In a challenging season opener, Prairie View A&M University football team faced a tough defeat at Panther Stadium in front of a crowd of 13,260. The game, held on August 31, concluded with a score of 27-9 in favor of the Texas Southern Tigers Saturday night.

The Tigers improved to 1-0 on the year and 1-0 in Southwestern Athletic Conference play, while the Panthers fell to 0-1 overall and 0-1 in conference matchups.

The day promised intense action from the beginning, with Prairie View aiming to harness their varsity skills against their longstanding rivals. Despite enthusiastic support from the home crowd, the team struggled to overpower the Tigers' defense. By halftime, Prairie View was trailing with a score of 6-13. Unfortunately, the second half didn't see a turnaround in fortunes, with the final score widening to a 27-9 loss for Prairie View.

Guillermo Garcia Rodriguez was the standout for Prairie View as he contributed to the team's scoring efforts with crucial field goals

Lamagea McDowell totaled 15 yards to lead the Panthers' ground attack in the game. Connor Wisham also tacked on 15 yards on the ground.

The most prolific target for Prairie View A&M quarterbacks was Shemar Savage, who caught six passes for 105 yards. James Burns got in on the action in the passing game as well, hauling in four balls for 50 yards.

Warren Shankle paced the Prairie View A&M defensive effort, collecting one recovered fumble. Defensively, Prairie View A&M held up fairly well against the Texas Southern offensive attack, holding the Tigers to 346 total yards.

# BUBBA MCDOWELL



McDowell enters his third season after being named Prairie View A&M's 34th head football coach on January 4, 2022. The former NFL defensive standout is in his 13th season as a part of the Prairie View A&M coaching staff to include four seasons as an assistant head coach.

In his first season at the helm McDowell led the Panthers to a co-Western Division title with a 6-5 overall record owning a 5-3 conference record splitting the title with Southern U. McDowell coached the fourth leading total offense in the conference.

In 2023 McDowell and his staff in their second season coached the Panthers to a SWAC Western Division Champships Title.

During the fall of 2021 McDowell coached an explosive Panther cornerback by the name of Drake Cheatum, who had a career season lead an ultra-productive secondary, having a pick-six and a season/career high picking off five passes (ranking him 7th in the nation), while defending four more. He led the team on the defense after playing in 11 contests with a total of 82 stops (42 solo, 40 assisted) ranking him 5th in the conference. Posting 5.0-15 tackles for loss. Cheatum earned first team All-SWAC honors for the second straight year. Along side Cheatum, Darius Campbell was also one of the most active Panthers ranking among the nation's best pass defenders and is ranked fourth in the SWAC with 14. He was one of the PV's top cover men ranking third on the team with 54 stops (29 solo, 25 assisted), earning him SWAC Second Team honors.

Instead of a typical fall football season the Panthers were forced to regroup in the spring of 2021 where Jaylen Harris, who was rarely challenged through the season, he continued to perform as arguably the league's top pure cover man. He made 10 stops on the season with a pair of pass breakups and one interception. This is the second year in a row that Harris has earned All-SWAC distinction.

During the 2019 season, Harris asserted himself as one of the most disruptive cornerbacks in the nation, leading the SWAC in total passes defended and ranking among the top 10 nationally in the category on his way to first-team All-SWAC honors.

In 2018, Ju'Anthony Parker earned first-team All-SWAC and BOXTOROW All-America honors for the second straight year while Harris had a career high in interceptions, and both players had interception returns for touchdowns. While coaching safeties in 2017, Reggie Stubblefield emerged as the fourth leading tackler on the team (51 stops) while tying for second in interceptions (two), and leading the team in pass breakups (10). 2016, Marquice O'Leary was fourth on the team in tackles and third in passes defened. Running back turned nickel back Arthur Lockett was sixth in tackles, tied for the team lead in interceptions, returning one for touchdown, and ranked second on the team in passes defened.

In 2015, O'Leary earned second-team All-SWAC honors after ranking third on the team in both tackles (51) and passes defened (five) and second in interceptions (two). 2014, true freshman defensive back Damond Jackson flourished under McDowell's guidance as he earned a spot on the All-SWAC second team. Jackson finished third on the team with 80 tackles and 5.5 tackles for loss. He also broke up five passes and forced a fumble with one interception.

McDowell was challenged with working with one of the youngest units once again entering the 2013 season as the majority of players in his unit had limited NCAA playing experience. At the end of the season, a pair of redshirt freshmen cornerbacks in Joshua Holley and Foster Brown II finished fourth and fifth, respectively, on the team in tackles while also combining for 10 pass breakups.

McDowell played a big part in the career performance from safety Brian Medlock in 2012 as he earned All-SWAC Second Team Honors at safety during his senior campaign. Medlock led the Panthers with four interceptions in 2012 and finished tied for second in SWAC play in addition to defending a total of eight passes. Under McDowell's watch, safety Corey Alston also had a big season as he completed his inaugural season at Prairie View A&M with 41 tackles and three pass breakups.

In his first year at Prairie View A&M in 2011, McDowell inherited the youngest unit on the defensive side of the ball as only one player had made a start in a collegiate game. Despite the lack of experience, the Panthers received career highs from all of its safeties as Medlock led the way after finishing fifth on the team in tackles along with four pass breakups.

Born in Georgia and raised in Florida, McDowell was a four-year letterman at the University of Miami and earned a National Championship ring as a starter on the undefeated 1987 squad under former head coach Jimmy Johnson. McDowell was also recognized by ESPN for his play on the gridiron that season as his knock down of a two-point attempt against longtime rival Florida State was featured as the 11th-best play that defined college football. He graduated with a degree in business management in 1989.

McDowell was drafted by the NFL's Houston Oilers in 1989 and immediately became a starter en route to earning First Team All-Rookie Accolades from Pro Football Weekly and Football News. After a solid rookie year, McDowell played a big part in the Oilers' success on the field as they posted five consecutive winning seasons and five AFC Playoff berths from 1989 to 1993. In 1991, McDowell earned NFL All-Pro Honors and was honored by the Oilers with the "Ed Block Memorial Courage Award" which acknowledged his courage in the pursuit of professional excellence.

During his final season with the Oilers in 1994, McDowell was selected as the Houston Oilers' NFL Man of the Year for his work in the community. McDowell moved to the state of North Carolina prior to the 1995 season and helped usher in a new era as he played on the inaugural roster of the Carolina Panthers before retiring the next season.

Despite concluding his career in North Carolina, McDowell remained popular in the city of Houston for his work in both the business and community sectors. In 1995, he became one of the first two professional athletes to receive the Human Enrichment of Life "Young African American Achiever" award. During the same year, he became the first athlete ever to receive the Friends of Friends "Positive Influential African American Male" award. In 1996, McDowell earned the first "Warren Moon Athletic and Community Service Award" by Houston's United Negro College Fund which recognized former professional athletes who have excelled in their particular sport while improving the lives of others. McDowell remains active in a variety of athletic ventures across the Houston area in addition to coaching on the high school level for several years. He has also completed NFL Minority Coaching Internships with the Green Bay Packers, Miami Dolphins and Houston Texans.

McDowell has two sons, Trey and Myles.

# ANTHONY WEEDEN

## OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR



Weeden's official start date as the new offensive coordinator for the Panther foot ball team was February 20, 2024.

Weeden spent three seasons at Campbell University, where he was elevated to offensive coordinator following the 2021 season. Prior to his OC position, Weeden coached wide receivers, the position he continued to coach as the OC.

In his first season as offensive coordinator in 2022, Weeden guided the Camels to a school record for passing yards in a single year (2,915), coaching both wideouts and quarterbacks. Under Weeden's supervision, offensive tackle Mike Edwards earned All-American honors, also becoming one of four Camels on the offensive side of the ball to earn All-Big South accolades, along with fellow first-team member Julian Hill and second-team running back Bryant Barr and guard Isaiah Burch.

Weeden also earned the Graphite Award, recognizing the most efficient offensive play-caller in each Division I football conference for the 2022 season.

In his first season in Buies Creek, Weeden coached All-America wideout Caleb Snead (third team, Associated Press). Snead hauled in 1,067 receiving yards, 294 more than any other player in the Big South, also leading the conference in receiving touchdowns (10) and receptions (73) – all Campbell single-season records. The wideout was named First Team All-Big South as the league's only 1,000-yard receiver.

Weeden also helped the Camels lead the Big South in passing offense at 261.6 yards per game, ranking 22nd in the FCS, despite starting three different quarterbacks during the season. With Weeden, CU set a school record for passing yards (2,901) and passing touchdowns (24) this season, as well as a school single-season record for four 300-plus yard passing games, including a single-game record 424 yards in a win over Presbyterian.

Weeden went to Buies Creek after four seasons at Dixie State, where he also coached wide receivers for the Trailblazers.

In his final season at Dixie State, Weeden helped the Trailblazers to a pair of wins through the abbreviated 2021 spring campaign, including a 26-14 victory over No. 22 Tarleton State in the program's FCS debut.

In 2019, Dixie State went 8-3 overall and a 7-3 mark in Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference play, marking the best season in the program's 14-year NCAA Division II era. He guided Dejuan Dantzler, DSU's career receiving-yards leader, to First Team All-RMAC honors, producing 45 catches for 847 yards and seven touchdowns. Fellow wide outs Jalen Powell and Kasey Allison were also named honorable mention All-RMAC, with Powell posting 44 catches for 557 yards and five touchdowns, and Allison adding 26 passes for 446 yards and five touchdowns.

The All-RMAC honor marked the second straight for Dantzler, who was named to the league's second team in 2018, catching 46 passes for 932 yards and seven touchdowns, becoming just the fourth DSU receiver in the Division II era to eclipse the 900-yard mark in a single season. Isaiah Wooden also earned first team All-RMAC honors as a kick returner in 2018, logging a team-high 288 kick-return yards, along with seven passes for 177 yards and two touchdowns.

Prior to Dixie State, Weeden returned for his second stint at Northwestern Oklahoma State in 2016 after spending a year at Missouri Southern State where he was in charge of coaching the wide receivers for the Lions.

Upon returning to the Ranger coaching staff, Weeden assumed the role of Passing Game Coordinator while also helping coach the wide receivers. Before taking over the receivers at Southern, Weeden was the recruiting coordinator as well wide receivers coach for the Rangers.

Weeden began his first stint at Northwestern during the summer of 2012. Under Weeden's watch, a young receiving corps at Northwestern progressed nicely in 2013, despite early-season injuries to each of the Rangers' top two quarterbacks. Eight receivers caught 10 or more passes, and six of them recorded a touchdown.

Depth was also a hallmark of the 2012 group, which lacked individual standouts but still notched several significant milestones. As a group, the receiving core set new single-season school records for most yards and receptions.

In a week two battle with Colorado State Pueblo - a team that spent much of the year ranked number one in the nation - junior Andrew King tied a Northwestern single-game mark with 14 grabs and ranked among the national leaders in catches per game before an ankle injury sidelined him for the second half of the year.

In King's absence, others emerged. Junior Avery Morris - who had recorded just eight catches in his first two and half seasons as a Ranger - caught three touchdowns to spark a win over Panhandle State. For his efforts, Morris was named Great American Conference Offensive Player of the Week.

Prior to his time at Northwestern, Weeden played and coached at Prairie View A&M in Prairie View, Texas. On the Prairie View staff, Weeden was a defensive assistant coach and offensive quality control coordinator. In his playing days, Weeden was an All-American return specialist, starting wide receiver, and team captain.

During his senior campaign, Weeden was a dangerous home run threat, averaging 18.4 yards per catch. He finished with 386 receiving yards, and five of his 21 receptions went for touchdowns. Weeden was part of three consecutive winning seasons and helped the program earn its first SWAC championship since 1964.

# ALVIN FOSSELMAN, III

## DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR | LINEBACKERS COACH



Alvin Fosselman, III is entering his sixth season on the Prairie View A&M University Football coaching staff, his fifth as the Panthers' Linebackers Coach. Recently, he transitioned to the Defensive Coordinator Coach in January of 2023 after the departure of former PV coach Todd Middleton.

Since Fosselman's helm as the lineback coach and special team's coordinator, who coached one of the conference's top linebackers. Keyshawn Johnson finished in the top 15 of the conference in the 2022 season with a total of 76 tackles (34 solo).

During his first year on the defensive side of the ball, Fosselman coached a stellar group of linebackers which was led by first-year JUCO transfer, Tre'Shaud Smith and second-year linebacker Storey Jackson. Smith finished the season as one of the top linebackers in the SWAC, recording 93 total tackles (fourth-most in the league) along with six sacks and 12 tackles for loss, both team-highs. Smith was selected second team All-SWAC. Jackson recorded 72 tackles on the year – ranking seventh in the SWAC for total tackles and stops per game – adding four

sacks and 8.5 tackles for loss. The linebacker group as a whole had an extraordinary year accounting for nearly half of the team's total sacks (14.5 out of 30) and 28 tackles for loss in the 2019 season.

Fosselman initially joined the PVAMU coaching staff as an assistant offensive line coach in 2018, helping to mold a group of offensive linemen that led the nation in rushing yardage for the first half of the college season, regardless of the level of football. Out of this group, there were two offensive linemen to make the All-SWAC team: DeJohn Jones and Christian Rice.

Before arriving at Prairie View, Fosselman was the Offensive Coordinator/Assistant Head Coach at his alma mater Wilkinson County High School in Woodville, Miss. During his tenure at WCHS, Fosselman established one of the most explosive offenses in the region. He was very instrumental in developing young players and providing a platform to showcase their talents. During the 2009 and 2010 seasons, he oversaw the development of wide receiver Devin Fosselman who led the team with 92 receptions, 1,065 receiving yards, and nine touchdowns, respectively, through his junior and senior years. Devin went on to be rated as a three-star receiver and the No. 14 prospect in the state of Mississippi. After the 2010 season, he was selected by the Mississippi Association of Coaches to compete in the Mississippi/Alabama All-Star Game. Devin later signed with Mississippi State University before finishing out his career at Jackson State.

In 2012, WCHS improved to a 9-3 record overall led by quarterback Devin Voorhies and wide receiver Allenzae Stagers. Together, the duo connected 52 times for 825 yards and six scores as the combination led the Wildcats to the third round of the playoffs. In 2013, the record-breaking offense took off as Voorhies passed for 2,374 yards and 19 touchdowns while adding 2,027 yards rushing and 15 touchdowns on his way to a four-star rating as an athlete and a top-five player in the state. Voorhies was also recognized as the 2013 Mississippi Gatorade Player of the Year and selected as First Team Parade All-American as a utility player. He also was selected by the Mississippi Association of Coaches to participate in the Mississippi/Alabama All-Star Game. Voorhies later signed with Louisiana State University in 2014.

Stagers hauled in an incredible 75 receptions on the year for 1,406 yards and 13 touchdowns in that season, going on to East Mississippi Community College – where he helped the team earn a JUCO national championship – before finishing out his career at the University of Southern Mississippi. Also, senior running back LaDarion Peterson rushed the football 131 times for 1,165 yards and 15 touchdowns. That year, Wilkinson County finished the 2013 season with an 11-4 record and hosted the South State Championship.

The Wildcats' offense was even more dominant under Fosselman's leadership in 2015. Quarterback Desmond Hunter became the school's all-time leading single-season passer, throwing for 4,861 yards and 42 touchdowns. Fosselman coached three wide receivers past the 1,000-yard mark, with Juan Anthony Jr. leading Wilkinson County with 95 receptions for 1,584 yards while Travion Jones racked up 62 catches and 1,173 yards.

Fosselman is a native of Woodville, Miss., and played at Southwest Mississippi Community College before transferring to Southern University, where he was a key member of the Jaguar football team during the 2007 and 2008 football seasons. He earned a bachelor's degree in Therapeutic Recreation from Southern in 2009 and a master's from Prairie View A&M University in Physical Education in 2019.

Fosselman is married to LaTessia and together they have three children, Kaelin, Amiyah and Alysha.

# MARLON WATSON

## DEFENSIVE COACH | SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR



Watson will be entering his second season as a member with the Prairie View A&M Panthers after a two year stint as the Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers Coach for the Elizabeth City State Vikings.

Prior to ECSU he spent three seasons at Alabama A&M University. In 2017 he was in control of the Linebacker unit. Watson, Coached 1st Team All-SWAC Linebacker, Kenny Davis. Davis led the team in tackles and was top 10 in the SWAC conference in tackles, tackles for loss, and sacks. In his first season he coached the Nickelbacks and the 2016 season he tutored the Defensive Line.

Before coaching at AAMU, Watson served as Linebackers Coach at Georgia Military College. While coaching Linebackers at GMC, three of the Linebackers finished top five on the team in total tackles and Dezmin Reed finished second on the team in tackles, sacks, and tackles for loss.

Prior to arriving at GMC Watson served as Defensive Backs Coach, Co-Special Teams Coordinator, and JV Defensive Coordinator at Bethel University in Tennessee. In his first season (2011) he helped tutor the Defensive Line as a Graduate Assistant. During his time at Bethel, the Wildcats won back to back Mid-South West Conference Championships (2011-12).

The Wildcats also appeared in the NAIA playoff series twice, and in the 1st round of the 2012 playoffs they beat Georgetown College, who was ranked #1 in the country. In his three seasons he mentored one AFCA All-American, one NAIA All-American, two BSN All-Americans, three Mid-South Conference 1st Team All-Conference players, and one Honorable Mention. The 2012 season the Bethel University Wildcats were the #1 Pass Defense in the Mid-South Conference. He also earned his Masters of Arts in Education Degree from Bethel University.

Before arriving at Bethel he was the Defensive Coordinator & Linebacker Coach at Joliet West High School in Joliet, Illinois. In those two years, he coached 9 All-Conference players, of which three were linebackers, and one which was a two-time All-Conference and All-Area selection as a junior, who went on to play at Harvard University. He also served as the Assistant Track Coach.

The Chicago, IL native played Linebacker at NIU under Joe Novak, and received his Bachelor's Degree in Communications. While at NIU he was part of a squad that in 2003 defeated Maryland, Alabama, and Iowa State, rising to a No. 10 national ranking en route to a 10-2 mark. By the end of his collegiate career at NIU, the Huskies were MAC West Co-Champions in 2001, 2002, and 2004, and 2004 Silicon Valley Bowl Champions.

# JONAS JACKSON

## DEFENSIVE LINEMAN COACH



Jackson joined the Panthers football coaching staff in July of 2022 and he serves as the Defensive Line Coach. Prior to PVAMU Coach Jackson was on the staff at Delaware State.

He most recently served as defensive line coach at NCAA Div. III (Albany State (Ga.) in 2019.

Prior to ASU, in 2018 and '19, Jackson was an assistant defensive line coach for Your Call an interactive Football Power team under the supervision of NFL veteran coaches Kurt Shottenheimer , Mike Sherman and Merrill Hoge. This was a competition in which participants call plays in real time for a series of live exhibition American football games with players, some of whom have played in the NFL or CFL. The participants watch the game via live streaming media and use a smartphone app to select the plays.

Jackson served as the defensive line coach, recruiting and special teams coordinator at SSU from 2012-March of 2018. While with the Tigers, SSU was NCAA Division I FCS and a member of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference. At SSU, Coach Jackson tutored two All Americans and five All Conference Players. Currently, three of his former players at SSU hold school records in sacks and tackles for loss.

Jackson made history as the first African-American head coach at a majority institution in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference while at West Virginia Wesleyan from 2009 to 2012.

Jackson coaching resume also includes stints as an assistant at Illinois State (2008), La Salle (2006-07), Temple (2005-06; grad extern) and Arizona Western (2000-04).

Before SSU, Jackson held numerous positions at Division II West Virginia Wesleyan College, including head coach. During his tenure at WVWC, the team broke over 30 school records two years in a row, had numerous All Americans and All conference players, a two time Harlon Hill finalist and regional player of the year, was undefeated at home for two years in a row, had the highest national ranking in school history and was the first African American head coach at a majority school in the state of West Virginia in league history.

During his career, Jackson has coached a total of 28 all-conference players, eight All-Americans, five all-region honorees and one player-of-the-year. In addition, he led units to a No. 2 national ranking in total defense (2019 Albany State), No. 2 national ranking in passing yards allowed (2019 Albany State), No. 1 conference ranking in scoring defense (2019 Albany State) and No. 1 ranking in total defense (2010 WVWC; 2019 Albany State).

Jackson's 2009 and 2019 West Virginia Wesleyan teams also earned American Football Coaches Association national rankings.

Jackson has also served at Illinois State, LaSalle, Temple, Arizona Western and was a head coach for the Elancourt Templiers of the European Pro League in 2005.

A former standout player at Eastern Michigan, he was awarded a bachelor's from EMU in 2002 and a master's from Valparaiso in 2004, and an Associates from Arizona Western "2000".

Jonas is a native of Boston Massachusetts, has two children, Cora and Kayon and is married to Liz Jackson of Ann Arbor Michigan.

# DAN LEMKE

## DEFENSIVE BACKS | CORNER BACKS | DEF. PASS COORDINATOR



Entering his second season Lemke joined the Panther football coaching staff in 2022, after a three year stint at Florida A&M University. Lemke serves as the Defensive Passing Game Coordinator, he coaches the defensive backs for the program.

Lemke, served as the Outside Linebackers Coach/Defensive Passing Game Coordinator/Recruiting Coordinator, while at FAMU. A native of Maple Grove, Minnesota, prior to FAMU he worked as the assistant head coach (defensive coordinator/ recruiting coordinator/ strength and conditioning coordinator) at Graceland University from 2017 to 2019.

Prior to Graceland, Lemke worked as various Division II institutions including working as the assistant head coach (defensive coordinator/ director of strength and conditioning) at Northwestern Oklahoma State University (2014-2016). Before working at Northwestern Oklahoma State University, Lemke worked at Upper Iowa University (2011-2014) as the defensive backs coach and strength and conditioning coordinator and at Saint Joseph's College (2009-2011) as the defensive backs and head strength and conditioning coach.

Lemke served three (2014-16) seasons at Northwestern Oklahoma State University as Assistant Head Coach, Defensive Coordinator, Secondary Coach and Director of Strength and Conditioning.

The 2015 campaign showed continued improvement for Lemke's Defense. As a whole the Defense earned rankings as #1 in the GAC & Nation, at the end of regular season play, in fumbles recovered, #1 in the GAC for 4th Down Conversions & #3 in the GAC for team sacks. In addition to these impressive rankings, the Ranger Defense also finished the regular season as #2 in the GAC and #4 in the Nation for turnovers gained with an impressive 32, 13 being interceptions and 19 being fumbles recovered.

Individually the Ranger Defense racked up some notable achievements with the first All-American Honors as a Division II institution. Lemke moved to the Defensive Line from the Secondary in 2015, where he coached many stand-outs. Among them All-American Joby St. Fleur, Jacoby Beasley and Theodis Williams. Under Lemke's tutelage St. Fleur racked up 10.5 sacks, making him #2 in the GAC for Sacks, as well as #4 in the GAC for forced fumbles, and #3 in the GAC with tackles for loss. Also at Defensive Line was Jacoby Beasley who was #6 in the GAC for Sacks, and Theodis Williams who shared the #1 spot in the GAC for fumbles recovered with his teammate, LB Devon Peyton. Peyton also had a stand out season and ended the regular season as #1 in the GAC and #16 in the Nation for Total Tackles and #2 in the GAC for Solo Tackles. In the Secondary, Jordan Norris ended the season as #1 in the GAC and #5 in the Nation for Interceptions and #2 in the GAC and #22 in the Nation for Passes Defended. Lemke will be moving back to the Secondary in the 2016 campaign, which is where he has spent the vast majority of his coaching career.

2014 was Lemke's first season as Defensive Coordinator at NWOSU and he made an immediate impact on the Ranger Defense. In 2014 he coached senior stand out Alex Hemberger (LB). Hemberger was named Second Team All-Conference. He racked up 134 tackles in just 10 games making his average tackles per contest 13.4, the highest in the GAC in the 2014 season. Under the guidance of Coach Lemke Joby St. Fleur (DE) also received Honorable Mention on the All-Conference team. St. Fleur was responsible for 53 tackles, 10 for loss, and 7.5 sacks. Lemke's Defense held rival SWOSU to only 6 points in the final game of the 2014 season putting an end to what had been a story of losses for the Rangers in the past 19 years of NWOSU vs. SWOSU matchups.

In December of 2014 Lemke was the Head Coach of the NCAA Division II team at the annual NCAA DII vs NAIA Bowl Game. Under the leadership of Coach Lemke the NCAA team beat the NAIA team 38-10 breaking what had been a losing streak. Lemke nominated Ranger Alex Hemberger to play in this All-Star game, and later coached him in it.

Prior to NWOSU Coach Lemke spent the past three seasons as Defensive Backs Coach and Strength & Conditioning Coordinator at Upper Iowa University. During his time there, the Peacocks made dramatic improvement in their pass defense, going from the bottom 15 percent nationally to the upper 40th percentile.

In 2013, Lemke's final season there, Upper Iowa finished 6-5 for its first winning season since making the move up from Division III in 2004. Two of Lemke's defensive backs earned postseason All-Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) honors, Keaton Martin and Jordan Andera.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Lemke was also instrumental in helping upgrade the facilities at Upper Iowa. He helped spearhead the research and design portion of the school's new \$400,000 weight room renovation project.

Prior to Upper Iowa, Lemke held a similar position at Saint Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Ind. Lemke's star pupil was Ronnell Tibbs, a two-time Preseason All-American who twice landed on the GLFC's First Team All-Conference list. Tibbs was named Co-Defensive Back of the Year by the GLFC's coaches after the 2010 season.

Lemke broke into coaching as a graduate assistant at St. Cloud State in St. Cloud, Minn., working extensively with the Husky secondary and outside linebackers, while also assisting on special teams. He completed work on his Masters of Science in Sports Management in 2009.

Lemke had a four-year career as a safety at Western Michigan University; he also served as a volunteer member of the athletic department's strength staff. Lemke earned his Bachelor of Science in Exercise Science there in 2005.

Coach Lemke is married to the former Theresa Hoffman; and they have two boys Curtis and Jackson.

# BURTON | ALVAREZ

## NICKELS COACH | VIDEO COORDINATOR



Burton enters his sixth season after joining Prairie View A&M in the Spring of 2018 as offensive analyst and video coordinator. In the spring of 2019 he moved to coaching the Nickels.

Burton joined the Panthers after spending the previous three seasons as a graduate assistant and videographer at Grambling State University. Burton played an active role in practice and game plan implementations while assisting in all offensive football preparations for the Tigers.

A native of Grambling, La., Burton earned both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Grambling State University.

## HEAD FOOTBALL STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH



Alvarez enters his third year as the head strength and conditioning coach for football, after returning to the "Hill" in April of 2022.

Alvarez previously spent three seasons at Prairie View A&M University as a member of the strength and conditioning staff. Since joining the staff in October 2018 Alvarez has brought a wealth of knowledge and experience to the program.

His experience derives from working with a variety of athletes from the collegiate and the private sector.

Alvarez came to PVAMU from Lifetime Fitness where he was the Performance Enhancement Specialist in which he designed, programmed

and implemented training programs for athletes in various sports. Prior to this he was the graduate assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach at Grambling State, where he worked as the head strength coach for Basketball and track while assisting with other sports. Currently at PVAMU, Alvarez designs and implements training programs for the women's volleyball, women's bowling women's basketball, men's and women's golf teams.

Alvarez earned his degree in Kinesiology in 2015 from Grambling State University.

# REGGIE MOORE

## WIDE RECEIVERS | OFFENSIVE PASS COORDINATOR COACH



Moore enters his third year after returning to the “Hill”, previously spending five years away. He rejoined the Panther staff after recently spending two years as a quality control coach for the offense at Colorado, having joined coach Karl Dorrell’s staff on March 9, 2020. Moore and Dorrell were teammates at UCLA in 1986, his true freshman year there when Dorrell was a senior.

Moore, went to Colorado after spending most of the last decade in his native state of Texas. He was the running backs coach and run game coordinator at Cypress Christian High School in Houston for the 2018-19 seasons, which followed three years as the receivers coach and performance liaison at Prairie View A&M (2015-17).

While at Prairie View, Moore coached NFL Falcons Player Khaderal Hodge and USFL Pittsburg Maulers championship runner up Joshua Simmons. He had also coached for CES Performance Sports, a premier physical fitness center in the Houston area. He was also the receivers coach at Westbury Christian High School in 2011; its head a coach was Charlie Ward, the 1993 Heisman Trophy winner from Florida State.

Moore spent three seasons (2008-10) as the wide receivers’ coach at his collegiate alma mater, UCLA, where he coached current CU tight ends coach Taylor Embree for the first three years of his career. He was also reunited with head coach Rick Neuheisel, who had given him his first collegiate coaching position in 2003 when he hired him as a graduate assistant and the team’s pro liaison at the University of Washington (though he would coach there under Keith Gilbertson after Neuheisel was dismissed in the summer).

Moore returned home to UCLA after spending four years (2004-07) coaching the wide receivers at NDSU under head coach Craig Bohl, where he also was the pro liaison. During his time there, NDSU made its move from Division II to I-AA (now the Football Championship Subdivision, or FCS), with the Bison posting an overall record of 35-9 during his tenure, including a 20-2 mark his last two seasons which included a 14-game winning streak. NDSU notched its first wins ever over FBS opponents, all on the road, defeating Ball State in 2006 and then Central Michigan and Minnesota in 2007 on its way to earning a No. 9 final national ranking in the final FCS polls. While on the Bison staff, in the summer of 2004, Moore was awarded the prestigious Bill Walsh Minority Scholarship and served an offensive internship with the NFL’s Jacksonville Jaguars (he also was the recipient of the same on two other occasions, spending it with the Seattle Seahawks in the summer of 2010 and again with the Green Bay Packers in 2016).

He graduated in 1991 with a bachelor’s degree in History from UCLA, where he lettered four years (1986-90; a three-year starter his sophomore through senior seasons) at receiver under coach Terry Donahue. He led the team in receptions as a senior, with 40 catches for 643 yards and three touchdowns, averaging 16.1 yards per, which was also his career average for 92 receptions (which totaled 1,483 yards along with scoring 10 TDs). He had three 100-yard career games, including a 105-yard effort at Washington in 1988 when he caught a 48-yard touchdown pass from Troy Aikman with 1:22 remaining to beat the Huskies, 24-17.

At UCLA, Moore was a member of three bowl champion teams for the Bruins: the 1986 Freedom (def. BYU, 31-10, when he redshirted), the 1987 Aloha (def. Florida, 20-16) and the 1989 Cotton (def. Arkansas, 17-3). He was a Sporting News Sophomore All-America team member in 1988 and a preseason All-Pac 10 selection ahead of his junior year (’89). An honorable mention Pac-10 All-Academic Team member as a senior, when he was UCLA’s Kenneth S. Washington Outstanding Senior Award recipient. He received an invitation to and played in the 1990 Blue-Gray All-Star Game as a senior in 1990, playing for the Blue squad that won, 17-14.

He signed as a free agent wide receiver/kick returner with the New York Jets and was with the club for the 1991 and 1992 seasons; he was with the Los Angeles Rams in 1993 and before suffering a severe hamstring injury, wrapped up his pro career in 1995 with the San Antonio Texans of the Canadian Football League (during the time the CFL expanded into the U.S.). After ending his playing career, he returned to his native Houston where he served as a fire fighter and paramedic with the Houston Fire Department from ’96 to ’03 (where he participated in two calendars to benefit the Houston Burned Children’s Fund in both 1999 and 2000). He simultaneously began his coaching career at his high school alma mater, James Madison, where he was an assistant for four years (1999-2002) tutoring the wide receivers and working with the offense, which included quarterback Vince Young. He then went on to join the collegiate coaching ranks by accepting a grad assistant position at Washington.

Moore graduated from James Madison where he lettered in football and baseball. He was a Parade All-American as a senior in 1986 (among a host of national honors), selected to play in the Texas State High School All-Star game and was an Adidas Scholastic All-American; he graduated ninth in his class. A talented infielder (shortstop), he was drafted in the 44th round by the Texas Rangers in the 1990 amateur draft. His father, Zeke, spent 12 seasons with the Houston Oilers (AFL 1967-69, NFL 1970-78) and played in two Pro Bowls; his brother, Trey, played basketball at Mississippi State and in Europe (he still does shows with the Harlem Globetrotters organization). Moore is a longtime friend with CU’s “H-Boys” from 1986-90, who prepped at rival high schools: All-American and College Football Hall of Famer Alfred Williams (Jesse Jones), Kanavis McGhee (Wheatley) and Arthur Walker (B.T. Washington)

He returned to Houston and made a successful transition back into coaching at Westbury Christian High as he worked with Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward in 2011. In 2012, Moore joined the staff of CES Performance as a performance coach for skill positions and worked with a plethora of NFL receivers such as Josh Gordon, Brandon LaFell, Quinton Patton and Russell Shepard.

# PATRICK BROWNING

## QUARTERBACKS COACH



Browning is one of the newest Prairie View A&M football staff members, and has returned to the Panthers offense after 10 years to serve as the quarterbacks coach. He rejoined the Panthers on April 10, 2024, after a short stint at Alabama State as the Hornets' quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator.

At Alabama State, Browning was in charge of developing Auburn transfer Demetrius Davis, a sophomore in 2023, as well as juniors Myles Crawley and Joe Owens and freshman signee Jordan Simpson.

Prior to his stint at ASU he was the head coach at Greenville High school. Browning also had served as the Pike Road football coach since its inception before leaving last season for Greenville, where he coached the Tigers to a 1-9 season.

Browning had an impressive resume, boasting 17 seasons of coaching at the high school and college levels. Browning is known for his innovative spread offense and quarterback development with multiple number-one-ranked offenses at multiple stops over his career.

He is noted for starting the Pike Road Football and in six years turned Pike Road into a 5A state champion. During his time at Pike Road, he compiled a 66-7 total record (36-2 with seniors), five undefeated seasons, four playoff appearances, three Region Championships, and one State Championship. Browning spent 15 of his previous 16 years as a high school coach, including four years at Dadeville (2011-13, 2015) and six at Pike Road (2016-2021), where he coached the Patriots to the 2021 Class 5A state championship.

While he earned a reputation for his innovative offense and quarterback development at Dadeville, he excelled at Pike Road, building a team from scratch into a championship contender in four years.

He built the program at the junior varsity ranks in 2016 and 2017, then launched the program at the varsity level in 2016. Pike Road won its first five games before dropping five of its final six games in its inaugural year. Browning would go on to win the next 29 regular-season games at the school, going undefeated in the regular season in his final three years as a coach.

He left for another challenge at Greenville and went through a 1-9 season, beating Park Crossing in the 2022 season opener before dropping the final nine games. He praised the efforts of Butler County school superintendent Joseph Eiland and Greenville High principal Jamie Howard and noted

Browning served as the quarterbacks coach at Prairie View A&M in 2014, coaching the talented Jerry Lovelocke. Prairie View opened the season with four consecutive losses before bouncing back to win five of its final six games as Lovelocke rushed for 10 touchdowns and threw for 16 more.

Browning is married to Jenny Browning, and has three kids; Lucy, Joseph, and Delilah.

# GREEN | BRADLEY

## OFFENSIVE LINE | RECRUITING COORDINATOR



Ashton Green is in his third season at Prairie View A&M University after returning in the spring of 2022. Prior to his return Green spent two years on the Alabama State University football coaching staff under NFL standout head coach Eddie Robinson.

In his last season at Alabama State, Green helped coach one of the youngest offensive lines in the country. At one time, the Hornets had four redshirt freshman along the front playing college football for the first time. He helped redshirt freshman Travon Taylor earn BOXTOROW All-American honors, while also helped the team rush for 905 yards and pass for 1,011 during the season, while finishing second in the East Division.

Prior to his stint with the Hornets, Green spent two years at Prairie View A&M, where was responsible for the offensive line for the Panthers. In his last season at Prairie View A&M, Danny Garza was named First Team All-SWAC in helping to lead the offensive line for the Panthers who averaged 35.6 points per game. He was part of the unit that helped Prairie View A&M rush for over 2,300 yards as a team including 1,000-yard rusher Dawonya Tucker.

In his first season at Prairie View A&M, both left tackle DeJohn Jones and left guard Christian Rice earned First Team All-SWAC honors. The duo helped produce 500-plus yard games of total offense four times, including a pair of games of 600-plus yards. The offensive line also helped produce a school-record 815-yard game at UAPB.

Green spent two years as a graduate assistant at Louisiana Tech before joining Prairie View A&M, helping the Bulldogs to a win in the inaugural Frisco Bowl in 2017. Prior to Louisiana Tech, he spent two seasons as the offensive line coach at Lincoln (Mo.) University.

Green, who won a pair of SWAC championships as a student-athlete at Grambling State, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater in 2013.

Marcus Bradley is in his third year as a full-time position coach. In his first stint with Prairie View A&M he was a defensive graduate assistant from 2018-2020.

Prior to returning to PV, Bradley spent a year at Benedict College as the Run Game Coordinator/Tight Ends Coach (2020-21).

Bradley began his coaching career in 2016 as the defensive line/Academic Coordinator at Kansas Wesleyan after playing for the Coyotes in 2015.

The native of Dallas was a second-team All-KCAC performer for the Coyotes and was second on the team in total tackles with 74. He had six tackles for loss for 19 yards and 2.5 sacks. He also had his first career interception this season and forced two fumbles. He was part of KWU's stuant defense which is second in the KCAC in scoring defense (19.7) and fifth in the conference in total defense (368.5), and led the KCAC in sacks

per game (2.9).

Bradley completed his degree in Criminal Justice in Fall 2015 and also received his MBA at Kansas Wesleyan in the spring of 2018.

He earned a second master's degree in Physical Education from Prairie View A&M in 2020.

# PANTHER HISTORY

The first football coach at Prairie View was H.B. Hucles, who began in 1924. Before Hucles's arrival at Prairie View, the school played two games without a coach on record: a 1907 7–0 win against a team from Wylie, Texas and a 1920 7–6 loss to Tuskegee University.

Prairie View's most recognized and celebrated coach was William "Billy" Nicks. Nicks was head coach in 1945–47, assistant coach in 1948–51, and head coach again in 1952–65. His record for 17 years was 127-39-8. He led the Panthers to eight Southwestern Athletic Conference championships and five black college national championships. At the Panthers' peak under Nicks, Eddie Robinson was said to dread playing Prairie View.

Nicks was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1999. Nicks was named the American Football Coaches Association's recipient of the Trailblazer Award. The award was presented posthumously at the AFCA Kickoff Luncheon on Monday, January 7 at the 2008 AFCA Convention in Anaheim, California.

Prairie View is recognized as the first historically Black university to create and play in a post-season bowl game. The Prairie View Bowl was played in Texas from 1929 through 1961.

The Panthers won Black college football national championship titles in 1953, 1954, 1958, 1963, and 1964 and Southwestern Athletic Conference Championships SWAC in 1933, 1951, 1952, 1953, 1954, 1958, 1960, 1963, 1964, and recently in 2009. Notable football players that have achieved success in the National Football League (NFL) are National Football Hall of Fame Inductee Kenny Houston, who played for the Houston Oilers and Washington Redskins and Otis Taylor, who won a World Championship with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1969. On a small note of significance, Charlie "Choo Choo" Brackins, who played from 1952–1955, was the first HBCU alumnus to play quarterback in the NFL.

The end of Jim Crow caused a significant talent drain for all HBCUs. Nicks had been able to stem the tide somewhat by persuading many of the state's black high school coaches to continue sending their players to Prairie View rather than to a predominantly white school. At one point, nearly all of them had played for Nicks, and owed their jobs to him. Usually, a single phone call from Nicks was enough to persuade one of Nicks' former players to send a prospect to "The Hill." He wasn't above threatening to have them fired if they didn't do so. However, Prairie View's fortunes sank rapidly after Nicks retired in 1965. The Panthers would only "officially" finish above .500 twice from 1968 to 1989. This included winless seasons in 1974, 1979, 1983, and 1984 and a 28-game losing streak from 1982 to 1985. They managed a .500 record in 1988 under coach Haney Catchings—their first non-losing season since 1976. However, that win was forfeited after the season due to an ineligible player.

Prairie View bottomed out when it returned to the field for the 1991 season. The team did not have any scholarships because only 150 alumni responded to a request to help raise a scholarship fund. The Panthers did not win a single game until 1998. The 80 consecutive losses spanning parts of nine seasons (including two losses to close the 1989 season) almost doubled Columbia University's 44 straight losses between 1983 and 1988.

The streak finally ended with a 14–12 victory over Langston on September 26, 1998. However, that team only had 15 scholarship players. The road back was difficult; the Panthers only won a total of 23 games between 1998 and 2006.

On November 10, 2007, Prairie View clinched its first winning season since 1976, and only their second since 1967, with a 30–27 victory over traditional power Jackson State University under then head coach Henry Frazier, III.

In 1999 the SWAC moved to a new divisional format with Western Division and Eastern Division champions to play for the SWAC Championship. On November 14, 2009, it clinched its first SWAC Western Division Championship by defeating Alcorn State. The next weekend would see the Panthers go undefeated in the SWAC by defeating Arkansas Pine Bluff and securing an 8–1 record; their only loss during the season was to New Mexico State. They finished the season by winning the SWAC Championship on December 12, defeating Eastern Division Champion Alabama A&M, 30–24, in the SWAC Championship Game. They exited the 2009 SWAC football campaign with an unblemished 9–0 SWAC conference record. They were led by their quarterback, 6 ft 4 in, 225-pound KJ Black, who led all quarterbacks in the SWAC with a passer efficiency rating of 168.1 their SWAC second-leading rusher in Donald Babers that averaged 5.2 yards per carry



# PANTHER STADIUM

It's year eight in the state of the art Panther Stadium at Blackshear Field, the inaugural season kicked off on Sunday, Sept. 4, 2016 when the Panthers took on the Tigers of Texas Southern. Panther Stadium seats 15,000 and is home to the 55,000-square foot Athletics Administration Building which sits in the west end of the stadium. The stadium sits in the former home of the original Blackshear Field that hosted both Panther football and track teams from 1948 - 2014. The Panthers currently hold a 21-11 home record since the opening of Panther Stadium at Blackshear Field.



# PANTHERS IN THE NFL



Quinton Bell Defensive End Atlanta Falcons - First Year: Bell was the first draft pick from Prairie View A&M since Matthew Teague who was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys in the tenth round and was made the transition from wide receiver to defensive in his final season with the Panthers. In the 2015 season he played in six games and caught two passes for 24 yards. In the 2016 season started three and played in 10 games where he caught nine passes for 138 yards and one touchdown against Rice(10/22) and caught two passes at Jackson St.(10/29) for 28 yards. In his final season as wide receiver he caught 8 passes for 97 yards. In his final year with the Panthers he made the switch defensive end in his final season where he earned 14 solo tackles and 32 tackles for a total 46 tackles in his senior season. He had 7.5 sacks for 38 yards. Bell was drafted by the Oakland Raiders in the seventh round with the 230th overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. He was waived on August 31, 2019 and re-signed to the practice squad. He was released on October 15. On November 5, 2019, Bell was signed to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers practice squad.[6] He signed a reserve/future contract with the Buccaneers on December 30, 2019.

Bell was waived by the Buccaneers on October 26, 2020, and re-signed to the practice squad two days later.....On February 9, 2021, Bell re-signed with the Buccaneers and was a part of the 2021 Super Bowl LV Championship team.....He was waived on August 22, 2021. Signing with the Atlanta Falcons on September 1, 2021, to the practice squad.....He signed a reserve/future contract with the Falcons on January 10, 2022.

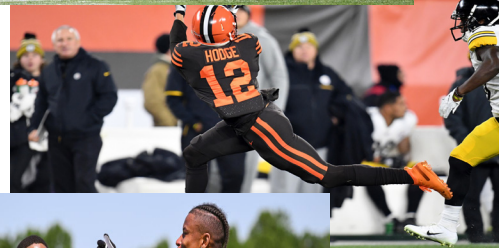
On September 1, 2021, Bell was signed to the Atlanta Falcons practice squad. He signed a reserve/future contract with the Falcons on January 10, 2022. Bell made the Falcons roster in 2022, playing three games before being waived on November 5, 2022, and re-signed to the practice squad. He signed a reserve/future contract on January 9, 2023. He was waived on April 14, 2023.

Bell was signed by the Philadelphia Eagles on August 19, 2023. He was released on August 29, 2023. On October 17, 2023, Bell was signed to the Miami Dolphins practice squad. He signed a reserve/future contract on January 15, 2024.



## Khadarel Hodge Wide Receiver - Atlanta Falcons First Year

Hodge began his collegiate career as a quarterback at Alcorn State but left after redshirting the 2014 season. Transferred to Hinds Community College in 2015, where he transitioned to wide receiver. He later transferred to Prairie View A&M in 2016 and played three seasons for the Panthers, catching 104 passes for 1,797 yards and 21 touchdowns. In 2015 he played in 10 games and started in 6, he caught 28 passes for 499 yards with 3 touchdowns. In 2016 season he played in nine games, earned 28 catches for 454 yards and 6 touchdowns. In Hodge's final season with the Panthers he played in 11 games, with a career high of 48 receptions for 844 yards and a career high of 12 touchdowns. In his first season with the Panthers he earned two receptions and 17 yards with his longest catch being 14 yards. Signed by the Los Angeles Rams as an undrafted free agent on July 24, 2018...Waived by the Rams on Sept. 1, 2018...Signed to Rams' practice squad on Sept. 2, 2018...Promoted to Rams' active roster on Sept. 19, 2018...Waived by the Rams on Aug. 31, 2019...As a rookie in 2018, he appeared in the final 14 games of the regular season and three postseason contests, including Super Bowl LIII. Claimed by the Cleveland Browns off waivers on Sept. 1, 2019. Hodge led the Browns with 13 special teams tackles in 2019.....Logged career-bests with four receptions for 76 yards in 2019 and led the team with 13 special teams tackles....Hodge was tendered by the Browns for the 2020 season, and signed the one-year tender on April 16, 2020. He was placed on injured reserve on October 6, 2020.....Hodge was activated from injured reserve on October 31, 2020 and was placed on the reserve/COVID-19 list by the team on December 26, 2020, he was activated on December 31. On January 5, 2021, he was placed back on the COVID-19 list and activated on January 14. Hodge finished the season with 11 receptions for 180 yards on 17 targets in nine games played.....The Browns placed a restricted free agent tender on Hodge on March 15, 2021, which he signed on May 26, 2021. Hodge was waived by the Browns on August 31, 2021...and headed to the Detroit Lions where he was claimed off waivers by the Detroit Lions on September 1, 2021.....signing with the Atlanta Falcons on March 25, 2022. On April 11, 2023, Hodge was re-signed with the Atlanta Falcons. Hodge statistically had his most successful season yet as a wide receiver in the NFL with the Falcons, tallying career highs with 13 receptions, 202 yards and scoring his first career touchdown in a game against the Carolina Panthers. On March 14, 2024, Hodge re-signed with the Falcons again on a one-year deal.
