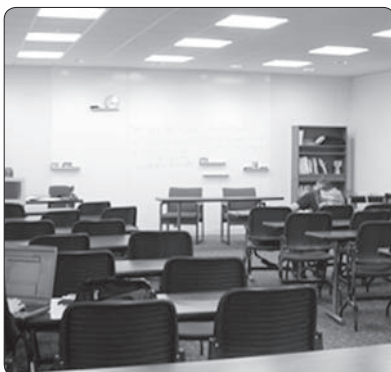

Student-Athlete Support Services: preparing for success

The Office of Student-Athlete Support Services is organized to help Northeastern University student-athletes develop and enhance the skills necessary for academic, athletic, and personal growth and success. The results are obvious as Northeastern has had countless athletes honored for their academic accomplishments over the past several seasons. Student-Athlete Support Services provides counseling and services for academic, career, and personal concerns. The staff helps student-athletes learn the appropriate procedures to effectively utilize the services of numerous departments throughout the Northeastern community. Similarly, when it is appropriate student-athletes may be referred for individual tutoring or workshops. The department supplements and compliments the student personnel staff in all Deans' offices and academic advisors in each department.

Academic Advising: Each team is assigned a primary academic advisor who acts as a direct contact for all athletes and coaches of their assigned teams. Student-athletes are able to set up appointments to meet with their athletic academic advisor regarding issues such as course registration, course conflicts, curriculum requirements, co-op, tutoring, and referrals.

Mentoring Program: The mentoring program assigns academically at-risk student-athletes to a staff member for individualized weekly meetings. The mentors hold the athletes accountable for their academic performance while

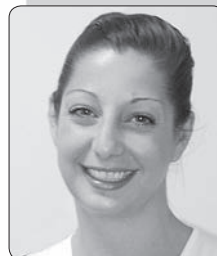
working with the student-athlete to identify and alleviate any academic, athletic or personal struggles. Athletes overcome these struggles and experience personal growth by working with their mentor on skills that include but are not limited to time and stress management, study techniques, goal setting, problem solving, and increasing motivation and confidence.

Study Hall: The newly constructed Shanahan Academic Center provides student-athletes with a 60-seat study hall room, conference area, tutoring tables and a computer lab for studying in a controlled environment. The academic center is open for study hall daily. Attendance and conduct reports are generated and supplied to coaches.

Tutoring: Tutors are provided free of charge to all varsity student-athletes regardless of scholarship status.

Academic Progress Reports (APRs): Formatted reports are mailed out to professors within the second month of the semester requesting information on the academic progress of all student-athletes enrolled in their classes. The reports returned to Student-Athlete Support Services by professors include information on class attendance and participation as well as test, quiz and homework grades.

Informal Contact: Student-Athlete Support Services staff members are consistently in contact with advisors, professors, deans, support staff, and coaches regarding student-athletes' status and progress.

Athletic training: NU provides first-class treatment

Northeastern's top-notch athletic training staff handles the day-to-day, minute-by-minute demands that the vagaries of the human body place on the university's varsity competitors. Director of Sports Medicine Ben Miller and his staff treat hundreds of athletes during the course of the season and ensure they receive the finest medical care available.

Miller and each member of the athletic training staff are Certified Athletic Trainers who are qualified to react to spontaneous, on-the-field injuries, manage and treat them, and, when it is necessary, follow through on athletes' comprehensive rehabilitation programs under physician direction.

The coaching staffs of the Huskies' 19-sport, women's and men's athletics program rely heavily on the input of Miller and his staff as they prepare lineups for games and analyze depth charts for future seasons. Athletic trainers at Northeastern are indispensable to the well-being of the



student-athlete and a key component of the program's overall competitiveness.

As the Director of Sports Medicine, Miller is responsible for a five-person athletic training staff and its ongoing liaison work with university physicians and health care staff. The sports medicine staff also provides supervision for undergraduate students in the respected Athletic Training Education curriculum. The staff's collective experience

spans across all sports and all areas of the nation.

Miller is a 1972 graduate of Kansas State, where he earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology, a 1974 graduate of Kansas, where he earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Therapy, and a 1981 graduate of Washington, where he earned a master's degree in Sports Medicine. He joined the Northeastern staff in 1985 and has worked with all 19 varsity athletic programs in his career at NU, including 17 seasons with the men's hockey team.

Co-op: A world of opportunities for NU student-athletes

A Northeastern education is built on the idea that every form of learning — whether in the classroom, in the workplace or in the community — is crucial to preparing students for their careers and their lives.

Created in 1909, Northeastern's co-op program is recognized as the national leader in practice-oriented education. Whether NU students want to explore career opportunities or gain experience in the workplace, Northeastern's co-op program becomes an invaluable tool for students in shaping their futures.

Many Northeastern graduates describe the insights gained through their experiences on co-op as "a turning point" or "life changing." The faculty cite co-op as a major contributor to the reality and rigor of the classroom experience. And Northeastern students know that co-op gives them a competitive edge in the marketplace, whatever their chosen field.

Co-op programs typically consist of a freshman year of full-time study followed by four upperclass years during which students alternate periods of classroom study with

work and career experiences. At any given time, about 6,000 students are working in approximately 1,500 co-op sites in Boston, across the United States and across the globe. About 30 percent of co-op students eventually go on to work full-time with one of their co-op employers. All of them graduate with an experience-filled resumé.

On co-op, students can discover what they want to do or, as importantly, don't want to do. They can try out jobs and test out theories in many different work settings. When back in the classroom, students then can apply what they've learned in the real world to their coursework.

Northeastern co-ops learn how to apply for a job and, once they have a position, how to do the job well. They discover the skills demanded of the serious professional: setting goals and meeting them, working with others, dealing with organizational politics, squaring values and goals with those of their employers, and balancing work and personal time.

The lessons learned along the way can be applied to creating a satisfying career — and living a good life.

Dyer: A star on and off the ice

During a visit to Northeastern while in high school, Kelly Dyer remembers one reason why she wanted to become a Husky.

"I walked into Matthews Arena and said, 'This is where I want to play my college hockey,'" Dyer said.

And that is exactly what she did, as Dyer starred in net for the Huskies from 1985-89. By the time she finished playing hockey at Northeastern, Dyer had set every NU goaltending record and compiled an amazing 47-6-2 record. In 1987-88, Dyer put together a 20-0-1 record between the pipes as the Huskies finished 26-0-1 and captured their first-ever ECAC Championship. The unbeaten streak stretched to 42 games during the next season when NU again won the ECAC title as Dyer earned team MVP and first-team All-ECAC honors. The Huskies also won four straight Beanpots during Dyer's career.

Dyer played hockey at Acton-Boxboro High School where she backed-up and then replaced Tom Barrasso, who would later play in the NHL. She continued to play hockey after leaving NU as well, playing for Team USA and winning two silver medals in the World Championships. She then went on to become only the third woman ever to start a professional hockey game.

While an undergraduate, Dyer learned that NU has another



jewel besides its arena: its co-op program.

"With the co-op program at Northeastern, you get the best of both worlds," said Dyer, who graduated with a degree in Business Administration in 1990. "Just when you feel you can't do another paper or another report, it's time to go on co-op and forget about classes for a while."

Like on the ice, Dyer got the most out of co-op, working several jobs, including at MIT and at the Laurie and Cutler Law Firm.

"At MIT," Dyer said, "it was amazing. I did three straight co-ops there and was allowed to grow and expand each time. It was a beautiful and inspiring experience. And working at the law firm, I experienced the hustle and bustle of the working world."

Dyer, a 1995 NU Hall of Fame inductee, has since gone on to combine her love of hockey with what she learned both in classes at NU and on her various co-op jobs. As the Pro Hockey and Team Sales Manager for Louisville Hockey and now TPS, she works directly with NHL teams such as the Bruins, Rangers and Islanders as well as several collegiate teams, including her alma mater.
